

- 7165 0406 ERITREA, Voice of the Broad Masses of Eritrea, 0406-0427 Oct 31, Horn of Africa vocals by a man followed by a man announcer with talk in local language. More HoA vocals with jammer on 7175 leaving that channel finding its target right hear effectively ruining reception. Fair until jammer opened on frequency. (D'Angelo-PA)
- 7200 2101 SUDAN, Sudan Radio & TV Omdurman, 2101-2104* Nov 1, tuned in to hear a man in Arabic with the news. Carried cut at 2104. Fair. (D'Angelo-PA)

At 2159 a woman announcer with ID: "This is the General overseas Service of All India Radio. Next is the news. Please stand by." Another ID by a man at 2200 followed by the news. At 2210 was a commentary about India relations with the European Union followed by the program "Woman's World" at 2215. Fair to good signal with //6180 poor to fair. D'Angelo-PA)

MONGOLIA

The Voice Of Mongolia is the country's only overseas broadcasting service and is operated by Mongolian Radio & Television, a public service broadcaster of the Mongolian Government.

Short-wave international broadcasting in Mongolia dates back over 30 years.

The first broadcast in September 1964 was a half hour transmission in the Mongolian and Chinese languages, beamed to China. In the next few years, Mongolian international broadcasting expanded in terms of languages used, broadcast hours and target areas. The English service of Radio Ulaanbaatar, which was renamed The Voice Of Mongolia on January 1st, 1997, was launched on January 29th, 1965. Today the output of The Voice Of Mongolia consists of various programmes designed to provide information about Mongolia and the Mongolians, their history, traditions and culture.

Keeping to the new policy of the Mongolian Government, The Voice Of Mongolia does not engage in propaganda, but in unbiased reporting. It broadcasts a total of 8 hours a day in 5 languages - Mongolian, English, Chinese, Russian and Japanese.

TRANSMISSIONS

All of The Voice Of Mongolia's broadcasts come directly from its Khonkhor Transmitting Station, about 25 km east of Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia's capital. It broadcasts through Soviet-made 100, 250, and 500 kW transmitters and curtain antennas built in the mid sixties. You may be able to hear some of our broadcasts which are not directed to your part of the world.

We're informed that our transmissions beamed to East Asia provide fair reception in South America, and the South Asian transmissions can be heard in Southern Africa and in Europe as well. However, this reception is influenced by propagation conditions and frequency congestion. Reception can be improved by adding an external aerial to your receivers whip antenna. Place the wire aerial near or outside your window. Don't place the aerial near electric power lines, and disconnect it from your receiver whenever there is lightning in your vicinity.

HOW TO REPORT

We always welcome reception reports and comments about programmes. All reception reports are acknowledged, and correct reports are confirmed by our QSL cards. Reports should contain the UTC date and the time of reception, the frequency on which the programme was heard, a rundown of the programme so that we can be sure that it was our programme that you heard, a short description of the receiver and aerial used, and your full postal address as well as any suggestions, comments and criticisms you may have. We prefer reports in SINPO code.

Reception reports on cassette tape can also be helpful but we CANNOT return the cassettes. A cassette tape should not have more than 4 or 5 recordings, each lasting not longer than 5 minutes. If you record several transmissions and frequencies on the tape, do not forget to note the frequency and date for every recorded broadcast separately to avoid a later random guess. Personal requests and comments should be written down on a separate sheet of paper so that the recorded report is only a technical one. All reception reports and personal letters should be sent to the station's address marked for a particular language section (e.g. English Section).

The official run of BBR in Guangxi right before the completion of China-ASEAN FTA is believed to further help improve mutual understanding between peoples of China and ASEAN countries, deepen friendship, and accelerate economic development in Guangxi Beibu Bay area, said Shen Beihai, the public relations minister of Guangxi at the launch ceremony.

At the same time, BBR's launch has created a new mode of cooperation between the state and regional media, according to Wang Gengnian, Director-general of China Radio International.

