



ZL Op Caught with Way Too Much Power

The New Zealand Ministry of Economic Development released a statement on May 25 noting that its Radio Spectrum Management, that country's version of the FCC, had prosecuted a New Zealand ham for "transmitting outside the terms and conditions of the General user Radio License for Amateur Radio Operators." The crime? Going QRO (high power) on the HF bands with no less than 3,100 watts. According to NZART (New Zealand Association of Radio Transmitters), New Zealand hams are limited to 500 watts PEP on HF.

So, was he sniffed out by FCC-style band police using sophisticated direction finding techniques and spectrum analyzers? No, actually they were alerted when they saw the ham's video on You Tube showing the transmitter operating at 3,100 watts. The fine was \$1,750 plus \$130 court costs and they took away his monster transmitter.

HCJB AUSTRALIA: Here is a piece of information on very unique QSL-card. The Japanese service of HCJB Australia is currently issuing different QSL-cards every month. These cards are not issued by the station HCJB in Melbourne, but by the Yodobashi Church in Tokyo. The address for reception reports is mentioned at the end of this e-mail.

Now, July edition of its QSL-card is featuring an DX-pedition held from 25th to 27th of last June. The participants of this DX-pedition are six Japanese men and held on a small island called "Katsurashima". This island, Katsurashima is located in the bay of Matsushima, near Sendai, one of the major cities in the Northeast of Japan and apart from Tokyo approximately 350 kilometers.

As this island is under noise-free environment, so we hold DX-pedition once or twice every year.

This QSL-card would be issued for the reception reports in July, but if you miss to receive the broadcast within July, I suggest that you ask the Yodobashi Church to issue the July edition even after the reports in August.

Village Radio goes FM

Village radio, the Tauranga Historic Village radio station that has for decades proudly broadcast AM on antique equipment, has gone FM.

The radio station is now transmitting on 106.7FM as part of a development that will see the Village Radio become part of the country's Access Radio network.

It begins with Village Radio transmitting from 9am-5pm and then streaming the Hamilton community radio from 5pm.

"It's the start of bigger things," says Village Radio trust chairman Colin Beere. The longer term vision is to transform Village Radio into a full participant in community access radio.

"Everybody will end up with better communications, it means the community will be brought closer together," says Colin.

"In Nelson it brought all the ethnic groups together. They have huge community markets there, everybody goes along because everybody knows about it." In community access broadcasting, people are at the centre of the process and there is no editor. Community access radio stations do not make programmes - they provide the facilities, training and infrastructure that allow citizens to make their own radio. In so doing, access radio stations are both broadcasters and community facilitators. Community access radio is an affordable, accessible, and engaging medium that is affective, even transformative in people's lives.

Around New Zealand 11 community access stations are achieving great things with the communities they serve.

Community access radio is participatory broadcasting democracy. The 11 radio stations are represented by the Association of Community Access Broadcasters. ACAB is a listening post and lobbying body, which aims to provide a resource for stations and a link for potential broadcasters to the stations in their area.

In reply to Bryan Clark's comment about Nga Iwi FM still being received on 92.2, this particular transmitter is located on Tokatea Hill at 400 metres above sea level, some 8km east of Coromandel township. Because of this prominent location 92.2 Nga Iwi FM can be heard across the Hauraki Gulf easily to much of Auckland , particularly elevated parts of North Shore City (50 km to the west of Coromandel) , and to lower Northland's east coast , including elevated parts of Whangarei 150km N.W., with only ocean between.



Nga Iwi's main frequency has moved to 92.4, its txr site being near Maramarua just off S.H.2, about half way between Pukekohe and Thames.

Nga Iwi's studios are located at 5 Princes St, Paeroa (since January 2010); having previously been on Normanby Rd nearby since the station came to air in 1991. The local Paeroa 99.6 frequency transmits from the top of the studio building.

From Bryan's location at Mangawhai, the Tokatea site near Coromandel is 100km to the south east in a straight line.

Country music makes waves on police radio

A small-time Christchurch radio station operator has unwittingly picked a fight with the police and the Economic Development Ministry and it could cost him \$30,000.

John Downey's Radio Redwood is a Low Power FM [LPFM] station that broadcasts nostalgia and classical music over 107.5FM to a small radius of listeners.

The station operates on a free spectrum licence that bans broadcasting at higher than 0.5 watts of power.

But when Christchurch police began reporting country music blaring through their communications network, they found Mr Downey at the end of the radio waves.

Police ICT manager for the South Island John Coleman says the music disrupted every part of the network.

"Broadcast radio signals were very clearly heard for an hour at a time on police vehicle radios, police portable radios and by the police dispatcher in the Southern Communications Centre," Mr Coleman says.

The station was closed until the technical problems could be resolved, following an investigation by the ministry's radio spectrum monitoring staff and police engineers.

Radio Spectrum Management (RSM) group compliance manager Chris Brennan says he is considering prosecuting Mr Downey under the Radio Communications Act. That could lead to a fine of \$30,000, although Mr Downey says his not-for-profit organisation "could not afford anything like that".

Mr Downey says the power issue was due to a technical fault which has been repaired – and he is back on air.

"The adjustment we had on the transmitter to keep it down to the legal level was faulty," he says. "Even when we got it down to the legal level it was still interfering with the police band so we had to do some serious repairs on it, and as far as I know our technician reckons everything's okay."

Mr Brennan says the LPFM spectrum licences are active on what would otherwise be a "guard band" to keep commercial stations from straying into the aeronautical or emergency services range. He says the RSM is also keen to ensure LPFM stations don't take advantage of their free licences by expanding their broadcast range and advertising power.

Mr Downey says he plays little advertising and derives no regular income from the station. But Mr Brennan says he wants to "deliver a message" to make sure LPFM broadcasters pay attention to their licence conditions. "We believe there is sufficient technical evidence here to support a prosecution," he says.

Changes to the Management Right used for FM Broadcasting

The existing management right used for FM Broadcasting is to be extended to cover the range 88.4 MHz to 106.63 MHz. This extension results from a technical re-planning of the FM broadcast band, including recent changes to the licensing arrangements for Low Powered FM (LPFM) broadcasting.

Approved Radio Engineers and rightholders should be aware that these changes will also have an effect on the content of documents to the Registrar of Radio Frequencies, but only in cases where the management right number is required to be included on the form. The new management right number for the band is expected to be number 261 (MR 261). The management right documentation has been presented to the Registrar and the changes are expected to take place from Monday, 26 July 2010.

Modification of Spectrum Licences suitable for FM Sound Broadcasting

Policies relating to the modification of spectrum licences in the frequency bands used for VHF-FM sound broadcasting have also been updated prior to the expiry of the current management rights on 2 April 2011. These changes have been made to ensure the transition to the new management rights, due to commence on 3 April 2011, are made smoothly. The following applies to all commercial spectrum licences in the band 88.4 MHz to 106.63 MHz:

- Proposals for modification of licences in MR 261 now requires assessment of corresponding transition licences (also in MR 261), together with licences in MR 207:
- Modification of licences in MR261 will be processed in the usual manner and payment of the assessed value of the change will be required;
- Modification of licences in MR 207 will be held, pending the completion of the licence settlement process by 3 October 2010, and then processed once payment has been received.

MAILBAG

Firstly this month, I want to thank Mark, our Chief Editor, who started a search for assistance in converting written contributions to electronic. And now, grateful thanks to our good League member Theo Donnelly, in Canada, who has kindly agreed to do this. The first example of his generous help has resulted in an item in this month's Mailbag. Your assistance is very much appreciated, Theo.

The very first generator of a useful radio signal was the electrical spark - the discharge between two metallic terminals where a high voltage differential existed. These days, this is just a nuisance to radio listeners which they call electrical noise or interference. However, in the first days of radio this was the source of radio transmissions.

The heart of all radio since then has been the humble oscillator- whenever a locally generated signal was required. I mentioned several in last month's opening words. An oscillator is a simple electronic amplifier in which part of the output of the amplifier is fed back into the input and so the signal continuously revolves around the circuit rapidly increasing until it results in a state of oscillation. What starts it off? Any electronic circuit produces a degree of noise if only at a very low level. And remember this is a rampant amplifier! It only happens if the signal is fed back directly from the amplifier's output. This is termed Positive Feedback. If by chance or design the polarity was reversed it would result in Negative Feedback and so reduce the signal to the oscillator which, most likely, would never oscillate or generate a signal.

Negative Feedback has been used with great success in audio amplifiers to greatly reduce distortion and at the same time act as a tone control - although it reduces the amplifier's gain.

Some club members may remember the then famous "Hiker's One," a one valve radio, which could be easily built by young folk. This used the same Positive Feedback precisely, and the signals heard got louder and louder until the set burst into oscillation. However, the amount of the valve's amplification was controlled by a variable resistor (potentiometer) which varied the voltage applied to the valve's screen grid so that it

could be set at a point, just below that at which oscillation occurred.

If you did put the set into oscillation you could talk into the headphones and be heard in radios nearby. Yes - a simple transmitter!

Our League Patron, Frank Glen, Christchurch wrote regarding the new Constitution, that he has followed this with much interest and hopes it bodes well for the club. Referring to the North Otago Records, he mentioned that he had dropped these historic documents into the Hocken Library following Peter Grenfell spending several months working on them. Recently, he was with Arthur De Maine and Paul Aronsen at Tiwai and he said that the South Americans were good at that time.

After assisting at Stu (Mark) Forsyth's (our Ladders sub-editor) wedding he will be off to Caloundra between 9th August to 6th September. While there, he will represent the League at the Queensland Dxpedition in Ray Crawford's area over the weekend of 14-15 August.



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TIWAI DXEXPEDITION JULY 2010

Monday 12th of July saw me pack up the 4WD with all the necessary bits and pieces for a four day Dxpedtion at Tiwai. I was to be the advance guard with Paul and Frank arriving on the Tuesday.

Back to the water problem, Paul fixed the pipe on Tuesday and then we waited for the rain, we waited and waited but it did not rain for the whole time we were at Tiwai. Therefore on Thursday we went into Paul's place for a shower and then Paul and Frank went to the Irish Pub for lunch and I headed to Wairo to look at railway vehicles.

While out at Tiwai Paul erected his Squid pole for his transmitter and several contacts were made with Ray Crawford in Australia.

Friday saw us depart Tiwai before eight o'clock which must be an all time record for departing Tiwai after nearly a week. It was certainly another great time at Tiwai and

Frank and I would like to thank Paul for having us again at that great DX location.

Gary Walters, Station Manager of Radio St. Helena, has just confirmed the above information, and, as usual, Derek Richards will operate the RSD shortwave transmitting facility.

There will be a special email-address exclusively for the evening of RSD 2010. As soon as Gary sets up this special email account, we will publish the account name.

The RSD 2010 QSL cards are being sponsored by the Danish ShortWave Club International. Reception reports for RSD 2010 should be sent with sufficient return postage to RSH using the special Airmail address via Ascension and the United Kingdom -- exactly the same procedure as for the RSD 2009 reception reports. ALL mail to RSH should use this procedure.

ALL 266 QSLs for RSD 2009 have been mailed and should now be arriving around the world.

The sunspot minimum between sunspot cycles 23 and 24 is the longest in history -- much to the dismay of shortwave listeners everywhere. This minimum has lasted since 2007 and is still ongoing. There are not very many sunspots to "help" propagation, and there is no real sign of significant change. The UTC-times for broadcasting to the various target area have been very carefully selected to <try> to have the very best chance of good reception in each area. Also, we need to have the RSD broadcasts one after the other. After RSD 2009, it was decided to change the times somewhat and to move RSD from November to October (as was the case back in the late 1990's -- Thanks, John). RSH hopes that everyone around the world has excellent reception conditions during RSD 2010 and is looking forward to your emails and also, if possible, to your telephone calls.

In "Specialized Resources" (under "DX Newsletters"): The bi-weekly Shortwave Messenger was published by J. Art Russell of San Diego, California from September 1960 until Russell's death in February 1963. It appears that the reader was on his own in matching contributor names (sometimes mentioned in various narrative parts of the newsletter) to WPE calls. We have posted two issues, from April 7, 1961 and March 21, 1962.

In "Specialized Resources" (under "DX Newsletters"): The USSR High Frequency Newsletter was published by Roger Legge of McLean, VA beginning in November 1976. UHN dealt mainly with Foreign Service transmissions from the former Soviet Union and its constituent republics. The newsletter was useful because of the frequent changes in Soviet frequencies and the Soviet policy of showing transmitter sites (said to often be at least incorrect and sometimes downright misleading) on QSLs when requested. We have posted two issues of UHN: March 1977 (No. 4) and November 1980 (No. 30).

In "Specialized Resources" (under "DX Newsletters"): Tropical DX Newsletter began publication in August 1974 and was edited by Fred Heutte, Jr. of Washington, DC. The bi-weekly newsletter focused primarily on reception of the tropical regions of the world on 60 meters and below, although other shortwave news was covered as well. TDXN ceased publication in February 1979. We have posted two issues, from December 20, 1977 (No. 79) and November 15, 1978 (No. 100).

This time, under "DX History/Stations," we have posted some information about the RCI monitoring station in Stittsville, Ontario: some technical information about the RCI transmitter and monitoring plants (1987); a description of the monitoring station (1991); and some photos taken at Stittsville. Thanks to Harold Sellers for this. -- And under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan," you will find several new stories from Adrian M. Peterson: June 27, 2010, "Tribute to Canada: The Story of the First Wireless Transmission Across the Atlantic"; July 11, 2010, "Time Ticks Across the Pacific: The Story of Chronohertz Station WWVH" and "Early Ship QSLs"; and July 18, 2010, "Early Shortwave in the New Pakistan" and "Radio Newspapers Aboard Ship."

Under "DX History/Stations," we present a collection of materials about station CKFX, Vancouver, BC, Canada, prepared by Harold Sellers. It includes two histories of the station; some 1996 and 1997 notes from Arthur Cushen and Ben Krepp about the station's closing, together with Arthur's 1940 QSL; a 1982 CKFX-CKWX letter to Harold Sellers about the station; photos and diagrams of the station's equipment and its building; and four QSLs from 1934, 1936 and 1956 from the CPRV collection. This material will also be up on the ODXA website soon. Thanks, Harold.
