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Welcome. Another very busy news month. Highlights include Martin Hadlow's news from Kabul, Adrian Sainsbury's updates on RNZI activities including the Democratic Voice of Burma relays and the DRM tests from Europe and Bonaire, the US based Radio World newspaper praises the League's website in a major article, KSAI Saipan goes silent, DXers meet in Wellington and much more.

Also, we have two China Radio International T-shirts to give away. You'll find full details at the end of the column. Thanks so much, again, to everyone who contributes to make this column possible. I hope you're enjoying it.

Adrian Sainsbury, RNZI Wellington has been keeping us up to date with plenty of news recently. As we read in last month's DXT, NZ Defence Forces Radio are now using the SW transmitter for



broadcasts to East Timor, Solomon Islands and Bougainville. These are not RNZI broadcasts, so can be counted as a new broadcaster.

This month, we can finally talk about the use of the RNZI transmitter for broadcasts of the **Democratic Voice of Burma**.

The programs are fed from DVB studios in Oslo, Norway and relayed from 1430-1530 UTC on 15620 from RNZI. We knew about this back in January but had to keep it under wraps until now. Adrian is able to check on signal reception in the target area by using a remote monitoring site in Thailand and says reception of the broadcast is also getting good reports from as far west as India.

Also, Digital Radio Mondiale Long Distance Tests got underway in late April, targeting Wellington, Melbourne and Sydney. The Wellington tests are scheduled May 1-7 from transmitters in Bonaire, Sackville, Sines and Juelich and involve a 57 minute program in alternate AM and Digital modes. Radio Netherlands and BBC staff have been in Australia and N7 for the tests.



Finally, Adrian confirms that technical planning for a second 100kW SW transmitter is underway, with an expected on air date of about 2004. This will be dual digital/analog.

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I'm delighted to participate in this valuable and exciting venture and will contribute to the Radio Heritage Collection as best I'm able.

As you've seen from this month's cover story, Martin has also contributed an **Update from Afghanistan** with items on British Forces Radio, Italian Forces Radio, BBC, Radio Afghanistan and the UNESCO project at the Journalism Faculty of Kabul University. We're immensely grateful to Martin for taking the time to send us the update and for staying in touch with us whilst on duty in Kabul. This update can also be found shortly at www.radiodx.com in the Radio Heritage Collection.

Jack Fox, Mosgiel sends a copy of the SEAC Forces Radio Times from June 1947. This was distributed to Aden, India, Burma, Ceylon, China, Malaya, Borneo, New Zealand, Australia, Japan, British Pacific and East Indian Fleets and selected listening posts throughout the world from Radio SEAC in Colombo, Ceylon.

It contains the BBC Overseas Service schedule for India and Malaya (programs included *Music While You Work, BBC Midland Light Orchestra, Home News from Britain, and Much-Binding-in-the-Marsh*) as well as the Radio SEAC schedule (including *Yours for the Asking, Date with Doreen, Bandstand and Forces Educational Broadcasts < Penny on the Rates, What the Council Does*) on 3395, 6075, 9520, 15120, and 17770 SW. Separate programs for Indian Forces in various dialects were broadcast on 15120 and 19840.

Radio SEAC was heard widely in New Zealand and there are many QSL cards from various



transmitters at the NZRDXL Archives, and in collections of current members. Our thanks to Jack for sharing this fascinating item from 55 years ago.

All India Radio has a useful new website at www.air.kode.net which traces a brief history of Indian radio, how AIR is organised, program schedules, and complete MW, SW and FM transmitter location lists by state, city and frequency plus times of operation each day. Domestic and External Services are included.

There are 208 individual broadcasting centers, with 150 MW, 128 FM and 48 SW transmitters currently on air. The Home Service alone is broadcast in 24 languages and 146 dialects. Email reception reports about technical quality of any AIR station are welcomed

at <u>faair@nda.vsni.net.in</u> so now's a good time to log those domestic SW stations. There are reports that these will be phased out and replaced by FM over a period of years.

In the meantime, **private commercial FM in India** is now a reality after a two year wait since starter stations were ordered off air by a court judgement. In the past month, Calcutta has been granted 10 FM stations, and Bangalore gets 5 as FM rolls out across 40 cities nationwide.

Mauritius meanwhile gets private radio as well, with *Radio One FM* launching on March 12, to be followed soon by *Radio-Plus* and *Sunrise Radio Mauritius*. In fact, the latter can be heard with an interesting program in Hindi and English via *Radio Taal* one of the Mauritius Broadcasting Corporation channels. Dual ID's are *Sunrise Radio live from London and 94 FM in Mauritius*. The UK station is on 1458 MW.

