I found the SSB signal on 6043.22 over several nights. Finally, with their switch back to 6045 and use of SSB, it was possible to catch the station ident and some commercial sponsors, despite the weak level. BCM



Reception of the BBC World Service (B09)

As a result of the frequency changes at the end of October (B09), I have been monitoring the BBC to get a revised list of "good" frequencies to listen to their World Service. I hope the frequency list below, received on a Kenwood R5000 using a 50ft wire antenna, will help. You should remember that the BBC no longer broadcast directly to the Pacific and any reception is a result of receiving broadcasts targeted to other areas of the World. Also, the BBC have greatly reduced their frequencies and transmission hours world wide, thus limiting reception in NZ. The reception of any given frequency will vary from hour to hour and day to day. However, I have heard the BBC on all these frequencies. Most reception is weak and noisy with good reception an exception. The BBC is almost becoming a DX catch!

CZECH REPUBLIC

On Dec 02, I received an official reply from Dr. Robert Rehák, Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Prague on the official protest from the DSWCI on the planned closure of the External Service of R Prague:

Dear Mr. Petersen.

thank you very much for your letter of October 16, 2009. I would like to appreciate your interest in broadcast of the Czech Radio Prague. We are proud to have such a radio and there is no intention to stop its broadcast. The Radio helps promote the good name promote the good name of the Czech Republic in the world and plays a key role also for Czechs living abroad. Great support and encouragement for Czech countrymen is also the Internet site www.krajane.net managed by the Radio.

Due to current financial crisis the Government of the Czech Republic decided in June 2009 to reduce the state budget by 20%. Following the Government Resolution No. 715 the Ministry of Foreign Affairs is obliged to reduce the budget of the Radio for 2010 also by 20%.

According to the data received from the Radio the reduction will mean saving on all budgetary items and increasing of the Internet budget. The short-wave broadcast will be retained in reduced form. Foreign transmitters will probably replace some of the transmitters in Northern Bohemia. The broadcast in different languages should remain

unchanged.

Thank you very much again for your interest in the broadcast from the Czech Republic. If you have more questions please do not hesitate to contact directly the Czech Radio or our Ministry.

GUYANA:

To resume SW broadcasts soon.

The National Communications Network (NCN) [ex Guyana Broadcsting Corp] is revamping its shortwave transmission system that will see the return of radio signals to interior locations and nearby countries. NCN Chief Executive Officer Mohammed Sattaur told Stabroek News that the process is being facilitated by the relocation of the company's radio transmitter at Sparendaam, East Coast Demerara. The company has since set up a new location at Canal Number Two Polder, West Bank Demerara. Meanwhile Sattaur told Stabroek News that the relocation process should be officially completed before the end of the year. He said the company will use the relocation opportunity to revamp and modernise shortwave radio, making it more powerful on the air. It has also moved to procure new equipment for this purpose. The new move means that people in interior locations would again hear radio and at different periods of the night countries close by would also be able to listen to NCN. The shortwave system was down for some time and so service to those locations were suspended.

Rodger reports that Father Christmas brought him a radio. A old new radio, one owner Solid State, includes LW, SW, air band and others. It has a dial and similar layout to a Eddystone.

Also received a letter from Keith Robinson of Invercargill advising that the station reported in the November section on 4417 KHz was Bluff Fishman's Radio operated by Mari Leesk, a well known character in the deep south. Keith reports that DX is pretty spotty at his location. Thanks Keith for the article which I will produce within the next month or so.

Over the past month or so I have taken an interest in receiving HF weather fax using a computer and one of my communications receivers. When I first looked up the subject on the internet I thought it would be easy, just download the software and then hook the computer to the radio, wrong, it took me two weeks to finally download a HF weather fax. At present I have received about a dozen weather faxes, but looking at what I have received I still have a little way to go before I receive a perfect copy.

Equipment and Software used to receive HF weather faxes – Communications Receiver with SSB - Computer with a soundcard and microphone jack - A cable with two mini jack connectors - Software program - Schedule of stations, frequency and times of transmission.

I use my Icom R-70 hooked up to my laptop. I found that I had problems getting the software to work on my desktop computer, but it is not a problem with the laptop. I downloaded two software programs, SeaTTY v2.30 and JVcomm32.

