IHRS Dues Policies for the New Millennium

IHRS memberships are on a calendar year basis only and run from January 1st through December 31st of a calendar year. There are no partial year memberships and we do not prorate the membership fee if someone joins after January 1 of a given year. What we will do, however, is send a new member all of the IHRS Bulletins for the calendar year in which they join. (There are 4 "Bulletins" that are produced each year).

As of January 1, 2000, dues are \$15.00/year or two years if paid in advance. (The discount does not apply to dues paid in arrears.) Members who paid dues for the year 2,000 or beyond prior to December 26, 1999 will receive a membership card and dues receipt with their next "Bulletin". After that date, the mailing label on your "Bulletin" will serve as your receipt. If you look after your last name on the label, your current dues status will appear, e.g., (12/00) which means that you are paid through December 2000. If your label for this Bulletin reads (12/99), that means your membership has expired and you owe for the year 2000 and you should pay now. We have enclosed an envelope preaddressed to me for your convenience. Please enclose your check, put a 33 cent stamp on the envelope and mail it. If you wish to receive a receipt, please enclose a SASE.

We are adopting the same system used by AWA for membership cards. If you have paid, your card is valid. If you have not paid, you are not a member. You will not receive the next "Bulletin", (#1, Volume 29, Spring edition) if you have not paid by the end of January, 2000. Please pay us now if you owe your dues for the year 2000. (Please note that everyone, paid up or not, has received an envelope and that you need to check your "Bulletin" envelope label for your current dues status.)

Minutes of the Indiana Historical Society Business Meeting, August 28th, 1999, Elkhart, Indiana Fred Prohl, IHRS Secretary

IHRS President, Alex Whitaker opened the meeting at 12:40 PM. The following Old Business was discussed:

- 1) The Secretaries report was waived.
- 2) Treasurer Dr. Michael Clark reported membership at 360 but some names will soon be dropped due to failure to pay dues. Dr. Clark reported \$4,200 in the IHRS bank account. Editor Bob O'Friel noted that the account total will be reduced considerably when the billing for the past three Bulletins is complete.
- 3) Fred Schultz gave a report on the Indiana Historical Radio Museum in Ligonier. Attendance for 1999 is ahead of last year. (Have you been there???) Some donated items have been sold to provide support for the Museum. Fred asked members to seriously consider providing radios for display. The Museum still represents a large number of his equipment. Ideally, the display will represent radios and related equipment from all IHRS members. New on display are three (very rare) DeForest spherical audions. Recently displayed are two telegraph keys donated by Fred Lynn and a tube type baseball radio provided by Charlie Miller. The Museum is open 10AM to 3PM, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday. Fred ended his comments by referring to the Museum's web page located at the IHRS site.
- 4) Alex Whitaker thanked the organizers of the Elkhart meeting for a job well done.
- 5) Ross Smith announced the contest winners for the Elkhart meet. (See pages 15 and 16 of Vol.28, #3 Summer Edition). The following was discussed under New Business.
- 1) Alex announced that a nominating committee will be formed to provide a list of candidates for the year 2000 officers. Members are encouraged to contact current officers if they are interested in active leadership in the organization or, if they want to recommend some one. Members were reminded that the October meeting in Greenfield is the date for Officer elections.

- 2] Due to lessening flea market activity at the IHRS Spring meet, the 2000 event will more than likely be scheduled for two days instead of three as in recent years.
- 3) This year's Elkhart meeting raised the need to have liability insurance cover the organization at the meetings. This cost plus the rising cost of publishing, (and mailing) the "Bulletin", opened a discussion concerning the IHRS dues. The discussion from the membership tended to be concerned with how much (\$12.00 or \$15.00) to replace the current dues of \$10.00 per year. Michael Feldt suggested a "straw vote" to get a feel from the members concerning an increase in dues. The attending members overwhelmingly indicated, by hand vote, agreement to an increase in annual dues. The issue will be placed again at the annual meeting in Greenfield, (October 2nd, 1999) for a formal vote on an increase in annual dues and the amount of increase.
- 4) The meeting schedule is currently set as follows:

Greenfield-October 2nd, 1999 Indianapolis-February 19, 2000 Indianapolis-June 8 and 9 and maybe 10th, 2000

Elkhart——August 19, 2000 A motion was made and seconded to adjourn at about 1:35PM.

