WEIRD AND WONDERFUL - SPOTTING THE SUNSPOTS OF LONG AGO

It is said that there is nothing new under the sun - or even inside the sun, as Mike Askins KE5CXP told ARNewsline Listeners!.

He said "Sunspot patterns, it seems, have been a human obsession for at least 200 years -- at least that's what can be believed from a recent discovery made in the state of Maine.

A report that appears on Space.com tells of a journal found inside a small house in that New England state with pages containing writings from some 200 years ago. The subject? Sunspots!

The journal's contents in an academic paper coauthored recently by solar scientist William Denig of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and historian Michael McVaugh of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The 19th century devoted sun-watcher was a Congregational minister named Jonathan Fisher. The clergyman had at one time practiced a more scientific look at the heavens as a math and science student at Harvard University in the 18th century. When he graduated, however, he took up the clerical cloth. Still, he never forgot his lessons in science and when the Northern Hemisphere experienced what historians recall as a "year without a summer" in 1816, the reverend kept meticulous drawings of his observations in those now-faded pages.

Clearly we have more advanced ways of tracking sunspots now but it's a comfort to know we hams aren't the only ones who have a tradition of keeping a watchful and sometimes nervous eye on the sky." Thanks to Ray Crawford and WIA Magazine

Farewell Bryan Marsh

As mentioned in the magazine last month, Bryan sadly passed away just as we were going to press.

As well as the DX League, Bryan was heavily involved with the NZVRS and was a life member. The obituary below comes from David Crozier (NZVRS).

Life Member Bryan Marsh has died in his 94th year.

Bryan joined the NZVRS in 1982, becoming the NZVRS treasurer after Eric Reynolds in 1986 and continued in this role for another 11 years until 1997. Bryan was a pen and paper man; his auction process was dual entry foolscap sheets; one for the sellers and one for the successful bidders. Totalling up by hand was done in Bryan's head. He was also the organiser of finances in the several exhibitions the society had during that period, including a convention. Bryan's hand entries on massive spreadsheets tracking the attendee's accommodation, meals, payments and other preferences was legendary. In 1991 Bryan was made a life member of the NZVRS in recognition of the services he had afforded the society. During his role as treasurer Bryan was also the repository of the society's circuit information, until 1997 when Ernie Hakanson became the librarian and offered to accommodate both books and provide the circuit information service.

Bryan's residence at 20 Rimu Road, Mangere Bridge was the society's address for over 10 years and well known in the developing years of the society.

Bryan was a keen radio DXer and was a Radio DX League member – travelling the country in his famous motor home to various convention sites, often in the South Island, and visiting members on his travels. He would also like to attend the Warbirds Over Wanaka Air Shows if he could. Bryan had favourite breeds of radio that he enjoyed, and Eddystones was one of these.

Bryan was an early member of the Eddystone users club and was a dab hand at their maintenance – knowing more than most of their various foibles and especially the location of those tucked away components that gave a range of issues. Several times in his retirement Bryan ventured offshore to the UK, visiting family but also radio haunts, museums, collections, friends and members. Bryan was particularly impressed by Gerald Wells and the BVWS museum in London.

He was upset when his autographed copy of Gerald's book "Obsession – a lifetime in wireless" was misplaced and requested a complete search of the NZVRS library in case it had been inadvertently deposited there. In his later years Bryan was less active in society affairs but still actively involved with questions "from the floor". He was also the trustee of the "Crosley Pup", at that time the only radio set owned by the Society.

Bryan's health in 2016 declined, the motor home was sold, as was the car, his wife Betty went into care and Bryan suffered a series of strokes, mild at first, that left him with unfinished sentences. Soon too, Bryan entered a care facility and the house was sold.

At his 91st birthday celebration it was mentioned that Bryan's interests have included model aircraft, hydroplanes and DXing. He was in the Air force with a period in Fiji where he built a model flying boat. He built radio controlled yachts and sailed them on Lake Taupo. Bryan worked for Air New Zealand and had formed a friendship there with Bill Farmer. He was a keen fisherman and had owned a 12-foot 6-inch Spencer launch. Bryan's early hobby of model aircraft (rubber-band powered) gave way to the thrills of hydroplane racing. This was replaced by shortwave DXing using domestic radios, leading to an interest in communication receivers, especially the famous Eddystone and Philips sets. Vintage radio collection and restoration was

a natural progression. At 91, Bryan was still driving himself to meetings when his health permitted. He was even assisting the relatives of a deceased estate - creating a list of the radios and related material for their dispersal. Bryan had often done this over the years, sometimes even taking his motor home on site.

