

Airport Security And Airline-Based DX-peditioning:

While it is still fresh in my mind, I thought that I might share a few lessons learned from my recent DXpedition to Easter Island. In Spring 2007, I actually planned two DXpeditions, almost back-to-back, so that the first, to Cape Hatteras, North Carolina, might serve as a test bed for the second, the main trip to Easter Island. I was particularly concerned about moving a lot of bits and pieces of radio gear through airport security.

For each trip, I used two large pieces of luggage which were checked for the flight and a mediumsized backpack which I carried on the aircraft with me. Even though specially miniaturized for these journeys, my radio gear alone weighed about 50 pounds and was made up of many small, suspicious-looking objects.

Given my history of lost luggage, I was also very concerned about arriving at my destination without some vital piece of radio equipment. Thus, I decided to keep my main DXing gear with me in my carry-on back pack: my main receiver, the Eton E1-XM, one matching transformer, my main audio recorder, the Edirol R-09 by Roland, a few spare batteries, ear bud headphones and 500 feet of 28 gage teflon- coated antenna wire. When viewed through an airport X-ray machine, I cannot imagine more suspicious looking carry-on luggage than that backpack.

I also planned to be at the airport at least two hours early for flights to allow for security problems. I planned similar long lay- overs at way-points for luggage security or customs problems.

Counting both trips from my home in Oklahoma, the carry-on backpack went through the security X-ray machine an even dozen times in the US, Santiago, Chile and Easter Island. It made it through X-ray 10 out of 12 times with no questions asked, a fact that I find both shocking and frightening. The two times that the backpack was inspected were each also interesting: one inspection was a rather cursory physical search, with the security agent being easily satisfied with my explanation of the wire as a radio antenna and with an offer by me to turn on the portable radio to demonstrate it.

During the second instance of carry-on inspection, the agent used a hand-held piece of equipment that was a black box with a long rigid tube attached; the security agent pushed the tube down into various pockets and crevices in the backpack, apparently using the device to "sniff" for explosive residue. That inspection was very quick and I passed, of course. I did also carry in the backpack a club bulletin and a commercial magazine with radio articles by me in them: aids to help me prove that I was a "radio enthusiast," if questioned in depth at security checkpoints. Those documents were never needed, but their presence was certainly reassuring.

My experiences with the checked baggage were considerably more thought-provoking. I encountered absolutely no Security problems during the trips between Oklahoma and Norfolk, VA on the Cape Hatteras trip, so I began to think that my concerns and planning in this area were way over-blown. Not so.

As was standard procedure, leaving for Easter Island, I arrived at Oklahoma City's Will Rogers World Airport with well over two hours to spare. I checked in, got my boarding pass and had to carry that darn backpack the full length of the airport to the most remote departure gate. I had just collapsed into a comfortable seat at my gate when the all-gates paging system squawked "Will American Airlines passenger Mr. John Bryant please report to the nearest American Airlines Agent."

Frankly, that sounded kinda scary; it got worse! I reported to the gate agent and was told that I needed to return the full length of the airport to the Baggage Claim area because the security people "could not unlock your checked luggage to inspect it." I told the agent in no uncertain terms that my luggage was NOT locked and there had to be a mistake... they then informed me that they couldn't solve the problem at the gate and I would need to make the half-mile hike, with my backpack, to Baggage Claim "if you want to travel with us today, sir." So....

When I got to the Information Desk at Baggage Claim, I was confronted by an armed female Oklahoma City police officer who stayed at least 6 feet from me and maintained her hand on her holstered pistol, as she dealt with me. I haven't felt that threatened, personally, since my government-paid trip to Viet Nam in the late 1960s. She informed me that both Federal and Oklahoma City security agents had serious concerns about some of the contents of my luggage and that I'd need to "accompany" her to be interviewed by these agents. She would not walk with or ahead of me, but maintained the 6-foot space behind me and directed me, in a very loud voice, "Down that hall, sir!" "Through that door, sir!" "Walk to the left, sir!" I was later discouraged from describing the security apparatus that I viewed in the baggage- handling bowels of the airport on this little journey with the lady cop, but it was very impressive.

Eventually, the lady policeman, her pistol and I all made it to a table where they had my most equipment-laden suitcase opened out and were examining it like they were doing an autopsy on a particularly interesting but disgusting corpse.

I got interviewed by Oklahoma City police officers and by David W. Culver, Assistant Federal Security Director-Law Enforcement, who was not easily satisfied. It turned out that what had concerned them, what had tripped the alarm, was the PVC pipe enclosure on a Ramsey Active Ferrite Bar receiving antenna that I'd only brought along to use in the heavily noise-ridden environment of my downtown hotel room in Santiago. Mr. Culver told me that the L-shaped piece of 1.5 inch PVC pipe "looked just like a pipe bomb."

