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

Radio Mada Internationale back on shortwave

Radio Mada Internationale, the station that supports the deposed president of Madagascar Marc Ravalomanana, has resumed shortwave broadcasts. Glenn Hauser reports receiving information from WRN that the broadcasts are at 1530-1600 UTC on 15640 (changing to 15670 kHz as from 25 October) from Moldova. Currently the broadcasts are on Saturdays and Sundays only.

The reactivation of shortwave is connected with the GTT (Gasy Tia Tanindrazana) which describes itself as a collective of various associations and individuals from Madagascar, Europe and other countries opposed to the coup in Madagascar, that is striving for respect and legality. Radio Mada Internationale now describes itself as the radio station of the GTT. (RN NEWS)

POLAND:

Polish Radio secures new shortwave provider

CHINA:

New SW radio station launches in Nanning, China

Tony Harding, a Hong Kong-based journalist covering the 6th China-ASEAN Expo, has just sent us this report:

Guangxi People's Radio and China Radio International today launched a new radio service - Beibu Bay Radio - "Voice of Guangxi Beibu Gulf". The station broadcasts on a network of 15 FM frequencies and 2 shortwave transmitters across Southern China from studios in Nanning, Guangxi province. The station will be on the air from 0700-2400 daily (2300-1600 UTC), in Mandarin, Cantonese, Vietnamese, Thai and English.

There are DX opportunities to hear the station on 5050 kHz and 9820 kHz, and on the Web at www.bbrmedia.com. The main English language programme, called The Hot Pot Show (This a Chinese form of eating, not a reference to the Golden Triangle in South East Asia), is from 1600-1800 local time (0800-1000 UTC).

At the opening ceremony, attended by the consuls of Thailand, Cambodia and Vietnam, the wish was expressed that the station will be able to give China's angle on events and trade in the area.

The launch of the station coincides with the 6th China-ASEAN Expo being held in the city and is also in preparation for the 1 January 2010 removal of trade tariffs between the 11 countries to form the biggest free trade area in the world. China is attempting to bolster cooperation as well as projecting a more favourable image abroad. (Source: Tony Harding for Media Network)

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Some 250 FM changes planned for 2010

Some 250 frequency changes will take place within NZ in preparation for the issue of new 20 year licences from April 2 2011. These are expected to resolve interference issues and make better use of the spectrum.

Radio New Zealand is affected by about 10% of the changes, with most of the adjustments being minor ones within the 101 range, and most scheduled to take place between April-November 2010.

However, the first change took place on October 22 when RNZ Concert in Akaroa moved from 95.3 to the new frequency of 95.1.

So, if you're interested in collecting FM QSL's then the next few months give you an opportunity to log and verify existing frequencies, before you can start adding to your collection again from April as the 250 or so changes occur.

This is a once in a 20 year DX opportunity, and at the same time, you can build your own record of New Zealand's FM radio dial as it currently is. (David Ricquish, Wellington)

Radio New Zealand Frequency Change

All of Radio New Zealand's AM and FM licences expire on 2 April 2011 and new 20-year licences will apply from that date.

However, as this is a one-in-20 year chance to fix up any interference or inefficient use of spectrum issues, the Radio Spectrum Management division of MED are requiring some frequencies to change. There will be about 250 frequency changes across the country and about 25 will affect Radio NZ's two FM networks.

Most of the Radio New Zealand National changes are slight adjustments within the 101 part of the band, but some of Radio New Zealand Concert's changes are significant. Most of the changes will take place between April and November next year but the first one is taking place in October 2009.

Frequency Change notification Concert's Akaroa frequency changed from 95.3 to 95.1 during the early hours of Thursday 22 October.

LPFM Channels to Change

Consultations are now underway and more are planned regarding some major changes to LPFM. It's now planned to shift the lower LPFM band to 87.5-88.3 at the same time as allowing a very long promised power increase to 1 watt.

This allows mainstream FM stations to move into the vacated LPFM channels, probably as part of the 250 or so FM frequency changes scheduled during 2010 ahead of the new 20 year licences from 2011.

