

New Year Greetings for 2009 from the Patron

It came as a surprise and humbling experience to be elected as your Patron at the last October 60th Birthday. Having for so long in my Dxing life known our late Jack Fox as the Patron who was always there, I felt it a real sense of honour to have been elected to follow in his footsteps. Jack was of the generation who trained mine in the hobby, and from among his generation we have very few left. As I look through the list of members there are not all that many of my own generation who in many respects began the hobby as I did in 1949 with a 5 vale Columbus radio that cost \$24 on time payment on my apprentice wage of \$3 a fortnight. The founders ranks have thinned as have the numbers of Dxers associated with the League, but I detected in Oamaru last year a passion and vitality that remains vigorously at the heart of the membership. The whole day was one of enthusiasm. Our hobby pursuit is very individual and could in some families be considered anti-social for by its very nature it excludes even people within our own family when we are 'twiddling the knobs'. It behoves us to recognize this characteristic in a world that is perhaps more sociable and less accepting of individuals who appear to be a 'bit odd'. We can be rather glassy eyed when wearing headphones or waving our hands about insisting those around us stops talking.

It is the nature of our hobby that brings us together and our common enthusiasm unities us across all walks of life that engenders a common bond of unity fun sharing. DXpeditions cannot be too frequent, nor can we afford not to be part of them when the opportunity occurs. Friendships are made for life and as I reflect through my professional life of over 51 years, (the time I have been dxing) I still have close friends and acquaintances who I met though the hobby. This is a priceless contribution to anyone's life.

As the New Year opens so do opportunities for DX in many and varied challenging varieties face even the least passionate of us who pursue the illusive QSL. It never ceases to surprise me that with our membership touching 200 so many of you have found districts close to where you live where reception and results can still be found. I live 800 metres from the sea and despite the TV and broadband noise, and even the close 500 meters of 11,000KVA lines, I have heard North America on X band at least three times in the past year. All of them logable. Opportunities still offer themselves; it's just that we need to have another mindset in perusing that illusive QSL.


Most of us have grown through the hobby with an idea of climbing the QSL ladders and achieving high OSL numbers for our months work. One wonders what the ratio of listening per hour and the QSL return was in 1950 compared with the same listening time in today's world.

My experience this past ten years has been it is not that stations are not interested in reports, but the administration of the radio stations have changed, the route for correspondence has altered and reception reports either don't get into the correct desk or they remain a junior level in the too hard tray. For the past couple of years I have

attempted an experiment. I enclose a letter to both the CEO and one identical attached information to the Engineer. The letter explains the remaining documentation contains a reception report from New Zealand and on a second attachment is a map of New Zealand with an arrow pointing either to Tiwai or where it was received. Then there is a report (the third document) and the experience has shown at least 30 minutes of recording reporting time is essential. Finally I enclose within an envelope \$2 US clearly marked 'for return postage', and this envelope is sealed. The attachments have also a self addressed envelope. Always, for good measure is an enclosed postcard or photo of some part of New Zealand. Of the ten last reports composed in this manner eight have replied and one indicated it was their station policy not to bother, but in view of the presentation of the report they had decided to break their rubric and verified with a personal QSL from the CEO and the Engineer.

The letter caused a bit of a stir among the local lads here in Christchurch. The emphasis I believe has to move from quantity to more careful preparation in the report for quality. The world is a village now and we need to keep that at the back of our minds. This experiment is one that I'm now ready to adopt as my own for as long as it works. If anyone wants a few more examples or hints let me know and I'll have a chat to you about it.

It is my wish for you all for a very happy and prosperous New Year with heaps of good DX and like you all, I hopefully look forward to taking part in a DXpedition at least once this year. Good hunting and careful listening, with 100% improvement of your QSL.

New Zealand's ZLXA 3935kHz Goes Silent

New Zealand shortwave station, ZLXA of the Radio Reading Service is about to permanently sign off the air.

In fact, it has already been silent since December 1 2008 and, as the following message from Kelvin Brayshaw [QSL Manager] says, the chances of it returning, except for a last special broadcast for DXers, are very unlikely.

