Article: New Samoan Station on 585kHz

Exclusive Report by David Ricquish Wellington

WDJD 585 American Samoa

On 13th April 2002, a new AM radio station is scheduled to come on the air in the South Pacific, when WDJD will begin regular broadcasts from near Pago Pago in American Samoa. It's only the third MW station on the island in some 50 years.

Operated by Asia Pacific Media Ministries, WDJD (What Did Jesus Do) is owned by the local Assemblies of God church and broadcasts on 585 kHz with 5000 watts

For New Zealand and Australian DXers, the signal shares 585 with 2XR Ruatoria (2kW) and 7RN Hobart (10kW) so should provide good reception in the evening. During daytime, even the groundwave may be heard in some parts of northern New Zealand.

Pacific Media Ministries, we're able to share these photos of the WDJD studios and include some excerpts from the diary of their visit to American Samoa just a few weeks ago. The full diary is available on line (see this month's Talkback) and covers the challenges of setting up a new radio station in the Pacific.

Construction Diary

On January 29, wiring of the two studios was well underway and the transmitter was tested for the first time. A heavy rainstorm meant the transmitter had to be hauled back to the studios as its building was still roofless at this stage.

The next day, the main studio was completed, Chuck observing we've had a hard time locating some pretty basic tools we need on the island like simple audio connectors, but, hey the Samoan way is

pretty laid back.

Announcer training started on January 31. Employees and owners of other stations on the island came over to check out the new equipment, and some locals had experience at their stations, but everyone was really quite new to radio.

On February 1, we continued recording CD's into the system so we can begin building program logs. We're still missing some equipment to really finish things, but



we're close enough to thoroughly test.

Test Transmission

The RF team continued working at the transmitter site and has been able to get it on air and tested. They just got power to the site today. We're missing vital equipment for the tower (microwave dishes), so until these things get here, there's really no way to get the station fired up and running.

We were supposed to get a shipment of equipment on this evening's in-coming flight, but it never made it.

By February 2, the team from home station WBGL-FM was getting ready to leave. Since then, more tests have been conducted, staff trained, and there's been a lot of support from the youth at the host church, Bulah Island Assemblies of God.

Family Programs

Acting Station Manager is Vickie Haleck, whose husband is pastor of the church. WDJD will have bilingual English (70%) and Samoan (30%) language programs, including music. Chuck says the island of Samoa is all about family, so the station slogan is **for**

you and your family, 585 AM WDJD. DXer Friendly

DXers in North America should have a good chance of hearing WDJD as well, as it's a split channel. Bill is interested in getting reception reports from New Zealand listeners, and others who hear the signal.

Our thanks to Chuck Pryor (Station Manager WBGL-FM) and Bill and the folks at WDJD for sharing news about their new station, and for being DXer friendly. If you've never logged or QSL'd American Samoa before, here's your chance. It's a brand new transmitter so should have enhanced radiation at present.

League website again in Top 10 websites here in New Zealand! The Hitwise people tell us we've done it again, with visitors to the site putting us in the top 10 for the hobby and recreation category. We've been there for six months out of the past year. If you haven't visited the site lately, check it out. Always something new.

John Davies, Queensland sends a variety of newspaper clippings about the battle between *DMG Radio* and *Austereo* in Australia. Both operate a variety of FM stations, and since *DMG* launched it's *Radio Nova* brand in Melbourne and Sydney, capturing big chunks of audience, the Aussie airwaves have become charged with tension. *Nova's* debut in Melbourne was to rank #1 in its first ratings outing. With another *Nova* on the way in Perth, *Austereo* is watching nervously.

Back in the 1970's, Radio NZ launched *Radio Nova* on the 3ZM 1400 channel to draw audience away from new private rival Radio Avon 1290. Of course, *Nova* was also *Avon* spelled backwards! *Nova* is defined in the dictionary as a fast rising star which soon fades. The Christchurch *Nova* soon fulfilled this prophecy and 3ZM eventually drifted into the ZMFM network and off the dial completely. *DMG Radio* will be hoping that Sydney, Melbourne and Perth don't follow suit.