A little less busy **around the Pacific** this month. First up though, a correction to the item on KMVI-FM last month. **Chuck Boehnke, Hawaii** correctly points out that *Jawaiian* is actually a fusion of Hawaiian and Jamaican music, based on reggae and 'roots' music. He says quite a few stations here do play a lot of Jawaiian as well as contemporary and traditional Hawaiian music. It also includes rap and hiphop.

For those interested, *Te Papa* Museum of New Zealand in Wellington is featuring *Reggae Xplosion* — the dramatic story of reggae from its Jamaican roots to the Kiwi music scene today. On from March 29-July 14. The latest Auckland radio ratings place *Mai FM* as top ranking station for the first time, and their playlist includes much contemporary Maori music known as *Pacific Reggae* which traces it's history back to the 1970's and the group Herbs. Our local version of Jawaiian.

Also in **Hawaii, KCCN 1420** is now back in local ownership after being sold separately from the FM outlet. The existing sports talk format continues. Also continuing is **KNDI 1270** The Broadcast House of the Pacific'

This is an eclectic timeshare station sometimes heard in Australia and New Zealand, with religious, Asian and other ethnic group programs. The local owner (a rarity in Honolulu) recently won a Small Business Association Award.



KSAI Saipan went silent on April 30. Operated by the religious broadcaster FEBC, KSAI 936 MW has been heard several times here in the South Pacific with a domestic service for Saipan. FEBC says funding issues were amongst the reasons why the station was closed down after several decades of service.

The original KSAI began broadcasts as a VOA propaganda station to Japan towards the end of WWII, and was often heard in Australia and New Zealand on 1010 MW running 50kW. QSL's for both KSAI stations can be found in the NZRDXL Archives and more information about the VOA operation including links to studio and transmitter photos can be found in the Radio Heritage Collection at www.radiodx.com for those interested.

Bill Marsh Jnr, Invercargill has contributed a wonderful article to the Radio Heritage Collection with the help of many members such as Paul Aronsen, Ray Crawford and Paul Ormandy. **Bill Marsh Senior** was a long standing DXer in Southland, and designed and built the *Marsh Special*, perhaps the best MW DX receiver seen in New Zealand. Check out the ten (yes, 10) South African MW QSL's for Southland reception. You can read Bill's story on-line, and here in the NZDXT shortly.

Other new articles of interest added recently include *The 4PM Port Moresby Story* by **Ian MacKay** (former broadcaster in PNG), *Radio Stories from Papua New Guinea* by **Keith Jackson** (formerly with the ABC in PNG and in Australia, founder of 2SER-FM/2ARM-FM), and from the endless pen of **Adrian Peterson** we have *Ship Broadcasts from the Pacific, German Army Broadcasts*, and *AWR Europe History*.

Meanwhile, **Bob Padula**, **Melbourne**, **Australia** has been licenced to reprint articles from the Radio Heritage Collection in his on-line DX magazine *EDXP*, and has also agreed to include a short message which gives his readers more information about the project and a direct link to the website. We look forward to this collaboration which has been arranged with help from **Adrian Peterson**.

Merv Branks is also remembered on-line, with an item about his exploits at the famous 6×3 at Riverton Rocks, including inside and outside photos of this legendary location. Again, our thanks to Bill Marsh Jnr for sharing memories and photos of Merv.

Wian Stienstra, Groningen, Netherlands writes just a short note to thank you and your team for the interesting articles on www.radiodx.com as such stories provide interesting insights and are much appreciated. Keep up the good work. (Thanks Wian, keep visiting the site, there's always something new there.)

Skip Pizzi, Arlington VA has written a very favorable article about the Radio Heritage Collection which appears in the April 24 issue of *Radio World Newspaper*. Headed **Website Captures Radio History** *Stations May Come and Go But They Can Live On in Cyberspace* the article says the result is an astounding collection of broadcast history that continues to grow.

Radio World International publishes a weekly newspaper in three editions, USA, World and Latin America, and is read by radio professionals across the world. Within 24 hours of the story appearing, the first email was received from a former broadcaster at AFN Europe in Germany. We hope this promotion will build interest in the project and more traffic for the website. Check out www.rwonline.com and get their free weekly online newsletter.

Still in the land of Bluff oysters, **Paul Aronsen**, **Invercargill** sends the latest *Southland DX Digest* with news of the branch visit to Mercury TV, plans for the working bee at Tiwai (volunteers needed), Steven Greenyer's MW reception of Argentina and Uruguay on just a loop in Timaru in mid-April, more about the *Tribute to NZ DXer Bill Marsh Senior* at www.radiodx.com and local branch news.

