



Main news this month is the continuing number of short term stations wanting to go on the air. 4XK Waikouaiti, 1300 kHz 100 watts has applied for a short term warrant from October 1 for three weeks for a test period.
Radio Sunshine is to apply for a temporary licence to operate from Kaitangata during November using 100 watts.

Radio Rhema is scheduled to open on October 14 on 1570 kHz.

Possible private stations are at may Of Islands, Rotorua (Radio Rainbow), Thames, Palmerston North, Wanganui and Invercargill.

The 1977-8 report of the Broadcasting Tribunal states that 39 applications were received. Twenty four of these for short term warrants under section 76 of the Broadcasting act 1976. Mineteen applications were approved, 5 withdrawn, and four declined, with eleven still under consideration at 31 Earch 1978. These included 5 application for new warrants, 2 for short term authorisations and 3 for ammendments to existing warrants. Reacting to the large number of short term applications the report said, "At the present time there is no fee payable upon application for this kind of authorisation, but if the general interest in short term broadcasting continues it may be necessary for consideration be given to introducing a suitable filing fee to cover the administrative cost involved in processing the applications.

AUGUST BROADCAST DX por el personal necesario

News from the New Zealand scene again dominates this month. First up is news that Radio K, Palmerston , has been assigned the call of 4XK. No frequency has been assigned as yet, but application has been made for a short term licence from October 1 to 27. The station will use a 78 foot vertical tower with 150 foot buried earth radials radiating north, east, south and west. Power is 100 watts and the frequency asked for is 950 or 1260. A.Cushen.

Radio Rhema. 3XG Christchurch, plans to begin broadcasting on October 14 on 1570 kilohertz. A.Cushen.

4YZ Invercargill, on 720 kilohertz, celebrated its 40th aniversary on August 2. Interviews with station personalities, including Arthur Cushen, was aired on the National Network in 'All Things Considered' at 09.45NZT.A.Cushen.

The new Gore station will have its own breakfast show from Gore studios. The Concert Program will be carried for the balance of broadcast hours. The transmitter will be located at Dacre, the site of 4ZA and 4YZ. Broadcasting Tribunal approval and necessary finance is still awaited.

Moving now to Australia, where the Federal Minister for Post and Telecommunications, announced on July 23, the establishment of a special radio service for the blind and other people with reading difficulties. The proposed service would present programs which are not provided in depth by existing stations. Licences to operate the new service are to be offered to the Sydney Radio Foundation for the Print Handicapped and to the Radio for the Blind in Melbourne and Hobart. The frequency to be used would be on or near 1750 kilohertz. The service is expected to be self-supporting financially and will not be allowed to carry spot advertising. Stations will be able to accept and acknowledge on air, donations and subscriptions from both individuals and organisations. R.Crawford / A.Cushen.

The operators of the experimental Canberra community radio station 2XX have won the right to stay on the air by default. Their oppnents at the Broadcasting Tribunal hearing for Canberra's public radio licence. Monaro Community Broadcasters, withdrew their application on 21/7. As a result Campus Community Broadcasters can expect to be awarded the new licence. B. Williams.

Back to N.Z.; QSLing John Campbell recently, 2ZG Gisborne indicated they plan to open a repeater at Ruatoria within the next two years. B. Clark.

30th ANNIVERSARY GREETINGS. Life Member Des Lynn sends his greetings and congratulations to the League on its 30th anniversary. Des recalls the day, 30 years ago, when he sat on a fruit box in Merv Brank's Invercargill shop and helped form the League. He recalls being with Merv Branks, Arthur Cushen, Jack Fox, Dudley Carter and the late Alec Allen, amongst others, and he was the League's first National Secretary. Still interested in reading the DX times, Des, who verified some 650 broadcast band stations, is no longer an active DXer but still holds the view that it is a mighty hobby and many of his friends have been gained through this interest. 73 to all League members and the hardworking executive.

New Zealand Radio DX League, 30 Years On.

