

This Channel 292 QSL was received by Jon Wood. However, he laments the fact that it is an automated response. Various people have differing ideas on what consitutes a QSL. To my mind it says QSL on it, he heard it and therefore it is a QSL. Others will have an alternative point of view.

We have the issue of stations which simply refuse to verify. We know we have heard them, we have recordings of them but the station won't play ball with us. I remember years ago there was talk of the possibility of a group being set up within the League to verify reports. This was dead in the water before it even started. The old hands wouldn't countenance such a thing. Such an idea is perhaps not as silly as it sounds these days when veries are harder ever to get..

The question really arises - who would do such a job and who has the time? I would be very interested to see members thoughts on this issue. Write to Theo next month and tell us what your views are on the two questions above: a) what constitutes a verification - or when is a verie not a verie and b) should there be a group tasked with looking at reception reports for unverifiable stations?

As always, notes from members keep springing something new on me; I must have slept through November and any mention of that <Shortwave Service>. And along comes Bryan with a German weather station.

Edward Kusalik from Daysland, AB was early off the mark with an update. "Since my last posting on the website, the verifications keep coming in, despite being squeezed between my duties as an elected official for the Town of Daysland and other duties with service clubs. Managed to receive veries from: Shortwave Service in Germany for their broadcast back November, a postal QSL card -- CRI verified my report for Voice of Beihu Bay Radio for 5050, after sending an e-mail follow-up -- from Germany via Media Broadcast, Radio Oomrang for their 'once-a-year' Broadcast for 15215 -- and from WRMI, Isle of Music, received both a reply from WBCQ and from the station itself. Plus, European Music Radio sent me their reply for a broadcast via Channel 292 relay; I have verified this station before but directly from Europe back in December of 1979 on 6235 kHz with only 10 watts of power (from Ontario). Major changes in the spring, as I am looking at taking all the antennas down and installing a Wellbrook Loop, to minimize the appearance at this residence! Residents in town keep asking about all those wires around my house, which I try to explain in a brief form, but all I get are puzzled looks." (Thanks, Edward. As I said last month about nosing around A3Z in Nuku'alofa, you can see the eyes glazing over when trying to explain the hobby.)

Stu Forsyth in Cyberjaya, Malaysia was looking forward to a visit back in NZ when he sent along a mid-month contribution. "A very quiet month - work is ridiculously busy. However, I received a verie for RB2 in Curitiba, Brazil on 9725 logged once again via Peter's SDR. I also received a verie for KPRP in Hawaii on 650 via a Facebook message. This was also logged via Peter's SDR. I logged one at home the other night - RRI Tanjung Pinang on 1341. I will see if i can get that elusive first Indonesian QSL! I am gearing up for a trip home to NZ. I am spending the first two or three days with Bryan and Sandy Clark in Mangawhai, so will no doubt have to turn the radio on - such a pity! I am really looking forward to seeing them." (Sometimes life is hard... will look forward to your report on reports.)

Jonathan Wood, Mosgiel was also early by passing along a copy of an almost instantaneous email response from Radio Channel 292, then had second thoughts closer to deadline. "Hello Theo: a QSL card recently received from Channel 292 with excitement (it arrived 4 minutes after the report was sent) turns out, I think, to be a fizzer. On reading the email I think it's automatically generated and therefore isn't really a QSL at all! It was still good to get Channel 292 from Mosgiel, though. One trip this month - to Aramoana, where cross-modulation was such a nuisance I packed up the BOG antenna after five minutes and headed over to Doctors Point which was much better (even though conditions were poor). The ELAD arrived back a couple of weeks ago - it was sent from Trieste, Italy, on 10 March and arrived on my doorstep on the 14th! Since then atmospheric conditions have been mediocre, so am looking forward to a trip to the coast soon." (Was the package just abandoned by NZ Post or were you home this time! Here's trusting you have all the kinks worked out now... it's a much-travelled piece of electronics.)

lan Cattermole, Blenheim I'd think is certain about his results. "I am again using your private address as have lost all faith in the <radiodx> one. Wonder just why that is being still persevered with!! Here are my SW veries received during March: RRI 9610 & 11950; AWR Trincomalee 15400; FEBC 15560; WHRI 9830; NHK Singapore 11825; NHK Santa Maria di Galeria 9485; RTI 9405; and Vatican Radio, Tinian 9695 kHz. That's all for this month." (Not quite double digits... and all the mail goes into the same inbox so it doesn't matter, as long as they work.)

