Tuvalu being abandoned. The Tuvalu Government has announced that it's giving up the battle against rising seas caused by global warming, and is preparing to gradually abandon the island nation, home of **Radio Tuvalu 621 kHz**.

Australia and New Zealand have advanced plans to resettle Tuvaluans, many of whom already live in New Zealand. The first group for resettlement will leave for New Zealand in 2002. Rising sea levels are a major problem for low lying Pacific islands. However, this is the first time an island government has admitted it simply can't afford to continue attempts to build higher and higher seawalls and find new sources of drinking water. (Pacific Islands Report).

Radio Tuvalu from Funafuti is regularly heard in New Zealand and around the South Pacific. If you haven't logged and QSL'd them, we suggest you get onto it over the next couple of years. Ironically, the signal gets out well because of the increasing salt water impregnation of its transmitting site.

The Wireless Giant of the Pacific returns to the airwaves. Coastal station **KPH Bolinas** on 500 kHz is testing at 2330 UTC in preparation for an on-air event on December 12 and other dates. Located at Point Reyes National Seashore (just north of San Francisco, CA), the station originally closed down in 1997 after almost 100 years of service to maritime traffic across the Pacific.

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The Maritime Radio Historical Society is preserving the station and buildings, and bringing KPH back to air for special occasions. Originally located in the Princess Hotel, San Francisco (hence PH callsign) it moved after the 1905 earthquake. Check their website for regular news: www.radiomarine.org (via Ralph Sutton).

Another station being preserved and restored is **Musick Memorial Radio Station** in Auckland, New Zealand. The NZART regularly meets there, and is restoring the art deco station buildings as a museum. The **NZ Vintage Radio Society** has an excellent article on the station in their November 2001 issue.

TVNZ heard in USA according to reports in **Gerald Brown's** e-broadcastnewsasia from Hong Kong. Sound channels 50.740/750/760 were heard during October by FM/TV DXers in the New England region near Boston and north of New York. That's fairly decent skip by anyone's standards.

Bryan Clark, Auckland reminds us about the **Marconi** centenary celebrations. **RNZ's National Radio** plans a documentary at 0505 UTC on Sunday, December 30, also carried on RNZI 15340.

Paul Ormandy, Oamaru reminds everyone that **Convention 2002 in Oamaru** starts in a matter of weeks, on February 1st, **ending on February 4**. With DXers from the USA, Italy and Australia already booked, this should be a great time. RNZI's Adrian Sainsbury, AWR and Wavescan's Adrian Peterson and Milan based Play-DX host Dario Monferini are amongst guest speakers. You can still book, but hurry. Sign-up forms were in last month's DX Times, can be downloaded from www.radiodx.com or contact Paul direct at 33 Greta Street, Oamaru, NZ. (Note correction to the final day (**Monday 4th February 2002 11 a.m**) on the front page)

A number of NZRDXL issues will be under discussion (see the AGM Report last issue also), plus what's shaping up to be a good DX season, and plenty of time to talk over great DX catches and adventures.

Afghanistan remains in the news. **Radio Afghanistan** is back on air from Kabul with female announcers, and presumably, new equipment to replace that destroyed by the USAF. Wonder who got paid for supplying the new gear?

From London, **Voice of Afghanistan 9950** broadcasts daily 1230-1330 UTC in Pashto and Farsi after test xmissions began November 20. News, music, announcements are being heard well in Pakistan and Afghanistan. Contact telephone: +44 020 7382 9610. (Financial Times UK via MedianStrip).

The US Senate is pushing for US\$25m funding for **Radio Free Afganistan** after complaints that VOA and BBC broadcasts were too restrained in their Afghani broadcasts. Modelled on the Radio Free Europe, Radio Free Asia, Radio Marti stations which the US Government has funded over the years. (The Times UK via MedianStrip).

The US Government is also looking at **\$US500m** to fund an alternative TV news channel for the Middle East (to counter the private Qatar based station al-Jazeera TV about whose broadcasts the Americans are far from pleased) and is talking with **MTV** to set up a channel for 'anti-American' youth in the Middle East. (e-broadcastnewsasia).

