## This and That

THE SYMPHONY season is on. This week the first Sunday afternoon concert of the season by the New York Philharmonic occurs and will, as usual, be broadcast over the Columbia network from 3 to 5.

Conductorial honors are to be shared by seven musicians this year. OTTO KLEMPERER is the first of the procession of maestri. It is a pleasure to note that LAWRENCE GILMAN, distinguished music critic of the

New York Herald-Tribune, again will comment on the program during the intermission period.

For his first Sunday afternoon concert, Mr. KLEMPERER has selected a program that will not readily escape the label "heavy," especially for those who would rather "ease into" their symphonic music after the Summer's holiday.

A new composition by PAUL HINDEMITH, young German iconoclast, is to be the piece de resistance. It is called "MATHIS the Painter" and comprises excerpts from an unfinished opera arranged in symphonic form.

The remainder of the concert will be devoted to BACH — the Prelude and Fugue in E-flat major — and SIBELIUS' Second Symphony.

There are those commentators who call SIBELIUS the most notable composer of our day. Others

# Insurgent Independents Break Power Held By Great Network Broadcasters

## Hauptmann Trial May Be Put On Air

The American Broadcasting System has received assurance from New Jersey state officials that it will be granted permission to broadcast proceedings of the trial of BRUNO RICHARD HAUPTMANN, indicted for extortion in connection with the LINDBERGH kidnaping, if it finally is decided to allow anyone to broadcast it.

The ABS-WMCA network won acclaim recently through its broadcasts of the inquiry into the Morro Castle disaster.

Whether the HAUPTMANN trial is held in Flemington, New Jersey, or in Trenton, ABS plans to present the entire proceedings without interruption.

It was the only network to broadcast reports directly from the New York police headquarters where HAUPTMANN was held for questioning, or to broadcast from the Bronx County Court House where he was indicted.

Both NBC and CBS also have made application for permission to broadcast the trial.

### Adrian Boult Is Guest

ADRIAN BOULT, conductor of the British Broadcasting Company's Orchestra in London, will be guest conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra for two pair of concerts this season.

## Roosevelt Commends the Radio

President ROOSEVELT for the first time publicly commended radio as an important public service in a telegram addressed to the National Association of Broadcasters, assembled in convention at Cincinnati, O.

"I am not unmindful," the telegram read, "of the special benefits which the radio gives to all the people and to all classes of business as a stimulus of buying power and its assistance to commerce generally."

President ROOSEVELT took the opportunity to praise radio as a great educational medium.

The President also has refused to reply to the demand of Senator THOMAS D. SCHALL (Republican, of Minnesota) that the administration immediately denounce Senator DILL's suggestion that broadcasting companies set up their own news-gathering agencies.

Senator DILL had further stated in the speech to which SCHALL referred that "such a service, operated under Government and censorship and censored by government license, must be established."

It was stated at the White House that Senator SCHALL's letter had been received but that it would be ignored.

## J. T. Ward, of Nashville, Heads NAB

The power usually exercised by the major networks was broken at the recent National Association of Broadcasters' convention in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Policy recommendations that have been opposed by network officials were approved by an overwhelming majority at the convention.

The nominating committee, which for years has been controlled by the networks, was dominated by insurgent delegates of independent stations who managed to elect their candidate for president of the NAB.

Most important of the recommendations, always strongly opposed by networks but accepted by the convention, was that seeking to "legitimize" electrical transcriptions.

That is, the Federal Communications Commission will be asked to cancel the regulation that requires an electrical transcription made exclusively for broadcasting purposes to be announced as such on the air.

WILLIAM S. HEDGES, manager of NBC owned and operated stations, moved that if broadcasters incur any expenses in merchandising commercial programs that expense be charged to the advertiser.

This resolution was defeated on the grounds that it was too ambiguous.

Attention was given to the charge that some stations have a tendency to take advantage of the Code Authority regulation which permits the granting of special rates, provided these rates are filed with the NRA.

