



Miriam Mtonga, Public Relations Manager for the Zambia National Broadcasting Corporation (ZNBC), says that the Corporation is in the process of procuring the replacement parts for the shortwave transmitter[s] which broke down earlier this year rendering no service to most parts of the country.

She said the tender process of procuring the replacement parts has been concluded and a contract has been signed with the supplier for the purchase of the parts at a cost of US\$130, 000. "Delivery of this will take about five months and during this time we regret that Radio One and Two will remain off air in the affected areas of the coun-

try," Ms Mtonga said.

And the ZNBC Public Relations Manager said ZNBC with the support of government, has embarked on a rural FM Project to install FM radio transmitters in some districts to supplement the shortwave transmitters.

The harp is played while sitting on the floor and holding it in one's lap; the strings are plucked with the right hand while the musician uses their left hand to dampen the strings which improve note clarity and help produce staccato notes. FM Frequency Change Chaos

Now rolling out across the country, the 250 or so FM frequency changes are potentially throwing the FM dial into chaos. We've obtained copies of the working documents used by Radio Spectrum Management which reveal that allocated new FM frequencies are having to be continually adjusted.

Surprises

Amongst the reasons - they're finding transmitters on the air they didn't know existed, they're finding licences not in their system because they've been issued by other authorities, and when field tests are undertaken the interference with other stations is often beyond their computer model predictions.

WRTH 2011 Update

Some changes are ranked as 'easy', but others are proving very complicated as the rollout takes place from north to south. We've been updating the WRTH 2011 files with as many of the new changes for major metro markets as possible, but many of the smaller centres and rural areas will not be settled until well into 2011.

Co-operation

The technical teams at the four major networks - RadioWorks, TRN, Radio NZ and Rhema BG are working closely with transmission site owners and RSM staff to co-ordinate the practical changes.

LPFM Also Changes

At the same time, the LPFM frequencies have been changed with effect from June 17 and some parts of the country have restricted access to some frequencies until land mobile operations end on October 1.

New rules include a move to vertical antenna polarisation only, some technical tightening up to reduce interference, and an increase in power to 1w eirp is allowed.

'Old' frequencies can be used with 0.5w until July 19, when all LPFM stations must be on a 'new' frequency with changed antenna, and give contact details and ID at least once an hour.

750 FM transmitters affected

Taken together, these changes potentially affect some 500+ LPFM stations currently estimated to be on the air, along with the 250 full power FM changes. Therefore, some 750 individual FM transmitters are currently involved in the biggest shakeup of the FM dial since FM was introduced to New Zealand over two decades ago. (David Ricquish, Wellington)

Key says no decision on digital TV switch yet

Cabinet has not yet decided on when the switch from analogue to digital TV will take place, Prime Minister John Key said today.

Discussions have been taking place over whether the total switch to digital should be brought forward from 2015 to 2013.

Broadcasting network operator Kordia, a State-owned company, has warned that an early switch could have see a significant loss of revenue for it.

Kordia chairman David Clarke wrote in a letter to State-Owned Enterprises Minister Simon Power that "the impact [of an early switch] on the financial performance of the company will be severe."

The Dominion Post obtained the letter among under an Official Information Act request. The size of the potential loss was deleted from the documents it received.

"I know they are under tremendous pressure," Mr Key told reporters today.

"I have certainly seen in terms of the SOE reporting that they have financially been not in a position to pay a dividend."

While a decision had not yet been reached, Mr Key said his "instinct" was for 2015 but detailed discussions needed to be held.

Govt seeks help to turn off analogue TV

Government officials are sounding out technology companies about the best way to expand the reach of free-to-air digital television as a Cabinet decision on the shutdown date for analogue TV approaches.

The Ministry for Culture and Heritage has this week asked companies in the broadcasting technology industry for their views on the most cost-effective way to extend the country's existing digital terrestrial television (DTT) transmission network.

The ministry will use the information to plan spending of up to \$6.3 million which the Government has set aside to expand the reach of DTT beyond the 75 per cent of the population now able to receive the broadcasts.

