

Independent radio Big FM changing hands

One of Auckland's few independent media voices is being sold.

Big FM 106.2 launched in November 2008 with 10-year community radio rights and the promise of big things to come.

But with founder radio veterans Larry Summerville and Bernie Brown long gone, a sale process is expected to close next week.

Big FM paid \$800,000 for radio rights and the remaining 8 year term will be the major asset. It was a bargain rate for a strong Auckland FM frequency, but a big overhead for a company competing with two dominant radio companies, The Radio Network and MediaWorks. No one will be surprised that the station with its limited marketing firepower stayed small.

Said one music industry veteran: "They are nice guys but the demographics were odd - you'd have MGMT followed by Lionel Ritchie - an urban adult contemporary station that drifted into cool stuff."

Others question its prospects launching as New Zealand drifted into recession.

The 106.2 FM "community" frequency was established by Labour to limit MediaWorks and the Radio Network power to shut indies out of Auckland. Similar licenses were issued in Dunedin and Christchurch,

Corporates are willing to pay big prices for Auckland FM frequencies, which are sold for as much as \$6 million. With Auckland - and the whole country - split in two, they lobbied against the special community licence that disrupted the duopoly.

Advertising consultant Martin Gillman says that radio has always done well as a retail advertising proposition, but he was never sold on Big FM: "It was a "me too" station that was launched into a very mature market," he said. "It used some very old-school practices and was not doing anything that was different."

Big FM director Jeff Down said that Summerville left last year. He confirmed that Big FM was being sold but wouldn't discuss talks.

The prospective buyer is Richard Kirby, with an offer rumoured at around \$2 million. Kirby is the brother of broadcasting veteran Thane Kirby who is a director of Luke Dallow's low-powered station Radio Ponsonby.

But it is understood that Dallow and Ponsonby FM have no role in the Big FM sale negotiations. The Kirby brothers worked together at George FM, where Richard ran sales and marketina.

Village Radio is going FM and moving to a 24/7 broadcast format in a partnership with Access Community Radio in Hamilton.

The current Village Radio building in the Historic Village is to be redeveloped into new studios, and a radio museum.

"This is going to be huge for the community and over the next six months will establish itself to be an important asset to the Bay of Plenty," says Village Radio chairman Colin Beere.

Village Radio has broadcast on 1368AM for 26 years from 9am-5pm.

The Village Radio Charitable Trust is also the owner of one of the largest collections of historic records in New Zealand and an extensive collection of irreplaceable radio broadcasting and recording equipment.

The Village Radio trustees are negotiating an arrangement with Access Community Radio to take their entire transmission and rebroadcast it over Village Radio's FM frequency, except for during Village Radio's current hours.

"The opportunity to introduce Access Radio to the Bay of Plenty is simply massive and the plan is that as our own region begins to embrace this powerful community tool the local station will accordingly reduce the Waikato transmission and replace it with our own local content," says Colin.

The FM frequency is yet to be established.

UNESCO WORLD PRESS FREEDOM DAY GLOBAL CONFERENCE May 2-3, 2010 BRISBANE, QUEENSLAND, AUSTRALIA

The UNESCO World Press Freedom Day Global Conference was hosted in Brisbane at the University of Queensland on Sunday 2nd and Monday 3rd of May, 2010. The theme of this years conference was FREEDOM OF INFORMATION: THE RIGHT TO KNOW. This was the first time that such a conference had been held in the Pacific Region and it was appropriate that it was held at UQ as this year is their 100th aniversary.

The conference was planned and organised by Associate Professor Martin Hadlow (member and Dxer) of the School of Journalism and Communications at UQ and it was most unfortunate he was unable to be there after having been hospitalised a week before.

There were many speakers from around the world taking part in several most interesting discussion sessions over the two days. The Director General of UNESCO, Irina Bokova, was in attendance and gave the UQ Centenary Oration for World Press Freedom

Day at the opening ceremony. She also spoke at the closing cermony and presented the UNESCO WPF Day prize to Monica Gonzalez Mujica from Chile who was jailed for 15 years in the days of General Pinochet.

During the conference it was my pleasure to meet and have two long discussions with Dan Southerland, Executive Director of Radio Free Asia. He was most interested our radio hobby and asked that Dxers send reception reports, as the more they get the better they like it.

