VALE PATRON FRANK GLEN

Frank Glen was a friend to all and will be sorely missed. As David Ricquish says below, it is a double body blow to the League losing our Chief Editor and Patron within 6 months of each other.

I first met Frank Glen at the convention held at Camp Iona in 2003. I was greeted warmly and welcomed into the fold, so to speak. I later that year moved to Christchurch from Wellington and began organising branch meetings. Frank was always a regular attender, and host. I well remember the event referred to by David Ricquish (see below). It is probably the most amazing QSL I have seen, or rather heard. He took over the role of organiser after I left for overseas.

Frank was a keen DXer but his hearing had suffered greatly from the noise associated with flying. We always took the trouble to provide Frank with details he might have missed when logging a station. I know he was tickled pink to get the veries back from them.

When we moved overseas, Frank and Margret came to stay with us in Dubai. They were on their way to an ANZAC Day celebration in Belgium. When Maureen and I were married in 2010, Frank helped to officiate at the blessing of our wedding in Christchurch. The cover photo comes from that occasion.

His activities as an apprentice electrician, an outback flying padre and an RAAF Chaplain lead me on to a couple of Frank's favourite stories. We were at Tiwai, when Paul Aronsen suggested we go to see what was left of the 6 by 3 at the Riverton Rocks. We were just coming in to Riverton when Frank went into ecstasy. There it was - the lampost and light he had erected and installed as a young apprentice - still standing and still working. It was the crowning moment of his career in the electrical world.

The first tale concerned his work in the outback. On one occasion Frank was taking off from the middle of nowhere and there was a large storm between him and his home base. He tried desperately to communicate with base, but to no avail. Suddenly on the RT there came a call from an RAAF plane on its way north to Darwin and on to Vietnam. The pilot relayed the message to base for him and with a cheery thanks and God Bless, Frank carried on his merry way.

A couple of years passed and Frank joined the RAAF. He was in the Officers' Mess on his first day on the job when he met a Wing Commander. When Frank explained who he was and what he had been doing, the penny dropped. The gentleman concerned had been the pilot of that plane. He then proceeded to expressly forbid Frank from ever mentioning God on air again. It turns out that when he hadsigned off, the RAAF plane had been almost immediately hit by lightning and quite a bit of damage had been done!

The second story comes in two parts and shows the true Frank. He had an element of the anarchist in him as will be seen.

RAAF Williamstown was to receive a visit form HRH The Duke of Edinburgh. Everybody was briefed and the officers were given rosters of 10 minutes to engage in conversation with the

Duke. They were told what they could and could not discuss, which Frank promptly ignored. The first thing he asked the Duke was, 'how's the wife, sir?' To which the Duke launched into a tirade about his wife, who had been ill and wouldn't see a doctor, the so and so kids who weren't behaving ... and so it went on. The CO was apoplectic, but as Frank explained, whenever he talks to parishioners he asks about family and it tends to relax them, as it had evidently done in this instance!

Five years passed and the Duke was on a return visit. Again the officers were briefed and warned to stick to the line. The Duke walked into the mess saw Frank and exclaimed: 'I know you, you're the padre that doesn't drink!' (Possibly the only one in the forces!). He then went on to say something to the effect that either he was the best padre in the forces and they wouldn't let him go or he was the worst and nobody else would take him on! Frank then asked him ... 'How is your wife, sir?', at which point the CO went puce and was quietly led away to a padded cell.

When the earthquake struck Christchurch, Frank and Margret's home was devastated and their lives shocked beyond measure. For those of us who were not there, it is hard to imagine what the wholesale destruction must have been like. Despite the obvious effect on their own lives, Frank selflessly ministered to the needs of those around him, offering solace and comfort to those in need. But who looked after Frank? Why, Margret, of course. Behind every good man Margret was certainly his support.

We have lost a great friend, wise counsel and loyal DXer. To Margret our sincere condolences. Requiescat in pace! *Stu Forsyth, Malaysia*

It has been a great privilege to have known our late patron Frank Glen - this larger than life, convivial teller of tales, with his disarming grin, always with wise or witty words to liven up the DX League meetings, conventions and listening sessions we shared. Frank always added colour and wisdom to any occasion. Pomp and ceremony became part of the DXpeditions to Tiwai and other places.