Meanwhile, the **ABC celebrates its 70th birthday on July 1**. Special programs are planned including a link-up of the original 12 stations: 2BL/2FC Sydney, 3AR/3LO Melbourne, 4QG Brisbane, 5CL Adelaide, 6WF Perth, 7ZL Hobart, 2NC Newcastle, 2CO Corowa, 4RK Rockhampton and 5CK Port Pirie. Most of the calls remain the same, although some have gone the RN way. At the same time, the ABC launches its **seventh nationwide radio network**, called DIG and internet only based. Format is all music, all Australian music aimed at listeners aged 30-50.

Some new **Aussie websites** of interest include <u>www.commercialradio.com.au</u> (lots of news and data about commercial radio stations) and <u>www.oldtapes.cjb.net</u> (jingles and offair tapes of Melbourne and Sydney radio shows from the 1980's).

The ABC website now includes details of when ABC Radio transmitters are off air for maintenance, and invites reception feedback so may be useful for e-QSLs.

Radio Australia expands coverage in Asia and the Pacific. A series of rebroadcast deals with local FM stations in *Indonesia* sees Indonesian language programs such as news and current affairs going live across several major metro areas.

NBC Papua New Guinea now carries English and Tok Pisin language news, current affairs, health, rural development and social and cultural (including popular music) magazine programs live across its AM, FM and SW network.

Meanwhile, **TARBS (Television & Radio Broadcasting Services)** from Sydney, is set to become the world's largest supplier of ethnic radio and TV programs. Currently supplying 52 x 24 hour channels into Australia, they will launch into North America via DTH shortly. They currently broadcast into Africa and Asia, and will soon expand into Middle East and Europe.

TARBS?. Think narrowcast radio services. Think rebroadcasting or relaying to local target areas much like SW. Package it all up with satellite technology and you get a global distribution platform.

Consider that local AM/FM transmitters can then rebroadcast chunks of their 24 hour streaming. The result is that non-English language programs can come straight into your home. Much like SW, only more expensive and in a very round about way.

New Zealand radio faces big changes after 2001 Census. Asians are poised to outnumber Maori in little over ten years and already outnumber Pacific Islanders. This means new languages and more stations on air.

We have state funded *National* and *Concert FM* networks catering for Europeans, state funded *Maori* radio, and now TV networks, and a state funded *Pacific* radio network starting soon.

The fastest growing and third largest ethnic grouping of *Asians* have only paid program blocks on two Auckland AM stations (1386/1593), various AM/FM community access stations and AM990 Chinese Radio.

Auckland is ethnically fast becoming another Honolulu, and these changes will be reflected along the radio dial. We hope to have an article on this soon. First we have to find all the 'guardband' FM stations on air, about 22 in Auckland at last count.

In **Hawaii** one of the oldest callsigns, **KMVI** has partially disappeared, as KMVI-FM in Wailuku changes format to *Jawaiian* and becomes KJMD-FM or *Da Jam*. KMVI-AM remains with this callsign. *Jawaiian* is the hot new format sweeping Hawaii for over 12 months now, with more and more stations switching to the local part Hawaiian part Japanese music format.

Ron Jacobs, Hawaii is a former DJ at Honolulu's KPOI and KCCN amongst many others, but also established the Southern California sound of **KHJ Los Angeles 930**.

Co-creator of *American Top 40* and other syndicated radio shows, Ron has released a book *KHJ Inside Boss Radio* which tells the story of how the new format in the 1960s pushed KHJ into dominance of American radio of those days. You can read excerpts at www.zapoleon.com and encourage your local library to buy a copy.

