


Happy Birthday KBPS



Over the weekend of March 19-23, the 75th anniversary of KBPS was celebrated in a series of special events. Originally licensed in 1923 as KFIF, the station's call letters were later changed to KBPS in honor of the station's home, Benson Polytechnic High School in Northeast Portland. On March 19th, a special reception was held at the White House, now a bed an breadfast, on NE 22nd.

The White House was originally the residence of Willard Hawley, Jr., a wealthy Portland lumberman. Mr. Hawley owned the station license under the call sign KYG, operating the station from the basement of his home. In 1923, a group of Benson students saw a "radio station for sale" sign in the window of Stubbs Electric in downtown. They subsequently convinced the school administration to approve the expenditure of \$1800 to acquire the license from Hawley believing the learning of radio was a natural complement to Benson's other fields of technical training. Now operating at AM 1450 and FM 89.9, the station has a long list of illustrious graduates who have gone on to successful careers in radio and television.

NWVRS members Dick and Dan Howard were invited to set up a display of vintage radios for the March 19th reception at the White House. Although the fate of the original equipment from KBPS is not known, Dick and Dan diaplayed a 1920's vintage AM transmitter that had been built by Portland radio builders Hallock & Watson for KGPP, the Portland Police radio station. They also displayed early microphones and speakers. Vintage receivers from Hallock & Watson, Superior, and Norco (all Portland makes) were displayed for the enjoyment of the guests. Appropriately, the radio display was set up in the basement room of the White House from which the stations earliest broadcasts are said to have originated.





Marwol

A Marwol Jewel for an April Fool! Well this is not entirely true because the Marwol radio works very well, although it sounds kind of trashy...true to form for a cheap radio. It does not even have the condenser, other than the grid leak and the tuners, that was used in the audio circuit of many 3-dial sets of the mid 1920's to improve clarity. But in light of what I am about to document in this article, it is no wonder there is no extra capacitor, the company had trouble paying for the capacitors they had! I don't want to solder one in and spoil the originality of this radio. (See my article in the 3-98 CALL LETTER), for the circumstances I went through when acquiring this Jewel!

I took the Marwol up in the shack and took out the chassis. An inspection underneath found a visual lesson in basics, not one of the usual artistry in square busbars, but directly wired with black cloth covered wire. The audio transformers have bare wire poked through holes in the Bakelite chassis panel and soldered to lugs. The pancake low loss RF coils are hung under the panel and things are crowded under there because this is a small radio using only a 7 by 14 inch front panel instead of the usual 18 inch or larger panel. This was only a \$39.95 factory set, and a cut in price from the \$60 Freshman Masterpiece it imitated.

The 201-A tubes tested very good and some had interesting test stickers, dated 1931, from Baker, Oregon. I hooked it up to my battery eliminators, plugged in a W.E. 540AW cone speaker that is noted for it's good tone and started twisting dials. I then logged all the dial settings and received all the local radio stations an old Tuned Radio Frequency set such as this can pickup, all the while noting what poor tone quality the Marwol had.

What's in a name?, with one like "Marwol", I began to wonder. I sent a card to Alan Douglas, Pocasset, Ma., author of the books, "Radio Manufacturers of the 1920's". Alan had been a big help in the past with my Kardon endeavor, (see ARC, Apr. 1994).


Alan has quite an extensive home library and happens to contain copies of popular radio trade periodicals of the 1920's including "Radio Retailing & Jobber" which kept a regular gossip column going about the New York City radio business in the 1920's. They never missed a chance to poke fun at RCA and their pomposities and wrote all they could on the small companies that were doomed to bankruptcy. Alan copied a page of such articles on the Marwol Radio Corp. and also a full page ad from RR&J, Sept. 1925. He sent them to me right away. The ad showed 6 different models and listed a portable, a phonograph panel, a console table, a home builder kit and a loud speaker. It showed my "Jewel" model in a much larger cabinet and two desirable looking models with five exposed tubes. Highest price was a console grand 3-dial with a built in speaker for \$130. The advertisement bragged heavily and emphasized that their "great new factory" would back up the un-changing demand for this outstanding radio success. It listed the upcoming radio shows where Marwol would display it's wares and it listed distributors nationwide, including a C.E. Gay, Portland, Ore.

The articles included told the real story of Marwol. This was a combined name of two owners; Ralph Martin and Irving Wollins, much like our Portland Halowat company by Joe Hallock and Cliff Watson. The company started in 1924 at 85 Mercer St., New York, NY and was quite successful during the 1924-25 radio season. Marwol had by Sept. 1925, moved to a "large factory" at 546-548 Broadway, NYC. RR&J, in it's usual style of reporting, described the Marwol executives, after moving into their new factory as becoming very "silk hattie". They also described the troubles various creditors were having with Marwol listing them by name and how much they were owed. Marwol continued and perhaps had overproduced during the sales season but by Feb. 1926, had filed for bankruptcy, with a total liability of \$195,722.

The company had tried a new product line for 1925-26, apparently at least in part, based on a redesign of the Jewel series cabinet radio, which is the set that I have. By this time, the list of creditors was a mile long and included two condenser companies. Not surprisingly, a second foreclosure was served on this company in Oct. 1926. By Nov. 1926, the two owners were facing criminal prosecution by the District Attorney's office of New York County! This is certainly why my set, with a 15000 series serial number, is shy of a few condensers!

In March, 1927, a meeting of creditors was held to consider an application for bankruptcy discharge by Ralph Martin, former treasurer and general manager of the defunct Marwol Radio Corp. RR&J stated that at that time, a large number of judgements had already been awarded to creditors by various county courts in and around New York City. The flash in the pan success of Marwol is a story of an industry in the making and the less than serious endeavors of "also ran" companies against the real competition such as RCA, Atwater Kent, Crosley and Philco.

We all have lots of radios made by those companies, but it is kind of exciting to own an orphan such as a Marwol. It is real amusement to tell someone you have a Marwol and to hear them reply, "A What?" I plan on researching and listing more of these cute combined radio trade names at a future date. My thanks to Alan Douglas for making this research possible. QSO you next time......IN THE SHACK.

This month I spent most of my time looking up new technology on the web, so when I went to look into old radio I started at the NW Vintage Radio Society's new Web Site.


