Happy New Year, welcome to 2002. This month in Talkback, former WXLE Canton Island Station Manager Max A Chapman checks in with news, Radio Happy Isles reactivates provincial transmitters, are there too many stations to hear and log or too few these days, new Pacific Community Radio Network on FM, and much more.

Reminders that you can still book for Convention 2002 in Oamaru (February 1-4), the Latin American Radio Tour in October 2002 is already attracting interest (see December DXT for itinerary and details) and the **Radio Happy Isles Competition** is extended until March 31 whilst we link www.radiodx.com to more partner sites over the coming weeks.

Are there just too many stations to log these days? It's a question which springs to mind after reading about the growth in Australian stations since 1992.

In that year, there were 908 MW/FM transmitters on air. Nearly 10 years later, and 1468 new transmitters have been added, excluding a similar number of low powered narrowcast transmitters. That's nearly a 300% increase.

Many stations are networked (ABC, SBS and increasingly commercial networks are

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emerging), and the tremendous growth in community stations has actually outstripped volunteers available to operate them. So networking of programs for community stations has also arown.

In 1992, Cairns had 8 MW/.FM transmitters, Today, there are 23 to serve a radio market of 150,000 people. From a DX viewpoint, that's added congestion on the bands, more high powered services to overcome manmade noise and interference from computers, and music which is largely unintelligible to older DXers (which makes reporting even more of an effort).

Or just too few? Shortwave DXers have a different challenge, as many small Latin American SW outlets convert to either MW or FM and leave the 60 and 90 meter bands.

Across the Pacific, local SW services have all but disappeared. In their place are 100 and 250kW units of state broadcasters (like VOA) or religious stations. Further afield, Radio Norway has closed down its SW transmissions, Radio Canada and ORF Austria have slashed services, the BBC has also cut back some SW broadcasts, and across Africa, SW radio is being replaced with MW/FM and diaital service.

Whether there are too many stations to listen to, or too few, it all adds to the fun and enjoyment of our radio hobby as we enter the 101st year after Mr Marconi gave us the iov of radio.

Pacific Community Radio Network gets green light. A national network of FM frequencies and funds have been provided by the NZ government to reach 85% of all Pacific islanders living in the country. This pilot program is funded for 4 years, and will then be evaluated.

The network will have regional studios in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch, and broadcast in languages such as Samoan, Tongan, Cook Island Maori, Niuean, Fijian, Tokelau, Kiribati, Tuvaluan etc.

What's unclear is the impact this will have on NZOA, community and listener supported Pacific language broadcasts on local community stations, Samoan Capital Radio 783 AM, Radio 531PI Auckland, Radio Samoa 1593 AM and other existing broadcasts.

A 'network provider' will be selected by a tender process says the Ministry of Pacific Island Affairs, who have oversight of the new network. The emergence of a 24 hour FM network may also provide a new program source

for Radio NZ International which could, presumably, relay broadcasts over SW frequencies to the islands.

Solomon Islands SIBC looks to future with more confidence after the recent elections. Here's an overview of the current operation: *SIBC is the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation, with the callsign Radio Happy Isles. The service continues to maintain its public service status as the national broadcaster, operating from its HQ on Honiara.*

SIBC transmits on 1035 kHz MW and on 5020 kHz SW in the 60 meter band. (9545 kHz is also listed as at November 27). PO Box 654 Honiara. Tel: +677 20051, Fax: +677 231591 or 25652, email: sibcnews@solomon.com.sb

SIBC also operates the Wan Tok FM transmitting on 96.3 mHz from Honiara.

Radio Happy Lagoon (Radio Hapi Lagun in pidgin) is in Gizo, and operates on 945 kHz MW. PO Box 78, Gizo, Western Province. Tel/Fax: +677 60160.

Radio Temotu is anticipated to be back on air in June 2001 on 1386 kHz MW from Lata. PO Box 46, Lata, Santa Cruz, Temotu Province. Tel: +677 53047.

As the national broadcaster, SIBC continues to advocate peace and unity in the Happy Isles.