Whether or not the "Hallo Rainey" transmitted by Nathan Stablefield to a partner in a demonstration in Kentucky Park, USA in 1892 was the first broadcast, as distinct from wireless telegraphy, DX ing as we know it to-day began with radio broadcasting. In New Zealand in 1919, Dr Robert Jack, Professor of Physics at Otago University, successfully experimented with the first radio telephone when he held regular experimental broadcasts from the University Buildings to Mr E.L.Meinung's house in Forth Street, Dunedin. Then on November 17, 1921, Dr Jack and his associates transmitted the first radio programme ever to be heard in this country. Since 1919 a mounting interest had been shown as these experiments became known and it was eventually decided to call a public meeting with the object of forming an association of radio entitusiasts in Otago. A well-attended meeting was held on 1 August 1922 to form "The Otago Radio Association" and on 4 October of the same year, a regular broadcast schedule was begun under the callsign DN. Since those days the call has been changed to 4AB, 4ZB, 4ZD, 4XRJ and now 4XD (1430kHz with 250 watts), but it is still operated by the Association.

New Zealand's first radio magazine NZ Radio began fortnightly publication on 31 May 1926, and almost immediately reports of overseas reception began to appear: "Neutron', writing in the Evening Star has reported interesting accounts of extraordinary reception of American and Australian stations with his 5-valve neutrodyne". Scott's Radio Handbook had first appeared in 1923.

However it was not until the advent of The <u>Radio Record</u> (now incorporated with <u>The Listener</u>) in July 1927 and the institution of an "Our Mail Bag" column that loggings and queries began to be more numerous. When these continued to increase in number and almost monopolised this feature, another feature entitled "The DX Club News and Views" was formed in 1928. The Radio Publishing Company of NZ presented a national trophy, The DX Cup, in July 1930, but it was not until June 19, 1931, that a meeting of Wellington DXers, which took place during the 3rd Wellington Radio Exhibition decided to form the NZ DX Club - "The first DX club in the British Empire".

Of course, in those days, almost every radio owner was a Dxer. Each week the YA's all had various silent nights, so what else could you find – often not even the other YA stations! Indeed many of the Aussies also observed silent nights. An early promotion circular for the club included 'The DX Club has been in existence nearly 4 years and the membership is rapidly approaching 1200", this in spite of the club publications being able to be bought at any bookseller by all and sundry. But sets were not very plentiful even by then.

The Otago and Canterbury branches severed their connection with the NZ DX Club and formed the NZ DX Radio Association on 17 November 1933. The DX Club continued under the auspices of the Radio Record but later began to deteriorate and it was decided to negotiate with the then owners, National Magazines, for the DXers themselves to take over the running of the organisation. It was not found until this had been accomplished, how gladly they must have welcomed this approach. Instead of the listing of approximately 20 branch secretaries appearing in the Radio Record, the new "ownership' discovered that there were just 2 branches in operation, Auckland and Southland, and regular dances could have helped to keep the former active. In September 1939, Auckland became headquarters for the NZ DX Club and Southland produced The NZ DX-TRA. Those Aucklanders were good guys but they new more about running a dance than a DX Club'. When the NZ President visited Southland on one occasion, he did not even possess a radio set at home. Disagreement was rife at times, and relations between headquarters and Southland became more strained as opinions on what DX was really about continued to widen.

Eventually at a gathering of Otago and Southland DXers, augmented by 2 representatives from Christchurch, and held at the home of Des Lynn (long-time League national secretary-to-be) in Dunedin on 13 September 1947 the momentous decision was made: "That within the next 12 months a new DX organisation would be formed by Southland and Otago Branches of the NZ DX Club Inc. if a more practicable arrangement could not be arrived at with the DX Club HQ in Auckland." In the year that followed the southerners continued to supply notes to The NZ DX-TRA but in October 1947 another publication, DX Bulletin(NZ), made its appearance from Invercargill. At the Dunedin meeting "those present felt that there was a real need for a publication presenting upto-date DX notes, not attached to any club, but catering mainly for the active DXer." DX Bulletin No.2 reported "As expected the response has been magnificent. Nearly all the names of NZ's most famous DXers already appear in our subscribers' list. This month samples are being sent to a further number of DXers and we expect by next issue to be able to report almost 100% of the 'first hundred' in DX in this Dominion." And so It was to be.