The new licences will be expensive, the Rhema Broadcasting Group anticipating costs running into millions of dollars just to keep their existing four radio networks on the air. (David Ricquish, Wellington)

Chatham Islands FM Radio War - Radio Roskat blows Radio Weka off the Dial

For many years, Radio Weka, broadcasting from a tin shack near Waitangi in the Chatham Islands, has been the 'only' local radio station for these isolated islands far to the east of New Zealand.

Operated by the Chatham Islands Radio & TV Society, Radio Weka broadcast on 92.2 FM and was operated by volunteers. The Society has also been responsible for the local TV station, which broadcast an analog signal with [originally] tapes shipped across from the mainland or relays of TVNZ's TV1 via a satellite dish.

In recent months, the Chatham Islands Community Focus Trust obtained funding from the Chatham Islands County Council to begin a new radio station, and Radio Roskat began broadcasts on 95.3 FM in September.

The frequency remains licenced to the NZ Racing Board.

The people behind Radio Roskat asked Radio Weka for help with radio gear, since Radio Weka had gone silent. Their request was rejected.

A local councillor noted that since most islanders now had SKY TV dishes, they no longer needed the local TV transmitter, and, in fact, couldn't pick up the signals anyway and, he added, 'no-one is tuned in to Radio Weka' either.

The SKY TV channel line up includes a number of stereo digital radio channels including Radio New Zealand's National Radio which also has a low power FM relay at Waitangi on 89.7 FM. The relay is managed by the same Society that runs Radio Weka and the TV station.

It looks like new technology has made the efforts of the old Society redundant, and with digital radio and TV coverage now readily available, the old arrangements are being swept away. Even Radio Roskat will be using broadband to receive programs from the mainland, as well as originating its own local community programs.

For some years, 'Radio Roscoe' has also been operating on the main island, with its owner saying he had 'enough wattage to blow Radio Weka' away as he powered country and pop music across the windswept flatlands of Chatham Island.

It seems that Radio Roskat is now doing exactly that, blowing Radio Weka away. However, with Radio Weka still holding on to its radio gear, it may yet emerge out of its current silence to provide competition on the [very] uncrowded local airwaves.

[For many years, Radio Chathams [ZLC] was a little known DX target on shortwave, sitting in its

very own timezone 45 minutes ahead of the rest of New Zealand. Local staff often broadcast news, music and other local programs for entertainment from the transmitters that otherwise kept the islands in touch with the mainland and maintained

24/7 shipping radio watch far off the eastern coast of the New Zealand mainland.

American Samoa Manu'a Islands FM Plan for KKHJ-FM & WVUV-FM

Isolated from the main island of American Samoa, and out of range of local FM stations in Pago Pago, residents of the Manu'a island group usually rely on the AM service of 2AP in nearby independent Samoa for radio coverage at times of natural emergency, and also for plain old fashioned entertainment.

Now, South Seas Broadcasting has offered to locate low powered FM relay transmitters on each of the islands involved - Tau, Ofu and Olosega - so they can become connected to American Samoa.

Larry Fuss, GM of the broadcasting company which operates KKHJ-FM and WVUV-FM says there's no commercial business on the islands, but he's willing to provide the service if the US\$150,000 involved to set the broadcasts up can be found.

Currently, it's one of the requests contributed to American Samoa's plans for a share of the US Federal Stimulus Package funding. No decisions have yet been made on the proposal, which may also be connected with other plans for broadband and cable services.

The idea was raised several months ago, before the recent earthquakes and tsunami revealed how more isolated the islanders really are, and when KKHJ-FM stayed on the air as the tsunami smashed into the ground floor of their office building in Pago Pago.

