Oh, if it could only happen here

Following a number of trials over the past few years, the BBC has confirmed that from January 2018, Medium Wave transmissions of a number of BBC Local Radio stations will either cease or be reduced.

The reduction of Medium Wave services was first considered as part of the BBC's 2011 "Delivering Quality First" programme. Trial switch-offs in subsequent years provided the BBC the chance to find out how many listeners were listening on AM.

Most switch-offs took place without much public reaction, although a trial affecting BBC Radio Merseyside's signal provoked a strong reaction from listeners and national newspaper headlines. BBC Radio Merseyside's Medium Wave signal has been left off the current closure list.

The BBC stations that are affected from 2018 have a wide reach on FM, as well as recently enhanced reception via DAB digital radio and Freeview. The number of users accessing radio via DAB, mobile and internet services has also been steadily increasing in recent years, as the share of analogue radio listening, including Medium Wave stations, has dropped to around 50%. - *(thanks to Ray Crawford and the WIA Magazine)*

Among stations to be closed are BBC Radios Sussex, Surrey, Humberside, Wiltshire, Nottingham, Kent and Lincolnshire no longer available, and reduced coverage for Devon, Lancashire and Essex. (*Thanks to http://davidlloyd-radio.blogspot.my/2017/08/farewell-bbc-local-radio-am.html*)

Some things old have become new again. Paul Ormandy has moved <dxdialog> flawlessly across to <groups.io> since the August 'Times', and several members have used the board to comment on the re-appearance of Ozy Music Radio, now on 5045 kHz. We're still waiting for Al Kirton to launch 4KZ's shortwave relay from northern Queensland.

Stu Forsyth in Cyberjaya, Malaysia doesn't demand top billing, but I usually place entries as they arrive. "Hi Theo, My WinRadio G33DDC (Excalibur) finally got here and I have had fun beginning to learn how to use it, and I emphasise the word beginning. It is a very complex piece of equipment. The really interesting thing for me is that you can see carriers on the waterfall, which is a real boon - I know you can see it on the League's SDR too. The only problem is that you don't always hear the accompanying signals! It has a thing called a scheduler in which you programme what you want to record and it will do it automatically. The 7th of August was a good night on the tropical bands. I heard about 5 Indian SW stations that I want to get within about 400 kHz of each other. I programmed the scheduler and went to bed. In the morning I discovered that for some reason I hadn't put the correct frequency in and so all I got was noise! I now have even greater respect for Bryan Clark, Peter Mott & co who have been using this receiver so effectively and proficiently for some time. I was trying to log an AIR station in Rajasthan on 1413 after the Thai closes at 1700. I didn't get that but I did get either 2EA Newcastle or the BBC via Oman, as both carry the World Service. I suspect it was the latter. I am pretty pleased with that, even though I have previously verified both.

I have logged KTWR 11965, NHK World 11825 & 15280, AIR Jalandhar 873. AIR Thiruvanathapuram 5010, R. Taiwan Int. 7445, 11600, & 1359, Bangladesh Betar 4750, KNLS 9690, AIR 9950, AIR Tiruchirapalli 936, and VoA 7260 via the Vatican on the Russell SDR. The other interesting one is that I heard the DW interval signal at 0825 on 15290. It is not scheduled to be on the frequency (via Issoudun) until about 1600. NHK was supposed to be there. We don't hear many Europeans unless they broadcast directly at us. However, I detected a signal and had a listen and there it was. I wrote to DW asking what the story was. I also sent them a recording of it. I was rewarded with an email saying that it was them and somebody at Issoudun had made an error with the switching. I will count it as a verie! Other veries received are Bangladesh Betar 4750 and 558, CFTE 1410 (thanks to lan Wells for the address details), CRI 6060 and 1080 via e-QSLs, AIR 15185, KTWR 11965, Vanuatu 7260 heard on the League's SDR and QSL'd via Facebook, TWR Moldova 9940 and Ozy Radio 5045 in 2 minutes flat - my quickest ever verie." (As for 2EA, Bill Whitacre from Virginia was DXing on the Washington state coast in early August and had a guery concerning 1035 kHz: a commercial at 1400 UT obviously from Newstalk ZB in Wellington for 'Well Hung Joinery' in Ngauranga but followed by Andean flute-type stuff and a "Welcome to our..." which seemed to indicate a fade up-and-down involving SBS. Newcastle and Wollongong supposedly carry SBS2 which at that hour (midnight AEST) should've switched to "SBS Radio Overnight". But going on-line to check, whatever <tunein> was grabbing or SBS was feeding on similar days a week or so later, was consistently 'SBS ArabyPop' despite the banner saying 'SBS Radio

Overnight' on three occasions and SBS Somali on another (though the audio was Arabic). I suggest that as more evidence you heard Oman.)

