RECEPTION OF THE BBC WORLD SERVICE

As a result of the frequency changes at the end of March (A09), I have been monitoring the BBC to get a revised list of "good" frequencies to listen to their World Service. I hope the frequency list below, received on a Sangean ATS 909 using a 27ft wire antenna, will help. You should remember that the BBC no longer broadcast directly to the Pacific and any reception is a result of receiving broadcasts targeted to other areas of the World. Also, the BBC have greatly reduced their frequencies and transmission hours world wide, thus limiting reception in NZ. The reception of any given frequency will vary from hour to hour and day to day. However, I, or David Norrie have heard the BBC on all these frequencies, frequencies in bold type giving the best reception. My thanks to David Norrie for the initial information.

MADAGASCAR:

At the NASB Annual Meeting, May 08, recent events surrounding Madagascar World Voice (the African shortwave project of World Christian Broadcastina) were discussed by Charles Caudill. Madagascar had a rather violent coup d'etat recently. WCB was good friends with the former president. WCB began hearing of problems in December 2008 through the ambassador. On January 27^{th} , they found that the rioting had escalated and that their warehouse was attacked at random and destroyed. The loss is estimated to be between \$50,000 and \$100,000. They got a roadblock to protect the actual building site. The US Embassy advised that their staff leave the country. They hid equipment and then evacuated the American staff. They left an 11 man security force in-place. An army commander then offered to provide protection as long as WCB would provide food. Work continues at the site; great progress is being made. They had to reschedule some of the work - especially the electrical work due to the theft of wire. What about the state of the country? The new president is in power and is being supported by the communists who were formerly in power. Things are in a mess. Tax and customs revenues are down. Education is in a mess. Government funds will probably start running empty by the end of this month. The former president is planning to return with support from other countries. Everyone is hoping for a peaceful return rather than a civil war. WCB is trying to keep a low profile and keep doing its business in the meantime. The population in Madagascar is 50% Christian, 45% tribal, and 5% Muslim. The new president has no religious affiliation; the old president was Presbyterian. (NASB Newsletter, May 2009)

Re 9-024: As I reported in my previous e-mail, Cameroon is indeed still on the air on 6005 with poor audio including a distinctive hum. Some observations from 6005 kHz:14/03/2009, 0700, audio heard under BBCWS. 0706, Cameroon in the clear, distorted audio, unidentified language.

16/03/2009, 1300, tone jingle, talk (news headlines) in English, followed by French. 1305, ID in English "The National Station of the CRTV", then listing of FM frequencies in major cities but no mention of shortwave. 1307 programme in English about the Pope's upcoming visit to Cameroon.16/03/2009, 1700, heavy interference from Russia and Iran but Cameroon still heard briefly underneath, then transmitter seemed to go off I'm not surprised the signal isn't getting out very far. At my location in Niger State, Nigeria it is not strong. Reception is a little better in a location I visit further east in Nigeria. It may be that they sign off 6005 at 1700. I have not been able to find any night time frequency (James MacDonell, Niger State, Nigeria, March 20,

DX LISTENING DIGEST) Thanks, James! Once upon a time, it was 3970 (gh)

XEQM, Mérida, presumed, on 6105 with het as befits a station always reported 100-300 Hz on the lo side, but I did not try to measure it, June 24 at 0618, upbeat music with live DJ, sometimes talking over, timechex. Did not get ID other than slogan "la más grande". Some fading, and mostly music until 0635. The het probably came from BBC Ascension in French, 27 degrees at 0600-0630 only (Glenn Hauser, OK, WORLD OF RADIO 1466, DX LISTENING DIGEST)

Sky TV ready to flick its UHF switch

Sky UHF network customers have until the end of next month to switch over to the pay-TV provider's digital service before it turns off the network.

The broadcaster announced early last year that it would no longer be accepting new UHF subscribers as the company's transmitting equipment, installed in 1990, started falling apart.

The transmitters generally last for about 15 years but no one makes the equipment anymore and the parts are hard to find.

Sky chief executive John Fellet had said UHF was either going to be turned off or fall apart and the firm started pushing to convert its customers to its digital offerings.

The network has now committed to closing the UHF system, starting on August 31 in Taupo. The company hopes to have the process completed throughout the country within six months.