Hadlow (member and Dxer) of the School of Jounalism and Communications at UQ.F Day events were broadcast through an innovative "Radio In A Box" radio transmitter. A 'special events' community broadcasting licence was obtained to transmit on FM 94.3 to the University campus and neighbouring suburbsand demonstrated the technology to interested media professionals and conference delegates.

The portable "Radio In A Box" is a compact and mobile radio transmitter, which can be used to broadcast messages in post-disaster situations in Asia and the Pacific. It's a UNESCO product designed by an engineer at the Kuala Lumpur based Asia-Pacific Broadcasting Union (ABU). The 'box' contains a 30 watt FM transmitter, a small computer, microphones, CD/cassette player, digital audio recorder and all the other essentials needed to set up a radio station in an emergency situation or disaster area. These are now built by In a Box Inovations based in Melbourne, Australia.

MAILBAG

I was very grateful to our good contributor, Terry Nielsen, who wrote in the last Mailbag that he disagreed with my comment in the March issue that "one cannot say that we are in anyway deprived of stations to tune!" and implied that I was wrong in counting say, the CRI's 250-300 frequencies as the same number of stations. We seem to have differing opinions on what constitutes a 'Station.' The section of the WRTVH is entitled, 'Stations of the World.' Thus I added up the items and arrived at a figure of 4540. Note that the section was not headed, 'List of World Frequencies."

A 'Station' in my opinion is one transmitter sending out a radio signal on one frequency. We can also have networks of stations - all sending the same programme or not on multiple frequencies. On the other hand, a 'Broadcaster,' is the entity which operates the stations - such as the CRI. Does anyone else have another opinion? Please let me know!

Terry raised another good discussion point. He mentioned Radio Australia and CRI and remarked that just because these broadcasters dominate the SW, listening to SW was so much better some 40 years ago. I agree with you Terry if you are a straightforward SW listener. Music, for example was rarely satisfactory because of the poor fidelity, high compression, various types of distortion, signal loss and noise, not to mention interference. Entertainment types of programming are much better served by local relays and the internet and that is why there is a great reduction in these sorts of content and that is logical. However, I understand that the new DRM system overcomes some of these problems.

But if you are a Dxer, I don't think things have changed. There have always been huge broadcasters and their networks of stations. In 1970, the BBC was transmitting on 163 SW frequencies. In 2010 they use 176. In 1970, the VOA had 111 such frequencies. Currently, 190. The former Radio Moscow, now the Voice of Russia, in 1970 was listed as 18 but as merely 'Moscow' added 53. And amongst the remaining 230 other Russian SW stations were a number of 250 kW ones. Remember, the Cold War was on! Now, the VOR has 88 frequencies. Similarly, Radio Peking had 318 (but some were domestic), now CRI lists 263.

Bryan Clark demonstrated that for Dxers there is still good quality on the shortwaves when he reported in the January Mailbag: "Radio Kahuzi (5066) in the Congo Democratic Republic with just 800 watts must rate as one of my best logs and QSLs in 48 years of radio listening. Then there's the 2 new Uruguayans on 49 metres, Dominican Republic 6025, a bevy of low-powered America and European hobby pirates- and that's just shortwave highlights!" Bryan's not alone. John Durham last month reported his QSL from Cupid Radio, Netherlands, a 400 watter on 15070 and there are usually other good examples in the Bandwatch under and over 9MHz almost every month.

Günter Jacob, Passau, Germany sent us an Airmail letter saying:

"Warm greetings from my home town, the three-river-city of Passau in East Bavaria, where our European spring has just started (yesterday's temperature of 20.5 degrees centigrade was very encouraging!).

Regrettably last week all my e-mails disappeared and until now I am unable to reinstall anything. That's why I have to contact you by the good old "snail" mail; it is not getting out of age, still works and keeps working. There is a similarity with shortwave, isn't it? We all regret the silence from Darwin. I took the opportunity of counting my Darwin QSLs, and here is the result (all different frequencies): 28 Radio Australia cards of 1970-1974, another 12 of 2001-2007, 27 Christian Vision cards of 2001-2009. I am waiting still for Radio Australia to verify 11865 and 11980 kHz and for CVC to verify 11925 and 17635 kHz. It will mean a total of 71 different Darwin QSLs as soon as the four missing cards will finally have arrived. Now as before Radio Romania holds back 9 QSLs for my monthly reports to the "Listeners' Club."