I've a Drake R8B sitting here along with an HP spectrum analyser and starting to collect lots of electronic gadgetry. Move into the new house by the beach during January and the DXing will begin soon after. Hoping to get my full Amateur licence here in Mexico soon.

Buddy can you spare me your time?! We're looking for some helpful members in different parts of NZ who can 'buddy' new members in their area. It's up to each volunteer to decide what they can do best and whether they want to be in touch by email, phone, mail or in person etc.

But the basic idea is simple: when a new member joins, we give them the name of a buddy in the club who can help answer questions, or refer them to others if they don't know the answers themselves.

With email these days, you may live in a different city or even country. For those without email, someone local will be more useful.

In the 'old days' this sort of thing happened through branches, but we've moved on, and members are now more isolated from one another. So, having a buddy is important as we gain new members in NZ and around the world. It helps keep the club human! Thanks buddy.

KAIM Gone. What a shock to read in last month's DXT of this 50 year veteran of the airwaves going silent in Honolulu. I heard them when they were 30 years old, and running just 10kW as 'Honolulu's stereophonic radio station' with studios at 3555 Harding Ave. I visited their original transmitter and tower in Honolulu with Alan Roycroft back in 1976.

Samoa's 2AP plans to broadcast from American Samoa halted by FCC.

The Samoan government station had office space allocated in the Territorial Emergency Management Co-ordinating Office at Tafuna, and was about to move a transmitter and tower to begin coverage of north shore villages of Tutuila and the Manu'a Island group which aren't covered by any American Samoa stations.

Both governments had agreed to the move in 2000, but American Samoa Governor Tauese Sunia says 'the FCC lacks jurisdiction over a foreign-owned radio station' so the plans are currently on hold. Currently, American Samoa is served by KKHJ-FM and KSBS-FM whilst plans to return WVUV-AM remain unclear, although the station is reportedly back on air with low power.

The 10kW 2AP transmitter is the only signal which reaches all of the two Samoas (see 'A Samoan Radio Journey' in the Pacific Radio Heritage Collection at www.radiodx.com) and is critical for cyclone warnings. WVUV was privatised years ago, downgrading the transmitter from 10kW to 5Kw and then going silent.

Radio Fiji Two remains silent on 774 although there is now an FM transmitter covering Suva with the Hindi language service. The strongest signal from Fiji is now Radio Fiji One in Fijian from Drasa on 558 using 12kW. Originally both 558 and 774 used 20kW transmitters, but services on AM have become less important in urban centers as FM transmission has expanded both by Radio Fiji and private stations.

RFO Noumea and Papeete remain the most powerful AM broadcasters in the islands, with 20kW transmitters on 666 (Noumea, New Caledonia) and 738 (Papeete, Tahiti) with local programs during the daytime and relays of France-Inter during local nighttime. Both are heard well in New Zealand, with 666 groundwave signals available during local daytime, particularly in northern parts of the North Island.

Edemir Hernandez, Costa Rica is passionate about SW DX and his Grundig Satellit 1000 Transistor 6002 has been giving him problems, so he's looking out for a new chassis for this particular model. If you're able to offer any advice or can help his search, please email Edemir at edemarhe@racsa.co.cr and let him know.

Richard Tucker (via email) picks up on **Ian Davidson's AM stereo** comments (November DXT) and says 'I've heard 3EE, 2UW etc in AM stereo back in 1994' and goes on to add that he also heard KOMA Oklahoma City 1520 in AM stereo. That's an interesting angle on powerhouse KOMA reception. Listen for this 50kWer early evenings over the next few months, it should shunt aside anything else on 1520 or 1521 in this part of the world!

Radio Tajikistan may reactivate 1000kW MW transmitter at Kolkhozabad in the south of the country according to a report in the latest ebusinessnewsasia from Gerald Brown, Hong Kong. The daytime signal can reach Kabul, southern Afghanistan and parts of Pakistan. Russian broadcasters want to use it, but are in negotiation over outstanding relay payments for other Tajik transmitters which have already seen the Tajik government suspend Russian radio and TV relays since mid-October.