No improvement in relations with Auckland HQ seemed to take place during the ensuing 12 months, so at an "enthusiastic meeting of Otago and Southland DXers" (held in the back room of Merv Branks' shop) at Invercargill on 15 August 1948, and the NZ Radio DX League was formed. It was governed by a Board of Directors, 5 from Southland and 5 from Otago, the latter to constitute the Administrative Committee and the Southlanders to form a Magazine Committee. The first issue of the NZ DX Times was published on 20 October 1948. The DX Bulletin(NZ) stopped with No.12 in September 1948. The NZ DX-TRA continued publication until February 1950, and the NZ DX Club Inc. went into recess one month later.

The second annual report (for 1949–50) stated "The year just completed is beyond doubt our most successful to date; we have advanced over the past 12 months far in excess than had been thought possible a year or so ago. The League has been able to fulfil the requirements of members with an up-to-date call book, handsome ladder and best-of-the-month certificates, lapel badges and a fortnightly programme from 4XD...The circulation of the NZ DX Times numbers 123 plus 17 exchanges. Logs have been supplied to the Lamphouse, Gulbranen Radio and HMV, notes to the NZ Listener, as well as keeping in contact with our many overseas contacts."

The Ladder Competition, which includes both BC and SW, is the most successful DX contest we are aware of . Besides providing awards for every member as he increases his totals, it also enables him to compete each 6-monthly period against DXers in the same division. Thus no relogging is necessary or allowed. In 1953 the League inaugurated its interbranch competitions. The Hope MacGregor Cup on Shortwave has been held by Auckland with 7 wins, Wellington 7, Southland 5, Canterbury 3, Otago 1. The story on the broadcast band is different, the Albert Stanton Cup going on 14 occasions to Southland, Otago 5, Wellington 2, Auckland and Canterbury once each. The aggregate cup, the Columbus Trophy, has gone Southland's way 13 times, Otago 4, Wellington 3, Auckland 2 and Canterbury 2. The Best-of-Months (BC and SW) form the basis of an individual Best-of-the-Year Award, and there is also another individual award for the Best Junior of the Year.

Another successful League activity is the convention, first sponsored by Otago Branch at Long Beach in 1955. The next year Southland was host at Riverton Rocks and 1957 saw the first Canterbury Convention. Then followed 1958 Otago-Long Beach, 1959 Southland-Riverton Rocks, 1960 Canterbury-Leithfield Beach, 1961 Otago-Long Beach, and 1962 Taranaki Branch were hosts at New Plymouth. The following year North and South held separate gatherings, Auckland-Whangaparaoa and Southland-Riverton Rocks, but neither was successful, so in 1964 it was a National Convention again, with Canterbury at Leithfield, 1966 Wellington-Reikeorangi, 1968 Canterbury-Leithfield and 1972 Southland-Omaui. The 25th anniversary convention and annual general meeting were held in Dunedin in September 1973, and must rank as the most successful social event in the League's history. Mr John Kennedy, editor of the Tablet, was the guest speaker. Since then conventions have taken place at Wellington-Tatum Park in 1976, Godley Head with Canterbury Branch in 1977, and this year Tiwai, Southland was the location. The 1977 convention at Christchurch was outstanding, with Radio Australia's ace broadcaster Keith Glover participating, while one or two members from every state of Australia (except Western Australia), plus Hawaii, were present. It was possible to hold a meeting of the Southern Cross DX Club there, evidencing the cordial relations existing between the two clubs. Indeed, because of the ingenuity of some of our enthusiasts, Godley Head was turned into an excellent DX location.