Ian Wells, Mosgiel reports in as the first of the two neighbours. "Hi Theo. I've received an email from Laurie Atlas <laurie.atlas@4RO.com.au> in relation to my report on reception of 4CC, 666 kHz. This is the Biloela relay of 4CC in Gladstone, Queensland heard via the Northland SDR. Also an email from Nimilote Naisorotabua <nnaisorotabua@fbc.com.fj> verifying my reception of Radio Fiji One on 558 kHz, received a few days before the official opening of the station on 11 August, also via the Northland SDR. Prior to the official opening, the station was apparently in trial mode." Plus he later added this Stop Press. "Just to note receipt of a very rapid email verification of my report for Ozy Music Radio 5045 kHz (within 30 minutes of emailing the report). Again, heard using the Northland SDR."

Jonathan Woods, Mosgiel had this to say to explain his situation. "Hello Theo, The receivers here have been largely silent this month. But an article that may be of interest concerns a 'LOG Antenna', essentially a 15-foot per-side square loop-on-ground. I tried a 10m per side loop with an incorrect coupling and found it wasn't great and haven't yet repeated the experiment with the recommended coupling. For anyone interested, it's described at <http:// www.kk5jy.net/LoG/ >. I emailed Matt Roberts, who wrote the article, and he commented, 'One thing to keep in mind is that as the loop becomes large with respect to the wavelength, the pattern begins to distort and the -3dB elevation angle starts to rise. So a 10m square will have plenty of signal on 160m, but it might not perform quite as well as a smaller loop on 40m, for example. The loop I am using does quite well on 40m through 160m, and it is about half the side length (4.5m) of the 10m loop you described." (15-foot-per-side? The sooner we get rid of that Imperial stuff, the better. <g> Oh wait, I was muttering that at the supermarket last week.)


Bryan Clark, Mangawhai had another busy month with visits to Hong Kong and Hanoi, but still had time for some exciting DX at home. "After the thrill of Radio Malabo in late July, I was also pleased with a report away to the new 1kW German hobby station 'European Shortwave Radio' on 6160 on 3 August and a rare loggable signal from Radio Apintie Surinam on 5 August. Have been monitoring a reported new Ethiopian provincial station on 5940 but it is a difficult catch with irregular schedule to date. Finally on 28 August I caught the initial test broadcast of Ozy Radio on 5045 - still waiting for the 4KZ relay on 5055 to appear. QSLs in from Channel Z on 6950.6 with 25 watts and Ozy Radio 5045." (You're turning into an absentee landowner! And 6160 reminds me... has anyone heard CKZN recently? There was a rumour a month or three back that they'd possibly gone silent.)

And from the across-the-ocean, over-the-hills, and far-away department: the IRCA's Tim Tromp in West Michigan reported in as I prepared this, that he'd grabbed Auckland's Magic 702 from the mix with 2BL at ~1100 UT 31 August. He caught the stinger/sounder between news and weather, and confirmed that from a simultaneous recording from the web feed. 73, Theo

Since the above profile was written Ian has progressed to a staggering 8306 QSLs (in June) from 209 countries. I know Ian also has some MW QSLs and is contemplating moving in that direction. When he does look out.

There are, however, other things I wish to say about Ian. He is like the calendar reminder items on your phone. Before being Chief Editor, I did the Ladders/ Continents. Every two months (as it was then) Ian would email me his totals early, and I knew it was time to get cracking. Theo Donnelly has said the same about Mailbag. Ian is his alarm clock.

lan is completely selfless – I have emailed him a number of times seeking information or contacts on a a station and he has never hesitated to reply and share what he knows. he epitomises all that si good about a DXer.

