DXM Book Review: Clandestine Confidential by Gerry Dexter: This 64 page book is quite extensive, and covers several aspects of clandestine broadcasting, such as: Clandestine DX'ing (how to identify the clandestine), Clandestine Yesterday (a comprehensive history of clandestine broadcasting), clandestine Tomorrow (countries where clandestines may surface), and the like. Personally, I feel the most valuable, and perhaps the most enjoyable part of the book is the section entitled "Clandestines Today," which lists 30 active countries with clandestines, and a biography on each station. Also to be found in the book are tips on how to verify clandestine, and an interesting article on the infamous Radio Swan. Excellent reading, this book is available from Universal Electronics, 4555 Groves Rd., Suite 3 , Columbus, OH 43232 , for only $\$ 8.95$ (plus 1.75 p\&h), or $\$ 8.95$ (plus 3.00 postage worldwide). Air Force gives thumbs up to over-the-horizon radar: The Air Force announced that it will build an over-the-horizon backscatter radar system on the West Coast. The OTH-B system, as it is known, was developed to increase military preparedness and give fighter aircraft more time to be deployed. The radar has separate transmitter and receiver antennas, each several thousand feet long ( $I$ know where to get my beverage antenna, hi! ids.), which must be separated from one another by about 100 miles to avoid interference. The transmither will be located near Christmas Valley, $O R$; the receiver near Alturas, CA. In addition, the Air Force plans to establish an operations center and software facility at the Mountain Home AFB in Idaho and a systems support facility near Klamath Falls, OR. The construction of the operations center
and the transmitter and receiver antennas is scheduled to begin next year. Lt. General Robert D. Russ, deputy chief of staff of the Air Force, recently testified before the House Armed Services Committee that the new system is necessary because the Soviet Union is working on a bomber capable of carrying missles. Slightly larger than the proposed B-1 bomber, the Soviet aircraft, known as the Blackjack, is expected to be operational before the end of the decade. (It will be interesting -or perhaps frustrating- to see what kind of interference is created by this system. Thanks much to John Trautschold-IL for forwarding this from the April Electronic Design. I hope you are now settled in your new home, John. ds.)

DXM Receiver Review: NRD 515... Best Exalted Carrier. By Ronald Pokatiloff: For SSB and AM listening, the McKay Dymek radios are, by far, the best. But what about Exalted Carrier SSB? Listening to AM stations with the BFO is mandatory in today's crowded bands. I used to think that the ICOM IC-R70 was tops; but no more! My recently obtained Japan Radio NRD 515 is better. Here are my reasons:

1. Wide filters, for better audio, can be used in SSB (ECSSB.)
2. The passband tuning control can be used to position the filter for best bass response while lowering the carrier/BFO phase distortion (the NRD CANNOT produce a clear signal when the filter is placed directly over the carrier- which would give you the most bass.)
3. Stability on the NRD 515 is rock solid.

Believe it or not, I can use my 8 kHz filter in Exalted Carrier; however, the 4 kHz , in my set, is more satisfactory for many stations. In regards to the passband control, it is almost the same as on the Drake R7(a). You can tune BOTH sidebands, and anywhere in between, with this knob. It doesn't even matter if the mode switch is in the wrong sideband position. BoTH sidebands ear be tuned in with the PBT. I am waiting to find out how good the new Eska RX99PL computerized, general coverage receiver sounds with its AM PL detector. It will need a wider filter than the 4 kHz supplied (4, 2.2 standard.) I also wonder how good the new ICOM IC-R71 sounds in ECSSB. This impproved R70 allows the wide filter to be used in SSB mode. Please report if you have the R71. (I appreciate your research and contributions, Ron. ids.)

Updating the Impossible Catches List, by: Michael Schulsinger-OH: By the time you read this sentence, the Polish Pathfinder's Station on 6195 kHz is expected to have left the shortwave spectrum forever. Shortwave writers have included this station on their lists of difficult-to-impossible catches for many years, and its loss will leave a gap which must be filled. I believe I've found a station that's up to the challenge.

The SPEEDX/EDXC Country List says that any broadcast station between 1635 kHz and 30 MHz is a shortwave broadcaster. Immediately above the low end cutoff frequency is experimental station VLZUV, operated by the Univ. of New South Wales in Australia. According to the 1984 WRTH, VLLUV broadcasts on 1692 kHz with 500 watts between 0845 and 1100 GMT . This would give it a nighttime path to the Americas, making reception possible, at least in theory.

