However, they've also opened a studio and sales office in Wellington [to comply with the licence requirements] and will need to originate their own local programs, news and community announcements for at least 12 hours daily.

Their Wellington studios are co-sited with the Whitireia NZ Media Training Centre in Cuba Mall, along with those of Niu FM which were also officially opened on June 9.

Analogue switch off next year

Transmission to analogue television sets will be gradually switched off from October next year.

Broadcasting Minister Jonathan Coleman today announced the switch from analogue to digital television would be phased in across the country in four phases.

When the switch is carried out, television will only be broadcast through digital Freeview, Sky or TelstraClear set top boxes.

Hawke's Bay and the West Coast will be the first to switch off at 2am on Sunday September 20, 2012.

The other three phases will be:

* Rest of the South Island at 2am on Sunday April 28, 2013

* Lower North Island, Taranaki and Gisborne at 2am on Sunday September 29, 2013

* Rest of the North Island at 2am on Sunday December 1, 2013.

About 20 per cent of Kiwis still have analogue television sets.

"I'm encouraging those who are not to plan and prepare now," Coleman said.

People without a digital set top box may need to buy one as well as a new aerial or satellite dish, he said.

"We're planning for the start of a fully digital TV age where New Zealanders can enjoy better pictures and sound, more choice and benefits such as onscreen television guides."

A public information campaign called "Going Digital" would kick off today to coincide with the announcement.

Regional TV funding package announced

The Broadcasting Minister has announced an \$850,000 assistance package to help regional television broadcasters make the switch from analogue to digital

The package, announced by Broadcasting Minister Jonathan Coleman this morning, will be administered by NZ On Air and provides up to \$70,000 per regional broadcaster for equipment and other costs.

Dr Coleman says the package, which will be part of a move to complete digital switchover in New Zealand by November 2013, recognises the contribution regional broadcasters make to their local communities.

"The Government acknowledges that regional broadcasters face funding constraints in making the switch from analogue to digital television so we're stepping up and helping with some of those costs," he says.

The package will be available over the next two years, and regional broadcasters must meet certain criteria to be eligible for the support.

Digital switchover will be completed in several stages, starting in the West Coast and Hawkes Bay in late 2012, the rest of the South Island in early 2013, and the North Island in mid to late 2013.

Dr Coleman says regional broadcasters will also benefit from the extension of digital terrestrial television (DTT).

DTT currently covers 75 percent of the population, but this will raise to 86 when it is extended to an additional 160,000 homes in time for the Rugby World Cup.

"DTT is a cheaper option than satellite transmission and enables regional broadcasters to just broadcast to their local community, satellite is nationwide," Dr Coleman says.

A graphic illustration of how reception on the higher shortwave bands can be enhanced by a rise in the Solar Flux Index, is shown by looking at the last few "Bandwatch Over 9" sections of the magazine. We will count the number of loggings on the 17MHz and 21MHz bands only, between the December and the May issues of the "Times."

Firstly, we count the number of loggings for both of the above bands and get 8 for December and 5 and 12 for January and February - a total of 25 for the three months. Remembering that the loggings in the magazine are essentially those heard during the <u>previous</u> month, the average Solar Flux Index for November to January was 84.

Next, we count the number of loggings in the March to May issues: 15 for March,28 for April and 17 for May. Total, 60 loggings. The average Solar Flux Indexes for February to April (the previous months) were 96, 116 and 113. Averaging 108.

Thus we can say that when the Flux averaged 84 we had only 25 loggings in those bands. But, when the average Flux was raised to 108, the loggings increased to 60 - i.e. 2.4 times the number of loggings obtained with a Flux of 84.

Terry Nielsen, Christchurch wrote: " My wife Paula and I went to Brisbane in mid-March to visit Paula's family living there and also to have a break from all the aftershocks. That was a trip that did not go according to plan. Leaving Christchurch together with a lot of people who also wanted to get away from the shakes for some weeks, months or permanently was quite an experience as different people react differently to the situation in Chch. Some were laughing and cheering when the plane left the ground, some crying. And when we touched down in Brisbane, maybe the laughing people were crying and the crying people laughing!!