The alleged tendency is to make price concessions which are in opposition to the stabilized rates provision of the code.

It was decided to petition the

Talent from Hollywood and Broadway will be cast in these radio versions of plays that have definitely proved their popularity.

The programs will emanate from New York.

# Radio Now Helps Dock Ships And Make American Harbors Safe

## Port Traffic Supervisors Are Aided

By The MICROPHONE'S Special Washington Correspondent

Radio is playing an increasing part in the handling of ship traffic in our great ports.

The Federal Communications Commission is giving encouragement to greater use of radio telephony to guide ships in harbors safely to their anchorage and wharves.

Port traffic supervisors are able with the modern art to direct tugs to take care of incoming ships and fire alarms may be flashed to harbor police and fire-fighting boats.

The FCC recently held a hearing on an application to establish radio service for the port of Philadelphia.

The New York Telephone Company has a similar service for the port of New York and the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company has started a network of radio telephony for the Boston shipping interests.

On the Pacific Coast the San Francisco, Los Angeles and Portland harbors have established similar facilities.

## Reporters Radio Their Own Stories

Reporters with radio transmitters strapped to their backs may be a common sight before long.

The Federal Communications Commission gave permits to two news press associations to operate short wave apparatus of only a half a watt power, to "cover" the national amateur golf championships at Brookline, Mass., recently.

The reporters radioed their running stories of the golf matches by short and ultra-short waves to the nearby club house, whence they were sent to the nation's newspapers by wire.

# The Sage Of Sleepless Hollow Has A Fortune All In Nickels

## Joe Cook Admits He Lived In Evansville

I HAVE been asked to tell the story of my life in words of one syllable so I sat down in a disappearing chair in the confines of my vanishing home at Sleepless Hollow here on dear old Lake Hopatkong. The lake was named before King Kong came out, so I can say that I am king in my own castle, but you know the old saying about an ace taking a king every time.

You may not know it, but for years I have been a very rich man, but I have concealed the fact so cleverly that now, for the first time, it may be told. My fortune consists almost entirely of nickels left to me by my grandfather, who saved the first nickel he ever earned, and then piled up millions on the telephone, that instrument not having been invented at that time.

But to begin at the beginning and forgetting my grandfather and my wealth for the time being, I might say—in fact, I will say—that my professional career began at the age of 13 as a juggler and handy boy with a patent medicine outfit that skimmed through Ohio and Indiana in 1900 under the guardianship of one Dr. AMOS JOHNSON, a gentleman concerned with disposing of his "Elixir of Youth" to the people of that territory.

The ingredients of the compound consisted of quinine, alcohol and a physic and it was recommended for both internal and external ills. My compensation was \$3 per week and board, and in return I exercised on a platform with a flock of Indian clubs—my antics being calculated to entice the more timid of the citizenry to vantage points about the lecture stand, where the doctor would later counfound them

with the merits of his cure-all.

I came into this vale of vicissitudes as JOE LOPEZ, the son of a Spanish father and an Irish mother. My father, an artist, married an American-Irish girl from Pierceton, Ind., and shortly afterward migrated to Grand Rapids, Mich., where he established an art studio.

This venture proving unprofitable, they moved to Evansville, Ind., and thence to Chicago, where I was born. When I was three years old, my father drowned, and almost immediately afterwards my mother died of shock. With an older brother, LEO, I was adopted by an Evansville family named COOK.

At the age of 14 I left Evansville and the medicine shows behind me and staked my all on a railroad ticket to New York. For several months I picked up what has been called a scant living by parading my repertoire of stunts at amateur night performances put on at various vaudeville houses, and, when necessary demanded, giving sidewalk exhibitions for whatever small change might be tossed my way.

I appeared in vaudeville for something like 12 years, my first musical show engagement coming in 1923 in the first edition of EARL CARROLL'S "Vanities."

Succeeding issues of Mr. CARROLL'S revue occupied my time for four or five seasons, and in 1928 I was starred in the circus musical, "Rain or Shine." That show played for two full years in New York and on the road, and then I made the motion picture version of it.