Ray Crawford, Queensland (via email) writes not a lot of DX being done at the moment as the noise levels are too high and conditions are not that good anyway. Am going to Convention 2002, and looking forward to hearing a few good signals although I think it's more important to socialise at Conventions these days..

A couple of books about **Espirito Santo** are recommended by Ray to give background to the rebel radio stations which operated there (see articles at <u>www.radiodx.com</u>) the first

being The Coconut War — the crisis on Espirito Santo by Richard Shears, a paperback published by Cassell Australia in 1980 (ISBN 0726978663), the other The Santo Rebellion — an imperial reckoning by John Beasant, published by Heinemann Australia and University of Hawaii Press (USA edition) in 1984 (ISBN 0 8248 0947 5).

Max Chapman, Nevada, USA (via email) may sound a familiar name to some DXers. Max was Station Manager at WXLE Canton Island and signed QSLs for many DXers, including one illustrating the WXLE articles at www.radiodx.com and has sent a new photo of the WXLE studios plus more memories of the station.

I haven't heard from anyone since I left the island, so I don't know where Joyce Haas is. The reference to Lowell D White refers to Dave White, and James Nolan was known as Jim. Nolan, Other prominent names around the radio station I remember are Jack Raider, Buddy Redmond and Darrell Alexander.

Ted Hill, who took the aerial photo on the QSL postcard actually lived on the island and I had lunch with him many times. He was about 60 years old then. For the 18 months I worked there, the population was about 350 so we all had a lot of meals together in the mess hall.

The supply plane, a C-141, flew down from Honolulu every Wednesday, stopped for an hour, then went on to Pago Pago. It made the return trip from Samoa to Canton to Honolulu every Thursday. We had a doctor (or sometimes just a nurse) on the island but no dentist, and the favorite way to get off the island was to get a toothache and have to fly to Honolulu. Otherwise, you were stuck there for 6 months when you earned a weeks paid vacation and round trip fare back to point-of-hire (mine was Oakland, CA).

Believe it or not, some people didn't want to leave and would fly to Los Angeles or somewhere just for breakfast to use their free airfare and come right back.

What a find on the net, the whole WXLE story! By the way, when I left Canton in 1976 I toured New Zealand and Australia for 3 weeks, great trip, great people.

Brynn Ruag via email adds I was on Canton Island in 1973-5 and in the chopper with Ted the day he took the picture (on the WXLE QSL card). One of my brothers-in-law was a DJ on WXLE in the early days.

Adrian Peterson, Indianapolis, IN writes on a couple of occasions recently, I've spent a considerable amount of time at your web site. This is indeed a very nice site, well prepared, very attractive, and certainly very informative.

ANOTHER CLOSURE: ITALY: Adventist World Radio (AWR) officially announces the end of broadcasting from its shortwave station located at Forli in Italy, effective December 31, 2001. The low powered 2.5 kW station in Forli has been on the air since 1985. The decision to cease broadcasting from the Forli site ultimately became inevitable after AWR began leasing airtime from two more powerful stations; Deutsche Telekom in Juelich, Germany, and ORF in Moosbrunn, Austria.

Adventist World Radio is the international radio system of Christian ministry operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church with its headquarters in Silver Spring, Maryland, USA. AWR owns and operates a major shortwave broadcasting station on the island of Guam, licensed by the FCC as KSDA, with four transmitters at 100 kW. AWR also leases time on shortwave relay stations in six additional countries; Germany, Austria, Slovakia, South Africa, Madagascar, and the United Arab Emirates.

AWR also broadcasts on national radio throughout Russia, as well as in Kazakstan and Uzbekistan. AWR also operates a satellite program distribution system serving a local network of downlink stations located in Latin America; from Guatemala to Argentina. Additionally, AWR operates a growing internet-based system of program distribution

The International Ice Patrol, flown by units of the US Coast Guard, will monitor the extent of the icebera danger near the Grand Banks of Newfoundland and provide limits of all known ice to the maritime community. Listen to the primary USCG frequencies of 5696 and 8983 for C130Hs based at CGAS Elizabeth City, North Carolina for these patrols. Aircraft are equipped with a side looking airborne radar mounted on a removable pod.