As mentioned above, Ian has verified a large number of Latin American stations in shortwave. When I asked him what he considered his best QSL was, this is how he answered: The one I think I treasure most was the Mexican, Su Pantera 6105khz back in 1977. Actually I have 10 Mexican QSLs. Also those from Haiti, Costa Rica etc are great.

He has reported 480 + stations and has around 250 QSLs – that is not a bad return at all. He also says: 'Costa Rica - I have sent reports to 14 stations, all domestic, (no REE, RFPI, AWR) and received 12 replies. The only two not QSLd are Radio Impacto 6150khz and Radio Columbia 4850khz. Both verified on other frequencies though. Brazil - I have sent reports to 165 stations and received QSLs from 82.

Of course there have been disappointments. I recall sending a very detailed report to Jamaica back in the 1970s. They were broadcasting test cricket but alas no reply.'

This is an excellent return by any standards.

lan's contribution to our club has been huge and we are forever grateful to him for what he has done for us. Happy retirement and keep the news of those veries rolling in.

As mentioned elsewhere in this magazine, **Ken Baird** retires this month after 23 years as editor of the Under 9 Bandwatch column. One could say he has done his bit. This has been done with a minimum of fuss and bother and with a lot of professionalism.

I asked Ken to give me a bit of backfround information, and this is what he told me:

I started listening to SW when I was about 10, on my father's 7 valve Philco, the one with the big angled slide rule dial. Picked up all sorts of things as the bands were very busy then.

Like most boys of my time I made a Hiker's One and Two and picked

up a lot of North Island MW stations from Ashburton. At High School I was mainly involved with Mullard HiFi amplifiers with a friend. We sold a lot around Ashburton.

In 1963 shifted to CHCH and started to make better SW receivers. Got a Q Inductance kit and made a good set using extra circuits out of the RSGB Handbook (All analogue and valve!!). My first commercial set was a Panasonic DR21 bought in Fiji. Swapped that for a DR32 with full digital readout. From then a continuous line of receivers, R1000, R2000, R5000, FRG7 etc. Now have the R5000 & TecsunPI505

I have 2 books full of QSL cards and was a monitor for R Berlin Intl, R Sweden, YLE Finland & ORF Austria. Did a broadcast from R Sweden. Best QSL is from ZK4 Cook Islands which I took back and had a good session with the station Director, Nooroa Tangaroa. The station was burned down shortly thereafter – something to do with FM competition?? Kept up with limited SW listening, joining the NZRDXL April 1982. Have been interested in SW listening on and off ever since.


It has been a very enjoyable hobby and I have made friends from all around the world. However, bands are largely empty today and there is very little of interest to listen to. I had the best of times and enjoyed it. That is now over and it is time to move on. I will still be listening however.

Most of us don't know that Ken was a professional engineer with NZPO after getting a BE in electrical engineering at Canterbury in the 1960's, specializing in outside plant, inter exchange links and the design of very large exchanges.

More importantly his great claim to fame was announcing to the world the start of the Falklands War! He told me his 'best reception - Port Stanley, Falkland Is on 2 megs at the moment the Argies raided the Studio. There was lots of Spanish and gunshots and then OFF. Never heard Port Stanley again but did pick up the BBC broadcasts to troops on the Falklands regularly.'

Ken understands that a Wellington Branch member informed the British High Commission in Wellington, who then notified the Foreign Office in London: first notification of invasion!

Ian has agreed to take over from Ken Baird for the Under 9s, and despite what he says below, there was not really a lot of arm twisting involved! We are all grateful to Ian for his support.

I asked lan to tell us a bit about himself and this is what he says:



I've been conscripted to take over Bandwatch Under-9 mHz column from Ken – hopefully I'll be able to maintain his high standards, but I think he'll be a hard act to follow.

I'm married to Lisa, with three adult children and, currently, five grandchildren, and live in Mosgiel, although I work in Oamaru.

I've been DXing irregularly since 1970, with a number of breaks as life and family took priority. My interest has always been more towards the exotic on shortwave (looking for new countries and low powered stations, especially South Americans, rather than quantity of QSLs) but I'll take anything foreign that I can get on mediumwave.

I started DXing with a Hallicrafters S-120 which I paid for with three years of lawnmowing, and have also owned Panasonic DR22, DR28 and DR49 receivers over the years. At the moment I have have a Kenwood R1000 and an Icom IC-R71E, but when not on DXpeditions, I mainly use an Sangean ATS-909 – the only receiver I've owned from new – on mediumwave with a 40" passive loop.

