ALASKA KOTZ, Kotzebue. OCT 12 0435-0440 – weak but alone, matching special programming scheduled as per their Facebook page: NPR-style female host interviewing male speaker on religious topics. First Alaskan on first DX through North basement window; South window was just RFI on 720. [JP-AB] ALASKA KICY, Nome. OCT 6 1305-1400 – clear religious sermon in English to BOH, then "Music in the Night" program to TOH. Solid signal at times, alternating with Spanish from assumed Chihuahua. Amazingly free of expected QRM from KOA. Missed ID at 1300 and too weak by 1400 for ID, but who else could it be? Sent e-mail report to generalmanager@kicy.org gleaned from website. Listened again on OCT 8 around 1300 hoping for ID, but KOA dominating. Was KOA off on the 6th? First MW Alaskan for me in years; I'll take it! [AP-CA]

650 MÉXICO XETNT, Los Mochis, Sin. OCT 12 1200 – opening 'Noticiero Altavoz' (loudspeaker newscast) with 6 am timecheck, dominant signal here, and also audible // amid QRM on 610, XEGS Guasave, both still on AM though Radio 65's FM has moved to 100.5, ex-106.5, top of band being cleared for

community/non-commercial use. [GH-OK]

MÉXICO XEROK, Ciudad Juárez, Chih. OCT 12 1207 – XEROK doing well, must be running more power than usual, vs easily nulled KQCV OKC. Adstring including help-wanted for some engineer familiar with AM radio (for XEROK itself? apply at a street address on Insurgentes, which chex for XEROK). "800, bajo el cielo de Ciudad Juárez"; local news headlines, on 'Calibre 800' (short for canal libre = clear channel) which seems to be the newscast name, on "Radio Cañón". 1210 finally starts the news with 6:09 TC; 1211 mix a bit of English, "Good morning, El Paso"; and "sí, hay clases, no hay día festive", no holiday for students even though this is the Day of the Race. At this time you would not know the main format has converted to religion. [GH-OK]

870 MÉXICO XETAR, Guachochi, Čhih. OCT 12 1215 – La Voz de la Sierra Tarahumara going from Spanish to native language, leisurely opening announcements including phone numbers for CDI and other government agencies, mixed with bits of rustic music. Good dominant signal from Guachochi, Chihuahua, hardly any WWL to be heard even if nulled. [GH-OK]

10/13. I'm at Grayland this weekend with Chuck and Tom. As is usually the case, it was a much different story out here. There were lots of TPs to be heard, with carriers on nearly all of the 9 kHz channels. About 80-90% of the stations were from Japan including many of the low powered NHK outlets. For example, at 1400 963 was a mix of weak NHK1 pips and news plus a little bit of CRI. Other NHK frequencies I've found so far include 648, 990, 999, 1035, 1071, 1089, 1125, 1152, 1296, 1386, 1512 and 1602, in addition to the usual suspects. Some of the Japanese commercial stations did well at times, too, with 1179 being an especially notable example.

Chinese and Koreans were inaudible or barely there most of the time, with 1566 being a major exception. VOA-1575 was also good around sunrise with something in the background (probably an FEN outlet).

There were also a few of the more common DUs, such as 702 891 1017 and 1503, but they were generally weaker than normal. I also had something on 1611 with contemporary-sounding music, including a Christmas song, possibly one of the Vision network outlets.

10.14. Day two at Grayland. Conditions were much better today. At first it looked like a DU morning, with many Aussies at about 1100-1200. Then the Asians suddenly faded up, with a nice mix of Chinese, Japanese and Korean signals.

The 711 KBS station was often stronger than KIRO, and parallel to 864 981 1062 and probably some others.

There were Chinese stations on interesting frequencies: 972 (sometimes overriding KBS), 1053, 1062, 1089, 1107, 1251, 1305, 1368, 1566 (behind HLAZ), and others that escape my memory at the moment. Plus some of the more common Chinese like 918, 936, 945, 963, 981, 1008, 1017, 1035, 1044, 1098, 1206, 1242, 1287, 1332, 1323, 1377, 1422, 1593, etc.

We also had the usual assortment of Japanese stations. Unlike yesterday, the weak low-powered ones on 963 etc were buried under stations from elsewhere. Also Taiwan on 738/1143.

There were TPs on several domestic channels 630(Australia and China), 990(UnID), 1170(Korea) and 1260/1350/1440(all Japan). Maybe a couple of others. I'll have more to report after going through hours of files.