I told him that I thought that was kind of odd, since all of the pipe bombs that I'd ever seen in articles were from iron or steel pipe to produce shrapnel during the explosion. He didn't want to discuss that further, but informed me that ANYTIME that I carry any PVC product, I need to treat it just "like you do when you check in luggage containing a loaded pistol." That finally made me mad. I told him that I was very conscious of security matters and that I had NEVER seen an advisory cautioning against PVC and that I had no idea how to check luggage containing a loaded pistol; I hadn't owned one since I'd laid down my trusty six-shooter, when I turned 9-years old.

He explained that, carrying PVC, one should check your luggage at the airline counter and tell them of the PVC. They would then inspect the luggage at the counter and determine whether you could proceed... if so, they specially mark your bag. Well, after another 15 minutes of discussion, we all parted friends and they rushed me through more of the bowels of the airport, even taking me on a short-cut across the tarmac, and both I and my suspect bag did make the flight. They were appreciative of a large-scale typed note that I'd left atop the stuff in each bag, written to the security agents, thanking them for inspecting the bag, explaining that I was a radio hobbyist and volunteering to explain or demonstrate any of the equipment, if they had security concern. They were also very appreciative of the fact that I had checked in for my flight over two hours early. So was I, since I was just flying to Dallas to then catch a ten-hour overnight flight to Santiago.

Thinking things over later, I think that there is a good chance that Agent Culver wasn't telling me the exact truth. I'll bet you that the PVC pipe, which was almost brand new, was out-gassing and that their sniffer-sensors can't distinguish between PVC pipe and some forms of plastic explosives, hence the very-understandable red flag. At least, that explanation makes more sense to me. In any case, I will NEVER knowingly carry PVC in my luggage, again. As a matter of fact, I disassembled that Ramsey antenna while I was on Easter Island and left the PVC pipe behind.

So, after this experience, here are my current working rules for airline-based DXpeditions:

- 1. Be at the airport and through the security checkpoint at least two hours before flight time. The radio items in your luggage may well trip some sensor and the resulting close inspection/explanations with the security personnel can be time consuming.
- 2. Having a note to security in each checked bag about the contents seems like a smart thing to do. It helped in my case.
- 3. Beside having plenty of photo-ID, having a club bulletin or radio magazine that contains identifying material in it that shows you, personally to be a bona fide radio enthusiast is quite helpful.
- 4. Don't try to take PVC through any security checkpoint. If you absolutely must do so, have the airline inspect that bag at the airline counter.
- 5. Getting mad or feeling unfairly singled out does NOT help. Keeping your cool, thanking them for doing their jobs and being sympathetic to the difficult choices that your gear might force on them also seems to work very well.

AFN: THE VANISHED SHOOTING STAR

During World War Two, the Armed Forces Radio Service "may well stand as the highest expression of American broadcasting." That was the view of one of the leading figures in the broadcasting world.

From 1942 it put out hundreds of hours of programs unrivalled for quality, as all the top stars in America gave their services free "for the boys over there."

As well as direct broadcasts, it produced over a million disks that were distributed to its offshoots all over the world, wherever American men and women were serving. The biggest of those was the American Forces Network.

From 70 broadcasting stations in the United Kingdom it transmitted programs from July 4, 1943, to Dec. 31, 1945, when it finally moved to Germany. Its intended audience: the many thousands of American troops pouring into Britain for the invasion of Nazi-occupied Europe and servicing the vast air armada carrying out the great offensive against Hitler's Germany.

Surviving AFRS programs can be numbered by the hundred — "Command Performance," "Mail Call," "GI Jive" and many others. Yet of the 2-1/2 years of AFN daily output, less than an hour is known to have survived.

Of course a great deal of its output consisted of rebroadcasts of AFRS programs. There were also a number of record programs that it would be pointless for the broadcasters themselves to record;

and listeners would be unable to record at all because in the days before audio tape only professional equipment was capable of recording radio broadcasts.

Nevertheless AFN originated a number of its own programs and it is surprising not one of these has survived.

No open

AFN's own archives have no material from the war years, nor does the BBC Sound Archives, with two brief exceptions. A dwindling number of AFN personnel who survived from the war years have nothing.

Syl Binkin, the first man to put AFN on the air on the Fourth of July 1943, kept some recordings from those days that he hung on to for years; but they vanished in a move, never to be seen (or heard) again.

