## 2009 Clandestine Shortwave Activity Survey

from Mathias Kropf – Bad Hersfeld, Germany

During the year 2009 the activity of political clandestine stations broadcasting on shortwave has decreased by 13.4 % to 1088 Weekly Broadcasting Hours (WBHs). This is the lowest level of activity ever recorded since this survey has been introduced in the year 1986 (so far the low had been 1116 WBHs in the year 1999).

The activity of clandestine stations broadcasting to target areas on the Asian continent has dropped by 18.7 % to 744 WBHs. On the American continent the activity has decreased by 8.4 % to 197 WBHs. However, on the African continent the activity has even increased (although from a very low level) by 21.5 % to 147 WBHs.

For the second year in a row the most active target area worldwide is North Korea with 252 WBHs (+7 when compared with last year), followed by China P.R. with 226 WBHs (+2). On the third place is Cuba with 197 WBHs (-18).

The number of different target areas active worldwide has remained unchanged at 17, although some changes have occurred. While Laos and Iran are no longer thought to be active, Madagascar and Sudan have emerged as new/reactivated target areas. (Shortwave Central)

Havana, March 19 (RHC)-- Beginning Monday, March 22nd, Radio Havana Cuba will broadcast on the Tropical Band of shortwave frequencies. The international radio

station's programming in Spanish, English, French, Creole and Esperanto will be heard throughout Cuba, as well as in the southern part of the United States, Central America, Mexico, the Caribbean and the northern part of South America.

Listeners will be able to tune in to Radio Havana Cuba between the hours of 23:00 UTC and 11:00 UTC the following day on 5040 Khz. via Dan Ferguson and the DX League email list dxdialog.

## Classic Hits King Country Radio closes

The Radio Network closes its second rural Classic Hits station. Classic Hits Radio Waitomo was closed in November 2003 (when I was the breakfast announcer - Adam), and now at midnight on 31 March 2010, both of Classic Hits King Country Radio's FM frequencies (92.7 & 99.9) were replaced with a simulcast of Peak FM (from nearby Raetihi). King Country Radio was on the air for 44 years.

## Triple T FM changes

Triple T FM's coverage area has been extended to include Ohakune/Raetihi (on 92.6 FM), National Park (on 90.4 FM) and Taumarunui (on 95.1 FM). Also, the station's Taihape frequency has been adjusted from 91.6 FM to 100.6 FM, while the Taupo frequency has been adjusted from 91.9 FM to 92.0 FM. The frequency changes were required by The Ministry of Economic Development as part of an effort to improve the management of New Zealand's radio broadcasting spectrum. These adjustments were two of over 250 changes required throughout New Zealand in the lead-up to April 2011, when the management rights to all radio broadcasting licenses will be renewed for a twenty year period. Tuwharetoa FM's Turangi frequency has been adjusted from 97.2 FM to 97.6 FM.

- Radio Live now broadcasts in Picton on 92.3 FM and Kaikoura on 89.1 FM.
- On 1 April 2010, Aerial FM merged with fellow Ohakune based station Ski FM. Aerial FM's frequencies (96.6 FM, 94.4 FM, and 89.5 FM) were subsequently replaced with Ski FM.
- Awa FM's Ohakune/Raetihi/National Park frequency has been adjusted from 91.2 FM to 91.0 FM.
- Coromandel FM's Whangamata frequency has been adjusted from 89.1 FM to 89.9 FM, Whitianga/Mercury Bay's from 90.6 FM to 90.3 FM and Pauanui/Tairua's from 94.1 FM to 93.9 FM. An additional frequency has been created in Matarangi on 94.0 FM.

### **New Zealand LPFM Radio Review**

Did you know that LPFM Radio is being reviewed right now? Many current frequencies will become unavailable for various periods; some new frequencies are being added, but others being removed completely.

Whether you're a broadcaster, a listener or have some interest in the Kiwi LPFM radio scene, it's important to follow what's going on.