Viewers can receive free-to-air broadcasts over the Freeview platform, launched in 2008, either using a UHF aerial - if they are inside the DTT broadcast coverage area - or via satellite reception, which covers the whole country.

Analogue television broadcasting is due to be switched off some time between 2013 and 2015, although the Government has yet to fix a precise date.

There is pressure to switch off the broadcasts so the radio frequencies they use can be

redeployed for high-speed wireless communications services.

Seventy-five per cent of the population can receive free-to-air television at present through the DTT service which is broadcast across networks of "terrestrial" or earth-based transmission towers and picked up by UHF antennas in the home. Viewers outside the DTT coverage area can receive digital TV signals through a satellite service.

"Extending DTT coverage could potentially act as an incentive for digital television take-up, and, thus the earlier achievement of [analogue TV shutdown] as set-up costs for consumers are cheaper," the Ministry for Culture and Heritage said in a pre-tender document distributed to technology companies this week. "DTT also allows for high-definition content and regionalised content."

The Government's commitment to provide up to \$6.3 million to expand the reach of DTT is conditional on the coverage being extended from 75 per cent to about 87 per cent of the population.

The ministry's discussions with technology companies are in part aimed at sounding them out on whether the expansion can be achieved on the Government's budget.

Prime Minister John Key said this week the Cabinet had yet to decide when the analogue TV signal would be switched off.

While detailed discussions still needed to be held on the subject, his "instinct" was that switch-off would be in 2015, he said.

Setting the switch-off date is a hot political potato.

Scrapping the analogue service will enable the frequencies to be used for eagerly awaited new data communications services and will net the Government welcome funds through licensing fees to broadcasters or telecommunications companies wanting to use those frequencies.

On the other hand, the death of the traditional analogue broadcast service will anger some voters who do not see the need to replace their existing TV sets with new models capable of receiving a digital signal.

One of the Government's state-owned enterprises, transmission technology company Kordia, has also warned that it faces a major financial headache if the move is made sooner, rather than later.

In a letter to State-Owned Enterprises Minister Simon Power, obtained by the Dominion Post newspaper under the Official Information Act, Kordia chairman David Clarke warns "the impact [of an early shutdown of the analogue network] on the financial performance of the company will be severe".

Clarke said the switchover date was "a serious issue for the company as Kordia's banks have expressed concerns as to the impact on Kordia's financial performance should DSO [digital switchover] move forward from 2015 to 2013".

Kordia, previously a high-earning division of TVNZ which pulled in significant revenue from building, maintaining and running analogue broadcast networks, has suffered financially in recent years as it has attempted to diversify its business.

It is under increasing pressure from the Government to show a return on taxpayer investment.

"I know they are under tremendous pressure," Key said when asked about the Kordia letter at this week's post-Cabinet press conference.

"I have certainly seen in terms of the SOE reporting that they have financially been not in a position to pay a dividend."

Australia starts its Analogue TV Switch-Off

The countdown to the day when DXing TV signals from Oz is underway.

The following is extracted from an article in 'Techworld' by Rodney Gedda dated 30 June 2010.

People in metropolitan and regional areas of Australia are still relying on analog signals to watch TV even as the government begins switching off the older technology in favour of digital-only broadcasts.

June 30 is first day digital-only signals will be broadcast in an area of Australia – the Mildura/Sunraysia region on the NSW-Victoria border.

The Minister for Broadband, Communications and the Digital Economy, Senator Stephen Conroy, said the switch to digital-only television in Mildura/Sunraysia is an historic day for Australia.

"Representatives of the Digital Switchover Taskforce have been out in force in Mildura/Sunraysia over the last few weeks to ensure that all possible help is given to the local community," Conroy said.

Digital switchover liaison officer, Kellie Boyce, said more than 2500 households have been helped to convert to digital TV under the government's Household Assistance Scheme.

With analog being cut off in regional areas first, some households - estimated to be 1 or 2 per cent by the government – will not be ready for the handover and lose signals as a result.

A NSW Central Coast resident told /TechWorld/ analog is still used where the channel reception is not good enough in digital.