There is any amount of material from AFN's long stay in Germany, but from the 2-1/2 years in wartime London, virtually nothing. It is particularly surprising that AFN's opening broadcast, an historic event in broadcasting history, was not recorded or, if it was, has vanished. The various institutions in the States that hold audio recordings of all kinds have a wealth of wartime programs but of AFN output, not so much as a station ident. It was the same story at the German national sound archives and other broadcasting archives on the Continent.

A few brief fragments of AFN's final day of broadcasting in the United Kingdom on Dec. 31, 1945, have come to light. But the source for these is something of a mystery. It is understandable that AFN's final program in Britain should be recorded for posterity,

presumably by AFN itself. But why only a few disjointed fragments have survived is puzzling.

Another oddity is that the BBC, which at first resisted the creation of AFN, later got on so well with the broadcasting "intruder" that it transmitted a special tribute, "Farewell AFN," in peak listening time. No recording of that program can now be found.

There is one other possible source for AFN program material, and that is the "Allied Expeditionary Forces Program," or AEFP. This was set up at the insistence of General Dwight Eisenhower, who commanded the great army that was soon to invade Europe. He wanted one single broadcasting station that would send the same message to all the thousands of servicemen taking part in D-Day and beyond.



The BBC strongly opposed the idea and so did AFN, which was perfectly happy with the way things were — Yanks and Brits doing their own thing in their own way.

Ike was furious. AFN, a military outfit, could be ordered to toe the line, but not the BBC. Finally Eisenhower went to the top and took the matter to Winston Churchill, who had no choice. He told the BBC to stop arguing and get on with it. And so the AEFP came into being.

In the event, it proved a remarkably successful program. Over half its output came from AFN and its lively, informal style was adopted as the way the program was presented on the air. The BBC has 10 AEFP programs in its Sound Archives but all are clearly combined efforts and not the individual programs that were special to AFN's output.

There are just the briefest fragments in the Archives of two of AFN's own most popular record shows: Johnny Kerr introducing "Duffle Bag" — voted their favorite listening ahead of all the star-studded programs from Hollywood by 72 percent of U.S. service listeners — and George Monaghan introducing "On the Record," another much-loved show. Sad that so little remains of what so many listened to with such enjoyment.

AFN London gave pleasure to many thousands of American servicemen and women during the war, as well as 5 million Britons who tuned in regularly, though they were in effect eavesdroppers. Like a shooting star it shone brightly and briefly, then vanished almost without a trace. But its successor, AFN Germany, glows in the broadcasting firmament still.

In a journalistic career extending more than 40 years, Patrick Morley worked in newspapers in Britain before joining the BBC, where he held senior posts in radio and television news. He wrote the first news story to be broadcast in Britain on the assassination of President Kennedy. He has been listening to AFN since 1944; upon retiring he wrote its history, "This is the American Forces Network," published under the Praeger imprint by Greenwood Publishing 2001. Another photo from AFN shows young men, probably at one of the studios in Germany in the years immediately after the war. I have not been able to establish who they are, where or when.

This website also includes a scanned newspaper programme listing from January 1945 that listed 1375kHz, 1402kHz, 1411kHz, 1420khz and 1447kHz for the UK and 583kHz and 6195kHz on the Continent.

Afghanistan

- BBC News is reporting this morning that the Taliban in Afghanistan have re-commenced broadcasts under the name Voice of Shariat, the name of the former national broadcaster when they were in power. The report quotes a Taliban spokesman as saying that a half-hour programme was broadcast on Tuesday night and would now be broadcast daily. The station appears to be low powered, probably using a mobile transmitter, and can only be heard in parts of southeast Afghanistan. Australia

Another rumour of a station coming on 1674 soon. - 1674 has been used for temporary tests out of Emu Plains near Sydney from time to time, but I believe this will be a new Melbourne VIC operation (*Geoff Wolfe - Bombala NSW Australia, June 3, dxhub yg via DXLD*).