Then I did "Fine and Dandy" and followed with "Hold Your Horses" and now I'm having a swell time on the NBC network.

Let me say at last that I really did live in Evansville, Indiana, and that I am some day going to imitate those four Hawaiians.

## Short Wave Fading from Local Dials

By GEORGE LILLEY

As darkness creeps over the land these Autumn evenings, the 25-meter short wave stations of Europe, heard so well here during the late afternoons, are beginning to fade from local dials.

This is because of the strange peculiarities of high frequency propagation conditions.

Although they readily span the seas and continents while the sun shines, radiations cast on the waves below approximately 26 meters (above 11.5 megacycles) become of little value after dusk drifts over the area between the points of transmission and reception.

Already a few of the trans-Atlantic broadcasters have taken steps to remedy the situation by moving their transmissions up to the higher waves.

DJC, the 49-meter German outlet, is back on the air again at 5.30 P. M., E. S. T., each night after an absence during the months of June, July and August.

For the past few weeks, the Daventry 49-meter voice, GSA, has been taking over the latter part of transmission five, which opens at 6 P. M. on GSD. 25 meters, and the 31-meter GSC.

## Applause By Request

WHEN thoughtless thinkers temporarily engaged in providing radio "entertainment" for the listening public so far forgot themselves as to introduce circus side-show come-on methods, it is time they were exposed to public ridicule. The Christian Science Monitor, accustomed to weighing its words and to knowing whereof it speaks, has done so in an able editorial, headed: "Regimented Laughter." Commenting on the custom of inviting guests to attend broadcasts, The Monitor says:

"When the star comedian gets under way and says something that the announcer thinks the audience should consider funny, an attendant holds up a placard on which is printed in large black letters 'Laughter.' And a spontaneous roar of delight goes out over the air... As the entertainment progresses and the announcer thinks it is time the visitors displayed a different kind of appreciation, his assistant holds up a card marked 'Applause' and in thousands of homes tuning in on the show the comedian's popularity is registered."

Laughter and applause from a studio audience interrupt a program from the listener's standpoint. When they are deliberately manufactured, they become doubly obnoxious.

## Guest Speaks for Mr. and Mrs. Legion

WHEN THE sponsors of the Household Memorabilia program first talked of bringing a poet to radio, there was much eyebrow raising.

The so-called experts could not see the idea of bringing rhymes to the microphone.

But the sponsor had an idea that if millions of newspaper readers, and hundreds of thousands of buyers of books of verse, would appreciate the rhymes of people like BERTON BRALEY, EDMUND VANCE COOKE, WALT MASON and EDGAR GUEST in print, they might well appreciate such a person in person.

So EDGAR GUEST was approached. And he consented. In looking over the success of that program, which has just moved to another and earlier hour, it seems that EDGAR GUEST has been as great a success as an air ace as he has been as a newspaper versifier.

Perhaps the critics were right when they raised their hands when a "poet" was mentioned.

EDDIE GUEST, strictly speaking, is not a poet. He's a lyricist of the man in the street, the fellow who appreciates his home well enough to want to pay off his mortgages and to sit around in it at night—and sometimes with his slippers on.

He's an American poet

rather than an outstanding disciple of standard English verse. He talks American language rather than the Oxfordian of the purist.

Surrounding GUEST's lyrical launchings are several types of music; the dulcet orchestrations of JOSEF KOESTNER, the tenor voice of CHARLES SEARS, handsome young tenor, and the comedy singing trio of TOM, DICK and HARRY.

The program is now, as it was originally, aimed at two people in America called Mr. and Mrs. Their last names are LEGION.

One by one the stock comedians fade.

JACK PEARL says he may come back January 1, but it will be with a different type of comedy. The new style of air comedy will be known as "humor."

JACK BENNY ranks more as a humorist than a comedian. So does DON MCNEIL, newest talker for an automobile program which comes to us September 30.