Only a few verifications arrived during the past four weeks, viz: RFA Tinian 7570, Deutsche Welle Sines 17800 and via Woofferton 12080. - More next time.

I hope that you keep enjoying a good life in beautiful New Zealand and I send my very best wishes." Thank you Günter for your heart warming letter and news. You've certainly a great collection of Darwin-based cards. And of course we hope you will soon be able to get those emails up and running again. Good luck - with a computer that is a necessity!

Jerry Berg, Lexington, MA sent us a short QSL note: "ENGLAND." 15760, "UK Rocks the World, colorful .JPG received day after hearing them; shows frequency, operator, control board, antenna, and "Belfast, UK," but no data and no QSL statement." A colourful pirate, no doubt. Thanks Jerry.

Rich D'Angelo, Wyomissing, PA reports "Our spring weather has had its ups and downs. Nice, warm dry weather (good for a round of golf) followed by cold damp weather (good for absolutely nothing useful). There have been three or more changes in weather patterns in one week on more than one occasion."

from v/s Charlie Loudenboomer; Radio Nederland – Tinang 1 Philippines 5860 verified with a full data "Cleaning the canals in Weesp" card in 90 days; Trans World Radio – Meyerton, South Africa 7215 verified through Sentech in 27 days with a full data letter from v/s Sikander Hoosern, HF Coverage Planning who indicated the transmitter is a 250 kW Brown Boveri, located at the Meyerton Transmitting Station in South Africa at geographical coordinates 26S35 28E08. It's nice to know you're still hearing us OK up there Rich and great to get your news.

ALASKA Last weekend. KICY in Nome held a celebration to mark an important milestone: the 50th Anniversary of their station. Owned by the Arctic Broadcasting Association and run primarily by full-time and part-time volunteers, this station has a unique footprint throughout Western Alaska and Russia's Far East. KICY AM 850 is a 50,000-watt station and runs 24 hours per day, sending the Gospel of Christ into regions that aren't necessarily accessible through other forms of media. NRB President & CEO Dr. Frank Wright sent KICY a letter, which was read at the celebratory dinner. "It is through the efforts of KICY that so many over the past 50 years, not only in Western Alaska, but in Eastern Russia across the Bering Strait, have been able to hear, believe and follow Jesus." He continued, "Praise God for your work in the industry as we seek the common goal of spreading the Gospel message to those who need to hear it." While KICY has broadcast into Russia since 1960, it wasn't until the late 1980's that the station management discovered that they were broadcasting into Russia at 5,000 watts. Today, it's the only commercial radio station in the United States that the FCC has licensed to broadcast into another country, and in another language. When Alaska sleeps, KICY turns their full 50,000 watts toward Russia, and Luda Kinock takes over. As a native of the Sireniki area of Eastern Russia, Kinock grew up listening to KICY programming, and today she not only directs KICY's Russian programming but includes a popular program "CareForce," where Russian pastors pray for needs on the air. This sentence is incorrect: "While KICY has broadcast into Russia since 1960, it wasn't until the late 1980's that the station management discovered that they were broadcasting into Russia at 5,000 watts." Actually, from the very beginning KICY was well-aware of its coverage of then highly militarised Soviet Chukotka. Moreover, the station had to compete for its local Eskimo audience with a well-funded and highly professional Yupik service from the Soviet city of Anadyr. KICY launched its Russian service in 1970. But the first written responses came in the late 1980s. (I guess that's what NRB Today is referring to when it talks about the management's "discovery.") In 1994 KICY had direct contacts with Yupik service in Anadyr. There were discussions of some joint projects. But from what I know nothing came out of that. (Sergei