I have no permanent external aerials erected at the moment, either at home or at my Oamaru flat. I do have a EWE, but it mainly sits in the garden shed between annual visits to Waianakarua. Because of local noise, the majority of my DXing at the moment is done using the Northland SDR.

I still chase verifications, mainly by email these days, and have just over 600 from 138 countries on shortwave (quality vs quantity) and currently 138 from eighteen countries on mediumwave.

two QSLs that we have posted in "The CPRV Gallery." One, from WJAZ, verifies reception reported in a letter to the station dated May 16, 1923 (the day after the move to 670 kc.). Of perhaps greater interest is a brochure about the station, and the hotel, which we have posted with the QSL. It gives the wavelength as 448 meters, so it dates from the same period as the letter. The other QSL is a great-looking folder (with EKKO stamp) from WEBH, together with a nicely-illustrated promotional brochure from the station. WEBH, which called itself the Voice of the Great Lakes, was on the air from the hotel for about four years. Newspapers played a big role in both stations, the Chicago Tribune at WJAZ, the Chicago Evening Post at WEBH. The hotel closed in 1967 and was demolished in 1970-71. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," Adrian Peterson tells us about "Artificial Languages on Radio" (Wavescan N440, July 30, 2017), and "The Radio Scene on a Small Island With a Large Volcano-1 [Montserrat]" (Wavescan N441, August 6, 2017).

This month we have two broadcasters issuing new QSL cards. New broadcasts planned by the BBC and a special from PCJ Radio International with 2 Sangean receivers available to lucky winners in their draw. Ozy Music Radio pops up on 5045kHz, a mysterious Radio Moscow interval signal heard from Armenia plus a new station from the Ethiopian Somali Regional State.

ARMENIA

Unidentified station again on air on August 29: 1355-1537 on 9640*unknown tx: At 1357 mentioned "Govorit Moskva" and IS of Radio Moscow 1500-1537 in Russian, talk about Ukraine & Russia and off *co-ch KBS WR 9640 KIM 100 kW / 225 deg to SEAs Eng/Viet. http: (Via swldxbulgaria.blogspot.bg/2017/08)

Armenian Public Radio on new test frequency, August 31: from 0600 UT NF9580 Yerevan tx unknown to UNID Armenian, ex 9640 kHz (Ivo Ivanov-BUL, dxld via wwdxc BC-DX TopNews Aug 31)

9580even Armenian Public Radio via CJSC Yerevan Gavar Armenia relay on Aug 31 at S=7-8 signal level here in southern Germany, better signals in remote SDR units in Belgium and U.K. westerly. (wb df5sx, wwdxc BC-DX TopNews Aug 31)

I got a clear ID of this station in your recording: "Yerevan ne khosum". They also had news about the national folklore ensemble touring Sweden, the visit of a Lithuanian General etc., i.e. things that a public broadcaster would report about. So one can safely say this is a relay of Armenian Radio domestic service on SW, probably via Gavar. (Cristian Mocanu, Deva-ROU, bclnews.it Aug 29)

Radio Mi Amigo International presents a very special live broadcast remembering those days 'the music almost died'. We remember Aug. 1967 (UK) and Aug. 1974 (Netherland) when the MOA ('Anti-Pirate-Law') became law in those countries and stopped most of the offshore stations. We remember with the songs from that time and some original recordings. The show will be aired on August, 27 from 19-21 hrs CEST (17-19 hrs UTC) on 11845 kHz in the 25m SW-band with 100 kW of power all over Europe and also online on our webstreams."

AUSTRALIA

OzyRadio 5045 kHz & Craig Allen's SW plans. Some new news & previously revealed news regarding Craig Allen's SW activity, including some history from me.

As I reported here last week OzyRadio (owned & operated by Craig) was due to return to the SW airwaves (5045 kHz) in the near future. On August 28th, 2017 OzyRadio returned to shortwave on new 5045 kHz from Razorback near Camden-NSW-AUS. Believed first reported by Mauno Ritola & Bryan Clark (0552 UT).