The morning after arriving, Paula felt ill and we had to take her to the Emergency Dept. at The Redland Hospital. They looked after her very well and told us that she had what they called a "post traumatic stress from earthquakes in Christchurch". So after a rest and some medicine (drugs) we could bring her back to the family. Paula had to have some test checking her heart, all went ok and then we had 3 weeks with family and enjoyed the Aussie company.

Well, back in Christchurch again, we got the offer of psychiatric counselling, and did that help! It was very good talking to a professional and he told us that at least 75% of people in the city suffer from "Earthquake fatigue".

So now we have decided to keep our minor damaged house and stay here in

Christchurch and take whatever comes of more earthquakes or aftershocks and be a part of the rebuilding of Christchurch by not leaving the city as thousands of people have done. We just have to believe that it will be possible one day to get our beautiful city back to "normal".

Günter Jacob, Passau, Germany reported, "By mid-April, I had received these QSLs for my collection: DW Sines 9715/21840, DW via Woofferton 15330, DW via Ascension 11665, DW Kigali 9755/12050, DW Trincomalee 15650/17820. Evangelische Missions-Gemeinden via Wertachtal 6055. Austrian Military Radio Society had a special transmission via Moosbrunn on 17620 kHz on the occasion of the anniversary '50 Years AMRS of Peace Support Missions' and sent their special QSL. During season B10, TRT 'Voice of Turkey' used transmitter Cakirlar (CAK), and I received QSLs for 7205 and 7240 kHz. RFA verified 5895 Tinian, 11795 Kuwait and 9690 (via Sitkunai). IBB Thailand Transmitting Station sent a confirmation for 9370 kHz. And as VOA Washington ignores all QSL requests, I turned to Bonaire Relay Station to get a QSL for 17895 kHz; Radio Nederland fulfilled my request and sent their card verifying Bonaire on 17895 kHz. Sikander Hoosen of Sentech sent a confirmation of 15420 kHz (BBC via Meyerton). Three more very nice QSL cards arrived, namely RDP 7345, Cyprus Broadcasting Corp. 9760, AIR Jammu 4830 (this one after 1835 days)."

Later, in May, we received the following update: "By mid-May, I had received these QSLs for my collection: CRI-35 (France Service) finally sent the card 56-02 with complete details of the Albania Relay on 7180 kHz (after 759 days); Bible Voice Broadcasting verified Issoudun on 13580 and 13630, Nauen on 11855 and 13600, Wertachtal on 11960; Family Radio sent one QSL for Wertachtal, 11665, for a report of 1 Jan. 2011, but they still let me wait for 21 QSLs for last year's reports; DW verified Sines 15650, Woofferton 11640 and Trincomalee 11615; and these other Asian QSLs arrived: Pakistan Broadc. Corp. 17720; IBB Philippines Transmitting Stn 5850/11655; IBB Thailand Transmitting Stn 7230; Voice of Turkey Cakirlar 6055/9610 and Emirler 9635/9655. Three months ago, after Radio Praque had stopped their shortwave transmissions, I reported having heard - for the first time - an external program on the internet, but in the meantime, I found out that my request for the offered QSL card was not yet fulfilled. Unusual, because previous requests for QSLs were fulfilled within one week. So, there will not be any more Czech QSLs for my collection in the future. No listening means no reporting and no QSLs. Hopefully, we will look forward to receiving many more verifications from other broadcasters that will stay on the shortwaves." I think I can hear an army of Dxers chanting, 'And so say all of us!' It was very innovative of you to get your VOA QSL from the relay station! Günter, you have been very busy, and the results above show the rewards for your good work.

<u>Ron Killick, Christchurch</u> advises, "Did not send any notes as nothing reported/ received.

However given the late chance, my health is super great and have been on a tune around some of the SW bands. I have sorted out some "to get" so just now to make some time and get back into it." That will be great Ron. We'll look forward to hearing from you again soon.