Mark Nicholls, Wellington alerts us to www.100kwatts.tmi.net which he says is a great site for checking US and Canadian AM & FM stations. The main entry page has the latest US frequency and callsign changes. Try typing a callsign into the search box. Up pops the transmitter location, format and a link to their website if they have one. Click on the little flashing transmitter tower and you get a map showing the exact transmitter location.

Ralph Sutton, Wellington passes on an item from the Queensland WIA newsletter headed SW Pirate Listeners Group Established which goes on to say if you thought modern SW listening was simply punching in frequencies and hearing stations, you might not have tried listening for pirate stations. Pirate stations are the rare DX for the SWL. They are typically low power and don't always keep reliable transmitting schedules. Hearing them is a somewhat hit and miss affair.

An email group has been established to allow listeners to share reports of reception of pirate radio. Read around the world, it has almost 500 active members. Subscribers also have access to audio archives and pictures. Visit www.egroups.com/group/SWpirates for more news.

And, check out our own Paul Ormandy's *Unofficial Radio* column here in the NZDXT. Since starting just a month or two ago, it's already building a popular following, and the word is, some of the catches reported there are top DX worldwide. As winter sets in, a hot toddy of Cap'n Morgans' finest will help you hear some pirates!

Meanwhile, from somewhere south of Bundaberg, **Ray Crawford, Brisbane** writes whilst researching the article about Bill Marsh for www.radiodx.com I came across some info about the NZ Shortwave Club.

They began as a column in 'The Radio Log' of October 1931 and were last seen in the 1932 issue of 'The NZ Radio Times'. The NZ DX Club was in both these magazines. The Radio Log was the official organ of the NZ DX Club and originated from the DX pages of the Radio Record. The Radio Times started in April 1932, and incorporated the NZ DX Club pages as well as technical articles.

(During Convention 2002, Ray and I found old QSL cards issued by the short lived NZ Shortwave Club amongst a shoebox of old cards at a stall in Oamaru. **Adrian Peterson** added quite a few other cards to his collection from the same source.)

Basil Jamieson, Oamaru is next up this month with a kind comment about the column. He says NZDXT arrived today. I found your



Talkback section as usual was most interesting, full of information. Congratulations on what has become a real feature of the NZDXT.



ANZAC Day was on April 25 for our New Zealand and Australian readers (similar to Memorial Day for those in North America) and if any readers were in **Jayforce**, the NZ occupation forces in Japan, you may be able to tell us more about Radio AKAA and Radio WLKW/WLKY.



In *Jayforce* by **Laurie Brocklebank** (Oxford UP 1997) there's a photo of Sergeant J Penketh playing a disk on the first day of broadcast by a radio station identified as WLKW. A radio station was located at the NZ camp at Yuda in Yamaguchi. The station began broadcasts with 500 watts on January 15, 1947 after scrounging gear and music from a local AFRS station. It was also known as Station AKAA, NZ Broadcasting Unit Japan. Broadcasts ended in 1948.

Ben Furby, Campsie NSW has also written with much more detail about the Jayforce stations. These have now been incorporated in a new article which will shortly be added to the Radio Heritage Collection. Ben was engineer at Radio AKAA for two years and now volunteers at 2RPH Sydney. According to Ben, Radio AKAA 1440 AM at Yuda, was the main station. There was a 30 watt satellite station with the callsign WLKY on 1480 AM at Shimonisekei. WLKY rebroadcast AKAA's programs.

From this information, it seems that WLKW is incorrectly referred to in the *Jayforce* book as being a NZ station. From our database, WLKW is one of a network of 10 watt repeaters of the Australian controlled BCOF main station at Kure. Ben adds that several NZ radio sporting personalities got their radio careers started at AKAA, including Dick Allard and Bob Irvine. National Radio's Gary Chapman, who worked the YA All-Nighter also began his broadcasting life at AKAA. So, this little known station in southern Japan has had quite an impact on contemporary NZ radio.

4XD Dunedin celebrates 80 years on the air by reaching #1 in Dunedin. According to **Jack Fox, Mosgiel,** Radio Dunedin 4XD has grown its audience again to become #1 station in Dunedin with 14.7% of the market. Jack also wonders *is talkback radio starting to fade?* The local NewsTalkZB station has lost audience, and talkback format stations have slipped nationwide in the latest ratings. Easy listening music stations have grown audience share.

Radio 4XD is still owned by the Otago Radio Association but leased to one of the major commercial networks, RadioWorks. Broadcasting continuously since 1922, 4XD is the last remaining of the original 'B' stations on air in New Zealand. Some say it's also the oldest

radio station in the Commonwealth. (Listen to 4XD on 1305 AM).