His life experience was so much greater than ours, he could always be relied on for wise counsel when there were challenging or difficult issues for the DX League to address.

During his 6 years as League Patron Frank put a lot of effort into organising the Christchurch DXers group but the earthquakes cruelly intervened.

He was also an important conduit in the DX League's relationship with the Hocken Library where the clubs early archives are maintained. Frank liaised with University of Otago to initiate a postgraduate investigation of the history of DXing in NZ but a suitable candidate for this research still eludes us.

Sandra and I were fortunate to have spent time with Frank and Margret last month when Frank could still crack a joke and a cheeky smile, and remember shared DX experiences that I had forgotten.

He has run the race of life well and is now at peace with his Lord. Our sincerest sympathy goes out to Margret who has shared Frank with their local communities around NZ and Australia for more than 55 years.

One contribution to 'Mailbag' about 18 months ago included the hope to explore the possibilities of Rakiura for noise-free reception over his 80th birthday visit to Masons Bay, but a later plan for a DXpedition in 2015 was not to be. *Theo Donnelly, Vancouver, Canada*

Yesterday I learnt the sad news that Frank Glen, Patron and Life Member had passed on to a better world. I am not sure when I first met Frank but I well remember a number of nights in the lounge at Tiwai with the only light coming from the fire and listening to Frank tell us some of his exploits. I remember one story about Frank and a rock in Doubtful Sound and always remember when on an overnight cruise in Doubtful Sound a year or so later, the Captain of the vessel related that same story when passing the rock. We were privileged to have Frank join us for our DX week at Okains Bay last year and during that week he told us of his plans to have a DX week in a remote house on Stewart Island in 2016 and that we were invited. Such was his enthusiasm for the DX hobby.


Frank's wise counsel to League members will be sadly missed by all in the hobby here in New Zealand.

Where do I start, and where would I finish, as trying to put a tribute into few lines on Frank, is imposssible? I remember travelling to Tiwia for a meeting. Frank told us, how he had gone out on a survelliance flight on an Australian Airforce plane, above the Australain coast line and how they had circled what was supposed to be a fishing boat. Upon coming lower, the boat was found to be spying, and quickly the crew members covered their naval uniforms with fisherman jackets and dropped the radio antennas. Frank was busy with his camera,(he was not actually permitted to do this). The film was taken and printed by the Air Force and he was told they where very good.

That was the first of many stories that he told us at Conventions, Tiwai trips, etc. There followed stories about meeting Prince Phillip when he made a visit to an RAAF Base. Another story about an Australian Soldier with Tin Legs, and many others that he kept us amused with over the years. Frank loved going to Tiwai. He found a handbag on the beach, and also a pressure plate from a 1st World War German U Boat and told us how it was sunk. There was also the flag raising cermony and lowering each day carried out by Frank and the First Sea Lord from Oamaru (Peter Grenfell).

Frank came in from a nature call one very clear night, sat down at his radio, and declared, "Tiwai is the most Magical place in the World". He loved being a Dxer, and being with us all who enjoyed the hobby of DX.

I felt priviliged to have been at Frank's bedside the day before he left us all in the NZRDXL.

MAILBAG

Again this month, the magazine focuses on remembering a major force in the League, as we pay tribute to Frank Glen. Just as I was about to prepare this column, webmaster Paul Ormandy posted a link on <dxdialog> to a piece that has to be described as 'Pure Frank'. I especially like the "Younger member" tale about half a dozen paragraphs down in Part One!