For those of you who may not feel that a 500 watt station provides supficient challenge, VL2UV maintains a 200 watt translator on 1720 kHz ! Perhap a prize should be offered to the first person in the Americas who manages to pull one of these out from under the radiolocation beacons? (Well, that would be quite a catch, Mike! If any member Down Under has additional info on this station, please, by all means, send it in! ds.)

SPEEDXer George Cady recently wrote in to query about obtaining a list of shortwave publication addresses. Well, George, the best source I've seen is published by Radio Netherlands. Just write in to Media Network (P.O. Box 222. 1200JG, Hilversum, The Netherlands), ard ask for "The Booklist." It lists many valuable publications, their price, and where they may be obtained. A very handy publication. as.

The following is an article prepared by Neal Purdue. Neal is known in the radio hobby as a pretty sharp thinker when it comes to antennas and their optimum use with a receiver. I'm happy to be able to present his insights. This is part one of two...

## ANTENNA TIPS by Neal A. Purdue, AL

MANY MEMBERS OF THIS PUBLICATION will have never heard my name, so I will do a brief intro. I have been involved with sw radio and other bands, mostly in NASWA and some smaller clubs, for about 15 years. I always had an interest in antennas, especially for the average DXer with an average-sized lot, and have devoted hundreds of hours, maybe thousands, to the study of antenna theory, but most importantly to the nuts and bolts variety of experimentation...putting them up and taking them down, and comparing the results of one against another. The basic rules may have changed a bit with the advent of the new "Hot Front End" receivers, but I have found that the same old rules generally apply and that overload and cross-mod products are the fault of the receiver rather than the antenna. These rules most certainly apply to older tube-type receivers, and I still stay with them as they cannot be beaten in terms of USEABLE sensitivity, selectivity, and resistance to fading, static, and the usual problems heretofore mentioned in the "New Breed" receivers. My main interests at present, in order, are UTES, SWBC (primarily Tropical Bands) and ECB. The receivers in use here are the "Rolls Foyce": R390A, Drake $2-\mathrm{C}$, and Hallicrafters $5 x-100$. During the past nine years I have had the luck to be located atop a mountain in north central Alabama. There is considerable iron content in the soil, and I would have to consider it an excellent location for antenna experimentation, though one of my fellow hobbyists once described it as "making a mountain out of a molehill." All comments in this article will deal with receivers which have the capability of utilizing optimum antennas. I recently tried out a Dx-302 with a full-sized antenna and it went berserk. Such is progress...we sacrifice performance for convenience features!

1) Unbalanced antennas (dipole or inverted-V) are fine for oneband reception. They will usually cover a 500 KHz spread with very good results without a tuner.
2) These same unbalanced antennas are not suitable for multi-band use, even with a "coax-tuner," compared with an inverted-L through a "random wire tuner." The latter may be a bit noisier on some bands, but you will almost always hear more DX with it. There are basically two types of inverted-Ls. The first, and more common, is fed into the receiver antenna input. The second, which is my preference, is the "Marconi" (also known by some other names), which is taken down to a good ground rod or rods, and then fed into the low-impedence antenna input of the receiver via 50 ohm coax. There are antenna tuners available for both types.
3) The single-wire inverted-L, fed through a compatible tuner, is good, but twice as much wire is needed as with the "Marconi." The formula for the former is 468 divided by the lowest frequency worked (in MHz). This is a half-wave antenna.
4) The "Marconi," which is my favorite limited-space antenna, needs only to be one-quarter wavelength ( 234 divided by the lowest frequency worked [in MHz$]$ ). and is an excellent low impedence general coverage antenna, though a few precautions are necessary to get the most out of it. First, it is considered by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) to be a "lo w-efficiency" antenna, and efficiency can be improved by running parallel wires (such as lampcord). The type of tuner used with this is a "groundplane" random-wire coax tuner. The best one I have found at a reasonable cost is the SST -T1 tuner (P.O. Box 1, Lawndale, CA 90260... or call 213-376-5887). Al 50, a good ground connection is essential. Both inverted-Ls are essentially non-directional. The old adage of "get as much wire as you can, as high as you can" does not apply, as you will get directional effects at higher frequencies if the wire is too long. A longtime friend of mine in the hobby, Tom Al leman, can attest to the remarkable results fo the one-quarter wave groundplane antenna, and the beauty of it is that up there where he lives, snow, ice and winds are a problem, so he managed to string the whole thing inside the house, from his attic down to the shack. He strung a bit over 70 feet of lampcord, and it is resonant (through the tuner) down the the 90 -metre band. Tom asked me for assistance in setting up his antenna arrangement, and because of various factors we could not erect it outside, yet he is now enjoying the best reception, by far: that he has ever had. The best configuration on either the one-quarter or half-wave inverted-L seems to be about 33 percent downlead and the rest horizontal.
5) Wire. On any type of antenna the wire used should be of sufficient diameter to withstand local conditions. I recommend no less that \#16 wire in moderate regions, and \#14 up north. If possible, one continuous length should be used, to avoid solder connections which become brittle and are therefore more subject to breaking under stress. AlWAYs use insulated wire. This in no way impairs the quality of reception, and since the fF signals pass along the outside of the wire, corrosion is to be avoided at all costs.
6) If solder connections must be used, coat them with a silicone sealer, such as Elmer's Rubber Sealer. Make sure to scrape them clean and shiny before applying the sealer.
7) Vertical antennas. The same rules regarding length apply with verticals as with any other type of half or quarter-wave antenna. A vertical can be a valuable asset to any shack, as all kinds of things happend to the polarity of signals between the transmitting site and the receiving site. I have run into some occasions when the vertical antenna was the only one which would give decent reception of a particular station.