Subject: Radio Reading Service -ZLXA 3935 kHz

Date: Fri, 16 Jan 2009 From: Kelvin Brayshaw

I'm sorry to have to tell you that, in all probability, the shortwave service of the Radio Reading Service will soon be discontinued.

ZLXA, 3935kHz, has been in abeyance since 1st December 2008 pending the result of a listener survey and the consideration of cost-effectiveness.

The final outcome is expected to be advised following deliberations by management at the first board meeting of the year - probably in February.

I feel there will be members of SWL groups who might appreciate an opportunity to log this transmitter one last time during the northern winter, and I'm sure that if you were to make a special request on behalf of shortwave listeners, RRS management would, in a continuing spirit of goodwill, consider marking an event of such significance to the worldwide DX community by resuming transmission for a brief period.

In the meantime Radio Reading Service programmes are streaming on the Internet.



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2008 Clandestine Activity Survey

During the year 2008 the activity of political clandestine stations broadcasting on shortwave has dropped by 5.3 % to 1251 Weekly Broadcasting Hours (WBHs). This is the result of the latest Clandestine Activity Suvey, which has been published annually since 1986. The activity of clandestine stations broadcasting to target areas on the Asian continent has decreased by 2.6 % to 915 WBHs. Activity to target areas on the American continent has remained unchanged at 215 WBHs. The activity to target areas on the African continent, where volatility has always been very high in recent years, has decreased by 27.5 % to 121 WBHs. The most active target area worldwide is now for the first time in the history of the Clandestine Activity Suvey - North Korea with 245 WBHs (+49 when compared with last year), followed by China P.R. with 224 WBHs (-16) and Cuba with 215 WBHs (unchanged). The number of different target areas active worldwide has decreased from 18 to 17, with Senegal dropping from the list of active targets. On the other hand, no new or reactivated target areas have been reported over the past 12 months. (Kropf via DSWCI)

FM/TV Logs from Paul Rawdon, Christchurch


At last I've managed to hear some DX! The sites for the ABC stations were based on transmitter power output from information obtained from the Radio and Television Broadcasting Stations (Internet Edition, October 2008) published by the Australian Communications and Media Authority.

The receiver used was a Digitech AR1747 (AKA RedSun RP2100) connected to a three element FM yagi attached to the front fence. The Digitech's results on FM without the directional antenna were disappointing with much overloading from local stations, with the antenna, it is a very snappy receiver.

In addition, Channel 0 Wagga and Toowoomba have been regularly heard as was Channel 2.

The photo attached gives some indication of the amount of co channel interference caused to TV1 Channel 3 Sugarloaf. The tennis is coming from TV1! The signal was received on Tuesday 6 January 2008 at 01:30 UTC.

UK Radio likely to switch to digital by 2020

The body set up by the government to secure the future of digital radio in the UK is expected to predict next week that switchover for the medium could be completed by 2020.

Next week's final report by the Digital Radio Working Group comes at the end of a series of meetings, some of them vigorously debated, between representatives of commercial radio, the BBC, media regulator Ofcom, community radio and manufacturing and consumer groups, according to sources.

The various parties were brought together by the government to map out a timetable for digital radio, which has been beset by uncertainty over the future of one of its key methods of delivery, digital audio broadcasting (DAB).

But despite the setbacks - which saw Channel 4 pull the plug on its DAB ambitions and a host of digital stations shut down, including TheJazz, OneWord and Mojo - the DRWG is expected to say that the migration of most radio content to digital could be completed by 2020.

This would reinforce the conclusions of the group's interim report, published in June, that recommended the establishment of a timetable for the migration of all UK radio from analogue to digital. DRWG said digital switchover should be completed between 2015 and 2020.

However, the report is also expected to recognise that parts of the country will still not be able to receive a DAB signal even by 2020, so will stop short of a blanket analogue switch-off date like the 2012 deadline set for terrestrial television.