Bangladesh

The Kalurghat radio station of Bangladesh Betar in Chittagong, which was affected by excessive rainfall, resumed its operation at 12 noon yesterday after remaining closed for one week. Transmission of the 100-kilowatt medium wave transmitter had stopped as water stood in the station compound after the heavy downpour of June 11, said a press release of Bangladesh Betar. However, in the last one week, programmes of the FM band continued to be aired from Agrabad Bhaban that could be listened to only by the audience in Chittagong city and adjoining areas. During the week, Cox's Bazar and Barisal stations of Bangladesh Betar expanded their sessions from 6am to 10am and 6.50pm to 11.10 pm everyday and broadcast the Dhaka station's programme for the audiences of greater Chittagong, especially for those who live at costal region and deep sea area. A three-member experts' team of Bangladesh Betar, led by additional chief engineer of Dhaka station, reached Kalurghat radio station from the capital soon after the incident on June 11 to assist the concerned engineers in resuming the operation of the transmitter. The team was able to make the transmitter fully operational this noon after working round the clock for the last one week. The Bangladesh Betar authorities have expressed regret to their audience in greater Chittagong,

particularly those in the coastal areas, for the inconvenience caused to them during the last seven days, said the press release. (Source: The New Nation, Dhaka)

Benin

The DRM transmission is multiplexed on the same antenna with another 5 kW AM programme on 1377 kHz, and also nearby is a 300 kW AM transmitter on 864 kHz on another antenna. Germany

India

The Research Department of All India Radio and Doordarshan has initiated a study of an Emergency Warning Broadcast System (EWBS) suitable for the Indian environment. Limited experimental transmissions have also been carried out on mediumwave and FM transmitters in Delhi. Prasar Bharati has a large transmitting infrastructure. This can be selectively used to convey emergency messages to public concerned about natural disasters after incorporation of the EWBS. However, manufacturers will have to provide EWBS ready TV and ready receivers. Prasar Bharati has informed that the EWBS has been in operation in Japan since 1985, in which emergency messages are transmitted on all transmitters (public/private, digital/analogue) during natural disasters for (i) relaying life-saving information on the preventive measures and (ii) the rescue measures undertaken. EWBS ready radio and TV receivers can receive alarm signals and emergency broadcast signals even in sleep mode. This information was given by Minister of Information & Broadcasting and Parliamentary Affairs, Shri P R Dasmunsi in written reply to a question in Rajya Sabha. *via Media Network Weblog*

Netherlands

- According to a press release Dutch broadcaster Arrow Classic Rock will take over the frequencies FM broadcaster Caz!. As simulcasting on FM and AM is not allowed in Holland, one can only assume that Arrow will leave medium wave. But as with all news, this remains to be seen when the time comes...;-) Herman Boel According to Arrow website. The parties have agreed and want the tax audit by 30 June 2007. Rapidly afterwards Arrow Classic Rock will transmit its programmes by means of the former CAZ! frequencies. Slogans on 675 already refer to FM today 21/6. If they leave 675 I wonder if Big L will make a play for the lower frequency & better daytime coverage?
- The Radio Communications Agency Netherlands has rejected an application by commercial broadcaster 100%NL to use 1224 kHz as a 'gap filler' in the same way that Radio 538 has mediumwave gap filler on 891 kHz in Limburg. 100%NL has good FM coverage across the country, with the exception of the area round Zwolle. The plan was to use 1224 kHz with low power to serve this area, from a transmitter site that would be readily available. (anoraknation.com)
- Radio 10 Gold will definitely leave mediumwave by end of June. Dutch commercial station Radio 10 Gold has confirmed to David de Jong of DutchMedia that its mediumwave transmissions on 1008 kHz will cease by 30 June at the latest. Station spokesman Jan Willem te Gussinklo Ohmann said that the exact date has not yet been decided. He also confirmed that the power of the transmitter in Zeewolde (Flevoland) has been reduced "in preparation for the eventual closedown". This affects mainly listeners in neighbouring countries. - Following a delay due to a technical problem, the Dutch radio listening figures for April/May 2007 have been published this afternoon by research bureau Intomart GfK. There were no major surprises, but the gap between the market shares of the two leading commercial stations, Radio 538 and Sky Radio, has doubled to a whole percentage point in Radio 538's favour. What's also striking is that the audience share for Radio 10 Gold has remained at 4.5% despite the staff and format changes that took place in March. Radio 10 Gold has so far remained on its mediumwave frequency, 1008 kHz, albeit at reduced power. A new situation has arisen this week, with the announcement that Arrow Classic Rock is to leave 675 kHz, a frequency that was previously used by Radio 10 Gold, and before that by public network Radio 3. Its arrival on FM should boost its audience share, and it will be interesting to see what this does to the shares of other stations. The future of 675 is the subject of much speculation in the Dutch radio newsgroups, but even the boss of Arrow, Ad Ossendrijver, doesn't know at the moment. In the bottom half of the table, 100%NL continues to climb steadily, if unspectacularly. This station recently overhauled its playlist, replacing 50% of the songs. The effects of this change on the audience figures won't be known for a couple of months. via Media Network Weblog
- UK TV station Channel 4 is currently running a series where entrepreneur Harvey Goldsmith (co-organiser of "Live Aid" with Bob Geldof) has to revive the fortunes of ailing businesses. On Tuesday 17th April, the series featured radio station Big L, who are supposedly loosing around £50,000 per month, most of which is probably due to the high cost of the AM transmissions from Holland on the frequency 1395 kHz, which to most people in the UK is currently so poor it is unlistenable and every night during the hours of 19.00 and 22.00, is turned off, as the frequency is used by a powerful Eastern European broadcaster. Big L presenters such as Randall Lee Rose keep saying they are working on the latter problem and I have read that they are also hoping to move the transmitter 100 miles closer to the UK, but still in Holland, or maybe it will be on a ship! North Korea