From our beginnings in 1948 the Adcom was centred in Dunedin until October 1962 when administration was taken over by Canterbury. September 1967 saw control return to Otago. Since 1972 Southland has controlled League administration with Ray Crawford as National Secretary, with membership, stationery and other duties being shared by branch members. Charlie Chester became Secretary in 1977 and the work was further diversified. The North Otago branch took over Stationery supplies under Ted Sutton, that branch already being the home of the League Archives, and very competent host at most of our annual general meetings in recent times. As Southland had been publishing DX journals for 10 years prior to 1949, they continued to do so with the NZ DX Times until August 1958. Between May 1953 and March 1958, the NZ DX Times Flashsheet was printed between issues of the Times, firstly for "active members only", but later for an annual charge of 3/6. It was stated that it was designed to replace the "now defunct fortnightly DX session over 4XD" which was sponsored by Otago Branch. In 1958 Otago took over production of the Times with new vigour, and in September 1962, Canterbury assumed responsibility for production for the next 10 years. Up until this period the mimeograph method of printing had been used, but on Wellington assuming publication in November 1972, offset printing was instituted. From 1962 to 1967 Canterbury thus managed both HQ affairs and the magazine.

Perhaps the greatest fillip to our hobby has been the big increase in DX peditions, mainly away from powerlines. Of course, there have been visits to seaside cottages etc for many years, and when the NZRDXL... To page 14.

Back in the 1950's and early 1960's, one of the premier DX locations in the country was the Clayden farm on the Whangaparaoa Peninsula, some 30 miles north of Auckland. In this article Tony Marr warmly recalls this idylic spot. Those who have enjoyed the hospitality of Mrs Clayden, and the late Lloyd Clayden, will be interested to know that the farm was sold earlier this year. Mrs C, now in her 80's, has settled in the Whangaparaoa 'village'. after some energetic alobetrotting. Ed.

With the advent of many new portable receivers, I think that we will probably see a change in DX habits, and I suspect that the use of any one particular DX location over a long period of time will probably be rare. I hope the following description of DX at Whangaparaoa will capture some of the unique atmosphere of the place, and perhaps bring back some pleasant memories to the many DXers who enjoyed the Claydens' hospitality over the years.

The shed used for our shortwave DXing was an old wool shed. It acquired a special atmosphere from a collection of many years of radio magazines and several old radios which lay around on rough wooden shelves. The main floor area was of slatted wood; there was a solid floor only in the end section which was divided off by a packing case wall with a rough splinter-filled door. A bench along the end wall of this divided section provided accommodation for our receivers, and a trap door high in the wall provided a square distant view of a small portion of the daytime sky. Many other items lay around the shed, including various pieces of wool baling equipment, fishing nets, a spear gun, containers of sheep nuts and chicken feed. Access to the building was via a short pliable plank, as the entire structure was supported by piles and hens and lambs roamed at will underneath and around the shed. Various aerials were used over the years, the most successful having been a 1200 foot longwire some 100 feet high. This aerial was responsible for most of the good catches.

The quiet hazy calm of the bands around midday seemed to magnify one's tiredness tenfold; with 60 and 90 metres deserted and sleeping themselves. Paraguay on 11947.5kHz, SODRE and 4VEH on 19 metres were about the only stations of interest to watch out for. Fine hot summer weather usually made swimming more important, and lost sleep was caught up with on the hot sands of one of the beaches close nearby. Frequently there were sheep to move, or other chores on the farm, and these provided a break from sitting hunched over receivers. The bands changed their tone from around 2pm in winter, and about 3.30pm in summer, as signals appeared increasingly, then on 6, 4 and 3mHz as the afternoon passed. During mid-winter, farming activities were arranged to finish in time to monitor 3300kHz; Belize would sometimes appear a few minutes before their signoff time of 0330 GMT. Africans would be around after 0400 GMT, Burundi 6140kHz being an infrequent catch, and regulars like Gabon 4777, Mali 4785 and Dahomey 4870 were accompanied by varying Mozambiques and South Africans by 0515 GMT. Dinner was usually around 6.30pm, after the main African 'onslaught' of the evening was over, and the TV then provided a change from DX listening.

Latins provided most interest from 0830 GMT, with mainly Uruguay, and Paraguay in later years, being sought on 49 metres. Asians and Indonesians dominated the bands beyond midnight, and gave plenty of interest for those with enough stamina. However 1am (1300 GMT) or so was usually the limit as, with the need to be up at 1700 GMT for the morning Africans, some rest was needed.