"DOC" ROCKWELL, who is a humorist rather than a comedian, may yet come back and even MORTON DOWNEY, who is one of radio's keenest wits off the microphone, may soon blossom out as a singing humorist.

Gone will be slapstick and back will come the rapier. A rapier can be used as a baton and a baton waved over the

right people can bring forth music.

And since there is music in laughter, watch for the humorists of the air.

After his impersonation of BING CROSBY the other Sunday evening, FRANK PARKER, tenor, has been offered a contract to make a series of movie shorts, doing his own impersonations of famous radio stars.

A survey taken this week of an even hundred dramatic actors at CBS contained the question, "What program, in your opinion, calls for the deepest concentration in radio today?"

An even 80 answered: "BUCK ROGERS." The reasons given included the delicate sound effect system which calls for as many as seven different microphones being open at the same time, and because every actor's speech must fall right on the cue to carry effectively the illusion of the magic of the 25th century.

Competition, I am told, helps anything. Why shouldn't it help radio? If radio were government-owned there wouldn't be any competition except between members of the government for the privilege of having their say on the air. They would be very lackadaisical about trying to please radio listeners. Even more so than the advertisers who hold radio in the palm of their hand at the present time. For advertisers have learned that they can't get people to listen unless they have a good program and reduce their ad material to a minimum.

And the advertisers supplied the money that brought me all those sporting events on Saturday.

# Programs for Children Range from Nursery Tales to Symphonies

## Milton Cross Stars In Two Broadcasts

From nursery rhymes to adventure stories; from cowboy tunes to symphonic concerts.

Such is the range of programs designed especially for children and presented for their entertainment over the major radio networks in this country.

Some of the programs are prepared with the idea of instructing the youngsters as well as pleasing them; others hope for nothing better than to thrill the young listeners.

Some of the latter type of programs have attracted in past seasons the sharp criticism of educators and parents because of their sensational trends.

Many of these critics have been particularly severe because they feel that children's radio programs are to some extent replacing the influence formerly exerted by children's books.

A glance at this season's schedule of programs for children indicates that there is less of the sensational sort of drama and more of the fanciful, instructive and wholesomely adventurous kind of program.

**Music For Youngsters**  
Of the musical programs for children none is of more importance than Dr. WALTER DAMROSCH's Music Appreciation Hour, broadcast Fridays from 11 A. M. to noon over both WJZ and WEAF.

In this series, now at the begin-

ning of its seventh season, Dr. DAMROSCH discusses and offers illustrations of orchestral instruments, forms of music from the folk-song to the symphony, and masterworks of the world's greatest composers from PALESTRINA to STRAVINSKY.

Many public schools are equipped with radios in class rooms so that pupils may hear these DAMROSCH programs. As a result, it is estimated that some six million school-children are among the listeners.

For younger children is a program titled "ALICE in Orchestra" and presented over the NBC-WEAF chain on Wednesdays at 5:30 P. M.

Adapted from the book of the same name by ERNEST LA PRADE, the program consists of dramatized episodes in a little girl's dream visit to a land where the instruments used in a symphony orchestra live and talk.

### Adventure Stories

Among the most popular of children's adventure series is "BUCK ROGERS in the Twenty-fifth Century," a CBS-WABC feature on Mondays through Thursdays from 6 to 6:15 P. M.

This series is a connected dramatization of fantastic adventures in interstellar space, the characters being BUCK ROGERS, his sweetheart and a strange tribe of people who resemble Martians.

Not dissimilar to the BUCK ROGERS sketches is the "Mysterious Island" series, adapted from episodes in JULES VERNE's well-known novel of the same name.

These are broadcast on the NBC-WEAF network Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 6:15 P. M.

The story is concerned with a group of people who on a balloon

flight from Richmond land on a mysterious island in the Pacific.

### Less Fantasy

Less fantastic children's dramas, dealing with everyday boys and girls, also are listed on the schedule.

"SKIPPY," broadcast Mondays through Fridays over the CBS-WABC network from 5:15 to 5:30 P. M., is among the best known of these programs.