One of the key issues still to be resolved is who will pick up the bill for the improvements required to the DAB radio signal, and how to encourage car manufacturers to fit more dashboard digital radios.

Ofcom is also likely to oversee a reorganisation of the way DAB multiplexes are organised on a local, regional and national level.

One option would see the BBC's Asian Network, and possibly some other BBC services, move to commercial DAB multiplex, Digital One.

The ill-fated second national commercial multiplex, which was awarded to now defunct Channel 4-led 4 Digital consortium, has yet to be re-advertised.

DRWG's findings are expected to be a key part of communications minister Lord Carter's Digital Britain report next year.

Speaking to the culture, media and sport committee on Wednesday, Carter said: "Radio can be received on mobile phones and through the television. Could you have digital radio without DAB? Yes, you probably could.

"If we do want DAB, we need to push it along a bit or technology will drive it out." (Guardian, 12 December 2008,

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Digital TV switch may leave millions behind

WASHINGTON - In less than six weeks, the nation's television broadcasters are due to shut off their analog signals and begin transmitting in digital — potentially blacking out as many as 8 million U.S. households that rely on analog TV sets to pick up over-the-air channels. That reality hit lawmakers and the incoming Obama administration this week after the Commerce Department ran out of money for coupons to subsidize digital converter boxes. Viewers who don't have cable or satellite service or a TV with a digital tuner will need the boxes to keep older analog sets working.

The coupon program funding shortfall was a key reason behind the Obama transition team's call for Congress to delay the Feb. 17 analog shutoff. Yet the problem with the subsidy program is just one of several hurdles that appear to be in the way of a smooth digital transition.

One big potential pitfall is that many people who think they are prepared for the analog shutoff could lose some channels — or possibly even lose reception entirely — unless they purchase a new antenna.

That's because many stations will shift their broadcast footprints with the switch to digital by changing transmitter locations, antenna patterns or power levels.

The Federal Communications Commission has said 18 percent of the nation's full-power television stations will have a digital signal that reaches at least 2 percent fewer viewers than their current analog broadcasts.

Some viewers could lose signals because of the so-called digital "cliff effect." Unlike analog signals, digital broadcasts come in clear or don't come in at all, meaning that people on the fringes of analog coverage areas who currently get fuzzy reception will lose that reception entirely.

These viewers will likely need more powerful indoor or outdoor antennas — in addition to converter boxes — to maintain their existing reception. Yet critics say the government has done too little to educate consumers about this issue and is not subsidizing the cost of an antenna, which can be between \$75 and \$150.

What's more, consumers figure to discover they need this equipment after the transition actually happens, noted Barclays Capital analyst Alan Miles. And that will be in the dead of winter for much of the country.

"Winter in Vermont is not when you want to be installing a rooftop antenna," said Sen. Bernie Sanders, I-Vt., who is sponsoring a bill that would, among other things, expand the coupon program to help subsidize antenna purchases and installations. "Television is a connection to the outside world for many people. But if you're 80 years old and living on Social Security, you may not be able to buy an antenna or hire someone to install it."

Another thing that consumers may not realize until the transition is upon them is that broadcast station channel assignments will move around. Viewers will have to make their converter boxes re-scan for the new assignments after the changeover.

This issue, too, has received little attention and could lead many consumers to incorrectly assume their converter boxes don't work after the transition.

That has led to questions about whether there will be adequate call center resources to handle what could be an avalanche of requests for help.

The FCC is investing roughly \$10 million in in-house and outsourced call center operations and has said it expects to be able to handle 2.15 million calls during the week of Feb. 15. But the agency acknowledged that it won't be able to handle all the expected calls on its own and will rely on broadcasters, cable companies, state and local governments and community organizations to run their own call centers.

The FCC also has awarded \$8.4 million to 12 outside groups, including AARP, to staff call centers and help consumers buy and install converter boxes.

Still, skeptics such as FCC Commissioner Michael Copps worry that the government remains unprepared should the transition go ahead next month. What has been lacking all along, Copps insists, is urgency throughout the government and industry — along the lines of the nation's Y2K preparations — to ensure that the transition leaves no one behind.