Morning Africans always provided the most excitement, with virtually all the continent having been heard over a number of years. Some of the better catches included Seychelles 4990kHz 40.watts, Sao Tome 4807kHz 1kw, Cape Verdes 4755kHz 450 watts, Comores 3331kHz 4kw, Madagascar University 3370kHz 4kw, Reunion 2446kHz 4kw and SABC 120 metre outlets with 20kw. Breakfast was ready at 2045 GMT, but was occasionally delayed in the search for a 90 metre Mozambique or a Cape Verdes, before the band finally closed. Invariably dawn seemed to arrive and pass very quickly, with the problems of trying to log too many stations in too short a time; and another day would begin with the morning paper to be collected from the shop, and the decision of whether to write out reports then and there, or wait until one was home and rested. Of course conditions would sometimes be abysmally poor, and in these instances the morning was often ushered in with the pleasant easy-listening music of one of the Russian Home Service outlets on 60 metres. As a rule, if the Russians were coming in like powerhouses, there was little excitement from the Africans.

In summer the bands would close early, and allow a visit to the beach before breakfast, or perhaps an hour's sleep in the long warm grass. On the other hand, in the winter the heavy rains made access very much a 'land-rover affair', with the access track axle-deep in mud. Such days at Whangaparaoa were best spent deep in a sleeping bag, or near a heater as it struggled with the low mains voltage; while the hens spent the day sheltering and arguing under the shed.

came into existence, Long Beach Otago was in it's heyday. Two DXcursions have been made on a rather more ambitious scale to Australia, in March 1975 and May 1977, when wonderful hospitality was experienced. The reforming of the Auckland Branch in recent times has been of incalculable value. There is also a valuable and increasing modernising of receivers suitable for DXing. Our Public Relations Officer Arthur Cushen continues to keep the League to the forefront with the multiple sources of publicity he provides, The NZ Listener still proving our main source in this valuable lifeline. Arthur averages about 40 enquiries a month, April 1978 being the all time record, reaching 101. Under the guidance and toil of Bryan Clark as editor-in-chief, assisted by the printing presses of Tony King and a Wellington committee, the NZ DX Times, with it's attractive layout of offset printing is unsurpassed anywhere. Our editor, with tactfulness, produces a magazine which is conservative, informative and progressive. At the 1977 annual general meeting, in an endeavour to reduce his workhours, Auckland members undertook to edit the shortwave pages while the Southland members became responsible for the broadcast section. Sutton Burtenshaw has been our president for the last 3 years and his wise counselling is a great asset to the League. He undertakes a lot of work behind the scenes.

Over the years there have been many dedicated workers and some remarkable achievements...names and events that have been forgotten; others that will live on. Thirty years; it seems but yesterday. Congratulations everybody'.

30 YEARS ON SHORTWAVE

a commentary by Arthur Cushen

During the past 30 years of the New Zealand DX Times and going back to 1939, when the NZ DX-TRA commenced, I have been writing a feature for the publication or the shortwave editor over this long period. To look back on 30 years of shortwave listening in the history of the League is a mammoth task, and so I have devoted this short article to only a few of the highlights over that time. The first 10 years of the League saw the DX Times published in Invercargill, and I wrote a regular page giving the highlights of reception from members notes, similar to Bandwatch in the Times baday. In 1958, when the Times was transferred to Dunedin shortwave information continued to be prepared in Invercargill. Around this time we note that Dick Pollard verified his 100th country; Auckland Branch was very active, with other branches in Wellington, Christchurch, Dunedin and Invercargill; shortwave highlights included reception of Burma using the 13 metre band and a service to the Pacific from Taiwan.

In the public relations field, theinquiries from the <u>NZ Listener</u> (which have been our main avenue of publicity since 1951) continue to pour in, and in April 1978 we received over 100 in the one month. Added to this is the publicity received in <u>Electronics Australia</u> and the DX sessions over Radio NZ and Radio Nederland. These transmissions on shortwave are heard worldwide and increase the interest in the League by listeners in many parts of the world, not only fascinated by the low power of our shortwave service and its exceptional catch, but also interested in the quality of news which appears in the NZ DX Times.

