

RADIO FREE ASIA ANNOUNCES RADIO PIONEER QSL #5 MAY 2019

Radio Free Asia (RFA) announces the 5th design in our 'radio pioneer' QSL card series **Lee de Forest, 1873-1961**, was an American inventor with over 180 patents who described himself as the Father of Radio. His is best known for his 1906 invention of the 3-element "Audion" vacuum tube which was a significant contribution to making radio broadcasting possible. He is also well-regarded for his influences on the development of long distance telephone lines and talking motion pictures. This is RFA's 70th QSL design and is used to confirm all valid RFA reception reports from May – August 2019.

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MUSINGS

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We start the month with Life Member **Ken Baird in Wainuiomata**: I have been using the NZRDXL SDRs since October on the advice of Arthur (Pres) as SW reception here in Wainuiomata is zero and have now heard 38 countries, many more stations. This is a major improvement and I am now able to resume listening to Intl SW B/Cs. However there is a gap in reception of below 9MHz signals, which is my area of interest, from 22:00 to 03:00 UTC with propagation shifting to the higher frequencies.

The info on the SDRs by Chris Mackerell mentions using <www.sdr.hu>. There are some 400 Kiwi SDR sites on the address, all over the world. I now check my world clock, find a likely site, log on and see what's there. I have heard some very interesting broadcasts. It should be noted, I don't send reports for QSL cards, only listen and don't send in loggings to the DX Times for them.

Some examples are: Canada, CHU at 2244 on 3330 using WA2ZKD Rochester NY, USA (Been trying to hear this for years!!); Madagascar, MWY African Pathways Radio at 2014, 11965 using KPH California USA (I have never heard this broadcast mentioned in the DX Times); Romania, RRI, 2029, 7375 using SM2BYC, Sweden; Turkey, VOT, 2040, 6050 using Fenu-Radio, Switzerland; Taiwan, CRI at 2217 on 7290 using AKKY, Japan; Germany, Bro Stair at 2237 on 6070 using K1RA, USA; USA, WWCR 4 at 0216 on 5890 using I1rra, Italy; Cuba, R Havana at 0226 on 6060 using TF1VHF, Iceland.

As you can see, there is a lot of Kiwi SDRs letting listeners hear anything they like with open access. Great fun!! [Great to hear from you, Ken. These SDRs do bring a completely new dimension to the hobby. The world is literally at your fingertips]

Douglas Johns in Christchurch is back again with this: In my musing last month I commented on the tardiness of the postie or, more likely the lack of replies from stations. Sadly this has not changed this month. As a result of my recent trips to Westport, Auckland and Hamilton I posted 27 reports, all with prepared cards and return postage. This has resulted in just 8 QSLs - a pretty poor return (and I don't think it is because they were poor reports !!!!). It seems that our major networks have forgotten that it is listeners they are targeting. Granted we DXers are tiny fry in the greater scheme of things but we do listen to radio stations, and those same stations make a point of welcoming listeners feedback. But is feedback just a one way thing to them?? They are in the business of communication and communication is a two way street. After all it does not take an inordinate amount of time to look at a report, sign a card and mail it back. I know that we have no right of entitlement and that replying is a gesture of goodwill, but perhaps station managers, when they next receive a reception report, need to consider their response to the feedback they give, and what it says about them, before consigning a listener contact to the rubbish bin.

Having said all that, thank you to George FM Auckland and Magic Talk Warkworth for sending back my ppc, but where are MediaWorks, NZME and RNZ - all of whom haven't bothered

to reply?

I spent of bit of time listening to an SDR in Alberta over Easter, and of the four reports I sent I received 3 emails back within 24 hours. They were CKJR Wetaskiwin AB 1440, CJCA Edmonton AB 930, and WRSC State College PA 1390. 75% success rate. Puts NZ to shame. [Yes, it is an on-going problem. As our numbers decrease, the exposure of stations for verifications similarly declines and so the stations get out of the habit. We just need to report more!]

Our President, **Arthur DeMaine from Ashburton** is a welcome addition. Our four days in Owaka were not entirely a washout. While the DX was poor the company was great. One of the reasons I enjoy Dxpedition's is sharing our experiences and learning new things that can help one in this hobby of ours. SDRs have certainly made this hobby interesting. One can look at a computer screen and see the radio signals and with one click of the mouse be listening to Radio Cuba or at worst just noise.

