

RADIO Formats Glossary

Adult Contemporary (AC):

Top 40 for baby boomers. A.k.a. adult rock or lite rock. Similar to CHR (see below) format. Includes artists like Elton John, Gloria Estefan, Chicago.

Adult Standards/Big Band:

Mixes non-rock oldies, easy listening, nostalgia and big band music from the '40s through '70s. For example, Tommy Dorsey, The Andrews Sisters, Frank Sinatra, Barbra Streisand, Anne Murray.

Album Oriented Rock (AOR):

Format emphasizes lengthy sets of rock music rather than DJ personality. Some stations stick to mainstream artists (Rolling Stones, Tom Petty, Aerosmith), while others include alternative acts (Big Audio Dynamite, Sugarcubes, Depeche Mode).

Black Adult Contemporary:

New hybrid format blends current urban contemporary hits with R&B/soul oldies from the '60s-'80s.

Classic Rock:

AOR spinoff for rock fans over 18. Familiar songs from the '60s-'80s by core bands like the Stones, the Who, Led Zeppelin, Genesis and Pink Floyd.

Contemporary Hit Radio (CHR):

Top 40 under a new name. Aimed at teens and young adults. Includes cross-section of music from AOR and urban formats. Everything from Paula Abdul to Bon Jovi.

Easy Listening:

A.k.a. easy contemporary. Once known as beautiful music, the kind played in elevators and offices.

New Adult Contemporary:

Combines new age, light jazz and adult contemporary music. Emphasis on contemporary jazz fusion instrumentals by Larry Carlton, Montreaux, Jean Luc Ponty. Some vocals by Basia, Al Jarreau, Anita Baker.

Nostalgia:

Big band and other non-rock oldies from the '40s-'50s. Also variety programs from radio's Golden Age (Jack Benny, Green Hornet).

Oldies:

Rock and pop hits, golden oldies, from the late '50s to early '70s.

Talk:

Mostly nonmusical, personality-oriented stations that air calls from listeners. Formats range from serious to silly to full-service (news, weather, traffic, sports).

Urban Contemporary:

Top 40 geared for younger black listeners. CHR format plays crossover urban/dance artists like Janet Jackson, Bobby Brown.

I love country radio and devote much of my listening hours to it. While traveling, I make notes of various country stations I've heard and their strong points and weak points.

Could you please do a future article on this format? A suggestion: don't devote all of the article to WUSN. A very entertaining station exists in WCCQ (in Joliet), which is partly on satellite and partly local. An all-nite truckers show exists in the Interstate Radio Network, which is broadcast from the WGN facilities, and can be heard coast-to-coast on its various affiliates. (This network plays country.)

Other suggestions: (1) Please update your Radio Station Index when stations change format. For example, WAUR-AM is listed as country and oldies/rock; it has not played country music since June 1990. (2) Could you add listener request-line phone numbers to the Radio Guide section? This would make it more listener-convenient/listener-friendly; especially for new listeners in town, and for new listeners in a different format.

Also, some radio stations have specialized phone lines, i.e., concert phone numbers, skiinfo. phones, weather phones, etc. Printing these numbers in the Radio Guide would be helpful.

Thanks for a great publication. I love radio and enjoy the in-depth profiles of the air talent who have depth to them as well. They don't just mention the call letters and the time/temp/transportation conditions.



BOB STROUD

ACTS OUT THE REAL

When he was growing up in Kalamazoo. Michigan in the 60s listening to Chicago Top 40 stations WCFL and WLS on his transistor radio. WLEP-FM midday personality Bob Stroud had a vision of what life as a disc jockey was like.

"I imagined Barney Pip and Ron Britain and all those guys I idolized getting together at night and hanging out in bars picking up chicks and going to see all these great rock n roll shows "he recalls

Now an 11-year veteran of the Chicago album rock radio wars. Stroud, perhaps best known for his long-running Sunday morning Rock & Roll Roots oldies show on

RADIO LIFE

WLLP-AM finds that his childhood fantasy was a bit more exciting than the reality in fact. Stroud seems almost apologetic that he hasn't done his part to uphoid the popular image of the rock'n roll DJ as party animal.

"You can ask my girlfriend or any of my friends — I'm a pretty unesciting guy," says Stroud. "I don't like crowds. I don't like hars and I don't really like going out to concerts unless it's somebody. I really, really want to see. My idea of a good time is a movie, dinner and then home. I lead the life of a shoe salesman."





Little did veteran play-by-play announcer Vince Lloyd and creative producer Jack Rosenberg figure, as they sharpened their skills working WGN's radio and television sports broadcasts, that they would be called upon to use their vast professional contacts to help create the WGN Sports Radio Network.

But in 1982, Jim Dowdle, new honcho of Tribune Broadcasting, tapped into an unused resource: Lloyd and Rosenberg's address books which bulged with the names and numbers of the various celebrities, business and media types, and radio executives who had finagled their way into the booth during decades of broadcasts.

WGN-Radio had a sleeping giant on its hands, lucrative sports programming that they had not marketed beyond the station's studios on West Bradley Place in Chicago. While a myriad of other pro and

college sports teams reaped financial dividends by linking huge radio networks, WGN's properties, particularly the Cubs, could only pull in Chicago-area ad revenue. Only seven Midwest stations picked up

Cub games on a sporadic basis.

The Radio Network idea had both potential and risks. The Cubs, who already had national appeal and the daytime baseball market all to themselves, were losers on the field in the early 1980s. And any new business venture is fraught with perils.

Dowdle, Rosenberg and Lloyd took the chance, swallowed hard, and two years later, in Lloyd's words, had the "tiger by the tail." The growth of Tribune Radio Networks' sports programming has been among the most explosive in the business.