lan Cattermole, Blenheim has now reached his magic number, but takes the easy way out to answer my query about a couple of frequencies in last month's QSL collection. "Sorry about those two typo errors, again put it down to age !!!!!! Yes, you are correct, TWR Manzini 15105 and Vatican Radio via Philippines 11695, broadcast in English at 1530 UTC, other languages earlier. Here my SW veries received during January: NHK (Issoudun) 9770; Radio Veritas Asia 15330 (for verie number 8000); Radio Vaticana (SMG) 21710; HCJB (Issoudun) 11995 & 11900; Radio Ashna (Nauen) 9770; Voice of Oromo Liberation (Issoudun) 13830; RDW (Issoudun) 11850; AWR (Nauen) 9850; NHK (Nauen) 9765; Overcomer (Nauen) 13810; VoA (Issoudun) 13870; VoA (Nauen) 11995; AIR 11710; and R. Sawtu Linjilla (Issoudun) 9800 kHz. There they are for this time. Radio Veritas Asia made it 8000. Now with a total of 8013 from 9805 reports out is around 81% returns in all. My first QSL was from New Caledonia on 7170khz back in 1976. Have also had QSLs from them later on 3355, 11710 and 9510 kHz. Those were the days, eh. Tahiti, Tonga, Cook Islands etc. etc. all on SW then." (My turn to blame declining grey cells: I don't recall Noumea on 31 and 25m, but Tahiti was always a strong signal on 11825 at 0300 UTC if I have my semi-facts correct, both in my days in Hamilton and up in this neck of the rain forest. That's a remarkable return rate for reports; for the column's sake - and mine keep it up!)

Stu Forsyth in Putrajaya, Malaysia has successes for his efforts. "Hi Theo, I have veries in from CRI on 17690 via Jinhua, 17650 and 15185 via Kashi, 11635 via Beijing, and 15210 via Kunming, and from VOIRI on 21510. I am still ploughing my way through the reports to stations logged in Europe. Life has been going full tilt here since our return from Europe and our Christmas break seems a long time ago!" (*With all the frequencies used by CRI, you'll not run out of possible catches for a while.*)


Jonathan Wood, Mosgiel is obviously getting his exercise. "Hello Theo, hope the year has got off to a good start for you - spotted a few good potential DX sites over the holidays - Marble Hill DoC reserve just outside Springs Junction on the Lewis Pass road has toilets, water, nicely mown tent sites and suitable manuka to tie an antenna pole onto. Also a cleverly built concrete wall straddling the Alpine Fault which runs through the campsite so you can tell if there is an earthquake. Also Ida Railway Hut (the original Ida Valley Railway

Station, carted up to 1300m alt with the aid of bulldozers and a trailer over precipitous mountain tracks) which has lots of new bunks; coal stove; and jumper leads from the outside leading to a lighting system... Browns Hut - smaller but easier to get to and made of flattened kero tins; and smaller still, Buster Hut (about the size of a large cupboard). Didn't get to try any of these out - only Lauder Basin Hut (no window; each end of antenna gets fastened to tussocks on opposite sides of a gully, and the hut is in the middle!) and Tailings Hut which was a bit ho hum for reception but a nice hut. Regards." (*Take a hike isn't a negative comment for you. How do other trampers react to your radio activities, or are you generally solo occupant?*)

Brvan Clark, Mangawhai reported in before we learned of Frank's passing. "(I've) logged FRS Holland 9335 and also heard another frequency for the reactivated RB2 Brazilian station (previously Radio Clube de Paranaense) - 6040. Current shortwave monitoring targets are an unidentified music station on 6070 mixing CFRX at 0700 - possibly Channel 292's new 10kw transmitter from Germany, and Guyana reactivated on 3290 - only the carrier detected so far. Regular MW DX monitoring has uncovered a few uncommon North American catches and the Puerto Rican WGIT has been heard again on 1660. I now have a WinRadio WR-G313e software defined radio, but will need a lot of spare time to master its use. You don't need sophisticated equipment for FM DX, just good timing. I was twiddling with the car radio in the supermarket carpark in mid-January and found Pidgin talkback on 103.0, maybe Vanuatu. Made a flying visit to the South Island early in the month to catch up with senior members Frank Glen and Peter Grenfell." (That was fortunate timing to get down south. RB2 has been putting in great signals on 11935 for me in our afternoons recently $- \sim 2300$ onwards - it's interesting to hear them throw quick voice ID's into the middle of songs as if they're trying to prevent anyone else from using the music.)

