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ABC Celebrating 70 years of Broadcasting in Australia

It was just 70 years ago that a dozen medium wave stations located in 10 cities in 6 states throughout the Commonwealth of Australia were formulated into a national network of government radio stations. That event occurred on 1 July 1932 and today they are celebrating their fabulous 70th anniversary with a whole host of special programs.

This is how it all began.

The first permanent radio station in Australia made its inaugural broadcast in Sydney on 13 November 1923 under the callsign 2SB. At the time, station 2SB was owned and operated by a small commercial company, "Broadcasters Sydney Limited", Their original callsian, 2SB. was derived from the initial letters of their ownership, Sydney Broadcasters, with the digit 2 indicating the state of New South Wales.

In anticipation of the inauguration of this new commercial radio station, test broadcasts were conducted from the station location on the rooftop of a newspaper company, "Smith's Weekly" and "Daily Guardian" in Philip Street, Sydney. The first test broadcasts were made from an amateur radio transmitter running just 10 watts under the







callsign 2HP. A few days later, when the commercial transmitter was ready for action, low powered test broadcasts were conducted from this unit.

This first new radio station in Australia commenced a regular broadcast service with a flourish, and the inaugural live broadcast included local Sydney musical talent, both vocal and instrumental. One month later, an official inaugural ceremony was broadcast and this included a speech by the Postmaster General of Australia, under whose jurisdiction were all matters associated with wireless broadcasting.

Some three months after the initial commencement of programming over station 2SB, the callsign was changed to 2BL and this new callsign was also taken from their ownership name, Broadcasters Limited. This new callsign was taken in order to avoid confusion on the part of listeners because of the similarity in sound between 2SB and another medium wave station now on the air, 2FC.

Radio station 2FC was inaugurated as Australia's second wireless station about 3 weeks after the inauguration of the first station 2SB. Likewise, temporary accommodation

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was secured for this station on the top of another large building in downtown Sydney, the departmental store of Farmer & Company.

Soon afterwards, a large transmitter facility with tall antennas was installed at Willoughby, overlooking the beautiful Sydney Harbour. This location was in use for only 3 years, before an even more suitable location was secured, at the AWA transmitting facility at Pennant Hills, an outer suburb of Sydney.

As time went by, the interests of both stations. 2BL & 2FC, became intertwined, until they were amalgamated into one large broadcasting company with studios and offices in Market Street, Sydney. At first, the ownership was under the New South Wales Broadcasting Company, and then the Australian Broadcasting Company.

Finally, the Commonwealth Government took over and these two "A" class radio stations became the headquarters operation for the Australian Broadcasting Commission. Station 2BL is still 2BL, though in 1971, the callsian of station 2FC was changed to 2RN, standing for "Radio National".

Both of these pioneer radio broadcasting stations in Australia were involved also in shortwave broadcasting. The very first shortwave broadcasts in eastern Australia were made from station 2BL in February 1926, using the amateur transmitter 2YG. owned by station engineer Roy Allsop.

These shortwave relays originating from station 2BL were on the air spasmodically for a period of 3 years and they were then transferred to the sister station, 2FC. At this stage, the regular medium wave transmitter at Pennant Hills was re-tuned at night to a shortwave channel for this special shortwave programming.

As time went by, further changes took place and these shortwave broadcasts were taken over by AWA under the callsian VK2ME. At the commencement of the European Conflict in 1939, this shortwave service from Pennant Hills was taken over by the ABC as "Australia Calling", the forerunner for Radio Australia, and the experimental callsign VK2ME was regularised into VLQ.

Both 2BL and 2FC issued QSL cards in the early days and today these items are quite historic. One of these early QSL cards shows also the shortwave channel for 2FC, as 28.5 metres, corresponding to 10675 kHz.

These two original commercial stations in Sydney became the headquarter stations for the Australian Broadcasting Commission on 1 July 1932, which is the big anniversary that the ABC in Australia is currently celebrating. At the time of the formation of the ABC, 12 medium wave stations were incorporated into the new government radio network. These stations were located in all six state capitals, though Darwin in the Northern Territory had no radio station of its own at the time

In addition to the capital city stations, a further four relay stations in country areas were also absorbed into the ABC network, and these were:

- 2NC Newcastle, New South Wales,
- 2CO Corowa, in the border area between NSW & Victoria,
- 4RK Rockhampton, Queensland; and
- 5CK Crystal Brook in South Australia.