In 2005, Congress required the digital shift to free up valuable chunks of wireless spectrum to be used for emergency-response networks and commercial services. The government has raised roughly \$19 billion by auctioning off this spectrum.

Even with the years of warning, however, analysts at Nielsen Co. estimate that as of December, 6.8 percent of the 114 million U.S. households with TVs remained completely unready for the digital transition. Another 10 percent still had at least one TV that was not yet ready.

A key sign that something was amiss came this week when the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, an arm of the Commerce Department, said it had hit a \$1.34 billion funding limit set by Congress to pay for converter box coupons.

The coupon program — targeted largely at poor and minority viewers — lets consumers request up to two \$40 vouchers per household to help pay for the boxes, which generally cost between \$40 and \$80 each. The NTIA started a waiting list for coupon requests as of Jan. 4, meaning that consumers who have applied since then are unlikely to receive their vouchers before Feb. 17. The NTIA now needs Congress to step in with more money or new accounting rules to get the program on track.

But even if lawmakers move quickly to resolve the funding issues, the coupon program itself is still not user-friendly, said Gene Kimmelman, vice president for federal policy at Consumers Union, which has called for the transition date to be postponed.

The program was not designed to handle a surge in last-minute requests, he said, which is exactly what the NTIA is now seeing as the government and industry have ramped up efforts to educate people about the transition.

It can take anywhere from four to six weeks to request a coupon, receive it in the mail, purchase a converter box and troubleshoot any technical issues. Now many consumers have run out of time.

"They didn't anticipate the level or the last-minute nature of the demand," said AARP lobbyist Dean Sagar.

Kimmelman added that the coupon program is inflexible in other ways as well. It places a

90-day expiration date on all coupons and prohibits consumers from reapplying if they let their coupons expire without redeeming them.

Added up, many fear, all these issues could amount to a train wreck on Feb. 17.

"We need to try to minimize the dislocation and chaos," Copps said. "But there will be people left behind."

Under "DX History/Stations," more on Bafra. Posted in the past were Don Jensen's 1987 PopComm article about Radio Biafra and the Biafran war (under "Stations"), and two letters from the station to Connecticut DXer Al Sizer (under "CPRV/QSL Gallery"). Now, in the "CPRV/QSL Gallery," we add another letter, this one addressed to Bill Sparks, and, under "DX History/Stations," a recording of the station made by Al Sizer on September 8, 1969, at 2140 UTC on 6145 kHz. Al introduces the recording, and notes that it was made on a DX-150 receiver. The station IDs as "the Voice of Biafra, the external service of the Biafra Broadcasting Corporation," and the IDs are at 2:26 and 3:12. Thanks to John Herkimer for the recording.

Under "DX History/Equipment & Advertising," The Scott News once again. This August 1932 edition focuses on the specifications and performance of the chrome-plated Scott Allwave Deluxe receiver, and illustrates the kind of DXing excitement that Scott promised his customers.

Under "DX History/Clubs & Publications," a few issues of the bulletin of the Radio Canada Short Wave Club, including the last issue (January-February 1971). The corresponding bi-weekly Saturday program of the same name started in 1962. The club president was S. Basil (Pip) Duke, a Londoner (U.K.) who had an extensive military, engineering, and broadcasting background before joining the CBC in 1954 and becoming Supervisor of Engineering Services for the CBCis shortwave broadcasts. From 1967 to 1971 the club had a regular bulletin with news about the CBC International Service, member profiles and lists of members seeking pen pals, member loggings, shortwave-related features and the like. The club left the air in 1975. RCI introduced a weekly "DX Digest" in 1977 (it became "SWL Digest" in 1981).

This week, under "DX History/Equipment & Advertising," a combination catalog-primer from Hammarlund, "Short Wave Listening Radios." Note the references to Popular Electronics, Gilfer, WRTH, NNRC and Radio New York Worldwide on p. 13. This was probably issued in the early 1960s. -- And under "Specialized Resources," we have posted Tom Williamson's "Looking Back" column from the the January 2009 ODXA bulletin. It deals with VOLMET stations.