I think my best Dx was hearing Morocco on 171 at a reasonable strength on Northland SDR on the last morning.

I am not sure what Arthur Cushen or Mev Branks would make of all this new equipment, iPhone held up to a radio speaker recording a song and the program loaded on iPhone telling you the name of the song, whether it be in English or Spanish. Even with these SDRs it is often enjoyable once and a while to get out the Icom, Drake or the Trio and tune the dial.

Thank you Steven, Stu and Sutton for your company we must do it again and Stu we won't mention cables and Steven we won't talk about the fence. [It was great having time away with you too, Arthur. The icing on the cake would have been good signals, but I guess we were happy to settle for wonderful company.]

The Patron is next. Sutton Burtenshaw calls in from Hamilton. Well, I'm back down to earth after our trip to Hina Hina. Really did enjoy my time with Steven, Arthur and Stu. The band may not have welcomed us but the company was great. Thank you Stu for putting up with me in Auckland beforehand and Steven for making the time to have us down there in the Catlins area.

We heard quite a few heterodynes that did result in some Peruvians making the grade but apart from that the highlight for me was being able to send a report to Medi1 171 kHz, the first ever Longwave station I have heard. Other notable loggings were Cheese Rolls (twice), Bluff Oysters (several) while thinking of a certain chap in Kingaroy, and of course Blue Cod. Look out next year! [And weren't the cod and oysters wonderful. What a response from a certain chap across the Ditch - our consumption seemed to hit a nerve!]

Mike Smith in Opunake continues to hear those exotic Latins, which annoys me intensely because I can't! Home again now having finished treatment in PN. Now I've got a few weeks to recover and get stuck into some DX before going under the knife to be replumbed! Anyway, what a great idea to share some shack photos around on the web group.

There is still plenty of action coming from South America here so I'm not tempted to reverse the direction of the EWE yet. I notice the MW Aussies are starting to show up in the early evening now so things are on the change. I've still got a phone full of recordings to listen to – reviewed one on 1570 from a few weeks ago (finally) and heard a part ID Radio Cristo (or Cristal) de la –something, also the phrase Bom Dia (PP) or maybe Buen Dia (SS). Trouble is I can't go to work for a few weeks to consult with my Spanish or Portuguese speaking colleagues! Anyway, what's life without a few challenges?

Keep up the good work, the Times is looking really busy and good. [Thank you, Mike. The mag is only as good as its contributors and we have some good ones, yourself included. Take the time to rest and recover and all good wishes from all of us.]

The King of East Mangawhai DX, **Bryan Clark** has this to say. A busy month with medium wave DX, trying to identify numerous off-frequency Latins. The age of the internet and the precise frequency measurement possible with SDR receivers means there is a wealth of shared information on these off-frequency broadcasters shared amongst DXers, for example the Offset links accessed through www.mwlist.org On shortwave, Mali has reactivated and PNG's Wantok Radio Light has made another brief appearance on 7325. [I'll leave everyone to work out who is tops in West Mangawhai! Yes, the offsets on the SDR are very handy indeed and as we saw down south they are very useful for sorting out who you should be hearing - in our case, should the signals be good enough. It is amazing to see 2, 3 or even 4 stations fighting it out on a frequency. We really do listen with our eyes these days.]

Life Member **Tony King in Greytown** continues to demonstrate that you do not need a lot of fancy equipment to hear good things. With a 100m longwire and 3 EWEs connected to a Tecsun PL380, Tony has managed to log MW stations in the USA, Brazil, Peru and Puerto Rico. The detals are in the MW trail. [You have a wonderful location, are marvellously inventive in your approach and the results speak for themselves, Tony. I'll never forget the evening I spent at your place about 17 years ago. 100m beverages on the ground and we heard all sorts!]

John Durham in Tauranga reports: Very little DX activity this month; noted a very faint signal on 6290kHz around 1950UTC possibly Mustang Radio but other than that in the the words of Sqt.Shultz I know nothing! [Well, that makes two of us, John!]

Stu Forsyth in Mangawhai has had little success at the dials apart from a couple of veries OAR (Otago Access Radio) 104.5, but heard on 1575 and RNZI on 5945 - thank you, Adrian Sainsbury! On going problems with a Latin EWE and a lost SDR cable don't help.