Wellington DXers met April 28 with Adrian Sainsbury present, and discussion included possibilities of hosting a combined Convention, AGM and 55th NZRDXL celebration function in October 2003.(See From the Branches for more news including plans for a May 25 social meeting at the studios of Radio New Zealand International)

Article: Afghanistan Radio Update

Some up-to-date information on the radio situation in Afghanistan.....

USAID (the US Government's aid agency) is currently installing a VSAT satellite system at Radio-Television Afghanistan in Kabul. (It should be ready by the end of the week). This will be used to send the Radio Kabul signal via satellite to shortwave transmitters in Norway and somewhere in the Gulf. The programmes will then be rebroadcast back into Afghanistan using Radio Free Afghanistan (RFA) and VOA facilities. This whole arrangement is being put in place especially to provide information to people in Afghanistan about the Loya Jirga process. (This is the body to take-over from the Interim Administration in mid-June). I expect the programmes to start soon, so keep an ear on the relevant frequencies.

In addition, we are advised that the IBB (International Broadcasting Board) also from the USA is to provide two x 400 KW mediumwave transmitters to be based in Kabul. One will transmit Radio Kabul programmes and the other VOA and RFA. In addition, two FM transmitters for Kabul are being supplied. I am not sure when the AM transmitters will be installed.

Hearing Africans in the Pacific

We've gone through all African loggings recorded in the *NZDXT* during 2000 and 2001, and brought them together in the following condensed listing. Some countries provide regular reception. Others have only been heard once or twice. You'll need to check current frequencies with the WRTH, Shortwave Report updates and other sources. However, this list should get you started.

There are two main African reception 'windows' and these are around 0500-0700 UTC especially for West Africans, and the main one of 1700-2100 UTC for nearly all parts of the continent. The Seychelles is best heard an hour or two before the 0500 window. South Africa provides a wider range of reception possibilities than most.

Other African countries

Eligible countries not heard in New Zealand during 2000/2001 are: Burundi, Comoros, Congo Kinshasa, Ivory Coast, Mauritius and St.Helena. Some of these simply don't broadcast on shortwave, although St.Helena has been heard with its one day special broadcasts from time to time. Ivory Coast has been heard in earlier years before recent coups destabilised this once flourishing state.

Comoros and Mauritius have been heard on MW in New Zealand, so some members may wish to attempt logging Africa on MW as a real challenge. It's not a total impossibility, as MW signals have been heard over the years from South Africa, Mozambique, Kenya, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Somalia, Egypt, Libya, Sudan, Tunisia, Morocco, Senegal and one or two others. Australian DXers have heard other African MW signals as well, especially from southern and central African transmitters. Perhaps one of the greatest challenges is to hear West African MW signals, and these may prove best via the longpath over the Atlantic and via South America in the 0300-0800 period. Dakar in Senegal has been heard in this time window.

Tips for logging Africans are welcome over the coming months in *Talkback* so that everyone is ready during the winter months to hear as many Africans as possible. Some of the 'highlife' music programs make enjoyable listening, so if you've never really targeted African stations before, you may find some new favorites, and add to your countries heard totals. Good luck everyone.

SOUTH PACIFIC

AUSTRALIA:

New International Broadcaster for Australia.

As the World Beacon prepares to sign off, HCJB World Radio-Australia has announced that it has received approval to build a new international missionary shortwave station at Kununurra, Western Australia. The approval follows a five-year application and consultation process. Initially the local council opposed the application, but all its objections have been dealt with. Construction of the first stage of the project on 200 acres of donated land can now begin, with a projected on-air date of 22 December 2002. The station will initially use a 100 kW transmitter now being built at the HCJB World Radio Engineering Center in Elkhart, Indiana, USA. The curtain arrays will be beamed to parts of Asia and the South Pacific, with a total population of 3 billion. Programmes will initially be on the air in English for two blocks of five hours, with additional languages to be added later. An application has been submitted to build additional antennas on 2000 acres of Crown property adjoining the current site. (Radio Netherlands Media Network.)

NEW ZEALAND:

Democratic Voice of Burma Now Relayed from New Zealand

Bryan Clark reports: On the 22 April edition of Radio New Zealand International's Mailbox programme, Technical Manager Adrian Sainsbury confirmed that the Democratic Voice of Burma (DVB) is now broadcasting via RNZI's 100kW transmitter at Rangataiki in the centre of the North Island. DVB had first approached RNZI in November 2001 regarding the hiring of airtime during RNZI's overnight silent period. Test transmissions were made in December and January, and since 15 March 2002, DVB has been relayed on a regular basis. The schedule is 1430-1530 UTC on 15620kHz. Programmes originate from the DVB studios in Oslo, Norway. Adrian Sainsbury notes that this is not the first time that the RNZI transmitter has been hired out to other organisations. The BBC was relayed in the 1100-1200 UTC period for many years, and more recently the NZ Defence Forces Radio. From monitoring in Thailand, the reception in the target area of the relay from New Zealand should be very good. © Radio Netherlands Media Network.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA. Possible New Shortwave Broadcaster in Papua New Guinea