HAWAII KPUA Hilo on 670 noted with ident 0759 UTC as "67 AM KPUA Hilo". Station no longer audible in the daytime since it was announced the station was granted permission by the FCC to halve its power to 5 kW. I called the station on 4 May to find out when this change occurred, but the receptionist seemed confused and blamed the lack of daytime signal to either sunspots or electrical problems! (Dale Park, HI via NRC DX News) The applicant for new station on Keaau, Hawaii on 1240 with 1kw day & night U1 has amended their application to 5kw days, 1kw nights U1 on 1250kHz. (NRC DX News) KUMU Honolulu HI on 1500 now carries overnight programme from its FM outlet called "Quiet Storm" show. Slogans include "94-7 Ku-mu" and "Always Better Music." (Dale Park HI via NRC DX News)

SOLOMON ISLANDS In a letter to the Solomon Star, Cornelius Rathamana, General Manager of the Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation (SIBC) says that the BBC radio relay on the National AM service after midnight has had to be switched off. The people of the Solomon Islands have been receiving BBC World Service relays from the SIBC National Service since the beginning of this millennium from 11 PM to 6 AM local time next demur Rathamana says that due to high cost of electricity, SIBC will no longer be supporting the relay as it will have to shut down its transmitters as soon as the national broadcast finishes at 11 PM. He adds that SIBC has taken this decision with full understanding that the growing BBC audience in the Solomon Islands will be deprived of this service when it is switched off. However, Mr. Rathamana says that SIBC can restore the relay if the electricity costs of the relay times were sponsored. The annual cost for the relay on one HF transmitter at 10kW is estimated at SBD\$90,000.00 (US\$11,471). (Solomon Star via RN media network weblog)

TIWAI 23 - 27 APRIL 2010

Paul Aronsen, Arthur de Maine and Steven Greenyer made a Tiwai visit again this year. Arthur arrived late having been held up for an hour by the bomb scare on the outskirts of Dunedin. Saturday saw a somewhat unusual warm northerly wind, which was obviously associated with the approaching front that caused flooding in Western Southland. We escaped most of this with only a day and a half of intermittent rain and drizzle. While the

weather was fine a squid pole antenna was erected. Sunday saw a second ewe erected for the USA and the South American one repositioned more to the north so tests could be conducted using two ewes fed to an MFJ antenna phaser. Paul and Steven also tried fishing with no luck due to both forgetting to bring bait, Paul leaving his in the Super Market. As Sunday was ANZAC day, hams in Australia are able to use an "AX" call sign, so we used the squid pole antenna to talk on Paul's ham set to Ray Crawford on 40 metres with the call AX4DXA. While Sunday and Monday were a bit wet we borrowed one of the duck shooters trailers and gathered up a new supply of fire wood. On Monday three of the Smelter Volunteer firemen arrived for a look around and we were able to talk to them about the large fire that occurred last year. While the scattered manuka patches are destroyed the whole burnt area is green with bracken and the burnt over flax and tussock now has new growth up to a metre high. Several power poles on the bore line road are still down awaiting a decision as to whether the power will be put under ground. Bryan Clark txted some MW frequencies he was hearing at his home, surprisingly none of these were any good at Tiwai. Best Latin by far was Peru on 1570 kHz, best and most consistent signals were from Peruvians. Several Argentineans were heard but nowhere as good as last year. Colombians once so dominant a few years ago are fewer and weaker. With the exception of WAOI 1200 kHz yanks were totally absent. On SW Africans were around in the mornings.

The phaser test with the two ewes was disappointing as there were no North Americans to oppose the S. Americans it was not ideal conditions to conduct tests. The squid pole referred to is a telescopic fishing

rod that pulls out to 9 metres, mine currently has a coil and wire that spirals around it for the 40 m ham band, given that it is designed for 40 metres it performed well on 7 MHz and some other SW frequencies but no good on bc. It has potential as a portable antenna, not as directional as a EWE but should make a good SW antenna. The beverage antennas still have it over the EWE's for sensitivity and direction. One of the problems in the south with EWE's is that there are no stations behind the EWE's that can be nulled out so this very good characteristic is wasted. Thanks to Paul for arranging the food and supplies.