Some **digital news** sees the **Federal Radio Corporation of Nigeria** starting a new 32 chain FM service with local broadcasts across Nigeria. Akure FM in Ondo State will be the first of the new digital FM stations. (www.allafrica.com via MedianStrip)

In Australia, the **ABC launches FLY** on digital FM, as a website (FLYNet) and as streaming broadband TV (FLYScreen), all targeted at the youth audience and as part of the digital

rollout across Australia, FLYScreen is also carried on Optus and Austar, (e-broadcastnewsasia). (If the staff stop work, I guess it's a FLYStrike!).

Jack Fox, Mosgiel writes 'have been reading about Japanese Occupation Radio in Shanahai/Manchuria' which I found most interestina.

My logbook shows I heard and logged XGDN 11760 on August 10, 1941 at 1025pm. I have a feeling this was a British station, and as the Japanese invaded soon after, I didn't get a verie. XOJB was logged on 900 with 10kW but I've no other details, and MTCY was logged on 9545 on March 25 1941 (with a QSL arriving February 2, 1942), and again on 15330 on July 18. 1941.

The Eric Shackle Collection which will be added to the Archives shortly also includes MTCY in Hsinking, Manchuria verified in Christchurch in 1935 with 100kW on 570, Very powerful for those times. Another Manchurian QSL was JQAK.

Tokyo Rose was the mystery Japanese female(s) broadcasting to US Pacific troops in WWII and we now have an excellent article on these broadcasts. Also, a great article on Zero **Hour** a very popular Japanese show which was so much liked by American Gl's that the US aovernment auickly created the AFRS broadcasts to the Pacific to counter its success. Japanese Wartime Radio is the third article added to www.radiodx.com recently, tracing the backaround to broadcasts and how an ex-2GB broadcaster came to be running the NHK broadcasts to Australian and American troops from Tokyo in WWII.

Member Profiles MY GREAT DX HOBBY Compiled by Jack Fox

Radio became my life in the 1930s when my parents had a mantle Oxford set and in 1939 purchased a Philips 650 6 valve allwave radio. I became hooked on listening to shortwave and medium wave. I joined the New Zealand DX Club and it was not long before I began sending out reports. Then the war came along but it did not stop DXing although I was to lose some reports through enemy action when ships were sunk or countries were captured. Even so the return of veries was about 90 percent, that changed later. As a result of growing interest I reformed the Otago branch which was in recess and we had about seven members. In those days Arthur Cushen and I would exchange weekly letters and keep informed of our activities.

One day I was asked to go into the radio inspectors office (I worked in the Telegraph Office) where I met two men who asked me to set up an organise a system to monitor enemy shortwave broadcasts and report on any mention of New Zealand and New Zealanders. They were members of the Security Intelligence Service. I arranged with Otago members and Arthur to carry out this assignment. It turned out to be an important part of the war effort by Dxers. (See Arthur Cushen's "Secrets of Wartime Listening to Enemy Broadcasts") I was in the Army Divisional Signals and then the RNZAF in the Pacific, and for a short period attached to an United States Navy flying boat squadron communications. This allowed me to continue monitoring. I obtained a battery operated Gulbranson 7 tube allwave set when in the army which I lugged around various camps. At Riccarton (Christchurch) I had my own hut out in the in middle of the racecourse to do the monitoring and DX!. I took up writing to next-of-kin of New Zealand Prisoners of War in Germany after hearing someone I knew, and on leave I proposed a monitoring system to our branch. At the same time Arthur Cushen was doing similar work and thus evolved the well known and successful Prisoner of War Monitoring Service which Arthur controlled passing on messages to families. An estimated 6000 messages were received. The service also ran during the Korean War. Up the Islands I was in Air Force signals and was able to use radios such as the RCA AR88s and made a number of loggings. My letters back to Dxers in NZ telling what I was logging were censored by officers who did not understand what the callsigns meant United States very good especially from Fiji.