#### **Summary**

- 1 The lower LPFM will change from the current 88.0-88.8 MHz to a new range of 87.5-88.4 MHz effective June 1 2010
- 2 Power increase from 0.5w to 1w
- 3 Use of 87.6-88.0 MHz is prohibited in some locations between June 1 and October 1 2010
- 4 Use of 88.1-106.7 MHz is prohibited in some locations between June 1 2010 and April 2 2011

#### **Comment**

This review and frequency changes will cause major disruption to many existing and future LPFM stations, especially when the use of many frequencies are prohibited in various locations over the next two years.

There will be a scramble for fewer available channels, and with a doubling in power to 1 watt eirp interference levels can potentially make the LPFM airwaves a disaster zone in larger cities.

Look at Appendix A in the review document at [www.rsm.govt.nz](http://www.rsm.govt.nz) to see which frequencies will be available in your area during the transition period.

In about 8 week's time, these changes take effect. We will be keeping track of as many changes as we can during the coming months, but the situation will be fast changing as operators scramble to find a channel and stay free of interference.

### **Low Power FM Broadcasting – General User Licence Consultation**

The Ministry of Economic Development has prepared plans for changes to the Low

Power FM broadcasting regime that will:

- Relocate the frequency band of the LPFM lower band from 88.0 - 88.8 MHz to 87.5 - 88.4 MHz as required for alignment with changes to the VHF-FM broadcasting band and Landmobile A band;
- Provide additional protection for aeronautical navigation and voice services; and
- Increase the permitted LPFM transmit power to 1 Watt e.i.r.p.

The proposed plans are discussed in a consultation document that is now available on the RSM website. A transition plan and details of the proposed new GUL terms, conditions and restrictions are included.

The revised GUL will be in operation from 1 June 2010 until late 2011, or early 2012, when LPFM requirements will again be reviewed to reflect less stringent coordination requirements for aeronautical navigational services. (RSM Newsflash, 22 March 2010)

## Shine TV on Freeview

## New MediaWorks Channel

Music is making the world go round on digital TV. MediaWorks is expected to announce soon that it will be launching a music youth oriented channel on Freeview. MediaWorks is obliged to deliver a second digital channel, but there has been speculation on how it can afford it.

The advertising market is still tough and MediaWorks is recovering from its own financial crises. In that sense a music channel makes sense, with a high degree of free and low-cost content. MediaWorks has been gradually shifting music content off C4, and there will be an opportunity to deliver content that way. Two former directors of the defunct music and youth channel Alt TV are working for MediaWorks. Thane Kirby and Oliver Driver sold out of the company, which later went into liquidation owing creditors \$3 million.

Kirby was programme director for George FM but subsequently stepped down to be a daytime host. Driver co-hosts the breakfast show Sunrise.

However, it is understood that neither of the MediaWorks staff is involved with the new channel. Meantime, record industry sources say that another party is developing plans for an adult focused music channel - possibly to run on Sky TV. Sky has already picked up exclusive rights to TVNZ pay channel Heartland and a travel channel. But there are prospects for more channels in the early part of next year. Would members kindly assist by sending their contributions early. Mailbag will close on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of each month and late entries will appear in the next issue. As always, your comments are appreciated and important in this column.

Let's suppose a new chum on shortwave asked you, "What's the best time to listen to stations on the shortwave bands?" One could count up the number of bands available in each hour on my current Shortwave Reception Forecast for all the areas listed. But this would not give him the answer to his question. He is not referring to the position in May 2010 but what happens generally !

If the question was directed to me, I could go back to the database and count the number of shortwave frequencies available in each hour, for all months, for all areas and for all phases of the Solar Cycle. This, besides being very labour-intensive (and I do not favour that kind of intensiveness!) may still not be actually close to the mark as some shortwave bands are likely to be more populated than others.

Thus I resorted to history ! Since February 1995, I've kept an hourly log of all new stations heard - all on the small airmail writing paper. There are 23 items per page and a total of 740 pages. That gives just over 17000 items. As my listening schedule places equal emphasis to each hour and band (from 5.7MHz upwards,) there should be very little bias in the results.

In regard to my listening day, local time 7am-10.59pm, I needed to exclude 18UTC and 10UTC as I covered these hours only if NZ Standard Time was in force or not.

