This month, **Paul Ormandy** begins a new section covering **Pirate, Clandestine, Alternative and Free Radio** broadcasts, *Unofficial Radio*. This should attract a lot of attention, as current world events continue to unfold.

Check out any **Numbers Stations** you find too. They're back. The ones with long lists of numbers. Also nursery rhymes are a possibility. According to www.mediachannel.org, there are even unconfirmed reports that the British government is trying to close down any reporting of these stations.

Another report points out that destruction of civilian radio stations (Voice of the Shari'a) is actually an international war crime, like the destruction of the Serbian Radio/TV headquarters in Belgrade. Whatever ones viewpoint here, the loss of life amongst broadcasters anywhere is a matter of sadness.

Nick Grace hosts a standard reference website www.clandestineradio.com which is highly recommended. Amongst recent additions are audio of Kabul's Voice of the Shari'a with some jamming and then going off-air after being hit by US bombers, before and after photos from the USAF showing damage to the broadcasting facilities near Kabul, news about a new Taleban outlet at Mazar-e-Sharif opening soon afterwards, and details of the Psyops radio on 8700 kHz and several MW channels operated by the US government.

A Radio Journey Across the Khyber is a very detailed article now at www.radiodx.com and giving the background to radio in Afghanistan, visits to radio stations there, the development of broadcasting across the country, relay broadcasts from the USSR, and more recent events.

Amongst the more unusual items would be a QSL card issued for an FM broadcast in Kabul some years ago, for broadcasts from an international convention of the Seventh Day Adventist Church. Our thanks to **Dr Adrian Peterson** for such a timely and entertaining article.

Closer to home, **Radio New Zealand International** conducted brief test transmissions on several lower SW frequencies for 'emergency' coverage of the North and South islands of New Zealand. Reports were specifically requested from the Otago and Southland areas at the southern end of the South Island.

Bruce Portzer, Seattle WA recently featured in an excellent article about shortwave radio 'SW dials up the world's voices' published in the *Seattle Times*. Thanks to columnist Erik Lacitis and the *Seattle Times* we bring you the article in this issue of the magazine.

One interesting item is that sales of SW radio receivers are going through the roof since September 11. **Grundig** reports sales up 500% and other manufacturers say the same.

John Figliozzi, Albany NY is another US DXer to feature in a major piece about the return to SW radio after September 11. The *San Francisco Chronicle* filed an item 'Sales of SW radios surge' which also quotes Bob Grove, of *Monitoring Times* saying 'sales have approximately doubled on shortwave in the past two weeks'.

Also quoted is VOA spokesman Joe O'Connell: 'Although broadcasters are shifting to the internet in nations with mature communications systems and downloading programs to FM stations via satellite, shortwave is the old workhorse and warhorse.'

BBC World Services' Michael Gardner added; 'We'll be heavily dependent on shortwave for many years to come'.

Matt Francis, Canberra, ACT writes 'I was flying back from Shanghai yesterday and needed to call the office in Canberra. I gave up in the end and flicked through the in-flight audio channels. Coming through crystal clear was the BBC World Service off a shortwave transmitter somewhere (probably Singapore). I listened to the BBCWS for most of the way across China and the South China Sea. Shortwave 1. Satellite 0.' (ARDXC)

Dr Adrian Peterson, Indianapolis IN tells us more about **AFRS Radio in Pakistan**: The first, as mentioned (October Talkback) was VU2ZX at Karachi Airport, on air from August 1944 to November 28, 1945 with 40w on 1330 AM.

The second was at the USAF Base at Peshawar, Frontier Province. The base was used for electronic eavesdropping on the USSR, and was in use when the Gary Powers U2 flight was shot down over Russia. It first appeared in the 1966 WRTVH as 10w on 850 AM, moving in 1967 to 25w on 870 AM.

Because locals could hear the station, it was moved to FM. In 1969, Adrian visited the station 'the MW xmitter was silent, the FM unit active and a small TV station was also in operation. The base was soon closed and the AFRTS facility dismantled. My QSL for the FM outlet is the only one in existence for this lonely AFRTS station'.

Ian Davidson, Melbourne (via greylineDX) asks if stereo signals can be heard in New Zealand from Australian AM stations broadcasting in stereo: Magic 693, 3UZ 927, 3AK 1116 and 3AW 1278 (Melbourne), 3TR 1242 (Sale), 2CA 1053 (Canberra), 4TAB 1008 (Brisbane) and 4BU 1332 (Bundaberg).