I first met Bryan at the League's 1968 convention and regularly at national conventions (often accompanied by his wife Betty) for almost 40 years thereafter. We had the added link of both being in the airline industry, and that connection extended to Bryan's prowess with model aircraft – I believe he represented NZ internationally in model glider competitions. When we moved to Auckland in 1979 I was able to regularly catch up with Bryan at Auckland Branch meetings and my Eddystone 680X benefited from Bryan's technical prowess. Sad to lose another of the characters that made our hobby such a colourful one.

I only met Bryan a handful of times at the few conventions I have attended. He was warm and was always tinkering with a radio. He and his wife, Betty, arrived in a camper van with a wonderful sticker on the back which said something about Mum and Dad spending the kids inheritance! A wonderful idea. In every convention photo there was Bryan with a radio held aloft. He was a true character and our hobby is the poorer for his passing.

I first met Bryan when attending my first Auckland Branch meeting way back in 1978 and soon after that first meeting I was invited to his place at Mangere Bridge. Bryan had a love for vintage radio receivers, many of which were stored in a shed behind his house, or it may have been the garage, (memory a little hazy). Bryan also collected information on modifications to a large number of receivers and this information would always be shared others.

Bryan and his wife Betty would often turn up at conventions in their Campervan and he would always produce some sort of portable receiver. I can remember him arriving at one Camp Iona convention with one very large portable radio.

Bryan will be missed especially in League and vintage radio circles.

70 YEARS AGO

We continue our look back 70 years ago to the foundations of the NZ Radio DX League, with extracts from publications of the time.

The January 1948 edition of 'DX Bulletin (NZ) reported "DXing over the holiday period was disappointing but since then conditions have improved and early morning Yanks are providing many new loggings."

The page and a half of shortwave news included numerous exotic and long-gone Latin stations including HC4FA La Voz de Manabi in Portoviejo Ecuador on 4765; HI2T Dominican Republic on 5970 and 7275; YSHQ El Salvador 6510; Des Hickey of Petone logged YNBH Radio Panamericana in Managua on late on Christmas Day and HJCF Bogota 6240 with all night broadcast on New Years Day; YNCNM Nicaragua 6715; CE920 Radio Ejercito Chile 9200; XEBT Mexico City on 9625; LRA1 Argentina 9690 announcing plans to increase power to 20kw and then 100kw to become the most powerful station in South America; Arthur Cushen reports HCJB Ecuador with English news at 5pm, and Mailbag 5.05pm Sundays. Ross Gibson of Dunedin had reports away to TGWA, HCJB, HER3 and replies from HCJB 12458, VLB10, VLA6, VLG5, VLA7, VLR, SBP, HER5, PCJ and KRHO 9650.

Half the magazine features North American MW news and loggings. Hector McMillan of Glen Oroua advised verifications in from KRGV, KOOL, CHVC (Niagara Falls, Ontario on 1600), KPMC and WLAC. Keith Robinson in Kapuka had a nice list of QSLs too – KOOL, KOCK, KUSN, CKNW, 6WN, KRUL, KUOA, WDAY, KNAK, CKWX, WDSU, KSRV & Singapore 1333. Across the Tasman there is news of new ABC stations soon to start broadcasting – 4QB Pyalba Queensland on 560, 2NB Broken Hill and 2NU Manilla NSW.

Happy New Year! And I trust all your celebrations for Christmas and the calendar flip into 2018 went well. It's a big year for the League, as our 70th anniversary will be marked in a few months with the convention at Mangawhai.