DXpedition to Hina Hina - April 14-17th 2019

Where may you ask is Hina Hina? It is about 5km south of Owaka, which in turn is about 30 km south of Balclutha on the South Otago coast. Nestled on the Catlins Lake (in fact an estuary) the house that Steven Greenyer rented is situated with a splendid view over the lake, just above the water. It should have been an ideal location for a DXpedition, but in fact, as it turned out, it wasn't. It was not that the location was poor, it was the atmospheric conditions. Paul Rawdon advised, via DX Dialog, that there was surging solar noise and this affected the auroral oval, as Paul Ormandy told us. We were too close to the edge of this and so listening was dominated by noise. While we were beset with hiss and crackle, Bryan Clark was enjoying good conditions in Mangawhai.

Steven Greenyer was joined by Sutton Burtenshaw, Arthur DeMaine and Stu Forsyth. We had four different receivers – a Palstar R30, Palstar R30 A, an Elad FDM-2SW SDR and a WinRadio G33DDC SDR. These were connected to a variety of aerials. Steven's 5m EWE pointed south east, a 5m EWE strung from trees pointed east, while Arthur put up a couple of 3m EWEs pointing east and north and a random longwire. In many ways Arthur's aerials out-performed the others.

The comparison between the Elad and the WinRadio was interesting as well. In many ways the Elad was superior, particularly with regard to noise reduction or elimination.

On the WinRadio I was able to see carriers on virtually every 10 kHz channel, but because of the noise levels the signals simply couldn't break through. I had similar conditions around New Year up in Mangawhai, but then suddenly, things improved. Had we stayed long enough, we would have heard a lot, I suspect.

That isn't to say that we didn't hear things. As you will see from the various trails there were things to be heard, just not very well. On Mediumwave it was the Peruvians that dominated. We had signs of, or heard, Radios Unión, Cielo, Bienestar, Ecco, Capital and Santa Rosa. Radio Nacional in Buenos Aires also put in an appearance, as did a couple of Yanks. We filled in our days with local visits and a spot of tree-felling. Steven has bought the section

next to this house and spent most of his time playing at being a Canadian lumberjack. He dropped half a dozen trees, including one which spectacularly smashed down one of his fences. The other three of us were there, of course, to offer sage advice and hep clean up the mess!.

While it was disappointing that reception was not good, the camaraderie was excellent and it was great just to get away from it all. Thanks to Steven Greenyer for organising the venue, the menu and the transport. It is very much appreciated.

Managing SW Broadcasts From Ascension Island. ENGLISH BAY, Ascension Island — A sixmile stretch of volcanic rock in the middle of the South Atlantic Ocean is home to the BBC's Atlantic Relay Station. Now managed and operated by Encompass Digital Media on behalf of the BBC World Service, the stations' six powerful shortwave transmitters on Ascension Island beam program in a dozen or more languages to some 30 million listeners in north, west and central Africa. It's a remarkable and fascinating diversion for a digital media business better known for providing video streaming, TV playout and OTT services — but it's not only the shortwave transmission site on Ascension that Encompass is responsible for. The company's engineers also run the island's power station (consisting of five diesel generators and five wind turbines) as well as a reverse osmosis desalination plant, supplying electricity and drinking water to the island's population of more than 800 people.

A BRIEF HISTORY Originally garrisoned by the British Navy in the early 19th century, Ascension Island, a British overseas territory, proved to be a useful stopping off point for ships crossing the Atlantic due to its location almost half-way between Africa and South America. It remains a strategic communications and logistics hub for both the United Kingdom and United States.

The United States built an airbase on the island during World War II and later expanded the runway to allow for larger aircraft — it even served as an emergency runway for NASA's Space Shuttle, although thankfully it was never used.

The British Royal Air Force also has a military base on the island, sharing the same runway. It was a key base during the Falkland Islands conflict in 1982.

The European Space Agency maintains a monitoring base there along with a small monitoring site for NASA and the United States Department of Energy. In the mid-1960s, the BBC built a relay station at English Bay on the northern tip of the island to transmit shortwave radio broadcasts to Africa and South America, plus a power station to provide the electricity. A LIFELINE FOR AFRICA For more than 50 years, the Atlantic Relay Station has transmitted critical radio broadcasts to millions of listeners in some of the remotest parts of Africa. The daily broadcasts include transmissions in English, French, Arabic, Hausa, Somali, Swahili and several other African languages, and more recently has added transmissions for other international broadcasters as well as the BBC.