Stations from Oregon to North Carolina — including such major markets as New Orleans, Denver, Tampa and Las Vegas — signed up to carry the Cubs. And the growing network was a key factor in WGN's regaining the Bears radio rights in 1985 after an eight-year absence. WGN's coverage of the popular NFL team now can be heard in such cities as St. Louis and Tulsa.

Both teams now are fed to a lineup of between 60 and 70 stations, a figure that might have easily passed the 100 mark had not Tribune Networks been limited by rules prohibiting geographic infringement on other team's markets. Lloyd said he and Rosenberg had to reject overtures from several California stations due to the proliferation of professional franchises in that state. Passing the century figure would have allowed the Network to rival in size the radio chains of the St. Louis Cardinals, Cincinnati Reds and Dallas Cowboys, the traditional giants of the team network-radio business.

At a Tribune Broadcasting dinner at the 1990 National Association of Broadcasters convention in Atlanta, Georgia, where the Tribune Radio Networks honored him as "Polk Salad Annie" or "Switching to Glide" as frontman of the 13-piece rock band Rockestra might beg to differ. In fact, Stroud, a boyish 40, presents a study in contrasts.

One of the city's most established album rock jocks, he didn't get his first job in radio until he was 26. He's known for his encyclopedic knowledge of rock'n'roll oldies, yet at home he's more apt to be listening to contemporary artists like Chris Isaak, the Black Crowes or the Waterboys than to the Beach Boys, Lou Christie or Steppenwolf. Working in a format where jeans and a t-shirt are acceptable on-air work attire, Stroud's penchant for sartorial finery has made him a target for some good-natured ribbing from his "Loop" cohorts.

"Let's just say I was well dressed as a child and it carried over into my adult years," laughs Stroud in a typically self-effacing manner. Dressed impeccably in a slate gray seersucker jacket, black linen shirt and pants and a tie with coffee cups on it ("My Twin Peaks Tie," he says), Stroud looks perfectly at home amid the multi-track tape machines, carts and control boards in one of the station's production studios.

A former production director at the old WMET, originally hired by the "Loop" in 1984 in the same capacity, Stroud is something of a whiz at cutting commercials and singing promotional jingles, a talent he attributes to his pre-radio career as an actor in dinner theatre, summer stock plays and musicals.

Rock & Roll Roots, which Stroud originated on WMET in 1980, has been somewhat of a double-edged sword for his radio career. Airing on WLUP-AM Sundays from 9 a.m. to noon, a typical show might include lesser-known hits and obscurities by wellknown '60s and '70s pop acts, local hits by such nearly-forgotten groups as the Mauds and the Riddles, as well as a healthy amount of classic soul music. Between the records Stroud dispenses nuggets of information about the music, or anecdotes about the artists, that are entertaining rather than obtrusive. And when Stroud says he's about to play a "scratchy old 45," often it's from his personal record collection. It's an endearingly retro touch in the current "CD Age."

Roots has such devotees as nationallysyndicated newspaper columnist Bob Greene, who wrote a column a few years ago raving about Stroud's eclectic approach to oldies. oldies jock. That's why he leapt at the chance to do a regular daily airshift on the FM "Loop" when the 10 a.m.-2:30 p.m. slot opened up in 1985.

"I used to feel cornered by my image as someone who knew a lot about old records," he says. "That's why I try to talk about the new music we play as much as I can. Everybody knows I know a lot about the old stuff — that's how I made my reputation. But I know about a lot more than just old records. I think people might be surprised by what I listen to at home, which is rarely oldies."

Still, he doesn't try to hide his passion for classic Top 40 fare either on *Roots* or on the more mainstream *Lunchtime Roots*, a daily feature from noon to 1 p.m. on his weekday show. In fact, Stroud gets a kick out of the feedback he gets from members of the Sunday morning "Stroud Crowd."

"I love it when someone is as passionate about the music as I am, and remembers these songs that nobody else plays," he says.

The "Golden Age" of Top 40 radio made a big impact on Stroud when he was growing up. In fact, he traces his interest in pop music and radio to the fall of 1962.

"I remember songs like 'Sherry' by the Four Seasons, 'Breaking Up is Hard to Do' by Neil Sedaka and 'The Monster Mash' by Bobby 'Boris' Pickett," he says. "And the music being presented by Dick Biondi on WLS in a way I'd never heard it before really got me hooked and addicted to the whole business."

Oddly enough, for a guy who had an early fixation on radio, Stroud didn't make his radio debut until he was in his mid-20s. First came a seven-year career as an actor. Working the dinner theatre and summer stock circuit in Michigan, Indiana and Florida, Stroud appeared in productions with Mickey Rooney and Don Ameche. Eventually, though, he realized he was never going to make it big as an actor.

"What clinched it for me was when I was auditioning for *The Sound of Music*," he recalls. "I was 26 going on 27 and singing 'I am 16 going on 17' and I couldn't hit the high notes. God, I was so embarrassed. I walked out of that audition and said to myself, 'That's it. I'm never getting on a stage again as long as I live.'"

Towards the end of his acting career Stroud had become friendly with a disc jockey who did an oldies program at WQSR in Sarasota, Florida, where he was living. He invited the DJ to meet former teen idol Tommy Sands, with whom he was appearing in a production of *Mr. Roberts.* "But my ulterior motive was to find out how to get into radio," Stroud admits.


Taking the DJ's advice, Stroud put together a demo tape and sent it to the station. Much to his surprise, he was hired to do Saturday and Sunday mornings for \$50 a shift. Within a few months he had become the station's morning man and music director. Two years later, with a short stint at a station in Tampa also under his belt, he got a tip about an opening for a production director at WMET. Much to his amazement, he got the job.

"I was absolutely dumbfounded that I ended up in a market as big as Chicago after only two years in radio," he admits. "It was a dream come true to work in the city whose radio stations I listened to as a kid."