Back to basics for 2009 Commentary by Mike Butler (January Editor)

While rummaging through an ancient file while gathering stuff for my first appearance as Mailbag host I came upon a piece written in 1995 by the great **Arthur Cushion** who put QSL-ing in a nutshell. In summarizing this, I am not attempting to preach to the converted, but hopefully, there may be members who would like to make a fresh start at the beginning of the new year. And for the Accomplished, there is a challenge at the end! So here is his:

"Way to verify that elusive station."

To begin with, Arthur said, in all cases the listener must look at his report in the light of its value to the broadcaster. Then to maximize your chances of a QSL:

- 1. Send a personal letter. Don't grind them out sending the same type of letter or report form to each. Write to each station with a personal approach.
- 2. Direct your letter, if possible, to a specific member of the staff. State a name or position e.g. refer to Passport to World Band Radio 'Addresses Plus' section, or World Radio TV Handbook near the top of each station's entry.
- 3. Make your report interesting!
- 4. Describe and if you can, enthuse on the programme heard. Still better, mention your 'favourite' programme and even those you were not enthralled with!
- Quote the date and exact timing of items in UTC. In the case of Domestic stations, also convert to their local time.
- 6. Use the SIO reception code but still include the description of the level you report: Strength: S1-inaudible,2-faint, partly intelligible,3-moderate,4-good,5-excellent. Interference: I1-wanted signal drowned out,2-heavy,3-moderate,4-slight,5-none. Overall: O1- worst -to- O5-best.
- Give a comparison to signals from other stations in the same area and in the same band.
- 8. Fading: describe the extent, slight, deep or complete.
- 9. Unusual weather conditions: esp. lightning etc.
- 10. Describe your equipment, especially the antenna. Amplifier?
- 11. Mention the sort of location where you listened e.g. in an elevated or depressed site compared with the general surroundings and whether in a city or at a listening post selected for its DX capabilities.
- 12. If you have some problem (Arthur was blind) describe how you overcame it to prepare the report.
- 13. Let the station know the reason for your interest in listening on MW, SW or other frequencies.
- 14. Major international broadcasters usually do not require a payment for postal costs.

Otherwise send an International Reply Coupon (IRC) or mint stamps for that country in the case of USA, Australia or NZ. Stick the stamps on to a self addressed airmail envelope!

Find the amount required from tourist brochures.

- 15. For new stations in those countries, you may make a pre-prepared card which may be appreciated as giving them a quick means to verify.
- 16. Keep a copy of your report for use in a follow up.
- 17. Don't blame the station which fails to reply but rather the possible non-delivery of your letter.
- 18. Stations that go to special lengths to verify your reception should be thanked after you receive the QSL.

At the stage when Arthur wrote this he had 3000 MW and 6500 SW QSLs!

Now for the challenge! If you think you can improve on the above or if you disagree with something in it - PLEASE WRITE AND TELL US!

It is of course understood that ALL the tips he has given us need not be used together except in the most unusually difficult cases. The experience of the DX-er will dictate as to how concise his report can be. And the use of email requires modification of items 14-17.

Our Patron, <u>Frank Glen</u> advises that <u>Douglas Johns</u> (both of Christchurch) has invited members to a meeting at his home on Sunday 18th January. A trip to Tiwai for a couple of nights - or longer- is on the agenda. The time suggested was near the end of January - early first week of February. Apparently some vandalism has taken place down there to the property over the last three weeks but it seems the local lads have done an excellent repair job. The only concern is damage to the equipment which is serious.

Frank has had the hard word put on him to have a DX display around about the middle of the year as a Civic proposal for a show of hobbies associated with the homes show. He would like members to contribute ideas towards that. He sends best wishes to all for 2009. Thanks

Frank and please let us know what transpired in the shade of that huge palm tree!