For the first time, China's state international broadcaster joins hands with a local radio station to initiate an international frequency that aims at expressing voice of China to neighboring countries and promoting regional cooperation as well as cultural exchange.

Tian Jin, vice Minister of State Administration of Radio, Film and Television (SARFT) and diplomats from consulate-generals of Thailand, Vietnam and Cambodia also attended the launch ceremony.

Community radio for Blueskin Bay

Community support and a community voice will bring community news over the airwaves to the Blueskin Bay area in the New Year.

Blueskin Bay FM (88.7) started after different groups with thoughts of establishing a radio station came together last month.

After receiving funding from the Waikouaiti Community Board this week, it will be operating in February.

President Brent Bell said many activities and events occurred in Blueskin Bay, which was home to a lot of creative people.

"I don't want to know what's going on in the North Island. Local is the way to go," he said.

The station would be set up in a room at Warrington School with the board of trustees meeting operating costs for the first year.

Waitati School also intended to become involved, which would create a true community station, he said.

Flava to change frequency in Rotorua

TRN has almost 50 changes to make out of a total of 254 frequency changes required throughout New Zealand before April 2011, when the new twenty year licence management rights commence.

The Ministry of Economic Development on behalf of the Crown has worked with broadcasters to clean up the entire FM band for New Zealand as part of the process of moving to the new rights.

"In theory all frequencies could change at midnight 2 April 2011. However, in practice there is insufficient technical resource to do this. All licence holders are being encouraged to move as soon as possible to avoid chaos in early 2011, that's why TRN is making the changes in Rotorua now", says Peter Casey TRN's frequency engineering project manager.

Commercial broadcasters (including TRN) are renewing all Commercial Radio Broadcasting licences for a total cost of \$96M for another 20 years to 2031.

Another Auckland FM Channel in Use

At 2.35pm local time today I discovered a new semi-'local'. Chinese Voice Broadcasting (CVB), part of the World TV Group, has previously broadcast in Mandarin on 936 AM. It is now simulcast on 104.2 FM, and here in Mangawhai the signal is very good, superior to Coast 105.4. World TV Ltd was a bidder for the 104.2 Pukekohe Hill licence, so I presume that the transmission is coming from this South Auckland location. World TV Group's other FM channel 95.8, used for Cantonese broadcasts, wasn't audible today.

I have had an email response from World TV who state: "the new FM 104.2 MHz is currently doing the same programme as 936AM but it might change in the future. The 95.8FM was transferred to FM 99.4 MHz from this morning for some reason and will stay in the frequency permanently. You can try to search the new frequency." Well that explains the absence on 95.8. 99.4 is audible here but only fair signal. **(Bryan Clark, Mangawhai)**

NZ Broadcasting School 96.1 off the air

In Christchurch, the NZ Broadcasting School on 96.1 appears to have closed for the year, only an open carrier is on air. Last summer, the transmitter left the air completely, hopefully the same will be the case this summer.

An off-air Low Power FM (LPFM) transmission audit

Radio Inspectors recently visited the Dargaville area early to track and assess the source of a previously unaudited Low Power FM (LPFM) transmission.

The General User Radio Licence prescribes limits, conditions and a schedule on the operation of LPFM. Section 5 of the schedule specifies a maximum field strength of

112dBµV/m at a reference distance of 10 metres from the transmitting aerial in a 100 kHz resolution bandwidth (of the measurement receiver). Because the signal appeared stronger than expected, and an off-air audit does not require the assistance of the licensee, signal strength measurement was promptly commenced.

After correction for all factors, the measured field strength was calculated as 126dBµV/m at 10m within 100 kHz; 14dB over the limit prescribed. This indicated that the output of the transmitter was slightly over 10 Watts e.i.r.p. Also noted was excessive occupied bandwidth levels against both the LPFM licence schedule and the applicable Table 3 limits prescribed in the Radio communications (Radio Standards) Notice 2008.

As the transmitter was not operating in accordance with the licence conditions, an infringement fine was issued to the company responsible.