The shortwave transmitters include two 250 kW Marconi BD272 transmitters originally installed in 1966 (and still in daily use) and four 250 kW RIZ K01 transmitters, which are also

capable of transmitting in Digital Radio Mondiale mode. Each transmitter can be switched to one of more than 20 antennas, which consist of HF curtain arrays beaming toward target areas in Africa and South America. Programming from London is delivered via satellite, with resilience and backup feeds provided by Encompass. The power station is staffed around the clock with engineers taking remote control of the transmitter site outside of peak broadcast times.

TRANSMISSION. Ascension typically transmits around 1,800 hours of program each month on shortwave for the BBC and other broadcasters. Most of these are beamed into Africa, but with the massive footprint of a shortwave transmission, some frequencies are also audible across much of Europe and the Middle East. Although the BBC closed its shortwave service for North and Latin America some years ago, the ability to transmit westward still exists.

There are currently no regular scheduled DRM broadcasts from Ascension Island but it has recently transmitted several digital test transmissions to South Africa and Brazil, proving that DRM on the shortwave bands (DRM30) can reach vast international audiences and deliver high-quality audio as well as data services.

The station's engineers also maintain the island's FM transmitters on Green Mountain (an extinct volcano), which broadcasts BBC World Service and the British Forces radio service (BFBS) to the local audience of servicemen and women, civilian contractors and their families.

OPERATING CHALLENGES. Atmospheric conditions, seasonal variations, sunspots and a host of other factors determine the propagation of shortwave transmissions and therefore affect the audibility of the signal in the target area. Encompass' specialist team of frequency managers plan all of the BBC's transmissions and work closely with other international broadcasters to choose the optimum frequencies at various times of the day. But in the case of Ascension, that's the least of the problems of operating a high-power transmitter site on a large volcanic rock in the middle of the ocean.

Getting supplies, spares, and, of course, staff on and off this remote island, nearly 2,000 miles off the west coast of Africa, is an enormous logistical challenge. Advance planning is essential; everything has a lead-time of several weeks if not months. When the transmitter station needs a spare part, you can't just drive to the local store or order online. A supply ship from the U.K. calls at Georgetown several times a year, but the islands' only "convenience store" usually sells out of fresh fruit and vegetables within the first week of a new delivery. Until a little over a year ago, reaching Ascension Island was relatively straight forward; an RAF plane bound for the Falkland Islands used to touch down on the island twice a week to refuel. However, there is currently a major project being undertaken to repair and resurface the runway and until this is completed, regular access is limited to much smaller military planes. There is one commercial flight a month from Ascension's nearest neighbor, Saint Helena (more than 800 miles, or a two-hour flight away) that links with Johannesburg, but these few military and commercial routes are the only opportunities to get people and goods to and from the island.

Without all of the vital resources and services provided by Encompass engineers, the daily shortwave broadcasts simply wouldn't happen, let alone the 24/7 power and water supply to the island's population. The 800 or so people living on the island are in a unique position, and they have to work together in order to survive. The shortwave transmitter station is as important today as ever, broadcasting to one of the BBC's largest audiences in the world — all from a rock in the middle of the South Atlantic. Competition on channel was tough and came from KIAM Nenana, Alaska plus 4QN Townsville (ABC North Queensland). Also, several Asians. Station is branded as Isla 63 and is broadcasting from the village of Dededo, in the United States territory of Guam. The station's format is Chamorro music and Talk radio. The station is owned by Pacific Telestations LLC (a company of the local conglomerate Calvo Enterprises, Inc.) and was Guam's first radio station, having signed on the air on March 3, 1954. IRELAND Upgrade works will ensure that the transmission of Raidió Teilifís Éireann longwave transmitter on **252** continues for the Irish diaspora, a Fine Gael TD has said. Chair of the Oireachtas Communications Committee, Hildegarde Naughton, welcomed RTE's decision to undertake significant remedial works on transmission equipment which will guarantee the continuance of the longwave service for a minimum of two years. Deputy Naughton said: "The maintenance of long wave radio for the Irish diaspora is a significant concern to the Committee. "The UK regulator, Ofcom, will not grant RTE, as a non-UK broadcaster, the necessary licence to broadcast on digital in the UK at this time. "After engagement between the Committee and RTE, I received a letter from the Director General of the national broadcaster committing to maintain service into the future. "The antenna upgrade requires bespoke manufacturing from a specialist supplier based in Canada and delivery of this element is expected by mid-September. "The relevant mast at Summerhill is 248 metres in height and is a high-risk work environment. "I am told that the weather, and more particularly wind speeds, will be the main determining factor on the commencement and the duration of the works. "Unfortunately, once this remedial work commences, the

