Welcome to the March edition of the DX Times.

When I was a university student back in the 70s, the university campuses around New Zealand began their own radio stations. Radio B in Auckland, Radio U in Christchurch and Radio Active in Wellington. I am sure there were others, but I can't remember what they were now. I was the QSL officer for Radio U in Christchurch in 1979 and I received reception reports from Bryan Clark, Arthur Cushen and Douglas Johns in particular. We had a special QSL card printed by Tony King too. The Radio U antenna was a hunk of wire dangled vertically from a very large crane for the fortnight or so it was on air. It was great fun.

It was therefore with some sadness that I saw a posting from Bryan Clark on the DX Dialog site advising: 'This week news broke that the company that runs Wellington's pioneering independent radio station Radio Active has gone into liquidation.

A crowded market, advertising dollars drying up, and streaming services - all makes for a challenging environment.'

I hadn't realised it was the first station to legally broadcast on FM.

Those of us who were at the Convention in 1980 at Motu Moana will remember listening to Radio Auckland 1 and Radio Auckland 2 on FM. They were broadcasting illegally from a car travelling around the city, no doubt being pursued by the Post Office Inspectors. The receiver was somebody's car AM/ FM radio. We marvelled at the sound quality. Reports were sent and I have one for each of them - on a prepared card!

It's a shame when stations like Radio Active, not my cup of tea, but local and not networked, are effectively closed out by the big boys.

Only thing that I can think of that would change that would be the CRTC, as they did, about 10 years ago, when they forced the CBC to abandon a plan that would have eliminated CBU-AM and gone all FM. But that would require some pretty solid numbers on a significant number of people in Canada who could no longer hear the CBC.

This is sad news indeed for those who enjoyed CKZU. What amazes me, is how a 500 watt shortwave relay covered such a large broadcast footprint in British Columbia and western North America. As Dave mentions above, CKZN St. Johns is still on the air and, perhaps, listeners on the west coast will have a better chance snagging their 1 kW signal now. (I heard and verified CKZN last Easter from Lake Ellesmere - it was a good signal. Get it while you can! - Chief Ed.)

Thanks first to Stu for handling the column tasks in February while I was being even lazier than usual. I don't know about "flowing prose". The closest to anything flowing around here is the local equivalent of Speights! Judging by a couple of comments to me, the Mailbag <radiodx> address was playing up again. Most of our regulars have my ISP address so please feel free to use that.

**Douglas Johns, Christchurch** aimed a message at me while I was cruising and snoozing, but missed the February deadline unfortunately. "Been a while since I have been doing much, but we had to go to Wanaka for a wedding at the beginning of January, so I took the time to log those stations not already QSL'd. Altogether logged 13 stations, but so far only eight have come back - which seems to be about average for replies these days. Those who did reply were: Star 87.7, Life FM 105.0, Coast 94.6, Sound 93.8, Trackside 106.8, Radio Wanaka 97.0 and Roy FM 104.2 - all these being Wanaka based, and one other The Edge/Omarama 98.9. Otherwise it's all quiet." (Summer's supposed to be Busy Season for FM DX. I see that big grass fire got very close to Sugarloaf.)

**Edward Kusalik from Daysland, Alberta** sent along a lengthy introduction detailing the highlights of his DXing activities that mirror a lot of familiar long-gone Great Catches from the mid-60's onwards. Please welcome him by taking a look at the full report on <dxdialog> as msg 7277 from 10 February. You'll see reminders of the likes of Reunion 2446 and Comoros 7290. He also provided a list of more recent QSL successes, again with full details in msg 7276. And for this month, he was pleased to receive a colourful card from 'Anglo Parade' via WRMI/9955 by snail mail from Colombia. (Thanks, Edward. We'll look forward to regular updates. I don't recall Comoros on 7290, but do count their 3331 frequency as my personal best.)

**lan Cattermole, Blenheim** is our regular updater, even if his email efforts get rejected! "Here are the SW veries received during February: WHRI/T8WH 11675; Reach Beyond Australia 11980 & 15590; RDW Sao Tome 9830; R. Habana Cuba 9535 & 13740; and R. Sedoye Bahar via Kostinbrod 7510 kHz. That's all for this time." (But still good stuff!)

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai was about to head back to his and Sandra's old stomping ground at submission time. "Trust the latest cruise was a success? DX highlight for February was my first reception in more than a decade of FM stations from the Aussie state of Victoria. Some success on medium wave too - still trying to identify a Spanish religious format on 1440 which I suspect is from Peru. Local Moana AM in Tauranga is off air from time to time, opening up DX opportunities on 1440. Short and sweet - off to Wellington tomorrow so planning to visit David & Jo Ricquish." (I hope you passed good wishes on to David and Jo from all of us... and you'll report back in April? Yes, the cruise was a success... nobody pulled the bung in the bottom of the boat!)