Des Davy, Te Kuiti was next in with reports to RCI 11805, AIR 13605 and R. Thailand 9725 and wonders whether they'll reply after all the trouble there. QSLs received were Slovakia R. 9770 and a cluster of CRIs, 7130,7325,9570,9600,9695, and 15210. Slovakian cards are not so plentiful as only one was reported last year. And it was yours! Des will be whisked away to Rotorua by his daughter for Christmas to avoid paint fumes as he has been doing the inside of his home. Substituting one fume for another I reckon Des! Bryan Clark, Mangawhai reports that he spent Christmas in Hong Kong but found no shortwave radios in the shops, nor could the hotel radio receive anything on medium wave. DXwise, his December and January focus is always on FM/TV DX. HAVE YOU HEARD A NORTH AMERICAN ON MEDIUM WAVE YET?

This is a good time of year to try to tune in an American medium wave station. You will need:

- To listen around 0700 to 0900 UTC (currently 8.00pm to 9.00pm);
- To have a reasonably sensitive and selective receiver on the medium wave band. If your receiver has selectable bandwidths, choose narrow (3kHz or better).
- To experiment with antennas. A box loop antenna aimed to the northeast will boost signals from that direction, usually helping to reduce the signal levels from Kiwi stations north and south of you. In urban locations, they will generally outperform 'short' longwires on medium wave. Of course a EWE antenna beaming NE will be even better!
- To be in a relatively noise free listening location. This could be outside on an
 outside deck or other area away from the noise interference generated by TV,
 computer, washing machines and dishwashers (to name some of the main
 culprits). If you can run your receiver on batteries, so much the better, as you
 can avoid noise coming through the electrical wiring;
- To tune your receiver to one of the 10kHz frequencies used in the Americas.
 Best heard North American channels are: 1120 KPNW Oregon with talkback;
 1170 KFAQ Oklahoma with talkback; 1180 Radio Marti, Florida in Spanish; 1580 KMIK Arizona with "Radio Disney"; 1640 KDIA California with religious talk;
 and 1700 XEPE Mexico identifying as "San Diego 1700".
- To be patient. Distant medium signals fade up and down. Using the BFO or SSB will help you detect that there are signals coming through on a 10kHz channel long before the actual audio fades up. If there's a lot of static noise around, try another night.
- Report on how you fare to our Mailbag Editor to help encourage others to try.

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OUR 60th ANNIVERSARY The following message has been received from ANKER **PETERSEN.** Chairman of the Danish Shortwave Clubs International: "From the DSWCI. I wish to send our sincere congratulations to the New Zealand DX League on this anniversary. It is really an achievement to keep a DX-organization alive for 60 years! The Anniversary Issue [of the NZ DX Times] describes in an excellent way the historical development of the DX-Hobby through all 60 years, including RNZI which I happened to hear yesterday on 9765 kHz and today on 6170 kHz with fair and understandable signals. I particularly studied with interest the First Issue from October 1948 and the reports about the late Arthur Cushen and Jack Fox whom I have both met. Arthur and Ralda visited my home here on June 14th, 1969. As you may remember, I attended your 50 years Anniversary in Camp Iona and heard the speech given by Jack Fox. I also read the article about his and Arthur's unique monitoring work during WW II. During the years, but particularly in 1998, I got many good DX-friends in New Zealand. I am especially grateful for the great hospitality Bryan, Mark and Tony King showed to me during my stay." (Anker also edits the DSWCI's fortnightly "DX-Window" bulletin and the valued annual Domestic Broadcasting Survey)

I heard, and got replies which I proudly showed my parents. I got about 5 letters back, including 2CA and 2NZ.

My wife Hazel worked in Dunedin and I took her to a poultry farm in Oamaru when we got married. One weekend when Hazel was away in Dunedin I was bored silly. I found these old Aussie letters and that night heard and wrote to a few more. So a DXer was born.