long wave service will have to be temporarily suspended. "I understand that it will be out of commission for approximately ten weeks, but RTE has said it will endeavour to complete the works as quickly as possible. "I welcome the efforts being made to continue this service, which serves as an invaluable link between the diaspora and home. However I intend to work with the committee to explore other longer term alternative solutions to ensure this service continues," Deputy Naughton concluded.

JAPAN According to March 27 edition of Sankei Shimbun and April 4 edition of Tokyo Shimbun, Japan Commercial Broadcasting Association (JBA) required the following main items at the meeting of experts in Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications (MIT) held on March 27.

- 1) System modification before 2028 to enable AM broadcasters to convert FM by their own judgment,
- 2) Permission before 2023 to enable AM broadcasters to stop AM broadcasting experimentally for a long period.

It is said MIT fears China will occupy and dominate the vacant AM(MW) band.

The president of NHK, Ryoichi Ueda, said at the press conference on April 4, NHK will continue to broadcast on AM, because, by the Japanese broadcasting law, NHK is under the obligation to completely cover the whole territory of Japan. According to JBA, there are 207 members in April 2018. Among them are 15 MW, 1 SW, 32 AM+TV broadcasters. (Takahito Akabayashi via wwdxc BC-DX TopNews April 6)

MEXICO Looks like the other shoe finally dropped at XEPRS-1090. After many months of "The Mighty 10-90" failing to make their exorbitant lease payments (reportedly about \$100K/ month, for a station which was 24th in the ratings last I heard) to the owners of XEPRS-1090. the owners appear to have found a new lessee. Starting at about 11:40am today, 10 April, XEPRS suddenly began simulcasting KJAV-104.9 "Ultra 104.9 FM" from McAllen TX, complete with Rio Grande Valley ("RGV") weather and local ads. The format is a bizarre mix of US and Mexican urban contemporary with US classic rock and 90s junk. Announcers, ads and announcements flip back and forth between English and Spanish. Local (Spanish language) announcer was welcoming listeners from San Diego listening on AM 1090. Prerecorded announcements throughout the hour (English and Spanish) mention 840 AM, so they must still be simulcasting KVJY Pharr TX, but the legal ID at top-of-hour mentions only KJAV 104.9 McAllen. Around the bottom of the hour they cut away for XEPRS-1090's ID (in Spanish) along with the obligatory Mexican government PSAs and political ads (badly translated into English by the same guy who seems to have been doing it for about 30 years now). Ironically one of the political ads is for Jaime Bonilla, the sleazy politician who owns XEPE-1700, XHPRS-105.7 (but not XEPRS-1090), who cut the same lessee off those two stations for the same reason several months ago... the same guy who fraudulently "cloned" and moved 3 Ensenada and Tecate stations (including XEKTT/ XEPE 1600/550/560/ 1700!) 15 years ago. Because of what had happened at XHPRS/XEPE a few months ago, staffers at XEPRS have known for months that today's event was a distinct possibility but did not have any advance warning that the lease was being cancelled today. UNITED ARAB EMIRATES One more Malayalam radio station catering to expatriates from the South Indian State of Kerala has shut down its operations in the UAE. Asianet Radio **657** AM became the fourth Malayalam radio station to close down in the past three years, executives of the radio industry told Gulf News. An estimated one million Keralites constitute the largest expatriate community in the UAE. The 18-year-old Asianet Radio stopped broadcasting on February 9 without making any announcements on its closure. A senior executive of the station did not respond to a request for comment.