Cuts in shortwave broadcasts to North Korea by the Korean Broadcasting System have resulted in heavier jamming of other broadcasts to North Korea. The intensified jamming of Free North Korea Broadcasting, run by defectors, is also affecting another nongovernmental broadcaster, Open Radio for North Korea. Currently, radio broadcasts for North Korea aired from South Korea are KBS' Social Education Radio as well as nongovernmental Free North Korea Broadcast, Open Radio for North Korea, North Korean Missions Broadcast, and others. But KBS has significantly reduced its shortwave airtime and frequency use. Social Education Radio has discontinued its shortwave transmissions and is now only aired on mediumwave. The suspension of shortwave has freed jamming transmitters in North Korea which are now aimed at the other stations instead. Park Se Kyung, Chairman of the "North-East Asian Broadcasting Institute", believes KBS should restart its shortwave transmissions to North Korea. He says that, if KBS cannot implement this due to various internal and external constraints, a transfer of broadcast capability to outside parties should be aggressively examined. Mr Park says that if nongovernmental broadcasts carrying the message of hope to North Korean citizens are to be safely transmitted, cooperation from KBS and its related organizations as well as the government's policy of support is urgently needed. Meanwhile, Reporters Without Borders has deplored the North Korean government's resumption on 11 May of its jamming of independent and dissident radio stations, and called on the South Korean government and the international community to defend their right to broadcast freely. "North and South Korea are celebrating the historic reopening of a railway line between the two countries, yet the Pyongyang regime is trying to stop North Koreans from getting news other than that served up by the regime," the worldwide press freedom organisation said. "This is a violation of international law." North Korea's ruling Labour Party, the only party allowed, last month denounced news from the outside world that allegedly aimed to destabilise the regime and ordered the security forces to stop all video cassettes, written material, mobile phones and CDs

from entering the country. The jamming may have been part of these measures or, an Open Radio official told Reporters Without Borders, may have been linked to the reopening of the railway. Jamming of these shortwave stations had substantially declined since last July.North Korea's serious energy crisis apparently prevents the regime jamming all frequencies round the clock. North Korea is ranked bottom in the Reporters Without Borders worldwide Press Freedom Index. (Source: The Daily NK, Reporters Without Borders viaMedia Networks Weblog)

Norway

According to UKEsenderen, there will be no broadcast on 1485 nor 7215 kHz this year during the UKA festival in Trondheim. As you may be aware of, UKEsenderen is the radio station of the biannual UKA festival during October, Norway's largest cultural festival (www.uka.no/informasjon/engelsk/). The radio station has been a cooperation between the Student Radio (content; www.studentradion.no) and Akademisk Radioklub (broadcasting; http://org.ntnu.no/ark/) in Trondheim.

Because of lack of interest by the organizers of the UKA festival, UKEsenderen was last operating in 2001. The Akademisk Radioklub has tried, in 2003, 2005 and this year, to convince them otherwise, but without success. (Harald Kuhl DL1ABJ)

Philippines

- Anytime this month, DZRK Radyo ng Bayan [1323 kHz] is expected to run uninterrupted and will now be covering a wider area after the installation of its brand new transmitter. The old transmitter, which is an 'inheritance' from an old US radio station in the country, had been causing several problems putting the station off-the-air several times for the past years. Engineer Rico Tome, Senior Manager Engineer of the Composite Technology Equipment Harris explained that the new transmitter is more sophisticated and is electronically run unlike the old vacuum tube type, a design of the late 70's radio stations. The new design is composed of different combiners, computers and amplifiers, which could operate the 10 kW output at full power. "It's possible that this transmitter could run for 10 years without any problems," he said. He however noted some considerations needed to be rectified in the transmitter site to assure a smooth operation once it goes on-the air this June. According to Tome, possible problems could be mainly on the mismatch of the amplifier to the antenna site power supply. He added that since the device is electronic, anything can happen. His recommendations include the need to install an AVR and Transient Voltage Suppression System (TVSS) to stabilize the voltage. This he said is a basic requirement for any electronic system. "These devices will maintain the three phase 220 volts even if there will be fluctuation in the primary current source," he said. When the station is operating in a full 10 kW output, Jose Rostigue Jr. Senior Operations Supervisor of DZRK, Radyo ng Bayan informed that the primary areas that the station could reach include Nueva Vizcaya, Cagayan, Ifugao, Apayao, Abra and some parts of the Ilocos Region. Spain