Douglas Johns, Christchurch made sure he could claim opening spot with an early contribution ahead of holiday travels. "I'm early for the next DX Times, but that is only because I have something to report, and because we are going to Brisbane for Christmas - where it is as hot as it is here in Christchurch. A night in Fairlie, South Canterbury, saw loggings go to the Sound on 104.7, and a hitherto unknown LPFM station, GEM-FM on 88.3. And both have verified. GEM-FM operates from the south end of Fairlie from 18 Nixons Road. V/s is Trevor Allan whom I met, and he tells me he has plans to turn what is now continuous music into a community-orientated station when he gets the time. I see that you are going on, I presume, a cruise for the holiday period. Season's greetings and I hope that 2018 lives up to expectations." (Thanks, Douglas. Your guess is correct – I'll try to keep my ravings 'short' further down the column.)

lan Wells, Mosgiel has a reply from a location appropriate for the Season. "Hope your Christmas was happy and safe. I have now verified my fifth Alaskan mediumwave station with a really nice letter and colourful e-QSL from KJNP, North Pole, on 1170 kHz signed by Joy Swedberg in response to a report emailed to <kjnp@mosquito.net>. Also emails confirming: KHKA, Honolulu, 1500 kHz from Mike Kelly <mkelly@espn1420am.com>; KLOK, San Jose on 1170 kHz from 'Franco' (I presume this is Franco Miranda, Director of Production and Promotions) <info@klokmedia.com>; KFI, Los Angeles on 640 kHz <robinbertolucci@iheartmedia.com>; and CFAC, Calgary, on 960 kHz <feedback@sportsnet.rogers.com>." (I appreciate the humour with that email address from KJNP!)

Stu Forsyth, Mangawhai as of the deadline for the January 'Times' was busy preparing his soon-to-be home base. "I had a little time to do some DXing before returning to New Zealand. Verified from the League's SDR are: KFNQ 1090 Seattle WA, KBBI 890 Homer AK, Kiribati 846 and 1440, CJRJ 1200 Vancouver BC (thanks Theo for the important contact info) and Gold FM Suva 990. I have logged AIR 15185. Meanwhile in sunny Mangawhai, there have been too many boxes to unpack. My aerials have arrived from the South Island but I have not been able to get at them because they are in the far corner of the garage and there is a wall of boxes between me and them! Hopefully before I go back to Malaysia I may be able to reach them!" (Ugh... packing, moving, unpacking. It's bad enough crunching a suitcase for travelling. Glad to be of help; as I wrote to you when you mentioned CJRJ on <dxdialog>, I think that's the first time I've noticed it pop up in NZ, though I might be wrong.)

lan Cattermole, Blenheim is definitely back in the swing of things. "Here are a few (very) SW veries received during December: Reach Beyond Australia 11900 & 9610; TWR-India via TCH 9950; Radio Vaticana via N. Marianas 7330; and Radio Vaticana via the Philippines 9695 khz. That's all for another year." (OK, you have me stumped. Where is TCH? Possibly Tashkent/Toshkent? Another year, and eleven more chances to confuse me which is easily done.)

Bryan Clark, Mangawhai was quick off the mark with the latest shortwave addition across The Ditch. "One QSL has come in from FRS-Holland 6284 and a report out to 4KZ Innisfail 5055. But it hasn't been a good month for me on shortwave or medium wave DX, apart from the surprise arrival of Radio Kiribati's new Christmas Island station. Two reasons - the FM DX season is in full swing, and I have been experiencing significant QRN across MW and SW bands which I suspect is coming from absentee neighbour's house about 340 metres away - he installed BPL (Broadband over Powerlines) in early December to provide a WiFi network for his security cameras, and my DX opportunities took a dive at the same time. When he arrives to stay for the summer holidays. I will be discussing a temporary shutdown of his system to validate it is my issue, then I will be seeking professional advice on how to eliminate or mitigate the problem. Sad to learn of the passing of Bryan Marsh - first met him at the 1968 Convention and regularly thereafter at conventions or Auckland Branch meetings from the 1980s onwards. He helped tweak my Eddystone receivers in the early days. All the best for Christmas, and may 2018 bring improved DX for all!" (Oh. not good news about BPL. nor about Bryan Marsh: vou and I also climbed Avers Rock with him 40 years ago... ouch.)

And continuing with travels, as teased above, I spent 14 nights on a circle cruise of the western Indian Ocean out of Port Louis, Mauritius during the second half of the month. I should have had Douglas Johns on hand to figure out what was going on in Mauritius as my 2016 WRTH listings for FM didn't seem to match up with reality!

Three AM'ers are active: 684 (in mostly brief daytime checks) had a good but not overpowering signal where I spent a couple of days pre-cruise on the SE coast, and was carrying Kool FM in French (the other French service on FM only was Radio One, pronounced as in EE) – 819 had a thumping signal at Blue Bay near the airport and appeared to be carrying Best FM in Hindi, plus short bursts of Chinese – and 1575 was poor with BBC World in English. I'm guessing 684 and 819 still share a site near Curepipe so why there'd be a noticeable difference in reception is a good question.