4 April 2002 A new Christian radio station that recently opened in Papua New Guinea has permission to broadcast on shortwave with a power of 100 kW. A team of engineers led by Sam Rowley from the HCJB World Radio Engineering Center in the USA recently travelled to Port Moresby to complete installation of Wantok Radio Light, the city's first Christian FM station. It will become the hub for the Papua New Guinea Christian Broadcasting Network, a satellite radio network being established through a cooperative effort involving HCJB World Radio and three partner organizations. The shortwave broadcasts will reach not only remote, rugged areas of Papua New Guinea, but the entire region. Other stations are being planned for Vanuatu and the Solomon Islands.. (Radio Netherlands Media Network.)

LATIN CORNER.

ECUADOR: From a listener in Quito via Cumbre Dx comes interesting information of SW transmissions of MW/FM Ecuadorian stations.

Radio Cosmopolita is a MW station in Quito on 960khz. Radio Chimborazo is a FM station in Riobamba, capital of the province of Chimborazo on 98.1.

Both these stations are broadcasting simultaneously on USB 5900khz in Quichua.

Technical chief, Sr. Alejandro Yautibug at Radio Cosmopolita advises that these transmissions are not intended for the public but function as a link between Quito and Riobamba as that region has a heavy Indian population.. He also advises that soon there will be a third station involved, Radio Filadefia in Guayaquil, MW 1170khz. This means that it will be possible to hear three stations simultaneously on 5900 and 5905khz. Power is .2KW and on USB these could possibly be heard here in NZ.

All three stations are run/hired by the Indian Evangelic Movement. Currently they have an application in to start real SW transmissions in AM and frequency will be around 4000-4015khz. to service the Indian population throughout Ecuador. Power will be considerably higher for these transmissions. For Latin enthusiasts these are a distinct possibility here I would think. Unfortunately no times are mentioned. (Cattermole)

PERU: Radio LTC, Peru, moving to 5005v kHz

Radio LTC, Juliaca, heard on new 5005 kHz at 0012 on 4 April 2002 with the program "Noticias LTC". Gives ID as "Radio LTC desde Juliaca... LTC, tres frecuencias, una sola seÒal" This station has earlier been heard on 5032 and 6011 kHz. **Radio LTC** heard with fair signal on 5005.28 kHz on 5 April 2002 with "LTC Noticias" at 1003. Many ids and station promos. (HCDX)

PERU: PERU 5387.76 Radio Manantial, Otuzco, la provincia de Otuzco, el departamento de La Libertad (Per[]).. New Peruvian! It took exactly 20 days of intense listening to catch an ID of this new, religious station. Henrik¥s suggestion with the name "Manantial" helped a lot when finally the station came up with a signal strength good enough for an ID April 28, ie this morning: "Est·n en sintonìa de su nueva estaciÛn Radio Manantial desde Otuzco, el

departamento de La Libertad". Sometimes also gives ID as "Radio Manantial....." plus something I catch as ".....de Vida". The DJ of station is absolutely delirious in his head - gives exact time on the "minute" but often mixes different time zones.

I have heard px from "Maranatha" and "LV de la SalvaciÛn". At other times their own programmes, often religious music. I think you can reach the station by writing to "Maranatha" in the town "Otuzco". Closes pretty regularly at about 0100 UTC and begins at 1000-1100 UTC. Info from "Ventanaper": Provincia de Otuzco, cuya capital es Otuzco.

A new Latin American radio station, with unknown location, has been heard on 5387.72 kHz. The station was first heard on 8 April 2002 until 0050, its first day of transmission. They repeated it was a new station, with an ID like: "Est-n en sintonia de su Radio "Marancay." [name as heard]. It carried a religious format, with long blocks of unannounced religious music without any talk and short and small "sermons" by male announcer. Announces the frequency as 5910 kHz and a starting time of 1100 UTC, and it closes around 0200.

When not broadcasting purchased religious programs, like "La Voz de la SalvaciÛn" and "Radio Universal de Vida", it is mostly playing nonstop religious music.