centered in the middle of the passband at the start, so you can lose the signal completely if you turn the PBT control too far in the wrong direction. Something similar to this happens in the AM mode. In the extreme clockwise or counterclockwise position the control is knocking off some of the carrier so signal strength will be down noticeably on the S-meter. Nevertheless, even in the sharpest configuration, audio quality remains good since nearly all of one sideband is retained. Really, this device is almost $100 \%$ efficient in eliminating "slop" from nearby signals. Of course if you're trying to clear up a signal that's barefraising the needle on its own and it's 5 kHz away from a signal that just about "pins the meter" all one can expect is considerable improvement and not total eradication of the problem. It wipes "hets" too, provided they lie within the sideband you're attenuating, and in this case they're gone-no vestiges remain.
What you can't get rid of with PBT, you can usually get rid of with the notch. It's 30db deep, very sharp, and spans a usable range of plus-or-minus 1.3 kiz . However, in Aif mode, the notch is centered about 2 kHz below the displayed frequency. It is well-centered for SSB and CW operation. Detuning somewhat on AM helps to bring the notch into the ballpark, so to speak.
One has to remember that this radio's ancestors were engineered as SSB transceivers and probably the AM capability was offered in the R70 as an attempt to siden the market to include SWLs as well as to entice the occasional "ham" who is also interested in general band-tuning throughout the spectrum. To keep the price competitive, which it most certainly is at $\$ 550$, certain compromises with excellence had to be made.

The first of these is the wide and mediocre quality AM filters. 6 kHz is too side nowadays; 4 kHz with a better shape factor would have been a better choice. Still the installed filters aren't nearly so wide as the 6 kHz filters in the modified Kenwood I had.
The second compromise, and a really weird one, is that the second IF center frequencies are offset from one another as much as 1.5 kHz in the various modes of reception. This makes for some very confusing anomalies at the ends of each 1000 kiz range. This I won't get into. Read the reviews of others; but don't let it scare you off. One does have to learn a lot to get the most out of this set, but it's worth it. Assuming you're looking for a really outstanding receiver with the capabilities this one has, you're not going to mind. Especially for only $\$ 650$ !
One last littlenicety: the digital display, on its left end, even shows which mode you're tuning and which BFO (A or B) you're using.
As far as I could determine, there's no misleading "hype" in the specs that they don't back up with performance. ICOM is selling an outstanding piece of equipment for a price that is almost ridiculously low. As little as two years ago, comparable equipment was selling for more than twice the price of the R70 today.
On a final note, I encourage others to write up their own views on the ICOM IC-R70 and send them to "Tips and Topics". Several opinions tend to give an objective balance to the discussion of any topic. I'm sure Art will welcome your contribution to "Tips and Topics", so let's hear it from out there "ior" (or "against") the R70!

The USSR High Frequency Broadcast Newsletter (UHN) is a must for getting the exact transmitter site of Radio Moscow transmitters. A subscription of $\$ 3$ in North America or $\$ 4$ overseas for 8 issues can be sought from Roger Legge, Box 232, McLean, VA 22101. The latest edition of the UFN appeared in the April 1984 Station Skeds column, page 16.