Arctic Radio is explained by Risto Hirvonen of Finland as only a call sign. Actual traffic is handled by Baffin Radio in Canada on VHF, while aircraft out of range of VHF may call Baffin on 2971,4675, 8891, or 11279.

The hobby of plane spotting, prevalent in Europe, comes to mind when reading of the arrest of a number of British spotters in Greece. Apparently they were spotted taking photographs at a military base. They have since been released. This is a reminder of an English Utes hobbyist seen at Shannon airport recording traffic details - on talking to him he said that he visited Shannon auite frequently although the number of international movements at that airport is small.

NEW ZEALAND: Three QSLs from one station? 1386 will bring you QSL's from Radio Tarana, Radio Korea, and Chinese Life Commercial Radio depending on when you listen and report and where you send the report. In purist DX terms this is totally contrary to the logging of a transmitter and is just one station. Remember the days of 1YD and Radio I with its format change at 10 each night?

The bane of identifying ESPN stations is WHEN may you hear an ID. NRC News reveals the programming sequences as follows:

The key times for ID inserts are between 00 and 5 mins past the hour, 20 and 27 minutes past the hour 40 and 47 minutes and 59 minutes past the hour. More particularly:

If the station doesn't go to news the following happens: (Minutes+seconds past the hour)

0000 (the hour) Sportscenter

0130 Local 60 second break

0230 Sportscenter

0400 Local 30 second break

0430 Sportscenter 0500 Local two minute break 0650 Music bed for ID

2000 Sportscenter 2300 Network ads 60 seconds 2400 Local ads 3 minutes 2650 Music bed for ID

4000 Sportscenter 4300 Network ads for two minutes 4500 Local ads two minutes 4650 Music bed for ID

5500 Local station input 5900 ESPN promo 5950 Local ID 10 secs.

If you hear ESPN promos during what would be local breaks you probably won't get anything useful out of the break. These are network fills. If you hear Public Service Announcements this is a good sign, as they are probably locally originated and will possibly identify the station location and provide an automated ID before returning to ESPN. AUSTRALIA: Radio Rhema 1413 Shepparton is on the air, but described by Aussie Dxers as 'most difficult to hear.' MW OZ DX.

SAMOA: Plans for closer cooperation between the governments of Samoa and American Samoa have received a setback. One of the elements of the plan, designed to improve coordination between the two states in times of crisis and natural disaster, was to allow Samoa's Radio 2AP to operate in the territory of American Samoa. But the US Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has refused to grant a licence to 2AP. The Governor of American Samoa, Tauese Sunia, told an inter-government meeting that the FCC refused the licence because 2AP is a "foreign-owned radio station." Office space had already been reserved for 2AP in Tafuna, and Director Kika Stowers said that they were ready to move equipment in. Despite the setback, both countries remain committed to closer cooperation,

and say that 2AP will continue to play a role in disaster awareness for both countries. (via Radio Netherlands Media Network 7/12/01)

SAMOA (AMERICAN): Here's the current status of the American Samoa station WVUV-648. I sent an email to KKHJ-FM which is co-owned with WVUV, and received the following reply: "WVUV is on 648 khz. It's on-air at low power, simulcasting KKHJ-FM. The original facilities were destroyed in a fire in '98. Plans are in the works for a new site and a return to 10 kw." KKHJ-FM's web site is www.khjradio.com and bills itself as "American Samoa's #1 Hit Music Station" and "93-KHJ" (which, curiously, was the slogan for a legendary Los Angeles Top 40 station in the 1960s). Radio Nederlands Special Broadcast

Royal wedding fever is beginning to grip the Dutch nation, and nowhere more so than here in the Dutch media capital. Coverage of the wedding by Radio Netherlands on 2 February 2002 will be the largest live broadcast in our station's history. More than 20 shortwave frequencies will be operating simultaneously, in addition to live television coverage on the Dutch-language satellite channel BVN-TV, and live Internet audio streams. Apart from our Dutch service, this is a major occasion for RN's Spanish service, which is expecting a huge audience in Argentina, the bride's homeland.