<u>Stu</u> Forsyth, Hanoi, Vietnam said, "I got caught by the mailbag e-mail address problem.

I sent you this: "I finally have managed to get a verification on MW from a country I am living in! I will explain - when I lived in Jordan I tried getting Jordan back on MW, as well as Israel, without any luck at all. In Dubai, I tried getting various stations back from the UAE, again without any luck at all, despite numerous attempts. Here in Hanoi, I listened to the Voice of Vietnam 2 on 549 (very powerful) and it was broadcasting in English. I tried 4 reports with no luck. Finally, I was listening to their FM outlet on 105.5 and there was some English there. I heard an e-mail address, which I tried and bingo - back came a verie for both frequencies. At long last!! It is country 59 and verie 737. My first for 3 years on MW!!

On SW I continue to listen occasionally with the idea of getting to 500 veries eventually and thus a Senior! Since the December issue I have had the following back: 17635 DW Trincomalee, 21780 DW Kigali, 15640 DW Kranji, 15650 DW Trincomalee, 21695 and 17725 Voice of Africa, Libya (good thing I got them then!), 17520 and 21780 DW Trincomalee Not a lot of variety there, but they all count. I now have 473 veries from 106 countries. Only 27 to go!!

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai, Northland writes: "May was a quieter month DXwise, with just one QSL in from Puketapu Radio 756.

DX conditions have been rather noisy, but on a visit by longtime League members Ray Crawford and Sutton Burtenshaw in late May, we were able to sample some Latins on MW and the tropical band, as well as Radio Djibouti 4780 longpath at 0315 UTC. Sutton brought along his Digitor AR1747 to try out because it severely overloads at his home location in Hamilton, less than a kilometre from several AM transmitters. But away from that situation it proved quite capable connected to the Northeast EWE antenna with 7 medium wave countries logged within a short time - New Caledonia 666, Tonga 1017, Hawaii 690, Mexico 1570, 1220 & 1320, Cuba 1620, American Virgin Islands 1620 plus Yanks on 740, 770, 1170 and 1700. The Tecsun 380 was also tried out, inductively coupled to a W-Q loop antenna but nothing foreign was heard." Your MW reception would have been assisted by a strange drop in the Solar Flux. From a high of 107 at the beginning of May it dropped into the 80s on the 19th and on the 25th it was actually on 80. March's high was 155 and in April we had a day on 129.

<u>RichD'Angelo, Wyomissing, PA</u> reports, "QSL returns continue strong. Here is this month's round-up crop of recent verifications received from various parts of the globe:

We were using pure nuclear energy to power our ICOM-735transmitter, coupled to a dipole cut to 6925 KHz. You heard our show # 11 and am pleased to present you with an e-QSL verification card. It is probably radioactive so handle with care. If you spot a mushroom cloud, you will know that Radio Mushroom was on the air. Keep on listening to Free Pirate Radio.' North American Pirate, WPON 6925 usb - The Weapon verified with a full data logo card for a report in Free Radio Weekly in 15 days.

Radio Japan via Tashkent Uzbekistan 9720 verified with a full data 'Winter Sentries(Niigata Prefecture)' card in 39 days and sent an oversized schedule and frequencies schedule and report form." An interesting lot there, Rich, and thanks for your report.



Shortwave Survey

The National Association of Shortwave Broadcasters recently had a survey on Shortwave Listening trends. We had a link to the survey on our website http://radiodx.com Below are some of the findings from the survey. (Mark Nicholls Chief Editor NZRDXL)

The Board discussed the idea of using the NASB website to carry out an online survey of shortwave listeners which would be virtually free of charge. Jerry Plummer, a professor who deals regularly with surveys and statistics, agreed to coordinate the survey and suggested putting it on Survey Monkey, which cost the NASB only \$200 for a year. We put a link to the survey on the NASB website, www.shortwave.org, and various other shortwave-related organizations helped us publicize it – some with links on their own sites (including WWCR). We put the survey online in May of 2010, and by May of 2011 we had over 1300 responses from shortwave listeners around the world. Clearly these were more upscale listeners who had access to the Internet, but the demographic information obtained from the survey would still be extremely valuable.