DX-PEDITION TO STEWART ISLAND, NEW ZEALAND OC-203

Some two or so years ago discussions between Paul Ormandy ZL4PW, Ray Crawford VK4DXA and Paul Aronsen ZL4PA were held on the possibility on doing an amateur radio DX-pedition. In the end this resulted in Stewart Island, OC-203 being decided upon as it was a relatively rare IOTA (Island On The Air) and easily accessed. In July 2009, Ray and Paul Aronsen, made a day trip to the Island to check out possible sites and accommodation. Seabreeze Cottage at Horseshoe Bay was eventually selected from those seen http://www.holidayhouses.co.nz/properties/2708.asp) which proved to be an ideal location for setting up the stations. Seabreeze Cottage had plenty of room to erect antennas and was well away from local inhabitants so the possibility of interference would be lessened. Mid March 2010, was picked as the time to make it all happen. It was originally planned to be there for the CQ WPX Contest on the last weekend of March but due to work commitments it had to be brought forward a week. The DX-pedition was now to be from Friday 12 to Tuesday 23 March, 2010.

After a one hour ferry trip across Foveaux Strait from Bluff we arrived on the island and had all our gear transported to Sea Breeze Cottage which is some 4 kilometres from Oban. The equipment used were an Elecraft K3 and Icom IC706/MKIIG transceivers, SGC SG-230 and Icom AH4 couplers, Dunestar 600 6-band box (2 off) and Dunestar 300 series 12,17 and 30m single band pass filters. Logging software used was Logger 32 and N1MM. The antennas erected were a 5 band 20-10m hex beam (thanks to Holger ZL3IO (ex DL7IO for the Ioan) and Spiderbeam poles which are made of strong fibreglass. They

are a very light and telescope down to a convenient length for shipping. One of the 9m poles had a 1m extension made out of PVC pipe added and was tuned up for the 40m band. The 18m pole had 20.6m of wire wound around it for 80 and 160 metres. Each of the verticals had two elevated tuned radials supported by electric fence standards for each band.

The 30/40m vertical was erected and we got on air on the Friday night. Paul ZL4PW using his ZL4M call and Ray VK4DXA using his ZL4TY call. Paul ZL4PA and Raewyn VK-

4DXA's xyl were busy preparing the evening meal. On Saturday morning the hex beam was erected along with the 80/160m vertical.

Conditions were not as good as we had hoped so the number of QSO's were well down on what we expected. There was a QRN problem and this was worst on 30m however if the signals were strong it was not an issue. It seemed to be erratic and no source was located. Signals on 20 to 10 metres were still poor after a week but there was a good opening into Europe on 20m SSB one day from 05-07Z when 89 stations were worked. Signals on 40m had been very good and the QRN seemed to be a lot lower in strength on that band. 30M was hard work and signals needed to be strong to get through but that was put down to conditions. With only two days to go 20-10m were still poor. The best bands were still 30 and 40 metres and 80m was not as good as it could have been.

On Friday 19th March we had the pleasure to host Steven Greenyer ZL4SG who flew over and stayed until Monday. He put up a beverage to listen to USA broadcast band stations and compare reception with the famous Tiwai Point DX listening site. For more information on the Tiwai listening site see:

The operation went QRT on March 22 as we had to vacate the accommodation by 10am the next morning. The beam was dismantled on the 22nd and the remaining antennas were taken down in the rain on the 23rd. We ended up with 3573 QSO's in the logs which were uploaded to ClubLog. We are sure we could have had more if the higher bands had opened as we hoped they would. We ran barefoot at all times and judging by the size of the pile-ups, we were getting out really well. Some of the "real" signal reports we were given were very encouraging. We hope go back again, probably to Seabreeze, for another DX-pedition perhaps in a year or two when conditions should be much improved.

Band by band QSO totals are as follows: 10 and 12 m nil; 15m 105; 17m 6; 20m 545; 30m 1684; 40m 1093; 80m 139 and 160m 1.

While on the island we took the opportunity of spending some time looking around the various tourist attractions that are too many to list here. When on Stewart Island, a 'must do' is a visit to Ulva Island, only seven minutes away and Kiwi spotting at night with Bravo Adventure Tours. There are lots of day walks through the bush where plenty of native birds and plants will be seen.

We must thank Mona Wiig, http://www.rakiuralodge.co.nz/ for all her assistance while we were planning for the trip, arranging transport of all our equipment, looking after us while on the island and allowing us to use her internet connection to upload our logs to ClubLog and send emails when we needed to.