My taxi driver to the ship was an entertaining elderly gent who was intrigued when I asked about the station on his radio (Best FM). He pointed out the former MBC building as we passed through Curepipe but they now have a massive building closer to Port Louis, and just as importantly he pointed out the nearby Phoenix brewery after asking whether I'd tried the local beer! Do you need any answer to that?

On board, my dinner sitting was late so any evening checks were in the region of 10.30 pm and later — either 1830 or 1930 UT, depending how far west we were. Very casual observations basically boiled down to lots of Iranians and Arabic stuff on MW; VoA 909 from northern Botswana was a powerhouse along with the parallel on 4930 — the Beeb on 3255 and Sonder Grense 3320 were easy pickings any night — and once we were on East African Time/UT+3, my check turned up presumed Madagascar at very poor strength/modulation on

5010. Also surprising was how weak RN Angola was on 4950 – ditto for ZBC/11735.

Thurs 21 Dec, the evening before the ship's call at Zanzibar, it was covered by a religious outfit in Portuguese till 2000 UT; is there really a 50 kW Brazilian called R. Transmundial as listed in the WRTH and Aoki? A hugely dominant African on 6090 was presumably Kaduna. One evening only, 999 had a Slavic language (I can't tell the difference between Russian/ Ukrainian) and since returning home, I think that must have been TWR/Kishinev-Grigoriopol which is listed as having a weird schedule.

Another evening, 4965 had Voice of Hope from Zambia thundering in with its American-style presentation, never to be heard again, till I realised after looking at Aoki that they use the frequency Mon-Fri only and my re-checks had been on weekends. Gee!

The Friday morning in Zanzibar, I was on deck about 8 am and 585 and 6015 were definitely on air. During a shore tour, I asked the local guide during a stop north of Zanzibar Town about how far we were from Dole? Eyes glaze over – tourists ask strange questions -- till I mentioned ZBC... ah, we're 'in' Dole... the tx site was maybe ten mins drive away, but banana palms and other trees kept any sighting, um, out of sight.


The first two calls had been in the Seychelles; I'd recalled there should've been a MW tx still on-air, but never heard it, so maybe it isn't? The other major highlight (for me) was the call at Mamoudzou on Mayotte's Grande Terre, in the Comoros. I took a ferry across to the old French colonial capital at Dzaoudzi and wandered to look for the now 'Mayotte Premiere' location but never found it. Anyone with an old ORTF QSL card for 3331 will have a view of the causeway. The last call was La Réunion: no MW as the two tx's (and the one on Mayotte) closed during 2017.

And suddenly, I'm back home with a deadline to Stu that's overdue. But he's relaxing in the Winterless North, probably grinding his teeth, waiting.

Rob Shepherd, a new member of the League based in Toowoomba, Queensland, using a JRC NRD535-D using balanced 80' long wire, plus balanced EWE, has shared the results of his recent listening. I have taken the liberty of editing some of his loggings that are relatively common here in NZ. While reception may not be possible in New Zealand at the times listed, or at all, it certainly makes for interesting and challenging reading.

We are pleased to advise that as part of our 50th Anniversary celebrations, Radio 4KZ shortwave 5055 kHz commenced transmission yesterday afternoon. Reports have come in from as far as Monterey, California USA.

Unfortunately, during the next 2 weeks we will be running on half power at 500 watts.

Transmission is from the 4KZ (am 531-8kW) & 4AY (am 873-1 kW) site at east Innisfail in Tropical North Queensland. We use a USA made LPB 1.2 kW shortwave transmitter feeding an Inverted V antenna at about 14 metres high at the peak. The transmitter audio is via an Australian-made Crusher digital audio limiter.

The system is designed to cover the Cape York area of Queensland and the Northern outback. Fortuitous reception is available at times over a much wider area. Transmission hours will be approximately 0500 to 2300 hours GMT (3pm to 9am Queensland time.)