As Gulf News reported on January 31, two Malayalam radio stations were closed down during the past year. Dubai-based Radio Mango 96.2 FM, launched in August 2014, stopped broadcasting regular programmes in mid-January 2019. Voice of Kerala 1152 AM based in Ras Al Khaimah was closed down in early 2018. In 2016, Umm Al Quwain-based RadioMe 100.3 FM had been shut down.

Malayalam radio professionals in the UAE said drop in advertisement revenue has posed a challenge to the sector. K.K. Moideen Koya, the founding programme director of Asianet Radio, said its closure is a huge loss to the Keralite community in the UAE. "Since the station was launched in early 2000, it made a huge impact on the community," said Koya who was

the director until 2002. "When Asianet Radio was launched, only two Malayalam stations were there. Later when the number of stations jumped to ten [until three years ago] and no new advertisers emerged, the existing advertisement revenue had to be shared by all, leaving a small share to each one," said Koya who is currently media relations director at UAE Exchange.

A high licence fee has also affected the financial viability of radio stations, he said. "The fee [to use frequency] has been increasing every year," Koya said. Echoing the same opinion, head of a prominent Malayalam radio, said: "As an AM [amplitude modulation that has higher reach than FM - frequency modulation] station, we are paying up to Dh4million licence fee per annum, which is not affordable in the current market conditions," said K. Chandrasenan, managing director of Abu Dhabi-based Pravasi Bharathi 810 AM.



Department of Defense to Transmit Interoperability Exercise Info via WWV/WWVH 03/29/2019

The US Department of Defense (DOD) plans to start making use of a provisional time slot on WWV and WWVH to announce upcoming HF military communication exercises and how the Amateur Radio community can become involved in them. The announcements will occur at 10 minutes past on WWV and at 50 minutes past on WWVH. WWV and WWVH transmit on 2.5, 5, 10, 15, and 20 MHz.

"DOD's use of the broadcast time slot on WWV/WWVH will benefit the MARS program's mission of outreach to the Amateur Radio community," said US Army Military Auxiliary Radio System (MARS) Program Manager Paul English, WD8DBY. "The actual messages to be broadcast are coordinated by the DOD Headquarters that the MARS program supports."

The initial announcements are set for the period April 20 – May 3, which coincides with the "Vital Connection" interoperability exercise to be held in Wisconsin. Future time slots will coincide with the Vital Connection exercise Ohio in June; DOD COMEX 19-3 in August, and the DOD COMEX 19-4 in October. Following the proof of concept this year, DOD anticipates making use of the WWV/WWVH broadcast time slot full time, year-round.

At the outset, broadcast messages will likely be static. For future exercises, announcements could be updated throughout an exercise. The messages will direct listeners to a specified website to provide reception reports and feedback.

The reception report will also ask the listener to submit a survey that will be shared among DOD, MARS, and WWV/WWVH personnel. English said that the survey will ask listeners questions about how often they listen to WWV/WWVH signals, how they use them, and what types of messages they would like to hear, but he notes that the survey is still under development.

"We want to provide feedback to WWV/WWVH to improve situational awareness of who is using their service and how it's being used, as well as future considerations," English said.

During the 1950s, and probably before and after, the number of DXers in Sweden always seemed to be much higher than the country's overall population would warrant. And Swedish DXers were organized. There were many clubs, and many of them participated in various "special QSL" events where a club issued its own QSLs for specially dedicated broadcasts. (You can see many of these in "The CPRV Gallery," "Scandinavian Club QSLs.") This time we turn to Sweden under "Specialized Resources/ Radio Postcards," where we have posted a file of photos of Swedish radio installations. It is marked "New." Thanks to ontheshortwaves supporter Lennart Weirell of Vasteras. Sweden who contributed several of these. The postcards are in this order: (1) the Grimeton station building, and (2) the Grimeton VLF antennas (both from Lennart); (3) the Hoerby mediumwave station (Lennart); (4) and (5) two more views of Hoerby, 1933 and 1953 respectively; (6) and (7) two views of the Motala longwave station (Lennart; the second is from 1944); (8), (9) and (10), three more views of the Motala facility, from 1932, 1937 and 1941; (11) another (undated) view of, I believe, Motala; and (12) a view of the station in Spanga.

And occasionally a mediumwave or FM station would show up on another station's shortwave transmitter, or would be used as a seemingly-impromptu modulation source for an out-of-band utility transmitter, or for a special transmission.