**Mike Smith, Opunake** was also wondering about the trip. "Hope you had a great trip/cruise/ adventure! Pretty quiet down here but have managed to spend a little bit of time tuning Peter's SDR with some success. I was surprised (and very pleased) to hear Radio Ukraine International on 1431 on the morning of 19th Feb. A very long time since I've heard anything

from Europe on MW. If I can get a QSL out of them it will be country number 63 on MW. Also managed to log both JOIK and KGUM on 567 at the same time, they were alternately peaking which was very convenient. Nothing new in the QSL department, hopefully will be able to contribute something to Sutton's page next time. You'll be looking forward to spring, but summer has only just arrived in Taranaki, whereas it has been resident over on the east coast for a month or so! Haven't even been for a swim in the Tasman yet. Hopefully I'll have a report on a mini-DXpedition to Pukehina Beach (half way between Tauranga and Whakatane) next month!" (The day in Auckland wasn't exactly beautiful – overcast though didn't rain – but at 25C was a relief after three days in Sydney in a heatwave... last day was 38C and humid. Ugh. Then I landed back to a snowstorm – been Vancouver's worst winter in decades for multiple dumps of white junk.)

Jonathan Wood, Mosgiel has been up the coast a bit near the Other Palmerston. "Had a good first trip of the year, up to Shaq Point. There's always someone wondering what's going on with the mast and wire - this time a visitor from Seattle who had just seen the 200 seals near the carpark and was wanting to know what direction the yellow-eyed penguins were. Back at Mosgiel, we had a good thunderstorm recently with the biggest intensity of rainfall I've seen here and was glad of my new procedure of (mostly) disconnecting the antenna from the radio when not at home. The ELAD Epic continues; it had been parked for nearly three weeks at the Italian Customs and RF Solutions and ELAD have just managed to extract it off them." And in a second message intended for next month, he added, "Courtesy of the Worldwide DX Club posting on <dxdialog>, I made a special trip home the other day to try and hear the HAARP experimental broadcast. Nothing heard: but the next morning I did manage to get Radio Oeoemerang's one hour annual broadcast, using Media-Broadcast's facilities in Germany. Reception was such that I was only able to tell the gender of the speakers, but did send a recording and received an e-QSL about 2 days later. R Oeoemerang originates from Amrum Island, in the German North Frisian Islands. Media Broadcast's address is <QSL-Shortwave@media-broadcast.com>. They transmit for a number of well-known stations and their schedule is in the section 'From Germany to the World' at <a href="http://www.media-broadcast">http://www.media-broadcast</a>. com/en/startpage/services/radio/short-wave-networks/>. Regards, Jonathan." (I didn't see the sense in holding onto your extra news. And better you than me typing out that Frisian name. Pity we don't have a member living just south of Taumarunui at Oio!)

**Stu Forsyth in Cyberjaya, Malaysia** had to take a little trip to grab his latest prize. "Very little to report, Theo. I am glad you are back and I am glad you are doing your job and I'm not! Anyway, the only verie I have is for R. Nacional da Amazônia 11780 heard via Peter's SDR in December. It arrived by registered post, which necessitated a trip across town during working hours to the post office. The fresh air did me good!" (Nice to know I'm appreciated, but you do the hog's worth of the work.)

John Durham, Tauranga appears to be another with the <radiodx> reject syndrome, judging by the header on his mail. "Hope you enjoyed your cruise, quiet couple of months re DX and other activities. The old growler fell down the steps bringing the washing in on New Year's Eve resulting in a broken leg. Have been looking after her since then but is getting mobile again so will be back to normal. QSLs in: 16 Gwendoline St via Bulgaria 9510 kHz; RFA via UAE 13735 kHz; and World Music Radio via Karup Denmark 5815 kHz – 7 kW listed — follow up report for reception May 2004. Thanks for help from Dene Lynneberg and Stig Nielsen for his effort in verifying after all these years." (I hope Your Better Half doesn't read the Times... and also thought you were joshing with that '16 Gwendoline' title. That's a new one for mel) Günter Jacob from Passau, Germany re-appears after a couple of months' break... I hope that's not because of the <radiodx> business. "It's something very special if you log – in the 62nd year of your listening hobby – a new country on shortwave and get it QSLed: Mr Ze Yar, Director of Broadcasting, verified my detailed report on the reception of Myanmar Radio on