WVUV American Samoa back on air, but only with a very low power. According to **Bruce Portzer** it's back on 648 AM with a relay of co-owned KKHJ-FM. The original facility was destroyed by fire in 1998. Plans are in the works for a new site and a return to 10kW. As even 1kW from Samoa can make it to New Zealand at midday (at places like Te Araroa), this looks like a prime summertime DX target so long as they run more than 50watts.

Janet Freeman, Tauranga says 'I've a Sony ICF 7600D which has given less than reliable reception of the BBC since moving to Tauranga. I listen mostly at night, which made

exhortations by the BBC to listen on the net pretty stupid — the computer is a PC and in a different part of the house.

I connect via zfree and therein lies the snag, the connection isn't 100% reliable and can crash. Using the DX League list of alternative frequencies, I now have better reception of the BBCWS than when it was beamed direct and tend to listen on the net less than I expected'.

Tony King, Greytown writes ' the most wonderful music sampler site for South and Central America is put together by DXer Henrik Klemetz. It's available as downloadable at www.havana.iwsp.com/radio/lamusic/ or www.home/swipnet/se/gersnaes/henriks/lamusic.html for streaming. For DXers in NZ without internet access, send a blank cassette (no case) plus an 80c stamp to PO Box 29, Greytown'. Tony will then dub the cassettes for you and provide a copy of the covering notes.

David Miller, Dunedin recently went to the access radio stations conference (ACAB), and reports 'they showed a video of the first access station ever. The station is KPFA. This was very interesting, as I compared what I saw with pirate stations in the UK. You can learn more about KPFA at www.pacific.org and the ACAB also have a website at www.acab.org.nz which is useful.'

Our Radio Friends Today article last month contained a mistake, when I said that the NZRDXL emerged from the Canterbury branch of the NZDXRA. Luckily, both **Jack Fox, Mosgiel and Bryan Clark, Auckland** quickly corrected me. What I failed to mention was the NZ DX Club, from which both clubs later emerged.

In 1933, the NZDXRA formed from the Otago and Canterbury branches of the NZDXC. The NZDXC was Auckland based and continued in other centers, with other members in Otago, Southland as well as Canterbury. Jack reformed the Otago branch of the NZDXC in 1939 and it became a strong group after WWII.

Dissatisfied with the NZDXC's emphasis on social activities, in 1947, a group of these other NZDXC members from Otago, Southland and Canterbury gave notice of their plans to establish the NZRDXL, which became formally established in 1948. I'm very grateful to both Jack and Bryan for this correct information.

Brian Smith, Toronto (via GreylineDX) tells us of a new service provided by the Ontario DX Association. They now manage QSLs for CFRB 1010, CFRX 6070, and CHWO 740, all Toronto stations. As well as snail mail, Brian says 'visit our website at www.odxa.on.ca and under 'Station Guide' click on 'Online Report' for all three stations, fill in the data and then submit your reports.' Also via email: odxa@compuserve.com or ODXA, PO Box 161, Station A, Willowdale, ON Canada M2N 5S8.

John Wright provides a similar service for some Sydney AM stations. Seems funny that listeners have to organise their own QSLs from a growing number of stations these days. I know the reasons why, and it means that QSLs can at least be obtained, but a QSL management service seems a complete abdication of engagement with the audience. Where's the communication gone?

Dario Monferini, Milan, Italy is well advanced with plans to attend Convention 2002, and we look forward to meeting up with him and other DX friends from overseas. He's bringing plenty of radio memorabilia with him to swap, such as stickers, keyrings, pins, pennants, postcards, so start checking out your collections for spares.

Also check your library for **radio books**! Again, the Wellington system has a large number, covering broadcasters like BBC, ABC Australia, Radio Luxembourg, Radio Hauraki, UK pirates, books on international SW broadcasting, personalities and much more. Good summer reading. All free.

Harry Weatherley, Melbourne recently celebrated his 80th birthday. Many happy returns Harry! Bryan and Sandy Clark flew over from Auckland carrying special wishes from the NZRDXL, and old DX friends from New Zealand and Sri Lanka. These days, Harry supports local 95.7 FM Golden Days Radio in Caulfield and is hoping to attend Convention 2002, health permitting. We remember fondly Harry's visits to previous Conventions, and his successful work to bring Australian and NZ DXers into closer co-operation.