I know that the station is located in a "departamento" and in that case both Ecuador and Bolivia are out of the question. (HCDX)

Programming will also devote core time to electoral issues of concern to vulnerable groups, i.e. handicapped, internally displaced persons, women and children. Two presidential debates will be organized and aired by Radio UNAMSIL in collaboration with the Sierra Leone Broadcasting Service and other stakeholders on 29 April and 3 May. Radio UNAMSIL will provide live coverage from around the country on 14 May, Election Day itself, up to the announcement of final results. The Section's Community Liaison Unit will continue ongoing voter education throughout the country in accordance with NEC supplied information. Starting on 23 April, its performing artists will undertake a nation-wide tour in all districts at the chiefdom level to disseminate information on the elections. A Command Performance will be held at the Lagunda Theatre in Freetown on 30 April, the theme of which will be free and fair elections. The performance will be adapted for radio and broadcast nationwide, as well as performed at all UNAMSIL Sector Headquarters. The Video Unit will continue collaborating with SLBS on the popular "Kapu Sens" programme and is producing public service announcements to be aired on the network. SOUTH AFRICA: R.dio Ecclesia from South Africa

R-dio Ecclesia has started a new service from South Africa on Monday 15 April, 2002. The frequency used is 6100 kHz, with 250 kW. The station is transmitting from the Meyerton Radio Station in South Africa.

R-dio Ecclesia, owned by the Catholic Church in Angola, has earlier been banned from broadcasting from locations within Angola. It has then rented hours in the Netherlands, and now South Africa. (HCDX)

UNITED KINGDOM. BBC World Service Audience Shows Small Decline 16 April 2002.

The BBC World Service has published its estimate of global listening in all languages for 2002. This shows a 3% decrease on the figure for 2001, and its weekly reach now stands at exactly 150 million. Much of the loss is attributed to a drop in the number of shortwave listeners in India, where there has been a dramatic fall in radio listening in general. The global audience for BBC World Service in English remains steady at 42 million.

According to the BBC, audiences in Australia doubled to 1.9 million, and audiences in the USA are at their highest level ever - up by 25% from 2.3 million to 2.9 million. Significantly, these were the two areas to which the BBC discontinued shortwave broadcasts on 1 July

2001. However, the BBC says that over two thirds of its weekly audience (115 million) still listen by shortwave. It continues to invest in this area, and a new transmitter site in Oman is on schedule to become operational in the autumn.

Andy Sennitt comments: The details released by the BBC are bound to renew the debate over whether it was right to drop shortwave to North America and Australia. Clearly, on the basis of the published figures, the decision appears justified. The problem is that the figures alone don't tell the whole story. In its measurements, the BBC appears to make no distinction between someone who listens once a week to a nine minute BBC news bulletin relayed by a local public broadcaster, and someone who is committed to listening to a wide range of BBC output for several hours a day. The Coalition to Save the BBC World Service has repeatedly made this point over the last nine months.

The other factor which is not covered by naked statistics is the quality of the listening experience. Analogue shortwave is not a perfect medium, but it is inherently more reliable than temperamental Web servers that can't cope with demand every time there's a big story. Broadcasters can boast about how many people were connected - but what they don't mention is the frustration experienced by the many more who tried and failed to listen online. Many people were glad to have shortwave as a backup when they were unable to listen via the Web. That option having been removed, a lot of potential listening hours have been lost. It remains the policy of Radio Netherlands to offer our listeners a choice of programme delivery methods within the constraints of our resources. Our decision to take over some of the shortwave airtime relinquished by the BBC last July has enabled us to offer our North American audience a choice of listening in the morning or evening, and provides improved news and current affairs coverage to an audience hungry for a European perspective on the day's events. (Radio Netherlands Media Network.)

USA: Papers were signed and money changed hands yesterday April 25th. and as of 9:00 AM this morning WJCR became the property of Word Broadcasting, WJIE! First broadcast day under new ownership is sked for Sunday the 28th. but may be sooner if I can get the 7490 transmitter back up to full power tomorrow! They plan on using only the 7490 frequency initially. May put 13595 back on using the old 270 degree antenna later in the season. They have not as yet gotten any means of program delivery established between their studios in Louisville and the transmitter site in Upton. They had been talking about an ISDN or maybe a Switch-56 landline interconnect because the 68 mile long path was too much for a microwaye STL link. (CUMBRE)

Continuing on from the narrative in March magazine the main routes for aircraft inter-nationally consist of airways (below 24,500 feet approximately FL 245) and upper air routes (above FL 245). In both cases the routes follow straight lines between navigation beacons or reporting points. (Also known as Waypoints). Upper air routes do not have defined widths since all airspace above FL 245 is under control. Below FL 245, however, the airways all extend at least five nautical miles either side of the centreline. The airspace is uncontrolled outside these limits (Handbook Air Traffic Control)

Easyjet, the British airline operating out of Luton airport and which featured in a television programme recently, is aiming to become a major player in Europe, rivalling Ryanair and posing a greater threat to British Airways. The airline operates 35 aircraft and flies to 45 destinations. (BBC world news)