And **Günter Jacob in Passau, Germany** joins lan in adding up his outgoing mail. "My statistics give these numbers of reception reports sent to the stations in the previous five years: 288 in 2009, 278 (2010), 243 (2011), 173 (2012), 52 (2013), finally climbing again in 2014 to 102. Lots of noise is deteriorating the reception conditions and reminds me of the 1960s when part of the shortwave spectrum suffered because of jamming stations all over. The EDXC Radio Country List 2014 is available at https://edxcnews.wordpress.com/ Incoming verifications from: RFA Tinian on 9950 and 21465; RTI Tamsui 11665; R. Romania 6170 within 2 months; TWR Swaziland 9940 within 2 weeks; and Reach Beyond Australia verified Kununurra on 12115 and 9940 kHz (eQSL in 2 days). Until next time." (My nephew said during a Christmas phone call that on a recent road trip from Cairns around Australia that he couldn't spot the Kununura site, though he went looking specifically for it.)

And until next time, it is. 73, Theo

MEXICO A recent report via the GRA Argentina blog contains important news about the migration of AM stations to FM in Mexico, maybe explaining the abrupt disappearance of some MW stations (like XEJ 970?). In summary, AM stations of under 1 kW must continue on FM only; AM stations of more than 5 kW have the option of moving only to FM or continuing on both (This does not make sense. And what about stations at exactly 1 or 5 kw?) The previous cutoff was 10 kW. Stations in Hidalgo del Parrral, Chihuahua which do not meet the power requirements will have to close down AM on January 15. 25 kW mentioned is the typical power (ERP?) of new FM replacement transmitters. (Glenn Hauser, DXLD Yahoo Group)

My interpretation of the Spanish text is that, alongside Mexico's plans to switch off analogue television in favour of digital TV, there are moves away from AM resulting from radio manufacturers favouring the FM mode of transmission in their receivers. Low powered stations particularly appear targeted to close AM in favour of FM operations. (BC)

NEW ZEALAND Radio Spectrum Management are having another go at selling radio frequencies which failed to sell at last December's auction. Included are the following AM frequencies: 855 from Ouruhia near Christchurch (reserve of \$28,600), 1170 from Dacre Southland with \$5900 reserve, 1170 from Waitomo in the King Country, 1485 from Twizel in mid-Canterbury and 1521 from Reefton on the West Coast (all 3 each with a \$1200 reserve). MW DXers will hope that no one is interested and perhaps the lack of interest in these licences is an early pointer to declining interest in operating stations in our AM band. Rhema Media have rebranded Southern Star as just Star, per the December edition of their Frequency newsletter. (BC)

RUSSIA Russian state television and radio broadcasting operator RTRS will end broadcasting on 30 of its 40 MW transmitters on 1 February 2015, says a source close to the RTRS. Department of operation RTRS has sent a letter to the regional radio centres. The representative confirmed RTR RBC that the company will continue in 2015 to reduce the broadcasting of radio programs on medium wave, but did not name the specific timing and extent of the reduction of funding for this purpose. After 1 February, broadcasts on MW transmitters will continue on 10 low-powered transmitters from 1 to 15 kW – enabling reception in a radius of 50 kilometres. These transmitters are planned to eventually convert to FM-band with the same short-range, said the correspondent of RBC deputy director of RTR Sergey Arkhipov. (Medium Wave Circle UK via IRCA)

TV/FM NEWS & DX

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai reports a lacklustre end to the 2014/15 FM DX season:

7 January - ABC Classic FM 101.9 from Batemans Bay NSW surfaced briefly at 0552 UTC. 12 January - while sitting in the car at the Pak n Save Supermarket carpark in Silverdale on Auckland's North Shore, I found a Pidgin English talkback programme on 103.0 MHz from 0644 till 0700 UTC. Mentions of Papua New Guinea and possibly Solomon Islands, though WRTH 2015 has nothing listed for those countries.

I am speculating that this signal was Vanuatu as I have previously had the Radio Australia relay and perhaps that has closed as a result of RA's cutbacks and been replaced with local programming.

The only other possible clue was something on 90.0, playing rap or hip hop.

13 January - English talk surfaced briefly on 103.0 at 0023 UTC - I've only previously heard Radio Australia relays from Tonga and Vanuatu (see above) here.