Scott Evans (via radiodx.com) writes: 'My grandfather, William J Evans, was the island administrator for the US side on **Canton Island**, I believe from '52-'56. He was a career radioman with the FAA, though I don't know what his involvement may have been with the radio station. My father and his brothers relate many wonderful memories of the place. My aunt was the first caucasian born on the island.' (Scott has offered to help find out more about KIBE Canton which was operated by the FAA during this period.)

Radio Westport 1480 featured in a Radio NZ *Spectrum* documentary in July, and **David Miller, Dunedin** provides us with a summary: Westport wasn't a good place for reception in the early 1960's, with only 3YZ Greymouth reaching the township in Buller. Local Paul Spencer 'decided to start up a radio station' and after six months, had built a transmitter, and got together enough waterpipe and overhead wiring for the antenna.

The xmitter was built by the late David Oates, the amplifer by the late Bill Moffat. The radio station was located in Paul's bedroom, which also housed 500×45 rpm records, $250 \times LP$'s, 8 reel-to-reel tapes, 2 Tanberry tape recorders, 2 Philips turntables, 1 microphone and 3 amplifiers.

The first song broadcast was 'Walk in the Black Forest' by Sounds Orchestral, and initial tests were on 780 kHz. These sufferered interference, so they switched to 1480, 'top of the dial' a few years before Radio Hauraki began broadcasting from the Hauraki Gulf.

Paul Spencer was soon tracked down by the NZPO Radio Inspectors and fined 5 pounds in the local Magistrate's Court. When he came to pay the fine, a wellwisher had already done it for him.' I'm sure there were other broadcasts which the 'evil ones' from the NZPO tracked down, sometimes with help from DXers too, and Paul Ormandy's *Unofficial*

Radio column would like to hear from you with the details.

On Sunday the 18th of October, the NZ Radio DX: League lost one of its long time stalwarts, Jack Searle of Haumoana. Jack began listening in 1935 aged 16 when he heard KNX Los Angeles on a now antique Sonora battery set. He began DXing in earnest in 1938 when

Jacks father bought a 6 valve ECKO AW98 receiver. War service in the Pacific with the RNZAF interrupted his DXing and it was not until 1970 that Jack again took up the hobby. Jack was a mechanic and his last job before retiring was with the AA as a technical advisor.

Jack was a regular contributor to the DX Times, and for a number of years edited the SW Mailbag section. Jack was always ready to raise contentious issues leading to some interesting debate. He also loved attending DXpeditions and League Conventions when ever possible

Three members represented the NZ Radio DX League at Jack's funeral. For those of us fortunate in knowing Jack, it's a personal loss as much as a loss to NZ DXing. His name will be missed from the DX Times.

A debate has started regarding QSL being offered by Belgian Ludo Maes'.

The offer is "available for broadcasts organized by TDP as of October 1, 2001", according to a message from Ludo Maes at TDP. The QSL cards, however, do not include any information on transmitter sites whatsoever. "My hunch, and it is only that, about the reason for TDP secrecy on actual transmitter sites, is that some of this business is under-the- table, i.e. technicians at certain under-used sites are paid to put the programs on the air without full knowledge or authorization by the governmental agencies owning them," writes Glenn Hauser in an issue of DX Listeners Digest.

Ludo Maes has responded with dismay to these "lies and serious accusations", adding: "Don't we have a right for not publishing transmitter sites?"

No further information was given on the reasons why, leaving it up to DXers and the DX community to go on debating the real value of these new QSL's.

A 3 kW amplifier has not been installed, because it causes interference to telephones and TV around 50 sq.m. They are now looking for a new transmitter site at suburban area. (HCDX) **Nigeria** 4 October 2001: Radio Netherlands journalist Eric Beauchemin has just visited the external service, Voice of Nigeria. The station plans to have two additional shortwave transmitters on the air by the end of the year. Then they intend to start a daily 18 hour service in English, and a separate 18 hour service in 5 foreign languages. Three new languages - German, Igbo & Yoruba - will be started later this year. An Internet service will start in early 2002, and streaming in RealAudio should happen by the spring. 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

Members are reporting patchy reception so far this summer DX season and the X band is far from open as at mid November. The viability of operating a station in the X band in the US with possibly a limited audience may be behind the trickle of call changes already signalled in our Broadcast News this month.

And so to the mailbag:

Ahoy me hearties!