I joined the NZ DX Club in 1947 and the NZ Radio DX League in 1948. My NZRDXL Membership Certificate shows me as member no. 28. I used a 7-valve Ultimate in those days, followed by an 11-tube Hammarlund, 16-valve MidWest and various household receivers. But the Ultimate was by far

the best. Antennas on the farm were 400 foot longwires, 12 feet high, running to the northwest and southwest. Moving north to Christchurch, I had 2 or 3 antennas between 400 and 600 feet long, around the farm. Then at Leithfield Beach, north of Christchurch, where we had a bach for 34 years, I used 2 antennas 200 feet long, running north and northeast. Leithfield rates as my best DX location.

I was always a medium wave DXer and, until we started the North Otago Branch in 1949 (I was the first Branch President), was always listening on my own. My best verifications are Canary Islands 1500 2kw, JOBQ Japan 1160kHz with 50 watts and KDMA 1450kHz with 100 watts. My most unusual QSL is KIVY with 250 watts on 1570. XERF usually dominated that channel, but one night they went off the air for an hour while I was listening to them, and right behind them KIVY came up with a Frequency Check. Their QSL said that my report was their first from NZ.

When the DX League was administered from Christchurch, I was Assistant Editor, Assistant Printer and Odd-Jobs Boy. At the time I had the third largest chicken hatchery in the South Island and was working 85 hours a week, so I didn't have much time for anything else. But I did start the Canterbury Branch (mid-1950's?) and again was their first Branch President).

Over the years I have attended many DX League conventions, including Canterbury (1957, 1960, 1964, 1968 & 1971), Invercargill (1957 & 1959), Otago (1958), and North Otago (1998 & 2008).

The enjoyment that I (and Hazel) have got out of the DX hobby over many years was the wonderful friends we have made. I think this is where all members can participate – support your nearest branch, attend any conventions you can, get to know other members, and share your DX catches and triumphs with others. They might be able to help you identify some station, and you might help them."

(Thanks Don for the interesting report on your DXing past, and we appreciate your support for the rejuvenating Canterbury Branch! As well as the DX interest, Don collects old boys and girls comics and annuals. He has many Rupert annuals and one of the largest G.A.Henty collections in the country. As well, there's his role as a Justice of the Peace for 38 years, and 18 years as a Marriage Celebrant. Hope you keep active for many years to come Don! Ed)

TIWAI LISTENING POST Members will be saddened to learn that this special DX location was recently badly vandalised, with all antenna and battery connections ripped out, as well as the solar panel removed. The Invercargill Police have visited the site and the matter is now with the CIB Burglary Squad. We extend our heartfelt concern to **PAUL ARONSEN** and others who have plans for DXpeditions to Tiwai in the coming months. Such a senseless act.

BROADBAND OVER POWERLINES (BPL) We reported some years ago on trials to introduce this technology (also known as PLC – power line communications or PLT – power line technology) into NZ. Those trials in 2002-03 proved unsatisfactory but we need to remain vigilant that this significant threat to listening to shortwave radio does not take hold here. **JOHN WRIGHT** in Australia, reporting to **Hardcore DX** earlier this month, believes wireless networks and wireless cards mean it is unlikely there will be a

demand in Australia for using powerlines to access the Internet. But in other countries it has already forced some SWLs and DXers to give up their hobby altogether.

So what exactly is BPL, PLC or PLT? Here's how an article in the UK Guardian newspaper last October explained it: "Fed up of your wireless network? Tired of the fact that your PS3 can't seem to find your router through two walls and a radiator? You're not alone. PLC adaptors utilise your home's electricity wiring to extend your broadband network and are increasing in popularity at an impressive rate. According to the Homeplug Powerline Alliance (www.homeplug.org/home), 16 million units were sold in 2007, 8 million more than 2006."

The article writer trialled a couple of D-Link DHP-300 PLC adapters which promise 200 Mbps speed and plugand-play performance. One adaptor was plugged into a mains socket near his computer Router and connected it with an Ethernet cable. The other adaptor was plugged in a mains socket 2 floors away, using another Ethernet



cable there to hook up his computer game consoles.