## Higher Wave Lengths Used For European Radio

(Continued from Page 3)

Within a week or so, GSD will be dropped entirely after 6 P. M. in favor of GSC and GSA.

"Radio Coloniale," the Parisian signal on 25 meters, seems to be the one European signal that so far has not planned a shift to higher waves during the American evening session.

For some unexplained reason, the French prefer to broadcast far into the night on their 25-meter spectrum.

This is entirely agreeable to local listeners during the long Summer evenings, but at present no trans-Atlantic station is exempt from fade-outs after 6 or 7 P. M.

Other foreign waves are beginning to put through better signals on the 49-meter band, which is truly a Fall and Winter channel.

From South America is heard a new broadcaster operating at Barranquilla, Colombia, with the

calls, HJ1ABG. The frequency is 49.75 meters or 6.03 meg. s.

They can be identified by three chimes given on the hour, much similar to those of NBC.

Just a bit above 49 meters, two more Spanish voices frequently seep through the code interference that thrives on this particular section of the dial. One is broadcasting from somewhere in Ecuador with call letters HC2B. They are picked up in the late evenings,

The other disseminator is HJ4ABE, Medellin, Colombia, seemingly with more power than before. Its spot is 50.42 meters (5.95 meg. s.).

HJ4ABE is one of Colombia's pioneer outlets and in a country that has been a pioneer in short wave broadcasting.

Fans would appreciate it, however, if it adopted a frequency that would be more free of code distortion.

The Rev. Howard O. Hough, pastor of the First Radio Parish Church of America for the past eight years, now brings his Sunday morning broadcast to the WEEI audience from ten to ten-thirty o'clock.

The First Radio Parish Church of America was born as the result of an experience in broadcasting a regular church service. The interest in this service on the part of the listeners became so keen and widespread, and the communications from so many sources extending over a wide area showing the lives that were being touched and helped, led to a determination to carry on the work on a larger scale.

The facilities of WCSH—Congress Square Hotel, Portland, were offered, and on Sunday, April 18, 1926, Rev. Howard Oliver Hough was inaugurated pastor. Rev. Mr. Hough, whose idea led to the formation of this organization was at that time a minister in the Advent Christian denomination.

Following the announcement of this dedicatory service, articles from the press of the country, voiced a hearty approval of this pioneering enterprise in religious work. Through the same channels the same cause has been frequently commended ever since.

The broadcasting of religious services was not new when the Radio Parish was started, but the thought of organizing and pro-

moting a non-sectarian service by means of radio, and the carrying on of pastoral work as is customary in all other Churches, was different. For a period of more than eight years the Radio Church has continued to minister with success, and in its archives are letters of commendation from men and women of national and international fame. It has come to be one of the outstanding religious influences in New England.

Known in his younger days as the "Boy Preacher," Mr. Hough is a native of Waterbury, Conn., and received his early education in the schools of that city. At the age of 15 he felt called to the ministry and entered the New England School of Theology, Boston. His first pastorate was in a rural New Hampshire community. He has since held pastorates in Rhode Island, New

York and Maine and in recent years has taken graduate studies at the Boston University School of Religious Education.

The scope of the work obviously is enlarged through the facilities of station WEEI which, as always, is ready to present an offering of proven merit and popularity. It is said that to the shut-ins of the sick room, the families in the lonely farmhouse, to the lighthouse keeper and others removed from allied habitation, the program has a particular appeal. The comforts of religion thus brought to the urban listener quite naturally have the same value.

# 'Bill' Has Gypsy Spirit; 'Ginger' Has Common Sense and Charm

## Comedy Duo Got Start In Philadelphia

Housewives, debutantes, invalids, part-time workers, in fact all who have heard the "BILL and GINGER" program broadcast over a WABC-Columbia network Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 10.15 in the morning, know the zest of this gay hammy team.

Their portrayal of a young married couple, singing, quarrelling and forgiving each other, is so realistic that most of their fans think they must be husband and wife.