After NRK left the channel the Spanish outlets can be tuned in best during their M-F window at 08.15h - 08.30h with local programmes. Mostly Tarragona via the REus transmitter and Salamanca. The station from Cuenca is there as well but a bit difficult due to the inferference from the other two ones. In their reply the Salamanca stn did state in english and spanish: "Heard in REgional / Local broadcast time: Only recordings will be accepted as prove of reception It should be a five to ten minutes continuous recording (CD better) It does not matter, if our signal is heard

only during some seconds. These norms has been dictated due to the great amount of false reception reports received in this station throughout the years"

United Arab Emirates

The recent installation in Abu Dhabi is the third successful implementation for Dhabayia, the radio arm of Emirates Media Incorporation (EMI). Dhabayia 1 and Dhabayia 2 were implemented in May 2003 [1170kHz] and January 2005 [1575kHz] respectively. Thomson and its local partner Bin Jabr TRS Est won the multi-million dollar contract to deliver, installand commission an 800 kW medium wave transmitter [for 1539], a directional two-tower antenna, auxiliary systems, the transmitter building and access roads. The latest generation Thomson S7HP transmitter was selected because it is readily upgraded to digital operation should Dhabayia decide to move to DRM. Considering the amount of civil works required, the project was completed in a remarkably short time. With the order placed in summer 2006, civil works were still being completed when the transmitter itself was delivered to site at the beginning of January. Test transmissions started on 20 February, with handover for operational services occuring on 25 February. Perfect team work, creative solutions and flexible interface management made this third record-

Perfect team work, creative solutions and flexible interface management made this third record-breaking time scale possible. The three new high power mediumave stations are situated only a kilometer away from the Dhabayia short wave site, where four Thomson shortwave transmitters and 48 Thomson shortwave antenna systems are still running well after more than 20 years of service. Equipment news New Wellbrook Antenna in the making

The **Wellbrook Phased Array** is a totally new receiving antenna designed for optimum MW reception. This Antenna system is only Broadband Phased Array to offer a uni-directional pattern similar to the Beverage, over 360 degrees with electronic Null Steering. The design is the result of several years research by Wellbrook's owner and chief design engineer Andrew H. Ikin. Trials of this new array have been performed in the US by experienced MW Dxers using the phasing system with high performance Active Vertical and Active Loop antennas.

These trials demonstrated that the Phased Array equipped with elements made from ALA 100 Large Aperture triangular Loop Antennas (one of the world's best active antennas) provided much lower noise and improved side rejection than an identical array equipped with Active Vertical antenna elements. This finding was particularly important for DXers living in urban areas. Moreover, comparative listening tests indicated that the Phased Array was equally as sensitive and directional as a 1000-1500ft Beverage, with the added advantage of deep null steering!

Phased Array Design: The Phased Array provides a reversible uni-directional reception pattern similar to a 1 wavelength Beverage with the added ability for the user to steer up to 50dB nulls around the back of the array.

The Phased Array consists of a **Control Unit** and **two ALA100 Loop antennas**. Each loop is **triangular** with just one support pole. The Phased Array can be expanded to use four ALA100 loop antennas to provide 360 degree coverage.

The Control Unit combines the output of the two antennas using a technique known as "Delay line Anti-phasing" i.e. the antennas are combined in anti-phase plus a **Variable Delay-line** equal to between 50% and 100% of the spacing of the antennas. This phasing technique provides a uni-directional reception pattern over a very wide bandwidth with only a minor adjustment to the controls.

This has a considerable advantage over the majority other phasing and noise cancelling systems which require constant adjustment even with small frequency changes.

Pirate BBC Essex... this could be the last time

Award winning Pirate BBC Essex became one of the world's favourite radio stations in April three years ago when it marked the 40th anniversary of the start of offshore radio in Britain. Already the legends of the 60s pioneers of offshore radio have signed up to be part of the 21st century team of presenters to broadcast from the North Sea. They include Johnnie Walker, Emperor Rosko, Dave Cash and Keith Skues. Some presenters, such as Norman St John, John Kerr and newsreader Gord Cruse are flying in from around the world to be part of Pirate BBC Essex. Listeners will also hear

Tom Edwards, Mike Ahern, Roger Day and Pete Brady, many of them working together for the first time in many years.