The SeaTTY program is the one I have used to receive the below weather fax. I set the mode to HF Fax and the LPM (lines per minute) to 120 and the IOC (index of cooperation) to 576.

The receiver has to set in USB mode and the frequency set 1.9 KHz below the frequency shown in the schedule.


The below weather HF fax was received on Sunday 10 January 2010 at 0215 hours UTC on the frequency of 9457.1 KHz from ZKLF.

I hope to receive these better than what I am getting at present. I would also like to hear from other members who have ventured into this area or who have received RTTY which is the other area I hope to get into this coming year.

TRN Sumner Frequency Changes

From Wednesday December 16th Radio Hauraki will broadcast on 89.3FM Sumner, in addition to the main Christchurch frequency 106.5FM.

"The geography of Sumner makes it tricky for listeners to receive a good signal. I'm very pleased that we can now greatly enhance the listening experience for Radio Hauraki fans in Sumner by introducing the repeater signal", says Andrew Britt TRN's General Manager Christchurch.

ZM's Sumner repeater will also change frequency to 90.9FM from 89.6 the same day.

"While it's a slight change, it aligns the Sumner frequency more closely to the main ZM frequency 91.0FM. It is important for listeners to correctly retune their radios to ensure they can continue receive ZM loud and clear".

"We have a freephone listeners can call if they encounter any reception issues as a result of the changes – it's 0508 CHANGE or 0508 242643".

TRN has almost 50 changes to make out of a total of 254 frequency changes required throughout New Zealand before April 2011, when the new twenty year licence management rights commence.

The Ministry of Economic Development on behalf of the Crown has worked with broadcasters to clean up the entire FM band for New Zealand as part of the process of moving to the new rights.

"In theory all frequencies could change at midnight 2 April 2011. However, in practice there is insufficient technical resource to do this. All licence holders are being encouraged to move as soon as possible to avoid chaos in early 2011, that's why TRN is making the changes in Christchurch now", says Peter Casey TRN's frequency engineering project manager.

Commercial broadcasters (including TRN) are renewing all Commercial Radio Broadcasting licences for a total cost of \$96M for another 20 years to 2031.

FM frequency changes in Sumner & Christchurch (Paul Rawdon, Christchurch) 10/12/2009 - I noted last night that I was getting ZMFM on 90.9, judging by the weather we had yesterday, it was perfect for some local tropo which would have meant WELLINGTON. We finally had a decent Nor'wester which we usually do (that has been lacking so far this summer) that pumped up the mercury. We certainly paid for it to day with yet another southerly.

All hope was dashed when during a long commercial break; all the ads were directed at Christchurch. I emailed ZM and from their reply, it turns out that 90.9 is a new translator for ZMFM in Sumner, power is low, in the 6 to 12 watt range. It is co-sited

with 89.2. They are in parallel with 89.2 for the next couple of weeks when 89.2 will not close, but will start relaying Hauraki to the Sumner area. One may question the logic of confusing ZM listeners by using a new frequency for ZM; it would have made more sense to put Hauraki on 90.9.

As far as coverage is concerned, the new frequency is similar to the old; the new transmitter is using new technology which should make the coverage wider. I found both to be almost the same in outlying areas today while I was out and about. As far as the music they play on ZM is concerned, it all sounded the same; I could have sworn that they played the same one at least three times!

What will be interesting will be any potential interference problems to the signal from Kaukau on 90.9, it was my understanding that the reason for the UHF TV2 translator was to cope with interference from Kaukau channel 1.

22/12/2009 - Radio Hauraki is now on air in Sumner, but, they are not using 89.2, the frequency they are using is 89.3.

23/12/2009 - No more speculation surrounding the future use of 95.3, The Edge is now on the frequency in parallel with 88.9. All that now remains is to see what eventually happens on 88.9. No doubt we will now have to wait until the New Year to see what happens next.

24/12/2009 - Yes - Took a trip to Sumner last night - 94.9 is More FM, 89.3 is Hauraki, 90.9 is ZM, and 96.5 is Classic Hits, so that provided a few new ones for the totals.

Wave is still on 88.5 but around McCormicks Bay and up onto to Mt Pleasant is somebody on 88.6. I suspect that this is also Wave FM as the programming sounded similar.