There will be a modified frequency schedule on 2 February for broadcasts in Dutch and Spanish. Live coverage in English and Indonesian will be carried on regularly scheduled frequencies. A transmitter at Dhabayya in the United Arab Emirates will carry Dutch programming at 0827-1325 UTC on 21575 kHz beamed to SE Asia. The 50 kW transmitter at Madagascar, not normally used for RNW transmissions, will operate at 0827-1325 UTC on 17485 kHz beamed to southern Africa. Full details at

SWITCH TO AM TAKES FM RIVALS OFF THE AIR

Brisbane youth broadcaster Switch FM yesterday snapped up the city's last community radio licence, but its survival depends on its young listeners making the switch to AM.

The Australian Broadcasting Authority announced yesterday it would issue a broadcasting licence to the Brisbane Interactive Radio Group, which has been running Switch FM on a community time-share arrangement since July 1999.

The announcement signals the end of a bitter community radio war in Brisbane that has raged for almost two years as eight stations competed for two free community radio licences. it means the shut-down of three other community radio groups that applied for the AM licence.

The youth station — which had previously shared the frequency 97.3FM with Pulse FM and now the defunct Wild FM and Groove FM, but had not been heard on Brisbane airwaves since July — will broadcast from March on 1197kHz on the AM band.

Project manager Matthew Boyd said the group was confident listeners would adjust their dials and remain loyal to the station, which has been broadcasting via the Internet since the time-share arrangement ended in July.

"Everybody seems to think that AM is 'old fogies' music, but the only reason for that is that there's never been great music on the AM dial," Mr Boyd claimed.

The ABA issued an FM licence to Christian broadcaster Family Radio Ltd. in August after considering applications from six stations including Switch FM.

Following that announcement, Switch pursued its AM application, competing with Pulse, tourism station Radio Queensland and the Silver Memories Community Radio Association.

Mr Boyd said Switch, now known as Switch 1197, would broadcast in stereo from a central Brisbane location.

Members Profiles

Doug Milligan, Tauranga.

I was very interested in Jack Fox's article in the December 2001 DX Times. I thought I might write about how I got into radio - it was back in the early 1940's through my girl friend, who's father was a motorman on the trams in Auckland. He was an amateur operator and he used to repair old valve radios as a hobby. I asked him what was a good radio those days - he said the Ultimate radios were very good.

My wife & I were married in 1945 and in 1946 I was working on a sheep station in Gisborne. That was when I bought my first 5 valve Ultimate broadcast & shortwave radio and I made up a Windom wire antenna 100 feet long with a lead-in tapped 70 feet from one end, which my father in law used for his amateur radio transmitter and it worked very well. I used to listen to the Armed Forces Radio Service with all the entertainment shows for the troops overseas, and to Switzerland on Sunday afternoons. Then I had a break for a while till we shifted back to Auckland at the end of 1949. In 1952 1 bought a 6 valve Ultimate broadcast & shortwave radio off McCabes at the top of Queen Street in Auckland. It is now 49 years old and still going strong. I use it on my 3-foot medium wave loop antenna and have had American broadcast band stations on it but I haven't tried the X band (1610-1700kHz) yet - I will have to use the Eddystone or the Sony 2001 for that band.

In 1956 we shifted back to Gisborne and Lused to listen to Radio Australia and the Voice of America. I like Jazz so I used to listen to Willis Conover who presented Music USA, Jazz Sunday mornings and Music U.S.A. standards Monday mornings, which he did for 41 years. He passed away on Friday 17th May 1996 after a long illness, aged 75.

I joined the New Zealand Radio DX League in March 1977. I used my Ultimate up to 1971 when I managed to buy a Phillips FM-AM Deluxe Portable L6X38T for \$50 but no sideband then. I wrote to Arthur Cushen re a radio where you could dial up the frequencies and at that time in 1976 the Barlow Wadley XCR-30 at \$315 had just come on the market. So I purchased one from Tricity House Christchurch, a very good set on sideband. I now used a 60 feet wire dipole antenna. In 1978 I was able to buy a Eddystone EC10 second-hand off a friend in Gisborne for \$150. In 1982 I purchased a Supreme Shortwave antenna from Tricity House for \$95, which I am still using.