Audits aim to ensure that all spectrum users are complying with the terms, conditions and restrictions of the LPFM General User Radio Licence, and fair and equitable access to the radio spectrum is available to as many users as possible.

FM DX Season Well and Truly Underway

If you have an interest in DXing the frequencies above shortwave, this is the time to start listening!

At the weekend I caught my first New Caledonian FMers of the summer season - 88.0 is always the marker station here, for RNC "Radio Nouvelle Caledonie". I also had a wonderful 'tropo' opening on Friday night with Coast Access FM, Kapiti on 104.9 in for several hours late evening, together with Fresh FM, Tasman on 104.8. Today, New Caledonia has been back, along with Queensland FMers! The star performer is indeed the Sony XDR-F1HD, which gives crisp clean signals on each FM channel, unlike my Icom ICR7100 communications receiver. The Sony can deliver RNC 88.0 whereas the Icom has local LPFM 'Smooth Jazz' 88.1 occupying 87.9 to 88.3. If you're serious about FM DX, the Sony is a must - unfortunately only available in the USA! **(Bryan Clark, Mangawhai)**

Email response from frequency owner World TV Group says the new channel may eventually have a different programme. They also confirmed 95.8 replaced by 99.4. The 104.2 transmitter was off the next day, but back on 3 December.

The Sony is producing amazing results DXwise, with every FM channel largely clear of interference from adjacent frequencies.

Paul Rawdon, Christchurch

There have been intermittent signs that DX is starting to warm up a little, nothing on FM but the very occasional appearance of Channel 0.

You mentioned in the November 'DX Times' the reshuffle of FM frequencies and the shift of Concert FM's frequency from 95.3 to 95.1. That was only half of the story, More FM's Southshore translator was also using 95.3, they are now on 94.9 which sadly blocks my reception on Port FM Ashburton on the same frequency. Port FM used to provide a fairly reasonable signal in various parts of Christchurch.

In this case, I suspect the real reason for the frequency changes is to accommodate yet another FM station on 95.3. Since the change, MediaWorks Radio have been broadcasting an engineering test transmission advising More FM listeners of the new frequency.

I am looking forward to testing a new radio which according to reviews is supposed to be an excellent performer on FM it's the Tecsun PL-310 a replacement release of the Tecsun PL- 380 which amongst other things allowed breakthrough of local AM stations throughout it's shortwave range. The PL -310's performance on the other bands has been less than encouraging giving the impression that it is quite deaf to signals. I think that this may be due to the radio having a soft mute function that cannot be turned off. Another annoyance is as whine behind almost all medium wave signals.

One interesting feature the PL-310 does have is a choice of FM ranges; it will ultimately cover 64 MHz to 108 MHz depending up on which of the three range options is selected. It also covers the Australian Channel 2 audio frequencies; it will be interesting to see how it performs.

HAZEL REED It is with considerable sadness that we report the passing of Hazel, widow of League life and foundation member **DON REED**, on 15 November in Christchurch. Under "DX History/Stations," we have posted an interesting historical item from VU2ZP, an early Armed Forces Radio Service station located in Bangalore, India, in the "China-Burma-India" theater. A mediumwave station, it operated on 1355 kc. I don't know much about stamp collecting, but I know a nice looking radio-related stamp when I see one. This week, under "DX History/Philately," we have posted some new philately items: (1) an envelope from HCJB showing the various mediumwave and shortwave frequencies that the station was using at the time (1948, if I read the postmark correctly); (2) a 1979 stamp from Radio Nacional de Bolivia commemorating the station's 50th anniversary; (3) a stamp from Peru depicting the Radio Nacional del Peru antennas and giving the call letters and frequencies of familiar R. Nacional shortwave channels 9562 and 6082 kHz.; (4) a first day cover issued in 1970 to commemorate the fifth anniversary of Trans World Radio transmissions from Bonaire; (5) a first day cover issued in 2008 in recognition of Radio El Salvador; and (6) a great looking 12-stamp sheet issued by Galei Zahal, the Israeli armed forces station, in 2008.