At one point, he organized one of the IHRS meets in Richmond. When Lionel Haid became a "silent key". Mary, his wife of many years assumed the role of guardian for this assemblage of historical representations of our hobby. Sadly, Mary passed away on April 29th of 1999 and the collection was still intact. To Carol Carpenter, their daughter, fell the responsibility of what to do with the collection. Fortunately, there were friends such as Bob Snively, who came forward to help, who recommended that an auction would provide the best opportunity to dispose of the collection. He suggested that making a mailing to the members of the IHRS and other organizations would provide an interested audience. This would also enable other collectors to acquire some wonderful (see below)

The auction was well organized and attended. Most all of the desirable items went without a problem. Over 200 bidders were registered from many different states.





There were many treasures including a wood table model Radiola that went for \$30.00, a Crosley Troubador that sold for \$80.00, two AK20s that brought \$60.00 each, a Radiola 20 that was purchased for \$160. A Federal D10 found a new owner for \$100.00 followed by a Splitdorf for \$125. An Automatic "Tom Thumb" went for \$210. whereas a Marshall 5 brought \$300.00. The horn type speakers that were sold included a Magnavox at \$225, an AK "H" for \$90, and an RCA unit at \$175.00.

Minutes of the Indiana Historical Radio Society

October 2, 1999 Business Meeting, Greenfield, Indiana.

IHRS President Alex Whitaker opened the meeting at 12:25PM. The following old business was discussed.

- 1) Minutes of the August 28, 1999 business meeting were read by the IHRS Secretary Fred Prohl. The minutes were approved as read.
- 2) Treasurer Dr. Michael Clark reported an IHRS account balance of \$5,800.00 with approximately \$1,700 owed on "Bulletin" expenses. An additional \$500.00 is due to reserve the Holiday Inn for the February 2000 meeting.
- 3) Following a discussion on the pro's and con's of an IHRS dues increase, a motion was presented to increase the annual dues to \$15.00 per year, or \$25.00 for a two year membership. A discussion related to the value of 1, 2, and 3 year memberships continued until the motion was called to a vote. The motion was passed with a show of hands, 15 to 0.

The following was discussed under New Business:

1) Election of the year 2000 officers. President Whitaker presented a slate of positions and members' names for office as follows:

President - Herman Gross

Vice President - George Freeman

Secretary - Fred Prohl

Treasurer - Dr. Michael Clark

Historian - Ed Taylor

President Whitaker called for additional nominations from the floor. A motion was made, seconded and passed to close the ballot as presented.

The list of candidates was presented to the members for vote and was accepted unanimously.

- 2) A discussion followed concerning IHRS meetings, the frequency and location of meetings. Of primary interest was the annual IHRS/AWA meeting in the Spring. Discussed was the length of the meeting, (two vs. three days in length), accessibility of meeting, auction and contest room space, and the considerably diminished auction the organization has experienced in recent years. It was suggested that publishing the auction contents prior to the meet will improve the interest.
- 3) The Greenfield meet contest winners were announced. George Freeman, Ed Dupart, Mike Feldt, Bill Morris and Ross Smith were awarded ribbons. The meeting was adjourned at 1:25PM.

1930s or Later Portable Tube Radios:


1st - Bill Morris with his Majestic radio. (4)


2nd - Ross Smith with his Sylvania radio. (5)

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





Bill Morris strikes oil with his first place win with his 1930's Majestic portable radio.

Here's Ed Dupart's second place win in the 1920's Battery sets with one to five tubes. It's his rare Klitzen receiver.


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Even Ligonier, Home of the IHRS Radio Museum, had a Radio Manufacturer



The paragraph below is taken from the identification card that accompanies the set that is in the IHRS Museum's permanent display.

Glen Decker was born in 1896. He and his assistants built and repaired radios in Ligonier from the 1920s to the 1950s. A victim of polio, he was confined to a wheelchair most of his life. This radio and the one at the Ligonier Historical Museum are the only two known to exist. Glen died in 1964.

(editor's note, in response to my comments in the last "Bulletin", the author of the following story sent this in as a prelude to future articles relating to his experiences as a Radio/TV repairman)

Debugging a Radio and Circuit Riding Rodents by Gary Behr

After a two year stint in the army, I took a job as a radio/television repair man in my home town of Lawrenceburg, Indiana.

In 1960, the home electronics available were pretty simple--I thought! I found out differently as I gained knowledge. 