KKHJ-FM broadcasts a contemporary hit music format mainly in English, and WVUV-FM 'The People's Station' broadcasts traditional and contemporary Samoan music. Both stations would have relays on each of the three islands thus ending many decades of radio isolation. (David Ricquish, Wellington)

Veteran Broadcasters Launch New FM 88.1 Station

NUKU'ALOFA (/Matangi Tonga/Pacific Media Watch/): Tonga's newest media company, BroadCom-TMN Group has launched a new FM 88.1 radio station and television production unit at Ngele'ia.

BroadCom is owned and operated by Maka Tohi, a former chief engineer for the Tonga Broadcasting Commission and wife Katalina, a former Television Tonga manager who retired from the TBC in May after nearly 30 years service.

FM 88.1, is the fifth FM station in Nuku'alofa and will offer a 24 hour Tongan language service, covering only Tongatapu and Eua. News bulletins will be presented both in Tongan and English, while on Sundays, they will be devoted to church programmes.

Katalina Tohi said they hoped to extend their coverage nationwide before December.

The BroadCom's staff is headed by former TBC staff, Siaosi Lavaka as the chief operation manager and news editor; and 'Anolo Manu as chief announcer.

Katalina tohi said that with television they were buying airtime from Kalafi Moala's Taimi Media Network TV2.

"We will not be doing any television news, we will just focus on producing Tongan programmes, which will be slotted in the TV2 programmes when it is available," she said. "But we are hoping to get a separate television channel that we can use to broadcast educational programmes in the future," she added.

Katalina Tohi confirmed BroadCom signed an agreement with the Taimi Media Network to lease their radio licence for the next five years.

She explained this was because government had to date not made any official response to their licence application, which was lodged in March.

TMN TV2 on the other hand leases airtime from TV Tonga2 to broadcast its news items and other programmes running daily from 5.30pm to 11.30pm.

"We are just thankful for Kalafi's assistance because we are up and running, which is the main thing in relation to performing our role as informants of the public ", she said.

The new media company was launched by 'Alisi Taumopeau, Tonga's former Minister of Justice.

Freeview on the up in New Zealand

New Zealand edging closer to digital switch over.

Nearly 300,000 New Zealand households are now receiving digital Freeview television, according to the latest sales figures released by Freeview New Zealand.

The company said in a statement that the New Zealand uptake of Freeview was "well above forecast and at a quicker rate per capita than the majority of countries that have made the switch to digital television".

The latest figures, for the three months ending September 2009, indicated that 291,853 Kiwi households were now receiving Freeview. That included 113,936 users with Freeview HD boxes.

Freeview general manager Sam Irvine said of the growth had been driven by the increasing number of free-to-air channels now available on the service, including the recent inclusion of Prime TV.

He said the strong Freeview uptake, coupled with the high number of people who now had Sky TV subscriptions, meant that 60% of New Zealanders now received digital TV.

Broadcasting minister Jonathan Coleman has said that the government will announce a final date to switch all channels to digital when the digital television uptake reaches 75%, or in 2012, whichever occurs first.

Irvine said the arrival of TiVo next month would further increase the uptake of Freeview and digital TV further. "It has two Freeview tuners in the back so it's got to be good for Freeview."

The recent global recession had resulted in many people on analogue TV deciding to upgrade to digital using a Freeview box rather than Sky because Freeview did not require an ongoing subscription, he said.

The League - 46 years ago!

In 1963, while living in Rotorua, I wrote articles on Shortwave listening for the Radio and Electrical Review, a monthly magazine for the electronics industry. Recently, I was amazed to find in the October issue of that year, my article on local listeners' clubs. The two that were mentioned were the New Zealand DX Radio Association and our DX League. It was even more surprising to me that I had written, "The writer subscribes to both as he considers them complementary - each having much individual merit for the regular listener." Because I still have my original member's certificate from the Radio Association, I could remember that, but not the League. After all, 46 years is a real test for the memory. So here is my 1960s-style description of how things were then:

"THE NEW ZEALAND RADIO DX LEAGUE was established as such in 1949 and publishes the monthly bulletin "The New Zealand DX Times." This organization appears to be concerned more actively with competitive listening and has gained much publicity from the activities of the well-known DX'er, Arthur Cushen, both Mr. Cushen's articles in New Zealand and Australian publications and Radio New Zealand broadcasts.