Our stations are all about 10 or more years old and have been broadcasting non-stop for that period. Radio Woodville is soon to be 12 years old. 
Its been great sharing the DX here with Kiwi and Aussie visitors this year. Here's hoping you get a chance to hear something new on your radio in 2010!"

ANZAC Dxpedition. Kingaroy Queensland 21/22 August 2009.

Our host was John Bastable and we were gathered from both sides of the Tasman. Ray & Raewyn Crawford, Cris & Lynne Martin, Colleen & John Smith, Doug & May Milligan, Martin & Ann Hadlow, Arthur & Dorothy de Maine, (also doing the Queensland railways circuit) Jeff & Di Hosking and Frank & Margret Glen (Margret was in Australia for a floral Art Exhibition) made up the weekend. We all gathered for a mid-day dinner at John Bastable's favourite watering hole know as the Captains Paddock Winey for a Saturday lunch where he made a speech of welcome to the Kiwis and Frank Glen replied on behalf of and including the NZRDxL. The expedition was well provided with radios from by the generous offer of John Smith who came with enough receivers to cope with those travellers who came without one.

The receivers represented were an impressive group. Drake RA8, AR7030, Drake SW8 World Band, IC R72, Sangean ATS 805A, Playstar R30 and an AR7030 Plus. Your writer used the Playstar and found it both simple to use and although small in size was clearly a leader in pulling in the signals.

The larger of the two standard EWE aerial was erected on the late afternoon of arrival and one could hardly see the table or radios for connection boxes, power points and plugs of every description. Among the smart equipment used were the Mains Plessey splitter box and noise illuminators. The NES 10-2 with speaker and the NEIM1030 in line model. Smithy operated a dandy ICD Sony P28 recorder, something that has to be seen to be believed.

John Bastable used the occasion to have a collective gathering of knowledgeable people who were able to assist him in the non listening period of the two days to install three different sized satellite dishes. These were 35cm, 2.3 metres and 65 cm. These satellites will enable John to receive hundreds of TV signals from all over the world and we were able to have a glimpse of those of these following installation.



There is little point in including the DX trail in this report because of the time lag in publication but it is worth mentioning on the Broadcast band on 909 China has a strong signal and a call 'Radio Matakana' on 1670 could not be identified. Generally it was not an exceptional expedition, but one that drew for this reporter five broadcast reports that would not have been attainable in New Zealand because local stations are astride those frequencies.

The expedition folded its EWE on the Sunday afternoon when one of the members flew his Piper 180 over out site and took an aerial photo of the gathered assembly. We were all grateful for John's hospitality and without doubt a fine time and a good time was had by all.





THE SKIES THE LIMIT

Well, it's not quite DX as we've known it, but when you move to the country and have only 3 sometimes-grainy analogue TV channels to choose from, the DX in me demanded something better. So for the past year, satellite TV has given us scores of TV viewing and radio listening options, although I admit the majority aren't in English. Our favourite TV channel is now SBS1 from Australia.

Thanks to a very technically-competent cousin, I have a 900mm fixed satellite dish with 3 LNBs enabling reception of 3 Optus satellites – C1, D1 and D2 (with D3 coming soon they say). My desktop box is a Strong SRT4654X that can handle up to 4 LNBs via a DiSEqC switch. For a short time, I also used a 1.8 solid 'petal' dish to receive signals from

Intelsat 5. The attraction of IS5 is free-to-air BBC World Television and the ABC Australia Network, as well as Radio Australia audio around the clock. But after the dish was bowled over twice by the high winds that often occur here, I've had to dismantle it and contemplate its replacement with a 2.4 metre mesh dish and motorised mount sometime in the future. Meantime I plan to plant bushes around the proposed ground mount location to provide the mount position with some shelter.

For those DXers no longer able to enjoy the DX challenges on shortwave and medium wave from home, perhaps satellite TV and radio could provide you with a new option to seeking out distant broadcasts. To whet your appetite, here are some of the radio signals audible in New Zealand via the Optus satellites and my 900mm dish:

12407 GHz V - BBC World Service (as heard on shortwave)

Optus D1 (where our Sky TV and Freeview broadcasts are transmitted from) 12648 GHz V – SBS Radio Tasmania.

Sydney, Sport 927 (Melbourne).