Dr. Tims News are in German, they contain logs and news from Dr. Tim himself and his

contributors, mainly from Germany and Benelux and they are available in text version only. The price is 'free', Dr. Tims homepage gives the full version of the news. Dr. Tims News are taking a rather 'yellow press' approach on pirate radio logging. They are a good opportunity if you want to read rumors or gossip or want to spread your own 'message'. But they do contain lots of facts too thanks to Dr. Tims excellent contacts to 'Holland'Dr. Tims News come out on late Sunday via a yahoo-based mailing list. Questions to DoctorTim@T-Online.de

Micro FMs I did some searching, and DFing this morning (11 May) with a Sony ICF-7600D, and its rod antenna. I heard four micro FMs from my home in Lower Hutt: 88.1, 88.4, 100.6, 100.8 MHz. I listened to each one for a while, but only 88.1 identified itself during the period, as "KC FM Lower Hutt 88.1 MHz". 88.1 was rather strong here in Lower Hutt, so I went looking for it. I found the transmitter at the top of Maungaraki, a suburb on the Western Hills above Lower Hutt. The transmit antenna, a 2-element, vertically polarised FM-band yagi, mounted on the side of a house was a give-away. (Doug Ingham)

New FM stations in Opunake Just a short note to advise you of a Life FM relay here in Opunake operating on 88.4 with 1 watt from the old power board building in Tasman Street. Operated by "The Wave" a local church. Also on is a relay of Solid Gold AM 1233 kHz on 88.1 with a milliwatt of power from Mike Smith Electronics workshop on Napier Street Opunake. Mike was Broadcast Editor for the Times some years ago. He also can break out for local announcements and play a few CDs as well. (Bill Woller)

New Guardbanders in Auckland On air today (17 April), on 100.2 FM and announcing an on-air date of 23 April is Buck FM, based on Auckland's North Shore. Is running a lengthy loop tape of comedy tracks (Ali G, Billy T, James etc) and promos with innuendo slogans like "Get Bucked". There has been a solid open carrier on the channel for a week, which I thought, was blocking the usually heard Virtual FM from Takapuna, which had a jazz format. However a visit to the North Shore last Thursday failed to locate a Virtual FM signal so they seem to have closed. Strong signals into my listening site at Mission Bay and south into St Johns where it is obliterating TLC (The Little Country) Radio from Otahuhu. Up FM is a dance music station that has been broadcasting on 100.6 FM since about 25 February. This station took over the frequency from previous occupant 'Frank'. Frank was a successor to George FM (now on 96.8FM), and played a lot of Frank Sinatra. Up FM is a totally different format with an incessant beat rhythm, though with live DJs at times. I suspect it is coming from the Ponsonby area and I can hear it up the Northern Motorway almost to Albany. Up FM ran a special broadcast on 107.4 FM last Saturday and Sunday, live from the Armageddon Show at Auckland's Aotea Centre. I didn't bother to fight my way through the crowds at the show to find the Up FM stand, but still need to track them down eventually to try and coax a QSL out of them for this special broadcast which was only audible in the central city and as far east as Kohimarama. Am still waiting a reply from Beach FM at Great Barrier Island! Their Kawau Island 97.0 and Waiheke Island 89.8 are often off air but back when I check another day. (Bryan Clark)

Another New Guard band in Auckland

There is a new guard band station broadcasting on 100.8 MHz fm from Mt Wellington Auckland. There is no station identification only music from the sixties. 88.2 FM Otahuhu is no longer on the air. (Winston Lashley)

New Frequency For Fresh FM

Fresh FM, the Nelson region's community access radio station, switched on a brand new transmitter in Nelson this month to improve the station's reception in the area. The new transmitter broadcasts on 95.4 FM across the CBD and non-coastal areas of the city,

complementing Fresh FM's existing region-wide frequency of 99.4 FM. Based at Fringed Hill, the move is the station's long-awaited response to concerns from listeners about poor reception in areas of the city. Fresh FM operates its single service from studios in Nelson, Motueka and Takaka to ensure people across the region can be involved in programmes. (Median Strip April 29)

Plains FM Makes Break Into TV Christchurch Access radio station Plains FM is branching out into television.