Last month we covered **financial woes** for various **Papua New Guinea SW** stations. According to DX reports, tales of their demise may have been too early. Check 3325 and 3335 as they may still be surviving. But for how long? Melanesian broadcasters continue to struggle elsewhere too.

Radio Vanuatu is on the verge of bankruptcy says the local audit office, and the government has sacked the entire board. Most of the staff had been sacked by the same

board earlier, so if you're still awaiting a QSL, maybe it's because there's hardly anyone there and they can't afford power and pay, let alone postage!

In **New Caledonia**, pro-independence **Radio Djiido's** female chief editor was beaten up by two masked men unhappy about how the station is covering increased racial tension between native Kanaks and Wallis islanders near Noumea. The station went silent for 24 hours in protest.

Meanwhile, religious broadcasters are falling over themselves to get on air across the South Pacific region at the same time as state stations collapse. Even **Planet FM in Auckland** is swamped with Asian and Pacific language would be religious programmers waving fistfuls of money to buy airtime.

Last month we mentioned both **WDJD 585** and the planned Pago Pago FM NPR station. The first is run by a US based ministry, the second underwritten by another US based ministry.

Check out http://www.wbgl.org/samoa1 for the fascinating diary of **Chuck Pryor** from WBGL-FM who visited **American Samoa** in February to help train staff, bring out gear and begin tests. Extracts from the diary are included as lead story in the magazine this month.

In **Samoa**, Radio Graceland has moved to 90.9 for Apia and Upoulu Island, added 106.9 in the Apia district, and adds 94.9 on Savai'i island also. Graceland Broadcasting Network (GBN) also has a 24 hour TV channel in Apia and is a US based operation.

In **Papua New Guinea** we've got **Radio Light** of *The Papua New Guinea Christian Broadcasting Network* on 93.9 and 106 FM in Port Moresby. Due on air about now, it's a joint venture between HCJB and Evangelical Bible Missions through Life Radio Ministries of Griffin, GA. (Interesting to note that HCJB maintains an Auckland office. So does FEBC/FEBA).

UCB Papua New Guinea operate *Laif FM* with a 1kW transmitter at Wewak also due on air soon, to be followed by FM stations in six other major centers, starting with Goroka, Madang and Port Moresby. UCB of course are the Auckland based umbrella network for Radio Rhema whose outreach is probably the largest in the world.

Yet another broadcaster with an eye on the area is **WTJC 9370 The Fundamental Broadcasting Network** in Newport, NC. They've been busy raising funds for a radio ministry in Papua New Guinea to add to their new SW outreach. Meanwhile, **UCB Vanuatu** is now on air in Port Vila for the past few months, and has a licence for Luganville as well.

Eternity Broadcasting Network began TV broadcasts from **Honiara, Solomon Islands** on March 29. Opened by the PM, the station doesn't even have a licence. However, the Solomon's Minister of Foreign Affairs is local chairman of EBN which relays American programs via satellite from *Trinity Broadcasting Network* according to **Pacific Island Report.**.

US based or affiliated Christian broadcasters and ministries are flooding the Pacific airwaves from PNG to Vanuatu to Solomons to Fiji to Tonga to Samoa and Tahiti, via AM and FM radio and local TV relay transmitters. Add SW broadcasts from Australia, Hawaii and Guam and the region is certainly being heavily targeted at present.

Bryan Clark, Auckland tells us that **ZFM Classics Lautoka** is another new private FM station in Fiji. They program all music for the 20+ tourism and local market near Nadi and the Western Division of Viti Levu.

He also adds: The **Christmas Island** relay first appeared in the 1983 WRTH as using 1115 kHz with 1kW, but a frequency change to 846 was shown as a future plan. An identical entry is in the 1986 WRTH but with a note that the relay was inactive at the time of editing.

Thanks Bryan. To my knowledge, reception of 1115 kHz was never reported here. Given a 1kW power, this should have been easily audible on the split channel apart from 2YX 1116 blocking it in some parts of the country. I wonder if it ever got to air.