So here are the results, expressing the number of pages filled, as a percentage of the total:

19UTC - 9.3%; 20UTC - 8.6%; 21UTC - 7.9%; 22UTC - 4.0%; 23UTC - 2.7%; 0 UTC - 2.7%;  
1 UTC - 3.7%; 2 UTC - 4.2%; 3 UTC - 5.4%; 4 UTC - 7.6%; 5 UTC - 9.7%; 6 UTC - 9.7%; 7  
UTC - 8.9%; 8 UTC - 7.8%; 9 UTC - 7.8%.

Therefore I would tell the shortwave newcomer, that in NZ, the best times generally are: from 5.00 to 6.59 UTC, closely followed by 19.00 - 19.59UTC and 7.00 - 7.59UTC.

Jerry Berg, Lexington MA writes regarding a QSL he received: WJHR, Milton, Florida USA 15550 Unsatisfied with a short e-mail from the station, I re-sent my e-mail report by postal mail with a SASE, requesting a postal QSL. In about 10 days I received an ersatz QSL-card, specifically a piece of paper with stn name, location, freq, scheduled hours (0900-1700 CST), but no specific reception details, taped to the back of a blank George S. Mock, WB4BFO QSL-card; also a short note on the back of a sheet of a business products letterhead--thanks for listening, we just installed a log periodic, God will bless you for a donation. Tnx to tip from John Fisher-MA. Seems a bit casual on the part of WJHR, Jerry, but it's good to hear from you. I guess you didn't respond with a donation !

Frank Glen, Christchurch. Our Patron reports on reception conditions on the X Band in Christchurch prior to a visit to Stewart Island in these terms:

"Amazing, fantastic and utterly quite unbelievable. It all bodes well possibly for X Band on the Island.

Last night Tuesday 10th I tuned in at Zulu (UTC) 1040. I was totally blown away - not a whistle of TV not the slightest local street lights or whatever. From 1600 up to 1700, loud and clear, although fading, but there were the following. 1640. KDIA, 1650, KFOX, 1660, KTIQ, 1670, KPHY and 1700 KVWS. A quick squeeze right around the band both in the 25 meter aerial and the EWE showed the EWE was the much better performer. Of the radios, the Edystone 640c could only hear KDIA the Grundig Statlite 650 heard them all but the daddy of them was the SPR-4 the Drake. Quite, steady and very lovable. Trouble is I've logged the lot at Tiwai and have them back. The reception was like a bad night at Tiwai, but one we would have persisted with." It appears things are going well for you Frank. Good luck for the Dxpedition !

Rich D'Angelo, Wyomissing, PA says "Our third and final DXpedition of the season was a snow covered affair...We began to unload our vehicles. The walking paths were shoveled nicely making that easy. However, when it came time to erect our antennas, life changed quickly. We had to trudge in snow that was knee to thigh deep in most places. Antenna work took a little longer than usual thanks to the snow pack but at least when I fell the landing was soft.

Afternoon and late evening Africans were excellent during the trip: Rwanda, Ethiopia, Fana, and Djibouti all putting in good signals. Several pirates were heard including Pirate Radio Boston with its reactivation program hosted by Charlie Loudenboomer. Latin American reception was relatively quiet although Radio Apintie put in a really nice signal. Overall, Asian reception conditions was pretty good but Indonesia, Papua New Guinea and India were relatively quiet. I was glad to get a couple of tentative/presumed logs of Radio Bana, Eritrea on 5,060 kHz as well as the new Radio Mashaal operating from Iranawila.

QSL Report:

Radio Australia 11660 – Shepparton verified with a full data "Shepparton International High Frequency Transmission Station" card in 295 days from v/s Ian Johnson of the ARDXC. I reported the frequency as Brandon but Ian noted that despite internet posting showing Brandon, Radio Australia's operating schedule shows this as Shepparton. Ian

included a copy of the current Radio Australia shortwave frequency guide. Radio Free Europe / Radio Liberty via Sitkuni, Lithuania 9635 verified with a full data – including site – “Illuminate Your World” card in 87 days for a broadcast in Tatar Bashkir language. Response came from office in Czech Republic.

