

Conditions on Shortwaves were rather extreme in September with a multitude of flares being fired by that big hot ball! From a monthly average Solar Flux of around 100 for several months it rose to over 134 culminating with a daily level of 190 on the 24^{th} . Although the levels were comparatively higher, these sudden bursts of radiation produced storms in the ionosphere resulting in a severe loss of signal at times.

Günter Jacob, Passau, Germany is first in this month with, "These QSLs arrived during the last four weeks:

Vatican Radio verified these frequencies: 5965, 7585 (Tashkent), 9660 (Madagascar), 11850 (Tashkent), 13765 (Madagascar). Kathy Gregowske of KTWR put complete details on a QSL for 11580 kHz and sent their schedule, too. Radio Free Asia's A J Janitschek sent an "RFA's 15 Years of Broadcasting" commemorative QSL for Tinian on 5895 kHz. Radio Nederland confirmed my reception of Sines on 5955 kHz. Another "one of the last" Trincomalee QSLs came from DW for 21780 kHz. Iris Rauscher of HCJB Global sent one of the 2011 series HCJB QSLs verifying a test program via Kall (1 kW.) on 3995 kHz. Regrettably there seems to be still more patience needed before Radio Romania and Family Radio will send their cards for my many detailed reception reports of many months ago. Just to mention that I received a mediumwave QSL from Radio Algérienne for my "Rapport du 10.10.2010, Fréquence 531 kHz, Heure GMT 22:00-23:04". Algeria's powerful transmitter provides a stupendous signal here in Europe every night on 531 kHz. But this is my first mediumwave QSL received within the last one and a half years or so!" Good to receive your news, Günter, and note that the interesting veries are continuing to roll in.

Ian Cattermole, Blenheim advises his "SW veries received during September: AWR 9470; KTWR 13750; RNW Issouden 9840, Tinian 9650 7360; FEBC 15580; VOR 11985 15585; RDW Kigali 9895 9885; R.Vaticana 5965; R.Tirana 7530 9895; CRI Kashi 9600, Cerrick 5960; European Gospel Radio 7290; VOT 9465; R.Ibrahim (IBRA) 11740; NHK. Santiago 6145." Thank you Ian and you've certainly proved that you haven't been taking a holiday. Last month I asked Ian about Azadi Radio from which he had received a QSL, a station which I had never heard of. His kind reply reads, "Radio Azadi, otherwise known as Azadi Radio is operated by Radio

Free Europe/Liberty with HQ in Prague. It broadcasts in Pashto and Dari to Afghanistan via transmitters at Udorn, Kuwait and I think Sri Lanka also and could well be others. Website is www.azadiradio.org Plenty of info there, staff numbers etc."

And Des adds, "I'm into jogging now. Yes, each morning, I get up out of the sack and into my track pants and T-shirt and track shoes, and I run around the block. And when I finish, I kick the block back under the bed! Jogging helps with my crook left knee and leg. What a job I'll have with a stick trying to jog!" You're really a tough guy, Des. I have two bionic knees and the last thing I would think of is jogging. Half -an-hour with a soft walk on the grass is the best that I can do!

Theo Donnelly, Vancouver, Canada comments: "Nothing of great import with DX here, apart from three/four weeks ago: R. Ethiopia on 9705 kHz showed up at sign-on ~0259:30 UT for a week or so -- most evenings (8 p.m. PDT) rather poor, but a couple where it lifted into the fair range. My Amharic is rather rusty so never did grab a definite ID... however, they have a distinctive "gong" sounding three times just after the initial announcements and anthem, and a quick check with their "National Radio" streaming audio brought the same detail to my ears! Ah, technology." What a wonderful age we're in Theo!

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai reports 3 QSLs in - Free Radio Service Holland 7600 and 6221, both just 350 watts - and Whangarei LPFM The Cruz 88.0.

This month I have enjoyed daily monitoring of daytime Brazilians on 19, 25 and 31 metres with Radio Inconfidencia 15189.3 audible from 1930 to sometimes past 0900 UTC, with only Family Radio to interfere with reception between 2200 and 0200. Very occasionally they carry a comprehensive English identification on the hour, most recently noted at 0500 UTC.

