620 WAKY KY, Louisville – 12/17 2208 noted with an Oldies format featuring music from King Harvest, "Merry Christmas, WAKY" jingle into a Christmas song by Frank Sinatra. A poor to very poor signal was noted in a mix of stations, confirmed via Tune-In Web stream. (PS-ON)

810 WCKA AL, Jacksonville - 12/15 1626 noted with Christmas music, mention of "Monday morning, 6:00 till 10:00 on WCKA, Alabama 810 and 94.3 and 97.1 FM" by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WGY, WSJC and an unidentified talk station. (KK-VA) (Your other talker may be

sports talk station WHB Kansas City, MO - eb) WSJC MS, Magee - 12/15 1700 noted with "AM 810 WSJC" ID by a female announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WCKA, WGY and an unidentified talk station. (KK-VA)

GA, Thomasville – 12/15 1730 noted with "WHGH Thomasville concludes its... broadcast..." as part of a sign-off announcement by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WHAS, WKTR and an unidentified station with vocal music in Spanish. (KK-VA)

ME, Gorham – 12/18 2232 noted earlier with Oldies and Christmas music under WHCU and WWL; checking back later, I heard an ad and "WLVP" 840 WHGH

870 WLVP weather" mention at 2233 (supposed to be simulcasting WLAM 1470, but I was sure they said WLVP), more Oldies before fading out. The signal was noted occasionally over WWL, but mostly under with WHCU as well. (PS-ON)

1030 WEBS GA, Calhoun - 12/14 2252 noted with a Country format, featuring music by Shenandoah and Randy Houser, "Kicking Country 103.5" ID at 2257, followed by selections from Chris Young and Big & Rich, missed a possible full ID at 2302 into more music. A poor but readable at times to very poor signal was noted under WBZ; confirmed via Tune-In Web stream. (PS-ON)

NC, Franklin – 12/16 2140 noted with a clear "1480 WPFJ" ID, popped through a station mix before fading. A poor signal was noted momentarily

1480 WPFJ in a station mix with WDJO, WTOX and an unidentified station playing an old-time radio show (probably "It's a Wonderful Life"), which turned out to be WHBC. (PS-ON)

Gary DeBock's Hawaii Trip (a few highlights)

12/18. Yikes! The regular Pacific island DU's were overwhelmed with monster signals from Japan, North Korea and China from 0730-1010 UTC, resulting in the wackiest TP-DXing session I've ever experienced. The first sign of bizarre activity was 1440-JOWF mixing with Kiribati in an S9 snarl around 0750, followed by a slew of North Koreans pounding in on 657, 801, 810, 819 and 855 (complete with South Korea Jammers on 810 and 819). The Chinese crashed the party from 0800-1000, with 981 and 999-CNR1 both well over S9, while 621-China actually started pushing Tuvalu down into the noise. 1440-Kiribati was diced by JOWF through the duration, but the Chinese practically owned the band on the other frequencies, with potent signals on 612, 621, 783, 792, 837, 909, 918, 927, 981, 999, etc. 846-Kiribati continued to have intermittent signals (one MP3 had them dropping out 3 times within 15 seconds) while 621-Tuvalu had an intermittent garbled signal throughout the night. No real time to sort out all the wacky snarls tonight, but here is 621-China doing its best to crash the 621-Tuvalu sign off at 1005 in one of many S9 snarls, complete with a garbled signal from Tuvalu during its national anthem. At least Tuvalu manages to fight off China long enough to get the (garbled) anthem through! (Sorry for the 1 kHz het- no time to remove it tonight) https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/6w3k47s0wk3tuqvdz8cm1up6foo6pcbq