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai reports a good month for shortwave DX but mediocre conditions on medium wave. "Reports taken on DWD (Deutsche Wetterdeinst) 6180 with 10kW and NHK via Sitkunai, Lithuania 5910 with final transmission from this site on 25 March. A prompt e-QSL response for DWD came from Wilfried Behncke, National NAVTEX Coordinator who advised, 'In the next few weeks we will change our broadcastings from AME-format to AM and hope that reception with normal shortwave radios will be better.' Other shortwave highlights - regular reception of Voice of Hope Zambia on two frequencies, traces of LRA36 Argentine Antarctica 15476 on some days but 2 March was the only day with actual audio, Radio Afghanistan 6100 heard again after a break of more than 40 years, HCJB Quito heard several days testing a new 1kW transmitter on 6050, and regular reception of weak signals from Irish station Laser Hot Hits on 6220 - classic pop songs identified in parallel to their web stream but have yet to collate an acceptable DX report. On medium wave, the Latins are beginning to appear but the disruptive solar conditions have made DXing very difficult most evenings." (But like fishing, for you a bad night's DX is still well worthwhile...)

Günter Jacob from Passau, Germany has that mysterious SW Service as mentioned earlier by Edward. "'Shortwaveservice' verified 17760 kHz via Noratus (Armenia) for a report on the German program 'Radio, Menschen und Geschichten'. Shelley Martin [and I presume you mean from Reach Beyond Australia - TD] sent e-QSLs 'Japanese Gardens Toowoomba, Queensland' for the Indonesian program 'Truth for Today, Making Life Better' on 11865 kHz and 'Sugar Glider' for these English programs: 'Insight for Living' on 11980 kHz and 'Psalms of Hope, Christianity Works' on 9645 kHz. IRIB World Service sent the card 'NO.1, Hamedan. The Mausoleum of Baba Taher-e Orian (Poet)' for a report on their program in Kurdish on 7415 kHz sent to <englishradio@irib.ir> with request to pass it on to <tech@irib.ir>. From the English Service of Radio Romania International came the October card 'The Post Palace. Bucuresti' for a report on 9620 kHz sent by airmail: regrettably the English Service still ignores several reports sent by email in 2015. Deutsche Welle's 'Keep tuning in' card verified 9820 kHz via Meyerton. Lorraine Stavropoulos verified 'TWR Swaziland, Speaking Hope to the World' on 6130 kHz. Voice of Turkey's QSL for 15270 kHz, Emirler, reminded about February 9, World Smoking Boycott Day. And WRNO Worldwide, 7505 kHz, sent the QSL 'You'll have about the Wave' and gives this address: <wrnoradio@ mailup.net>."

Günter signed off with "Until next time"... and that's all from me as well, except to add Easter wishes.



USA KIMF: A new shortwave broadcasting station in Nevada

Many thanks to SWLing Post contributor, Tom Servo, who writes:

While going through the FCC Daily Digest for my own hobby website, I came across the International Authorizations section and happened to take a look today. To my surprise, a license to cover has been filed for HF station KIMF in Beowawe, NV! I can't remember the last time a new HF station filed to go on the air in the US.

Do you know anything about this station? Here is a link to the FCC's data page on the station; I've attached a PDF copy of the license form, which lists both the operating frequencies as well as times, power and modes they've asked for. It looks like they will run a combination of AM and USB across three frequencies.

I went to the license coordinates to see if anything was visible on Google Satellite View, but it's just empty desert. So I have no idea what's really going on, but generally once a license to cover is filed, that means the station is built and ready to go on the air. At least in the world of AM, FM and TV broadcasting!

IRELAND RTE has agreed to continue its longwave **252** kHz service in the UK until the end of June 2019. After that, RTE hopes Radio 1 will gain approval from UK authorities to launch via a chain of small broadcast networks which cover main urban centres. Currently, a broadcaster has to be based in the UK to obtain an Ofcom licence. RTE says using the DAB+ platform will be considerably less (approx one fifth) than the present quarter of a million per annum that RTE expends in running costs for 252 kHz.