"Some channels like Nine and Ten do not display well in digital so we watch them in analog. In fact, most of the time those digital channels do not display at all due to the poor signal quality. Other digital channels like ABC, SBS and Seven generally work well."

The person said digital also tends to be more sensitive to adverse weather conditions – if there is high wind or a storm the analog channels are viewable whereas the digital display is affected more significantly.

"We know we don't have the best reception, but if the government is going to remove the option of viewing TV with analog I hope it helps people get all the channels in digital first." Another person, commenting on a News.com.au digital TV report http://www.

said an antenna installer advised "everyone to stick to analogue or get cable TV instead because digital will never work here unless a new transmitter tower is built".

Continuing installation of digital broadcast transmitters and Viewer Access Satellite Television (VAST) http://www.mysattv.com.au mean regional households have options to avoid black spots.

VAST is a government-funded satellite service which provides access to the digital TV channels available in capital cities, including multi-channels like ABC2, ABC3, SBSTwo, 7Two, Go! and OneHD.

It will also broadcast the new ABC 24 hour news channel when it is launched later this year, in addition to a dedicated local news channel, according to the department.

Conroy said the government is committed to improving digital television services in all parts of Australia with the digital switch-over scheduled for completion on December 31, 2013.

The next analog switch off will be in regional South Australia and Broken Hill on December 15, 2010.

Many of our members, especially those who are also of the Ham fraternity will be very aware of what goes on inside our radios, but I am sure there will be some who do not. This brief description is written for them.

There are several types of radio receiver but nearly all those currently used will be of the type called 'Superheterodyne'- or 'Superhet' for short. This is the name for the system in which an incoming station's signal, obviously at the station's frequency, is made to beat (or mix) with a local variable oscillator (signal generator) to produce a constant lower frequency signal which can be amplified - resulting in better selectivity and signal gain. So, our radio may have a **(A) Radio Frequency (RF) amplifier** to initially boost the signal from the antenna. This is usually tuned to stop or reduce signals being included from unwanted frequencies. The output from that is fed into the **(B) Mixer** - a circuit where it is mixed with the signal from the **(C) Variable Oscillator/signal generator.**

This produces two signals. (a) one at the <u>difference</u> between the frequencies of the two signals - called the Intermediate Frequency (I F) and (b) one at the <u>sum</u> of the frequencies of the signals.

The signal at the higher frequency (b) is rejected by an **(D)** Intermediate Frequency **(IF)** filter which accepts only the signal at the lower frequency (a.) This may be a crystal filter or mechanical filter which is switched to accept different bandwidths or degrees of selectivity. Or just one or two tuned circuits. The signal is then amplified by one or two **(E)** IF Amplifiers which add the main sensitivity and selectivity to the receiver. Here also is injected the signal from another variable oscillator/signal generator called a **(F)** BFO

Beat Frequency Oscillator which provides the carrier signal to compensate for that missing in SSB signals - necessary before the signal can be detected. (An alternative is a Product Detector served by a BFO)

Finally, the signal is converted into a variable DC current by (G) Diode/Rectifier/Detector which is itself amplified by several stages of voltage and power (H) Audio Amplifiers. Part of the signal fed into (G) is diverted to a separate (I) AVC-automatic volume control diode/rectifier which then provides negative bias to (A) and (E) stages above, so that the radio becomes progressively insensitive as the original signal increases- so your ears are not demolished! This AVC voltage also operates your S Meter.

This system has been used since the 1930s employing, in turn, valves/tubes, transistors and integrated circuits (ICs.)

ARGENTINA New on AM from Buenos Aires City is Radio AM 1710 on 1710kHz. Heard by Arnaldo Slaen with a relay of an FM station in Paraguay. Radio Antares from Manzanares-Pilar on 1650 AM has also been heard. (Arnaldo Slaen, Argentina, June 21, condiglist yg via Glenn Hauser's DXLD)

AUSTRALIA On 23 June, Gary Deacon in South Africa heard an ABC test transmission from Busselton WA on 1152 kHz - a new proposed ABC News Radio service for the Bunbury-Busselton area. The test transmission, heard via the Sony SRF-M37V ultralight receiver and 220 metre BOG directed towards Perth, was verified promptly by Graham from ABC Master Control. Apparently the Federal Government has pledged additional funding for the expansion of new ABC News Radio services into all centres around Australia with populations of more than 10,000 (subject to the availability of spectrum) and will include over 80 frequencies by the end of 2010 according to the ABC News Radio website, says Gary. According to Bruce Portzer, the ACMA website says this is a 10kw transmitter with the call sign 6PNN. Gary Deacon has also discovered that ABC Radio National from Busselton has relocated from 1224 AM to 1269 AM. On 28 June he heard ABC News Radio Busselton in operation with a BBC relay and 6RN Busselton 1269 with "Australia Talks", parallel to his most consistently heard West Australian 6RN on 1296. (via Coastal Roundtable Yahoo Group)

CANADA (thanks to IRCA's DX Monitor magazine June 2010)

- 620 CKRM Regina SK has changed from Country to Country & Sports format.
- 1370 CFOK Westlock AB drops 'The Fox' slogan for '1370 CFOK' with Classic Hits format.
- 1400 CKGR Golden BC granted move to FM 106.3 with 890 watts.
- 1610 CHHA Toronto ON proposes increasing nighttime power from 1kw to 6.25kw.

MEXICO A COFETEL press release notes authorisation of a new expanded-band station on 1670 in Cd. Anáhuac in Nuevo León (not too horribly far from Monterrey in northeastern Mexico). The station was authorized last November to the Universidad Anáhuac.

Another news release notes the progress of the country's voluntary plan to move AM stations to FM. In Region I (Campeche, Quintana Roo, Tabasco, and Yucatán), *every* authorized AM station requested an FM frequency. I don't *think* the deadline has yet

expired for applying in the other five regions.

Under the plan, AM stations receiving an FM frequency must begin FM operation within a year. They are required to leave the AM station on the air for a year after the FM launches, simulcasting the FM (similar to Canadian practice but with a much longer simulcast period). In cases where populations receive only AM signals, COFETEL may require the AM simulcast to continue for an indefinite period, beyond one year (Doug Smith NRC-AM 16 June via WORLD OF RADIO 1518, DXLD)

NEW LEAGUE CONSTITUTION APPROVED A special general meeting of the NZ Radio DX League in Auckland on 27 June voted unanimously to adopt the new constitution that will significantly change the club's governance model.

When the DX League was founded in 1948, voting at general meetings was restricted to elected officials and branch delegates. Subsequently members elected to life membership were also able to cast votes. Under the new constitution, now in effect, anyone who is a NZ resident and has held membership for at least 3 years, will have voting rights, or can assign a proxy for someone who will be present at a League Annual General Meeting or Special General Meeting, to vote on their behalf.

Other features of the new constitution are:

- Simplified rules for formation and running of local branches. The minimum number of members falls from 5 to 4, and there is no formal requirement for a committee structure or keeping/reporting on branch finances. The main aim of a branch is now stated as "providing members with the opportunity for local social interaction and practical support for pursuing their DX hobby."
- Recognition of the Internet as an increasingly important means of supporting the DX hobby and our members, with a club website administered by a Webmaster appointed by, and responsible to, the Administration Committee.
- A requirement for any media comment in the name of the DX League to have prior approval of the Administration Committee.
- Additional guidance on running of the Annual General Meeting and Special General Meetings. A special general meeting can now be scheduled by the Administration Committee if requested by 15 financial members, with at least 12 weeks prior notice of the time and place.
- The role of the Administration Committee has been clarified, as "the management of the League, in accordance with policy which has been determined or ratified by the General Meetings".

The new constitution will be published at our website www.radiodx.com shortly, and members may request a printed copy by writing to our National Secretary **MIKE BUTLER** at the address published elsewhere in this magazine.