With the exception of a nine-month stint at WYSP in Philadelphia after WMET was sold in 1983, Stroud has been a Chicago radio staple ever since. And despite his earlier vow to stay away from the stage, the opportunity to front Rockestra, which was formed a year ago and plays several times a month at clubs and festivals, was too good to resist.

"I've wanted to be in a band since I was 19 and just never got the opportunity until now," he says. "I think of it as a great hobby."

And this time around, he hits the high notes.



WBBM news reporter Carol Ramos has come a long way from her Brooklyn roots, where her interest in journalism started out with a schoolgirl crush on Geraldo Rivera. From radio jobs in Puerto Rico to small town Indiana, the bilingual reporter has overcome Hispanic typecasting along the way.

WBBM-AM's Carol Ramos has based her career on refuting stereotypes. As Chicago radio's only Hispanic news reporter, in the non-foreign language market, Ramos has been a lone wolf since she started at Newsradio 78 five years ago. As a pioneer, Ramos has worked hard to "make a difference."

The former president of the Chicago Association of Hispanic Journalists and a member of the National Association of Hispanic Journalists, Ramos says, "Our goal is to eventually eliminate stereotypes. And to encourage representation in the media."

Throughout her career, Ramos has practiced what she preaches. For instance, the green-eyed blonde continually refuses to change her looks in order to land a career in TV news.

"I've had at least five people in television management tell me that I don't look Hispanic enough," says Ramos, whose parents are Puerto Rican.

In Miami, a TV news director was determined to hire Ramos, but on his terms. She could have the job only if she dyed her hair black to presumably appear more Hispanic. "I told him, 'I refuse to employee of the year, Rosenberg's acceptance speech was both nostalgic and funny.

"I said that nine years ago Dowdle told Vince and I to shoot 50 arrows into the air and if one hit, fine. If not, just change course," said Rosenberg, now manager of sports for Tribune Radio Networks.

"But I also said I had a mental picture of one of those arrows hitting me right in the butt."

In 1982, as Harry Caray joined the Cubs broadcasting team, Rosenberg and Lloyd had legitimate fears of just such a boomerang effect.

"The first year was a rough one," said Lloyd, now living in semi-retirement in his native Sioux Falls, South Dakota. "But the next year, the stations started calling us early. That was a tipoff it was becoming hot. They [the station owners] probably did a lot of talking to one another."

The Cubs' unexpected first-place finish in 1984, the team's first in 39 years, created an additional layer of fan interest that persuaded stations to sign up. And when the Bears timed their first-ever Super Bowl triumph with their present affiliation with WGN in 1985, the future of the Sports Network was assured.

But a bottom line was also at work. As Rosenberg said of Dowdle's philosophy: "There's no such thing as a good deal unless it's good for both sides."

In a typical baseball broadcast, the deal is 23 minutes of network commercial time and 20 minutes for local ads. The near 50-50 split "encourages stations to come on board," said Rosenberg.

Network time for the 1991 Cub season was sold out long before the first pitch was thrown, and Bears' spots are moving just as fast. With all the money to be made, why wasn't a network created years before, especially since WGN-TV had set up a Midwest chain of stations for all Sunday and selected weeknight road Cub games as early as 1968?

Station management may not have been so marketing-conscious in the pre-Dowdle era. And the executives may have overrated WGN's 50,000-watt signal's reach.

"They may have felt the reach was so great," said Lloyd. "Where would you start to build a network where you'd have to start 130 miles from Chicago?"

Interest was strong in the Cubs and Bears at this distance, and much further. But consistent reception of WGN often was chancy.

Sportscaster Bruce Levine, in the 1970's an expatriate Chicagoan living in far downstate Carbondale, said WGN was impossible to receive during the day. And decent

nighttime reception was only assured for late Cub games from the West Coast.

Peoria Journal-Star sportswriter Dave Reynolds, who covers the Cubs, said the local signal of network affiliate WIRL (AM 1290) in Peoria is much clearer than WGN's at a distance of 150 miles from Chicago.

WGN's daytime signal fades out completely on car radios just south of the state capital, Springfield, and cannot be reliably picked up in central Wisconsin, a popular summer-destination for Chicagoans.

Without local network radio affiliates, a tremendous daytime audience working in offices and factories that does not have access to cable TV and WGN-TV could not easily follow the Cubs.

Thousands of miles from Chicago, the Cubs are a hot property on radio.

"They're very popular in Las Vegas. We have no trouble getting sponsors," said Rosemary Michaels, Laughlin, Nevada station manager of Las Vegas-based KROL (AM 870), a 5,000-watt, dual-transmitter news-talk station. The Chicago-based games have enabled KROL to crack the Top 10 of a 30-station market in the 35-to-65 listener age group.

"So many Chicagoans have moved out here," said Michaels, "the Cubs are our first priority for sports teams. We also carry the San Diego Padres live and the Oakland Athletics on tape delay. But if for some reason we don't pick up the Cub game, the phones go crazy. They're a big seller."

KROL also carries the Bears' broadcasts, which were not as vital in building up the team's appeal as other networks did with baseball teams. CBS-TV already aired many of their games to a national audience, but the team had become so popular by the mid-1980s that far-flung stations clamored for the radio broadcasts.

Under team president Michael McCaskey, who took control of the Bears after grandfather George Halas, Sr.'s death in 1983, the Bears became more marketing-conscious. When the radio rights came up for bidding after the 1984 season, WGN,

along with WBBM, WMAQ and WLS all engaged in a spirited competition to snare the games.

But WGN had special leverage.

"[Wayne] Vriesman, [Dan] Fabian and I were involved in a considerable number of junkets to Lake Forest," Rosenberg said of the WGN negotiating team. "We met with the McCaskeys [Michael and his father Ed], Jerry Vainisi [then Bears general manager] and Bill McGrane [then marketing director]. It was like old home week. I had known these people. The network undoubtedly was one of the big selling points. They were very interested in developing this."