Sky spokesman Tony O'Brien said UHF had about 300,000 subscribers in 1995 and the company had reduced that to about 25,000 customers.

He said the digital option, which has run since 1998, had "much more variety, stacks more channels".

"As we had to close it down we're just moving them across, giving them a very compelling offer to move across to our digital, and it's going exceptionally well."

Mr O'Brien said the digital service was not a more expensive option but was a "completely different network with a whole host of different options and package choices for [customers] so it depends what they pick".

The broadcaster would send out installers to every UHF home to put up new satellite dishes for the digital network at no cost to the customer, he said.

Sky moved its live broadcasts of the Warriors league team from Sky Sport 1 to digital-only Sky Sport 2 to move people away from the now-decrepit technology. About 10,000 people migrated once that happened.

Sky plans to hand its UHF and radio spectrum back to the Government and trade them for digital terrestrial bandwidth.

Pay, free-to-air TV clash over sport offerings

A new report by the Productivity Commission says the list of sports offered first to free-to-air TV is anti-competitive and it should be changed.

Currently free-to-air stations have first dibs on more than 1,300 sporting events.

But pay TV networks Foxtel and Austar claim it is unfair and argue the findings by the Productivity Commission supports their case.

Earlier this year Channel Ten launched Australia's first free 24-hour sports channel, OneHD, and the ABC launched iView, a new way to watch TV on the internet.

The Productivity Commission says the media landscape in Australia has taken a big leap forward in recent times and anti-siphoning law should be changed to reflect that.

It says the legislation which allows free-to-air TV stations the first pick of major sports broadcast rights is anti-competitive.

Foxtel and regional pay TV network Austar have seized on the commission's recommendations.

Steve Bracks, who heads up pay TV lobby group ASTRA, says the Federal Government needs to act on the recommendations and reduce the number of sporting events free TV has to choose from.

"Clearly, it's corrected, it is a relic of the past and it needs to change," he said.

"It's the biggest anti-siphoning list in the world.

"It's holding back economic value in our economy that could gain to sport and codes of sport around the country, which would in turn go to their members and we'd like to see more seen and obviously live to air, and as big a range as possible.

"So, we support this change."

'Unfair' calls

But Wayne Goss, who chairs the free TV industry group, says the drastic changes called for by pay TV are unfair.

"Pay TV obviously want more sport because that's their business and they charge people for it," he said.

"Free-to-air broadcasters, which include the commercial networks that we represent, want to have sport there that they can broadcast to the public free of charge."

Media analyst Steve Allen, from Fusion Strategy, says the lobby groups for both sides are powerful.

He says changing anti-siphoning laws could have political implications.

"Most of the debate that you and I are discussing and your listeners are listening in to is a debate between people who can make commercial gain out of these rights," he said.

"It's the public that really count and from the Government's point of view it's probably the public that can do the most damage to a Government if it steps in the wrong direction."

A spokesman for Stephen Conroy, the Federal Minister for Communications, says a discussion document about changing anti-siphoning laws will be released in the coming weeks. A final decision will be made by the end of the year.

How does a station's power affect the signal you receive? Commentary by Mike Butler (July Editor)

The slick answer is of course: the greater the power, the more it will bend my needle.

Your needle is your S Meter's indicator or those five lights which sometimes don't shine at all, but are supposed to tell the signal strength. But unless you've a Drake or similar, it probably doesn't do that exactly, either!

Let's have a look at an ideal S Meter. It indicates strengths at levels S0 to S9 and above that in decibels (dB) - which are units used to compare power levels. Each S point is a 6db level change from the next one. Plus 6dB corresponds to a power increase of 4 times. Minus * 6dB corresponds to a power decrease of the original power divided by 4 i.e. a quarter of the original power level - or down one S point.

So our ideal S Meter scale will in effect be (with the dB levels and signal level descriptions) \underline{SO} +6dB $\underline{S1}$ +6dB $\underline{S2}$ +6dB $\underline{S3}$ +6dB $\underline{S4}$ +6dB $\underline{S5}$ +6dB $\underline{S6}$ +6dB $\underline{S7}$ +6dB $\underline{S8}$ +6dB $\underline{S9}$...etc. dB: 6 12 18 24 30 36 42 48 54 Descr. faint very weak weak fair fairly good good mod.strong strong excellent

We remember that a quarter of the original power corresponds to *-6dB or down one S point then:

If a 1 megawatt station produces an S9 excellent/or a S6 good/ or S4 fair /or S3 weak signal, then a 250kW (1MW/4)produces an S8 strong /or a S5 f.gd /or S3 weak /or S2 v.weak -do- and a 62kW \ (250/4) produces an S7 mod.strg/or a S4 fair /or S2 v.weak /or S1 faint signal.