Jerry pointed out some of the significant findings of the survey. Two-thirds of respondents had three or more shortwave receivers. The most popular makes were Sony, Grundig and Icom, which are not cheap receivers. A whopping 84% of respondents had been listening to shortwave for more than 10 years, so these are not novices. Nearly 90% had listened to a shortwave broadcast within the last week, and 31% listen more than seven hours per week. Thirty-five percent had purchased a shortwave receiver within the last year; 75% within the last five years. Three-quarters bought their receivers new,

nearly half of them via Internet or mail order. Forty-three percent planned to buy another shortwave receiver within the next year. If they travel abroad, 73% of survey respondents carry a shortwave radio with them. Forty percent are licensed amateur radio operators – a fact that may surprise some. Nearly half of them paid between US\$100 and US\$500 for their primary receiver.

The survey asked for the five favorite shortwave stations of each respondent. The top five vote-getters were BBC, Voice of America, Deutsche Well, China Radio International and WWCR. Rounding out the top ten were Radio Australia, the Voice of Russia, Radio Netherlands, Radio Havana Cuba and Radio Canada International. News and current affairs is the most popular program genre of these listeners, followed by shortwave hobby/DX programs, cultural and educational programs and music. Religious programming was favored by seven percent of respondents. The vast majority listen to shortwave programs in English, with significant smaller portions listening in Spanish and French.

Thirty-three percent of those who took part in the survey also listen to international broadcasts via the Internet on their computers, and nine percent listen with a dedicated Internet radio receiver. Local AM and FM rebroadcasts of shortwave stations were listened to by 16% of participants. International broadcasts via satellite were less popular at 9%. Twelve percent download international radio programs to their MP3 player, and six percent listen via their mobile phones.

Eighty-one percent of those who responded were familiar with the term DRM (Digital Radio Mondiale), but only 14% listen to DRM broadcasts. Fifty-three percent would be willing to pay from US\$100 to US\$300 for a DRM receiver, and 38% would be willing pay no more than US\$100.

Forty-four percent of listeners get their information about shortwave broadcasts from the Internet, 30% from magazines or books such as the World Radio TV Handbook, and 26% from DX programs. The most popular publications were Monitoring Times (28%), the World Radio TV Handbook (27%) and Popular Communications (16%). Surprisingly perhaps, 65% do not belong to a shortwave club or organization. When asked if they collect QSL cards, the response was split about half and half.

The largest age group was 50 to 60 years old (32%), followed by 40-50 years (25%), 60 and over (25%), and 30-39 (12%). Only five percent were in their 20s, and just one percent under 20 years old. This shows the challenge that international broadcasters have of reaching younger listeners. A question about annual household income revealed that the largest group (24%) make from US\$50,000 to US\$100,000 per year, while 16% make from US\$25,000 to US\$50,000 per year.

One of the most revealing statistics was that 97 and a half percent of respondents were male, reinforcing the stereotype that shortwave is a technical hobby. Seventy-six percent have a college education, and a high school diploma is the highest education for 22%.

Over half (54%) of the respondents live in North America, and 28% are in Europe Eight percent live in Asia, and four percent each in Latin America and Oceania (Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific). Less than one percent answered from Africa.

The final question on the survey was about how participants heard about the survey. Fifteen percent heard about it from the NASB website, 59% from another website, 19% through a shortwave publication, and 7% from a friend or family member.

When Jerry presented these findings at the NASB annual meeting, it was suggested that the NASB should cross-tabulate these results to analyze the responses of subgroups such as geographical regions and age groups. Jerry said he will try to get his students to work on this project in the coming months.

Paul was the first to arrive at Tiwai on Friday afternoon at 1.30pm with myself and Frank arriving later on in the afternoon.