We welcome reception reports. All confirmed reports will receive a 4KZ shortwave QSL card. No return postage is required. Cuba. Arnie Coro writes we now have three Cuban stations on the 60m Tropical band. My plans are in the works to go on the air on the 90mb by 2018 with 50kw and a omidirectional NVIS antenna. Now we have 5025kHz 100kw 24 hrs with Radio Rebelde program,on 5040kHz from 2100-0600 UTC omidirectional Radio Habana Cuba and 4765kHz 50kw with Radio Progreso 0130-0500UTC.(Arnie Coro on Facebook 4 Nov. in reply to his comment on

his posting about recent nil sunspots-AP via BDXC Communication Dec.)

Peru 4810 OAW9A On Monday Nov 27 I visited Radio Logos in Chazuta, about 90 minutes ride east of Tarapoto. The road is paved. For the last half of the route the road is cut into the side of the steep hills flanking the bank of the Huallaga River. In several places the pavement has been washed away and in one place the original road was covered by a landslide. A detour was plowed through the debris.

The prosperity of Tarapoto has not reached the Chazuta area. There are some eco-resorts nearby but the town of Chazuta is very poor. All the streets I saw were dirt. The houses mostly unpainted wood or adobe, a few with thatched roofs and most with rusting tin panels. In the 1800s and early 1900s this was an important transit point on the Huallaga River. (The book I am writing - an historical travelogue of northern Peru - will tell of those times.)

The Radio Logos offices are located on a side street several blocks from the plaza. There is a large open compound with a building along the street. The name is painted prominently on the side. I arrived about 10:30 a.m. and the station was off the air until late afternoon. There was no one there but a woman nearby walked me back through to the other side of the compound. Pastor Jairo Sangama lives directly behind there. He was resting in his hammock when I got there. He opened up the station building and took me on a tour of the facilities. There isn't much. In front there is a small control for the transmitter, which he says is on a hillside east of town. Then there is a small studio. and a large mostly empty workshop room

At the moment they broadcast for four hours in the morning and the evening only on 4810 kHz shortwave in twelve different indigenous languages. Most of the programming is prerecorded and comes on CDs but they sometimes do live connections with jungle villages via cellphone. Pastor Jairo showed me two different models of solar-powered fixed-frequency radios that they give to leaders in the different jungle communities. They recently received a license for an FM transmitter in Chazuta but are awaiting the Transmitter.

They have applied for a license for a new SW station in Pucallpa but are still awaiting approval and so have not bought equipment yet. (I was told elsewhere that the Ministry of Communications is no longer issuing licenses for either medium wave or shortwave.)

Pastor Jairo said the station is fully funded from Peruvian sources but they do have some outside contacts. He said he had recently been in Dallas, Texas. Across the street the church was sponsoring a dentistry workshop. Two American dentists, from Florida and Oklahoma, were teaching basic dentistry.

CHRISTMAS ISLAND (CENTRAL KIRIBATI) Press Release from Kiribati Broadcasting and Publications Authority (BPA): I-Kiribati living in the remote Line and Phoenix Islands can now for the first time listen clearly to Radio Kiribati broadcast from the Broadcasting and Publications Authority's (BPA) main studio in London, Christmas Island following the installation of a new AM transmitter. The newly installed transmitter was commissioned on Saturday, 25 November 2017 in London village. BPA Board Vice Chairman Betarim Rimon said the launching was covered live on Radio Kiribati and was heard in the Kiribati islands (Gilbert Group) through AM1440 khz and in the Line and Phoenix Islands through the newly installed AM 846 khz in London. Mr Rimon said the people of Kanton (Canton), the only inhabited island in the Phoenix Islands Protected Area (PIPA) can now tune and listen clearly to the broadcast from Christmas Island, a barrier in radio communications which has plagued and isolated the island from the rest of the islands in the country for many years. "The people of Kanton can now tune to this service as it will sufficiently cover the rest of PIPA. You are now no longer far but drawn closer to the rest of the nation and the world in terms of news updates and radio service," said Mr Rimon. (RK News via Facebook via BC)

DXers on the North American West Coast first discovered Radio Kiribati back on its old frequency of **846** at the end of November. Transmissions are parallel to 1440. (Theo Donnelly via DX Dialog) I measured the frequency as 845.996, just on the low side of NewsTalk ZB Masterton on 846.000. For me, 1440 is a much easier frequency to hear, despite Tauranga co-channel. 846 is easier to hear on the League SDR with its north beam and reduced back-end pick-up. I am assuming they have reactivated the lower frequency as it should have better daytime coverage of the widespread islands of Kiribati than 1440, but here in Mangawhai the 846 signal strength is inferior to 1440. (Bryan Clark via DX Dialog) The Kiribati group is spread over a vast distance (over 3300km) so 846 would only be intended for coverage of the western group, even at night time. 846 may suffer less from skywave cancellation at night. (Paul Ormandy via DX Dialog)