"It keeps us in touch with our fans all over," said Bears play-by-play voice Wayne Larrivee. "The Bears having a radio network isn't as important as it was for the Kansas City Chiefs [his former employer]. They had a huge stadium to fill and needed to pull in people from all over. But it still helps build interest. We get great reaction from the St. Louis area, where they still have the Cardinals [who fled to Phoenix in 1987] on TV."

Bill Coffey, operations director of country-music KUSA (AM 550) in St. Louis, wanted to air the Bears in the fall of 1988, but his Gannett radio division bosses preferred the Chiefs. Coffey changed their minds the following year. The result was the strongest fall ratings book in six years with an increase of two share points in 1989.

"I felt the Bears were a highly popular team, probably No. 1 around here by now with the Cardinals gone, and with Mike Ditka's personality being so dynamic," said Coffey. "I even made the suggestion to our sales staff to bring Ditka down here, pay whatever he wanted, to schmooze with people."


But Tribune Radio Networks couldn't sell every station, a frustrating situation for Lloyd, who found a dead zone in Cub's and Bear's coverage in his native South Dakota where he moved back in 1987.

"There was a Yankton station with a good signal, WNAX (AM 570), that was one of the first stations I tried to get," he said. "But they carried the Minnesota Twins, who are a lot closer to this area. It was frustrating to me. I knew this area and knew there were a lot of Cub fans out here."

Better late than never. Just before the 1991 season began, WNAX dropped the Twins to take on the Cubs. Another arrow had found its mark. And the value of decades of networking was proven once again. \diamondsuit

work for someone who perpetuates stereotypes.' He was really surprised because it was a good opportunity. I'm very proud of my decision," she says.

Ramos' refusal to be typecast hasn't hurt her career as a broadcast journalist. She worked as a radio news anchor in Puerto Rico and Indiana, before moving to Chicago when her husband was transferred here in 1984.

"Good heavens, I never really expected to get a job in such a large market," she recalls.

But she didn't let her hesitations deter her from trying. She attended a women's networking seminar at the Hyatt Regency and did some instant connecting. A couple of weeks later she was working as a TV reporter for Channel 26.

At a 1986 conference of Hispanic journalists in Miami, Ramos wasn't the type to waste away her free time at poolside. She was too busy networking. One new business contact was Greg Peterson, general manager of WBBM at the time. Within a couple of weeks, he hired her as a reporter.

Many Hispanic journalists work to avoid the so-called "Taco Beat" for fear of being typecast as a reporter who only covers Hispanic issues. But once at 'BBM, Ramos aggressively sought to cover the Hispanic community. "From my time at Channel 26, I knew all the players. No one could BS me and get away with it. I'm bilingual, it just makes sense."

But Ramos also covers assorted other stories. "The worst are early morning fires when it's below zero. I love Chicago, but I don't think I'll ever adjust to the winters."

A general assignment reporter and news anchor, Ramos can most often be heard on WBBM during the weekend from noon until 8 p.m. Her daily schedule at the station is always busy and varied.

"First, I look at the computer with electronic assignments. It may simply start with checking out a news tip, either by phone or in person. Or it may mean going to cover a story like a news conference from the governor or a news conference to ban fuzz busters in trucks - just about something different every day. Then, I file the report by telephone. I may get another assignment or I may be needed back at the station. Once there, I can be editing my own tape or enterprising my own ideas for stories or following up on other pieces I've done."

Ramos is the Mother Goose of Chicago journalists because her favorite stories have fairy tale happy endings. A recent example is the story she broke about aspiring, but impoverished, figure skater Larry Holliday. A benefactor for the skater had helped to raise money in his name, but then froze the account and the funds.

Ramos pursued the matter, alerting the state's attorney. The state agreed that Holliday's benefactor didn't have a legal right to withhold the funds.

"Sure, I like to do good; I like to make a difference," she says. "The day I become a cynical journalist is the day I leave the business."

Ramos would especially like to see more positive news from the Hispanic community. "Sure, I realize and agree that gang banging and all the crime that goes on should be reported. But I wish there was enough time to infuse more; there are positive stories."

Ramos, now 32, wasn't always interested in her heritage. The

fact that she was Hispanic really didn't seem to matter. "I was raised in a melting pot called Brooklyn," she says. "We lived in a Jewish area, and I had lots of Italian and black friends."

Geraldo Rivera was her early inspiration. It wasn't so much because of his Hispanic background or for his skills as a journalist. A 12-year-old Ramos simply had an old-fashioned schoolgirl crush on him. She even happened to meet him when her aunt took Ramos to the TV studio (Rivera was working at WABC in New York at the time). The aunt told Rivera about young Ramos' interest in journalism, and he proceeded to escort the two on a personal tour of the station. "It was the thrill of my life," she says.

Recently, Ramos met Rivera again and proceeded to thank him. "He gave one of those, 'Am I that old?' looks," she says. "Here's a grown woman saying, 'I remember loving you when I was 12.' I guess I offended his ego. Maybe that's also because I never complimented his work." She adds that as she grew older her role models changed to the late Frank Reynolds and then Peter Jennings.

Ramos graduated with a degree in journalism from the University of Georgia at Athens in 1980. She took a job in San Juan, Puerto Rico, as a radio news anchor.

At that time her husband, Victor Matos, was an agricultural inspector. In 1982 he was transferred to Huntingburg, Indiana, near Evansville. Ramos hooked up with a local radio station as a news

It took living in an Indiana small town to open Ramos' eyes concerning her own heritage. "I'm sure I was the first Hispanic to live there," she recalls.

One day, a local resident asked Ramos if she carried a switchblade. "Their education in Hispanic culture came from West Side Story and Chico and the Man," she says. She said that the locals weren't malicious in any way, just ignorant.