12/19. The Asians once again slammed the Pacific island DU's with huge signals from 0830-1030, so apparently this is the usual Kona propagation pattern for December. Japan, Korea and China were all well represented, with several wild and wacky S9+ signals from the likes of 819-Pyongyang, 981-CNR1 and 1440-JOWF. 846 and 1440-Kiribati have delayed their sign off until 1014 the last couple of days, so this may be a new programming change. 1440-Kiribati's sign off was particularly interesting tonight, with JOWF doing its best to hold down the frequency. 621-Tuvalu's garbled audio has become a chronic issue, and no longer seems to be intermittent. Unlike April both of these DU's have trouble holding down their frequencies, and around 1000 Tuvalu's garbled audio was so weak that three different TP's (NHK1, Pyongyang and China) were running all over it, TP mixes were all over the band, with Japan, North Korea and China fighting it out. Recordings have been made of all these mixes but there's no time currently to write up a detailed report and post them. The full report will need to wait until return to Puyallup, I'm afraid. In any case I'll post this one wacky recording of 819 Pyongyang KCBS at 1035 tonight (dedicated to Chris Kadlec), with bizarre female doowop music loud enough to wake up the dead https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/xd18go0080a8xgnku4fcwf3ug2mcaws0

12/23. The 5-day trip to warm and (usually) sunny Kona, Hawaii has wrapped up, and now I've returned with a huge number of obscure TP-DX recordings made with a 5 inch (127mm) TSA-friendly FSL antenna (also known as the "Frequent Flyer" model). This antenna was specifically designed to pass quickly and easily through airports, and provide gain roughly similar to that of a 4 foot (1.3m) air core box loop.

December propagation in Kona was a stark change from what was observed during a 4-day trip to Kona with identical gear in April. In April the Pacific island DU's on 540, 558, 621, 1017, 1098 and 1440 had no Asian competition from 0700-1030 UTC, and could pound in at awesome strength all alone on their frequencies during those hours. By contrast, during this week's Hawaii trip the Asian TP's started pestering the Pacific island DU's as early as 0730, and usually drowned most of them out by 0830. The only exceptions were the new 846-Kiribati from Christmas Island, its 1440-Kiribati parallel (although with a 19-second delay between the two, with Christmas Island lagging), and 1098-Marshalls. Overwhelming signals from Japan, North Korean and China were usually all over the band by 0900 UTC, with the second-tier Asians sounding like big gun TP's do on the west coast. The 5 inch FSL did a great job in providing gain to record many exotic MP3's at good levels, but the "side effect" was piling up a huge number of obscure TP recordings (including wild TP snarls), and the necessity to "record first, and report later.'

In an attempt to provide some organization to the wild process I decided to initially report TP-DX according to the countries of origin, and post links for some of the more memorable recordings from each area. Once the dust has settled a more detailed (frequency-by-frequency) report should be in order. The group of MP3's chosen for this first report were all recorded from North Korea, a bizarre country with even more bizarre programming. Other North Korea stations were received in TP snarls, but these were generally all alone. They include an S7 recording of Pyongyang's Japanese service on 621 (with degraded audio from the transmitter), a transmitter on 801 with a Southern Jammer (sounding like the old 1053 beehive) and an 819 transmitter loud enough to wake up the dead. A curious point was that the usual west coast big gun on 657 was never received - a victim of loud Hawaiian splatter from 650 and 670.

621 DPR KOREA Pyongyang Bangsong, Chongjin. Voice of Korea Japanese service at a strong level, complete with a buzzing transmitter. This was one of three Asian TP's (including China and NHK1) that would usually run Tuvalu off the rails around 0900

- 801 DPR KOREA Pyongyang Bangsong, Kimchaek. This station was a moderate-strength regular, and had an intermittent Beehive-type jammer from the South https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/e4kr0asg24d1ujyk74zztcbdl8aepazh. Jammer and Pyongyang at equal anemic strength https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/2fgnifuus86pd0n9qzsatzps56hk43kb
- 819 DPR KOREA Pyongyang Bangsong, Pyongyang. Far and away the strongest North Korea station in Kona, this signal would pound in around 0830 and vary from S7 to S9+ right up until 1030. Bizarre vocal music from a female group was at legendary strength at 0935 on 12/19 https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/gj2deffl7mjuzqr5tocsro100sfhqll9. Typical music and 3+1 time pips at the North Korean "TOH" of 0930 on 12/20 https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/v7q9eniu9qq1f27rbq97v4c9zbni2eha
- DPR KOREA Pyongyang Bangsong, Sangwon. Those who remember the tirade lady on 657 will recognize the voice in this recording. This station was always around during good TP propagation, but never at overwhelming strength https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/34r4oayh63kxxigc6hisu3t5bfhz1yeb
