# "O, BOY!"

(and other Fun Radio Finds)

The boy, dog and radio figure, "**O, BOY**" on the cover is almost true to size. The wide eyed listener is six inches tall, solid chalk with a ceramic paint and glaze that has preserved the original color. There is a copyright 1922 on the back with Martin Novelty Co., 132 1/2 S Spring St. Los Angles, Cal. ink stamped on the bottom.

Locating "**O, BOY**" and other "Fun Radio Finds" (FRF's) doesn't happen with a quick sweeping look at a dealers display for radios, speakers and antennae. The FRF's on the back cover required some detailed looking to locate. Of course you don't know what you are looking for, you just have to look at everything. The gold boots, with the words **RADIO BOOT** printed on each boot, were found in a display of jewelry. The **RADIO LOCK** was found in a box of locks (of course). The painted **LEAD HORN** in a printers tray, the **RADIO STROP DRESSING** with vintage cosmetics and the **RADIO REDS PIN** in a cloth tobacco sack with other treasures. The **RADIO LOG** (the log pulls out of the radio like a window shade) was easily seen on the dealers shelf and the match holder **DOG LISTENING to a RADIO** was from another collector. (The 01A is pictured for size reference.)

The FRF's pictured represent a fraction of radio labeled/related items to be located. Radio Flyer wagons, Radio Sweaters, Radio Razor Blades, Radio Electric Razors (recent ARC issue) - there is a picture book waiting to be published of a large variety of products that were promoted and sold with the growing popularity of radio in the 20's.

# NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear IHRS Members,

Greetings! This is my first missive to you as president and as such I want to take this opportunity to wish you all good health and collecting (in that order) for 1995! We had a good turn out for our Winter meet at Indianapolis on February 18th. There were over 130 registered parties and as usual the flea market area was full. The luncheon was attended by about 45 people. A very productive meeting followed thereafter with yours truly conducting the proceedings. We covered a lot of subjects and made a few decisions, so that's about par for the course I guess. I will elaborate on some of the items as I progress with this note. Thanks to Dr. Mike Clark, Alex Whitacre, Bob Shuck and Dr. Ed Taylor for planning this event. I might say the addition of a sound system for use in our meeting was a nice touch and well appreciated! Don't want to forget to thank Mike Clark's secretary, Marcy Culp and Terri Whitacre for handling the registration desk and Shirley Gross for "manning" the Membership table.

Fred Schultz was called upon to speak about progress with the IHRS Radio Museum at Ligonier. (Please see a letter from Fred and another from the Superintendent of the West Noble School Corporation elsewhere in the bulletin.) In a nut shell, the project is progressing rapidly and the museum should open about May 20. Fred and his daughter have been averaging a phenomenal 8 hours/day working on the building, show cases, etc., and filling out voluminous grant request forms! We owe them a real debt of gratitude and are so fortunate to have such dedicated people in IHRS! Fred hasn't asked for any help to my knowledge, but when he needs it, let's not be bashful to lend a hand. On this note, if any of you plan to lend or give the IHRS museum anything, would you please bring it to the May meet if possible. Or, if you don't bring it, consider filling out a museum loan form for Fred. This was a request that came up in our meeting.

Thomson Consumer Electronics commemorated the opening of their new Americas Thomson History Center by inviting members of the IHRS and TCE employees to participate in a product contest. Only RCA, Victor Co. and GE products were eligible. TCE stated the purpose of the displays was to acquaint their employees and other invited guests to the product history of their company. Contest results will follow in another article.

The IHRS Board of Directors, which are the current elected officers, met at Shapiro's Deli in Indianapolis on Feb. 4th to discuss several matters. Many of our concerns were cost related, such as postage increases and cost of reproducing colored photos etc. for the bulletin. The Board decided to continue using 1st Class mail and to use an envelope to send the bulletin. Both are costly but our bulletins do look great and they arrive in good shape. We do want to use colored printing judiciously. As an example, I understand