The "Times" runs to about twelve pages beginning like "Tune In" with editorial comment and Branch news. Active branches are situated at Auckland, Taranaki, Hutt Valley, Oamaru, Canterbury, Otago and Southland. The Broadcast and Shortwave sections are kept apart, the former being given the colourful name of "Kings of the Kilocycles" and corresponds to the second section of the other magazine. Shortwave is dealt with by Mr. Cushen in his "Shortwave Review" being a page of loggings arranged in order of frequency drawn from his own observations with the assistance of a group of about a dozen other contributors.

"On the Shorter Wavelengths" is a presentation of members' loggings and verifications given under each name, with call signs, frequencies and time heard being given.

Up to two pages each month are usually set aside as "Feature Pages," describing broadcasting installations and other related subjects. Another column which corresponds with the "Shortwave News-sheet" previously referred to is the occasional page called "From our Exchanges" which lists information received from at least six overseas clubs.

Contests are organized and ladder competitions are encouraged, based on a club points schedule, in turn based on the factors of locality and powers of the stations assessed.

The subscription to the League is 12/6 and inquiries should be addressed to P.O. Box 1356, Christchurch.

Both clubs hold annual meetings or conventions and the opportunity is usually taken on these occasions to combine the formal proceedings with some practical DX using the hosts' equipment. Suitable report forms, log books and other stationery are also arranged by the clubs or purchase by members. These greatly facilitate reporting to stations, if this is undertaken."

So that was the way it was. Incidently, the Radio Association also charged 12/6 per year. But they also charged an additional 5/- for initial registration. I think it was for that flashy certificate. Maybe if the League had done that, I should never have forgotten that I too was a member long ago !

Frequent voice ID's are inserted in the automated music programs along with the 'Nostalgia Nostalgia' music jingle.

2009 AGM REPORT

The League's 61st Annual General Meeting in Auckland on Sunday 25 October 2009 opened with President **BRYAN CLARK** welcoming members present. A minute's silence was held in memory of those members who had passed away in the past year – Life Member **DON REED**, former National Secretary **EVAN MURRAY**, and **COLIN CAMPBELL**.

In Matters Arising from the 60th AGM, the venue of annual meetings was discussed. Bryan explained that between 1949 and 1990, all AGMs had been held in the South Island. Since the Administration of the DX League had moved to Auckland in 1991, most annual meetings had been held there. The League's current constitutional model requires a minimum of 5 voting members for a quorum and has generally meant the AGM was held where most Adcom members are domiciled. Bryan expected the broadening of voting eligibility in the proposed new constitution would make it easier to consider other locations, but desirably needed a hosting branch. In his Patron's report **DR FRANK GLEN** spoke of his busy year in the role, representing the League at NZART events and a DX gathering in Australia. He reported a favourable response from Otago University regarding academic study

into history of radio listening. Frank, together with our Australian member Associate Professor **MARTIN HADLOW**, plans to visit Otago University in the coming months to further this project. He has begun collating details of relevant archival material held by members, as well as at the Hocken Library.

In his President's Report, Bryan thanked those who keep the club operational, in particular Chief Editor MARK NICHOLLS and his 'NZ DX Times' sub-editor team, Secretary/Treasurer PHIL VAN DE PAVERD and other members of the Administration Committee, and not least, the members who contribute to the magazine and support the club in other ways. He spoke of the various difficulties facing DX hobbyists today and the need for the League to 'adapt or die'. His view was that the Internet is key to the League's ongoing survival, and he announced that MARK NICHOLLS would be taking on the additional Webmaster role, whilst PAUL ORMANDY would be setting up and moderating a new Internet-based user group on Yahoo, for League members. "By these measures we can better ensure members get timely information and promote ourselves worldwide", he said.