After the war interest in Dxing grew and the Otago branch became a strong one with more than 20 or so members meeting monthly in a city hall. It played a strong role in the community such as getting sport results and news to daily newspapers and radio stations well ahead of the news services. Most noteable being the All Blacks tour of South Africa in 1949, and this is a story on its own in which Arthur Cushen played a part by making arrangements with the Radio Club of Mozambique to broadcast results ahead of the cable services. But it was the first test in which Otago created the biggest upheaval. Knowing the difficulties of getting signals from South Africa, due to the path through the South Magnetic Pole and that the South African Broadcasting Corporation had no shortwave transmitters, the League offered its assistance. It was declined by the New Zealand Broadcasting Service as it had its own receiving station at Makara. Neverthless Dxers monitored the official tests which were to prove beneficial. On the day of the first test Ken Mackey was approached by 4ZB to set up a station at his Long Beach crib as the staffers did not have confidence in their own Wellington operation!

A primitive wire recorded was installed and with most of New Zealand listening, the first half came in strong through Makara, but for the second half Wellington played music while the southerners were receiving perfect copy. Excitement was high at the crib as the music continued to be heard. The recording was raced back to Dunedin and Wellington ordered 4YA on the air so it could be played and be rerecorded for broadcast later in the morning. The uproar which blew up over this after the media had "learnt" that the NZBS had turned down the Dxers, offer ended up with the director general going to Dunedin and arranging for the relay of future games through the assistance of the Dxers. New Eddystone sets were flown down and as there was only one telephone line to Long Beach it was extended to Ken Mackey's location and the Port Chalmers telephone exchange kept open all night to relay the broadcast so it could be fed into the net. (It is interesting to note that Ken's 1936 Patterson radio performed better against the communications set).

When the first postwar cricket match took place in Australia between the MCC and Aus-

tralia, Radio Australia introduced ball-by-ball broadcasts. This was something new and with one of New Zealand's leading radio shops (Columbus Radio Centre) and Otago Dxers combined in a big operation. A large scoreboard was set up in their Dunedin shop and we would feed in results. When conditions were suitable we would set up a listening post in the window which created such interest that the crowd packed out onto the street that traffic officer had to control people so trams could get past. Olympics and others followed and we were regularly headlines in the papers. Weekly *New Zealand Dxers Calling* were broadcast over 4XD and the branch was also involved in producing the first callbook for some years which went on sale in the country and overseas.

DX FRIENDSHIPS

South Island Dxers had strong friendships and became concerned about the national headquarters in Auckland. A meeting between the southerners led to an ultimation being given that unless the hobby returned to its proper function a new DX organisation would be formed. Thus we have the New Zealand Radio DX League which was born in 1949. Leading up to the formation saw Otago and Southland Dxers plan for the basis of the new organisation with the southern branch responsible for the monthly *New Zealand DX* Times and Dunedin the administration. Today we have an organisation that has led to being one of the most recognised DX groups in the world.

In the late forties and fifties Otago Dxers turned their attention to Long Beach where Ken Mackey had a holiday home and George Beardsmore established one. This, along with Murray Lamont's location at the Spit near the entrance to Otago Harbour, the former proved to be one of the country's best DX locations. Beverage aerials were erected on manuka stakes 10 or so feet above the sandhills to the beach at lengths of 1000 feet and more. These highly directional antennas would bring in low power Americans on medium wave with no trouble. Monday nights would see Dxers travel some 20 miles over a rough road from Dunedin and spend a few hours chasing 100 and 250 watts undertaking frequency checks with the FCC. The 50.000 watters would be "ignored" as 250 and 1000 watters were the catches sought. European and Asian stations were also excellent DX areas in the early mornings

OUR FIRST CONVENTION

Otago launched the first DX Convention when it was held in 1955 at Long Beach which was attended by a large number of Dxers, a year later saw 23 at Riverton Rock for the "Antarctic Touch". Many others have followed throughout New Zealand and even attract people from overseas.