Solomon Islands - According to a late December blog by Ashley Wickham, SIBC General Manager: "we are about to buy new FM transmitters to install early next year (2015) at Kirakira and Taro Island with others to follow in all provinces. This is part of the 'Unity FM project' which will shift the delivery platform from the old shortwave technology we have used for about 50 years to CD quality FM."

New Zealand - In the early December government auction of radio frequencies, Rhema Media picked up 25 FM frequencies in 17 locations (Tauranga, Rotorua, Gisborne, Taumarunui, Ohakune/Raetihi, Wairoa, Wanganui, Kapiti, Picton, Blenheim, Westport, Reefton, Greymouth, South Canterbury, Wanaka, Cromwell/Alexandra and South Otago) and they are now working to find suitable transmitter sites, negotiate leases, acquire transmission equipment and commission the stations. A condition of the licences is that they are on-air within 21 months, otherwise the frequency is returned to the government.

The same auction saw Mangawhai's Mark Perry (operator of Heads FM 106.4 and The Wireless 88.1 FM) picking up the new Mangawhai licence for 90.4 FM.

Mark tells me he had to bid to his limit "as the networks were aggressive in their bidding, having "war rooms" with staff loaded on terminals online."

He plans to put the transmitter/antenna on Bream Tail so that will give him 100 watts (Heads FM is currently 1 watt) into the Northland east coastal region from Marsden Cove in the north to Pakiri in the south.

He's ordering gear at the moment and hopes to be on air in February, with a news service too.

REMEMBERING FRANK GLEN Our highly respected Patron and Life Member passed away on 5 February, a couple of months after being diagnosed with a brain tumour. This issue of the DX Times has been dedicated to Frank and you will find tributes and reminiscences of members elsewhere. But, for those who did not have the privilege of meeting Frank, some details of his varied life and interests: In his 82 years, the Reverend Doctor Frank Grenfell Glen had an impact in many places. From the DX perspective, he joined the Southland Branch of the NZ Radio DX League aged 16 in 1949, just a year after the League's formation. The Branch expelled him in 1953 for not paying his subscription, but 6 months later reinstated him. He was an electrical apprentice at the time earning just 30/-(\$3) a week. At the instigation of foundation member MERV BRANKS, Frank rejoined the League in 1976 upon returning to Invercargill. He remained a member until 1983 when he shifted to Hastings, and rejoined a third time in 1987 when based in Thames, Frank had been a member ever since, interested in both shortwave and medium wave DX. From his youth Frank was also interested in aviation and, thanks to a scholarship he learnt to fly as an RNZAF cadet in the early 1950s. In 1955 he began training for the Methodist ministry and married Margret in 1958. Their interesting life together has been captured in a series of books that Frank wrote – "Holy Joe's People" (published by Reed in 1968) covered Frank's first parish in Western Southland and included his pioneering work as an Industrial Chaplain on the giant Manapouri Hydro Scheme. "Fly High, Reach Far" (Reed 1971) chronicled the period from 1966 when the couple worked for the Methodist Church's

Far West Inland Mission, covering an area of 92,000 square miles of NSW, Queensland and South Australia. Frank's skills as a pilot and clergyman enabled a more effective church mission to inland Australia. In 1976 the Glens returned to Southland - 'Bush in our Yard' (Reed 1990) covers their life on a 2 hectare property at Myross Bush and Frank's time as a Probation Officer.

During his training for the ministry at Trinity College Auckland, Frank became interested in church history and later historical research of military matters became a major focus. Frank had been appointed National Service Chaplain with the NZ Army in 1962, and following his Australian outback flying days he spent 6 years as a chaplain with the RAAF. He was admitted as a Fellow of the Australian Institute of History and the Arts in 1990 and was the editor of the NZ Journal of Military History for 5 years. He is an Honorary Life Member of the NZ Military History Society. In 1998 Frank graduated PhD from the University of Waikato and his thesis dealt with the Chaplains of the NZ Expeditionary Force 1939-45. In the past decade Frank has had several more books published – "Bowler of Gallipoli" (Australian Military History Publications 2004) - the basis of a TV documentary currently in production, and "Australians at War in NZ" (Willson Scott Publishing, 2011), dealing with the 2400 Australians who fought in our Maori Land Wars between 1860 and 1867.