During the past 30 years the international broadcasters have shown an increasing interest in regular reception reports and many of our members are now on monitoring panels for various stations throughout the world. In my own field I now represent 6 major shortwave services, including the BBC (since 1942), Radio Canada (1945), Voice of America, Radio Sweden, Radio Nederland and Vatican Radio. The work of the shortwave listener in finding clear channels, suggesting better reception times and improved programme content, is helping all shortwave listeners to get a more enjoyable signal from their favourite station.

At the same time over 30 countries are now broadcasting daily to New Zealand, while almost as many as this are heard weekly with DX programmes, and this avenue of fast communication promotes faster distribution of information on the shortwave scene. Receivers have come a long way since 1948, when I was using a 7 tube Ecko. Today the lineup here includes 5 communications receivers – one a Racal with a readout dial accurate to 1kHz. No longer do we have to struggle with a mass of stations on a small, poorly calibrated dial to find the stations we are searching for. Dialling the frequency gives us the exact channel and if propagation conditions are right the station should be heard.

The future for international broadcasting looks very bright indeed, with the Geneva Conference next year, which is almost certain to allocate more frequencies for these stations and give an extension to the bands as we know them at present. This will mean that there will be more space, less interference, more elusive DX and better quality listening.

IN MEMORIAM ALBERT MERVYN BRANKS

1906 - 1978

It is with regret that we advise members that Albert Mervyn Branks, Patron and Life Member of the New Zealand Radio DX League, passed away on Tuesday 29 August 1978. The League membership takes this opportunity to express its deepest sympathy to his wife Netta and son Graeme.

To those who knew him, Merv was the perfect DXer. His vast knowledge and experience gained in over 50 years of activity as a DXer of the highest order, will be sadly missed. While his first love in the hobby was the broadcast band, he was always interested to know what others were doing on the shortwave bands. At any time one would find him readily willing to pass on information and to provide the encouragement neccessary to revitalise any flagging enthusiasm. Those in the Southland Branch, along with numerous others in New Zealand and Australia, owe much of their ability in the hobby to having had close contact with such an experienced listener.

The interest in radio began while Merv was a boy in Winton, Southland. He often helped his father, who had a franchise for wireless sets in the early 1920's, with their installation and erection of aerials, so neccessary for good reception in those early days. With broadcasting at the time only beginning, there were few stations to be heard from within NZ and signals from overseas were listened to with enthusiasm. Tuning in a 3-dial wireless set was a major operation and once someone in the neighbourhood had found a station, no one else could tune into it because of the whistles created by the receiver. Before long, Merv was writing to stations and even in those days, before DXing as we know it had even been thought of, competition between friends was high. As stations increased in number, there was great interest by listeners and numerous magazines carried DX news. Merv was widely known through his contributions to various publications as 'The Southlander'.

From Winton, he moved to Invercargill and for many tears worked for the 'Southland Times' newspaper. After working well into the night, he would return home and search the broadcast band for the VK's, amateurs who were licensed to operate with low power, usually only a few watts. His collection of VK QSL cards built up at this time is second to none.

Merv went into business in a dairy, and for many years this was the 'watering hole' for numerous members of the Southland DX fraternity. Meetings over the years were held in the back room of the shop and on dozens of occasions the 'NZ DX Times' and 'Southland DX Digest' were published here. This began in 1948 when he was one of those responsible for the formation of the NZ Radio DX League. Various offices, in the administration of the club, and as Editor of the DX Times (1948 – 1958), were held over the years.

For many years his DX listening was done at his parents holiday home at Riverton Rocks. As the area became more populated the noise level grew, and in the mid-1950's a shack was erected in the sandhills on Howells' Point at Riverton Rocks. This location with its longwires became widely known as the 'Six by Three', the name coming from its size, six feet long and three feet wide. It was big enough for 5 to listen in, and just enough room to sleep 3, 1 on the bench seat and 2 on the floor. With a quiet location, he concentrated on the USA and Canada in the summer and Asians in the winter months. With his expertise in the Asian field, Merv edited and published a 'Pacific-Asian Log', in the days before such a listing appeared in the 'World Radio TV Handbook'. Being the comprehensive publication it was, DXers from all over the world looked forward to each new reprinting of the Log.