In addition to the 12 medium wave stations, the PMG department also operated an experimental shortwave station at Lyndhurst under the callsign, VK3LR. This transmitter took its programming as a relay from the two "A" class mediumwave stations in Melbourne, 3LO & 3AR.

The callsign 3LR was a combination of the callsigns of the two medium wave stations. The experimental callsign VK3LR was regularised just prior to the commencement of the war, as the more familiar VLR, though this station was closed a decade or two back.

Last month, I phoned the ABC in Australia for additional information regarding their 70th anniversary celebrations, and the receptionist girl at the switchboard gave the identification simply as, "702". This of course, is the frequency for their medium wave station 2BL. Today, the ABC operates a nationwide network numbering more than 500 AM, FM and shortwave stations throughout Australia.

One of the major 70^{th} anniversary events is a historic broadcast with program input from the twelve original medium wave stations in the ten cities in the six states. Another significant event occurring on 1 July is the launching of the ABC's seventh radio network. This new network will be an Internet-only radio service featuring contemporary Australian music for the age bracket ranging from 30 - 50 years.

From Ken Baird, Christchurch comes a cautionary note about a new type of DC power supply currently marketed in New Zealand by Dick Smith Electronics. Ken writes Catalog items M9931 (4.5v, 1.2A), M9932 (6v, 1A), M9933 (9v, 800mA) and M9935 (12v, 700mA) on page 156 are all switched mode supplies and OK for MW reception, slightly noisy for FM but totally useless for SW reception as the noise level from the power supply drowns out any SW signal.

I have a 6v one (M9932) which is useless except for the DC lead which I can put on another 12v supply. Keep to the traditional transformer types as detailed on pages 153, 154 of the Dick Smith catalog and you will get good results.

lan Baxter, Australia drops a quick note to say I've been doing a few SW DX reports over the past few weeks whilst things are guiet on FM. The African and Latin scene certainly isn't what it was compared to the early 1980's.

An Expanded AM Band Guide to Australia is being completed and will be available for download from radiodx.com shortly within the next month. In frequency order from 1611 it lists all licences issued state by state and mailing addresses. Some of the licences have a restriction that will affect DX. If there are any reports of reception out of Australia, the station may lose it's licence! We know they're narrowcast and for local reception, but this is taking bureaucracy too far.

Tealu Moresi, Wellington says at the radiodx.com website, I read about an article celebrating the official beginning of broadcasting from 2AP in 1947. When will we see this? I must add that I've enjoyed surfing your website. (Thanks Tealu, we should have the item

added to the Radio Heritage Collection later this year once we've found a better copy than the one to which we currently have access.)

Meanwhile, check out the **Broadcast** column with details of **Nev McKenty's** first report of WDJD 585 Pago Pago reception in Napier. A great catch to liven up a wintry month.

Now, here's an item to get the attention of **Don Reed**. **Christchurch**. As well as sending us a lot of detailed information about FEN Nagoya, WVTC Nagoya and WVTQ Osaka, Zenro Suzuoki, Tsuruga, Japan tells us of a recent find in a Japanese book:

I found a description about NZ DXers in the book Fukui Hoso no Ayumi (History of Fukui Broadcasting Co) that Mr Frank WM Wilson of Dunedin and Mr WD Reed of Christchurch sent reception reports of JOPR in 1958 which surprised the FBC people. There is a photo of one of the DX reports in the book, with the heading 'New Zealand Radio DX League'. (The Frank A Wilson Collection forms part of the NZRDXL Archives. I hope we can soon include a copy of the JOPR QSL along with the extract from the book showing the original DX report here in the NZDX Times)

Christopher Rives (christopherrives@hotmail.com) writes I'm in the process of looking for details of radio broadcasts during the invasion by the Japanese of Luzon or Manila in the Philippine Islands. Please contact me if you have anything available.

Also via email, Barry (Silverfox8442@aol.com) says I've been SWL BRS29858 for 42 years and find this a very interesting site. Many thanks to all involved for their efforts. (Thanks Barry, please write and tell us what your SWL number means. Perhaps it was issued by a DX club or a SW radio station?)

Chris Mackerell, Wellington checks in to note one day I'll get along to one of the new gatherings, but things have conspired against me for the last couple. (Wellington area members and friends are now meeting every couple of months and you'll find details of the next meeting on July 28 in Branch News).