5985 kHz. Very good reception is still possible of Radio New Zealand International on 7355 kHz, and the requested QSL for my report was sent within 4 weeks. As a surprise it was the first to arrive in the New Year, even if I would have preferred my name on it instead of the mentions of receiver and antenna; the frequency schedule B15 was also enclosed. Also welcome were these QSLs: AJ Janitschek sent the 20th Anniversary card for RFA Tinian on 5885 kHz. Shelley Martin sent an e-QSL 'Sugar Glider' from Reach Beyond Australia for the program 'Making Life Better' in Bahasa Indonesia on 9865 kHz." (Oh nice with Myanmar -- maybe you could put in a good word to chase my report for 955 kHz back on 26 August 1967, another of those 50th anniversaries about to click by!)

Kelvin Brayshaw, Levin has come up with some year-end stats for his Over-9 column: JAN FEB MAR APR MAY JUN JUL AUG SEP OCT NOV DEC 163\* 87 75 76 43 105 103 81 74 47 93 70 Number of logs monthly for BW Over 9 MHz for 2016 (NZ Contributors only) \* 100 from PP (I had to go back to see what Phil had done in June... must have been a rainy month in the Winterless North for that marathon.)

A tremendous turnout to welcome me back! Quickly, my travels this time were a cruise across the South Pacific from Sydney to Valparaiso. I jumped at the opportunity to see Pitcairn as well as celebrate Easter Sunday in January on Isla de Pasqua/Rapa Nui – those two aren't visited frequently by the budget-oriented operators!

The Tecsun 380 came out of hiding on just three occasions. On the two evenings prior to Nuku'alofa at ~0900 UT/10 pm I made a deliberate check to hear what was available from Fiji. It seems 558 as RF1 is the only MW on air, with R. Apna in Auckland ruling the roost on 990 with no interference, and it was definitely them with Apna ID and commercials/phone numbers for mostly southern suburbs of Auckland. Maybe after proving that the new tx works, the FBC are saving 990 for true emergency broadcasts only. Other expected Pacific Islanders were present easily 621, 1017, 1098, and 1440 but I somehow forgot to take note of 540 or 630! Considering how well some in both NZ and West Coast NA have been reporting V7AB, I was surprised how poor a signal they were putting out. Another relatively poor performer was RNZ National on 819 though the co-sited Newstalk ZB on 1008 was booming. Also intriguing (to me anyway) were the thumping signals from all the Hamilton stations compared to Auckland tx's with mostly double the power ratings.

In Nuku'alofa, I nosed around A3Z's compound taking a few photos. A very serious BIG young man came out to see what I was up to, but acted deaf when I suggested I might be allowed to take a look inside... this after explaining why I was interested. It's not easy explaining DXing to a non-hobbyist... you can see eyes glazing over and the mind asking 'Why?'! And in Pago Pago, it was strange to hear the casual "K-H-J" ID's from KKHJ... not what I remember from 930.... while in a local store looking for a T-shirt. I can confirm that R. Polynésie Première isn't on 738. Tahiti had had a major weather event the previous day and overnight into Sunday with flooding, road washouts, land slips, 'electricity cut, water supplies not pumping, and the airport at Papeete closed. That was second story on RNZI Pacific News at 0100 UT with a massive signal on 17675... who needs DRM with that performance? Local authorities wouldn't allow passengers off the ship but it was a miserable day anyway. Mebbe such a situation might cause a re-think to the shutting of 738.

Enough – time for Stu to get busy. 73, Theo

In recent years, Vatican Radio has experimented with digital transmission technologies, including DAB, which is said to be cheaper and has a better sound quality, according to experts. In Africa, the main outlet for our English Africa programmes will continue to be through the re-transmission of the daily programme by several Catholic radio stations in Africa. Most of these radio stations are owned by various African Catholic dioceses, parishes, religious congregations and some by the Radio Maria network. The times and frequencies of shortwave broadcasts to Africa and the rest of the world remain the same:

#### **SAN MARINO**

#### TWO RADIO DAYS THAT SHOOK THE REPUBLIC OF SAN MARINO

Co.Ra.DX (NB a partner of DX Fanzine) has recently obtained an extraordinary document in Italian that dates back to just under 20 years ago (See illustration). It is a San Marino Postal Administration statement, posted on the official website of the government of San Marino, which warned anyone from sending money to the pirate station Radio San Marino International (RSMI) which claimed to broadcast from this tiny enclave inside Italy. RSMI was short lived and the reason was just that official release from the national postal administration of San Marino.