"The two adapters found each other within about 20 seconds, and the result has been reliable, Ethernet-quality broadband access, with a huge reduction in latency. At around UK£90 for a pack of two adaptors it's not cheap, but it meant I didn't have to install a wireless booster on the first floor, or attempt to lay an Ethernet cable between my attic and my living room." (via Mike Barraclough reporting to DXLD Yahoo Group)

So that's the good news, but there's the downsides. Of most concern to us is the RF interference these devices radiate, which can knock out shortwave radio reception within the immediate vicinity, including neighbouring properties. Recently we heard from **TOSHI OHTAKE** of the Japan Shortwave Club about the situation in Japan. Toshi writes that JSWC have filed an objection against the approval of the latest PLC equipment made by the Ministry of Interior and Communications. Some academic data experiments "show very high noise level preventing satisfactory listening to the Radio Nikkei" broadcasts on shortwave. "This means NO DXing is expected in neighbouring houses. Almost 100 listeners joined this filing. We expect a formal hearing will be conducted soon for a technical re-evaluation of the approval."

Meantime in Europe and North America the situation looks even more serious. An American Amateur Radio Newsline Report dated November 14, 2008 quotes news reports stating that "IBM says it wants to bring high speed Internet to rural areas of the nation using Broadband over Powerline technology. The company has penned a US\$9.6 million contract with International Broadband Electric Communications (IBEC) to deliver high-speed broadband connectivity to millions of people who both companies claim might otherwise not be able to get it. The Wall Street Journal reported that IBM and IBEC are working with over a dozen electric cooperatives in 7 American states. IBM will provide the data technology while IBEC will actually manage the networks. For years the supporters of BPL have hoped that it would allow power companies to become the third alternative in the broadband market, competing against cable operators and telephone companies. But technical limitations and interference issues with radio systems including those used by ham radio operators have stood in the way of mass adoption.

Deploying any new infrastructure whether it's wired or wireless won't be cheap. Even with the powerlines already in place, some reports say that it could take years before rural Americans get high-speed Internet. And other technologies, such as 4G wireless may offer lower cost and higher speeds with fewer technical issues than BPL. Also, an article in the latest IEEE Communications Magazine reports on a research effort by NATO that shows that BPL would cause interference to military communications systems. (VHF Reflector, KOSQ, K2GW, KB6NU and various other published news reports via Glenn Hausers IDXD Yahoo Group)

60 YEARS AGO

In the January 1948 issue of the NZ DX Times, editor MERV BRANKS' front-page editorial features the excellent DX opportunities for North American medium wave stations. "There are now 1803 licensed stations in the USA alone (compared with 4778 AM stations today! Ed). This augurs well for the future of our hobby." The editorial also mentions 3XC Timaru officially opening on 18 January "in furtherance of the National Broadcasting Service's policy of Dominion-wide coverage. Each station opened means at least one channel blocked for early evening reception. Yes, DX is a tough game but the thrills are many. The more hours one spends at the receiver, the bigger the dividends it pays. Here's to a gloriously successful DX year in 1949". Shortwave listening highlights reported to the magazine by **ARTHUR CUSHEN** included the new ABC Sydney station VLI2 on 6090kcs and VLI3 on 9500kcs, the latter suffering severe interference from XEWW Mexico prior to 6pm. According to a guick QSL, the 2kw transmitters were located at Liverpool. Arthur also reported Radio Monte Carlo on 3 frequencies - 6035, 9500 (audible after Sydney closed down at 8.15pm) and 11800kcs. The British Far East Broadcasting Service Singapore was to test during February in preparation for relays of the NZ Cricket Team's tour of the United Kingdom. Philippine radio station prefixes changed from KZ to DU, DY or DZ, and the BBC was operating on 86 different shortwave frequencies. There were 8 contributors to the Shortwave Mailbag whilst 20 contributed to an extensive Broadcast Mailbag and 13 to a long Trail. **LLOYD WARBURTON** logged **WXLI Guam on** 1380 closing at 1.30am; ALBERT STANTON reported that his QSL from KXOX was his 819th from North America; **LLOYD CLAYDEN'**s verie from WKNX (Saginaw Michigan 1210) said his was their first overseas report.
