
Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$25.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The *Call Letter* has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the founder, Bob Bilbie, and our first president, Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous society members, the *Call Letter* has continued to be a publication that informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held the second Saturday of each month at the Abernethy Grange Hall at 15745 S. Harley Ave. in Oregon City, Oregon. They convene at or about 10 AM for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings).

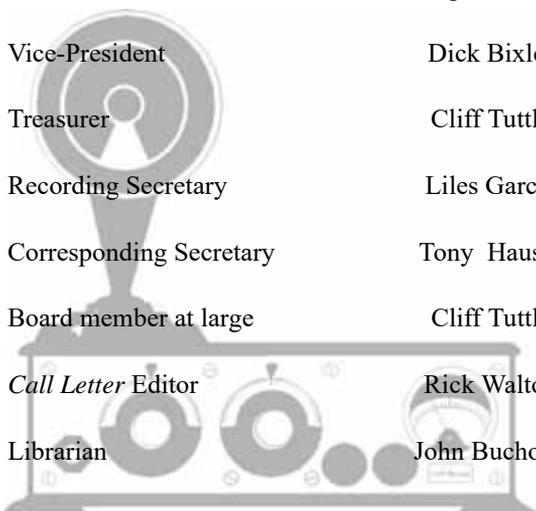
Other Society functions include guest speakers, auctions, radio shows, and radio sales which are advertised in the *Call Letter* and are held in and around Portland.

WRNO, Vancouver

Happy New Year from the WRNO gang! Since Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve fell on Wednesdays, there was no column last month. Last month we continued working on radio phonographs, making some headway, but not completing all of them.

The Zenith was finished and will be proudly spinning 78's for Jerry Hertel in the very near future. This tabletop unit is a simple All American Five radio with a 78 RPM phonograph on top. There were two issues that cropped up on this particular project that are worth mentioning: a product called "Lubriplate" and the Crystal Cartridge.

The first issue that we experienced was with the phonograph mechanism and the lubrication that was used. There is a popular product called Lubriplate (GC Electronics), sold in a tube and intended to be used a general purpose phonograph lubricant. Over time this product will dry out and harden, seizing many of the moving surfaces on which it was applied. Lubriplate is easy to spot; with age, it will be off-white in color and will invite dust and dirt onto the surfaces with it. The lubricant has typically become hard and has cracks present as well. The only sure way to free up these mechanical surfaces is to disassemble and clean all of the surfaces with tuner cleaner, mineral spirits, or Naphtha (I use the latter). Use a silicon based or poly-synthetic grease as a suitable replacement once the surfaces are clean.

The second common issue found on these older phonographs is the cartridge. The output of the crystal cartridge will be weak or not present at all. My recommendation is to utilize the services of a company called: West Tech Services. They will rebuild the crystal cartridge and return it to you post paid for around \$35.00. NOS crystal cartridges rarely work any better, age just takes its toll.

Some of the activities we've engaged in this month include cleaning house, test equipment usage, and restoration of higher tube count radios. WRNO cleaned house, including some donated cabinets full of parts. Tom Hoskins and Robbie Robinson can be seen looking for treasures while Pat Kagi (and his 38 Philco) and Ed Montgomery (with a Zenith 7F02) are finishing up their projects on the bench. Several WRNO regulars received new pieces of test equipment for Christmas, which has

lead to practical usage discussions this month. AF and RF signal generators have been the main topic during the past two Wednesdays along with conversations round the differences between isolation transformers and variacs. That's it for this month.





The Dump

This story goes way back to when I was a little kid... probably about 7 or 8 years old. I have had quite a time trying to remember some of the finer details of this but I think that now is going to be "as good as it gets!"