Greetings. I would like to report about things I have heard. All times and dates strictly UT.

RX: mostly DX-398 with internal antennas only or PL-880; NRD-545 with ALA-330S inside E-W or inside random wire N-S; Nissan caradio as specified; or IC-R75 longwire.

All my MW DX reports starting August, 2011 in this forum with open access: http://forums.wtfda.org/showthread.php?6543-MW-DX-from-Enid-OK-by-Glenn-Hauser/page71. Also included here: https://www.mail-archive.com/irca@hard-core.dx.com/.

890 October 3 at 1821, KTLR OKC is the first station I hear running the much-publicized nationwide EAS test (eclipsed by text version 2 minutes earlier I am not equipped to receive). It's an impossible task to evaluate the 1-minute EAS without the entire local AM and/or FM bands for later study as if they were DX – did anybody so this?

As zero-minute approached, I was set to scan up MW ASAP starting at 550. After KTLR, many others were heard but nothing seemed to be synchronized. One station still playing music while others EASed was 1130 KLEY Wellington KS but moving on, I don't know whether they did run it

earlier, later or never. At least, they long ago solved the transmission break-up/noise pulsing which plagued KLEY most of the first half of this year.

Notably, 930 WKY OKC ran a Spanish version of the EAS announcement circa 1822. At least, I did not hear a horrible echoes of distortions as has happened previously, due to too-lengthy chains!

WJAG is surprisingly seldom heard here at 629 km=391 statute miles; 1 kW ND daytimer with 500 watt PSRA but no PSSA, says NRC AM Log. If not for KSPI, it might be JBA in daytime like 840 KTIC, but that's 5 kW. Official FCC sunrise for WJAG full power is 1245 in October, 1315 in November. In fact, I find only one previous report of it, almost exactly three years ago, so this must be the season for it.

"780, Oct 8 [2015!] at 1210, promo for Norfolk Community Theatre, local news from WJAG, le Norfolk NE, 1 kW ND daytimer, but before 1245 in Oct, must be only on 500 W PSRA; yes, one of those few legacy W-calls west of the Miss. Nearby KSPI OK is nulled, and at this time no WBBM, after actual Chicago sunrise today at 1155." WJAG dates back to 1922, but no explanation of the call letters: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/WJAG. Own website seems to lack any history: http://norfolkdailynews.com/wjag/.

UnID. 771, Oct 9 at 1322, carrier here hetting another one on 770. Strange, not noted before, not a TP frequency, and too late for that anyway. Possibly local device, but seems spot on 771.00; could a US station be 1 kHz off, vs KKOB, KKOB or KKAM?

UnID. 1710, Oct 7 at 0604, JBA talk vs noise level and CCI, TIS? I include this frequency in MW bandscans, and often there is a JBA carrier, but had not heard Radio Retén lo que Tienes, gospel huxter pirate in Baton Rouge LA, for months after alleged FCC bust at least of its publicized FM side. Checking since Terry L Krueger, Clearwater FL, just reported this as audible again.

Here in deep North America, not much chance for me to pull any audio from TAs or TPs, but I spend a few minutes now and then cataloguing all the 9-kHz carriers I can detect:

780, Oct 12 at 1204, nulling KSPI Stillwater, I expect still to hear WBBM making fast SAH with off-frequency KSPI, but instead it's Newstalk 780, WJAG, Norfolk NE, with morning news, ad for Battle Creek Mutual Insurance - that could be confusing - and 1205, Skywatch weather including records

UnID. Trans-Atlantic just-barely-audible MW carrier search, Oct 2 at 0133-0138: 531, 549, 585, 621, 774(2), 837, 882, 909, 936, 954, 999, 1017, 1044, 1089, 1098, 1107, 1125(2, one of them minus, Belgium?), 1134(2), 1215.

Trans-Pacific JBA MW carrier search, Oct 2 at 1158-1202: 1098, 837(2), 774, 1035, 1548. Again at 1204-1209: 1017, 882(2), 828, 747, 702, 612, 594(2). Also something on about 1367.904 which I suspect is from a local device.