Ernie Hakanson, Auckland sends the latest issue of the **New Zealand Vintage Radio Society Bulletin**. This includes an excellent and well researched article on the high powered Spark Radio stations in New Zealand (VLA Awanui, VLB Awarua) by George Newlands. There are plenty of historic photos.

Another important article is about *Ideas and Advice on the Disposal of a Collection* covering donations to museums and trusts, auctions, and how to protect and preserve radio collections as members get older.

Other articles include Part 3 of the Australasian Three Pin Power Plug, Filaments and Reactivation, Tube Restoration, Adventures of a Traveling Radioman (Part 2) and a round up of news from the Waikato get together. Plus the usual excellent Marketplace.

George Rolton, Dunedin sends news about **The Wolf Network** from the free magazine *Communicator* put out by the Com-Centre in Auckland and Christchurch. Now on 1593 AM in Christchurch, all over the South Island on FM and slowly moving into the North Island on FM, their secret for expanding so rapidly is finally out.

Jonathon Marks, Hilversum, Holland tells us that he found **Martin Hadlow's** article on Afghanistan last month to be 'fascinating stuff' and we've had other nice comments from members as well about Martin's efforts.

Bill Smith W5USM (USA via e-mail) says the latest ARRL Propagation Report can be found at http://www.sec.noaa.gov/weekly and we're now at the peak of the current sunspot cycle. The next solar minimum is predicted to be between September 2006 and April 2007.

Jerry Berg, Lexington MA has agreed to join the Heritage Committee and the *Radio Heritage Collection* with immediate effect.

Jerry is founder of the Committee to Preserve Radio Verifications, whose collection is held at the University of Maryland. A well known and respected authority on DX and radio history, Jerry has written books on the subject and has built a wonderful website featuring many articles about radio history.

The NZRDXL Archives and the CPRV will now begin a close association supporting each others activities, exchanging information and advice, and developing common programs.

Martin Hadlow, UNESCO, Kabul has been contributing to the *Radio Heritage Collection* as time permits, and has also been appointed to the Heritage Committee with immediate effect.

With a wealth of knowledge about broadcasting in Asia and the Pacific, Martin is a long time League member and we're fortunate that both Martin and Jerry have now joined **Adrian Peterson** as international members of the Heritage Committee.

ISRAEL: Temporary Reprieve for Israel's External Service

After weeks of confusion and conflicting reports, the external Service of the Israel Broadcasting Authority (IBA) has been given a reprieve, at least for three more months. Earlier this year, the IBA had given notice of its intention to terminate the shortwave broadcasts in eleven languages due to a budget shortfall. This brought angry reactions from shortwave listeners around the world, and dismay within Israeli political circles at the timing of the decision, coinciding as it does with attempts to end the wave of violence between Israel and the Palestinians.

Following the personal intervention of Prime Minister Ariel Sharon and Public Relations minister Tzipi Livni, the IBA has now agreed to maintain the broadcasts for at least the next three months, and will seek funding from the Jewish Agency, the Immigrant Absorption Ministry, and organisations dealing with the Diaspora. The news came too late, however, to prevent an <u>unofficial Web site</u> supporting Israel Radio from declaring that broadcasts would end on 31st March 2002. (RN NEWS)

LATIN CORNER:

BRAZIL: 2470 kHz - Radio Cacique, Sorocaba (SP). This is just to let you know that this station is back on the air operating with 250 Watts. Until a few days ago there was a controversy among some Brazilian DX'ers if this station was really back on shortwave or not. I decided to call the station and spoke to a technician called "Toninho". He was very friendly and told me that the station is back to shortwave since about 2 months ago. The schedule is: From 07:30 UTC to 03:00 UTC - in parallel with Medium Wave (1160 kHz).

From 03:00 UTC to 07:30 UTC - in parallel with FM (96,5 MHz) - only music.