This tx site was last utilized by Craig for rebroadcast of Vintage FM, Penrith on the SW freq of 3210 kHz back in early 2004. 5045 kHz is licenced for 1 kW, but currently operating with 500 watt.Craig reports that the transmission antenna is an inverted V. Back in 2011 Craig utilised a inverted V for 3210 kHz, whilst 5050 kHz was using a NVIS antenna, a horizontal dipole with reflector on the ground (hence the NVIS designation).Craig reported late on 29 Aug 2017 that he had reduced compression of the signal. He's licenced for 6 kHz bandwidth (BW). I've noted a nice sounding 8+kHz bandwidth signa.Johno from the ARDXC mentioned on 28 Aug 2017 that Craig Allen had recently acquired two shortwave licences: quote (JW): "now has 4850 and 2350 kHz in Alice Springs ... he needs a transmitter".

Upon inspection of the ACMA database I see he's licenced for 2350 & 5050 kHz from the existing 8HA/8AL Alice Springs TX site with 5 kW. Don't expect this to happen for a while, without a TXer. I 'believe' licence owners can initially list a TX site for transmission, it doesn't mean that this will be the actual site that is utilised when/if finally to air, but if he does get to air from Alice Springs the correct tx site will appear within ACMA records.Currently JW is responding to OzyRadio reception reports for Craig with a quick Gmail email text reply. If dxers/QSL hunters wanted a unique jpg eQSL I believe this could be easily organised, but dxers would have to lean heavily on JW & Craig for this to happen.

Next Aussie private SW station to hit the airwaves could be 5055 kHz 4KZ.(Ian, SW TXsite Aug 30 via WWDXC)

Guam radio stations accidentally air emergency alert amid North Korea threat

After a week of threats from North Korea aimed at Guam, residents on Tuesday thought the worst when two radio stations accidentally broadcast an emergency civil danger warning.

Idyllic Pacific island relies on tourism and the US military to sustain it. When it comes to North Korea, islanders hope that peace wins over war

The two stations, a music channel and a Christian network, alerted listeners at 12.25am local time of an unspecified danger near Guam. Civil danger broadcasts are rare and are used to warn civilians of an imminent threat, such as a military strike or terrorist attack. The warning lasted only 15 minutes and officials later stressed that a real emergency message would describe the type of threat.

"The unauthorised test was not connected to any emergency, threat or warning," Guam's homeland security office said in a statement adding it had worked with the radio stations to "ensure the human error will not occur again".

Residents and tourists on Guam have been anxious for the last week after North Korea detailed a specific plan to fire four missiles into the waters around the US territory, which is home to 162,000 people and hosts two military bases.

BBC to launch new service in Korean

The BBC is braced for a backlash from the North Korean government about the launch of a new service targeted at the country amid growing international tensions over its missile tests Francesca Unsworth, the director of BBC World Service, said the corporation was wary about launching the new North Korean service next month due to the likely opposition from the government but insisted the fragile political situation vindicated the move.

In an interview with the Guardian, she said: "We are reaching an incredibly febrile, dangerous atmosphere at the moment about that whole story, and isn't it terrible for the people of North Korea that the only information that they getting about any of this is that woman who goes on North Korean television every night?

"We talked for many years about whether it was worthwhile doing something for the most inneed country of the world. This is right at the head of the BBC's mission to bring independent news to people most in need – and Korea is the country most in need, followed by Ethiopia and Eritrea."

The service will launch just weeks after Donald Trump, the US president, threatened to unleash "fire and fury" on North Korea, which responded by announcing a detailed plan to fire missiles at the US Pacific Territory of Guam Korean is one of 12 new language services being launched by the BBC over the next few weeks in the biggest expansion of the World Service since the 1940s. The expansion involves hiring 1,400 staff and is backed by £289m of funding from the government. Other services that are launching include Pidgin, which is spoken by 75 million people in Nigeria, Punjabi and Serbian.

Tony Hall, director general of the BBC, said the new services marked "the start of a new chapter for the BBC" and called the World Service "one of the UK's most important cultural exports".

However, Unsworth said the North Korean embassy in London had told the BBC "in no uncertain terms" that they did not want the Korean service to be launched.

The service will broadcast a half-hour radio programme daily, that will go out in the middle of the night so that, in the words of Unsworth, "people have the opportunity to listen under their bedclothes without telling the neighbours".