With his interest in young people, Merv also enjoyed a life-long association with the Boys Brigade. He was founder and first Captain of the Winton Company. After being Southland Batallion secretary for many years, he was awarded Life Membership of the Boys Brigade, fitting reward for the dedicated service untiringly given. Another pastime he followed with dedication was the collecting of old schoolboy books and comic papers, especially if they contained Billy Bunter stories. Over the years, many such books graced the bookshelves of his home and Merv was always on the lookout for additions to his very large collection.

26 members of the League, including Chris Martin and Harry Weatherley from Australia, and 'DX Times' Editor Bryan Clark, attended the funeral in Invercargill. DXers in general and Southland Branch members in particular have lost a real friend. Albert Mervyn Branks will be sadly missed but his name and achievements will long be remembered.

Radio Monitors International is now broadcast according to the following schedule:Sundays at 0415 GMT on 9720, 11955 and 15425kHz to South Asia; Mondays at 1115 GMT on 11835, 15120 & 17850kHz, beamed to Far East, South East Asia and Australia; and 1900 GMT (may be retimed) Sundays on 9720, 11870, 15115 & 17850kHz to Africa, Middle East and Europe. RMI is the only international DX program produced and broadcast in Southern Asia. It is hosted by League member Adrian Peterson, and the associate announcer is Sonia Christo. All correct reception reports covering specifically "Radio Monitors International" receive a specially prepared full data QSL card.

The new BBC relay base at Masirah in the Persian Gulf which uses four 100kw transmitters is now in operation relaying the world Service to New Zealand 0900-1530 on 15310 and 0900-1330 on 17770kHz. September 3rd saw many new frequencies in use and the powerful relays of the Polish Home Service at 0300GMT week days, (0400 Sundays) have been noted opening on 7180 and 9755kHz. This information first broadcast on Radio New Zealand medium and shortwave September 3 at 1015GMT. All times GMT, frequencies in kHz.

Australia: Radio Mustrolia frequency changes from September 3 include 11835 1500-1730: 11855 1845-2100, 2300-0100: 11895 2230-0130 and 17890kHz 2200-0600GMT, and 21740 0000-0330.

Canada: Montreal to North America in English with secondary coverage to the South Pacific broadcasts 0200-0227 9535, 11845: 0300-0327 5960, 9535, 9755 and 11845: 0400-0427 5960, 9535, 11845kHz 9755 replaces 11940.

Greece: Athens 9710kHz opens Sundays 0500 with church service relay, but mixed with Radio Moscow.

Guam: KT.R using the new frequency 11795 in place of 11780kHz opens 0845 with frequency adjustment, 0900 Japanese, 1000 English. This frequency suffers interference from Deutsche Welle.

Iran: Teheran on 9022kHz has retimed its European service and now heard 1700 Russian, 1730 Turkish, 1800 Arabic, 1830 German, 1900 French and 1930 English.

Israel: IBA to Australia and New Zealand 0500-0515 English: 0515-0530
French using 11655 long path and 17855kHz short path.

Ivbia: 5060kHz is used in arabic 1800-2000 and mixed with Radio Tirana. According to the announcements the transmitter is on Malta.

Malaysia: As from August 31 the Voice of Malaysia has added two languages. Bahasa Malaysia 0900-1000 on 15295 and also 1700-1800 on 15295, 9750 and 6175. In Burmese 1430-1530 on 6100kHz.

Malta: Malta Calling on Saturday 2045-2115 on 5980kHz. Programme is in English with news and pop music and asks for reception reports to Box 82, Valetta, Malta.

Masirah: The new BBC relay base is now operating on shortwave with four 100kW transmitters is known as the Eastern relay base and carries the World Service to Australia and New Zealand on 15310kHz, 0900-1515. Also used to Asia 11780 0700-0815, 15310 0700-0815, 17770 0900-1330GMT.

Mexico: XEQN 6105kHz verifies with a card, letter and folder gives power as 250W heard opening 1100GMT and made me honorary member of their listeners club.

Poland: Warsaw home service 9755kHz opens 0300GkH after interval signal and time pips and plays popular music. Very strong signal on this frequency and around 0530GkH is mixed with AFRS.
