



CONQUEROR OF SPACE by Georgette Carneal 1930 296 pages

"An authorized biography of the life and work of Lee DeForest". Miss Carneal wrote the DeForest story from first-hand sources, the living man. (DeForest was 56 years old in 1930.) This is why some of the bias, inaccuracies, and down right miss-information has found it's way into these chapters.

The account starts with the lonely, puzzled little boy in the Alabama village who, having no toys, is dependent on his curiosity to find out what makes the clock tick and the engine move. There is the awkward country boy who finally achieves his dream and goes to Yale to study electrical engineering, Later in Chicago the young man, in a small hall bedroom, developed the ideas which eventually gave us the three element AUDION. A chapter is devoted to DeForest's method of talking, moving pictures which he called PHONOFILM.

In his patent and court battles, the names of many other radio pioneers are brought to light. Although subsequent events has proven that DeForest was not the most astute business-man, any radio buff will find his story of great interest.



THE SIGN AT SIX

By Stewart Edward White A. L. Burt Company: New York, 1912

If you enjoy early radio fiction, but the thought of reading yet another Radio Boys adventure no longer has the appeal it used to, then try to find a copy of The Sign at Six. This book is an early attempt at science fiction that turns out to be a wireless mystery, a fact not immediately evident from its title. Unlike the Radio Boys and similar juvenile series, it is not written just for children.

The Sign at Six recounts the story of an evil genius who has invented a sort of negative wireless transmitter. Instead of generating waves, this machine can actually damp out or cancel vibrations of any wavelength. With this invention he is thus able to plunge the entire city of New York first into complete silence (by damping out all sound waves) and then into total darkness (by damping out all light waves). Needless to say, the city is quickly reduced to near chaos by these startling effects.

This villain is opposed, however, by one Percy Darrow, "....a young man of scientific training, indolent manners, effeminate appearance, hidden energy, and absolute courage." By means of his superior logic and insight, Percy manages to discover the villain and save the city from destruction, but not before the evil genius, in an act of consumate villainy, freezes the mayor of New York to death. To find out



how this ultimate of horrors is perpetrated, you must, of course, read the book. You will, we are sure, find it an exciting and amusing story that is quite different from the usual radio fare.

A. H. Grebe was one of the pioneers of early broadcasting receivers and is well remembered by his Grebe Syncrophase using the binocular coils. In his advertising he attracted attension with the use of the fictitious Dr. Mu.