The document says with certainty, that the transmissions were undoubtedly "pirate", since no authorization had ever been granted by the San Marino authorities to any broadcaster. There is no reason to doubt about that assertion. Not the same can be said instead about another statement:

"The broadcasts were never made from the territory of San Marino". According to the former operators of RSMI – their broadcasts were instead really indeed originating from San Marino. It should be mentioned that the document was posted on 22 December 1997, the day after the second of only two official broadcasts in Italian, English and German, which were aired according to the following schedule: Saturday, December 20, 1997, at 20: 00-24: 00 UTC on 7580 kHz LSB and Sunday, December 21, 1997, at 04: 00-07: 00 UTC on 7580 kHz LSB; at 0700-1000 on 7440 kHz LSB and 0700-1700 on 11410 kHz USB.

It is quite doubtful that the San Marino authorities have indeed checked that the broadcasts of Radio San Marino International were not originating from the small republic territory. Probably, the true intent of that official statement, which was then actually realized, was to scare the operators of RSMI, which never would have expected a reaction so quick and angry by the San Marino government. The statement in fact not only emphazised the illegality of the broadcasts but warned listeners to refrain from sending money to RSMI. That is really funny: it seems that the San Marino authorities have conjectured that the operators of RSMI were scammers with the aim of extorting money from listeners. In reality, the "money" required by RSMI, was nothing more than the equivalent of a postage stamp for sending a QSL card.

It appears even ridcoulous the allegation that the transmissions were radiated "from leased sites in some countries of Central Europe, probably from Germany". This assertion, probably was based solely on the fact that the mailbox announced on the air was in a city of Germany (Mainz). The release also says that there will be a full investigation. However, it seems the authority of San Marino have come to nothing, except for the sudden cessation of all of Radio San Marino International activities, which was on the air on the shortwave bands of 41 and 25 meters, not only on the dates included in the official statement, but also on 19 October 1997 and 9 November, In fact, after the publication of the statement, of which there is also an English version, the operators of Radio San Marino International, who received about 700 reception reports, not only immediately decided to stop their transmissions but also removed all information about their programs, they have included on a dedicated website. The confirmation of this, is also found on the KIWI Radio Weekly (edition 31 January, 1998), which contained the following message received by Radio San Marino International operators: "Due to excessive reaction of the San Marino government and postal authority, RSMI is forced to stop its broadcasts until further notice".( via Antonello Napolitano. #### TITUS II SDR Receiver

In a recent edition of the DX Times I included a piece on the Titus II SDR and its unveiling. I recently received an email from Radio NZ's Adrian Sainsbury. In it he included a link to an article on the Titus II. I include the article below. It has been heavily edited. The original article can be found at http://www.radioworld.com/headlines/0045/pantronx-seeks-complete-sdr-solution/336753

Unveiled at an international broadcasting meeting in Miami in August, the Titus II SDR is not yet shipping. But it is described as capable of receiving and playing analog and digital radio transmission formats including AM, FM, shortwave, HD Radio, DAB+ and Digital Radio Mondiale. The company is considering adding a DRM+ decoder.

The initial market is among worldwide broadcasters, particularly those serving countries where listeners may lack internet; a secondary market is individual listeners, hobbyists and others. PantronX will not supply all decoders for all formats but add them preloaded as needed.

Looking much like a 1990s' boombox except that the central section is entirely occupied by a touchscreen Android tablet, the Titus II's software-controlled capabilities, ability to receive new transmission formats through software upgrades and proposed price tag of about 90 euros wowed HFCC delegates.

"We have been following this receiver development with great interest based on the fact that it is hand portable, less than \$100 initial cost and utilizes an Android tablet platform, has wide potential reception frequency range of 100 kHz to 2 GHz, and is Bluetooth-capable," said Tom King, president/CEO of manufacturer Kintronic Labs and an interested observer of the international radio marketplace.

"Best yet, the Titus II can be easily updated and improved with time by virtue of software upgrades," he said. That's something that cannot be done with a hardware-based consumer radio receiver.

#### HARDWARE-DEFINED, SOFTWARE-DEFINED

Up until now, the vast majority of consumer radios have been hardware-based. The physical components that make up their assemblies define what they can and cannot do.

The Titus II SDR breaks this mold, relying on its preloaded or downloaded software to define

what this consumer radio can and cannot receive.

The onboard applications that enable the unit's Android core to receive various radio formats can also let the Titus II operate as "a streaming video player, web browser or just about anything imaginable," Stone said. "For instance, we can use an Android like-OS called Remix that would also allow Titus to become a rather nice desktop computer."