According to verie signer Babera Marewenimakin, the power of Christmas Island is 10kw. (Stu Forsyth via DX Dialog 12/12)

846-Christmas Island is by far the strongest DU here in Kona, but it seems to have a serious issue with the transmitter cutting out intermittently. It did this about 3 times last night. I recall that Bryan Clark of NZ also mentioned that the signal was gone on one of the recent days -- maybe the same issue? The 19-second delay with 1440-Kiribati also seems pretty bizarre, but it was checked repeatedly last night and confirmed. Both 846 and 1440-Kiribati are easy catches here in Kona, so the delayed programming is pretty obvious. (Gary DeBock 17/12 visiting Hawaii via Glenn Hauser, DXLD Yahoo Group)

HUNGARY Antenna Hungaria's new Nautel 2 Megawatt NX2000 medium wave system on **540** AM is now operational. Located at the broadcaster's transmission facility near Solt, Hungary, Nautel says the project, on which it worked in collaboration with Porion Digital KFT, involved large infrastructure changes at the site as well as installation of the new transmitter.

Modifications included building renovation and air handling updates as well as interfacing the NX2000 to Antenna Hungaria's existing 11 kV voltage supply. The new solid-state Nautel system replaces a custom-built tube transmitter that had been in use for 40 years. "The NX2000 system incorporates five Nautel NX400 transmitters along with a large, versatile combiner," said Wendell Lonergan, Nautel head of Broadcast Sales. "Our new NXC2000 combiner can be reconfigured if one or more transmitters is shut down, which ensures that maximum power is delivered to the antenna in all cases." Antenna Hungaria is wholly owned by the government of Hungary and provides broadcast, telecommunication and multimedia services throughout the country. The signal of its Solt operation can be heard on 540 kHz all over Europe as well as in parts of Africa, Russia and Asia. (RadioWorld.com via Richard Langley via Glenn Hauser's DXLD Yahoo Group)

SOLOMON ISLANDS According to an announcement posted on the sibconline.com website, SIBC shut down its 1035 AM transmitter on 15 December as a cost-saving measure. "Recent surveys have shown that most rural people listen to SIBC In the early morning hours and during the evenings. This indicates that they are listening to the shortwave transmitter whose antenna is designed to ensure the signal reaches all corners of the country during daytime, morning and evening times. The MW transmitter... covers the middle sector of the country and doesn't reach the furthest islands. SIBC management will review the MW coverage issue in the new year." (Nigel Holmes via Paul Ormandy DX Dialog) I understand from my sources in Solomon Islands that the closure of 1035 kHz relates primarily to the cost of electricity to keep the transmitter running. A funding issue has arisen between the SIBC and the local utilities authority over rhe payment of the power bill, and even the SIBC studio

complex in Honiara was recently without mains power and operating on a diesel generator for a while. The issue is expected to be rectified early in the New Year and 1035 kHz could well be reactivated sooner than later. Despite the information in the SIBC press release, the mediumwave signal is still very important in playing a part in ensuring nationwide radio coverage. (Martin Hadlow via DX Dialog)



The national broadcaster, SIBC, is taking drastic and desperate measures to stay on air. This comes after Solomon Power's recent disconnection of SIBC's power supply due to a \$65,000 outstanding bill. The national broadcaster, which has the furthest reach and relied on by the rural populace, currently runs on generators, which are expensive to maintain. Chief Executive Officer Ashley Wickham told the Sunday Star they are taking every possible measure available to keep the station on air. "We've already shutdown the medium wave transmitter

SIBC Headquarters at Rove

(MW) because of the situation," Wickham said. "Only the

Short Wave (SW) transmitter is still being maintained because it reaches the whole country," he added. "Our streamed overnight service listened to internationally had to be switched off at 11pm so the generators could rest." Wickham said their poor financial situation came about as a result of the government's critical cash flow problem. The government is SIBC's main source of revenue. Wickham said they will review the situation in the New Year. "But our outlook is not so clear. "We have not been told when Parliament is likely to sit to look at the budget. "If our finances don't improve, we will reduce the transmission hours of the shortwave transmitter so that they are only heard in the early mornings and evenings to close down at 11pm. "Then we start a process of lay-off of staff." "Since the government changed we have not heard how the new administration views our SIBC prospects," Wickham stated. He said SIBC had also complained to the Prime Minister's Office and Ministry of Finance that Solomon Power did not seem to know the essential services act and did not seem to know or care about the cash-flow situation everyone reliant on government is affected by. Solomon Power earlier insisted their action applies to every customer that has outstanding bills with them.