Plains TV will be "a new way of thinking about local television," according to Marketing & Development Co-ordinator **Richard Liddicoat**. "We make the medium completely accessible to allow anyone in our community to make and broadcast programmes they have created themselves. Plains TV have the facilities and expertise to make local people local broadcasters." The station operates on the same not-for-profit philosophy as Plains FM96.9, with programmes broadcast each Sunday through a partnership with NOW TV. "Plains TV delivers niche programmes to niche audiences, and the programmes are made by, for and about those audiences. It's a simple approach that works," says Liddicoat. Plains TV launched on April 21. (Median Strip May 6)

Barbados While listen on the Internet to C B C 900 they announce they were also broadcasting on 100.7 MHz FM. Barbados now has nine radio stations. The area of the island is 166 square miles with a population of 270,000. There are 2 AM station and 7 FM stations. (Winston Lashley)

Fantastic US/Canadian AM FM radio site A great web site for checking US and Canadian AM and FM stations is http://100kwatts.tmi.net/. The Main entry page above has the latest US AM/FM freq and callsign allocations and changes. Try typing a callsign into the SEARCH box. Gives you station transmitter location, station format (unfortunately doesn't appear to give station postal addresses). However it does have their website address/link it they have one. And if you click on the little flashing transmitter tower you will get a map indicating where their transmitter is located. (Mark Nicholls)

Article: Happy Birthday to New Zealands Second Shortwaye Station

On behalf of DX League members and DX enthusiasts everywhere, we congratulate NZ Radio for the Print Disabled Inc and the Radio Reading Service in Levin, which celebrates its 15th anniversary on-air on Thursday 9 May.

NZRPD was founded in 1985 by former League member Allen Little, who wanted to do something for people who, for whatever reason, cannot hold, see, or understand printed information. Allen himself is legally blind. Since May 1987, this voluntary radio station has broadcast on medium wave and shortwave for people who find reading a major challenge. A volunteer team of more than 240 people focus on "turning print into sound" They aim to

provide full fresh information, topical news and current affairs based on published material. Volunteers read from newspapers, magazines etc, while others operate the studio equipment. The Radio Reading Service is funded by donations, grants, subscriptions, bequests and sponsorship. "New Zealand on Air" helps with an Operational Grant from the Public Broadcasting Fee.

At Easter weekend of 2000, I was able to visit the studios and transmitter site with local League member and RRS volunteer Kelvin Bradshaw. I was also pleased to meet QSL Manager Brian Stokoe again – he had been my Scoutmaster in the early 1960s. The station has always been DXer friendly and welcomes reception reports, which are all personally replied to by Brian. At the NZRPD offices and studios on the first floor of the Levin Shopping Mall, a world map is on display, surrounded by postcards from DXers

Kelvin got permission to take me out to the RRS transmitter site at Weraroa, about 2 kilometres south of Levin (with the main antenna mast just visible west of State Highway 1). + For 2XA 1602 kHz medium wave, the main transmitter is a 2.5 kilowatt Blyth unit, with a 1 kw Harris MW1 unit as standby. The omni-directional MW tower is 44 metres high. Shortwave station ZLXA operates on 3935 kHz via a 1 kw Bauer 701b HF transmitter. The antenna is a half-wave Sloper, running Northeast-Southwest. In past years, alternate shortwave frequencies of 7290 & 5960 kHz have used Radiofon 500 watt transmitters feeding into inverted Vee antennas facing East-West. But these have not been operational for some time. I must say that I was amazed to see the simple 3935 SW antenna and realise that it was carrying ZLXA broadcasts to DXers in all parts of the world.

Article: Are Long Wires Directional? An Investigation

Living in a retirement village, the desideratum of having antennas "as long and as high as possible" is something of a dream. Instead, I am limited to experimenting with running random wires of modest length (and height) in various directions in a quest for improved short wave and mediumwave reception. It would be helpful to know for sure whether long wires of such length are directional — either in the direction of their length or at right angles to it.

What the Experts Say.

The experts seem to be at variance on this point. For example:

Towards an Answer

My present aerial array consists of a 32-metre long wire at 85°/265° azimuth, a 34-metre long wire at 55°/235° azimuth and a 62-metre horizontal loop. Over a period of 14 months I have recorded each occasion when one of my long wires has given a better signal than either of the other two antennas. The results have been as follows:

The 25° limit is quite arbitrary, but in most cases in category B the agreement has been much closer. The signals logged in categories B and C have tended to be in the weak to medium strength range. It is noteworthy that in only one case was the azimuth of the signal anywhere near at right angles to the direction of the wire giving the best response.

As far as mediumwave is concerned, I rarely pick up anything beyond New Zealand other than Australian stations. However, it is significant that reception of Australian stations has been consistently better using my east/west long wire.

Some Tentative Conclusions.

The above data gives some evidence that a long wire of approximately 30 metres in length can be directional if aligned with the incoming signal rather than being at right angles to it. The high ratio of over 9MHz signal in category B to the total number of over 9MHz signals logged in category A compared with under 9MHz signals suggests that such a long wire is more likely to be directional with higher frequencies.

Have readers any other data, i.e. hard data, or authoritative source that throws further light on this issue?