But they're not. Just good friends since that day in May, 1932, when they teamed up to broadcast over WCAU, Columbia's outlet in Philadelphia.

BILL, known professionally as LYN MURRAY, is nearly 25 and earns more money than many men his age.

But he wants to have much more financial independence before considering wedlock.

When that day arrives, the lady will have to be gifted with a Gypsy spirit if she expects to find happiness with the adventure-loving Bill.

Born in London, England, his real name is LIONEL BREEZE. He managed to attend school there pretty regularly.

### Periodic Lambastings

But even these comparatively prosaic days were punctuated with bicycle tours around the British Isle, and with surreptitious painting of mustaches on the busts of Queen VICTORIA or JULIUS CAESAR.

The pranks resulting in periodic lambastings by the headmaster.

After BILL and his parents (both musically talented) came to America in 1925, he gained their consent to board a freighter for a three weeks' trip.

But LIONEL—as he was known at that time—liked the carefree existence so well that he forgot to go home for six months.

During that period, as a member of the crew of various vessels, he visited British Trinidad, Cuba and coastwise points between New Orleans and Newfoundland.

### A Busy Life

The BREEZE family had settled in Philadelphia and LIONEL eventually returned there.

At the North East High School in the Quaker City he reported for the *Megaphone*, the school publication; joined the dramatic and debating clubs, besides giving plenty of time to studying English, history and music and participating in many of the sports activities.

By the time he had finished high school, LIONEL decided that he didn't want to join the navy, as he had dreamed he would when a boy in England.

Instead he thought it would be fun to become a reporter and landed a job in this capacity on the *Philadelphia Ledger*.

Soon after that he was engaged as an organist in a small church and at the age of 19 made his professional debut as a pianist with a vaudeville act playing one-night stands.

## They're Newlyweds—to the Radio Audience

Then he drifted into radio work and two years ago started the BILL and GINGER series.

### Clear and Cheerful

When the clear, cheerful tones of GINGER are heard announcing at the opening of the program, "This is little Ginger Baker," the words are meant literally.

VIRGINIA (to use her real first name) is a petite damsel, slightly over five feet tall, and weighing about 100 pounds.

Her philosophy is based on a line from EMERSON:

"A strenuous soul hates cheap successes."

Her demure appearance, and almost childlike voice, belie the wisdom and common sense tucked behind her chestnut brown curls.

She believes that show business and radio work is a matter of salesmanship, and that if necessary she could be a success as a saleswoman in the business world.

To her it means charm primarily, not high pressure methods.

### Solo Train Ride

Her charm has been built of wide interests, courage, sincerity and constant activity. At the age of six, when most children suddenly placed in strange surroundings are overcome with fear, little GINGER was started on her first train ride all by herself.

Her mother pinned a big tag on the child's dress, to assure safe arrival at the destination.

Instead of being frightened by the new experience, GINGER recalls it as the most exciting mem-

ory of her early days. That independence has been characteristic of her whole life.

The days are never long enough for GINGER Baker to do all the things she wants.

In the Summer she swims and plays tennis, dances and drives her car.

In the Fall she is among the colorful throngs at football games, operas and concerts.

And during any spare moment at any time of the year, like her partner, BILL, she reads the classics and an occasional modern writer.

GINGER was born in Philadelphia, September 28, 1911. Her father played the clarinet in a Philadelphia band for some time, and her mother was a pianist.

Her original intention was to be a school teacher, but as a child she showed talent for the stage, so she spent her Summers in child acts.

Her first engagement, singing and doing acrobatic dancing, for \$30 a week, came at the age of 11.

As the family insisted that she be prepared for another vocation, she finished high school and business school before turning to vaudeville as one-half the team of "REED and BAKER" which toured the RKO circuit throughout the East and mid-West.

Two years ago she made her radio debut at WCAU with CHARLIE VERNER's band on a local commercial program.

Her one appearance on the flickering screen was in the lead of an educational "Safety First" two-reeler, produced by the State

of Pennsylvania and shown to factories and groups of workmen throughout the State.