In 1974 when we went over to Sydney to see our daughter, we managed to go to Melbourne for a few days on the train and I went to the ABC studios and met Keith Glover who used to do a shortwave listeners programme. I wrote a letter to him after we came back to Gisborne and he answered my letter on his programme in December 1974, which I still have on cassette tape. I know that older members will remember Keith Glover.

We shifted to Tauranga in September 1983 and all my radios are set up at the back of my garage downstairs. In 1987 1 bought a Sangean ATS-803A for \$369 at Dick Smiths. In December 1984, one Saturday afternoon I was tuning around on my Phillips, which is very good on FM as it has an AFC switch and is coupled to a 4 element FM antenna - I had Radio Noumea on 96.4 booming in like a local station and the same afternoon I had a new FM station from Fiji as well. There's no way I can get any FM stations DXing in Tauranga now - it's virtually impossible with Auckland, Waikato and Tauranga stations coming in. There's no way I can get FM stations from Australia which I want to hear - Coast FM 91.7 and Radio

Hope Island 94.1 which plays Jazz 24 hours a day. I got about 33 stations in this area. I recorded the Noumea station on cassette tape too.

In 1999 1 managed to acquire a Sony ICF-2001 from a friend for free so I have 6 shortwave & broadcast sets with the Philips, Sangean & Sony having FM as well. Would anybody have details of modifications for the Sony 2001 to narrow the FM band(width? Ed). I have an AOR1000 scanner for 500MHZ to 1300MHz. I have had CB radio since 1977 and when I was living in Gisborne I used to talk to Jack Fox when skip was running in the summer months. I had a few contacts after we shifted to Tauranga. Jack's callsign was DN987 and mine was GS304. I met Jack in Tauranga back in the 80's when he came up for a press conference. I worked Jack on skip over a period of 20 years on CB radio. That's my story.

As a young teenager in 1968, I often flicked the SW switch on an old Phillips 210 along-side my bed and listened to HCJB Quito, FEBC Manila, AIR Delhi, Deutsche Welle/ Cologne and my favorite, Radio Beirut, who had a wonderful weekly hit parade of truly cosmopolitan music from Lebanon. They sent a nice QSL by registered mail.

It wasn't long before I realised I could hear foreign stations on MW as well, my first catch being 'KFRE, TW Patterson Building, Fresno' and soon, many others. I didn't have a WRTVH, I didn't know about the NZRDXL, I didn't know what a valve looked like, but I did enjoy checking the mailbox each day to see what colorful QSL cards and letters had arrived from strange places on the map.

Alan Roycroft began to chide me for hanging out the back of the Phillips instead of doing my studies, but I heard some fantastic DX on that small 4 valve radio and 120ft of wire, including 250 watt KMTH Midway Island, Bordeaux 1205 at 6pm and tiny 50 watt 6BE in the wee hours of the morning when all the West Aussies were there mixed with AFVN Saigon, Radio Singapore 790 and KSDX 1250 in the Ryukyu Islands.

The Canterbury Branch was very active in the early 1970s, and we used to meet each month to collate, staple, address and mail the DX Times. Don Reed, Lance Johnston, Craig Crawford, Bob Boundy, Dave Dwyer, Mike Pollard, Stu Forsyth and many other names were involved. The 1971 Convention at Leithfield Beach was amazing. It seemed there were Latins on every channel. I upgraded to a Trio 9R59DSM which is still my main DX receiver.

Over the years I steadily worked away at DX, but gradually found that university studies, National Radio going allnight, more local stations, and in 1980, a move from Christchurch to Wellington, made it harder to hear good DX. I visited Te Araroa several times, hearing fantastic Caribbean signals (VOA Antigua 1580 at 2pm, Radio Caymans 1555 sign/off at 3pm) but after one such trip, I logged 30+ great catches and got back only 5 QSLs. That really undermined my active DXing, which has been sporadic, to be kind about it, ever since.