I haven't tried Radio Cacique yet but keep in your mind to check it out every day. We never know when the propagation would be open for Brazil and this would be a great DX.

NIGERIA: Voice of Nigeria to Add New Languages Soon

Director General of the Voice of Nigeria (VON), Taiwo Allimi, has disclosed that the station plans to start broadcasting in Igbo, Yoruba and German before the end of June 2002. VON has five high power shortwave transmitters, three of which are currently operational following refurbishment. When the remaining two have been refurbished, VON will run four transmitters simultaneously, with the fifth being on standby. (Radio Netherlands Media Network)

RUSSIA: Radio Ezra back in Russia

Radio Ezra is due to commence a third series of thirteen half hour weekly broadcasts between 2330 and 0000, beginning on 6 April 2002 UT.

The frequency will be 17665 kHz and the target zone is Western North America. The transmitter location is Russia.

Radio Ezra will produce a limited number of QSL cards for the series. Reception reports should include an International Reply Coupon or \$1 to cover return postage. (HCDX)

USA:

Changes Proposed in US International Broadacasting

Big changes are being proposed to the structure of US international broadcasting, which could see the private sector becoming involved. The Chairman of the House International Relations Committee, Henry J Hyde, introduced the Freedom Promotion Act of 2002 on 14 March. Its aim is to rebuild a mass communications infrastructure to explain American policies and culture to the world.

Under the proposed legislation, there would be a new International Broadcasting Agency headed by a director appointed by the President - with the concurrence of the Senate - for a term of five years, with safeguards to preserve journalistic integrity from political influence. The present part-time Broadcasting Board of Governors would become the Board of International Broadcasting (BIB), which would retain operational control of grants to entities including Radio Free Europe, Radio Liberty, and Radio Free Asia. The BIB would function in an advisory role to the International Broadcasting Agency.

The legislation provides an initial amount of \$7.5 million annually to the Office of Broadcast Services at the State Department. The State Department would be authorised to lease time on satellites and to develop other media channels serving key regions, such as the Middle East and East Asia. The State Department would also be authorized to develop programming for foreign audiences separate and apart from the International Broadcasting Agency, which could involve the use of the private sector. The State Department is encouraged to work with foreign television broadcasters and other media to produce and distribute programming. (Summarised from official press release). (RN NEWS MEDIA)

WORLD BEACON

Almost two years to the day after it's launch, the World Beacon will sign off, effective April 15. Affiliated Media Group, the parent company that operates the short wave based mission initiative has announced it will suspend operations to concentrate on the company's domestic ministerial clients.

The Beacon was the brain child of Affiliated Media Group founder and chairman Ray Davis, who conceived a Caribbean version in the 1970s. At it's height, The World Beacon broadcast a full weekly schedule to Africa, Europe and Russia, shuttering European and Asian operations when sufficient clients could not be found to fill the broadcast time slots. The station broadcast from transmitters in England, South Africa, Russia and the United Arab Emirates. The Beacon was in fact the victim of Affiliated's incredible growth and success. The agency which represents a wide array of spiritual and secular clients found demand for it's domestic services far exceeded client requests for overseas radio ministry opportunities. The events surrounding September 11, 2001 were also a factor, limiting the company's ability to receive and respond to the flood of mail that the Beacon received each week.

The World Beacon launched on April 2, 2000 with it's popular signature theme performed by the new age group Deep Forest. In addition to a full schedule of spiritual programming, the Beacon produced "Midnight Ministry" and "DXQSL" which were dubbed "listener appreciation programs." The station was profiled on the popular Radio Netherlands Media Network program and had a large cadre of devoted listeners around the world.

Program director Jeff Johnson will continue to process reception reports through April 15.

