

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How to Enjoy a Baseball Game on Radio or Television

Perhaps the above title sounds fatuous. Most sports fans would say, "Might as well write a book on 'How to Enjoy Being Happy.'" Yet there are millions of Americans to whom baseball is still something less than a way of life. For their sake, we spend these first few pages on the ABC's of the game.

You can double your enjoyment by marking a scorecard as each play unfolds. Keeping score this way gives you a greater sense of participation and furnishes a personal momento of the game.

Since TV's zoomar lens brings you each pitch and each play in full-screen splendor, you can be your own broadcaster and your own umpire! Decide whether it's a fast ball or curve, a split second before the announcer makes his call. Decide whether it's a strike or ball, safe or out, just before the umpire commits himself. This can be real fun!

Think along with the manager. Baseball is a game of mind as well as muscle. Size up each tactical situation, make a mental note whether you'd bunt or swing away, call in a pinch hitter, etc., and check your judgment against the manager's.

Televiewing can be twice as much fun if you learn to identify certain players by their stance or actions: Peanuts Lowrey's hip-wiggle at the plate, Satchel Paige's ageless shuffle, etc.

Most important of all, pick a favorite team or player. Then you can exult or wince at each hit or strikeout, each win or loss . . . and Devil take the hindmost psychiatrist who labels the whole thing as a simple case of empathy!

Description of the Game

Baseball is played by two teams of nine men each. The visiting team takes the offense (at bat) one man at a time, while the home club's nine plays defense (in the field). After three outs, the teams reverse their offensive and defensive roles, until the home team has made three outs... thereby completing the inning. The usual game lasts nine innings.

The playing field consists of a 90-foot square called the infield, and a larger area beyond it, called the outfield. The batter stands at one corner of the square (home plate), and the other corners are numbered counter-clockwise: first, second and third base. The two baselines which begin at the plate are extended until they reach the fence in the outfield. Everything inside the home plate right angle is fair; everything outside, foul.

Each team consists of a pitcher, catcher, first baseman, second baseman, third baseman, shortstop, left fielder, center fielder and right fielder. The pitcher stands in the middle of the square and throws the ball to the batter. The latter's object is to bat the ball fair and run around the bases, a complete circuit of which is called a "run." The team scoring the greater number of runs wins.

The game is ruled by umpires. The one stationed behind home plate primarily judges whether each pitch comes within a specified range (called a strike) or outside of it (called a ball).

PS: The umpire is never wrong . . . well, hardly ever!

Digest of Baseball Rules

A strike is a pitch which (a) Is struck at by the batter and missed, (b) Enters the strike zone, over the plate and between the levels of the batter's knees and armpits, without being struck at, (c) Is bunted foul, (d) Is batted foul with less than two strikes, (e) Hits a batter's body or clothing as he strikes at it, or (f) Is tipped by the bat and lands directly in the catcher's mitt.

A BATTER IS OUT WHEN:

(a) His fly ball is caught,

(b) His third strike is caught by the catcher,

(c) He bunts foul on the third strike,

(d) His third strike is not caught, providing there is a runner on first base and not more than one out,

(e) He hits an infield fly before two are out and there are runners on first and second or bases loaded,

(f) He tries to hit a third strike and the ball hits him,

(g) After striking the ball, he intentionally strikes the ball a second time, or deflects it while running to first,

(h) After a third strike or fair hit, he is tagged with the ball before he reaches first base, or the fielder holding the ball tags first base before the batter reaches it,

(i) He runs outside the baseline to avoid a tag,

(j) The fielder purposely drops his fly to set up a force play,

(k) A preceding runner interferes with a fielder.

A BATTER BECOMES A BASERUNNER WHEN:

(a) Four "balls" have been called by the umpire,

(b) He is struck by a pitched ball which he is not attempting to hit,

(c) The catcher interferes with him,

(d) A fair hit strikes an umpire or runner before reaching a fielder.

The batter can be called out for a variety of illegal actions. such as failing to bat in proper order, stepping from one batter's box to the other while the pitcher is in set position, etc. The baserunner is called out when tagged with the ball between bases; when he runs into a batted ball before it reaches a fielder; when he leaves a base before a fly ball is caught and the ball is returned to that base before he can come back, or when he runs out of the baseline to avoid being tagged.

Pitchers must use a legal delivery. There are 13 specified manners of deviating from this delivery, and any one of these results is a called "balk," entitling the baserunners to advance automatically one base each.

The ball becomes "dead" and runners return (or advance) to their bases without jeopardy of being put out when (a) A pitched ball touches the batter, (b) The plate umpire interferes with the catcher, (c) A balk is committed, (d) A ball is illegally batted, (e) A foul is hit and not caught on the fly, (f) Interference is called, (g) A fair hit touches a runner or umpire before reaching a fielder, (h) The coach interferes with a thrown ball, (i) The ball touches a spectator, or (j) A legal pitch hits a runner trying to score.