TONGA Tonga's beleaguered state broadcaster has begun regular 24 hour operations on **1017** AM for the first time. Previously it only broadcast after hours between midnight and six in the morning if there was a public emergency. The station received a revamp earlier this year in an effort to improve content and boost revenue after being called 'an enemy of

government' by the prime minister. The Acting General Manager of Tonga's Broadcasting Commission, Solomone Finau, said while content hasn't yet been finalised, there are plans to stream everything online. "We'll be trying to expose these services, that six hours extra, having some talkback shows and some of the religious songs and local music. It's kind of popular at the moment but we're trying to expose that, [not just] to the local people but

Silverdale (Auckland) Bandscan on 19 December - More FM Coromandel 89.1 an easy catch; LPFM 87.9 West Coast Radio strong (I could hear this in Wellsford 40km north as well, so must have a good transmitter location, or multiple sites); 106.8 identified as "106.8 FM, the World's Greatest Music" and 107.5 was carrying TLC Radio.

Further to West Coast Radio, a quick response from the station advises: "we have two transmission sites, one is very high up on the Kaipara hills and the second is very high in the Waitakeres"

Had a visit from **UK FM DXer Dave Small**, a long-time friend of Brian Withers. Dave was en route to the Far North for a 7-week DXpedition to hear Pacific FM DX. We have kept in touch about FM DX activity by email, text messages and Skype. Dave uses a Sony SDR XDR-F1HD like me but with computer interface which enables him to capture the unique PS codes transmitted by FM stations - makes identifications so much easier. He is also trialing an SDRPlay RSP1A SDR for FM DX.

The internal switch that switches the external aerial to the internal when the plug is withdrawn is prone to failing leaving the aerial permanently switched to the external. This is the second radio that has developed this problem. Time to attack it with a soldering iron.

Aerial used was a 5 element Yaqi.

Update on the Digitech AR-1780 aerial socket: I shorted out the terminals on the switch, so the internal aerial is active all the time. It will be interesting to see if others have a similar problem.

GfK Total New Zealand Commercial Radio Survey 4 – December 7, 2017

MediaWorks:

2017 has been a stellar year for MediaWorks Radio with the latest GfK Total New Zealand Commercial Radio Survey results showing an increase in total listeners to 2,316,800 people nationwide across its nine radio brands, the largest ever audience reach and an increase of 54,700 since the start of the year.

More FM Wellington also saw an increase with the Polly & Grant breakfast show extending its strong debut audience to a 7.5% share.

"More FM Wellington's results demonstrate the success of Polly & Grant in their home town and is a great indicator for their expansion into four new regions in the new year, including

Waikato, Rotorua, Whanganui and Dunedin," said Wratt. "What we are doing in Dunedin in 2018 is really exciting and a world first for breakfast radio. More FM will broadcast on two frequencies in the region, giving listeners a choice - to tune in to Si & Gary on 97.4FM or Polly & Grant on 100.6FM."

The Breeze is once again New Zealand's leading music station in share and is second only to The Edge in total listeners nationwide. The Edge retained its leading position with a national audience of 613,100. The Breeze also had a great result in our biggest cities, increasing in Auckland, reaching its highest ever share percentage of 13.4% in Christchurch, and continuing to rule as the top music station in Wellington with 12.6% share.

Mai FM built on its strong results from September with a share increase to 9.2% in Auckland and a total listenership of 228,800 people across the city. Also in Auckland, Mai retained its top spot in breakfast radio with 140,400 people tuning in to Nickson, Nate and Lily each morning, 4,100 more than Newstalk ZB and more than 46,200 ahead of the nearest music station.

George FM recorded a strong performance in major markets growing 12,100 listeners in Auckland, including a 3% share point increase in its target demographic of 18-34. The Wellington market also jumped 0.5% in share to 1.2%.

The Sound is the preferred station in Dunedin3 and recorded increases in multiple key markets; Auckland, Tauranga, Taranaki, Manawatu and Southland. It is third equal with The Breeze in share for all people aged 25-54.