Radio Sweden via Talata-Volondry, Madagascar 9490 replied to an electronic report for my reception of the interrupted broadcast due to the Christmas Day fire with a postal letter in 26 days informing me that they no longer verify reception reports (“We regret to inform you that Radio Sweden no longer sends QSL-cards”) and apologized for an inconvenience this causes. Silly me, I thought that there could be some interest at Radio Sweden due to the nature of the ill fated transmission. Although they could have easily responded by e-mail, they did a postal reply. Couldn't they have just as easily sent a QSL? Hi!

Voice of America Philippines 9490 and 11610 verified two separate reports six weeks apart with one card in 94 days (9490) and 52 days (11610) with a full data “Transmitters and Antennas at Sunset” card. Package included a 2009 calendar, bumper sticker and several program schedules.

Far East Broadcasting Company Philippines 5990 verified with an electronic reply from v/s Jan B in 76 days confirming my reception of the lu Mien broadcast from Bocaue apologizing for the overdue response (they did in fact respond with a full data card previously). Jan did indicate that about five years ago the entire antenna curtain at Bocaue was renewed and this strengthened their signal but that there is little they can do to improve things further at this stage of the sunspot cycle.

WJHR Radio International USA 15550 usb verified an electronic report with an electronic no data ‘Dear Shortwave Listener’ form letter rich text file reply in 5 days from v/s G. S. Mock including a picture of the transmitter. In his letter, Mock states: ‘It is always good to hear from a new listener! It is our desire to provide quality Christian programming to the world in these last days. Please keep listening and tell someone to tune in. Our station is new and needs your prayers. Someday in the near future we will have a web page to keep listeners abreast of latest developments which will be of interest to our listeners.’ ”

Thanks for all that and you certainly had a ball in the snow, Rich ! As for that quote from Mock, haven't I read something like that from someone else this month ?

**Des Davey, Te Kuiti** relates that: “On Sunday March 7 I went out fishing with my mate. I didn't do any good but my mate caught a kahawai fish and it was a booma at approx. 18 inches long. By the time we got back to Te Kuiti after having a beer at the Waitomo Tavern, his fish was almost one metre long - or so he told others along the way !”

**Terry Nielsen, Christchurch** writes: "I'm sorry to say that I totally disagree with you in your statement about SW stations in the last mailbag; "one cannot say that we are in anyway deprived of stations to tune!". First, how did you calculate the number (4540) of listed SW stations? Did you for example calculate that ABC sending on up to 40 different frequencies as 40 SW stations, or CRI transmitting on some 250-300 frequencies as 250-300 SW stations?? And just because of these stations dominate the SW, listening to SW was so much better some 40 years ago. Today's problem is not the lack of SW stations as the SW is dominated by a handful of huge stations like ABC and CRI which are dominating the SW

here in the Pacific together with the US Gospel stations and BBC and VOA just to mention some of the big ones. So the quantity is there, but quality is NOT.

It's always been my impression that Shortwave has always been dominated by huge networks, but I plan to expand on these ideas in my opening words in the May Mailbag as we haven't the space here. It's good of you to raise the subject.

A shortwave QSL from AFRTS Diego Garcia 4319 produced Country No.186 for Keith. Congratulations and it's great to receive your report.

And now penultimately from "Darfield DX, " or in the person of **Stu Forsyth, UAE** with his reports out to: DW 15650 and 17635 (both via Trincomalee) and AIR 13695, 15410, 17800 and 17895. It's nice to know you're continuing with something important, Stu - as well as educating the brilliant scholars of the Emirates !

**Bryan Clark, Mangawhai** notes increasing atmospheric noise in recent weeks, but is pleased that Radio Globo 1220 from Rio de Janeiro has put in several appearances during March - roll on the Latin season on medium wave! Plenty of Brazilians being heard on 60, 49 and 31 metres too. Other shortwave highlights are Radio Havana Cuba back on 60 metres, Serbia 6100 in English, and a tentative trace of Scandinavian Weekend Radio on 3 April. See Bandwatch for details.