FIJI Fiji's Prime Minister says all Fijians can now tune in to the 'national dialogue' following the rehabilitation of the country's medium wave radio infrastructure. The Japanese government provided \$US7 million for the rehabilitation which took over 18 months to complete. It included the installation of a 60 metre antenna with two AM transmitters. Prime minister Frank Bainimarama said villages in the most remote pockets of the interior and in the furthest reaches of the outer islands could now tune into the AM signal managed by the Fiji Broadcasting Corporation. (RNZI Website 11 Aug17)

The full press release read as follows: "Fijians in all maritime islands can now tune in to the recently installed and clearer Amplitude Modulated (AM) Signal that will be broadcasted on two main radio stations. The new medium wave radio transmission \$15 million facility is

managed by Fiji Broadcasting Corporation and funded by the government of Japan will air programmes on both Radio Fiji One and Gold stations. Officiating at the launch in Naulu, Nakasi on Friday, Prime Minister Vorege Bainimarama said Fijians living in Vanuabalavu, Lakeba or Ovalau could now tune on to the radio and join listeners around the country through a range of AM programming. Mr Bainimarama said through this upgrade Fiji had now achieved a 100 per cent coverage for all outer islands. "It means we will now have access to critical flows of information programming on youth development, women's issues, health, agriculture and many other topics," Mr Bainimarama said. "The right to access information is one of the most important rights my Government has sworn to uphold." Mr Bainimarama says the massive effort to bring high guality education throughout the islands is to have every Fijian child taught accurately and have relevant and up-to date materials. "That is why we are expanding our network of cellular data and Information and Communication Technology (ICT) services. By December, we will extend the reach of free to air digital television to all of Fiji using satellites and terrestrial technology to bring a range of programmes to the Fijian communities," he said. Mr Bainimarama said the Fijian Government first signed the Memorandum of Understanding with the government of Japan where he believed that information belonged to the Fijian people and access to information was the life blood of the nation. Mr Bainimarama said the AM radio infrastructure is more resilient to severe weather patterns than Frequency Modulation (FM) systems. Meanwhile, the government of Japan was pleased to announce the completion of a project as it includes the installation of a 60-metre antenna system, two AM radio transmitters funded through Japan's Grant Aid programme. Ambassador of Japan Masahiro Omura said the Prime Minister's presence at the event showed the Fijian Government's serious commitment to reduction of risks from natural disasters. Mr Omura said the threat of natural disasters has been and will be increasing due to climate change and strengthening of preparedness is strongly wished for in Fiji as well. He said in order to respond swiftly to natural disasters, appropriate transmission of relevant information is crucial. "In Fiji, however, one of the most effective means of information transmission, namely medium wave radio transmission has been out of order since 2013." Mr Omuro said. He said in many remote islands, radio broadcasting became unavailable. The Fijian Government requested assistance from Japan and the Japanese government decided to extend their grant aid assistance. (Fiji Sun Online, 12 August)

This list was prepared by Lennart Weirell of Vasteras, Sweden. -- And under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," Adrian Peterson fills us in on "The Radio Scene on an Almost Canadian Island in the Caribbean" (Wavescan N439, July 23, 2017).

< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, August 6, 2017 -- Under "DX History/Stations" we have posted several items in a mini-tribute to Radio Universidad de Costa Rica. One looks to be a regular RUCR envelope (note the inclusion of the shortwave channel on the bottom front, but not the back), with two stamps commemorating the writing of the lyrics to the Costa Rican national anthem by Jose Maria Zeledon, and a cancellation commemorating the 55th anniversary of the station. The date of the cancellation appears to be written as "14:22 Julio, 2004," which I believe was the celebratory period, July 14-22. The station came on the air on November 29, 1949. < www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, August 13, 2017 -- In "DX History/QSLs & Other Station Memorabilia," we remember the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago. It should ring a bell with students of the early American broadcast band scene, for it was the first home of Zenith station WJAZ, which had developed out of the famous Chicago Radio Laboratory ("Mathews and Hassel") amateur station 9ZN in 1922. It was for promotional purposes that the hotel offered a home to WJAZ, which operated initially on the common broadcast band channel of 360 meters, moving to 448 meters (670 kc.) in 1923. The station left the hotel after a year, changed its call letters to WGN and sold WJAZ to the hotel, which changed the call letters to WEBH. (WJAZ lived on in other incarnations.)
