NBC Operates 37 Short Wave Stations Not Heard Generally by the Public

Press Scores Radio Fire Report | Are Used for

Broadcasting from Chicago Is Ridiculed

The newspaper press renews its attack upon radio news broadcast-The subject for the latest outburst is the reporting by radio of the recent Chicago fire.

The Chicago Daily News, summarizing the radio report of the fire under the title of "Radio

Rumors," said in part:
"It would be ungenerous, perhaps, to disparage the valiant efforts of the radio announcers who tried to tell the world about the Chicago fire. They told the world a lot of things that weren't so, and succeeded in getting many people vastly ex-

There were thrills enough in Saturday night's h'g fire if one stuck to the bare facts. But radio has its own methods. The radio boys, untrained in news gathering, undisciplined in the value of accuracy, were doing their best to live up to the young tradition of their

Experiments In Programs

By O. B. HANSON Chief Engineer of NBC

While the general public probably is much more "short-wave conscious" at the present time than ever before, there is vast activity going on outside the broadcast band with which very few persons not connected with radio are familiar.

The National Broadcasting Company operates 37 different short-wave transmitters in addition to its regular broadcasting stations, and these short-wavers are never heard by the general listening public.

The stations below the broadcast band are used for various purposes, some of a program na-ture and others which are at the present time entirely experimen-

The call letters \\ 3XAL, Bound Brook, N. J. and WyXF, Chicago, mean nothing to listeners in the United States but they, are famous around the world.

They are powerful short-wave transmitters used to send NBC programs to foreign countries, and as a result of them, fan mail comes to Radio City from South America, South Africa, Australia and other distant points.

Then the NBC operates four "broadcast pick-up transmitters"

A comic strip like DICK TRACY has a lot of action, gun shots, speeding automobiles, crowd noise, police alarms, sirens and all sorts of noises. And this has all to be worked into a very fast dialogue.

So Brown went into a huddle with the engineers and produc-tion men of WBZ and, after much rehearsal finally achieved a

realistic DICK TRACY.



If it does not get the kind of radio it expects, in the long run, the public will take over the radio, as was done in England, and run it for its own interests. Then no one will make a profit from it.

And perhaps more persons will be better satisfied.

Damrosch Brings the "Classics" to Farm Houses and Apartments

Conductor Still Sees Far Ahead

To describe the variety of audiences that Dr. WALTER DAM-ROSCH used to reach when he first took his symphony orchestra on tour many years ago, some-body wrote that he brought MOZART to mining camps and WAGNER to the wilderness.

Now, every Monday night over an NBC-WJZ network, he not only gets the ear of the American worker with classics but "produces" ROMBERG in the ranch-house and GERSHWIN in the gameroom of the suburban home.

Such contemporaries as FRIML of Charles Martin Loeffler, who wrote the "La Vilanelle du Diable" which recently was given by Dr. Damrosch, have their day in court with the American radio audience as jury, along wit BEETHOVEN and MENDELSSOHN.

A Pioneer

Thus we find Dr. DAMROSCH pioneering in American music every Monday night, reaching new groups of music lovers with new compositions, just as he did years ago in a much more limited field when he gave New York its first taste of the symphonic work Brahms, Tschaikovsky and FUGAR

Dr. DAMROSCH brings to the Packard program on Monday nights the enthusiasm that made an international success of the NBC Music Appreciaton Hour, which recently finished its sixth consecutive season for the school children of America.

With hardly a pause, he went from the task of guiding and stimulating the musical tastes and appetites of millions of boys and girls to the equally congenial work of bringing fine music on regular broadcasts through the Summer to the American home.

Dr. DAMROSCH'S is now the largest orchestra on the air which organized exclusively broadcasting. There are 75 members of his symphony.

Dr. DAMROSCH does not confine the activities of this group of artists to the symphonic field. He selects at will numbers from classification.

esthete the classic as well as the aristocratic music of the classical sort and the appreciative approach to the newer meritorious American compositions.