They will be joining Ray Clark, Steve Scruton, Ian Wyatt and Tim Gillett from the 2004 Pirate BBC Essex line-up. Pirate BBC Essex will be based aboard the classic light vessel LV18, owned by the Pharos Trust and moored off Harwich. It was the last manned Trinity House light vessel.

Commercial Radio News

Commercial radio upbeat despite BBC gains

10 May, 2007

Commercial radio bosses were bullish today despite the BBC taking its biggest ever lead in the ratings battle. BBC Radio had a 56% share of the audience in the first quarter of 2007 against commercial radio's 42.1%, according to Rajar figures published today. It gave the BBC a record lead over its commercial rivals of 13.9%, eclipsing the 12.8% gap it opened up in the first three months of 2006.



Commercial radio's outlook was brightened by a strong performance by two of its national stations, Classic FM and TalkSport. But there was a warning that small local commercial stations were suffering. "Let's not get too depressed about it. We are still doing pretty well in our core demographic of 15- to 44-year-olds. That is absolutely stable and it beats the BBC hands down," said the

GCap London managing director, Fru Hazlitt.

"Yes, we have still got some work to do. This is an ongoing strategy for commercial radio - we have got to compete here. We know that [digital audio broadcasting] will give us more of a level playing field. It should be a core objective for all commercial radio to take share back from the BBC."

TalkSport boosted its audience, from 2.07m last year to 2.34m in the first three months of 2007. It boosted its share across the year from 1.7% to 2%.

Virgin Radio's audience of 2.45m dipped slightly on the same time last year (down 9,000), but saw its share of the audience fall over the past 12 months from 1.6% to 1.4%.

Commercial stations' overall reach increased by 2.5% year on year, and it took a lion's share of the listening in the key 15- to 44-year-old demographic with a 53% share of the audience. Older listeners heavily favour the BBC.

"It's great to see radio listening as a whole remaining strong and we're particularly delighted with commercial radio's national performance, which sees an increase in the number of listeners tuning in as well as time spent listening," said Andrew Harrison, the chief executive of the commercial radio stations body, the Radio Centre. But Harrison warned that some small local stations were suffering. "One thing that today's figures do show is that some of our small local stations are finding some of the market conditions challenging and we look forward to Ofcom's future of radio consultation which we hope will give them more flexibility to compete effectively in the current multimedia environment," he added.

However all is not well the losers:

Capital Gold Network: GCap's golden oldies network lost 9% of its audience on the previous quarter and nearly 14% over the past year, down from 1.24m to 1.07m.

Classic Gold: GCap and UBC's network lost nearly 7% of its audience over the past year, down from 731,000 to 681,000. It is in the process of being bought outright by GCap.

Chrysalis 'encouraged' by radio review

14 May, 2007

The Chrysalis chief executive, Richard Huntingford, has said today the company's review of its radio business was "progressing well" despite reports it has struggled to generate interest.

Mr Huntingford said Chrysalis had received "a range of different proposals and within those a number of offers" for the business, which includes the Heart, Galaxy and LBC brands and is valued by City analysts at £200m. "Contrary to some of the speculation, the review is progressing well and we are encouraged by it," he added. Mr Huntingford said the review was likely to be concluded "towards the end of the summer". Chrysalis announced the review in February to examine potential mergers with other players, a sale of the radio

business or a demerger from the company's music division.

Last month, SMG announced it would float Virgin Radio to focus on its TV and programme-making businesses. Both Chrysalis and Virgin missed out on a big transformative deal two years ago when the radio industry embarked on a first wave of consolidation. In the space of a few months in the spring of 2005, GWR and Capital merged to form GCap Media, Emap bought out Scottish Radio Holdings, and the Wireless Group was acquired by UTV. Meanwhile, Chrysalis failed in its attempt to buy the radio assets of the Guardian Media Group, which owns the Guardian and MediaGuardian.co.uk.

GCap revenues slide 30 May, 2007

GCap today reported a 9% drop in annual revenue and cut its dividend by more than half, despite assurances from the chief executive, Ralph Bernard, that the group has made "significant strategic progress" during the past year. The Capital Radio and Classic FM owner said that profits had fallen from £22.2m in 2006 to £14.4m in the 12 months ending March 31, with revenues down to £200.1m.