The Rock remained consistent in the fourth quarter, celebrating its best result in the Auckland market in two years at 4.9% share. Leading the charge from the top, The Rock Morning Rumble, hosted by Rog, Bryce and Mulls, is the number one breakfast show in the country in the key 25-54 demographic.

Magic remained the top music station in Rotorua and Hawke's Bay and saw gains in Dunedin and Tauranga. Magic will continue to expand into the regions adding Manawatu on 104.2FM to the network in the new year.

RadioLIVE stayed strong in New Zealand's heartland, posting consistent results in nearly all of the smaller regions, and increasing share in Northland, Rotorua and Tauranga.

Rova continues its success, increasing total app downloads by 12.5% to 242,000. To date, the total of all streams across Rova and the nine radio websites is 1,023,501 with 535,590 hours consumed via the app.



< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, December 3, 2017 -- From 1984 to 1994, late night ABC talk show host Ray Briem conducted an annual five-hour IDX Special about DXing. Originating in Los Angeles, it was carried nationwide. Briem was a DXer himself, and he invited many DX luminaries to take part in the discussion, either in person or by phone. Under "DX History/Recordings" we have posted a recording of Ray's shortwave special heard on February 15, 1985 over WABC-770, New York. Stew MacKenzie was in the studio with Ray, and among the DX cognoscenti who participated by phone were Richard A. Wood, Tom Meyer, Arthur Cushen, Glenn Hauser, Laurie Boyer (NZ), Jonathan Marks (briefly), lan McFarland, H. D. Norman (NDXE), and Joe Costello (WRNO), plus several callers. Briem retired at the end of 1994. He died in 2012. The recording is 2 hours, 50 minutes in length.

< www.ontheshortwaves.com> Update, December 10, 2017 -- Now an Indian state, Goa was ruled by the Portuguese untl the Indian army moved in in 1961. Emissora de Goa went on the air on shortwave in 1949, but was seldom heard--at least in the U.S.--until 1960, when it inaugurated a 50 kw. transmitter, yielding very good reception here. Under "DX History/QSLs & Other Station Memorabilia," we have posted four picture postcards from the station showing various scenes in Goa. Three are printed as Portuguese-English station QSL cards, and the forth is a postcard bearing the station name. All are blank. The cards are numbered on the back, #1 through #4, and #2 is the same as a Goa QSL received by Don Jensen for reception in 1961 http://www.ontheshortwaves.com/DNJ/QSLs/SW- Goa-EmGoa-1961.pdf> so these cards date from around that time. Don's reception was in November 1961, the month before Portuguese rule ended and the station went dark. It would be 33 years (1994) before Goa returned to shortwave in the form of AIR-Panaii. We have updated our "Active-Inactive SWBC Countries" list, which you can find under "Specialized Resources." The December 5, 2017 update adds two reactivated countries (Chile and Equatorial Guinea-Fernando Poo), and deletes two (Canada-Newfoundland and Morocco-Spanish), so the active-inactive totals remain the same: 117 vs. 146. See p. 42 of the list for the details. -- And finally, under "Specialized Resources/Wavescan," Adrian Peterson tells us about "The Radio Scene in the World's Smallest Kingdom [Tavolara, Italy]" (Wavescan N457, November 26, 2017); and "Abandoned Radio Stations-2" (Wavescan N458, December 3, 2017).

2018 CONVENTION KEYNOTE SPEAKER ANNOUNCED!

Journalist David Gapes came up with the idea of a commercial pirate radio station for NZ in 1965. A year later he was joined by a young radio ham and technical whiz -Denis (Doc) O'Callahan. Together with David, Derek Lowe and Chris Parkinson (both of whom had been working independently on a similar project), Denis made up the founding directors of iconic NZ broadcaster Radio Hauraki.

Denis O'Callahan will be special guest speaker at the League's 70th Anniversary DX Convention on 6-9 April this year. Denis' wife Judy will also attend – she was part of the Hauraki pirate team and once flew back from Australia with a key transmitter component hidden in her baggage!

Denis was Chief Technician for the station's pirate radio ship Tiri from 1966 to 1968 while Radio Hauraki broadcast from international waters (then 3 miles out!) between Great Barrier Island, Leigh and the Coromandel Peninsula on the mainland.