The year had to be around 1948 or 49 and we lived in Oak Grove, Oregon, a suburban area south of Milwaukee and Portland. Now days, that area is very well developed, perhaps even over-developed. But at that time there weren't so many houses. Lots of vacant land here and there with woods. Fir, maple and oak trees with lots of underbrush and the dreaded poison oak abounded anywhere there wasn't a house. We would go off and play in the woods, down at the river, or



anywhere our parents told us not to go. It seems that compared to today's youth, we just were not watched very close all of the time. It was OK as long as we came home when our parents told us to (sometimes NOT), and since dad was a builder, he always had a piece of lath handy for *that* painful occasion!

My uncle's mother had a quaint little white bungalow, maybe larger than that, on the bluff, with a fantastic view to the West that looked out over the Willamette River and the railroad trestle and bridge between there and the town of (Lake) Oswego. One day, we went to visit her for a bit and played around in her yard. Then we went down to the train track below her place and played on the railroad trestle. We would walk the wooden planks, high up between the trestle timbers and climb down the big ladder to the beach on the river. Steam engines would clunk by above us and drip scalding water down through the timbers. Once, my sister got burned somewhat badly on the arm and we had to take her home, but that's another story. Those places were all on our parents no-no list, remember! Anyway, that day we walked back off of the trestle toward Aunt Marie's place again but before we got there, we were walking the rails and a man shouted at us to get off the track. We were not too good at telling the bums from the railroad workers, since they both seemed to wear shabby clothes, so we ran into the bushes. We stumbled right into a hobo camp. Now we were really scared! But they seemed friendly to us and struck up a conversation. The usual questions were asked, you know, "Where do you kids live? What are you doing down here?" Basically, we asked them why they lived like that and if they liked it. One by one they told us stories about why they lived that way and how they got there. I guess we had enough and told them we had to go but we didn't want to take the tracks because of the man that had shouted to us. We headed straight into the brush toward Aunt Marie's road, climbed over a small hill into a clearing and sat down to talk over our recent adventure.

By now, I am sure you are asking what in the blankety-blank does this have to do with radio! Looking down on the ground, we found a bunch of black cylinder like things with writing on them and prongs sticking out. There were wires and weird looking metal plates sticking out of the opposite end of the cylinders through broken glass. None of us really knew what they were. We started digging into the ground and into the brush, finding more and more of them. We found balls of wire, and square metal things with holes punched in them and funny looking plates that moved into each other attached to the metal. We started reading the strange sounding names that were etched into the side of the black cylinder shaped things with the prongs on them. We threw all of the ones with the same names into our own little piles, to see who could get the most in a pile. I remember that my pile was "Cunningham" with that strange looking "C" and I must have had 25 or 30 of them! We saw Sylvania, Tung-Sol ("What does THAT mean?"), National Union, Silvertone, Arcturus, Crosley, Airline, RCA Radiotron, General Electric, Sonatron, Spartan, Zenith with the neat lightning bolt "Z", Philco, and many other names that I don't remember. Oddly, none of us knew what these things were! Some of them were not broken, but we took care of that, they made a neat popping noise when thrown against a rock. Finally, the fun was over and I stuffed one into my pocket and took it home to show dad. The conversation went something like this, "Dad! Look what I found in the woods up by Aunt Marie's. What is it?" I remember dad saying, "That is a radio tube. We have some of those already." And he pulled the family '42 Philco console out from the wall, which up to that time, I had never looked in the back of, and said, "There they are!" Standing tall above the lowly loctals were two Philco type 41's, just like the ones we had been playing with!

Perhaps that day was the one that changed my life forever and infected me with that lifelong disease... Radiomania!"




The Back Page

Meeting Location

Here is a map (thanks to Google Maps) to the Abernethy Grange Hall (the pointer marked “A”), where the Northwest Vintage Society meets the second Saturday of each month. Just follow the arrows on the map.



To get to the Abernethy Grange Hall:

1. Exit I-205 at SR-213 (Exit 10 to Molalla) and head south on 213.
2. At the first intersection (the traffic light), turn left onto Clackamas River Dr.
3. Turn right at Forsythe Rd.
4. Turn left onto Harley Ave. The Grange Hall is on the left about a block and a half.