Welcome to the first edition of "Unofficial Radio" — the forum for all your pirate and clandestine logs, QSLs, tips etc etc. This new section recognizes the interest in these spheres of DX. Chasing clandestines and pirates can be very exhilarating as they certainly offer the die-hard DXer starved of action on the rapidly depopulating tropical bands and cramped mediumwave band. This month, we'll delve a little into pirate DX.

What makes pirate DX interesting is that these stations often only operate on weekends when their radio inspectors are enjoying their days off having a sleep in rather than chase hobbyists generally causing little harm to established broadcasting services. I say "generally" as many of the bands that pirates use carry fixed utility services and some times a pirate is only chased and raided after complaints through official channels from utility stations experiencing interference.

Pirate activity mostly occurs in Europe, North & South America. The Euro pirates are most commonly heard on our Sunday evenings and the majority around sunset on the 48 metre band (typically 6200 — 6310kHz), the 39 mb (7440 —7500kHz), around 9290kHz, below the 25 mb (11470 — 11490), the lower end of the 19mb (Alfa Lima International from The Netherlands is a regular on 15070), the upper end of 19 mb (15795 & 15807 often used), and the 13mb (21890kHz). The higher frequencies can be heard anytime from midday on through the evening. The 48 mb can also provide activity around Sunday & Monday sunrise. Euro pirates tend to move around in frequency, often to avoid interference though also to add an element of elusion.

Most of the Euro pirates broadcast from Germany, The Netherlands, England & Ireland and they are also excellent verifiers. Their format is very heavily pop music, often English Euro-pops even on continental stations. Almost all have e-mail addresses and there are several very good web-sites carrying pirate news, chat and user-groups, in fact you'll find Duplex (Down Under Pirate Listeners Exchange) user-group on radiodx.com at http://www.geocities.com/martin/pwdb-pir.html with great address references and http://www.geocities.com/alfa lima international/

And the US pirates are mostly heard Sunday evenings around sunset between 6900 and 6970kHz, in particular 6955kHz. Unfortunately, the US pirates are not as good as QSLing. Their programmes are often anti-establishment, with black parodies and alternative musical styles (acid rock, elevator music, even Gregorian chants!). A*C*E (Association of Clandestine Enthusiasts) runs a good web-site at http://www.frn.net/ace/ A lot of the US stations use amateur equipment designed for the 40 mb and as a result, many use USB mode. South Americans tend to be spread around and not heard as frequently. Check around 6880 and 11420 for activity on Sundays.

Very few of these stations provide anything near "arm-chair level" signals, they are often mixed with powerful utilities, have bad audio (a lot use home-brew equipment) and the frequency may be unstable. All of this makes them a real DX challenge! Many of these are below 100 watts yet they still make it down-under...

Another thing, pirates are understandably reluctant to give their correct address over the air so many use "mail drops" essentially a sorting house for reports often run by a pirate radio sympathiser. This means that the address you hear may well give no clue at all as to the station's location!

Here are some recent logs to whet your appetite!

First up, US pirate logs from Richard d'Angelo IN Pennsylvania which will give you some idea of what you might hear!

6925 0210 Radio Bingo, 0210-0228 Oct 20, very good imitation of Steve Anderson and United Patriot Radio with Merlin address for QSLs at 0227. Good signal. (D'Angelo-PA)

6955u 0240 Take It Easy Radio, 0240-0247 Oct 21, talk about operations in Afghanistan, Ids, hello to listeners. Good signal. (D'Angelo-PA)

6955u 0315 Psycho Radio, 0315-0346 Oct 21, rock music with Ids ay nice level. (D'Angelo-PA) 6928 0118 usb, 0118-0129* Oct 27, Alan Maxwell hosting program inviting listeners to tune in again next time; Box 69 Elkorn, NB mail drop for QSL cards. End program with Outer Limits theme music. Good signal. (D'Angelo-PA)

6955 0326 Z-100, 0326-0335* Oct 27, man announcer with ID, jingle ID noted playing old rock tunes ("Truckin"). Station off suddenly at 0335 without announcements. Good signal. (D'Angelo-PA)

6925 0312 WHYP, 0312-0403* Nov 3, Listener Appreciation Show #8 for Lee Reynolds. Very good signal "in beautiful AM, of course." (D'Angelo-PA)

6925 0432 United Patriot Militia Bingo, 0432-0522* Nov 4, Steve Anderson spoof with IDs, great ad for Steve Anderson Action Figure, and e-mail address yahwehradio6925@yahoo.com). Strong signal. (D'Angelo-PA)

6955 0006 Whack (?) Radio, *0006-0015* Nov 4, popped on while I was listening to Peruvian with music, man with phone number (888-959-8177) mentioning will be back at 0100 on 6925. Noted later around 0040 on 6925 testing on frequency for later broadcast. Fair to good signal. (D'Angelo-PA)

And from Europe, all heard by Ye Ed over the last month or so (please note that the best time to listen for these stations is either side of sunset — hence no times are mentioned below).