DX highlights to date include: phonecalls from KTAR Phoenix and CFPR Prince Rupert, visiting KYNO Fresno one year to the day after logging them at Te Araroa, taping 8DR Darwin via SW after Cyclone Tracy, switching KORL Honolulu off air, spending a day at VL2NI Norfolk Island, logging KHLO Hilo 850 1kw at Convention 77 and finally hearing the Falkland Islands, even if it was on SW. Biggest frustration: being on some sort of black list from ZNS1 Bahamas

1540 and driving past their Nassau studios without the time to call in and collect my outstanding QSL from 1974.

I've been fortunate to travel widely in the Pacific, Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Europe, and always enjoy doing local bandscans. I lived in Los Angeles for four years which totally drained me of interest in logging Yanks anymore, but wherever I traveled in the US and Canada, I could always find a link with home by listening to the radio. Bryan Clark and I even listened to RNZI moments before my marriage to Jocelyne in Canada, and I took a SuperRadio to Bermuda on our honeymoon!

These days, I enjoy hunting out items for **Talkback**, researching stories about Pacific radio for the **Pacific Radio Heritage Collection**, and helping build the NZRDXL as a premier global heritage radio club reflecting todays radio scene. I recently checked out DXing from my favorite old site, and found no local noise, lots of hets, and the promise of some good signals if I make the effort. I may do so, and I hope the stations reciprocate with QSLs to rekindle the interest. I'd love to get 50 Western Aussies and 100 Pacific QSLs.

The neat thing about the hobby is you can always find a new angle or rediscover an old one, all the time. And I continue to make some wonderful friends, including a penpal from Fresno back in 1969 who just got married this September and we're still in contact 32 years on. After all, radio is all about staying in touch.

Thank you to Doug Milligan , Tauranga. and David Ricquish , Wellington for their memories of how they joined the hobby of DX'ing and what they have got out of the hobby over the vears.

Article: Australia by Radio QSL Part 2

South Australia & Northern Territory

ADELAIDE with a population of 1.1m is capital of Australia's most urbanised state (70% urban) and also the driest (66% is pure desert) state. Well known for its major arts festivals, and close to seven major wine producing areas, Adelaide is also regarded as slightly conservative, designed by the same surveyor who designed sister city Christchurch. Commercial 5DN (970, 2kW) was heard in February 1970 and is QSL#1, soon followed by the commercial station owned by the Adelaide Advertiser newspaper, 5AD (1310, 2kW) as QSL#2 also in February 1970. A third commercial station heard was 5KA (1200, 2kW) in May 1970, and QSL#5. In August 1970, the two powerful ABC stations in the city were heard: 5AN (890, 50kW) as QSL#6 and 5CL (730, also 50kW) as QSL#7. In March 1976, new commercial station 5AA (1390, 5kW) began broadcasting with an easy listening format and was soon confirmed as QSL#15, followed in March 1980 with a frequency change (1386, 5kW) for QSL#16. Another frequency change in October 1982 was for 5DN (now 972, 2kW) and confirmed for QSL#17. Travelina 260km NE of Adelaide on the Sturt Highway now to reach RENMARK, a town in the heart of Australia's oldest irrigation area. Fruit orchards and vineyards are major local industries, and Renmark is close to the town of Berri (of fruitjuice fame) and less than 40km from the Victorian border. It's the location of commercial 5RM (800, 2kW) heard in April 1970 for QSL#3 Also north of Adelaide is PORT PIRIE, a city on the Spencer Gulf. The world's largest lead smelters are here, along with sheep farming and fishing. ABC regional station 5CK (640, 10kW) is located here, and was heard in April 1970 for QSL#4. CRYSTAL BROOK is 25km from Port Pirie and although now part of that city's radio market, once had its own commercial station 5PI (1040, 1kW) heard in February 1971 and confirmed as QSL#10. Later, the same station was confirmed as located in Port Pirie (1044, 2kW) for QSL#18 in October 1982. Some 460km to the SE of Adelaide is the city of MOUNT GAMBIER, center of a large softwood pine timber industry, as well as horticulture and dairy farms. The city is less than 35km from the Victorian border, and ABC local radio 5MG (1580, 200w) was heard from here in July 1970 (QSL#8) as well as commercial 5SE (1370, 500w) in February 1971 (QSL#9). Just 80km north of Adelaide is MURRAY BRIDGE on the Murray River, originally settled as a center for riverboat traders. Now a holiday destination and center of a large citrus and fruit producing area (home of 'Riverland' oranges), it's also home to commercial 5MU (1460, 1kW) heard in March 1971 (QSL#11). Much further north is the small town of LEIGH CREEK, center of a large open-cut coalfield which eventually even consumed the original location of the town, including the transmitter site of local ABC station 5LC (1570, 50w) heard in July 1971 (QSL#12). The new town