Cleve Costello, Wellington has been having fun with misdirected mail but says Fortunately, the DX Times has arrived without fail and is a first-class magazine. I read it cover to cover, despite being in what I'm convinced is a lousy reception area. Even UHF-TV from Kaukau is totally blanked out by the hill behind us. Incidentally, you can register my QSL collection for the NZRDXL Archives. It goes back to 1947.

(Good luck with improving reception, and we hope you can also attend one of the Wellington area meetings shortly. Other members who wish to register their QSL Collection (and all the magazines, photos, car stickers, pennants etc accumulated along the way as well) with the Heritage Committee are invited to do so by contacting me at PO Box 14339, Wellington or via email).

Andy Gardner, Manzanillo, Mexico alerts us to www.aardvark.co.nz a NZ internet users website which recently ran an editorial (June 24) which began When I was young land dinosaurs walked the earth), one of my favorite pastimes was listening to SW radio late at night. The writer then talks more about SW listening, follows this through to streaming of radio stations on the web, and recent royalty decisions in the US which have seen hundreds of stations there end webcasting.

This is now a big issue. The RIAA (Recording Industry Association of America) has won the right to charge royalties per listener to webcasting. Faced with current and back royalties running into hundreds of thousands of dollars per station, many have simply pulled the plug.

One of the biggest suppliers has been Yahoo Radio. They've gone, and taken hundreds of stations off the web overnight. The only option to hear them has reverted to a good radio

receiver and a decent aerial. No longer is it easy to hear an FM jazz station from San Francisco. Non-commercial US stations (such as NPR) pay a much lower fee and will survive.

Greg Agnew, Los Angeles, CA is a rejoining member after many years, and writes I'm curious, do DXers aet QSLs for webradio broadcasts. Most hobby clubs define broadcast via radio signals as the basis for allowing QSL of reception. So, usually, webcasting is used either for listening enjoyment, or to parallel a SW or MW signal to confirm that the radio signal is coming from that station. As a personal choice, some listeners may like to listen to webradio and ask stations to confirm their audio reception.

Maybe a little late on the market is a new book called *Rough Guide to Internet Radio* by LA Heberlein which we hope to review shortly. Published by Rough Guide Publishing in New York.

John Fialiozzi (www.savebbc.ora) reminds us that it's a year since the BBC made their decision to cut SW broadcasts for North America and Australia/NZ. The NZRDXL supported the Coalition to Save the BBC and lobbied MPs in the UK, and British state agencies, to revisit the decision. In fact, the BBC has quietly reinstated some frequencies and times which benefit listeners in these areas, whilst maintaining their push for local rebroadcasts and internet delivery.

As John savs It's not so much what the BBC did. but B B C WORLD SERVICE how they went about doing it, that, in the end, has left the most lasting impression. A first year student in PR could have handled this more productively than the BBC did. The mildly disparaging confrontational attitude used toward longtime SW listeners was unnecessary, ill advised, counterproductive and unworthy of the broadcaster.

The BBC now has agreements in place with many Access stations in NZ for program excerpts which range from BBCWS News to whole program blocks. A lobby group with hundreds of members exists in Wellington with the aim of getting a free frequency from the government to relay the BBC locally. In the UK, plans are afoot to reduce the licence fee paid to the BBC. As a result, only core services would be supplied free. Other services would be on a pay per view or listen basis.

Ray Crawford, Forestdale, Queensland says no DX, but plenty of work getting done around the place. Thanks for the Convention 2002 photos and we hope to be over to see you later in the year for some good Pacific DX.

James Kevin, Mountain Home, TN has a query: A reference librarian suggested your website when I was conducting research into the history of volcano studies in Hawaii. A major advance in that field occurred in 1920/21 when a naval radio station began broadcasting reliable time signals in the Pacific. It's callsign appears to have been either NPM or NPG but I can find no other information.

Adrian Peterson, Indianapolis, IN (our resident guru on things Pacific) has come through with some answers, but if anyone else knows more about NPM, please write and tell us. Adrian says:

The US Navy established three communication radio stations in Hawaii, at three different locations and all with the NPM call, located at Heeia Point, Koko Head and Pearl Harbor. The use of calls changed from time to time, sometimes with remote relays and remote control, but NPM is basically the USN Pearl Harbor station, with NPG San Francisco also coming into the picture. Check your local library for the book called The History of US Naval **Communications** for more information.