RCA marketed numerous "Globe Trotter" receivers over many years. Under "DX History/ Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns," we have posted a booklet, "The Globe Trotter," that was published in connection with RCA's Globe Trotter receiver of 1937. In addition to a list of the principal shortwave stations of the day (arranged by frequency and by country), a world map, and a list of American and Canadian broadcast band stations, the first few pages contain a good example of the kind of promotion that was embodied in shortwave advertising. "And to these fine radios have been added the adventure and thrill of short wave reception, enabling you to listen to the whole wide world--taking you to those places of which you have read--truly a magic carpet awaits you" -- Under "Specialized Resources" we have posted seven new editions of "Wavescan"--three about radio on St. Helena--"The St. Helena Story" and "The Radio Scene on St. Helena" (both November 8, 2009), and "St. Helena on Mediumwave and Shortwave" (November 15, 2009), and four about radio on Bermuda--"Broadcasting in the Bermuda Triangle" (October 18), "Mediumwave Broadcasting on Bermuda" (October 25), "The Bermuda Story--Ship Broadcasting" (November 15), and "Bermuda on Shortwave" (November 22)

Although White's Radio Log was not the first AM station log, it became the best known; and while it disappeared for a time in the 1950s and again in the 1980s, it also had the longest overall lifespan. Known under various names in its early days, the first issue was published in 1924, and the last in 1985. This week, under "DX History/Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns," we have posted a very early copy of White's, known as White's Mileage and Radio Call Book. This was probably not the first issue of White's; however, this one was published in 1924, which was White's first year of publication. It lists stations by call letters and states (but not by frequency, which came later). It was published in Rhode Island, and the New England flavor of this edition is evident by the mileage chart (p. 16) that is based on Boston, and the hours of operation (p. 18) "of the principal broadcasting stations commonly heard by Mass. radio fans." -- And under "Specialized Resources," we have posted another of Adrian Peterson's "Wavescan" scripts (September 27), this one continuing the story of the BBC at Daventry.

This week, under "Specialized Resources," we have posted the final two parts of Adrian Peterson's five-part "Wavescan" series on the BBC shortwave station at Daventry. The two parts are "BBC Daventry" (October 4, 2009) and "Demise of BBC Daventry" (October 11). To complement these articles, we have also posted, under "DX History/Recordings," a recording of the closedown announcement for BBC-Daventry that was broadcast on March 29, 1992 at 1126 UTC on 15070 kHz., a frequency that had come into use (as GWC) around 1941. (More than one BBC transmitter was operating on 15070 at the time, so the actual moment of Daventry's closedown cannot be discerned on the recording.) An excellent 95-page book about BBC-Daventry, "Daventry Calling the World," was authored by Norman Tomalin in 1998, and is available free on line in PDF format at < http://www.bbceng.info/Books/dx-world/dx-calling-the-world-2008a.pdf >

Under "DX History/General Radio History," a potted history of Soviet jamming, issued by the USIA in May 1987. Soon, nearly all Soviet jamming had stopped.

This week, under "DX History/Equipment & Advertising," something that will bring back memories for SWLs who were active in the late 1950s and early 1960s: a SW equipment feature from the January 1962 issue of Electronics Illustrated. The first six pages contain brief writeups on some of the most popular equipment of the day--the Knight Ocean Hopper, the Space Spanner, the Heathkit AR-3, the National NC-60, the Hallicrafters S-38, the Hammarlund HQ-145X, and others, plus accessories. Following this are three articles on "new" receiver kits of the day--the Heathkit GR-91, the Philmore CR-5AC, and the Knight-Kit R-100. "Those were the days!" -- And under "Specialized Resources," three new "Wavescan" scripts": early radio broadcasting in Irian Jaya (August 23), early wireless stations in the Philippines (August 30), and radio in connection with the 1937 eclipse (September 6).