ZIMBABWE: ZBC Shortwave Transmitters Refurbished In a message posted on the Ontario DX Association mailing list, Spencer Chirume in Zimbabwe reports that ZBC has upgraded its shortwave transmitters with new spares. According to a report quoted by Mr Chirume, the transmitters will again be operating on full capacity, having been on reduced power. Two ZBC networks are broadcast on shortwave: National FM [3306, 4828, 5975 or 7175 kHz] and Radio Zimbabwe [3396, 5012, 6020 or 7285 kHz]. (RN News Media)

New Island Logged on FM! Well, one never knows what one will hear on FM. Idly tuning on VHF I found a station on 123.6mHz - just a spurious I thought, and indeed it was. But the station was called 'The Beach'. Soon a full station identification was heard - and I was able to hear them on 2 of 4 frequencies in use, and to telephone their studios on Great Barrier Island (87km east-north-east of my listening post in Mission Bay Auckland) for more information. Here is the run down:

94.6 FM Great Barrier Island - 500 watts but currently only running 200watts.

88.3 FM Tryphena, Great Barrier Island (harbour on the western side, destination

forferries from Auckland) - 1 watt

89.8 FM Waiheke Island - 400 watts 97.0 FM Kawau Island - 100 watts. The last 2 of these are audible here at Mission Bay. Waiheke is very good, while Kawau is poor, due adjacent channel QRM. I have previously heard FM stations from Waiheke (line of sight 18km east from here)but never from Kawau (45km north). A report is in the mail and I will post more information when I have it. What amazes me is that they have been on-air since mid-January and this was the first I'd heard of them. Shows how little FM DX Is being done here nowadays! (Bryan Clark)

They're still doing engineering work on which channels and locations will be possible, but seem to be very advanced in their planning. They have reserved channels for National Radio, Concert FM, Maori radio and the Pacific National Radio Network on a nationwide basis. (David Ragusa)

Stellar lift-off for super Nova There's a revolution under way in Melbourne radio. It may be happening quietly and methodically behind the scenes but it's blaring across the airwaves. Taxi drivers are listening to Nova 100.3 FM and shoppers are rocking while they're shopping. Groovers everywhere have embraced the new sound. After only 15 weeks on air, Nova 100 has become the city's number-one station, with a rating of 12.6. Hip music that straddles many formats, presenters with names like Hughesy, Whippy and Stuie, and low advertising content mean Nova's star is shining brightly. And judging from the AC Nielsen radio ratings released on Tuesday, the station is not just the domain of the 18 to 39-year-olds. Older people are into it too. The station had overtaken Fox FM as the top station, a result that was all the more remarkable for the fact that Fox has been around for 22 years while Nova has been on the air for only three months. PUKETAPU RADIO

While in North Otago for Convention 2002, Peter Grenfell and I visited this small station which operates out of a former shop in the town of Palmerston on State Highway 1. We met with the station's founder and now its Technical and Programme Director Lawrence McCraw and Station Manager John Blair. Puketapu Radio operates a 100 watt TRS transmitter on 954kHz MW and a new 70 foot antenna mast. Broadcast coverage extends south to Waitati and west to Macraes Flat, though a recent DX report from Gore shows that the station is sometimes heard further afield.

The station has been on air since May 1999 and, through the support of local businesses in Palmerston, is now breaking even. A small video library in Puketapu Radio's office adjacent to the studio helps support the station operation. There is also a money box tin on the counter for donations. The station is on air 24 hours, and originates its own programming every day from 7am. Overnight, Classic Hits FM is relayed according to the following schedule - 10pm to 7am Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Sunday; 9pm to 7am Wednesday and Saturday.

On display in the Puketapu Radio office is a little bit of radio history - the original transmitter of Radio Sunshine. Lawrence began this pirate station in 1973, serving the Kuriwao and Catlins districts of Southland, until the station was closed down by the Radio Inspectors in February 1977. **Bryan Clark**

Current FM Guardband Stations

Compiled by Bryan Clark Auckland

New Zealand has a significant number of local low-powered FM 'micro-broadcasters' in the frequency ranges 88.0 to 88.8 and 100.2 to 101.0 MHz FM. These ranges were called auardbands, as they separate the official FM broadcasting band from other spectrum users. Maximum approved radiated power for these transmissions is 300 milliwatts, that is, less than a third of a watt. As more stations are granted licences in the 101-108 MHz FM range (commercial licences are due to be auctioned from 2002), the upper guardband will change to the 107.6 to 108.0 MHz range.

