



"MAC"

On October 10, 1906 in Rockford Illinois, a young lad was born with electricity in his veins. At the same time that Lee DeForest was trying to figure a way to use the amplifier for profit, young Francis entered the home of a telegrapher for the Milwaukie railroad.

By 1912, when the McCann family followed the railroad west to Butte Montana, American (land)Morse was becoming a part of his life. Inevitably the McCanns moved west. First, to Spokane, then to Bellingham in 1914, and to Sand Point Idaho n 1918 where "Mac" would attend high school, edit the Sand Point Bulletin, & met his lovely wife Irene who also worked for the newspaper.

Mac was first licensed as a Ham (7AJQ) in 1927. A clipping from the "Bulletin" of 1927 tells of his construction of a "receiver especially designed to receive the GE station 'WGY' Schenectady, New York", which was carrying the heavy weight fight between Gene Tunney and Tom Heeney. The receiver was set up in Gardiner Furniture Store for all to hear.

On September 27th, 1929 Mac received the call sign KGKX and established the second station in Northern Idaho. With 15 watts

on 1420 Kc, it outclassed the 10 watt peanut whistle in Kellogg. "The station was easily heard not only in Sand Point, but all over Banner County."

1931 brought a move to the University of Washington but the depression cut short his studies. When he and Irene married in 1934 it was decided that Mac would return to school, receiving his Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering from Ganzaga University in 1936 and continuing in Spokane with a position at KHQ.

In 1940 again the McCanns moved west. This time to the FCC monitoring station in Portland. In 1944 Mac was commissioned a Lt. JG in the United States Navy.

At the end of the war it was back to Portland and the FCC where he succeeded Joe Hallock, W7YA as engineer in charge in 1960, serving in that capacity until his retirement in 1975. His "John Hancock" appears on many a commercial ticket including several of mine.

In recent years Mac's poor health curtailed his activity, but he often attended meetings of Marconi's Cronies, and Society of Wireless Pioneers.

Mac became a "silent key" on August 20, 1986 and is survived by his wife, son and four grandchildren. Irene still monitors the 75 meter "Geritol Net" which she always tuned for him.

On October 28th, Andy Bell and Dick Karman had the horor of representing our society at a reception given by supports of National Public Broadcasting station KBPS.


On short notice, our society was asked if it could provide a small historical display which would, in part, commemorate the birthplace of KBPS. This was because the site selected for the reception was the original location of the station before it was sold to Benson Poly-tech in 1923. It is a very impressive home at the corner of NE 22nd & Hancock street.

Using very few pieces, our society pulled together to "install" an exceptional display of radio equipment and justly depicted the vintage years.

Dick Howard provided his Hallock & Watson transmitter, and a superb double button carbon microphone complete with floor stand and 20 foot cable. Andy Bell contributed a button mic with a table stand, and a 1924 Kenedy battery set to the display. Jim Mason allowed us to display his Westinghouse "RA-DA" and a Western Electric Horn.

As Andy & Dick met many influential people from our area, they were also graced with stories from several historians which dated back to Sarnof, the origin of RCA, and the like. Guests included the president of the National Public Broacasting corporation from Washington D.C., city commissioners and school board members.

It was a credit to the society to be able to assemble the display & have members there.