Now, many years later I have not lost my enthusiasm for radio and still enjoy my time listening to stations around the world but no longer send reports. In 1993 I gained my amateur license and spend time on air Dxing. If I was asked had things changed? Oh yes they have, let's look at shortwave. In the thirties the stations were more entertaining with music but the war brought along propaganda and in the Cold War period wide spread jamming. Thankfully most of this has gone. In those days when you heard a station you knew it was located on in its own land, not today, and added to this was that a station was identified by its callsign. Each country had its own and every frequency had its own call.

What was my favourite station over the years? I would have to say Radio Australia in its heyday. The BBC and Radio Nederland have also been high in my stakes. There have been others, perhaps it is strange but monitoring Berlin during the war led me to become a

fan of German music and I now have a large collection.

What has the hobby done for me? Besides giving me a terrific amount of enjoyment it broaden my knowledge of so many countries, but it did much more like giving me experience in developing organisational skills for future years. It was radio that changed my life when I took up journalism and founded a prize winning newspaper. It all began through writing DX and radio notes in newspapers.

Yes, DX through radio, has been a great hobby for me and one which I have never had a regret of being associated with through the many people I have met and known. It has been and is still a great hobby. I hope to able to continue for many more years.

COLOMBIA: Idea Radio. Colombia. 7380 kHz. on Radio Idea has started broadcasting on 7380 kHz, giving ID as "Idea Radio - desde Colombia para el mundo". Some DXers have had doubts about the Colombia location, but correspondance with the stations chief engineer, Andrea Laudicina, confirms the Colombia location. Says Laudicina: Idea Radio is the same station as was active in Genova in 1992-1993. However, six years ago I transferred my working activities to Colombia, so now we are trying to put in service a private station from Colombia on shortwave. The transmitter is located 25 km from the capital Santa Fe de Bogotà. We use a RCA transmitter with 10 kW.The antenna is a dipole half wave on a tower 50 meters tall. We want to promote Colombian music, and our aim is to operate 24 hours. We have some problems in finding the best frequency for our transmissions, and we ask DXers and DX clubs worldswide to send us their suggestions to. idearadio@hotmail.com The present 7380 kHz is good for Europe, but in the Americas it suffers from splash interference from other American radio stations. Radio Norway is closing down all programming and transmission on short and medium waves. The decision was made by the board of the Norwegian Broadcasting Corp (Norsk Rikskrimgkasting - NRK) on Dec 5. NRK is in deep money trouble. Radio Norway will cease to exist early in the new year (2002)", If you haven't got Radio Norway's QSL this is your final chance to get it. Radio Norway has been on the air since1948, beaming programs mainly to sailors on board Norwegian merchant vessels and expatriate communities. Radio Norway was a direct "child of the Norwegian exile government's transmissions from London and Boston during WWII to Norwegians living in German occupied Norway and to sailors on the Norwegian merchant fleet supplying UK and the Soviet Union with goods and arms from the US. Big changes on Sky Digital On December 1st Sky Digital completely rearranged itis digital channel line up. This was mainly due to the addition of TV One and TV2 on channels 1 and 2 respectively. Sky Digital has added a new audio service with the following channels of music - Chart Attack channel 70, Pop 71, Smooth 72, Chill 73, Jazz 74, House 75, 50s & 60s 76, Disco 77, Rock 78, Country 79, Classical 80, Kids 81, and Christmas 82. National Radio is now on channel 101, Concert FM on 102, The Wolf on 103, and The Edge on 104. BBC World will be 24 hours a day on Sky Digital from next month. For a full list of channels see

The Rock hit with 'devastating' BSA fine An unprecedented - and "devastating" - \$24,500 fine was imposed by the Broadcasting Standards Authority on The Rock this week after 21 complaints of breaching 'good taste and decency', 'maintenance of law and order' and 'social responsibility' were upheld against it. (Median Strip November 30)