The local, and hobby-nature of many of these operations makes it very difficult to provide an up-to-date national listing. We seek the assistance of members throughout New Zealand to update this list prior to publication at our radiodx.com internet website. Please send updates to Bryan Clark at P.O. Amateur radio organisations (and indeed clubs like ours!) are constantly looking out for ways of attracting young people into membership. The American Radio Relay League (ARRL) has teamed up with the producers of the Archie comic book series to produce 'Archies Ham Radio Adventure'. This very well produced comic book introduces young people to amateur radio, and is being distributed free of charge to attract young people into ham radio.

MORE BUDGET CUTS FOR RADIO NZ INTERNATIONAL? Speaking to the Parliamentary Commerce Committee last month, Radio New Zealand's Chairman BRIAN CORBAN described our official shortwave service as "a critical service to our Pacific neighbours". He said that the present skeleton broadcasting — 4 hours a day of its own programming, down for 11 hours a day when the service was relaunched in 1990 — was at risk of further reduction unless funding constraints were addressed. The DX League has lobbied past governments in support of New Zealand maintaining a viable international voice on shortwave. At its next meeting, Adcom will consider a further submission in support of RNZI.

SPOTTED AT THE HOCKEN On a recent visit to view the NZ Radio DX League Archives held by the Hocken Library in Dunedin, your scribe was interested to view many historical QSL collections from the early days of radio. The oldest North American verification I could find was for KHJ Los Angeles, logged by **HAROLD LOOKER** in July 1930. But the one that most captured my imagination was in the collection of **FRANK WILSON** — a QSL card and letter from the South African Broadcasting Corporation for 600 kilocycles medium wave, logged by Frank at 1700 GMT on 26 August 1939. Reception of southern Africa on the broadcast band from New Zealand is possibly the most difficult challenge for us.

DID YOU KNOW? MHz is the abbreviation for megahertz, whereas mHz is the abbreviation for millihertz.

COUNTRY UPDATE After 90 years of existence, Yugoslavia disappeared from the map of the world last month, to be replaced by the new state of "Serbia and Montenegro". This alliance of 2 almost independent countries has 1 president (Vojislav Kostunica) and 2 capitals - Beograd and Podgorica (Podgoritsa). After 3 years, not earlier, the two countries may dissolve the alliance. The new Serbia and Montenegro were what remained of the former Federative Republic of Yugoslavia composed of Serbia, Slovenia, Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Montenegro, Macedonia. The countries regained their independence during several civil wars in the 1990s. (Karel Honzik via Hard-Core DX) Last year, the Indonesian government approved a name change for the easternmost part of the nation — from Irian Jaya to Papua. According to press reports, this change took effect on 1 January 2002.

The implications of both these changes for the Radio Countries List are being reviewed in collaboration with our colleagues at NZDXRA.

Article: Loop Aerial Formula

As many of us recognise, the Internet is a great source of data and wisdom on aerials with one source www.cybercomm.net/~slapshot/loops.html being such a place.

The following is taken from "The Low and Medium Frequency Scrapbook" written in 1977 for Ham Radio magazine by US amateur operator Ken Cornell.

The following table gives the inductance and frequency range of square loop antennas that are $12^{\prime\prime}$ 24" and 36" on a side. Wire spacing for 1/4" and 1/2" although other size frames and wire size spacing can be determined by interpolation. The frequency range shown is based on using a variable capacitor of 500 pf. (the single or double gang (egg size) ones in 'full size' receivers.)