Adrian also reminds us about the Wavescan 2002 DX Contest which readers are

invited to enter for a range of great prizes, including limited edition QSL cards from KSDA Guam and a copy of *On the Shortwaves* written by NZRDXL member **Jerry Berg**. Ralph Sutton, Wellington meanwhile tells us that the Australian Bureau of Meteorology has started SW broadcasts from VMW (Western Australia) and VMC (Charleville, Queensland) on a range of frequencies including 2056, 4149, 6230, 8113, 12356, and 16546. Facilities are built and maintained by TVNZ subsidiary BCL. A number of Marine Radio sites around the Australian coastline have gone silent as a result. Meanwhile, VNG Time Station has had a reprieve until December 31, 2002.

SOUTH PACIFIC

AUSTRAI IA:

Reprieve for Australian Standard Frequency & Time Station VNG.

A letter dated 24 June from Dr Richard Brittain, Secretary of the National Time Committee of Australia's National Standards Commission (NSC) advises that the closure of Radio VNG

will be postponed till 31 December 2002.

This step recognises that some users have had insufficient notice of the closure and time to make the necessary alternative arrangements. A voice announcement regarding the end-of-year closure will be aired from mid-July. Further notification of the closure will be given in writing to VNG Consortium Users in July and September.

In the event of any major equipment breakdown, the NSC will not be able to guarantee continuation of the VNG service for the full 6 months.

So, for DXers wanting to get a QSL for VNG, there's now another 6 months left to log them on 2500, 5000, 8638, 12984 or 16000 kiloHertz. All frequencies are on 24 hours, except 16mHz which operates from 2200 to 1000 UTC. Voice announcements are carried on 2.5, 5 and 16mHz only - the other frequencies carry Morse identifications. GREENLAND: Greenland still on shortwave

Kalaallit Nunaata Radioa, KNR or Greenland Radio, is back on shortwave. The daily news programmes are carried on 3812 kHz USB with 100 W at 1330-1430 and 2000-2200 UTC (1430-1530 and 2100-2300 when Daylight Saving Time). The transmissions are unofficial but are quite regularly heard - especially during summer. Transmitter site is Tasiilag on the East coast of Greenland

"Real" shortwave transmissions may start again in Greenland. For some ten years the authorities have been considering closing down the current five 5-10 kW mediumwave transmitters, due to few listeners and electricity costs. Calculations and considerations have been made to replace the mediumwave transmitters with one shortwave transmitter on the island of Cook - not far away from Nuuk. That would be a more efficient way to serve the fishermen who are - more or less - the only ones still listening to AM.

Cook Island was also the site of the old shortwave transmitters of KNR using 3999, 5980 and 9575 kHz several years ago. (HCDX) (Something to hope for ED)

INDIA:

AIR have introduced a SW channel for their National Program parallel to 1566,1134 kHz. This service is heard at 1325-0040 hrs on 9425 kHz. This is understood to be a test transmission. for an indefinate period and originates from Bangalore at 500KW. (DX India)

MADAGASCAR:

The situation in Madagascar means that power restrictions continue to be in force. A number of Radio Netherlands transmissions have been temporarily transferred to other transmitter sites. These arrangements will remain in force until further notice. (RN News Media)

Station has been widely reported between 2330 and 0215utc which rules out reception here in NZ but it has also been reported at 0800utc which makes it a distinct possibility in this region so those interested in Latins keep an ear on this frequency during our evenings. Ed. Latest update is:

Radio Baluarte, Argentina, is transmitting daily on shortwave 6215.06 kHz between 1000-0300. Power is 1 kW. The station is transmiting from Puerto Iguazo, Misiones, Argentina. In

COLOMBIA:

This station was first heard by DXer Bjrn Malm in Ecuador, and has later been confirmed as being Lz Voz de tu Conficencia by DXer Rafael Rodriguez in Colombia, who on 23 June 2002 heard the station with this ID's: "... en emisiones de prueba, transmite 6065 La Voz de su Conciencia desde ???? para el mundo..."

The station mentioned it address as being Apartado Aereo 95300, Bogota, and having written to them, Rafael Rodriguez received with returning mail the information brochure "Rescate a su Familia". Rafael Rodriguez, Colombia, Conexion Digital, 23 June 2002

La Voz de tu Conciencia is run by Russell Stendell out of Lomalinda in the southeastern plains of Colombia, which reaches into an area that is mostly guerrilla controlled, but also reaches some drug traffickers and some paramilitary.





George Joins Sky Digital Stable George FM joined the Sky Digital line-up on July 1, to reach an ever-wider audience and complement its existing FM networking in Auckland, Hamilton and Queenstown. The station is available on Sky's Channel 104. (Median Strip June 20) Also TCM movie channel is back on Sky Digital on channel 24.