Trans-Pacific JBA MW carrier search, October 5 at 1221-1240: on the DX-398, the lower ones are definitely NW, like Japan, but above 900 they are generally difficult to get a DF null, as if they are coming both from FE and DU: 594, 666, 747, 774, 828, 837, 873, 882(2), 891, 936, 972, 1026, 1035, 1044, 1053(2), 1098-W, 1116 (2), 1134, 1143, 1197, 1206, 1224, 1242, 1287, 1296+, 1314, 1323, 1332, 1404, 1476, 1494, 1503, 1512, 1521, 1548-WSW, 1566, 1593, 1611-WSW. 747 and 774 were strongest at outset; and when finishing at 1240 I recheck 774 and find it still audible, but much

Trans-Pacific JBA MW carrier search, Oct 12 at 1222: 657-WSW, 702-NW, 747-NW, 774-NW, 882-WSW, 1017-WSW; unchecked further up but not much expected. At 1228 recheck, still in are Japan 747, 774 and 828 from NW.

A couple of changes have been made on the local AM dial. WJBM 1480 Jerseyville IL has flipped from a News/Talk format to Country, adding translator W284DN on 104.7 MHz. WQQW 1510 Highland IL has ditched its Classic Hits format for News/Talk, calling itself "Southwest Illinois' News Radio 1510. The ag programs remain on the air at WQQW. The biggest surprised I've noted in recent weeks is the silence of WKBF 1270 Rock Island IL. According to other DXers, the Regional Mexican-formatted station lost the lease to their transmitter site. In WKBF's absence, KRXO, WLIK, WQKR, WWWI and WXGO have been noted at this location. WKBF was dominate on 1270, going back to when it was WHBF. IRCA Business Meeting Reports

Secretary/Treasurer (Lynn Hollerman)

As of 8/14/18, we have 185 members (7 are members due to bulletin exchange). Membership has steadily increased since proposal 28.1.24 (in Volume 55, No 33 of the DX Monitor), which made renewal membership free and new membership \$5. However, several members have said they've gotten out of the radio hobby. It appears to me from the volume of payments that more and more members are using PayPal; it's far more common in recent years that I go to the PO and find no mail in our box. PayPal has again made several alterations to their site, most of which made it easier for users.

As of 8/14/18, our treasury balance is \$12,955.47; all bills are paid for the year. This year, the PO Box was \$82, up from \$76 last year and \$70 the year before. "Frequent Flyer" FSL Antennas Take Off – Gary DeBock (via eGroup)

The mission of the compact, TSA-friendly "Frequent Flyer" FSL antennas is (to paraphrase Captain Kirk) to "seek out exotic new DX, and new propagation... to boldly go where no gain antenna has gone before." With this compact antenna's ability to go practically anywhere and provide serious inductive coupling gain for portable radios, isolated ocean beaches worldwide have suddenly come into play for serious long range DXing.

Just like Captain Kirk and his crew put their skills to the test in strange new worlds, a "Frequent Flyer" DXer puts his skills to the test on strange ocean beaches, and isolated tropical islands. Weather can be extreme, and the DXer needs to be ready to face the challenge head on. Instead of Klingons there are RFI issues to work around, and in instead of Romulans there are prohibitions on external antennas. Internet access costs can easily exceed the yearly budget of a Star Trek captain. A strong sense of creativity and adaptability is a must, as well as a determination to carry out the mission regardless of any obstacles. But the rewards are as great as the challenges.

Most DXers are aware that a salt water beach can enhance transoceanic propagation, but few DXers have had the chance to chase transoceanic DX on an isolated tropical island, surrounded by salt water on all four sides. John Bryant had the chance to do so at Easter Island in 2007, and I had the unforgettable experience of doing so on Aitutaki Island (in the Cook group) in April. Ocean-enhanced propagation at such sites seems to be in a higher league than what we enjoy here on North American beaches. John Bryant remarked (in his unforgettable way) that DXing on Easter Island was "the most fun that I've ever had with my clothes on." DXing on Aitutaki Island was certainly in the same league, although I wouldn't want to attempt any description similar to John's. After receiving long range AM-DX from India, Bangladesh, Cambodia, Mongolia and Brazil with a compact FSL antenna, though, I can definitely say that it was the most fun that I've

If you plan a long range vacation (or many) and think that you are up to the challenge of "Frequent Flyer" DXing on exotic ocean beaches, the Federation would like to talk with you. New ferrite bar and ferrite rod FSL models are available for donation to those who are willing to put their DXing skills (and innovation) to the ultimate test. So consider following in the footsteps of Captain Kirk, and take this opportunity to put your hobby excitement into warp drive.