Glossary of Terms

Assist: Credit to fielder who helps make putout.

BACKSTOP: The catcher; also, screened section behind plate to keep fouls from going into grandstand.

BAG: First, second or third base.

BALTIMORE CHOP: Batted ball which bounces near plate and soars very high.

BARNSTORM: Post-season exhibition tour. BATTERY: Pitcher and catcher.

BEAN BALL; Pitch thrown at batter's head; also called "duster."

BEEF: Vehement protest.

BENCH: Seat used by non-batting members of offensive team and substitutes of both teams.

BENDER: Curve ball.

BIG LEAGUE: American or National League.

BLEACHERS: Cheapest seats, unroofed and usually beyond the outfield.

BLEEDER: Lucky hit; also called "scratch hit."

BOOT: Miss a ground ball.

- BULLPEN: Area where substitute pitchers warm up during a game, usually fenced off bordering the outfield.
- BUSHES: Minor leagues; also called "sticks."

CELLAR: Last place in league standings.

CHAIN CLUB: Minor league affiliate of big league team.

CHANGE-UP: Slow pitch thrown with same motion as fastball.

CHOKE: Grip a bat several inches above bottom.

CHOKE UP: Lose efficiency in critical situation.

CLEANUP: Fourth man in batting order. CLUTCH: Vital situation.

COUSIN: Pitcher easy for a certain batter to hit.

CRIPPLE: Pitch following count of three balls and one or no strikes on batter.

CROSSFIRE: Sidearm pitch.

CROWD: Stand close to plate.

CYCLE: Single, double, triple, homer.

DEEP: Far from the plate.

DIE: To be put out, or left on base.

DISH: Home plate.

- DOUBLEHEADER: Two games for price of one.
- DRAG BUNT: Ball lightly hit by bat which is pulled back slowly at time of impact.
- DUSTER: See "bean ball."
- ERROR: Misplay by fielder which prolongs life of batter or baserunner or allows runner to advance.

FAN: Rooter; also, to strike out.

FIELDER'S CHOICE: Throw to retire runner when there is chance to retire batter.

FIREMAN: Relief pitcher.

- FLAG: Pennant emblematic of league championship.
- FOOT IN BUCKET: Batter's forward foot away from line of pitch.

BLOOPER: Weak fly barely beyond infield; also called "banjo hit" or "Texas Leaguer."

FOUR-FOR-O: Four trips to the plate and nothing but outs to show.

FULL COUNT: Three balls, two strikes.

FUNGO: Player throws ball into air and bats it himself.

GARDEN: Outfield.

- GATE: Paid attendance.
- GOAT: Player guilty of serious lapse.
- GOPHER BALL: Pitch hit for homer.
- GRAND SLAM: Homer with bases loaded.
- GRAPEFRUIT LEAGUE: Spring training games.
- GROOVE: Middle of strike zone.
- HILL: Pitcher's box; also called rubber, mound or slab.
- HIT-AND-RUN: Play in which runner breaks with pitch, drawing fielder to bag, whereupon batter drives ball through space vacated by this fielder.
- HOMER: Home run; also, umpire favoring home team.
- HOOK: Curve ball.
- HOP: Sudden rise taken by fast ball.
- HORSEHIDE: The baseball.
- HOT CORNER: Third base.
- JOCKEY: Player who taunts opposition.
- **KEYSTONE:** Second base,
- KICK: Same as "beef;" also, same as "boot."
- KNUCKLER: Pitch thrown with knuckles or fingertips gripping ball.

LEADOFF: First batter.

- LEG HITTER: Player who gets most of his hits by beating out grounders.
- LINE DRIVE: Solidly hit ball traveling almost parallel to ground.
- MEAT HAND: Hand not wearing glove.
- MONKEY SUIT: Uniform.
- MUFF: To drop a ball.
- NAIL: Put out a runner.

NINE: Baseball team.

ON DECK: Player in circle near plate, waiting to succeed current batter.

PASS: Base on balls.

- PAYOFF PITCH: Pitch following 3-2 count against batter.
- PICKOFF: Catch runner off base with sudden throw from pitcher or catcher.
- PINCH HITTER: Substitute batter.
- PITCHOUT: Wide pitch purposely thrown to foil batter or advancing runner.
- pop-up: Short, high fly.
- PORTSIDER: Lefthander; also called "southpaw."

RABBIT BALL: Lively ball.