The Soviet Republics that are covered in the Europe column are the Russian SFSR (West of the Ural Mountains), Ukrainian SSR, Byelorussian SSR, Moldavian SSR, Lithuanian SSR, Latvian SSR \& Estonian SSR. The Soviet Republics that should be reported to the Asia/Oceania column are Russian SFSR (East of the Ural Mountains), Uzbek SSR, Kazakh SSR, Azerbaijan SSR, Georgian SSR, Tadzhik SSR, Kirghiz SSR, Armenian SSR \& Turknen SSR.

There is one transmitter site that I don't know the location. Does anyone know where Taldom is?

Where the transmitter site is unknown generally broadcast to Eastern North America will be from European sites and those to Western North America from Asian sites.

Radio Kiev, Radio Vilnius \& Radio Rodina broadcast to Eastern North American should be reported to Europe ( $41,31 \& 25$-meterbands) and broadcast to Western North American should be reported to Asia/Oceania (19 \& 16-meterband). If your not familiar with the meterbands these would be the following MHz bands: $41 \mathrm{mb}=7 \mathrm{MHz}, 31 \mathrm{mb}=9 \mathrm{MHz}, 25 \mathrm{mb}=11 \mathrm{MHz}$, $19 \mathrm{mb}=15 \mathrm{MHz}$ \& $16 \mathrm{mb}=17 \mathrm{MHz}$.

All Radio Yerevan \& Radio Tashkent loggings should go to the Asia/Oceania column. All Domestic service logs should go to their respective Republic wich can be found in the World Radio TV Handbook.

I hope I have covered it all, if there are any logs that you still don't know where it should be sent, if you get it to me by the 6 th of the month $I$ will pass it on to the right column.

to qualify for QSLs. The first complaint is that the average QSO is of the duration measured in seconds vs. an hour's listening to a $S W$ station. When one considers that over 10,000 QSOs are produced by a DX operation of a limited time of a few days, the SWL QSO rule is simply unrealistic. An exercise in arithmetic would prove it would take at least 10,000 hours or over a year to accomplish the job. This based on the assumption of continuous operation and ideal round-the-clock propagation existing. Who or what organization or individual has the capacity in time and finances to conduct such an undertaking under SWL QSL rules? The difference of QSL rules has got to be obvious.
How many ham operators do you know that have a QSL for a QSO with China? Albania? Have you forgotten that for over 30 years China has forbidden ham radio until recently? Albania is another of the same category. Yet as an SWL, one only has to spin the dial of his receiver to a given frequency and BINGO: you have Radio Peiping with no sweat. The same with Albania, etc. Yet, you complain that there is an hours effort of listening, making out reports, etc. It should be obvious that QSLs for those places should be a dime-a-dozen in the ranks of swls in spite of their efforts to obtain them.

There is the complaint of time and monotony in the effort to obtain a QSL card. Mr. Phillips overlooks the fact that ham radio operators do not have lists of fixed times and frequencies on hand to look up and work their desired countries as if by a time table. What about the monotony involved when scanning the bands for hours if not days in quest for that elusive DX? Not to be overlooked is the probability of others involved in the same game ready to beat you to the draw. This activity is pursued with the knowledge that the DX in question has random activity and randon requencies of operation. Also, the probability of no DX becomes an accepted risk in the game. Thus, swLs are not the only ones with their problems of monotony.
The so called carefree operator does not always get to work dozens of countries with time out for typing on the feed bag for the given time it takes to satisfy the requirement for one SWL. QSL. What is overlooked is the old reciprocity theorem: if you can't hear them; you can't work them. Propagation is a big factor with the time differences of locations to be considered as well. Dozens of countries? Hell no! Dozens from the same country would be nearer the truth when one considers the populations of ham operators in West European countries being very numerous. The exception to the rule possibly being an ARRL or CQ DX Contest with ideal propagation conditions. Otherwise that dozens of countries claim is invalid.
When it comes to the complaint of costs of QSLS, IRCs, etc. I always like to relate to the story of how J.P. Morgan was asked what it costs to operate his yacht. His answer to the effect being that if you got to worry about the cost, you cannot afford to own a yacht. Perhaps the same could apply to SWLing and ham radio when one complains of QSL card costs.

Another misleading statement is that one goes to the store and purchases the equipment for that big signal. Mr. Phillips, have your forgotten those police powers exercised by municipalities known as zoning laws that limit one's desire to put up the antenna to go with that big signal? There are relatively few with the large real estate for those big antenna systems. With this country in a severe recession, it is very doubtful there are many hams able to buy such equipment when one considers the sale of cars and houses being at an all-time-low in these times.