BBC MONITORING UNDER THREAT According to a 'Guardian' newspaper report by James Robinson on 9 July, this well-known professional radio monitoring operation faces significant job losses and even a risk of closure. Chris Westcott, director of BBC Monitoring, told employees in a briefing on Monday that the "situation is grim" and the organisation is at a "tipping point". It could even be closed down, he warned. BBC Monitoring employs about 450 people in the UK and overseas, with a main base at Caversham Park in Reading. It tracks and translates press, TV and radio reports from 150 countries in more than 100 languages. The organisation's role and funding is being examined by the government as part of it strategic defence and security review, the first for 12 years. The service can trace its routes back to 1939, when a forerunner was founded to provide the UK government with information about wartime propaganda and press reports from overseas. It played a key role keeping UK governments informed during the Cold War and has provided coverage of dozens of key historical events, including the failed 1956 Hungarian uprising, the 1962 Cuban missile crisis and the overthrow of the Shah of Iran in 1979. PHIL BARTON, a former long-time member of the DX League in Wellington, died on17 June at the age of 84. Phil had been in care with Alzheimers for the past couple years. When he knew that his health was deteriorating, he decided to give up the hobby and donated most of his bits and pieces and books to the Quartz Hill User Group. The sale of the items made a welcome addition to the group's funds. Thank you to User Group

and DX League member **RALPH SUTTON** who attended Phil's funeral and conveyed condolences on behalf of the League.

NORTH OTAGO BRANCH ARCHIVAL REPORT received from PETER GRENFELL.

In 1971 the North Otago Branch set up a project committee to preserve radio listening material. Over the years this material accumulated and was stored in various places. In 1996 the Hocken Library in Dunedin agreed to provide a permanent home for the many collections of past and sometimes present D.X.ers. In recent times the Hocken and the League have reviewed the policy arrangements and this has necessitated some changes. Over the years the North Otago Branch has accumulated miscellaneous material and several files of letters.

On the 13th July 2010 our Patron the Rev. Dr. Frank Glen took to the Hocken Library all the remaining material and records to deposit these at the Hocken with the League Archives.

Some of this material contains profiles of several well known D.X.ers who were and some still are members of the League. Newspaper clippings from the collections of Jack Fox and Peter Grenfell some going back to the 1930's were included. Also deposited were a selection of early copies of the magazines "The Broadcaster" and the "N.Z. Radio record" some going back to 1937. These magazines were the forerunner to the Listener and contain an interesting glimpse into the early days of radio in N.Z.

Under "Specialized Resources," we have posted five more sets of "The Pioneer Days" column from the NNRC bulletin. In these columns, Carroll Weyrich looked back at what was happening in the NNRC from the 1930s through the 1950s. These columns were published in the years 1974 through 1978. -- Also under "Specialized Resources" you will find two more "Wavescan" stories, both from May 2, 2010: "The VOA at Ocean Gate, NJ," and "Earthquake Radio in Haiti."

In "DX History/Recordings," John Herkimer has posted a special Radio Canada International Shortwave Club LP recording produced in 1974 by Ian McFarland, producer and co-host of the Radio Canada Shortwave Club. Copies were offered as a prize in an RCI Shortwave Club survey contest. (Some copies were also available at various DX gatherings.) Side 1 of the LP contains an introduction by Jim Coward, host of the Radio Canada Shortwave Club; a long discussion about World DX Friendship Year 1973, originally broadcast on October 6, 1973 and featuring participation by Harry Van Gelder (Radio Nederland), Reg Kennedy and Henry Hatch (BBC), Arne Skoog (Radio Sweden), and Arthur Cushen (Radio New Zealand): and a seament on SWBC transmitting antennas. Side 2 contains segments on SW receiver specifications; interference (with examples of 14 different kinds); and the Northern Lights; plus a closing message from Ian McFarland. Thanks to John for this nice piece of SWBC history. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" stories, both from May 9, 2010: "Early Mediumwave Stations in the New Pakistan," and "American Applause Cards." (For some examples of applause cards, search for "Applause Cards" in the "QSLs & Other Station Memorabilia" section of the "DX History" page of www.ontheshortwaves.com.)