Ramos' move to the Windy City proved to be more encouraging, but only to a point. On Chicago television there are several prominent Hispanic journalists. In radio, however, Ramos stands alone as the sole Hispanic news reporter in the city's non-foreign language market.

"It's pretty lonely here by myself. And it's a very sad commentary on Hispanic representation," she says pointedly.

Ramos says she is encouraged by Hispanics getting involved in Chicago politics, such as 22nd Ward Alderman Jesus Garcia. "He's a pioneer for others to follow. One day, we'll have a Hispanic mayor. It could be Miriam Santos [city treasurer] or someone else up and coming," she optimistically predicts.

However, Ramos may not stick around fown long enough to find out. "Chicago is a great, juicy news town. But the winters just get harder and harder for me to handle."

She says her dream is to roller blade from Santa Monica to Venice, California. Well, that's what she'll do on sunny days. She'd also like to work part time as a West Coast anchor on either TV or

"I believe in dreaming. Why not?" she says off-handedly.

Speaking of dreams, what sort of advice might Ramos offer to today's aspiring 12-year-old Hispanic reporters? Sounding worldweary, Ramos replies, "Just hope you're judged on ability - just ability. And work hard, really hard."



They sound good together on a.m. drive time – conversational, friendly, "like we're sitting there drinking coffee with people in the morning," says Darryl Daniel, the distaff half of the morning duo on WJPC. She and her partner Harold Lee Rush Jr., a voice familiar to Chicago radio listeners from his years with WGCI, are using all their wiles to woo listeners away from other black urban contemporary stations on the dial during the crucial morning drive time. "We're trying to make WJPC more competitive in the mornings," says Harold.

But Darryl and Harold – even their *names* work well together – are more than just a pair of pretty voices that disappear into oblivion at 10 a.m. every weekday.

After hours, Daniel's involvement with a local anti-drug program takes her to inner-city high schools, where she uses her persuasive personality to give kids a sense of "self-love and self-esteem," she says.

Rush treads the same tough turf. When he's not teaching radio broadcasting at Columbia College, he works through a program with the Chicago Public Schools to reach "hard-core" high school kids, giving them an in-the-flesh role model of what a Chicago public school kid can be when he grows up.

The station teamed Daniel and Rush on March 11, the day that WJPC changed its format to more directly compete with other black urban contemporary stations. Station manager Charles Mootry thought that their on-air personalities would work well

together, and that the combination of their friendly voices, and a softer urban contemporary rather than rap play list, would appeal to the station's more mature audience, says Rush.

And while the new WJPC formula may not differ drastically from the old one, things are "more intimate" now, with the team mentioning regular listeners by name and neighborhood, Daniel says. "We don't do a lot of silly chatter; we're more news and community oriented," she adds.

Before being hired by WJPC, Daniel was sidekick to WVAZ's morning man, Richard Steele, who she worked with for a year before her contract expired and a "managerial decision" caused her to lose the gig.

"I learned a lot from Richard Steele," she says without rancor, refusing to comment on any bad feelings between the two because "I always come from a positive plane. I was sad to leave WVAZ, but I like it here. This is a new opportunity for me."

Although she's relatively new to the Chicago radio dial, Daniel is no lightweight when it comes to broadcasting. A cum laude graduate from Memphis State University, Daniel first worked in television at the NBC affiliate in Memphis, Tennessee, and on local cable before landing a job with the old RKO talk radio network, where she was the only black female host. When the network was sold, Daniel's next radio job was with a Memphis station with "a 'GCI format," sidekicking for a jock named Larry Steele – no relation to Richard. She moved to Chicago to work at WVAZ and the other Steele in 1989.

Harold Rush, Chicago born and bred, had a similar background in television and theater before getting into radio. Straight out of high school, Rush was cast in the first all-black produced television show, *Bird of the Iron Feather*, filmed at WTTW-Channel 11 in the late '60s. He also worked on cable TV programming "while it was still experimental," he says.

Rush landed his first radio job at WGCI-FM through former jock Bob Wall, whose morning show he produced and cohosted for four years. After Wall's departure, Rush did the same for Doug Banks, Wall's replacement, for three and a-half years.

After a brief stint at 'GCI-AM spinning dusties, Rush was offered the morning slot with Daniel on WJPC, and jumped at it. "I knew the morning format, and the idea of doing both AM and FM was fun," he says.

And although it's still "too early to tell" how Rush and Daniel will do in the ratings against the competition, listeners' responses so far have been good, with the duo getting its share of letters and good comments, Rush says.

A good indication of how the "war" is going came recently when a man called their show saying his wife wanted to switch to WJPC, while he preferred V-103, Daniel says. After a few listenings, though, he was won over and called them to tell them so – another battle won, one household at a time.

But while some stations, believing the old adage that "all's fair in love and war," may take a cutthroat approach to competition,

Daniel and Rush prefer to stick to the high road, partly because in Chicago's intimate radio community, you never know where you'll end up.

"You know how radio wars go in Chicago; they come and go," Rush says. "But after they're over, the people involved still have to work together."

Because of this, Rush and Daniel like to stay connected to the community through their volunteer work and other projects. Daniel continues to host her cable TV program for the "No Dope Express," a project she's been involved with since last fall. She also regularly MCs dances and parties for young audiences, which gives her a "young people's appeal," she says.

And Rush's Chicago Cable Access program, *Rush Street*, gives him a chance to emphasize the positive aspects of the African-American community in Chicago, he says. For example, Rush recently filmed a spotlight report on the young Chicago actors who starred in director Robert Townsend's film *The Five Heartbeats*, following them around for the week they were in Chicago to promote the film.

And while neither Rush nor Daniel have any children of their own, they like to keep busy with their many "surrogate" kids by speaking weekly at Chicago public and parochial schools.

"It's hard to be working at a Johnson station and not get involved," says Rush. "We can't criticize people who are not working in the community if we're not."