- RAINCHECK: Ticket stub good for admission to later game in case rain halts play before 41/2 innings are over.
- RECEIVER: Catcher.
- **RELIEVER:** Substitute pitcher.
- RHUBARB: Same as "beef,"
- ROCK: Stupid play.
- ROOKIE: First-year player.
- ROLLER: Slow grounder.
- RUN-AND-HIT: Runner breaks with delivery and batter is committed to strike at ball.
- sлск: Ваse.
- SCREWBALL: Zany player; also, delivery which breaks opposite way from normal curve.
- SHUTOUT: Scoreless.
- squeeze: Play in which batter tries to score man from third with sacrifice bunt.
- swinging BUNT: Hard swing which tops ball and makes it dribble like bona fide bunt.
- TEE OFF: Hit hard.
- WARMUP: Practice before regular game.

Red Sox Announcers



GURT GOWDY-Now 33, Curt heads Red Sox broadcast staff. He won a dozen letters in three sports at U. of Wyoming, was All-Conference basketball forward in 1941. Entered Air Corps after graduation, but incurred spinal injury and was discharged. Started sportscasting in his home town of Cheyenne, Wyo., then switched to Oklahoma City for broadcasts of college sports and Texas League baseball. Moved to Yankee radio and TV berth 1949-50, thence to Boston, where he was instant hit.



TOM HUSSEY-Native of Marblehead, Mass., Tom moved South, entered U. of Florida in 1927 and made radio debut as singer there 1928. After some years of sportscasting in Florida, he returned to New England in 1935 and joined Yankee Network for sports and commercial announcing. Has broadcast Red Sox play-by-play since 1938, and shared telecasting of first screened World Series, 1948.



BOB DELANEY-At age of 17, Bob had first radio job at WTHT, Hartford, Conn. Quit to enroll at Syracuse U., where he doubled as staff announcer over WFBL. Entered Service in 1943, served on Gen. MacArthur's staff and wrote, produced and announced several Army Hour shows over NBC network. Returned to college in 1946 and resumed announcing. Joined WHDH in Boston the next year, and did such a good job on college football broadcasts that he was soon promoted to big league baseball.







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CONNIE DESMOND—Played baseball, football and basketball in high school and college. Attended Notre Dame three years, then broke into radio as broadcaster of Toledo (AA) games over WSPD in 1931. Later became sports director of the station. Also covered Big Ten football games, golf championships, etc., before going to Columbus in '40, New York in '42 (as Mel Allen's assistant). He teamed with Red Barber on the Dodger broadcasts in 1943 and has been a fixture since.



His first day at WIND he broadcast three scholastic basketball tourney games in Lafayette, Ind., then hurried back to Chicago for ticker re-creation of Sox-Cubs exhibition game.





C., then went to Washington to broadcast Senators' games 1941-45. Next year he came to New York to aid Mel Allen in baseball and football, finally landing top Giant job in 1949. Has been topnotch boxing broadcaster nationally for five years.







GUS MANCUSO-Renowned in the National League for more than a decade as a "quiet but brainy" catcher, this former Card and Giant veteran ironically turned to talking for a living. Broke into broadcasting in the Spring of 1951 covering the Houston Buffs of the Texas League. When Gabby Street died a few months later, Gus auditioned for the broadcasting vacancy in St. Louis and won the job as Harry Caray's assistant.



HARRY CARAY-Three-time winner of Sporting News award as best announcer in National League. Bred in St. Louis, Harry got his first break as an announcer in Kalamazoo, Mich. Came to KXOK in St. Louis a decade ago, broadcasting Brown and Card home games, then became exclusively Cards in 1947. The 35-year-old ace sportscaster handles football and basketball games in season.



CAMPBELL A. (STRETCH) MILLER-Got his nickname when his 6-foot 4-inch frame made him the star center on the basketball team of a small college in Illinois. Started broadcasting at Bloomington, Ill. Does not cover road games with Mancuso and Caray. Chief job is to announce commercials between innings, with occasional crack at play-by-play. Aids Caray in Winter sports broadcasts, too.













Broadcasting Chuckles

"I made Bob Ripley's 'Believe It Or Not' with my broadcast of an American Association game which started in one month and ended in the next! It was a night game in Columbus, Ohio, starting on Saturday night, August 31, 1940... but lasted 19 innings and went way past midnight ... ending Sunday morning, Sept. 1." —CONNIE DESMOND

"I'll never forget the time the Pirates came within one pitch of winning the 1938 pennant. But Gabby Hartnett of the Cubs ruined them at 5:47 P.M. (EDT), September 28th, by clouting a home run through the semi-darkness and over the left field wall of Wrigley Field. I fainted dead away at the microphone without giving a signoff."-ROSEY ROWSWELL.