5805 ENGLAND R Free London, semi-regular with English pops though monstered by a ute and best in LSB

6210 GERMANY R Marabu, mix of English & German pops. Another regular signal though occasionally Borderhunter is here too.

6220.1 ENGLAND Laser Hot Hits, another running English pops and often ids as "LHH" **6236 NETHERLANDS R Black Arrow**, EE pops and announcing a freq change to 15807 in 20 minutes.

6261 GERMANY R Doctor Tim, Euro pops and announcements in German, tough going in ute QRM

6276.4 ENGLAND Swinging Radio England, often heard with relays of English comedy shows like "Hancock's Half Hour", e-mail as swingingradioengland@hotmail.com

6281.5 NETHERLANDS R Black Power, testing initially, very stop-start, then EE & Dutch tunes **6296.1 NETHERLANDS Spaceman R**, Fair sig and improving with mix of English & Dutch tunes. **6304.2 NETHERLANDS Alfa Lima Int**, regularly heard around here with English pops, often // 15070 and relays other pirates e.g. Radio Geronimo.

6401.5 Unid, weak English soft-pops

7489.5 ENGLAND Ozone Radio International, very weak with EE pops and annoying ute QRM. **15070 NETHERLANDS Alfa Lima International**, easily the most regularly heard Euro-pirate, often from midday past 0700 with some stunning signals on occasion. Has the odd comedy show too.

CLANDESTINES

Just one timely clandestine log to finish off, though we'll have more on clandestines next month.

8700u 1700 Commando Solo is re-broadcasting ":Information Radio" purportedly from a Hercules C-130 aircraft airborne over Afghanistan. The programmes are in Pashto or Dari and carry many mentions of the proponents in the war. Th exact location of this transmitter is unknown and many DXers feel it is land-based. Communication with the armed forces unit running this broadcast has said more detail and verifications will not be issued until the hostilities conclude. This same aircraft was used to broadcast "psyops" (psychological operations) over the former Yugoslavia in recent years. The choice of frequency and use of sideband has increased speculation that this is a feeder to the circling aircraft who also transmit on medium-wave frequencies formerly used by the Taliban before they were blasted off the air. There is also conjecture that this frequency was chosen as it is near an operational frequency of Taliban ground forces.

Article: Shortwave dials up world's voices

In the basement of Bruce Portzer's home in Seattle's Ravenna neighborhood, I watch him punch in the numbers on the digital shortwave radio. And just like that, the airwaves from Afghanistan are beaming back.

I am listening, live, to U.S. propaganda broadcasts into that country from an Air Force EC-130 "Commando Solo" plane. You want immediacy, here it is, courtesy of the U.S. Special Forces carrying out PsyOps, which stands for "psychological operations."

Through that sometimes staticky, sometimes fuzzy background noise of shortwave signals, as they bounce off the ionosphere and maybe pass through a thunderstorm 1,000 miles away, I hear Afghan music.

The tunes last maybe five or six minutes. Then I hear a no-nonsense voice. Portzer says it's in either Dari or Pashto, Afghanistan's major languages. I think I hear the words "Taliban" and "bin Laden." I don't understand what's said, but it's definitely not a smooth disc jockey's talk.

According to the BBC, the British Broadcasting Corporation, which monitors broadcasts around the world, what was said on a previous day included, "We have not come here to harm you. We have come to arrest Osama bin Laden, al-Qaida and those who support him. ... We request you to stay away from bridges and roads for your own safety, and do not interfere with the military operation and our troops."

Years ago, I used to have a shortwave radio. I listened to broadcasts from Cuba, Australia, Japan, Radio Moscow and even New Guinea. Back then, Radio Moscow gave you 100 percent Cold War talk, 100 percent of the time. From Cuba, there was propaganda, along with some pretty good music.

Shortwave is a guy's kind of thing. A woman enters the household, and she can't understand why anybody would listen to all that static and crackling. That's why shortwave radios get relegated to the basement, or boxed up and stored in the attic.