VEBE 30 YEARS AND **STILL FLYING** HIGH

Other Weber's oldest son has two unique distinctions, 1) He has been on Chicago radio nonstop for 30 years, and 2) He has been married to the same woman for 36 years.

In the transient show biz world of the radio host, the odds of Weber's success in either of those areas, much less both, are highly stacked against him. But then Clark Weber has never believed in statistics. He'd rather believe in people.


Last year, for instance, when his alma mater WLS switched from a Top 40 to an all-talk format, Weber was critical of the station's "stomp 'em into the ground" attitude toward callers. He predicted it wouldn't last.

"That school of thought ...where you put the people down and they love it...Well, when you look at their (WLS') ratings, people apparently don't love that."

"People are people and we want our opinion to be respected. Someone may not agree with us but we don't want to be told we're the dumbest thing that ever walked the earth," he continues.

"I like to treat listeners as if I'm running a hardware store. Because each one is a special customer and I value their patronage. I respect the audience. We can agree to disagree and still be friends. And that's always been my underlying philosophy as a talk host," and one of the keys to Weber's rare achievements in radig.

Other factors contributing to his success as a talk host include:



the ability to think on his feet; to maintain objectivity when dealing with controversial subjects; a knack for reading people; and an adeptness at smoothing over raging emotions.

The good-humored host is also quite skilled at maintaining an everyman mystique. "I'm known as a Catholic Protestant Jew who is conservative, liberal, and radical. And I get mail accusing me of all of the above. Which is wonderful. That way, no one can say for sure what I am."

However, he is an expert at playing devil's advocate. "That's my job, to make them think beyond their own opinion." Even the guests he interviews run the gamut — from Robert Bork to Gloria Steinhem.

On occasion, Weber will reveal his true feelings. Regarding the Lake County teens who gawked at a body in the woods for months, rather than report it to the police, the talk host opined: "Nobody had the common sense that God gave a goose!"


Weber's people philosophy also applies to his co-workers, as evidenced by the warm camaraderie shared with his WJJD staff, both on and off the air.

Each weekday morning, Coach Weber rallies the on-air team spirit among meteorologist Mike Spiel, news director Reese Rickards and traffic reporter Janelle Younger. He mercilessly teases and jokes with them like longtime family members.





It might surprise some people, but country music is one of the most successful formats on contemporary radio, and gaining popularity everyday. Chicago and Nashville radio executives examine the past, present and future of the country format.

"Country radio is the format of the '90s." If you talk to people in country radio as well as to country music's movers and shakers on Music Row in Nashville, Tennessee, sooner or later you'll hear them make that statement. Country is radio's most popular format, with 2,500 stations nationwide to runner-up adult contemporary's 2,360. And while it may lag behind adult contemporary in the size of its audience (a 15.8% audience share in the Top 100 radio markets compared with AC's 21.6%), country radio's 28 million weekly listeners can't be ignored.


More importantly, nearly 57% of the country radio audience is between 25 and 54 — the most desirable demographic for advertisers. Couple that with the increasing numbers of younger listeners drawn by the current profusion of new country stars, ranging from "new traditionalists" like Clint Black, Garth Brooks, Alan Jackson and Travis Tritt, to the more rock-oriented Carlene Carter, the Kentucky Headhunters, the Desert Rose Band and Vince Gill, and you have perhaps the most dynamic of all radio formats.

"We're seeing younger and younger people tuning in to country radio because other formats are leaving them cold," says Shelia Shipley, vice president of national radio promotion for MCA Records in Nashville. "And the fact that many of these new artists are young and trendy-looking makes them easier to relate to."

In fact, Weber and Rickards are buddies off the air. The baritonevoiced newscaster is an Episcopal minister who performed the wedding ceremony for Weber's daughter Peggy. "When it was over Reese asked me, 'Well, how'd it go?' And I said, 'It ran a little long for a newscast," Weber laughs.

Adding to the uniqueness of Weber's 30-year career is the fact that he has worked 20 years as a talk host — 90 percent of it spent as a morning man. Before that he worked as a Top 40 DJ at WLS, from 1961 to '68, and at WCFL from 1968 to '70.

Weber's "baptism" as a talk personality came in 1971 at WMAQ. Upon learning that the station was about to go country, Weber talked management into letting him try the talk format. When WMAQ switched to country in 1972, Weber and his popular new talk show moved to WIND, where he stayed for the next 12 years. After the station went Spanish in 1985, Weber jumped to WJJD.

His current role as the top ratings-getter at sister stations WJJD and WJMK is rampant with déjà vu, and not just because of the oldies they play. Weber shares studio space with some of the same DJs he started out with at WLS 30 years ago (Dick Biondi and Bob Hale) and later at WCFL (Ron Britain and Bob Dearborn).

In spite of his longevity as a talk host, the friendly voice of Clark Weber will forever be etched into the minds of Chicago's baby boomers as that of the man who introduced the Beatles at Comiskey Park in 1964. Pop culture will always remember him as one of Chicago's original rock 'n' roll radio pioneers who helped make WLS the Midwest's mammoth Top 40 station in the early '60s.

Who could forget his fake feud with fellow 'LS jock Ron Riley the smart aleck who dubbed Weber "Chrome Dome" back in his pre-toupee days?

The harassment started in 1959 from our days at rival rock stations in Milwaukee," recalls the Wauwatosa, Wisconsin native whose radio career started in 1955 on WAUX in Waukesha. "When Ron came to 'LS in '64, naturally we picked it up again," Weber

Forever trading insults, Riley led the "down with Weber" rebels,

while Clark reigned in the morning shift as "Emperor Weber" with his fans, the "Weber Commandos."

"People thought it (the feud) was real and it was difficult for Ron and I to have lunch together." To this day, however, Weber and Riley are still friends and keep in touch.

WLS was the dream place to work at. The station had huge, huge ratings. It was a juggernaut."

Weber says the reason WLS hired him to host the overnight shift in 1961 was because he helped the late program director, Sam Holman, out of a jam. "Sam got very drunk one night in Milwaukee. when we both worked for WRIT. He started giving two parking lot attendants a hard time. One of them picked up a tire chain and was about to work Sam over, when I saw a squad car. I yelled to them and they came and broke it up.

"Sam, in his inebriated way, said, 'I'll never forget you for this, Clark.' Six months later he called and said, 'Hey, remember how you saved my ass?""

Weber was soon on his way to fame and fortune in Chicago. As part of the WLS job, the jocks had to trek across the Midwest to sock hops and concerts about three times a week. An amateur pilot since 1951, Weber flew his own plane to these events. He also went on tour with the Dave Clark 5, Neil Diamond, the Beach Boys and Herman's Hermits to host their Midwest shows.

Even though Weber was bald and bespectacled, the former rock jock admits to having faced and overcome "a lot of temptations" in his WLS days.

Clark Weber had groupies?!

"Yes, there always were some around in the days at 'LS and even today. But Joan takes it in stride and is willing to share me...psychologically," he chortles.

The father of four daughters (including a set of twins) and five grandchildren is quite proud of his 36-year marriage to Joan. "That is probably my most outstanding accomplishment," he beams.

Unlike his past nerdy image, these days Weber's appearance is striking. Tall, tan and lean, looking fit and far younger than his 60 years, Weber is indeed a silver fox amongst the Hush Puppy set. The admitted exercise buff lifts weights and swims. He's a ham radio operator, belongs to a pilot's club and for relaxation, he flies up north to go fishing.

Weber's physical fortitude stood the test during a live, remote, breakfast broadcast for WJJD in Schaumburg at a packed Richard Walker's Pancake House. Dressed in a jaunty yellow blazer with a matching, striped tie, it isn't hard to spot Weber as he casually strolls, wireless mike in hand, among the brunchers, working the crowd just like Phil Donahue.

After the live show, which is a first for WJJD, Weber's age 45-plus fans instantly line up for autographs, pictures, and handshakes. There's even a handful of thirtysomethings with their children, reminiscing with Weber about WLS.

Although Weber's listeners these days are largely over age 50, he says his audience is growing larger and younger all the time. Live appearances like this one exemplify the power of Weber's radio-host-as-local-shopkeeper philosophy.

After the show, Mr. Charisma goes out of his way to compliment a young mom on her darling newborn and he politely chats up Chicago politics with a senior couple.

Even though he's exhausted from nearly five hours on his feet, the man-of-the-hour takes time to exchange congratulatory hugs and kisses with his all-female staff before heading home to Wilmette.

When asked how he'd like to be remembered in the history books, witty Weber replies: "As someone who genuinely cared about the audience. And on my tombstone it will read: Here lies Clark Weber, I'll be right back after this commercial message."

Even US99's Spangler, a former program director at WJEZ, admits that a second country outlet in Chicago is inevitable.

"We love being the only major country station that serves the entire Chicago area," he says. "But I'm not so sure that some more competition wouldn't help us. It might bring more people into the country music fold, and that would be good for the format."

As far as the music being played on country radio today, there have been numerous changes since WMAQ-AM dropped the format. After the short-lived *Urban Cowboy* craze of the early '80s, country music seemed directionless, and a lot of the core, pop-country artists like Crystal Gayle, Kenny Rogers and Barbara Mandrell began to lose favor with the country radio audience.

"There was a major floundering in country music, because Nashville didn't know what to do," says WSM's Cramer. "Record sales were off and some of the country radio stations were losing audience shares, because this was simply not the music the audience wanted to hear."

The tide began to turn in the mid-'80s with a return to a more traditional country sound spearheaded by then-new artists Ricky Skaggs, George Strait, Randy Travis

and Reba McEntire. Armed with great songs provided by the legions of songwriters who flock to Nashville, they began to change attitudes in the Nashville music establishment. No longer was a new single by an established artist like Merle Haggard, George Jones or Conway Twitty an automatic hit. Now it's the song rather than the artist that grabs the country audience first. In the argot of the music business, country music changed from being "artist-driven" to "song-driven."

"Country music had always been artist-driven," says Helton. "Not so long ago country radio programmers would play a mediocre record by an established artist. Now that's changed. If you're a major artist now and you don't have a really good record, you're going to have problems getting airplay."

"There have been some incredible songs that have come out of Nashville lately," says MCA's Shipley, whose label roster includes such superstars as Strait, McEntire and Twitty as well as hot newer acts like Marty Stuart, Vince Gill and Patty Loveless. "When you have songs that touch the heartstrings of people, it pulls them into the record stores. It causes them to call up radio stations. It generates an excitement out there, and each time a new

artist breaks through like that with a great song it opens up the doors for still newer artists with great songs."

Record industry figures indicate that in the second half of 1990, twice as many country albums were released by the major record labels than in the first half of 1989. Besides the explosion of new artists, US99's Spangler notes that the lyrics in country music are another lure.

"The lyrics are very important in country music," he says. "People who are uninformed think that country music is only about cheatin' and drinkin'. There's almost none of that on country radio these days. The format is about adult, real-life situations."

With booming ratings for country radio stations nationwide, country record sales on the increase (helped by the proliferation of country videos on cable video channels), an influx of fresh new talent and a profusion of great songs coming out of Nashville, country radio is indeed undergoing a revitalization.

"In the last three years country radio and country music are better than they've ever been," says *Radio & Records'* Helton.

Echoes MCA's Shipley, "Country music today is the healthiest it's ever been, and I think it's going to get healthier."

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THE FORMAT OF THE FUTURE?