If a 500kW station produces an S9 excellent/ or a S6 good / or S4 fair /or S3 weak signal, then a 125kW (500/4) produces an S8 strong / or a S5 f.gd /or S3 weak /or S2 v.weak -do- and a 31kW (125/4) produces an S7 mod.strg/ or a S4 fair /or S2 v.weak /or S1 faint signal.

If a 250kW station produces an S9 excellent/ or a S6 good / or S4 fair /or S3 weak signal, then a 62kW (250/4) produces an S8 strong / or a S5 f.gd /or S3 weak /or S2 v.weak -do- and a 16kW (62/4) produces an S7 mod.strg/ or a S4 fair /or S2 v.weak /or S1 faint signal.

If a #100kW station produces an S9 excellent/ or a S6 good / or S4 fair /or S3 weak signal, then a #25kW (100/4) produces an S8 strong / or a S5 f.gd /or S3 weak /or S2

v.weak -do- and a #6kW (25/4) produces an S7 mod.strg/ or a S4 fair /or S2 v.weak /or S1 faint signal.

Now it is possible to compare the strength of signals produced by stations operating at many different power levels.

Examples: If a 250kW station produces a fair signal, then a 62kW station will produce a weak one. If a 16kW station produces a fair signal, then a 250kW one will produce a good signal. If a 25kW station produces a weak signal then a 100kW one will produce a fair signal.

Other values can readily be obtained by changing the numbers # above. Or starting at a low power e.g : if 1kW produces S4, fair / (1x4)=4kW produces S5, fairly good / 16kW produces S6, good / 64kW produces S7, moderately strong and so on.

All these calculations assume, in respect of both stations being compared, that they: (1) are at the same location, (2) and have antennas with the same gain in the direction of the signal path to your receiver, (3) at the same time, (4) on, or very close to, the same frequency. The power levels referred to are the E.R.P.(effective radiated power) levels.

Nevertheless, these charts show the general effect on reception resulting from differences in the stations' power outputs. A couple of observations:

1. When the reception is good and a 500kW station is being received at S9 level, a severe drop in power to 31kW is inconsequential- from S9 to S7 - still moderately strong-see Chart.

2. When the reception is mediocre and the 500kW station is heard at only a fair level, the same drop to 31kW would make the signal unusable-S2,very weak, particularly as it is common these days to have a noise level of around S3 strength or more. And even a 125kW station would be suffering under these conditions!

ABC LAUNCHES NEW DIGITAL RADIO STATIONS 3 new ABC music channels were launched on 1 July as ABC Radio goes digital in Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Adelaide and Perth. ABC Radio director Kate Dundas says listeners will have access to the current five ABC Radio services - ABC Classic FM, ABC Radio National, ABC NewsRadio, triple j and the local radio station. But Ms Dundas says listeners will also be able to hear three new music channels - ABC Dig Music, ABC Jazz and ABC Country. Ms Dundas says listeners do not need to rush out and buy a digital radio to hear their current favourite program. "The thing that's important to remember is that all our current services stay on analogue, so no one needs to go out and have a complete switch-over like television will be in a few years," she said. "But yes, you do need to buy a digital radio to receive the services in digital." Ms Dundas says there are plans to extend the service to other capital cities and regional areas. BAHAMAS The current structure and staffing levels at the Bahamas national broadcaster ZNS will have to be critically reviewed, to ensure that its transition to public service broadcasting is smooth and effective, said Tommy Turnquest, the minister responsible for broadcasting in the Bahamas. "As it now stands, ZNS has 253 employees. 80 of these staff members are in management and 173 are line staff. Of that total, 205 work in Nassau and 48 persons work in Freeport, Grand Bahama," Mr Turnquest told parliamentarians in the House of Assembly. "The upshot of the current staffing tables of 80 managers and 173 line staff at the BCB (Broadcasting Corporation of the Bahamas) is that the average ratio of staff to one manager is less than 3:1. "In some cases, management staff has no one to manage. This is a situation that developed as a result of promotions over the years, which were intended to give employees improved wages, but which did not take sufficiently into account the job that actually needed to be done." Mr Turnquest said the issue of funding from advertisements will also have to be considered when ZNS transitions to public broadcasting. "It would not be expected that ZNS, as it moves to public service broadcasting, would be soliciting advertisements," he said. "Currently, the Government provides an \$8 million contribution to ZNS for its operations and \$3 million towards its capital improvement program (digital upgrade)." Mr Turnquest said a decision will also have to be made in respect to the number of stations that the BCB operates once it transitions to public broadcasting. Currently, the BCB operates a national radio service (ZNS-1) on both the AM band and the FM band (where applicable). It will have to determine whether to retain or divest its other two branded stations, Power 104.5FM and Inspiration Station (1240 AM/107.9FM), he said.