Four public networks for upper FM band Having sought public feedback, the government is sticking with its initial plans to move National Radio and Concert FM to new 101-108FM frequencies and establishing at least two new nationwide networks - one for Maori and one for the Pacific Island community. Further FM frequency plans will be released in April next year, including what to do with any spare upper-band frequencies and those vacated by National Radio and Concert FM. Options would include offering them for commercial use or setting them aside for YRN, KidsNet or some other public broadcasting project. The future of low-power (guardband) broadcasting, and where on the spectrum they will be allowed to operate, will likely be considered at the same time. (Median Strip November 15)

Nelson loggings and news Two loggings from Brian Palamountain this month: 90.8

90FM Rahotu, 92.4 Energy FM Rahotu. Nelson radio station Fresh FM is shifting its Nelson operation from New Street to the historic Cock and Co building on the corner of Haven Road and Bridge Street on November 21. The public access station will be based in part of the first floor area that was once home to commercial station The Planet 97FM. The Planet 97FM moved to the Radio Nelson building in Selwyn Place in April. Fresh will start broadcasting from Haven Road on Friday, November 23. (The Leader 8/11/2001)

BROADCAST NEWS

HAWAII: On the air since 1952 KAIM 870 Molokai, is to close down permanently on 31 December. KAIM has for years put in a strong signal to New Zealand. The religious programming which is the basis of the station's mission will be carried by KGU 760, and KGU's talk format will move to sister station KHNR 650. The decision to close has been made based on electricity costs and restricted coverage of many parts of Oahu. (50 kw from another island at greater cost versus 10kw on the Island of Oahu itself with a larger population). Coincidentally by taking KAIM off 870 enables Salem Media to boost the power of its mainland station on 870 KRLA to 50 Kw.

AUSTRALIA: 3AW and 3AK Melbourne have been hard to verify for some time. However the latest 'gen' is that QSL's are possible from 3AW through Peter Illis, 3AW technician, P.O. Box 369F Melbourne 3001. For 3AK write to Paul Taylor, 3AK, Level 1, 432 St Kilda Road Melbourne 3001. (MW OZ)

The Australian Broadcasting Authority has announced that it will move 5CS 1044 to FM (105.9) and allow 5AU Port Augusta to simulcast on both 1242 and 1044. (ARDXC)

John Wright (dxer@fl.net.au) has issued the following information on the activity of Radio Melbourne 1629 and others on that frequency.

To quote a release dated 27 November to MW OZ:

"The key station is in Melbourne and is known as Radio Melbourne 1629AM. It is part of the Radio Promos and Radio Salsa Australian Network operating 24 hours a day 7 days a week on 1629 with a 400 watt narrowband transmitter located in Williamstown.

Narrowband signifies a maximum bandwidth of 6 khz whereas in-band stations have up to 9 khz. Programming is largely in English apart from 0700 to 0800 in Vietnamese, and 0800-1000 with Spanish Music. (no wonder we think we're hearing a SS Yank on 1630- ED) Macedonian and Chinese are planned. The official call of the station is VMS 264.

Other narrowcast stations on 1629 with 400 watts and under the Rete Italia banner are in Adelaide, Shepparton, and Brisbane, and Hospital Radio Network (100 watts) in Newcastle. The Australian Mediumwave Club and the Australian Shortwave Club have a non-commercial agreement to process DX reports and issue new specially designed official Radio Melbourne 1629 QSLs.

Mailed reports must include return postage; emailed reports will be email QSL'd."

Article: Christian light to go dark

It's almost unheard of in the radio business, but KAIM 870 AM will go dark, or permanently sign off the air, at the end of this year and the frequencywill no longer be used in Hawaii. It first signed on in 195 2 and was joinedthe following year by KAIM 95.5 FM, which plays contemporary Christian music.

The stations, owned by California-based Salem Communications Corp., are operated by Salem Media of Hawaii Inc., which also runs KGU 760 AM and KHNR 650 AM.

"In order to facilitate a good transition for KAIM AM on Dec. 1," said KGU, KHNR and KAIM FM Program Director Michael Shishido, "we're taking all that programming and putting it on KGU AM 760. That causes a chain reaction, where KGU's (talk radio) programming gets merged into (all-news) KHNR."