The company is pinning its hopes on extending its most successful brands across new platforms, announcing a further £5.6m investment in interactive projects, new station launches and brand development. Classic FM, Xfm, Planet Rock, theJazz and a network of "classic hits" stations will all be developed as multiplatform projects, while One Network and Capital 95.8 will receive a £2.2m investment in marketing and programming.

GCap will close Capital Disney and has said it will "cease to invest" in Core and Life. Company debt has been reduced to £27m from £76 in 2006, the result of a two-year restructure and cost-saving scheme by Mr Bernard. GCap has saved £29.5m over two years and said a further £5.5m will be saved in the next two years. Mr Bernard said the company has made "considerable progress" towards its strategic objectives in the past 12 months. "The market remains difficult to predict but we have seen an improving trend in advertising revenue performance and we outperformed the market in the last quarter of the financial year." Chrysalis Group to sell radio business

25 June, 2007

Charles Allen's return to the media sector comes less than six months after he parted company with ITV plc, where he was chief executive for two and a half years.

Mr Allen is to chair Global Radio, a newly created investment firm that is buying Chrysalis Radio for £170m. Chrysalis, owns the Heart FM, LBC and Galaxy stations. (www.mediaguardian.co.uk)

This from Paul Robinson www.mediaguardian.co.uk "The BBC's iPlayer may have finally been given the go-ahead by the BBC Trust, but it has yet to launch and in the interim commercial radio has stolen a march. Under the guidance of the RadioCentre's energetic chief executive, Andrew Harrison, the trade body has launched its own version - the RadioCentre Player. Although it is initially being positioned as an internal tool to get exposure for all of the UK's 300 or so commercial stations, it has the potential to go way beyond a bit of in-house marketing.

So what does the player offer? At its heart is an existing piece of software developed by a US company, Ressen Design, which adapted it for the RadioCentre. This is how commercial radio has got the player out so fast; in contrast the BBC's iPlayer is being developed in-house. The RadioCentre Player features 12 preset stations, including the National services, Classic, Virgin and TalkSport; other big stations such as Heart and Capital, and a few smaller regional stations from Channel 103 FM to Lincs FM. The player gives access to every single station in the UK, either in an alphabetical format or by group ownership basis. This means that you can listen live, in real time, for free, to any station in Britain It is quick - almost every station buffers and streams live in less than 10 seconds - and there are fewer clicks than going on to the BBC website to "listen again".

This brings me to the BBC, and where some commercial radio executives start to get uneasy. The player features a "search" button, which brings up all of the BBC's national, regional and local stations. So imagine if you are tuned to Magic, and the breakfast presenter Neil Fox promotes the

RadioCentre Player URL. Listeners are instantly transported to a place where not only can they hear all of Magic's commercial rivals, but the BBC as well..

But it goes further than that. The player also gives access to thousands of internet-only and licensed radio stations from around the world: 10,227 stations, in fact, including 3,794 from the US. Commercial radio bosses, therefore, are reluctant to promote the player direct to their listeners - even though it is there to be found, should they be so minded, at http://www.radiocentre.org But I think commercial radio needs to be a bit more confident about itself. It is easy to knock UK radio, but if you compare our commercial radio stations on the RadioCentre Player with others around the world it is impossible not to come to the conclusion that they sound pretty damn good.

Ronald comments: "It's not good DXing time in the summer month's - the signals are low and unstable, highlights rare"!!

Jack writes: "I wasn't going to send in anything because there really hasn't been anything much audible here, let alone anything worth logging, but I decided that I might as well let you have these three rather unexciting entries. It seems extraordinary that conditions on MW have been so poor right over the sunspot minimum. Even allowing for the normal decline during the summer months, propagation seems vastly worse now than in any previous recent summer. And certainly, last winter would have counted as a very poor one for me even compared to years with much greater sunspot activity. I would suspect my antenna, but everyone seems to have been experiencing below-average conditions. I wonder if things will begin to improve as the sunspot cycle turns up again, though common sense says that it should do the opposite. It's all very strange".

I would agree that North American conditions during last winter weren't as good as the previous one, but what has struck me in updating the CA and SA All-time lists is that 2006 brought a noticeable increase in logs from "at-home" DXers compared with previous years – mah.

The dawn lift to southern South America here in Clashmore is between 0300 and 0430 at this time of year, although signal strengths are weak; many of my logs in the above are from overnight recordings since getting up at this time isn't a viable proposition for me, and I've been pleased with some interesting catches. IDs tend to be few and far between, and it's unlikely that I'd have the patience to stay on channel for long periods if I were listening live - mah.

All Barry's logs were made on unattended overnight recording.

I look forward to receiving your logs by then, preferably electronically/via e-mail using the Word pro-forma, which I can supply on request.