12644 GHz V – Radio Netherlands in Dutch, English and other languages; Voice of Turkey in various languages; Radio Vlanderen International; The Overcomer (Brother Stair); Kossuth Radio (Home Service from Hungary); Raw FM (Dance Music, Canberra); Vietnamese Radio (Australia); Mood Media Radio (Australia).

12706 GHz V – Radio France Internationale; Croatian National Radio.

12706 GHz H - Voice of Charity (Lebanon).

12734 GHz V – UCB Radio; Bangkok FM94; Kiss FM (Dance Music Radio, Melbourne); Net 105.8 (Greece); 2CR China Radio Network and Rumanian Radio.

An up to date listing of what TV and radio is available on each communications satellite can be found at www.lyngsat.com Beam information against each frequency shows whether New Zealand is in the signal beam, and an F indicator shows the 'free to air' broadcasts. I subscribe to the apsattv Yahoo Discussion Group for updates on what is being seen and heard on FTA (free to air satellite television). (Bryan Clark 11/09)





Under "DX History/Equipment & Advertising," we have posted a nice Hallicrafters catalog dating from around 1948 or 1949. There are a lot of familiar communication receivers here--the SX-43, S-40A, S-53 and S-38, as well as FM, TV, and amateur equipment. -- And under "Specialized Resources" we have added two new editions of "Wavescan," both aired on November 29, 2009: "Radio Australia--Lyndhurst" and "Shortwave Listener Cards." (More on Lyndhurst can be found in the Wavescan scripts #480, March 14, 2004 and #497, July 11, 2004. More on radio cards can be found in the scripts of August 2, 9 and 16 and September 13, 2009.))

The year 1946 was the first year that England's "Wireless World" magazine published the booklet, "Broadcasting Stations of the World." It contained lists of shortwave stations arranged by frequency and by location, and like lists of European mediumwave stations. Posted under "DX History/Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns" is that first edition. Perhaps to avoid confusion with the "Broadcasting Stations of the World" which the U.S. Foreign Broadcasting Intelligence Service had started publishing in 1945, the British publication changed its name to "Guide to Broadcasting Stations" in the second edition. Many subsequent editions were published, the last in 2001. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" scripts (December 6, 2009)--"American Radio Stations in Australia," and "Usage of Callsigns--Mixed Numbers and Letters."

This time, we have placed under "DX History/QSLS & Other Station Memorabilia" a number of Christmas and New Years radio-related cards of the past. Included are (1) TI4NRH, Heredia, Costa Rica; (2) OTC, Leopoldville, Belgian Congo; (3) Radio France Asie, Saigon, Vietnam (1955); (4) & (5) two cards from Commander E. F. McDonald, Jr. of Zenith Radio Corp. (1942 and 1957); and (6) & (7) two Christmas cards which appear to date from the very early days of radio. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" scripts from December 13, 2009--"Return to Pitcairn" and "Usage of Callsians--Shortwave." Happy Holidays, everyone!

Under "DX History/Stations" we have posted some interesting material on the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation that was received from Martin Hadlow, Associate Professor at the University of Queensland in Australia and a well-known name in "down under" DX circles (and a follower of ontheshortwaves.com). Martin was actively involved in the development of the SIBC, and has sent a booklet which he produced commemorating the opening of the SIBC Broadcasting House in 1982, together with a broadcasting-related First Day Cover issued by the Solomons in 1984. Thanks, Martin, for this excellent material. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" stories, both from December 20, 2009--"Radio Australia Anniversary-Wanneroo" and "Pitcairn Island-Callsigns and QSL-Cards."



No doubt it has been some time since the postman has brought you a schedule for the External Service of Radio Ghana. Under "DX History/Stations," we have posted one for the period January-March 1977. Along with African political news, it contains the schedules for the station's six English services, two French services, and two Arabic services, together with services in Portuguese, Hausa and Swahili. Just reading the frequencies on the back cover reminds us--not that we need it--how much the shortwave scene has changed. Ghana's external service began in the early 1960s. In 1977 it was on 6130, 9545, 11850, 15285, 17870, 21545, 21720 kHz. It is hard to believe that it was over 30 years ago. -- Also this week, under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" scripts--December 27, 2009, covering the Philippines on Medium Waves (Early Years), and January 3, 2010, covering the BBC London on Shortwave (Start Point), and Dutch Radio Stations in Australia.