Adcom initiatives over the past year, both successful and unsuccessful, were reported. Commenting on the constitutional remits to be considered by the meeting, Bryan concluded his report by saying "whatever the outcome, it is unlikely to change the fact that we continue to rely on a very small number of people who give freely of their time and talents to ensure that all of us gain benefit from club membership. I ask you to give them whatever support and encouragement you can in the year ahead".

Presenting the Treasurer's Report, **PHIL VAN DE PAVERD** noted that income was substantially reduced because of the complimentary membership year marking the club's 60th anniversary. Major expenses were the magazine, which had increased printing costs and the 60th anniversary dinner costs. Total funds at the bank on 31 August 2009 totalled \$18,416, compared with \$26,012 a year previously. Membership stands at 181, a net increase of 5 members. Bryan thanked Phil for all his hard work.

In the Chief Editor's Report, **MARK NICHOLLS** thanked his sub-editorial team for the time and effort they put into the magazine, and individual members for their contributions during the year. Since the magazines were being mailed in prepaid envelopes, we don't appear to have had any problems with NZ Post. Commenting on taking up the Webmaster role, Mark said that "while I can see the printed magazine being around for many years, the instant availability of information through the Internet such as the League website, is something I hope to develop, along with maintaining the current printed magazine."

Competition Results were announced by Competitions Secretary ARTHUR DE MAINE, as follows: Best Logging of the Year Broadcast – BRYAN CLARK with V7AB Marshall Islands 1098kHz; Best Shortwave Logging Under 9mHz – BRYAN CLARK with Tajikistan 4765kHz; Best Shortwave Logging Over 9mHz – IAN CATTERMOLE & BRYAN CLARK with Abkhazia 9495; Best Broadcast QSL Of the Year – SUTTON BURTENSHAW with KENI Alaska 650kHz 50kw; Best Shortwave QSL of the Year – BRYAN CLARK with Spider Radio Athens Greece 6925kHz 80 watts; Best FM QSL – DENE LYNNEBERG with 2NBC Sydney 90.1mHz, 200 watts; Merv Branks Memorial Trophy – SUTTON BURTENSHAW with 9 QSLs; Founders Award to Bryan Clark for his continued input to a number of sections of the DX Times and for his valuable all-round input into the League.

Auckland. Auckland Branch will have a stand at NZART's 2010 Annual Conference in Auckland - **BARRY WILLIAMS** and **GRANT MANNING** undertook to investigate participation in the grab-bag supplied to participants. Members were relieved to hear that recent scrub fires had not affected the Tiwai DX Listening House.

Officers elected for the 2009/10 year were President – **BRYAN CLARK**, Vice-President – **DAVID NORRIE**, Secretary – **MIKE BUTLER**, Treasurer – **PHIL VAN DE PAVERD**, Chief Editor – **MARK NICHOLLS**, Competitions Secretary – **ARTHUR DE MAINE**, Auditor – **BRIAN BEYNON** BCA. No nominations were received for Publicity Coordinator – Adcom will investigate co-opting a member to this role.

Previously submitted remits and notices of motion were then debated. The remit from **PAUL ORMANDY** for a working group to consider future options for the League was passed unanimously. **DAVID RICQUISH** withdrew his 5 notices of motion concerning the Constitution, in favour of supporting the related proposal from Adcom for a complete revision. Proposed changes were overviewed, together with initial feedback received from members of the Constitutional Review Group. As a result of the ensuing discussion, the Adcom remit was passed, with changes to draft clauses 3.3 and 6.2. The resulting draft is published elsewhere in this magazine, for member feedback.

It was agreed that subscriptions for 2010 remain at the levels currently published in the DX Times.

Under General Business, **MIKE BUTLER** reported on shortwave propagation conditions during the past year. He acknowledged member contributions to the Bandwatch columns that form the basis of his research. **BRYAN CLARK** reiterated the work being undertaken by **FRANK GLEN** to document what material relating to the early days of radio listening and broadcasting was in private hands, and he hoped members would be able to contribute to this. **BRYAN MARSH** displayed items from the collection of the late **DOUGLAS DOULL**.
