The proposal will be published in the June **CALL LETTER** and voted upon at the July meeting.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

A Board of Directors meeting was held prior to the regular Club meeting on May 11th, 1985. Board members present were Dick Karman, President, Frank Plaisted, Vice President, Jim Mason, Secretary, & Jerry Talbott, Member-At-Large.

President Karman recommended that the Board submit to the membership a proposal that annual dues be increased to \$15.00 for regular members and \$13.00 for Associate members. All four board members present approved the proposal. The recommended change will be published in the June CALL LETTER and be voted upon at the July meeting. If approved the new schedule will become effective January 1st, 1986.

The receivers are connected to the secondary coil. Two strong permanent magnets are placed with like poles together and serve to magnetize the revolving steel band but this is destroyed [by wireless waves [and a clicking of the receiver diaphragm is the result.

While this type of receiving tuner has the closest inductance variableness possible with any transformer, it has the disadvantage that the secondary coil cannot be inserted very far into the primary. From long distance transmitting stations, however, the messages will come in better when the secondary is withdrawn from the primary, which makes this tuner very serviceable.
