Dan Wills has agreed to show the Federal Communications Commission's "Patrolling The Ether", a video tape that was lined up for the picnic earlier this year by Jerry.


Power Supply


S E A T T L E S W A P M E E T

The NWVRS met at 10 A.M. on Saturday, July 9, 1983, at the Buena Vista Club House for the regular monthly meeting.

Pages from the Past

On July 2, 1917, Raymond A. Heising made the first talk from an airplane in flight to the ground and six weeks later he took part in the first conversation between airplanes in flight. He also developed ship to shore radio, submarine chaser sets, and single side band transmission. His most famous invention was the system of modulation used in 1915 to broadcast voice from Arlington, Virginia to Honolulu, Hawaii which bears his name. In answer to the question, 'How did you succeed in solving a problem upon which so many had worked for years in six short weeks?' Heising replied that:

"I realized at once that the microphone had, for many years, received the attention of men much more ingenious and capable than myself and obviously I could not hope to do what they had failed to accomplish. Therefore I sought an entirely different method. I realized that the microphone was satisfactory for controlling very small currents accurately. I therefore planned to use it in this way, instead of attempting as did my predecessors, to overload the instrument or to adapt it to carrying larger currents. I worked out a method whereby vacuum tube amplifiers were employed in successive stages, to increase these microphone currents to considerable value, in fact to the same order of magnitude as the continuous wave carrier which it was desired to modulate."

"In a nutshell, the system involved uses amplified audio frequency currents to control the source of plate potential of the oscillator tubes which supply the continuous wave carrier current."



Remembering

A routine day for Radio producer Carleton Morse in 1939 was to rise early, go to the office, write a script for a fifteen minute I LOVE A MYSTERY episode, clear production details for that day's broadcast, oversee a "dress" rehearsal, and direct the east coast broadcast before handing the script to assistant producer Buddy Twiss to handle the west coast repeat.

Although routine, this was the pattern seven days a week. On the weekends when he wasn't writing I LOVE A MYSTERY he was writing ONE MAN'S FAMILY. He wrote over eight hundred and forty individual fifteen minute ILAM episodes and well over thirteen hundred OMF 30 minute episodes.

Eventhough he wrote I LOVE A MYSTERY episodes about two to three weeks in advance, he often tells interviewers that he never knew the outcome of any given senario until the day he wrote it. Sometimes the final twist would be evident to the listeners and sometimes it would seem absurd; but it would always keep you on the edge of your chair. The final episode seldom ever fell on the same day twice in a row. Some mysteries would have 10 episodes, some as many as 30. The average was 18 to 20 fifteen minute installments.

Mr Morse' prolific pen has become the focus of an evergrowing throng on I LOVE A MYSTERY and ONE MAN'S FAMILY fans. They collect ILAM and OMF on tape and trade program logs and memorabilia.

If one were to look, nearly an entire collection of ONE MAN'S FAMILY can be found from various collectors across the nation. It is not so easy with I LOVE A MYSTERY. Of the forty-six titles (each with 10 to 30 episodes) only seven are in circulation, and some of them are missing episodes and lack in sound quality.

While some collectors search high and low for titles like The Snake With The Diamond Eyes, or the Stairway to The Sun, others would be just as happy to locate the two missing episodes which would make The Temple of Vampires complete. Rumors often run down the grapevine in the collector's circles about the illusive "uncirculated" ILAM stories but it has been over ten years since the last full I LOVE A MYSTERY story came out of hiding. It will probably be at least ten more.

I was working on it, was a sort of a game. It was not until the principle was clear that its possibilities occurred to me. Within a very short time, compact aircraft radio telephone transmitters were developed and they did their bit on the western front. International communication occurred to me as the first possibility, but, as you see, broadcasting preceded it, although I am sure that international commercial telephony is simply a matter of continuing development work until the remaining obstacles are successfully surmounted."

MARY LIVINGSTON

Born Sadie Marks in 1906, she married Jack Benny in 1927 and soon became an important part of the Jack Benny Show. Mary died in California on June 30.

WALTER O'KEEFE

Mr. O'Keefe was best remembered as the announcer on Double or Nothing. He also announced on the Lucky Strike Show. Mr. O'Keefe died June 26th of heart failure in a Torrance, Ca hospital.

RAYMOND MASSEY

Although Mr. Massey was best remembered perhaps for his role in the television and movie version of Dr. Kildare, he appeared repeatedly in radio in such shows as Inner Sanctum Mystery, The Harvest of Stars, and starred in the Doctor Fights. Mr. Massey passed away on July 30.

HARRY JAMES

A trumpeter and big band leader, Mr. James was heard during the 40s on the Danny Kaye show, the Frank Sinatra show and the Dick Haymes show. He also shared the spotlight with Johnny Mercer on Call For Music which featured Dinah Shore as mistress of ceremonies. He was 67 years old when he died last month.

LYNN FOUNTAINE

Ms. Fountaine was married to Alfred Lunt. The team is often referred to as the "Sweethearts of the American Stage". Born in 1887 she first performed in New York in 1910 and was one of the first legitimate stage actors to cross the forbidden boundary and appear on Radio. She and Mr. Lunt appeared in 1940 in a benefit broadcast for charity.

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