the colored reproduction cost for the Dec. 1994 issue was about \$388.00, or over \$1.00 per bulletin! Another thing we discussed was the possibility of getting some additional help for the Editor (not that he's asked for any). But Jim Fred and Marilyn Johnston handle the whole task by themselves and we thought they wouldn't mind some help with typing, stuffing envelopes, etc. One member, nameless for the time being, has offered to help with all this and write articles too. Now to my way of thinking, we should latch on to that kind of help, because there aren't many who do offer help. We talked about the advisability of raising the membership dues to \$12.00 starting with 1996. It was brought up to the membership at this past meeting on Feb. 18th and the two comments from the floor were that it was believed \$12.00 wasn't out of line. No decision has been made on this issue as yet. What do you think?? We did decide to do away with the prorated membership fee scale. This was an accounting nightmare. The fee is a straight \$10.00/year running Jan. 1 to Dec. 31. If a person signs up during the year, we'll make an effort to see he gets the back issues of the bulletin for that year, if we have them, but that's it. Current members should realize that your dues are expected early in the year, preferably in January, and if you want a membership card returned to you an sase is appreciated.

The board spent a large amount of time discussing the May meet, especially fee schedule, flea market and Saturday auction changes. I believe a May meet flyer with almost all pertinent information will accompany this bulletin. You will note that there won't be a Thursday evening hospitality hour. It cost us about \$300.00 last year and it was felt that the money saved could best be used to pay for a professional auctioneer rather than beg for a "freebie" as in some years past, and to pay for the Ladies Luncheon and Banquet speakers. Last year we sent out over 2000 flyers at a bulk postage rate of over \$471.00. Flyer printing was free, but not likely to happen again this year. The board decided to buy a full page advertisement in the April issue of A.R.C. This will cost us only about \$200.00. It is expected to be far more effective than mailing fliers....we'll see. I tried to make the May meet a full 2-day event by delaying the auction until Saturday afternoon. This should encourage the flea market patrons to set up Saturday morning and keep up the activity there. Last year on Saturday morning the flea market was a no-mans-land, which greatly discouraged those who expected some action on that day. I know several people came to Kokomo on Saturday for the flea market and there was none. These people wanted to sell as well as buy. By the way, please note the reference to flea market early set-up and sales in the flyer. We're serious about this. Please cooperate.

We hope to be able to offer an auction buyer early check-out, but this will depend on manpower and the auction chairman. We will try to be as flexible as possible and still maintain order.

We have the promise of several very interesting seminars this year. Of course there is room for more and I ask that you all consider offering some

of your restoring "secrets" or a Hint-n-Kink of any sort. These seminars are very casual and don't have to be highly technical or lengthy.

The speakers this year should be very interesting. For the Ladies Luncheon we will have Xenia Cord from Kokomo. She specializes in historic quilts and women's aprons. Those of you who attended the luncheon last year will remember her "WLS" quilt. This year she will have a show-n-tell on "antique" aprons. The luncheon will be held in the Ramada's restaurant alcove this year. Our featured speaker for the Friday evening banquet is also a Hoosier. She is Mrs. Carolyn Churchman. She will speak on "My 50 years in radio". She is a pioneer in early radio and TV in Indianapolis and has hosted many radio programs and interviewed thousands of interesting people all over the world. She says she's interviewed everyone from Queen Elizabeth to Morris-the-Cat! She still conducts an interview show three time a week and hosts a music of the 30's and 40's show on WXLW, Indianapolis. Don't miss this opportunity for a delightfully intertaining evening! By the way, the menu for the Friday evening banquet is the same as last year with "Roast Beef Stuffed with Seasoned Dressing" and "Savory Baked Chicken" as entrees. Cost remains the same too.

If the May meet Old Equipment Contest categories aren't on your copy of the flyer here they are: 1) Made in Indiana, 2) Open class (anything goes), 3) Kits & Home Brew, 4) Pre-1930 Battery Radios, 5) Crystal sets, 6) Tombstones/Cathedrals, 7) Plastic/Bakelite Table Radios, 8) Transistors.

I'd advise those of you who are planning to come to Kokomo in May for the Spring meet to get your motel reservations in early. There will be a women's bowling league here on the same weekend and rooms may be scarce, according to Ramada Inn management. ( I forgot to tell the folks at our meeting at the Winter meet!!) That's why Ramada would only reserve 35 rooms for us on Friday evening, May 12. They did reserve 50 rooms for Thursday, May 11. Motel "6" (formerly Howard Johnson and Kokomo Inn) has reserved 35 1-bed and 5 2-bed rooms for us. All rooms must be reserved by April 1 or they may be lost. Tell them at Ramada Inn or Motel "6" that you're from the IHRS for special rates. Other motels in the area didn't care to reserve rooms for us.