Regarding the "Bad Apple" syndrome by Mr. Phillips empirical observation on the PYO undertaking, he mentions how they were listening 14200 up while transmitting on 14195; but, he omits the fact they stated that they were listening all the way up to 14300 ; hence, 100 kHz of the band taken up for listening to replies. Such an excessive use of frequencies only result in Russian roulette and/or frustration as the consequence of poor control. No wonder there were so many who showed their frustrations by the name calling, profanity, and $Q R M$ on their frequency. Yes, Mr. Phillips, I was there to hear it all for myself. Considering their poor control of the situation, I could not blame them. With 30 years experience in chasing EX as qualification, I would rate them among the poorest operators in all my time.
As further proof of my claim, I did conduct an experiment by calling them about 100 kHz up from the bottom edge as directed for 45 minutes with no response. I did check for a clear frequency periodically. Now, can you really claim that they were listening up that far in spite of their giving directions to that effect? For one who is knowledgable of mathematical statistics and probability, I claim a grade school kid can easily form his hypothesis on that issue. Need I say more?
Regarding your respect for the QRP operator who has to work his way through the "Big Guns" by using his operating skills to the maximum, I will inform you that calling from the high end is an old trick that is utilized by them. Time after time I have used it with one or two calls to get a QSO by the result of a smart operator at the other end. By this classic manuever, the QRP operator works his way around, not through the "Big Guns"! However, the PYO operators were not that intelligent according to the results of my experiment; hence, it was a rare exception that this classic manuever failed.

AND THAT'S THE WAY IT WAS

In January I went back to my first love, shortwave listeninn, when I purchased a new ICF-2001. As I pushed the buttons and listened to the synthesizer swish in this interesting receiver, my memory took me back to my introduction to
the hobby during World War II.
Everything was simpler then; the equipment, the band congestion and the interference it produced. But the listening was exciting to anyone of any age, much less an early teenager.

As I turned the dial for the first time on the second-hand Philco console radio my parents had purchased for me for $\$ 45$, one of the first (if not the first) stations I heard was the BBC, London. Immediately my imagination took over as I visualized a distinguished Oxford-accented British announcer speaking so distinctly and calmly in what I inagined was a studio three stories underground while London was being blown apart by the German air force. To a kid wondering what was going to happen to the world, it seemed reassuring.
Over the next couple of years, there were many thrills, but none to equal two letters i received. Both were from parents of American Pows, one held by the Japanese, the other by the Germans. I had copied Pow messages to home from Radio Tokyo and Radio Berlin and forwarded them to the anxious parents. One letter indicated it was the first word of substance received from the imprisoned son. Those two letters were lost long ago in moves around the country, but the memory of them will never fade.

The enemy didn't always do its homework in its propaganda barrages. There was the broadcast from Radio Berlin during a time of severe flooding in southeast Kansas. The German broadcast reported that "all of the coffee in Coffeyville, Kansas had been destroyed by the flood!!!"

SwLing and DXing bring fascinating experiences, and in some ways I enjoy it more than amateur radio (I've been a ham since shortly after the war). But the young dial-twisters and button pushers of today have not known the excitement of monitoring shortwave broadcasts during a world war. Let's all pray they will never have the opportunity to do so.

REVIEW OF THE SHORTWAVE LISTENER'S HANDBOOK Author: Robert J. Traister Tab Books Inc., Blue Ridge Summit, PA 17214

Mr. Traister is the author of a better known book, How to Build Hidden, Limited-Space Antennas That work which is directed primarily to the radio amateur fraternity. In The Shortwave

Listener Handbook, Mr. Traister directs his efforts to the beginning shortwave listener who has no technical knowledge.

In this ten chapter, 191 page book, the beginning shortwave listener is given specific instructions to build 25 shortwave antemnas. All the antemnas in the book are designed for the $4-7-13 \& 26 \mathrm{MHz}$ bands. There is no mention in the book of the $13-16-19-25-$ 31 - 41 or 49 meter bands and no mentions of the frequencies which they occupy. The new shortwave listener is given one short paragraph on how to convert the antenna projects to usable frequencies.
The shortwave enthusiast who buys this book could very well build an antenna far removed from their frequencies of interest. Little knowledge of how to calculate antenna lengths for various frequencies will be gained.

This book has an attractive bright red cover with a shortwave receiver tilted provocatively at an angle. Unfortunately, the cover is the only attractive thing about this book. Mr. Traister leaves the beginning shortwave listener as ignorant of antennas as he was before he bought the book. The unfortunate shortwave listener is out $\$ 9.95$.