Frank was elected League Patron in 2008 following the death of **JACK FOX** and in that role he has been a wise and encouraging presence for the Administration Committee. He was also a lively presence at many League conventions. We are grateful for the role that Frank and Margret have played in our club and our lives. In Frank's honour, the League

has made a donation to the George Barton Trust at Knox College Dunedin, where Frank's extensive Archives including DX material is being housed.

THIS MONTH'S BAD NEWS In the latest dismantling of the infrastructure of international shortwave broadcasting, we have news of plans to close the Deutsche Welle relay station in Kigali, Rwanda (Central Africa) at the end of the current B14 season (29 March 2015). This comes from Thomas Feustel of DW's Technical Distribution who also says the station will then be dismantled. The consolation is that the English, Amharic, French, Hausa, Swahili, Dari and Pashto broadcasts that have used Kigali will continue from 30 March to the same service areas, using 'rentals', presumably transmitters from the likes of Sentech (South Africa) and Babcock. Keith Perron notes that the Trincomalee Sri Lanka relay station employed 4 European engineers and 125 Sri Lankan staff when operated by Deutsche Welle, so paying a relay operator is certainly a cheaper option. (Thanks to Glenn Hauser's DXLD Yahoo Group for source info)

CONGRATULATIONS to member **IAN CATTERMOLE** who recently passed 8000 shortwave QSLs, achieved in 38 years as a DX/SWL hobbyist.

DXING THE BROADCASTING BAND - Part 2 with Ray Crawford

Over the last 50 years DXing the broadcast band I have been the recipient of QSL cards and letters verifying my reception from some 2366 different stations. These have come from 189 countries and a continental breakdown is as follows, Australia/New Zealand 881, Pacific region 127, South America 111, Central America 86, North America 414, Europe 132, Africa 46, Asia 569.

Some of the better QSLs from New Zealand reception include several 250 Watt stations in the USA on 1230, 1240, 1400 1450 and 1490 kHz which was their maximum power on these frequencies. They are now allowed to use 1kW.

Some of the other better stations heard and confirmed include

Radiofonica Ecuador 1535 kHz 1 kW

Ondas Orientales, El Salvador, 1155khz 1kW

WKFE Puerto Rica 1550 kHz 250 Watts,

St Pierre et Miquelon 1375 kHz 4 kW,

HIDA Dominican Republic 1590 kHz 1 kW

Radio Cristal in Panama on 1320 kHz,

Bermuda 1235 kHz 250 Watts which was heard quite often on an electric fence (not working of course)

CBA New Brunswick 1070 kHz 50 kW only ever heard the once, signing on at 0900 UTC.

American Forces Far East Network, Iwo Jima, Japan, 1500 kHz 100 Watts

Radio Caroline a British commercial Pirate on 1520 kHz 10 kW

French Somaliland 1538 kHz 4 kW (heard on a five valve radio and 30 metres of wire in the backyard)

Radio Cordoba, Spain 1475 kHz 2kW

Radio Mendes, Bolivia 680 kHz 4kW

Radio Belize 834 kHz 20 kW

British Forces Cyprus, 890 kHz 7500 Watts

Gothenburg, Sweden on 981 kHz

In 1981 I transferred to Australia with COMALCO to assist with commissioning of the high voltage substation equipment at the Boyne Island aluminium smelter and then continue with operations when the plant came on stream. Boyne Island, on the central Queensland coast proved to be a very good DX location and from here some good DX was heard.

Some better reception and QSLs from Australian reception have come from

KIPO Hawaii 570 kHz 1000 Watts (their first report from Australia)

St Denis, Reunion 602 kHz 4 kW

American Forces, Diego Garcia 1475 kHz 250 Watts

KSDP Sand Point, Alaska 840 kHz 250 Watts

Radio Jacaranda, Rhodesia 1255 kHz 1 kW

Radio RAAF, Butterworth Air Base, Malaysia 1445 kHz 1 kW (Only known reception from Australia)

KICO California, USA 1490 kHz 250 Watts

Some frequencies have been very good and 1550 kHz has given 30 different stations from 10 countries with 21 being from North America. 1440 kHz has yielded 31 stations from 11 countries.