"Late in the 1950 season, with Jim Konstanty doing a great relief job in the last half of the 16th inning, Jack Phillips of the Pirates sent a terrific shot toward left center with men on base. Since the broadcasting booth in Pittsburgh is far removed from the playing area, I lost the outfielders as they dashed toward the ball in the fog-bound night. The crowd sensed that Phillips had broken up the game, and filed toward the exits, as did the Philly players. Groundskeepers started moving the tarpaulin to cover the field. The high-pitched voice of the umpire, coming in from center field, then climactically revealed that Richie Ashburn had caught the ball on the fly, retiring the side. All the players were dumbfounded—as well as this broadcaster, who had already started giving the final rundown on the totals. Philly went on to win the game in the 17th, an outcome particularly important because they eventually won the flag by one slim game." —GENE KELLY. "While serving as announcer for the Ted Weems orchestra, before a large studio audience, I came on stage and drew the loudest laughs of my career. Too late, I learned that my trousers were torn in a very prominent place. In turning to hide the gap from the audience, I knocked Weems to the floor, and the resultant slapstick only made the crowd roar more."—JACK BRICKHOUSE.

"There have been great ad-libbers, who could think fast in a tight spot. But I'm sure no one ever had to improvise for almost a full hour, the way I did one afternoon during World War II. I was coverering the All-Star football game on a nationwide hookup, when fog suddenly enshrouded the field. It was so bad, the players were invisible from the broadcasting booth. Since there was a critical ban on announcing weather conditions, I couldn't reveal my difficulty. So I despatched a series of runners to the field, and as each one brought back a slip of paper with the successive plays, I re-created the action with all the fervor and impromptu excitement I could muster. It worked so well, the Navy later gave me a special award for that day's work."-BOB ELSON.

"Broadcasting an exhibition game between the Pirates and Memphis Chicks, I wasn't familiar with the abruptly elevated infield in this Southern ballpark. As Clem Koshorek, who stands all of 5-foot-4, backed up for a pop fly, he back-pedaled down a steep incline and suddenly dropped out of sight. I was broadcasting from a seat right behind home plate, and when Clem disappeared I was so startled that I blurted, 'Where the hell did Koshorek go?' That remark really put me in the soup!"-BOB PRINCE.

"In 1935, I was doing a re-create of a Senator game, from my WTOP studio. At the beginning of the fourth inning, Arthur Godfrey, with whom I shared an office at the time, sneaked into an adjoining studio and started cutting into my play-by-play, so what the public heard was something like: 'Men on first and third ... burp ... two out and here's Joe Cronin ... burp ... etc.' This went on for several innings. The studio switchboard was swamped with phone calls: a typical one, "Why don't you people get Arch some black coffee—he's as drunk as a monkey!' Godfrey, who is my best friend in this business, continued his prank right through the ninth inning, and it almost ended both our careers in radio when the station executives found out."—ARCH McDONALD.

"One thing I love about the broadcasting business: I don't have to lie about my age any more, the way I did while playing baseball. I was 33 last February 8."-BUDDY BLATTNER.

"It seems funny now, but was stark tragedy for me at the time. The very first night game I broadcast, down in Texas, was in the seventh inning when a player hit a double to left center. As he was rounding second to try to stretch it into a triple, every light in the park went out. I was supposed to keep the mike alive, but my jaw hung open and I remained embarrassingly silent for many long, long seconds, which seemed like hours, before I could think of what to say."-GUS MANCUSO.

• "People still rib me about the time I was working the White Sox-Browns game at Comiskey Park, and decided to take a sun bath in the empty, closed upper deck for an inning. The sunny, warm air put me to sleep. Jack Brickhouse, announcing the game, told the engineer to train the camera on me, and he then told the TV audience: 'There, ladies and gentlemen, is WGN-TV's great announcer, Harry Creighton ... surrounded by all his friends!' "-HARRY CREIGHTON.

Details of 1952 All-Star Game

Under a dismal, rainy sky that finally washed out the game after five innings of play, the National League All-Stars beat the A. L. for the third straight time (and the seventh time in 19 games) by a score of 3 to 2. The game was played in Shibe Park, and the honors fittingly went to two Philadelphia pitchers. Curt Simmons of the Phils started and blanked the A. L. with one hit in the first three innings. Bobby Shantz of the A's (the league's Most Valuable Player) finished the game by toiling only one inning, the fifth. He threw just 13 pitches in successive strikeouts of Whitey Lockman, Jackie Robinson and Stan Musial.

J. Robinson put the N. L. ahead in the first by blasting a homer off Vic Raschi. The junior circuit went ahead in the fourth when Minnie Minoso doubled off Bob Rush, Al Rosen walked, Eddie Robinson singled for one run and Bobby Avila singled through the middle for another score. But in the last half of this inning, Musial was hit by one of Bob Lemon's pitches and Hank Sauer (N. L.'s Most Valuable Player) blasted another Lemon pitch for the winning homer. Summary:
