Mangawhai solar powered radio station a first for NZ

Tsunami, flood, fire, earthquake... whatever the emergency, the first thing you are advised to do is turn on the local radio to see what's happening, but if the station's power is out as well, there'll be nothing but static!

However, Heads FM – Mangawhai's small locally owned radio station – will soon be immune to that, becoming what's thought to be New Zealand's first solar powered radio station.

In the winter of 2006 hurricane-force winds closed roads, blew down trees and cut power for up to a month (Heads FM was off air for a week) leaving locals relying on word of mouth to find out the real details of what was happening in their region and their neighbourhood.

During the tsunami events over the past year the little radio station became a reliable source of information, and recent earthquakes in the Canterbury region are a reminder that no matter where we are, all of us are vulnerable to natural events.

When veteran broadcaster Mark Perry started the station up as a hobby six years ago, crisis situations weren't foremost in his mind

"To be honest, I just wanted to set up a station that was different from the mainstream network stations on offer, plus I needed a transition since leaving Radio Hauraki," says Mark.

It all began with an iPod and a low power half watt frequency, but now Heads FM is 25 watts and covering the community.

"My hobby has become Mangawhai's entertainment. I say watch out Rupert Murdoch!"

Now with an environmental focus foremost in his mind, yet still wanting to be a reliable media vehicle for Civil Defence

purposes, Mark's aim is to avoid noisy, fossil fuel guzzling generators by instead relying on renewable solar energy to charge a battery bank to keep the station on air in times of power outages.

"It's important to me in this day and age to be aware of our impact on this land. In everything we do we're aiming to be as green as possible and lower our carbon footprint – being a key part of the community now it makes sense that would stretch to the radio station as well, and thanks to the small income derived from local advertisers, the Mangawhai business community has had a stake in getting this solar system installed."

SUN SMART: Reid Technology have supplied and fitted the solar gear, which will provide power for Heads FM for up to two days without sun.

MAILBAG

Phase-Locked Loop or PLL tuning, which I alluded to in our September Mailbag has three essential components. (A) A voltage-controlled oscillator which as the name suggests, depends on a positive or negative bias voltage to vary the frequency that it operates on. In the PLL context, this is the oscillator that produces the basic signal on the desired frequency for the receiver or transmitter. By itself, it would produce a very unstable signal, frequency-wise. (B) A stable Low Frequency crystal controlled oscillator (of course complete with its harmonics.) This is the "Reference Frequency" oscillator that I referred to in the September issue.

The signals from (A) and (B) are both fed into a C) Phase Detector which produces an output voltage, that may be either positive or negative, and which is of a level proportionate to the difference in frequency between the two signals. This is called the 'Error Voltage.' . It is then filtered, and it is this filtering that determines the frequency range within which the PLL will ultimately work. The filtered Error Voltage is then applied to the (A) voltage-controlled oscillator to cause it to lock on to the desired harmonic of the (B) crystal controlled oscillator.

When that is achieved, the **(A) voltage-controlled oscillator** is highly stabilized and will provide a very dependable signal source for receivers and transmitters.

Sophisticated programmable frequency dividers - too complex to be described here - are employed to obtain the ultimate frequencies required.



Items from National Radio Club's "DX News" bulletin

- WQAM Miami FL CP granted for U4 30/25kw co locating its transmitter with that of WAXY 790. Both new patterns, from 5 towers, throw the signal in long, fat lobes to the northeast and small bubbles off the back.
- 740 KBRT Avalon CA has filed for an STA for D1 1kw days on 1690 kHz for the purpose of making conductivity tests "for a few days" in preparation to submitting an application for changes. The form doesn't specify the dates, so if anyone hears KBRT on 1690 . . . this is what's going on.
- 880 KRVN Lexington NE now carries Fox News, a change from ABC. (Heinen CO)
- 910 KCJB Minot ND CP granted to increase their power to become U4 5kw day & night.
- 930 KNSA Unalakleet AK is now on with U1 4.2kw day & night.
- 1360 NEW Santa Maria CA CP granted for U4 2kw day & night from 3 towers. Day and night patterns are identical: circular lobes to the southwest.
- 1430 KLO Ogden UT now on air with U4 25kw days, 5kw nights, an increase in daytime power. The pattern remains the same, with major lobes to the north-northeast and south and a minor lobe to the west.
- 1430 KZQZ St. Louis MO CP granted for U4 50kw days/5kw nights.
- 1470 NEW Anchorage AK applies for U1 10kw day & night.
- 1610 CHHA Toronto ON their application to upgrade to U1 10kw days, 650 watts nights has been denied by the CRTC. The station was late in filing annual reports with the CRTC, thought to be a mortal sin in the agency's opinion. It is thought that, although they are licenced for 24 hour operation, CHHA currently uses only 1 kW during daylight hours.
- 1630 KRND Fox Farm WY noted 18 October with upbeat SS music, ident as □KRND 1630 AM Fox Farm Wyoming" and new slogan like □La Corsa Mexicana □ (Heinen CO)
- WTNI Biloxi MS is operating under an STA with U1 2.5/1kw. Has applied to reduce the height of its tower by approximately one □half. WTNI uses one of the towers formerly used by its predecessor, WVMI on 570. Due to the degradation to the tower caused by conditions near the Gulf Coast, WTMI is planning to replace the tower in the near future. They have

- filed for an STA to operate at reduced power while the tower is being dismantled and a replacement structure is being constructed.

A member has expressed keenness to get into medium wave DXing, so I will try and include some commentary in this column each month on how to go about it. This will be at a basic level, but input from other DXers will be most welcome.

Firstly – when to listen. As a general rule, long distance medium wave reception occurs when there is a darkness path between the transmitter location and your receiver. We see this of course with improved reception of NZ stations at night. As an example, here in Mangawhai I can listen to BBC World Service in Auckland on 810 kiloHertz, but after dark, the Radio NZ National transmitter at Dunedin is the dominant station.

The best time to try for stations in the South Pacific, and the Americas is from our local dusk through until the sunrise time at the transmitter site. So, taking Hawaii as an example, with a 2 hour time difference to NZ standard time, it is possible to hear Hawaiian stations through till a few hours before NZ sunrise.

But I focus my DX listening in our early evening period when the American stations are fading in, and before the signal levels of NZ stations are excessive.

It's best to start out MW DXing by trying MW frequencies without adjacent local stations. For starters, have a go on **1170** kHz, currently unoccupied by any kiwi broadcaster. After dark you will hopefully hear 2CH in Sydney with its distinctive music format. But before that I can also hear KFAQ in Tulsa Oklahoma with a news and talk format. KFAQ carries the 'Coast to Coast AM' overnight talk show, but has local breakouts on the hour and half hour. The trail items appearing in the DX Times are a fair guide as to when to listen for a specific area, but you need to allow for optimum times moving back or forward depending on whether summer or winter are approaching. I might hear South American stations fading in around 0300 UTC in our midwinter, or North Americans fading in around 0700 in mid-summer.

Next month, we'll overview antennas and receivers, but do tune 1170kHz after dark and let me know what you can hear. (BC)

Greg joins us as a result of a recent Trade Me initiative. Gentlemen, we hope you find items of interest in the magazine to assist your enjoyment of the radio monitoring hobby. Please let our columnists know how you get on!

AGM REPORT This was held in Auckland on 31 October, with members from North Otago, Northland and Auckland in attendance. Patron **Dr FRANK GLEN's** report focused on efforts to preserve the history of our hobby. Frank spoke of the new level of relationship with the Hocken Library in Dunedin that he and Queensland member **MARTIN HADLOW** had achieved with the Hocken Library and the University of Otago. He acknowledged Martin having travelled to NZ at his own expense for this purpose. A candidate has been identified by the University to undertake an academic history of DXing. Recent additions to the Hocken Library's archive of historical DXing in Otago and Southland were the **ALBERT STANTON** collection covering Albert's DXing between 1929 and 1953, and material from the DX League's North Otago Branch. Albert was a Dunedin founding member for the Radio Association (RA5) as well as the NZ Radio DX League. Frank said that the Stanton collection is virtually a cornerstone of our history and predates much of the material already held by the Hocken. In another positive move, the Christchurch City Archives have expressed interest in accepting records of DXing in Canterbury and this will be an area of further discussion and rummaging in the coming year.

In his annual report, President BRYAN CLARK said that despite the ongoing decline in hobby activity, he believed the club is in good heart, as we complete our 62nd year in service to the DX and SWL community. He noted that the past year was very significant in the history of the NZ Radio DX League, as we introduced a new form of governance, with all longstanding members now able to vote on important issues. He thanked **DAVID RICQUISH** for initiating and persevering with the idea for a number of years. [The meeting subsequently moved a vote of thanks to David for his initiative]. Bryan said he hoped to see more volunteers stepping up to assist the club, particularly as sub-editors in the NZ DX Times, and also for roles on the Administration Committee. The ease of communication via Email and Skype means we can consider greater involvement from members in other centres. "In the coming year, I will be keen to hear from other members wherever they are, who think they might be able to contribute to the club's ongoing success." Bryan also hoped there could be discussion amongst members in the coming year on how the DX League might evolve to remain of relevance and service to our members. "The median age of our members is probably 60+, and there is now minimal equipment being manufactured for the DXing or SWL hobby. I believe it would be remiss not to try and adapt, rather than simply fade away as an organization", Bryan said. He thanked PAUL ORMANDY who has taken on his public relations and

promotions role with gusto in the past year – a lot of initiatives that have given the DX League a profile in some new areas, and helped attract some new members against the tide. Bryan also expressed appreciation to his fellow Administration Committee members, particularly **MIKE BUTLER** and **PHIL VAN DE PAVERD** who continue to carry the main administrative burdens of the League and generously allowed him time off for serious DXing. He ended with special thanks and admiration for our Chief Editor and Webmaster **MARK NICHOLLS**. "The 'DX Times' is far and away the key output of the DX League, and it is the glue that essentially binds us together as an organisation. Without the magazine, the club would die – and without volunteers like Mark, Mike, Phil and Paul, and our other long-serving adcom members and magazine sub-editors, we'd simply have no club", Bryan concluded.

Treasurer **PHIL VAN DE PAVERD'**s report showed membership now stood at 164, a net loss of 15 over the previous year [interesting to note that ARDXC membership is around 170. BC]. See elsewhere in the magazine for the annual accounts.

Chief Editor MARK NICHOLLS thanked the DX Times sub-editors for the time and effort that they have each put into helping produce the magazine, and to those members who have sent in contributions during the year. Mark also acknowledged THEO DONNELLY who offered to transcribe handwritten or typewritten contributions for Mailbag into a more suitable computer favourable format. This will shortly be extended to the sub-editors of other sections of the magazine. In his Webmaster role, Mark reported that he had overhauled the radiodx website, updating the contact details and removing all Radio Heritage Foundation material which had been placed on the radiodx.com website while the radioheritage.net website was being developed. Future plans include a section of the website where members can put up a profile of themselves and photos of their DX shack and some QSL scans if they wish to, and more promotion of the DX League. Mark invited members to give any feedback or suggestions on improving the website or promoting the DX League on the Website.

Our energetic Public Relations Officer PAUL ORMANDY reported that that he has employed several initiatives to gain new members and taken advantage of the internet to raise our profile. The most active promotion was the setting up of a Yahoo Group to cater for League members only. There are currently 37 members and we need to encourage more to sign up. It is now as simple as sending Paul e-mail (zl4pw@orcon.net.nz) The Yahoo Group offers a place for members to share tuning tips, equipment news, station news etc and has two very useful weekly tuning news items, DX Mix from Europe ans the NASWA Flashsheet from the USA. Additionally, there are places for members to upload photos, useful files, handy web-site addresses and even an on-line Ladders and Continentsstyle listing. Also, the facility to run surveys, some of which have revealed interesting results! Information on the DX League has been provided to several internet directory listings: Grown Ups, DMOZ (The Directory of New Zealand), NZ Search and newzealand. com. A Facebook presence has also been established with **ADAM CLAYDON** stepping forward to manage this. A 3-month trial subscription to the e-mailed version of the DX Times has resulted in one definite new member. Advertising in NZART's "Break In", also offering the trial subscription has also brought some new members. BARRY WILLIAMS arranged for attendees at the 2010 NZART conference to receive information brochure about the League and this too has resulted in definite sign-ups. Upcoming promotional activities include offering subscriptions on TradeMe [this has already achieved success – see above. BCI. Paul would be delighted to hear of any other suggestions for promoting the NZRDXL.

Arising from an enquiry by **PETER GRENFELL**, the meeting decided that funds held by North Otago Branch to support DX Archives, but unused for 5 years, should be returned to Adcom and held for a future archives initiative such as that emerging in Canterbury. Competitions Secretary **ARTHUR DE MAINE** presented his report in person, with the following annual awards: Best Mediumwave Log – CFFR 660 **BRYAN CLARK**, Best Shortwave Logs – Tibet 4905 **DES DAVEY** and Libya 17725 **CLIFF COUCH**, Best Mediumwave QSL – Nueva Q Peru 1570 **IAN WELLS**, Best Shortwave QSL – Outhouse Radio USA 6925 **BRYAN CLARK**, Best FM QSL – Franklin FM 107.0 B**RYAN CLARK**, Founders Award – **PHIL VAN DE PAVERD**. Arthur questioned the future of the FM competitions, given the lack of eligible entries, and said that the League should reconsider the criteria for the Founders Award.

Branch reports were received from Auckland, Wellington, Canterbury, North Otago and Otago.

All existing office bearers were elected unopposed for a further year.

Subscriptions were the subject of lively discussion. Changing exchange rates had meant that some overseas subscriptions were below cost so the meeting agreed to standardise overseas rates at the local equivalent of NZ\$60 for the printed magazine and NZ\$20 for the emailed magazine. There is no change to domestic subscriptions.

MIKE BUTLER presented his annual Shortwave Propagation Activity Report, and acknowledged the contributors to his research including **PHIL VAN DE PAVERD, IAN CATTERMOLE and DES DAVEY.**

WITH REGRET we advise of the passing of **ANITA FOX**, widow of foundation member and past patron Jack Fox on 12 November, and **CLINT ALLAN**, a long-time Canterbury member on 16 August.

MORE SHORTWAVE CLOSURES? There are reports emerging of significant reductions in shortwave broadcasting by Deutsche Welle, and the likely closure of Radiodifusora Argentina al Exterior's shortwave transmitter at the end of 2010. In the latter case, according to Takahito Akabayashi of Japan, reporting to Glenn Hauser's DXLD Yahoo Group, RAE's shortwave transmitter(s) needs repair/replacement but now the Argentine government has prohibited the use of any equipment containing injurious PCB (Polychlorinated Biphenyl) from the beginning of 2011. The transmitter does contain PCB but with the Argentine government having no budget for replacement or repair, the outlook is grim. If you wish to express support for shortwave broadcasts from Argentina continuing, please email your request without delay to dxrae2010@gmail.com

HAS 'THE BOAT THAT ROCKED' BEEN SCUTTLED? News on that Pacific Ocean pop pirate ship that was planning to bombard Fiji with news and pop music, reminiscent to the golden oldies days of offshore England broadcast tubs has "dried up". The President of the Fiji Democracy and Freedom Movement, based in Sydney Australia, says the idea was to put an antenna on a ship anchored in international waters, outside Fiji's legal jurisdiction. It had been suggested in some quarters they had been planning to position a Dutch-registered merchant vessel in the international waters off the coast of Fiji to defy censors in the military dictatorship and fire up on both AM and FM. This time, under "DX History/Stations," we have posted a pamphlet from 1936 titled "NBC Around the World" which commemorates the company's tenth anniversary. It describes the NBC networks ("red" and "blue" in those days), studios and artists, and then discusses NBC global activities. NBC was the source of much of the programming that went out over American shortwave stations in those days, and a good deal of company promotion centered around the shortwave programs that were prepared for reception abroad and the foreign programming that was received here and rebroadcast over NBC domestic stations. You can get the flavor of this in some of the pages in the second half of this pamphlet. A list of NBC network stations, including shortwavers, is on the next-to-the-last page. -- Also this time, we present three new stories from Adrian Peterson's "Wavescan" program: October 3, 2010, (1) "Gone But Not Forgotten - Radio Australia Darwin," and October 10, 2010, (2) "Amateur Radio on the Air from Radio Netherlands Bonaire" and (3) "Tibet QSL Cards - Why So Valuable?"

Under "DX History/Lists, Logs, Guides & Columns," you will find a PDF copy of the pamphlet, "RCA Victor World-Wide Radio," published in 1934. RCA introduced its first all wave radios in 1933, just as "all wave" was becoming a consumer sensation. This pamphlet promoted shortwave and facilitated customers' use of their new receivers. It covers many of the basics of SWLing--time changes, propagation, the types of signals heard on shortwave, etc. It also contains a listing of the times and frequencies of many of the shortwave broadcast stations of the day. It closes (p. 11) with a brief promotion for "the Short-Wave Club" in Klondyke, Ohio (by which it means the International Short Wave Club), and for the Electrical Division, Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, U.S. Department of Commerce, which in 1934 published the first "official" shortwave station list in the U.S., "World Short-Wave Radiophone Transmitters." -- Also, under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan," you will find two new stories from Adrian M. Peterson: "Massive Flooding in North India-The Lucknow Story" and "Wavescan Update-Karachi in Pakistan and Hyderabad in India" (October 17, 2010).

This time, under "Specialized Resources," "Radio Postcards," a file containing nine views of station WOC, Davenport, Iowa, which began life as the station of the Palmer School of Chiropractic. This is one of several famous Iowa radio stations whose postcards we will post. Note that views #4 and #5 are the same except that the cars were deleted in #5. -- Also under "Specialized Resources," "Wavescan," another story from Adrian Peterson: October 24, 2010, "Africa's First Commercial Radio Service on Shortwave - LM Radio in Mozambique."

Some Observations of the performance of Coax Loops By Kelvin Brayshaw

About five years ago, because of age, and a growing reluctance to risk my neck walking on the roof, climbing trees, and in various other activities necessary for maintaining outdoor antennas, I decided to downsize my SWL set-up to a wholly indoor operation, hopefully without losing too much signal quality.

With a move into elder-care always a last-resort possibility. I thought it wise to have my much-loved hobby future-proofed for such an eventuality.

As a start I tried a variety of frame loops described some years ago in a NZ DX Times article by Tony King of Greytown.

These worked well and a small example of this type was handy for packing in the luggage with a portable receiver for use on holidays.

However, for the home situation I eventually settled on loops made from coaxial cable which, although covering a smaller frequency range for a given physical size, appeared to offer better sensitivity and pretty effective nulling of local interference.

I used the "cut-and-try" method of construction, until finding some definitive advice on page 39-1 of the ARRL Handbook (1988), from which I learned that a length of less than 0.08 wavelength was the ideal size for the conductor in a single-turn loop.

For approximately the next 1 MHz tuned beyond that critical point natural resonance appears to take over, and tends to overload a small receiver.

The loop on which the following figures are based is housed in a 70cm diameter hula hoop bought from the Warehouse about 3 years ago (unfortunately the latest stock available locally is of solid plastic - so I've turned to garden irrigation tubing to support loops of 70 cm or smaller, and 20mm PVC electrical conduit for larger square loops covering the lower 6MHz of the spectrum.

Length of conductor being Diameter X pi (3.14), the 70cm hula hoop takes close to 2.2M of coax. "Critical" Frequency = 300 divided by 2.2 x 0.08 = 10.9 MHz

I've read somewhere that 75-ohm coax should be used for the antenna itself, and 50 ohm for the feeder.

However, the table below shows tuning range obtained, using various settings of the two mini variable capacitors in series with the loop, comparing both 50 and 75 ohm varieties for the antenna portion.

Note that optimum sensitivity is in the top half of the range in all cases, so I find it better to use larger loops and old-fashioned 3-gang capacitors for tuning 49m and below.

Changes in sensitivity were more clearly defined by my Sangean ATS 505 receiver, which was used for these tests.

My Eton E5 reacts in a slightly different way (possibly due to later front-end technology), but gives good results in everyday use, especially with an AR2 amplifier connected in the line from the antenna.