Then Sept. 11 happened, and shortwave got rediscovered. It had never gone away, but, suddenly, there were ads such as this one, placed in The Wall Street Journal by Grundig, one of the major shortwave-radio sellers.

"GLOBAL UNREST" says the ad, over a photo of an Asian man shouting his message in what appears to be a radio studio.

"No need to wait for updated Internet reports and news at the hour when there are hundreds of correspondents reporting directly to you, live from around the globe. That's the

power of Shortwave Radio," said the ad.

A spokesman for Grundig told me sales have increased five-fold since Sept. 11 over the same period last year. Grundig is aggressively marketing its shortwave radios, some of which are the size of a cell phone, and which sell from about \$30 to \$500.

If you're that businessman traveling to some faraway location, you don't need a computer hookup, just some AA batteries. Then you can tune in to the BBC, with its reputation for unbiased and thorough news reporting, and hear the absolute latest news.

Sitting in Portzer's home — he's 50, an engineer for a wireless-phone company who started listening to shortwave at age 12 — we tune to the BBC. I listen to an interview with a guy who promises mail delivery into Afghanistan. For \$5, the guy says, the letter will get there in five or six days.

Larry Van Horn, assistant editor for Monitoring Times, a magazine for radio hobbyists, says they're getting lots more people resubscribing. "Even when it's not a time of crisis, shortwave radio gives you a whole new perspective," he says. That civil war in East Timor? Van Horn was hearing about it on the shortwave, while initial coverage in American media was practically nonexistent.

At Portzer's home, we turn to 8700 kHz, one of the propaganda frequencies. On the Web, at www.clandestineradio.com, a site that keeps track of all kinds of shortwave broadcasts around the world, you can see copies of the American propaganda leaflets dropped from planes. The leaflets have a drawing of a radio tower, with zigzag lines emitting signals. The drawing shows what look like two boom boxes receiving those signals. "Information Radio," says the leaflet, along with times and frequencies of the broadcasts.

It's crude art, but maybe that's the point. Nothing fancy, just the simple message that we're coming after bin Laden.

It is morning in Afghanistan, where music then is followed by the no-nonsense voice, and what we're doing there becomes just that much more compelling. I'm searching my basement, to see if I can find that old shortwave radio.

THE BIG BIRTHDAY NEXT MONTH! Some enthusiasts have suggested that 12 December 2001 is the centenary of DXing! Why not? Because exactly 100 years ago, inventor Guglielmo Marconi received the first international radio signal over a distance of 3200km, and so provided a starting point for radio broadcasting.

On Thursday morning 12 December 1901, in a furious gale, Marconi and his 2 assist-

ants used a kite to lift an antenna wire to a height of about 120 metres above Signal Hill, overlooking the port of St. Johns, Newfoundland, Canada. His receiver was very crude — a few coils and condensers and a coherer. By prior arrangement. the engineers at his transmitting station at Poldhu in southwest Cornwall, were transmitting the Morse letter S every 10 minutes, with intervals of 5 minutes, between 1500 and 1900 GMT. Shortly after local midday in St Johns, Marconi placed a single earphone to his ear and started listening. Here is how the moment was recorded in his diary: "Suddenly, about 12:30 there sounded the sharp click of the 'tapper' as it struck the coherer, showing me that something was coming, and I listened intently. Unmistakably, the 3 sharp clicks corresponding to 3 dots sounded in my ear; but I could not be satisfied without corroboration. 'Can you hear anything, Mr Kemp?' I said, handing the telephone to my assistant. Kemp heard the same thing as I, and I knew then that I had been absolutely right in my calculations. The electric waves which were being sent out from Poldhu had traversed the Atlantic, serenely ignoring the curvature of the earth which so many doubters considered would be a fatal obstacle, and they were now affecting my receiver in Newfoundland. I knew that the day on which I should be able to send full messages without wires or cables across the Atlantic was not far distant."

So how will you celebrate this important anniversary? See page 17 of last month's DX Times for details of a special EDXC broadcast via WRMI in Florida. Closer to home. Australia's ABC Radio







will combine all its radio networks for a day of special programmes on Wednesday 12 December, and ABC Radio's print magazine "24 Hours" will include a special commemorative CD of the 'best moments in radio' in its December issue. There'll no doubt be more special broadcasts around the world, so make sure you tune in to your radio for this significant occasion!