The big thrill of DXing the broadcast band is not knowing just what you will hear. It can be frustrating too especially when a nice strong signal is heard and before it can be identified it fades under another station which comes up and dominates the frequency with the former

not heard again. As well as this is the often high noise level from atmospheric static which is like that heard on 80 Metres. In older times we had no tape recorders to aid listening and all notes had to be taken by hand. These days it is helpful to have a recording of the station and it can be played back over and over to glean the detail needed to be able to write a meaningful reception report. While not able to speak the language all Latin American reception reports are written in Spanish. Tuning the dial is the enjoyable part of the hobby. Getting that QSL in the mail is always a thrill but they don't come without writing the report which is always an onerous task.

With experience it is surprising just what can be understood from the stations that are heard in foreign languages. If stations use call letters to identify they are nearly always given in English and slogans as used by South American stations are often quite easily understood. One thing the hobby teaches is patience and perseverance. Many nights you can tune the band and never hear anything new then that one night comes along when the band comes alive and there are so many stations to chase you don't know which frequency to sit on. For nine days over the Easter weekend in 2004, I was again able to go to the Tiwai DX location near Invercargill and managed to get loggings from 80 stations including 24 from North America, 4 Mexicans and 34 from South America. All the reception reports have been sent and it is quite a bonus these days to be able to use email as it is a big saving on postage. Over recent years it has become more difficult to get replies from stations. There are many reasons for this and the demise of engineers employed by stations and the use of contracted companies for maintenance is just one. No one at the station seems to be interested any more that they have been heard at such a distance or even knows what a QSL is.

The New Zealand Radio DX League has a very good web site at www.radiodx.com and there are some very interesting articles and photos about DXing and DXers. Broadcast band DXers do it better in the dark!

January 18, 2015 -- Not shortwave, but one of the well-known early broadcast band stations was WOR, Newark, New Jersey, which was owned and operated by the even better-known Bamberger's department store. Under "DX History/Stations" we have posted an interesting little booklet from 1923 which will tell you about both the station and the store. -- And Adrian Peterson takes us back to the Philippines, with more on Press Wireless. Look for "The Philippine Radio Story: Press Wireless Returns to the Philippines-2" (Wavescan N307, January 11, 2015), and in the same issue of Wavescan, "The World's Smallest Radio Station." Find both under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan."

January 25, 2015 -- Radio Moscow, whose signal once blanketed the shortwave bands, is now but a memory. Under "DX History/Stations" we have posted a promotional booklet issued by the late Radio Moscow, apparently circa 1956 (judging from the postmarks shown on the inside back cover). -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," Adrian Peterson favors us with two new entries: "Focus on the South Pacific: French Radio in the South Pacific--New Caledonia-2," and "Underwater Radio" (both Wavescan N308, January 18, 2015).

February 1, 2015 -- It has been a long time since international broadcasters sent out paper program schedules, probably even longer since you've seen one from the Voice of America. Under "DX History/Stations" we have posted two that were sent out by VOA in 1966-67, one for the Far East service and one for the Middle East service. There were also schedules for South Asia, Latin America, Europe and Africa. They all shared some common pages, with some area-specific features added. -- And time travel again with Adrian Peterson this week as he tells the story of early broadcasting in Bangladesh. Look for "Radio Broadcasting in the Land of the Three Rivers: Diamond Jubilee Celebrations" (Wavescan N309, January 25, 2015), in "Specialized Resources/Wavescan."

February 8, 2015 -- This time, under "Specialized Resources/Radio Postcards," we have posted views of stations in five European countries: Andorra (four pictures of Radio Andorra); Denmark (two pictures of the Kalundborg mediumwave and longwave facility); Finland (an outside and an inside view of the Lahti station, and a picture of the radio shack located in the station's Radio and TV Museum); Italy (the Marconi station in Bari, and the radio tower in Caltanissetta, Sicily); and Switzerland (the League of Nations station, Radio Nations, in Geneva; and the mediumwave antennas at Sottens).