Under "Specialized Resources/Radio Postcards," you will find some new cards from Arkansas and Alabama. From Arkansas: KFPW, located in the Hotel Goldman, Fort Smith; the "radio receiving station" in the Hotel Mariana, Mariana; and an unidentified antenna array atop the AOUW ("Ancient Order of United Workmen") Building in Little Rock. From Alabama: WDNG, Anniston; WTBF, Troy; a photo of WJMO, Opelika; and an unidentified tower at Duncan Place in Mobile. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," two more stories (May 16, 2010): "Early Shortwave Stations in the Philippines" and "Radio Broadcasting from Japanese Ships."

Under "Specialized Resources/The Pioneer Days," you will find the final four years--1979, 1980, 1981 and 1982--of Carroll Weyrich's NNRC column, "The Pioneer Days." The final column was in April 1982, which was the month the club closed down. Also in "Specialized Resources," there is another edition of Adrian Peterson's "Wavescan"

NEW ZEALAND DX TIMES

Under "DX History/Philately," we have posted a file containing eight radio-related postal covers from Canada. The first five were issued in connection with the 1971 "RCI Speaking to the World" stamp commemorating RCI's installation of new high power transmitters in Sackville, New Brunswick (the fourth cover has an explanatory insert). The sixth cover features the CBC "exploding pizza" stamp issued in 1986 (the reverse of the cover explains this well-known CBC symbol). The seventh cover is also from 1986, and features an overprint memorializing the 1986 ANARC Convention in Montreal. The final cover memorializes the first Seventh Day Adventist Church World Session held in Canada (2000), and includes an Adventist World Radio-Toronto imprint on the front. Two other Canadian covers were posted in our "Philately" section in the past, one from 1971, the other from 1986; to locate them, search the section for "Canada." -- Under "Specialized Resources" we have posted another "Wavescan" script with two stories (May 30, 2010): "Radio Broadcasting on Lonely Ascension Island, the BBC Atlantic Relay station," and "Radio Events in the Chile Earthquake."

Under "Specialized Resources/Radio Postcards," there is a new file containing eight postcard views of the 500-room U.S. Grant Hotel in San Diego, California, home of station KFSD. The extensive antenna structures are prominent on the roof. At one time the overcrowded hotel offered guests a fresh air alternative--one of 20+ completely furnished rooftop tents! These are visible on the fourth and fifth cards. -- In "DX History/Stations," we have posted a booklet, "Lyngby Radio Calling," which tells the story of Lyngby Radio, OXZ, the Danish coastal station whose history dates back to 1904. (Lyngby Radio ceased operating on shortwave on October 1, 2009.) Thanks to Jim Cumbie of Texas for sending this in. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," two new stories from Adrian Peterson (June 6, 2010): "The Temporary VOA Relay Station, Hicksville, Long Island, New York" and "Early Mediumwave QSL Cards."

Jim Cumbie has sent us some additional material. Under "DX History/Clubs & Publications" you will find the Statistics column from the December 1956 issue of the NNRC Bulletin. I see some familiar names there. -- Also this week, under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," a new Wavescan entry from Adrian Peterson (June 13, 2010), "Early Mediumwave Stations in Japan."

We have begun a new section under "Specialized Resources." It is called "DX Newsletters." In the pre-internet days, the monthly club bulletin was the principal means for disseminating DX information throughout the listening community. DX newsletters were a second vehicle. Shorter in length, and often issued more often than monthly, they served up DX information more promptly, and usually to a smaller audience. Here we will be posting samples of some of the DX newsletters of days gone by. Thanks to John Herkimer for the first NL posted here: a June 1949 issue of Ken Boord's "Flash Sheet." The Flash Sheet served as an information exchange among some of the most faithful contributors to Boord's Radio & Television News column, which he edited from 1944 to 1955, and an important source of information for the column. -- And under "Specialized Resources/ Wavescan," three more entries from Dr. Adrian M. Peterson: (1) "Non-QSL Cards, Mediumwave and Shortwave" (June 20, 2010); (2) "1938 Eclipse Broadcasts from Antarctica-South Georgia-Radio Broadcasting from Shortwave Communication Station ZBH" (July 4, 2010); and (3) "Radio Panorama 1-Ancient Predictions" (July 4, 2010).