THE LONGEST NIGHT Bryan Clark reports....

It was a privilege to host our esteemed Patron Frank Glen and his good wife Margret for a relaxing stay at Mangawhai-by-the-Sea in Northland in mid-June. For me, living in a relatively isolated country area, any opportunity to DX with a fellow enthusiast is a bonus. With the Glen's visit coinciding with the Winter Solstice and the shortest day of the year, it was also a chance to see how early we could hear distant low frequency stations that rely on a darkness path to propagate. There was also the opportunity to get to know Frank better as, whilst he has been a DXer for some 60 years, our paths did not crossed until recent years.

And get to know this most interesting of DXers I did – of his growing up in Invercargill, taking on an electrical apprenticeship, his time as padre and priest to workers on the Manapouri Power Scheme, flying missionary work covering thousands of square miles of inland Australia, serving with Australian Forces in Asia, the return to NZ and time as a Probation Officer, Parish Minister, Lifestyle Farmer. And I discovered common interests in booking collecting, philately, military history, and much more. Frank has written 3 books about their interesting life, as well as academic treatises on church and Australian military history including a soon to be published book on Australian involvement in the NZ (Maori) Wars of the 19th Century. As you might imagine, our conversations ranged far and wide!

But when we weren't talking, we did check the radio dial and fortunately conditions were better than average, with Latin American stations (a lot of them unidentified) on almost every medium wave frequency, and good morning and evening African and Latin signals in the tropical bands. It was good to hear Frank's comparisons with his regular DX listening sessions at Tiwai.

Our earliest fade in on medium wave from the Americas was Peru on 1400kHz, at 0247 UTC on the 21st. Africans were heard on 60 metres shortwave from 0300 UTC. The pick



of DX for me was a mystery station on 1230 that might have been Haiti (a country which I last heard on the broadcast band back in the 1970s).

- 1550 CUBA Radio Rebelde with popular Latin vocals 0409 // shortwave 5025 20/6.
- 1610 ANGUILLA Caribbean Beacon 22/6 with mailing addres for Pastor Scott in Los Angeles at 0410, fair & clear.

GET WELL FRED! We wish long-time Wellington member **FRED HUMPHRIES** a speedy recovery and return to the DX dials following major surgery recently. I've known Fred since the 1970s when he was one of the team who gathered each month to collate, staple, fold and envelope the DX Times copies. Back then we had over 700 subscribers so it was a big job - the DX League only survives today thanks to the volunteer members like Fred working behind the scenes to bring the magazine out. WITHER THOSE SUNSPOTS? The lack of sunspots continues to suppress reception of broadcasters on higher shortwave frequencies. An international panel of experts -- led by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and sponsored by NASA -- has released a new prediction for the next solar cycle: Solar Cycle 24 will peak in May 2013 with a below-average number of sunspots. "If our prediction is correct, Solar Cycle 24 will have a peak sunspot number of 90, the lowest of any cycle since 1928 when Solar Cycle 16 peaked at 78," said panel chairman Doug Biesecker of NOAA's Space Weather Prediction Centre. The latest forecast revises a prediction issued in 2007. At that time, a sharply divided panel believed solar minimum would come in March 2008 followed by either a strong solar maximum in 2011, or a weak solar maximum in 2012. "It turns out that none of our models were totally correct," said Dean Pesnell of the Goddard Space Flight Center and NASA's lead representative on the panel. "The Sun is behaving in an unexpected and very interesting way."