The first order of business was to raise the New Zealand flag for the last time at the Tiwai site. This honor was given to the Patron Frank Glen. This was done with great ceremony . The next business was to unpack the vehicles and light the coal range and set the fire in the lounge.

Then the radios were setup with Frank in the middle room and Paul and Arthur in the second room and then it was down to some DX. Conditions were only fair and a little noisy.

Saturday morning saw us all up bright and early at the dials. Dunamis Radio, Uganda on 4750 KHz was logged between 1830 and 1900 hours UTC but conditions were still noisy.

The Patron insisted that we carry on with the usual Tiwai tradition of having lunch in the Irish pub in Invercargill. After lunch we met Steven at the gate and upon arrival at the house Steven setup two EWE aerials on the west side of the house. After tea contact was made with Ray Crawford via amateur radio on the 40 meter band.

Sunday morning saw the flying mailman wake us all up with his banging and



crashing in the kitchen. The comment was made that it was most usual for him to be up so early at Tiwai.

Frank left us straight after the photo shoot in the morning as he was heading to Cromwell and only had a leave pass for two nights. Steven also left to go into Invercargill to start painting a flat in town. Arthur and Paul were left to charge batteries and general tidy up and clean out cardboards. Conditions again on Sunday night were not the best.

Sunday evening saw Steven rig up the switchboard so that the house lights could be run off the generator.

Monday saw the best morning of the whole week for African reception with a number of stations noted in the log.

Tuesday saw us head into Invercargill and Riverton, Paul had his bowling club's last day for the season and Steven had some work to do and I went off to look at railways up Ohai way. In the evening we stayed at Paul's palace at Riverton where we tested the location for radio reception, unfortunately my AOR did



not perform very well and there was also electric fence noise.

Wednesday saw us head back to Tiwai and the task of dismantling long wire antennas and removing poles commenced. This continued through to Saturday when Paul and I departed Tiwai. Steven departed Friday morning.

For me it was sad to depart Tiwai for the very last time. I had been visiting this famous listening site regularly since moving to the South Island in 2003. The departure was made worst by the very disappointing reception conditions on Mediumwave and the lower Shortwave bands apart that one morning.

In all I really do have some happy memories of DXpeditions to Tiwai and the DXers that I met. The stories that were told around the fire some nights when DX was slow still remain in my memory.

My thanks to Steven, Frank and Paul for their company during that last week at Tiwai.

MEMORIES OF TIWAI

Steven Greenyer's eulogy to Tiwai (May DXT) reminds me of an opportunity I recently had to bring the demise of the fabled listening site to the attention of a conference audience in the USA. I was attending the (April, 2011) Popular Culture Association (PCA) convention in San Antonio, Texas and was both surprised and delighted to hear a young US academic speaking on the subject Disembodied Voices and Dislocated Signals: The World of Modern-Day DXing. The presenter was not a DXer himself, but was involved in Greek language ethnic radio in the USA and had received listening reports from DXers. This led him to an interest in the field and to undertake an academic overview of the hobby.

His discourse was fascinating and I found myself nodding in agreement with most of his research findings. In terms of 'what was DXing', he indicated that both the amateur radio aspect of the hobby and shortwave/broadcast band listening could be included in the definition. On the subject of gender, he told us what we already know, namely that DXing is largely a male-oriented hobby, that 85% of ham radio operators are male and that an interest in the hobby is often passed down from father to son. He felt that we have a strong sense of community with a 'rich set of traditions and social conventions' and he rhetorically asked whether this was 'a reflection of yearning to contact diverse aroups of people outside our immediate environment'. We have 'high levels of technical ingenuity', but I wonder how many of us fit the 'negative stereotype' he gave of the hobby. Apparently, this paints us as being 'anti-social, nerdy, dorky, geeky, largely white and middle-aged, overweight, etc.' During the Q&A session after the presentation, I took to the floor and outed myself as a DXer, much to the delight of my academic friends and colleagues. I indicated that I fitted some of the 'stereotypes', but that he would have to ask my wife about the 'anti-social' aspect. I then told the conference of the demise of the famous Tiwai listening site. I recounted my own experience in having visited Tiwai (sadly, on only one occasion) and I also paid homage to the many top-class NZ DXers who had made so many loggings from the site. I mentioned the NZRDXL as being one of the few remaining DXing organizations still publishing regular magazines and I gave a brief overview of the proud history of our League.