center is 13km south at South Leigh Creek. South of Leigh Creek and 308km north of Adelaide is PORT AUGUSTA, an industrial city at the head of the Spencer Gulf. Port Augusta also services outback areas and large sheep stations, and is a major railway junction for the Indian-Pacific and Ghan trains. Here is commercial 5AU (1450, 2kW) heard in July 1971 and confirmed as QSL#13. Final stopover in SA is PENOLA, 50km north of Mount Gambier, and near the Coonawarra wineries and sheep, beef and grain farms. This SE part of the state is served by ABC regional radio 5PA (1160, 10kW) which was heard in August 1972 for QSL#14. The Northern Territory was originally administered as part of NSW, and later SA, and earliest radio callsigns began with 5 before the territory was allocated the prefix number 8. We begin our radio iourney to NT with a visit to the heart of Australia, and the town of ALICE SPRINGS. More than 1500km from the nearest capital city, the town was founded in 1871 as a key depot on the Overland Telegraph Line and serviced by camel train from Port Augusta in SA. Heart of Australia commercial 8HA (900, 2kW) was heard in August 1971 and confirmed as QSL#1, followed by ABC regional station 8AL (1377, 2kW) as QSL#2 in October 1981. The territorial capital is DARWIN, located in the tropical Top End and washed by the Timor Sea. Settled in 1869, the city was badly damaged during several years of Japanese bombing raids in WWII, and virtually destroyed in Cyclone Tracy on Christmas Day 1974. It's home to ABC regional station 8DR (657, 2kW) heard in October 1981 (QSL#3) although also logged and verified via Radio Australia's shortwave transmitters at Shepparton (Victoria) on December 25, 1974 when the local AM transmitter was knocked off the air and only SW broadcasts could reach the stricken city. On the NE tip of Arnhem Land, on the Gove Peninsula is the bauxite mining center of NHULUNBUY (GOVE), now also administrative center for the region which is freehold land of the Yolngu aboriginal people. Here, the ABC installed a local transmitter 8GO (990, 500w) which was heard in October 1981 and confirmed as QSL#4. Some 506km north of Alice Springs is the town of TENNANT CREEK, founded when a beer wagon broke down at the site. Now the center for gold and copper mining in the Barkly Tablelands, the ABC local station 8TC (684, 1kW) is here, and was heard in October 1981 (QSL#5). Our final visit in the NT is to the Kakadu National Park, and to a mining town located in the center of the World Heritage park. JABIRU is 280km east of Darwin on the Arnhem Highway, and ABC local station 8JB (747, 200w) was heard from here in October 1982 for QSL#6. There are a number of other towns in both SA and NT with AM stations, such as Katherine, Berri, Port Lincoln, Streaky Bay, and Woomera, as well as other stations in many of the listed towns. Some of the SA signals are relatively easy with seapath to NZ or are located close to the western borders of Victoria. Stations on the Eyre Peninsula are the most difficult, although 5SY Streaky Bay (693) has been heard regularly with ABC programing. The NT stations are rarely heard, although when they are, the signals are surprisingly strong given their inland location. Again, DXing after midnight aives better opportunities for the Darwin and Top End stations, whilst Alice Springs can be heard as early as 0900 GMT if conditions are favorable. Check for signals from far western Queensland (Mt.Isa and Longreach) or NSW (Bourke and Wilcannia) as indicators for reception from NT and parts of NW Western Australia. Again, with perseverance many SA and some NT signals can be heard in New Zealand, as this collection of 23 QSLs demonstrates. Visit the Top End and the wineries of SA via your radio soon!