"Right now - June 2009 - the solar cycle is in a valley, the deepest of the past century. In 2008 and 2009, the Sun showed some of the lowest sunspot counts on record, as well as weak solar winds and a low solar irradiance, going more than two years without a significant solar flare. "In our professional careers, we've never seen anything quite like it," Pesnell said. "Solar minimum has lasted far beyond the date we predicted in 2007." In recent months, however, Pesnell said that the Sun has begun to show some small signs of life: Small sunspots and "proto-sunspots" are popping up with increasing frequency. Enormous currents of plasma on the Sun's surface are gaining strength and slowly drifting toward its equator. Radio astronomers have detected a tiny but significant uptick in solar radio emissions. All these things are precursors of an awakening Solar Cycle 24 and form the basis for the panel's new, almost unanimous forecast.

Pesnell cautioned optimism, telling the ARRL that there is an "error bar of +/- 20." This means Solar Cycle 24's sunspot number could be as high as 110, or as low as 70. "Based upon my own personal research, I don't think we'll see 90 [sunspots in Solar Cycle 24]," he said. (ARRL via RAY CRAWFORD)

60 YEARS AGO

The League Ladders made their first appearance in the July 1949 issue of the NZ DX Times. Topping shortwave was **ARTHUR CUSHEN** with 1020 QSLs, whilst **ALBERT STANTON** topped MW with 1209 and **DAVE THOMAS** had 3750 Amateur verifications. Today, we salute 3 surviving League members from the original Broadcast Band Ladder **KEN MACKEY** (617 QSLs), **KEITH ROBINSON** (432) and **DON REED** (205). **ROSS GIBSON** with 100 QSLs is the only shortwave survivor. The DX Times first Amateur column edited by **RON GRAY** also appeared in July 1949. 6 members contributed including **GEORGE GOODSIR** with 64 countries verified on 20 metres and new member **ERNIE MOORE** of Brisbane. Ernie also reported a lot of shortwave Latin Americans to that issue.

The front page editorial contained more details of how the Second Rugby Test from South Africa was only heard in NZ thanks to 4ZB technicians being onsite at **KEN MACKEY's** Longbeach crib to tape the shortwave commentary, rush it to Dunedin by taxi, and then put 4YA on the air at 5am to rebroadcast the recording up to Makara for wider rebroadcast. The All Black rugby commentaries by Winston McCarthy were heard over stations ZUD24 Pretoria 8695kcs and ZRB Waterkloef Air Station on 9110.

The shortwave news included an exclusive story about Radio Batavia's new 100kw General Electric transmitter, due to start testing shortly. Salisbury, Southern Rhodesia was being heard testing on 3320kcs.

FRANK WILSON reported that, with his QSL from 5AL Alice Springs (30 watts), he had all Australian MW stations verified. A response from KCOY was his 99th Californian QSL. **BILL MARSH** in Invercargill was hearing medium wave Europeans from 6.30am till after 9am some days, plus Japanese stations opening at 7am. A new station "BBC Calling from Ceylon" was being heard on 930kcs with AIR news at 3.30am, and a BBC bulletin at 4am.

Under "DX History/Recordings," more recordings of Brazilian stations, these from 90 meters. Brazil on 90 m. was always tough at my QTH, as these recordings demonstrate. Reception windows were narrow, signals were of mediocre strength, and there was always a lot of noise. Here are six from years past. Listen carefully for the IDs. (1) Lins Radio Clube, 3225 kHz., 1980, ID at :54; (2) R. Educadora, Uberlandia, 3345, 1978, IDs at :23 and :36; (3) R. Iguatemi, Osasco, 3295, 1978, ID at :18; (4) R. Nacional de Sao Gabriel, 3375, 1980, ID at :36; (5) R. Tamandare, Recife, 3265, 1978, ID at :19; and (6) R. Tapuyo, Mossoro, 3295, 1977, ID at :16.

In "days of yore," many of the larger SWBC stations issued informative printed schedules to listeners on their mailing list. Some of these contained extensive program, time and frequency information. Under "DX History/Stations," we have posted one such schedule from Radio Australia. This one is from April 1951 (it was issued quarterly).