The simulcast period for CBE Windsor Ontario on 1550 (once an easy catch in NZ. Ed), which has moved to FM (CBEW FM 97.5), has been extended by the CRTC to September 30.

CHHA Toronto Ontario on 1690 has applied for U3 6.25kw day & night.

Transport Quebec and Cogego are teaming up to create two new all traffic AM radio stations (one French on 690; one English on 940kHz) for the Montreal region. As of the fall, the stations will broadcast from 4:30 a.m. to 1 a.m. on weekdays, and from 6 a.m. to 1a.m. on weekends. They will focus on traffic conditions on major roads and bridges, road conditions, roadwork, transportation public awareness campaigns, and the weather, Transport Minister Sam Hamad announced on Monday. Transport Quebec will spend \$3 million per year to finance part of the stations' operating costs. Both stations propose the former facilities of CINF 690 and CINW 940, both operating with U3 and 50kw day & night. (NRC)

HAWAII Three now-silent Hawaii County radio stations are up for auction due to the bankruptcy case of Idaho-based parent company Parrott Broadcasting L.P. KIPA-AM 1060 and KHBC-FM 92.7 in Hilo and KHWI-FM 92.1 in Holualoa (Kona side) have been off the air, or "dark," since October, said media broker Greg Merrill, director of Media Services Group Inc. The stations, studios and transmitter sites are still in place. "It's just a matter of flipping on the switches," Merrill said. Programming of some sort might be good as well, but none is included since staffing that provided local shows and any other agreements for programming from other sources are long gone. Experienced broadcasters among potential bidders would likely have some format ideas for their potential new signals, Merrill noted. So far 15 entities and individuals have expressed interest by asking for additional, detailed information about one or more of the stations. "I would say 50 percent are from Hawaii, and 50 percent are from the mainland," Merrill said. Not all bidders are interested in all three stations. Bids are due June 1, and Merrill expects the successful bidder(s) will be notified within a week to 10 days. (From STARADVERTISER DOT COM via IRCA)

NORTHERN MARIANNA ISLANDS A new AM station simulcasting on FM is spicing up Saipan airwaves with authentic island music from all parts of the world-whether it be Chamorro/Carolinian, Jawaiian (Jamaican-Hawaiian), roots reggae, you name it. "KKMP," a product of a husband-and-wife tandem, is the first locally owned and operated radio station in the CNMI, with a global reach via www.cnmiradio.com. It broadcasts on 92.1FM on Sajpan and Tinian, and on 1440AM on Rota and the Northern Islands. Blue Continent Communications, owned by former representative and government chief prosecutor Rosemond Santos, hit the airwave on Dec. 9, with visiting Interior Assistant Secretary for Insular Areas Tony Babauta and Gov. Benigno R. Fitial among the first guests on-air. Santos' husband, businessman Gary Sword, is the company's vice president and first conceptualized the idea of putting up a new radio station five years ago. "KKMP" is the fifth FM radio station that Sword has established in the Pacific. The first one was in American Samoa in 1999, followed by stations in Western Samoa, Palau and the Marshall Islands in 2005. (Saipan Tribune, December 2010 via Bruce Portzer Real DX Yahoo Group) The station has been reported to be on 1440.04kHz by Japanese DXer Shinya Hasegawa of Yokohama,

USA (items from IRCA's 'DX Monitor' magazine)

Two new antenna towers being built in Washington State for KRKO & KKXA are in their final stages of construction in Snohomish, Washington, and will be the towers that carry the signals of S-R Broadcasting's "Fox Sports Radio" KRKO-AM (1380), and sister-station KKXA-AM (1520), which is not yet broadcasting. When the new towers are completed and placed in use, KRKO is also expected to increase its power from 5,000 watts to 50,000 watts by sometime in the US summer. KKXA will begin broadcasting at 20,000 watts during the day and 50,000 watts at night, but will be allowed to increase their

power to 50,000 watts full-time, upon approval from the FCC. As for what the format will be on KKXA - that apparently is being left up to the listeners. Their sister-station KRKO is asking "If you have suggestions for a new format for the radio station, we'd love to hear them! Talk? News? Country music (focusing on 1983-1993 with some currents and some gold mixed in)? Regional Mexican? How about...Polka?" (RADIO INFO DOT COM via IRCA)

Big AM Project at KKXA Progresses It's something of a celebratory event when a big new AM goes on the air. KKXA 1520 isn't quite there yet but will be soon. Two new towers have been erected. The Puget Sound area station will blast 50 kW at night and start at 20 kW during the day. It is hoping for approval to move to 50 kW full time. The debut air date is tentatively at the end of July and the format is up in the air, pending a rough survey of prospective area listeners (country and all news are leading so far). KKXA will be the sister station of sports talker KRKO 1380 Everett. The Snohomish area site where the KKXA towers are situated is also home to those of KRKO 1380. Those sticks received unwanted publicity when they were vandalized last year and required rebuilding. Add to that the difficulty in getting the required permits and approvals and it is possible that KKXA will be the last new commercial signal in the area. There are six towers total at the site; four serve KRKO in a parallelogram; four serve KKXA as an in line array. One taller tower is KRKO only and not shared. Two of the six towers are shared. Both stations are omni-directional daytime. The KKXA name "is a nod to one of Western Washington's first radio stations, KXA 770, a station now broadcasting as KTTH 770, 'The Truth.'" (via NRC)

DAVID AULD Members will be saddened to learn of the passing of another veteran DXer and League member. David died in Greymouth on 18 April. His longtime partner Diana says radio was a lifelong passion for David. We extend sincere sympathy to her and David's family on behalf of all members. I only met David once, at the 1964 DX League Convention.

END TIMES? Doctor Harold Camping, founder of shortwave station Family Radio has been in the news recently for his prediction that the world would end on 21 May. Nothing transpired but, from the perspective of the SWL and DXer, one may wonder if we are now in the "end times" for international shortwave broadcasting?

Last month RDP Portugal advised of its intention to suspend shortwave transmissions.

Then, under the headline "Germany's Deutsche Welle to end most shortwave broadcasting" we learnt there will be no more SW broadcasts in Bulgarian, Croatian, Greek, Macedonian, Polish and Romanian from 1 July. FM transmitters owned by DW in Sofia, Bucharest, Pristina und Tirana. Then, on 1 November, German, Russian, Persian (Farsi) and Indonesian shortwave broadcasts will cease totally. English broadcasts will be limited to those beamed to Africa and Chinese broadcasts are halved to one hour a day. The following other languages will continue on SW after 1 November: Amharic, Dari, Pashto, French, Hausa, Portuguese, Swahili and Urdu. Today DW has 260 hours per day on SW, from season B11 it will have only 55 hours/day. Transmitting stations in Trincomalee (Sri Lanka) and Sines (Portugal) will be closed.

The sun is also setting on the Voice of America's shortwave radio service, heard worldwide in dozens of languages for 70 years. Details have just come to light of a strategic technology plan prepared by the Broadcasting Board of Governors (BBG), the federal agency responsible for VOA, Radio Free Asia and other international stations. This concludes that it should end many shortwave broadcasts in favour of "more effective" media such as internet radio. "The intrinsic high cost of operating high powered shortwave stations is constantly being weighed against the rapidly diminishing effectiveness of shortwave within a growing number of countries," the report states. "... the cost effectiveness of shortwave transmissions continues to wane and is expected to be circumscribed to a very small number of target countries in the relatively near future."

Finally in a month of 'bad news' stories for the SWL has come reports that Radio Netherlands, another favourite broadcaster for many of us, may also be facing drastic cuts. An unconfirmed report from commercial news broadcaster RTL TV says that government cuts to Radio Netherlands Worldwide will leave the Netherlands' international service with less than a quarter of its current budget. RNW has already

announced plans to substantially slim down its Dutch-language service, a saving of roughly 20% of the media organisations' budget. Dutch-language programming would be largely scrapped, keeping only RNW's function as an emergency broadcasting station in the event of disasters for Dutch nationals abroad. The transmitting stations in Bonaire and Madagascar are also expected to be casualties of the cutbacks. The station will concentrate more on informing people in countries where press freedom is not a given, under the by-line 'Free speech, Dutch values'.

So what does this all mean for us as SWLs and DXers. Certainly it means a significant reduction in our shortwave programming options. DX opportunities may improve with cleared frequencies revealing previously unheard regional broadcasters. But I do wonder about the resulting loss of shortwave broadcasts for those without better means of accessing the differing viewpoints on the international scene that shortwave has traditionally done so well. Are these reductions premature? It is believed that less than 30% of the global population currently has access to the internet, which is strictly censored by a number of countries. Sure, local FM rebroadcasts and satellite TV can fill some gaps but here too restrictive governments can readily block an individual's access to foreign viewpoints when they need to. We are definitely entering the "end times" for international shortwave broadcasting, but there is still life and listening to be done! **Thanks to RN Media Network, PAUL ORMANDY & MARTIN HADLOW** for background details)

Tuning through the 60 meter band today, it is hard to imagine the DX that could be heard on those frequencies 50 years ago. Among the best sources of signals were the stations in the countries of what was then called French West Africa and French Equatorial Africa. By 1960, most of these countries had become independent, and their stations were affiliated with SORAFOM, Societe de Radiodiffusion de la France d'Outre-Mer, a French government organization formed in 1956 to aid development of broad-casting in the former French territories. Under "DX History/Stations," we have posted a schedule of the SORAFOM stations as of September 30, 1960. As can be seen, most of the shortwave transmitters were 4 kw. units. Despite this low power, many were routine catches on east coast afternoons. -- And under "Specialized Resources" you will find a number of "Wavescan" postings from Adrian M. Peterson: April 17, 2011, "Don't Cry for Me Argentina--The Radio Scene in South American Argentina," and "Radio Panorama RP9: Wireless Signaling Through Water"; April 25, 2011, "Return to Argentina--The Shortwave Scene RAE," "VOA Relay Stations in Argentina," and "AWR-Asia with RAE Relay and QSL Cards"; and May 1, 2011, "Five in a Row:

The Forgotten BBC East Africa Relay Station, Berbera in Somalia," and "The Radio Scene in New York City: The Earliest Known Reception Report."

Following up on the SORAFOM schedule posted last time, this time under "DX History/Stations" we have posted several schedules of African stations that had external services transmitting on the international HF bands. They are: ELWA, circa 1962; Ghana Broadcasting Corp., 1961 (tnx Tom Carten, Wilkes-Barre, PA) and 1969; Radio Brazzaville, c. 1962; R. Leopoldville, c. 1962 (tnx Bob Schmid, LaPorte, CO); and R. Madagascar, 1973 (one-hour service on 17730 kHz., 100 kw). -- And under "Specialized Resources," two "Wavescan" stories from Adrian Peterson (May 8, 2011): "Middle Eastern Cave Radio: Yemen" and "Two Radio Ships: On the Air in Libya."

Radio and humor were a frequent combination in radio's early days. This time, under "DX History/Literature & Humor," we have posted a file of humorous radio-related postcards. The first three were used by radio repairmen, presumably to inform customers of their services, and were printed by National Union Radio Tubes. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two more "Wavescan" scripts from Dr. Adrian M. Peterson: "Five in a Row: BBC Middle East Relay Station, Perim Island" (May 15, 2011), and "American States on Shortwave: Utah--The International Story of Shortwave KUSW/KTBN" (May 22, 2011).