#### **SPECIFICATIONS**

A Radio World article detailing the advent of a radio technology requires specifications to be listed, so here they are: Built into a handle-equipped plastic case measuring 11.4 x 6 x 1.8 inches, the Titus II's Android core uses a 1.2 GHz quad-core ARM A53 processor running one of the Android 5+/6+/Remix operating systems (users can choose which they prefer). The Android core has 1 GB RAM and 8 GB flash memory; it is controlled using a 7-inch, 1024 x 600 TFT display with a five-point capacitive touch panel.

The Titus II SDR comes with demodulation software to process and playout AM, FM and digital radio broadcasts. Through a built-in Wi-Fi hotspot, it also has the ability to access open source software libraries for upgrades and new apps, and the web for more content and media files.

Physically, the Titus II outputs 5 watts of stereo audio to its two speakers, and is powered by a rechargeable high-capacity Li-poly battery. The unit is both Wi-Fi and Bluetooth-capable. It has HDMI and USB OTG (on-the-go) output ports and an SD slot for loading in externally-sourced content; it can be fitted with an optional camera.

On the radio side, the Titus II's 100 kHz–2 GHz wideband receiver is highly sensitive yet generates little noise, according to the company. The unit has an internal balanced tuned ferrite antenna for AM (MW)/shortwave reception, a built-in whip antenna for all other bands, and a jack to allow an external antenna to be connected.

#### **POSITIVE REACTIONS**

Stone declined to try to predict how many units might be sold; he considers the potential market "huge" and said the company's manufacturing partners could handle as many as 500,000 pieces per month. "Titus has been designed to take advantage of most possibilities, not only as a SDR but also as a piece of hardware." Nor have its methods of distribution been finalized. HFCC, Stone said, is helping PantronX assess the market among broadcasters and other potential customers. "Sales channels will be as unique as the product is."

But though it is not yet shipping, reports of the unit's capabilities, upgradable nature and proposed cost are winning positive responses.

Stone said Titus was designed with an eye on users who lack internet in less-developed parts of the world and who don't have any computing device, and it most likely will be preloaded with presets and apps for their particular needs. The user interface, he said, can be changed to reflect local desires and configured to behave like a "dedicated device" where necessary. As with most consumer technologies, the market will decide whether the Titus II SDR will take off.



< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, January 29, 2017 -- Under "DX History/Stations," we have posted two BBC items from very different eras. One is a picture of the antenna of 5SW, the BBC experimental shortwave station, in 1929. It had come on the air in November 1927 and was located at the Marconi plant. The other is a BBC quarterly folder for the period October-November 1962 containing an hour-by-hour schedule of the General Overseas Service and various other items. Thanks to Bob LaRose for sending this along.

< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, February 5, 2017 -- It was a bad week. It looks like Radio Australia, as well as the Northern Territory Shortwave Service (Alice Springs, Katherine, Tennant Creek), are no more. One of the selling points for preserving these services was their ability to provide emergency broadcasting during cyclones. Under "DX History/Recordings" we have posted two examples. The first is a recording of a Shepparton relay of local ABC Brisbane programming during Cyclone Larry in March 2006. The second is a Shepparton relay of ABC Far North programming during Cyclone Monica in April 2006. Both were heard on 6020 kHz. In the case of Monica, a letter to the Cairns office of ABC Far North brought a nice reply with some interesting information, including an ABC Far North folder on tracking cyclones and staying safe. Radio Australia had been providing emergency broadcasting services for many years, as evidenced by a QSL for the Shepparton relay of mediumwave 8DR-Darwin, which had lost its transmitter during Cyclone Tracy, Christmas 1974. The 8DR programming was sent to Shepparton where it was relayed back on shortwave for the benefit of the 30,000 Darwin evacuees and also for the surviving Darwin mediumwave stations, which picked it up and relayed it. The Radio Australia shortwave transmitters in Darwin, which had come on the air in 1968, were also knocked out, and returned to limited service only in 1979. Some 71 people died in Cyclone Tracy. -- And under "Specialized Resources," Adrian Peterson journeys from Indiana to Australia in three new "Wavescan" stories: "Indiana 200th Anniversary: Early Radio Broadcasting Stations in Indiana" (Wavescan N413, January 22, 2017), "Goodbye, Radio Australia" (Wavescan N414, January 29, 2017), and "The Quaint Story of Waltzing Matilda: Australian Anthems" (Wavescan N414, January 29, 2017).