Other listening highlights for the past month included KSCS Fort Worth Dallas with its low-powered feed on 25990 in FM mode, Turbo Mix in Peru on 1540.5 putting a heterodyne on ZNS1 Bahamas 1540, and surprise reception of the 1kw Hamburger Local Radio from Germany with an extended schedule on 5980 on 3 October.

You have certainly been tramping through the frequencies this month, Bryan. SW to 26MHz, MW and even on FM. Thank goodness my September forecast proved correct!

Globetrotting member MARTIN HADLOW has forwarded an article from the Guardian newspaper of 9 October, entitled "Radio 4's long wave goodbye"

A handful of specially crafted glass valves each measuring one metre high are all that is stopping the historic home of Test Match Special, Yesterday in Parliament and the Daily Service going suddenly and permanently off air. BBC Radio 4 long wave, which transmits on the 198 kilohertz frequency, relies on ageing transmitter equipment that uses a pair of the valves – no longer manufactured – to function.

The valves, at Droitwitch in Worcestershire, are so rare that engineers say there are fewer than 10 in the world, and the BBC has been forced to buy up the entire global supply. Each lasts anywhere between one and 10 years, and when one of the last two blows the service will go quiet. Last week, Mark Thompson, the director-general of the BBC, signalled the beginning of the end for the 198 long-wave service, which is still used by 90,000 homes in Britain to receive Radio 4 in areas where short-range FM does not penetrate.

The BBC began national transmission with the National Programme, the predecessor of Radio 4, in 1926. Transmission moved to 200 kilohertz in 1934, when the BBC moved its transmission to Droitwitch, and has remained at that frequency, allowing for a slight shift to 198Khz ever since. (Thanks to the Guardian & Martin for this story –another significant milestone in the ever changing radio scene. BC)

TONY KING in Greytown writes: "For two years now I've MW DXed with Ultralights and own a Tecsun PL606 and PL380 bought direct from Hong Kong. The advent of the Silicon chip that enables a selectable bandwidth on MW and SW of 1 2 3 4 6 kHz was a dream come true, and to be able to nudge Coast 1584 away from 1580, and separate Anguilla on 1610 from the Aussies on 1611 has been great. Does anyone else own one of these radios? With the \$NZ v \$US at a high about a month ago, I landed the PL606 for NZ \$58 delivered in 6 days. The sets respond best to loop antennas and the trend in the States now is towards Ferrite Sleeve Loops (82 Russian surplus ferrite rods taped at 1cm intervals and wrapped around a plastic waterpipe; an 84 turn litz wire coil over the rods goes to a 381 pf tuning condensor, and the signal transfers by induction.) The lack of real estate and QRN is one of the reasons for so many US DXers like this approach. If you want a peek at the prices etc, type anon-co ebay into your browser." (*Thanks Tony – I hope some of our 'retired' MW DXers will take up the challenge of trying this new approach to the hobby*)

EKKO stamps—the verification stamps that were popular in the 1920s—are quite well known, Bryant stamps less so. Bryant stamps were somewhat of a competitor to EKKO stamps. However, I have seen many thousands of old BCB QSLs and, unlike EKKO's, I have never seen one bearing a Bryant stamp. Presumably you bought them direct from the company (P. M. Bryant, Chicago).

Under "DX History/QSLS & Other Station Memorabilia" you will find a file containing some sample pages from a 1925 Bryant stamp album. It is set up much the same as an EKKO album--pages for the stamps (which were a little less artful than the EKKO's), then lists of American broadcast band stations arranged by call letters and location, followed by pages for keeping a log of stations heard.

Also shown are several sheets of unperforated Bryant stamps. A little research shows that the stations are arranged on the sheets alphabetically by state (left-to-right, top-to-bottom), though not necessarily alphabetically by call letters within the state. Could you send a list of stations to Bryant and have them send you a sheet of stamps for the requested call letters? Did you have to send the QSLs? There is some suggestion on line that you could buy the album with a complete set of stamps. Unlike EKKO's, which bore the words "Verified Reception Stamp," Bryant stamps carried no indication that they were meant to signify verification of reception. -- Also, we have substituted a new version of the file containing club seals and stickers that we posted on August 28, 2011. This one contains two new items from John Herkimer, a red NNRC sticker and a green-and-gold NNRC decal (3" diameter).