Although their program of songs and patter is intended to be entertaining and nothing more, the two songsters like to think that it often accomplishes some real good.

"There's a fellow in the National Soldier's Home in Virginia," reports Bill, "who drops me notes from time to time and I'm proud to be able to take his mind off his troubles for at least a little while.

"Another young person," he continued, "wrote a letter saying, 'You were arsenic today.'"

"The next day she was in a different mood. 'I take it back,' she said, 'You caused me to make up with my boy friend, so you're all right.'"

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# A Promising Hoodlum

**J**AZZ LEFT its honky-tonk stage and grew importantly smart in the hands of a few people.

George Gershwin proved, with such compositions as his cherished "Rhapsody in Blue" that Tin Pan Alley was a cradle for advanced modern music. He matured in the Alley. His first job was peddling songs. His first hit was "Swanee." And he's come a long way since then. He is at present at work on an opera.

There is a sort of myth about the Swanee River. Song-writers are fond of calling it the birthplace of the blues.

Try to find it on a map in any geography book!

Judging by the number of writers of the moody blues who hail from the East Side—the East River is actually the mythical Swanee River.

The Irish cop on the beat where George, and Leftie Louie and Gyp the Blood grew up swore that the tough Gershwin lad was the most promising hoodlum of the lot.

At an early age he learned to flourish his fists and sass the public school teacher.

George was no sissy. He was no arty, dreamy prodigy.

The great change in his life—the great mystery which suddenly took the place of cops and robbers—was an upright piano purchased by Mama Gershwin.

Mama Gershwin purchased it because her sister had one, and she didn't want to be outdone. Also because she thought Isadore should have lessons. Isadore was George's brother, better known now as Ira, the writer of smart lyrics for smart Broadway revues.

It was tough little George who took to the piano instead of brother Isadore.

He was wont to sit at the keyboard, delightedly hammering out with one finger the tunes he heard on mechanical pianolas on the East Side.

That was the beginning. He kept it pretty secret from the guys in the gang, but the installment plan upright laid a spell on him that he has never been able to shake.

George took to it like the proverbial duck to water. One day a school-mate, Maxie Rosen, was playing the violin in the school auditorium.

The kids in George's gang considered Maxie a sissy. They jeered sniggeringly at the strains of "Humoresque."

Side. So he got hold of Maxie and took him home so he could see how well Georgie Gershwin played the piano. Maxie, frankly, was not very impressed.

Neither was the entire Gershwin family, nor what intimate cronies were let in on his passion for the piano. So the necessary obstacles were thrown in his path.

They didn't think he could play, eh? He'd show them! There was nothing very distinguished about his entree into the musical circle. George became a song plugger in Tin Pan Alley for \$15 per week.

For three or four years he stuck to his job, learning a lot about popular tunes, about song writing, and about people.

Then he took a job pounding the piano in Fox's City Theatre. He did this with a definite plan. He figured he might have a little time to compose songs of his own instead of peddling everybody else's tunes.

He marked time until the success of "Swanee" brought him fame, by expertly tickling the keys of pianos in the pit of vaudeville houses.

George turned into the plugger of his own tunes when he peddled "Swanee." It was played by small orchestras without causing much comment, for months.

Then Al Jolson, who was playing in his own show, "Sinbad," heard the tune. He bought the rights to it and

sang it in "Sinbad." Soon everybody on Broadway was whistling "Swanee." And young Gershwin was in line for congratulations. Of it 2,250,000 phonograph records were sold, to say nothing of sheet music.

Now, a quietly vigorous chap and a millionaire, he lives in a Riverside Drive modernistic penthouse apartment, hob-nobs genuinely with the brains and the names of the Broadway theatres and music "cliques."

That, of course, isn't all he does in his Riverside Drive apartment. He composes feverishly. And the black and white keys of his perfectly tuned grand piano have all the lure and challenge of the installment upright which first laid a spell over him on the East Side.