## BROADCAST NEWS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

**NEW ZEALAND** Radio Ake 1179 in Auckland is now on air. First noted 6 April with a variety of cruisy songs, ranging from reggae to boogie and many ID's such as 'Te Reo o Ngati Whatua', '11-79 Radio o Ngati Whatua', 'The Sound of Ngati Whatua - Ake' and jingles '11-79 - Ake - 11-79'. No continuity announcer and no ads, just music and ID's. Licenced to Ngati Whatua who used to operate Ruia Mai until they lost a major funding contract which saw Radio Waatea arrive on the scene, then leased to the Voice of Samoa, and for the past 6 months or so running music loops. Radio Ake is a 'new concept' in broadcasting according to the sparse info found so far. Still awaiting full contact details and will post when these are available. **(David Ricquish)**

The old 1ZU Taumarunui mast was taken down on 6 April and placed into storage, with 1512 now silent. The frequency remains with TRN and is likely to be used elsewhere in the country. According to TRN's Taupo manager Brian Jennings 'What's left was given to the local Taumarunui museum. The station has now been absolutely cleaned out and emptied' So if anyone is going through Taumarunui, call into the local museum there to see what reminders and souvenirs are around. 1ZU originally came on the air in about 1966 and has lasted 44 years, first as King Country Radio and more recently as Classic Hits Taumarunui. The FM frequencies have been sold to Peak FM which now has a substantial network of repeaters in and around the central North Island high country skifield area in competition with Ski FM and several iwi radio stations. **(David Ricquish)**

**AUSTRALIA** 3MP Melbourne 1377 AM is changing name and format. According to the Melbourne Age newspaper of 7 April, new Melbourne talkback station MTR is going to be "in your face, confrontational and opinionated", says its marquee host and program director Steve Price. Price, backed up by such personalities as Sam Newman, Steve Vizard and TV reporter Martin King, has thrown down the gauntlet to Melbourne's dominant radio station 3AW. The new station comes on air on April 19 with Price kicking it off at 6am (AEST) and taking on 3AW breakfast kings Ross Stevenson and John Burns, parlaying into heavy hitter Neil Mitchell. MTR is targeting the over-40s market and is frank about being to the right of centre in its views. "The most successful talk stations occupy right of centre, with politics in particular," Price told reporters at the station's launch today. He said the station's talkback hosts will be given free rein to voice their opinions. "We will be in your face, there's no point in having people sitting on the fence," Price said. MTR, a joint project by Macquarie Radio News and Pacific Star Network, will take over the broadcast frequency currently occupied by 3MP at 1377 on the AM band. **(AAP via Barry Hartley)**

**ARGENTINA** LRI-227 Antares AM 1650 "La Radio de la Familia" inaugurated their new broadcast studios in Dec 2009. They are located at Calle Cjal. Manuel Martitegui 598, Fátima, Pilar, Buenos Aires. Telephone (02322) 49-9899. The station is operated by Radio Familia S.A. with Señor Norberto Eugenio Chindemi as its CEO. The station transmits with 1/0.5 kW of power and is fully licensed. (Marcelo A. Cornachioni, Lomas de Zamora and Arnaldo Slaen via Christer Brunström/ARC) via IRCA

**CHINA** Hubei PBS News & General Sce. is using 1566 kHz with 10 kW from Jingmen in addition to 774 and 1404 kHz. Liaoyang PBS. Traffic and Arts Sce. operates also on 1503 kHz in addition to FM. **COLOMBIA** 1140 HJDL Radio Paisa, "la Cariñosa de Medellín" has moved to Edificio Coltejer in downtown Medellín. It is believed that all RCN outlets in Medellín are operating from this skyscraper, which is kind of a "landmark" in Medellín.