At the age of 72 he is so far At the age of 72 he is so tar from being a conservative that he points out what radio does for the development of the good singer rather than spend time lecturing on what radio ought to do, fails to do, etc. A recent observation regarding radio musicians of all kinds, from the youngest beginner with popular melodies to the world-famed operatic star, is that the technical requirements are so strict that the performer must do his best at all times if he is to get across successfully to his vast audiences.

He Sees Ahead

Only good diction can succeed on the air, he points out. This leaves the pessimists somewhat in the rear of the procession. And he points out in addition that opera over the air gives encouragement to a much handicapped group, the creators and producers of American works. Hardly a program of Dr. Damrosch's but brings home the truth of one or the other of these acute observations.

To those who have been making themselves mournfully vocal by singing the swan-song of American music, Dr. DAMROSCH says cheerily, and means every word of it:

"I'd like to live to be a hundred so as to see what America is going to do to our music."

He could see ahead, when he became a director half a century ago. He can still see ahead.

ly not experienced-lead to great confusion. I wasn't quite sure at the end who had committed the crime or who had been killed.

"Taxi," the series of dramas starring that movie actor Max BAER, is quite inferior material. It reminds you, in fact, of the less violent heart-throb draymas of the early screen days.

But it is done so engagingly, with BAER himself having such a good time acting it, that you listen despite your better judgment.

On the whole, there is more room for improvement in radio dramas than in any other form.

The solution does not lie necessarily in getting "big names" to act on the air.

It does lie in getting a high standard of material, with fewer and more carefully trained actors to present it.

While at M. I. T. DAVE organized an orchestra in order to pay his way through school. The en-terprise proved successful in and around Boston at college and country club dances, and DAVE continued with it until 1929 when it broke up after a vaudeville tour of the country.

the three mad melodeers, was born March 16, 1908, in Cambridge, Mass., but was moved to Springfield when he was only three weeks old. There he grew up until he reached the height of six feet, four inches, and it was time to go to Dartmouth College,

At Dartmouth, GORDON was a soloist with the Glee Club and in his senior year was leader of the Club when it won the United States championship title. After graduation, he landed a job in a show, "The Dagger and the Rose." Both show and job lasted six weeks, five of rehearsal and one of performances in Atlantic City, but GORDON found it good fun and learned how to live on \$5 a week.

Like DAVE GRANT, GORDON came back to Boston. He wanted to become a newspaperman, but landed the work of a singing master of ceremonies in a night club, while waiting for the job to materialize.

FOR WE have discarded the square shoulders, the leg of mutton sleeves, the epanlets, which contributed to the T silhonette of last year. But we have not abandoned the straight, slim skirt nor the desire to appear as slender as possible. The T silhonette is still with us, only it is the hat instead of the shoulders, that gives the necessary line.

A LOVELY FASHION-these large hats which are almost universally becoming. They are shallow-crowned, straight-brimmed, or with a slight forward dip, and sparingly trimmed. "There is a certain universality of appeal in the poetry mired by his listening audience. that deals with man's longing and his relationship to things about him," he says.

"Poet's Gold" has drawn responses from public officials, professors, housewives, clerks and cab drivers.

In planning a program of poetry reading Ross is careful hot to select poems of too great subtlety.

"I have learned," he says, "that the medium of radio demands each poem shall create an instantaneous emotional reaction. There is no going back once the word is spoken.

"A poem, should therefore, be chosen for its simplicity and for its intimacy. It must contain an experience that is familiar to most mortals, so that it may be readily appreciated by them.

"The subtle poem, one that requires meditation, belongs to the reading room. But the poem that is read must arouse an immediate response. The printed poem is as inanimate as a scored sheet of music. It only begins to live when the voice stirs it to life."

Ross is endeavoring to elim-

Mr. Ross has found that in reading verse over the air a greater emotional response can best be elicited if there is an unobtrusive musical background, and so Emery Deutsch's orchestra softly accompanies his readings with haunting, stirring strains.

Most of the verses read on his program were selected because they are particularly adapted to reading aloud. They have recently been compiled in his new anthology called "Poet's Gold," published by Macauley.