Massy Uni To Launch Wellington Radio Station. Students at Massey University's satellite campus in Wellington are to establish their own radio station - Munt FM - in the capital. Programme Director Claire Medcalf says the station will be non-commercial, with heavy NZ music content, staffed by students. "We plan to launch on the first day of the next semester and will be in it for the long haul. We're aiming to maintain a minimum 60 per cent New Zealand music quota, focusing on promoting local musicians to the max." (Median Strip June 19)

Greymouth Pegasus Gold 88.3 now on air in Greymouth, covering area to Shantytown and Boddytown also. 1950s/1970s music, on relay from Radio Pegasus, Christchurch 24/7 with local community notice inserts. Radio Pegasus has transmitters at Bishopdale, Linwood, Cashmere and Belfast all on same channel. (The Press, July 5 via David Ricquish)

Australian Influence Looms It's looking increasingly like New Zealand's largest radio company will wind up in Australian hands following reports this week that those companies to lodge 'indicative bids' for CanWest's local TV and radio assets all have Australian connections of some form. The bidding process, being handled by stockbrokers JB Were, is confidential. However, newspaper reports on both sides of the Tasman this week suggest the contenders are Australia's Ten Network, Austereo and RG Capital, and local TV company Prime Television, which is in turn part-owned by an Aussie, Kerry Packer. Prime is said to only be interested in getting hold of TV3 and TV4, not radio. Inside running still looks to lie with the Ten Network, which is half-owned by CanWest. Final bids are not due for another month. (Median Strip June 20)

AFTRS team ready for the RUSH Every year students in the full-time commercial radio course at the Australian Film Television and Radio School launch their own youth targeted radio station as they approach the end of their seven-month long course. This year the station is called RUSH FM and will be on air for two weeks, first on the Internet and, in its second week of broadcasts, on FM 100.7 in Sydney's west. New community licences for Northern NSW The ABA has allocated new community radio licences for Casino, Coraki and Nimbin in northern New South Wales. The Casino licence was allocated to Casino's Own Wireless Association Inc (COW) to serve the general community on FM 107.9. The Coraki licence was allocated to Community Radio Coraki Association Inc on FM 88.9. The Nimbin licence was allocated to Nimbin Independent Media Inc on FM 102. All three permanent licences will commence on 1 July, following on from their existing temporary community broadcasting licences. (AMT News July 2002)


Gold Coast and Nambour applications called. The ABA is inviting applications for two new commercial FM radio licences in Queensland. Indian commercial radio expanding. Commercial FM radio in Mumbai India is all abuzz according to Gerald Brown's e-broadcastnewsasia. "Five stations are all going on air within the space of two months since the Government opened up the airwaves," reports Brown. Radio City has been the latest station to launch. "While it is early days yet, it appears that Radio Mirchi and Radio City would focus on more mass programming, dominated by Hindi film music while GO 92.5 and Radio Win will orient to a urbane, English speaking audiences," according to Brown. A recent survey conducted by Madison Media shows overall FM listenership has increased significantly as a result of the new stations going to air, with 56 per cent of people surveyed tuned in to FM.

Medium Wave Trail From Brisbane - Australia

I recently spent ten days staying with Ray and Raewyn Crawford at their home in Forestdale, about 20 km south of Brisbane. Sutton Burtenshaw, a fine DXer, and his wife Kaye were also staying there when I arrived and naturally I took the AOR 7030 with me.

It was interesting to compare what can be heard from Ray's compared to what I hear at home. Naturally there were the little Aussie stations all over the band. Radio Tarana from Auckland boomed in one night. Yanks were there but were very hard to hear. You really do need a 300m plus wire, such as Chris Martin has at his home in Ormeau. Ray has a 100mNE wire, a N/S dipole, and E/W dipole, and a ground radialheading west. We could hear the Yanks, but apart from a couple of evenings, there was great difficulty hearing them well enough to get an id.

Solar conditions were poor and the MW and tropical bands were noisy and had splash for a good part of my stay. Below is a trail of what I heard. I haven't listed everything, but as you will see there was enough around to keep me busy. I have reported virtually all of these stations.







Simon Green, Scotland has sent us some wonderful old QSL cards and other promotional material from MTCY Manchuria and XGOX China and the following note:

I came across your website the other day and wondered if you'd be interested in scans of QSLs I inherited from my father.