I've covered about all that I can remember. I hope this has been informative. Shirley and I are eager to meet all of you at the Spring meet this May. As usual we are still looking for help with all aspects of the meet at this time. A call of help from you would really ease our anxieties and allow us to sleep better at nights.....well.....that may sound dramatic, but there's some truth to it. Please feel free to call or write about any subject. I look forward for feedback from you.





## THE PASSING OF JIM DI RUZZA

Jim Di Ruzza died January 9, 1995.

For two years we made all the major regional antique radio meets. We sold hundreds of radios and parts to private collectors one-by-one and at auction. AWA, Rochester, September 1994 was Jim's most successful meet saleswise in his entire vintage radio experience. A wonderful Mishawaka IN radio and its companion parts set were some of the 'good stuff' Jim was finally letting go. We collectors will be buying vintage radio parts for years as a result of Jim's conservation efforts.

When we'd plan our trips, Jim would always talk about 'all the fun' we were going to have. And we did! We even had fun over our afflictions. When I'd get on my breathing machine for a half-hour, three times a day, he'd reference my 'smoking my peace pipe'. In the morning when he'd straighten his poor, wrinkled back into shape, I'd reference his 'Jane Fonda exercises'.

We talked often about death in our travels through OH, PA, MI, NY and IL. I was helping Jim manage his affairs in preparation for his death. I heard his descriptions of what the Grunow Plant smelled like back in 1934 when I was two years old. We talked about his fears as the son of an Italian immigrant in the 20s--during the Ku Klux Klan's heydays in Indiana. He would ask me questions he had relating to my field, broadcasting. Our days together were some of the best of my life.

Jim was a member of IHRS for over 15 years. I wrote a biography about him in the Vol. 22, No. 3, September 1993 IHRS Bulletin, pps 12-13.

Jim's Obituary is on the next page.

James A. Di Ruzza, age 76, Dayton OH, passed away suddenly on Monday, January 9, 1995. He was a retired Electronic Technician from DESC, with 20 years of service.

Mr. Di Ruzza was an active member of many Communications and Antique Radio Clubs. He will be sadly missed by his wife, Siglinde (Linda); by 'Spot' and 'BJ'; many relatives and friends. Visitation, Thursday, at the Magetti Gavin Funeral Home, 1508 Valley Street, where the funeral service will be held Friday, with Rev. Henry Chafin officiating. Burial will be in Memorial Park Cemetery. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to the Humane Society of Greater Dayton, 1727 Danner Avenue, Dayton OH 45418.

Sympathy and condolences go to Linda from Jim's friends in IHRS. Her loss is ours, too. (A donation was made in Jim's memory.)

## Thomson History Day

# **IHRS RADIO MUSEUM OPENING MID-MAY! GRAND OPENING SET FOR SEPTEMBER AT LIGONIER.**

Dear IHRS Members,

At this time the plan is for the IHRS Radio Museum to be opened by mid-May. The carpet, rest room equipment and most of the electrical supplies have been purchased and are in the process of being installed as the weather permits. We have completed most of the showcase wiring and are in the process of replacing some missing glass. A wooden fence has been installed at the rear of the building at a cost of \$1800.00. This was paid for by the Tylers (owners of the property). \$600.00 has been donated to the building fund in the last 30 days by local businesses and industries. Using donated labor and careful buying, our building fund is still in good shape.

We continue to receive a considerable amount of publicity. Ft. Wayne television station Channel 12 was in Ligonier filming a 3 1/2 minute segment on the museum. It was aired on the 6 o'clock news and we received very favorable comments. Channel 21 has requested they be the first ones notified when the museum opens so they can do a follow up piece. This along with the Associated Press release has given us a good base as we apply for various grants to complete the restoration.

Many schools, senior citizen and handicapped groups along with travel agencies have already contacted us in regards to scheduling tours. (See letter from West Noble School Corp. elsewhere.)

Things are starting to move fast and before long we need to create a museum committee to oversee types of displays and many other detail that will come up. The whole project requires a lot of work but it is something that the IHRS and the State of Indiana can be proud of.