Then as of Jan. 1, KAIM AM will go off the air and KGU's slogan will become "First in Ministry." It is a play on the fact that KGU in April 1922 was the first radio station licensed in the Territory of Hawaii. It signed on in May and was followed hours later by KDYX AM (590, now known

as KSSK).

The decision to pull the plug was made for economic and other corporate reasons, according to Doug Campbell, general manager of Salem Media of Hawaiilnc. Employees will be "reallocated," he said, but there will be no staff reductions as a result of the plan.

Operating its 50,000 watt transmitter on Molokai costs \$12,000 to \$13,000 a month for electricity, Campbell said, and for technical reasons, "most of Honolulu from Hawaii Kai to Pearl Harbor doesn't hear the station or hears it poorly."

Conversely, electricity for KGU's 10,000 watt transmitter in Oahu's Kewalo basin area costs roughly \$1,000 a month and it provides "stronger service to the main population base."

With 870 inactive as an AM frequency in Hawaii, Salem can boost KRLA 870 AM in Los Angeles from 5,000 to 50,000 watts with no concerns about interference from this side of the Pacific, Campbell said.

The transmitter site on Molokai is owned by the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, which sold KAIM AM and FM to Salem in October 1999.

"The transmitter and processors are ours," Campbell said, but the transmitterbuilding and antenna array must be addressed by the association.

The transmitter site and radio frequency interference with new residential developments around it became the topic of controversy for the Maui County Planning Commission in recent years.

After public hearings, the commission granted Salem an extension of its special use permit for the transmitter site, "pending resolution of the (interference) issues and concerns of the community," Campbell said.

Those issues will now become moot.

Hi all. Welcome to the second edition of "Unofficial Radio". This time we have a closer look at clandestine stations, the very term inspires images of cloak & dagger operations, dark secrets and intrigue... and that's a pretty good description of this nefarious activity often aimed at the overthrow of a government. So, what is the definition of a clandestine? I can't do better than reprint the one appearing in A*C*E "Clandestine radio stations are unlicensed broadcasts designed to create political change within countries targeted by the transmission. They are different from pirate radio stations. Pirates generally are operated by hobbyists as unlicensed transmissions of entertainment programming. Clandestines often appear in countries experiencing political turmoil, especially when overt hostilities or wars have broken out. They are common in regions where political opposition groups do not have access to local broadcast media because of government regulations or censorship".

Clandestines can be found from MW right through SW, mostly using "out-of-band" channels. And they are almost always broadcasting to their target rather than from within. A number of clandestine broadcasters use airtime hired off international broadcasters, notably Julich transmitters leased from Deutsche Telekom or in the C.I.S.

Many are openly operated by government or non-government organisations. There are some who maintain a tight veil of secrecy and are subject to speculation. Some like Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty (run by the US government's International Broadcasting Bureau), have been ground for a long time, having existed through the years of intense iamming during the cold war to now claim wide audiences in their target countries with most governments receptive to their alternative point of view.

The IBB also runs "Radio Martí", whose programmes target the Cuban government and "Radio Free Asia" who targets Asian countries the US government considers to contravene human rights and suppress ethnic groups. The IBB are soon to add "Radio Free Afghanistan" and here's a quote from Teletext provided by Mark Nicholls "The US House of Representatives has approved a measure to establish a radio station in Afghanistan which will help explain the United States war aims to Afghans in their local language. The move authorises spending of around \$60 million over the next two years for transmissions into the country. Radio Free Afghanistan will run under the auspices of the existing Radio Free Europe or Radio Liberty services which traditionally broadcasts information into countries without free presses".

There are a couple of excellent web-sites with plenty of information. The one I find to be the best is www.clandestineradio.com where you'll find pretty much all you need to know about clandestines. The other good site is www.frn.net/ace/ the "ace" stands for "Association of Clandestine Experts" and includes a significant section on pirates, particularly from the USA.

Many clandestines are easy to hear and almost impossible to verify as their addresses are not readily available. Neither are their details published in the WRTH. Some are happy to reply and the verification usually comes with printed material justifying their existence.

Anywhere in the world where there is conflict, clandestines will make an appearance. The Middle East, Korea, the Horn of Africa, Colombia and Asia are current clandestine "hot spots". And it's from Asia that we'll now find most of the jamming originating, particularly of anti-Iranian stations and Radio Free Asia broadcasts, the latter reportedly blocked by the People's Republic of China. You'll also find examples of clandestine broadcasts on http://radiodx.com, for example the articles "Tokyo Rose" and "Treason By Radio".

Clandestines that suffer jamming, notably those aimed at Iran, often move frequency very often. It is common to hear them change anything from 10 — 50kHz every minute or so in an effort to stay one jump ahead of the jammers. The most common form of anti-Iranian blockers are called "bubble jammers", where a quickly varying "wobbly" pitch is used. They are often high-powered and easy catches.

Here are some recent clandestine loggings:

- 5640 1834v V of Mujahed 1834 man talking in Farsi , main theme on Talebans .QRM by jammer until 1838 . Drum music on background MA giving freqs , tel number and IDing "R Sedaye Mujahed". Signal 34333 (Liangas, Greece via internet)
- 8700U 1400 "Information Radio" anti-Taliban transmission to Afghanistan hrd at this time 1/11. Audible most mornings till sign-off around 1732. First heard station 27/10 1730 when AFN feed in progress. This leads me to suspect transmitter location might be Diego Garcia. Checks on subsequent days has been in presumed Pushtu or Dari, with numerous references to Taliban. Mix of spoken prgms and Middle Eastern vocals. (BDC) (Eds. Note: the US military says that QSLs will not be available, or the transmitter location divulged till after the hostilities... which should be very soon.) Their address is: 193rd Special Operations Wing, Attn: Lt. Edward Shank, 81 Constellation Court. Middletown, PA 17057, USA.
- 9950 1330 Radio Voice of Afghanistan. Strong signal in Pashtu and Dari. Address for this one is: Afghan Broadcasting Coy., 21 Worship Street, London EC2 A2DW, UK. This programme is apparently transmitted through Samara, Russia. Ian Cattermole.
- 11840 1858 Radio Rainbow, *1858-1959* Nov 9, open carrier into opening ID and an nouncements with brief musical segment prior to long political talk in Amharic language. Horn of Africa music at 1919 and 1941. ID "Keste Demena Radio" and sign off announcements prior to carrier being terminated. Fair. (D'Angelo/FCDX-PA)

- 15230 0859 V of Mesopotamia 0859 after song plays YL IDing in Kurdish as "Harium kum darusalam di Kurdistan" giving freqs then news. 0913 with Quaranic verses 0920 with songs till 0945 when clear ID was given as "Denge Mesopotamia" with freqs and telephone. Again ID and continues with nice western back ground music and talks by man. 0954 with Kurdish folk music . SINPO 32433 before 0900 but on 0930 as 33433from a medium level carrier on 15229. (Zacharias Lianaas, Greece via internet)
- 21550 1330 "Sowt al-Karn" (English "Voice of the Millenium" also ids in English as "Millenium Voice". A website provides more in formation:

 http://www.voice-of-eritrea.com/Newsletter/voe_newsletter12112001.htm They are heard 1330-1430 and apparently run anti-Ethiopian government program ming, so the sponsors may well be Eritrean. (Hans Johnson, Cumbre DX)
- 21590 1230 Tamil Broadcasting Corporation, London, sked 1230 —1330. (D. Prabakaran Mettupalayam via DX India & Ian Cattermole)

Article: **QSL** Questionnaire

Over the years much has been written about reception reports, QSLs etc. I have always wondered just how the recipient at a particular broadcaster viewed these reports and the importance attached to them. I decided to approach Kathy Otto who handles reception reports/QSLs for Sentech in South Africa. She was only too happy to oblige and here are the questions that I put to her along with her replies:

- 1. Q. How many reception reports per week would you receive?
 - A. We receive on average around 7 reception reports per week, so we're not exactly in the "big league".
- 2. Q. What are the quality of these reports as to programme content and reception details?
 - A. The quality with regard to programme content and reception details is variable-perhaps only 50-60 percent of reports supply adequate details.
- 3. Q. Are reception and programme description generally adequate, if not what is missina?
 - A. Of the reports we consider to be inadequate, programme details are usually too vague.
- 4. Q. Do your technical staff take an interest in these reports?
 - A. Although it is interesting to learn just how our signals travel, from a technical point of view only reports from our target listening areas are of any value.
- 5. Q. Does Sentech consider reports as being important or just a PR exercise?
 - A. We regard reports from our target listening areas as extremely valuable. However, we respond with QSL cards to all reports received, irrespective of where they come from. It's certainly not a PR exercise, but a common courtesv.
- 6. Q. Do you, personally as a recipient and QSLer enjoy receiving these reports and replying to them or is it just another part of the job?
 - A. It's always a pleasure to receive an informative, concise and well written reception report from far-away places, but to be honest sending out QSL cards is just part of the job.
- 7 Q. Do you have any suggestions on ways to improve reception reports by DXers, things you would like to see included?
 - A. One thing that comes to mind is identification of interference to a

- signal. Very often the SIO rating indicates the presence of interference, in which case the type of interference (CW, Co-channel, adjacent channel etc.) and the origin should be identified if possible.
- 8. Q. Do you get reports that you consider poor as regard to reception detail and programme content, if so could you give an example of a poor report that you have recently received?
 - A. Refer to item 2 above. Some examples of inadequate details of programme content include: "Views, comments and music from South Africa," or "voice of a man, voice of a woman, music".
- 9. Q. You have now received several reports from me. To enable me to get a comparison how do you rate my reports as to quality compared to others vou receive?
 - A. Very good.
- 10.Q. Which part of the world do most of your reports come from?
 - A. Australia, New Zealand, India and Japan.
- 11.Q. Does any particular region send in consistently better or worse reports than any other?
 - A. No.
- 12.Q. Any additional comments and criticism would be very welcome. Anything you can think of in this regard.
 - A. All is covered above.

Well there it is from the recipients view. I guess it gives us all something to ponder over and it is obvious that reports should be interesting and well written. Ian Cattermole.

Auckland

The 25 November meeting had 15 present at the clubrooms. Mike Butler says that last month the sunspot peak has reached almost the same peak as the "official" peak early in the year. Always exciting science!

Daniel Bloomfield invites those from Auckland interested in attending the DX convention at Oamaru (1 Feb - 12 PM 4 Feb 2001) in the South Island can fly by Qantas to Christchurch \$220 return airfare and bus the remaining distance to Oamaru \$54 return fare. With \$100 to cover the conference and stay a total price is estimated at \$400.

The Leonids meteor shower of 18/19 November saw the 2 metre ham band up and down, according to Barry Jones, also with news that a new radio station he's heard on 95.4 MHz FM in Auckland. No IDs were heard and the music played automatically.

Yuri Muzyka observed the Leonid meteors in the hours leading up to sunrise on Monday 19 November with three other radio amateurs up in the hills at Whitford, east of Auckland. They saw at least 100 bright meteors! A suitable TV beacon on 50.040 MHz allows for meteor scatter radio monitoring by tuning 1 kHz down to 50.039 in the USB mode. Listen out for "pings" and "pongs" faint or medium strength sounds in the general background noise. There are several types of meteor scatter events which produce a whole range of combined sounds. No meteor scatter monitoring was done at Whitford but two video cameras were used.

The Geminids meteor shower peaks on December 14th.

Barry Williams suggested members thoroughly monitor a small stretch of the 25m band (between 11800 - 11900 kHz) over the spring and summer and send their loggings in to the DX Times. It's for a nationwide propagation analysis.

There is no meeting in December.

The January meeting is tentatively at the Clubrooms, 3000 Great North Road, New Lynn, just past Whau Creek, on the 27th at 2 pm.

Meetings are on the last Sunday of the month except December.
