William Ray VanderZanden long time member of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society became a silent key on Friday, February 6, 2015 at the age of eight-six and ten months. Radio Ray as many radio collectors remember him always had



a table at the Society's swap meets next to his good friend Robert "Bob" Campbell. Ray sold mainly battery radio parts and along with a few restored battery sets. His other passions besides radios were socializing with family

Radio Ray had long ties to Oregon. He was born in Oregon, grew up on the family farm near Banks, and attended Forest Grove High School. Ray graduating from Pacific University and the University of Portland. He worked as a chemist for GAF and retired from the Bonneville Power Administration as a quality assurance engineer. The IEEE Proceedings of the eighth Reliability Engineering Conference in Portland was published in his name during April 1981. His second wife of 22 years Sharon and numerous children, four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren survive him. He will be missed at our meetings and swap meets.

TECH TIPS

Tips and Tangled Cords No. 1

A recent project involving a 1948 Buick auto radio lead to this month's column.

While the restoration was unremarkable, testing became an issue, due in part to the vibrator. The original mechanical vibrator had ceased to function, and I was not ready to risk installing a new solid state one. The solid state vibrators are great in a circuit that is working properly, but very sensitive to over-voltage, overcurrent, and polarity issues. The radio uses a 6 pin synchronous type vibrator and not having working example became problematic. My work around was to restore the original to a functioning state in order to test and insure that the radio was ready for a solid state replacement. There are several types of vibrators (Shunt fed, Series fed, non-synchronous, synchronous) and most of them used a foam rubber insulation inside. This rubber material was vulcanized to the can and relay base and in the process, used a significant amount of sulfur. The off-gassing of this process contaminates the contacts with time, leaving them non-functional, even when they are NOS.

Conversations in the past with Bob Campbell and Rudy Zvarich gave me some direction and a couple of ideas for restoring the original mechanical unit. First, I removed the outer case by carefully folding back the crimp at the base of the vibrator with a small pair of diagonal cutters (wire cutters). It takes a couple of passes around bottom to enable the removal of the phenolic base from the metal can. Once the actual relay has been removed, burnish the contacts and adjust the pads so that you can just see a sliver of light through them. Second, you can use the simple dim-bulb circuit shown in Figure 1 to burn off any residual contaminates. Be sure to practice "Safety First" as the circuit below can cause injury if you're not careful, I use an isolation transformer when performing these operations.

Connect the leads from the dimbulb tester to the vibrator across the coil section of the unit.



Looking at the figure below, the leads would connect to pins 1 and 4. The Vibrator should hum and the light should glow dimly. If it doesn't hum and the light does not light, unplug the dim-bulb tester and check for continuity across the coil (if it's open, you're done, toss the vibrator). If your vibrator doesn't hum and the bulb is bright, you have a short somewhere. Again disconnect the dimbulb tester and try to locate short, then repeat the test.

If all goes well, the vibrator will hum smoothly and this process will burn off any sulfur, carbon, and any other contaminates. Run the vibrator for 30 seconds to 1 minute, then unplug the dim-bulb tester, disconnect the vibrator under test, and see if you if you've been successful.

While we are on the subject of auto radio vibrators, *ALWAYS* make sure you replace the buffer capacitor. This will ensure that your vibrator contacts will last a while. Buffer Capacitors can be hidden inside metal covers, or even inside the power transformer cans and will typically have a 1 KV rating or more.



That's it for this column, happy hunting and "keep 'em playing".