Lest you think that the Winter SWL Fest was the first "national" SWL convention, consider the IDA DX Festival, held in San Francisco, July 8-11, 1939. Sponsored by a national DX club, the International DXers Alliance (IDA), the festival coincided with the Golden Gate International Exposition, i.e. the 1939 World's Fair (one of them--there was also a New York World's Fair that year). Under "DX History/Clubs & Publications," we have posted a file containing various articles in The Globe Circler (the IDA journal), and several promotional pieces put out by the IDA, about the festival.

As you can see, there was a special IDA broadcast over General Electric Treasure Island shortwave station W6XBE (later KGEI), and a train trip from Chicago for those wishing to make the trek west by rail. If I am reading the third to the last item in the file ("Editorial") correctly, it look like IDA president Charles A. Morrison made the trip by car but missed the convention! Per the next item, attendance was an inspecific "goodly number," if "somewhat smaller than expected." An August convention in Downers Grove, Illinois drew more than 40 people. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" entries from Adrian Peterson: "VOA Shipboard Relay Stations-VOA Ship No. 2: The Mystery Story of the Radio Ship Phoenix," and "Minivan Radio for the Maldive Islands"

(September 11, 2011).

This time, under "DX History/Equipment & Advertising," we have posted a Hallicrafters 20th Anniversary brochure, issued circa 1954, containing brief writeups of receivers, transmitters, and other equipment. -- And under "Specialized Resources," two new "Wavescan" entries (September 18, 2011): "Radio Afghanistan Returns to the Air on Shortwave-1: Early Mediumwave," and "The World,s Newest Country: The Radio Story in the New South Sudan, Pt. 2."

For many decades, at least before the internet, national clubs were the major way for SWLs to stay in touch with one another.

However, club membership was often supplemented by gatherings of local DX groups. Such groups have existed for many years, as evidenced by an article posted under "DX History/Clubs & Publications"--"Leaves From a DXer's Scrapbook," from the May 1939 issue of RADEX (Radio Index) magazine. It reviews the activities of some of the local groups of the day. The author, "Count de Veries," was the well-known BCB DXer Carleton Lord. -- And under "Specialized Resources," a new "Wavescan" article by Adrian Peterson: "VOA Shipboard Relay stations-VOA Ship No. 3: The Apache—The American Ship With the Australian Cargo" (September 25, 2011).




The Story of the PAL Radio Guides

Mery Branks - PAL's first editor

PAL was first published in the late 1950's by the New Zealand Radio DX League and editor Merv Branks was a well known AM listener. He contacted hundreds of radio stations in the region and began publishing a 50-60 page long guide with results of his queries and observations from hundreds of club members.

It may be a haunting rhythm from the Pacific, a weird melody from the vast Asian continent, a muezzin summoning the faithful to worship from the minaret of a mosque in the lands of the Middle East, or even beat music from some jungle outpost." Pacific Log

Merv withdrew from publishing PAL because of advancing age, the final edition being in October 1966.

Chris Martin's Pacific Log

Chris Martin of the Southern Cross DX Club (Australia) published a 'Pacific Log' in 1978 dedicated to the memory of Merv Branks. This ran to 90 pages and co-incided with the move to 9kHz spacing along the mediumwave dial throughout Asia and the Pacific.

Another smaller guide was published in 1983, when Robert Chester of the ARDXC, issued a 'Mediumwave Guide to Australia, NZ and the South Pacific' running to 36 pages and excluding Asia.

PAL reborn in the digital age

It would be almost 20 years before Bruce Portzer took advantage of the digital age to begin compiling PAL again, with regular revisions, and the tradition established by Merv Branks was reborn.

The Original PAL Log

Almost 50 years later, PAL has returned to New Zealand as 'flagship' of the Radio Heritage Foundation Guide Series under the control of editor-in-chief Bruce Portzer.