1300 HJRB, online info says name of the Tunja station is CRB, Cadena Radial Boyacense.

1390 HJZY Per online info, the name of the Bucaramanga station is La Primera.

1580 HJQT is now relaying "Candela" which is a popular FM outlet. The owner, William Vinasco Ch., has been leasing the channel to Radio Mar and then to Sonríele a Jesús Radio, but they have now left the frequency. The latter organization is instead heard at various times of the day and night on 1400 Emisora Mariana and 1430 AM 14-30 (ex-Emisora Kennedy). Vinasco also owns 1160 Ecos de Colombia, which has been leased to IPDA, Iglesia Pentecostal Dios es Amor. They offer independent programming but also, on occasions, relays from Radio Victoria, in Lima, Peru, and Radio Universo, São Bernardo do Campo, Brazil. (Yes, in Portuguese!). Sonriele a Jesus Radio is now re-broadcast on 1430 KHz via 1430 AM Bogota (Emisora

Kennedy), Monday to Sunday at 0030-1130 UTC. At other times the station continues with its regular programming. The station has website at <http://www.1430amradio.com/> (Rafael Rodríguez R. via Yimber Gaviria via Lista ConDig via FinnDX)

**JAPAN** I had been ignoring the Japanese harbour stations listed on 1670 in the Pacific-Asian Log as I thought the US interference would always be too much. I noticed a bit of interference to 1670, checked it out and discovered that these stations are not really on 1670 nor are they "1670.5 USB" as listed on their website. They have a carrier on 1669 and an upper sideband. That still means quite a bit of interference from 1670, but it also means that it is easier to tell when a signal is present. With USB reception and a notch on 1670, audio was recoverable in many of the time slots used by these stations which share the channel. Various 50 Watt marine stations were heard Oct. 3 in 1669kHz at 1357, 1428, 1429:30, 1430:35, 1431:07 - 1432, and 1433:40 - 1434:11. Also Oct. 4 at 1420, 1421:39, 1424, 1428:40, 1433:20 and 1438:30 (and a few more not yet processed), While listed on 1670.5 USB on their website and 1670 in the PAL, they have a carrier on 1669.0 and an upper sideband. There's no lower sideband. Each of the stations transmits on a fixed schedule for a minute or two (differs per station) and then drops the carrier. After a short dead time, the next station turns on their carrier and starts talking immediately. An example of the announcement is: "Kakkyoku Kakkyoku Kakkyoku. Kochira ha Awashima Awashima Awashima. Kaijo Hoancyo ga Sawasakihana toudai oyobi Hajikisaki toudai no kisyo jokyō wo oshirase shimasu. Jikoku 22:43..." or "Dear all stations. This is Awashima. Japan Coast Guard informs you conditions of weather around Sawasakihana lighthouse and Hajikisaki lighthouse. The time is 22:43...." Special thanks to Hiroo Nakagawa for the language assistance. (Chuck Hutton WA via IRCA)

**MEXICO** XEMMM from Mexicali, playing oldies for the US market, has been reported in Finland on 940.174kHz. (Mika Makelainen via MW Offsets Yahoo Group)

**MYANMAR** Myanmar noted today on new 693 kHz at around 2300 UTC. It's a bad choice as its neighbor Bangladesh is also operating on same channel with 1000 kW. Maybe it's to jam their signals? (Jose Jacob via dxld 27/2-2010 via mediumwave.info via IRCA)

**WELCOME TO NEW MEMBERS:** **FRED DISHER** from Waihi and **E.T. WARBROOKE** from Glen Eden Auckland. We hope you find the news of radio stations contributed by our members of interest – please do let our section editors know something of your own listening experiences, to share with the wider membership.

**SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING** Notice is hereby given of a special general meeting of the NZ Radio DX League, to be held on Sunday 27 June 2010, commencing at 2.00pm. Venue will be the Western Suburbs Radio Clubrooms at 3000 Great North Road, New Lynn, Auckland. The SGM will consider and vote upon the proposed new DX League Constitution, which was circulated to members in the November 2009 magazine.

**PRESERVING HISTORIC DX MATERIAL** Further to the report in our column last month regarding the DX material held at the Hocken Library in Dunedin, our member **MARTIN HADLOW** (Associate Professor of Communications at the University of Queensland) notes that there is no equivalent arrangement in Australia at present. In view of this, Martin advises that he would be willing and able to receive and hold in trust QSL collections, magazines, memorabilia etc. This material would not be used, but held in storage while a long-term solution to archiving is established. Martin says that at least this approach could 'save' material from old DXers collections that might otherwise be discarded. If you are interested in pursuing this, please let me know and I will pass your details onto Martin to make contact with you.

**BROADCASTING CHANGES** The sad news this past month has been Radio Sweden's announcement that they would discontinue shortwave broadcasting. All broadcasts by Swedish Radio on shortwave and medium wave will cease by 31 October 2010. Foreign language broadcasting will continue on the Internet however. Radio Sweden has been broadcasting to listeners abroad since 1938. The announcement from Stockholm has prompted lively debate amongst hobbyists, as to whether we have done enough to convince international broadcasters that we value their efforts. On the 'DX Listening Digest' Yahoo Discussion Group, JOHN FIGLIOZZI in the USA wrote "QSLing was done as a courtesy and service to the listener (although some become very indignant when a station fails to QSL, almost as if it were a DXer's right or a station responsibility). The quid-pro-quo never materialized however - or at least in the eyes of station management doesn't exist any longer. What is the quid pro quo? "Listen - really listen - to our programmes

and give us meaningful feedback.” The fact that George Wood -who can only be seen as a friend to listeners and DXers given his history (host of Sweden Calling DXers) and long career at Radio Sweden - is observing that they get virtually no meaningful feedback to their shortwave broadcasts speaks volumes about the role of (or blame accruing to) the shortwave listening community for outcomes like this one. As much as 20 or more ago some (like Ian McFarland, Andy Sennitt and Bob Zanotti) were warning listeners that they needed their constructive feedback in order to demonstrate conclusively to managements that their programmes were having an impact. Sadly, it seems, listeners didn't heed these warning - at least not in significant or sufficient enough numbers and persistence. Would it have altered these outcomes? It's hard to know for sure. But it wasn't done and we have this result again and again. It would not be incorrect to draw the conclusion that shortwave listeners themselves bear some responsibility here.”

And from Radio Netherlands, ANDY SENNITT responded, “I was a keen DXer and SWL - but that was over 30 years ago. DXing is now a 'legacy hobby'. Enjoy it while you still can, but don't expect to be indulged by the rest of society which has decided to move on.” **[Certainly food for thought, ladies & gentlemen. Comments? BC]**

### EARLY POLICE RADIO

Ever get a letter from a police commissioner thanking you for your DX report ? That is what I received from the Victoria Police headquarters in Melbourne for hearing VKC while in an Army camp in Canterbury in 1943.

In thanking me the chief commissioner signed the verification for reporting their transmission on 1640 kHz.

It was not my first report to VKC as I reported them on August 14 1941 conducting radio tests between mobile units and country police stations.

In 1946 I was told by the officer in charge of communications at VKC I was the first in New Zealand to hear their subsidiary transmitting station VKC3 at Seymour, 64 miles from Melbourne on 4490 kHz with a power of 200 watts.

Other police stations heard and verified were VKG Sydney 1750, VKR Brisbane 2180, ZLKQ Auckland and ZLKP on 1680 testing with old army ZC1s.

A lengthy letter was from a radio technician of KGPA 2414 500w in Seattle. He said that after being on for 10 years it was being replaced by a FM station of 250 watts and a 50 watt one to serve 82 cars with three way communication.

The cars had 25 watts transmitting on 37780 and the base on 37900.

Another stateside station was WCK City of Detroit Department of Police on 2414 with 1000 watts and the deputy commissioner had his secretary reply to my report.

This week, under "DX History/QSLs & Other Station Memorabilia," we have posted six pages of info that you might have received in the mail from "PCJ," Radio Nederland, in 1948, specifically the station's summer schedule and the schedule of Eddie Startz's "Happy Station" program. -- And under "Specialized Resources," you will find a new "Wavescan" script, "Tajikistan, Pt. II" (February 28, 2010).

This week, under "Specialized Resources," we have posted three more years of Carroll H. Weyrich's "The Pioneer Days" columns from the NNRC bulletins. These are from the 1968, 1969 and 1970 bulletins, and cover NNRC doings in various years of the 1930s, 1940s and 1950s. -- Under "DX History/SWling & DXing," an article by Harold Sellers on the origins of "Radio Golf. (This article is also posted in the "Articles" section of the ODXA website <<http://www.odxa.on.ca/listeningin/index.html>>) -- And under "Specialized Resources," another "Wavescan" script from Dr. Adrian Peterson (March 7, 2010): the story of the temporary BBC relay station at Clevedon.

This week, under "CPRV," "CPRV QSL Gallery," we have added ten "new" U.S. mediumwave QSLs. They are from the 1920s and 1930s, and serve as a reminder of the varied kinds of organizations that operated radio stations in those days. And they boast excellent graphics. The QSLs are from: KFDM, Magnolia Petroleum Co., Beaumont, Texas (1928); WCAH, Columbus, Ohio (1933); WHB, Sweeney Radio & Electrical Co., Kansas City, Missouri (no date); WLAG, Cutting & Washington Radio Corp., Minneapolis, Minnesota (no date); WOMI, Owensboro Messenger & Inquirer, Owensboro, Kentucky (1938); WREN, Jenny Wren Co., Lawrence, Kansas home of "Jenny Wren ready mixed" flour (1928); WSVS, Seneca Vocational High School, Buffalo, New York (no date); WTAR, Reliance Electric Co., Norfolk, Virginia (1924); WWA0, Michigan College of Mines, Houghton, Michigan (1924); and WWSW, Hotel Schenley, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania (1933). These QSLs are from the collections of Homer Lee, Carroll Weyrich, Samuel Murphy, John Tweedie, and Eugene Allen. -- And under "Specialized Resources," a new "Wavescan" file (March 14, 2010) containing two stories: "The Story of Radio Broadcasting on the Pacific Islands of Tonga," and "American Fax Radio" Part I.

One of the nice things about CPRV is that by combining the QSLs from several donors you can get a broader picture of a station's QSL history. This week, look under "CPRV,"

"The QSL Gallery," "Shortwave Broadcast," "Africa - Tangier (Morocco)" and you will find a newly posted compilation of IBRA Radio QSLs. A Pentecostal organization based in Sweden, IBRA Radio ("International Broadcasting Association") began broadcasting in 1955 over Radio Africa Tangier. The power was 10 kw., and the station was fairly well heard in the U.S. afternoons. When all private stations in Tangier were ordered closed at the end of 1959, IBRA continued broadcasting over some small stations in other countries. However, it did not regain a major shortwave presence until 1971 when it began broadcasting over the new Radio Trans-Europe, Portugal, a joint relay project of Deutsche Welle and the former owner of Radio Africa Tangier. QSLers liked IBRA Radio because each language program verified with its own card sent from that particular language service's headquarters for reports sent to that QTH. So for a Norwegian program you wrote to Norway and the Norwegian program QSLed with its own card from Norway, for the the French service you wrote to France and obtained that service's QSL sent from France, etc. The QSLs shown are from 1957-59. They are in a single PDF file and appear in this order: Denmark; England; Finland; France; Germany; a generic "IBRA Tangier" QSL sent from Yokohama for a Japanese program; the Netherlands; two Norway cards; and three Sweden cards. These cards are from the collections of Roger Legge (USA), Jan Tuner (Sweden), Eric Ericsson (Sweden) and Jerry Berg (USA). A close look at the cards will show that most of the frequencies used by IBRA in those days were out of band: 9226, 9275, 9630, 9900, 11342, 11458, 11507 and 14858 kHz. -- If you have any other IBRA QSLs from the 1950s, send along a JPG scan (150 dpi) and we will add them to the file. -- Also this week, under "Specialized Resources," two more "Wavescan" episodes, March 21, 2010: "Original Mediumwave Stations in Pakistan," and "American Fax Radio-2."

Under "Specialized Resources," we have added three more years of Carroll Weyrich's "The Pioneer Days" column in the NNRC bulletin, these from 1971, 1972 and 1973. Also in "Specialized Resources," a new Wavescan story (March 28, 2010), this time about VOA broadcasts from Lawrenceville, New Jersey.