"People recognize that country music isn't the 'hick' thing it used to be," adds Jeff Walker, a member of the board of directors of the Country Radio Broadcasters who doubles as an independent country video promoter based in Nashville. "People who listened to Creedence Clearwater Revival in the '60s and the Eagles in the '70s have now found a home with country music, because the music isn't all that different."

Here in Chicago, country radio is synonymous with WUSN (FM 99.5) or "US99." Since WMAQ-AM dropped country nearly five years ago, US99 remains the only country music station whose signal covers the entire Chicago metropolitan area.

Under current program director and morning DJ J.D. Spangler, the station has flourished of late, partly due to the upswing of interest in country music and partly because of some fine-tuning at the station under his leadership. Using a "more music, less talk" philosophy, US99 has seen its market share increase in two out of the last three Arbitron ratings surveys. In the most recent ratings report, the station was ranked as Chicago's No. 8 station.

"We made the music the star of the radio station and the DJs 'enhancers' of the music," says Spangler, talking about the station's decision to cut down on chatter. "At our station if you're not making the music better, then what is your purpose?"

Unlike radio markets in the south and southwest, where there are at least two major country stations competing, US99 is in the difficult position of trying to be all things to all country listeners in Chicago. As such, the station sometimes draws criticism for its conservative music approach.

"Naturally we'd like everyone to love us, but it's impossible to please everyone," says Spangler. "Imagine if Chicago had only one rock 'n' roll station and had to try to cover everything from Bill Haley to Iron Maiden and Whitney Houston. That's kind of what we're dealing with here at US99.

"We consider ourselves a 'mainstream' country radio station. We try not to go too

far to the rock edge of country and also not to be too eclectic with artists like k.d. lang and Lyle Lovett. We do play a touch of all of that, but the mainstays of the radio station are people like Randy Travis, George Strait, Reba McEntire and Alabama."

If you live in Will County or in the southern parts of Cook, DuPage and Kane counties, Joliet's WCCQ provides an alternative to US99. Using their own air personalities in morning and afternoon drive time and picking up programming from the Satellite Music Network during the rest of the day, the station plays David to US99's Goliath.

magine if Chicago had only one rock 'n' roll station and had to try to cover everything from Bill Haley to Iron Maiden and Whitney Houston."

"We feel we're in direct competition with US99 for listeners," says WCCQ general manager Robert Channick. "US99 is a major market Top 10 station though, and it's a tough task for a smaller station to compete with them. But we feel that we can."

While never considered quite the hotbed of country radio that cities like Dallas and Houston are — to name two cities where two of the three top-rated stations are country outlets — Chicago has a his-

tory as a two country station town. In 1975 50,000-watt AM giant WMAQ-AM changed to country to fight a successful battle for listeners with WJJD/WJEZ. WJJD dropped country in 1982, WJEZ became oldies WJMK ("Magic 104") in 1984 and WMAQ-AM shifted from country to talk in 1986 and all-news two years later.

"I remember when WMAQ went country people said, 'Chicago isn't a country market,'" says Lon Helton, a WMAQ-AM DJ from 1975 to 1979 who is currently the Nashville bureau chief for the weekly trade publication *Radio & Records.* "We proved that it was. Even early on, WMAQ became one of the top three or four stations in the market.

"We were also the first country station that didn't use the word 'country' on the air. It was always, 'WMAQ is Going to Make You Rich' or 'Your Radio Station.' It was felt that the word 'country' had a stigma — as unwarranted as it may have been — and we decided not to label it. We also had the White Sox in addition to all our contests, so we would draw in people who might not be country fans. And once they heard the music they would usually say, 'Hey, that's not bad.'"

A lot of people's perceptions about country music have changed since then. Companies like Coca-Cola with Randy Travis and Oldsmobile with the Judds are using country stars in advertising campaigns, and one of country's biggest fans, George Bush, currently resides in the White House.

It's a pretty safe bet that one of the next Chicago stations to change formats will go country.

"I don't think there's any doubt that there's room in Chicago for another country station," says Ted Cramer, a 35-year veteran of country radio who was WMAQ-AM's program director from 1981 to 1984 and currently holds down the same position for Nashville's WSM-AM. "If a station came on with a lot of money for promotions behind it and with some really great air talent, Chicago would go for it."

LEARNIN' THE ROPES IN CHICAGO COUNTRY

Known as "Kat Man," sidekick John Katzbeck enlivens morning drive time for listeners of host J.D. Spangler's country music show on WUSN (FM 99.5). The Kat Man is short on years but long on experience.

've been lucky. Who am I gonna kid? I've been real lucky!" says the "Kat Man."

Looking back on the short career, by radio standards, of John Katzbeck, US99's resident "wacky guy" and sidekick to morning drive host J.D. Spangler, you might conclude that luck had a great deal to do with this 26-year-old's rapid rise in this major market. Most DJs learn the business by struggling at a series of hamster-powered low-watters in places like East Lunglish, New Mexico, playing jug band music interspersed with gardening tips.

Not Katzbeck, who has spent his formative years entirely in Chicago, Luck? Well, the old adage is you make your own luck. And the Kat Man has done just that by working extremely hard at what he loves—radio.

"I have a lot of experience," Katzbeck reflects, "in not too many years. There was a long period in my life when I had two, three, four jobs at a time. And I just did it."

As with any profession, Katzbeck is still learning the ropes and he's got a pretty good teacher in Spangler, a 22-year veteran of radio and also US99's program director.

"I've learned a lot. I've learned to get to the point quicker, to tighten up my act a little bit. And J.D.'s also started to teach me a little organization 'cause he's hyperorganized."

"I don't know what I've taught him," says Spangler, whose show ranked a respectable eighth with a 3.6 rating in the most recently available Arbitron listing, "but in our format, what we try to get across is warm and friendly. And John has a natural charisma and you can't teach that; you've either got it or you don't."

"We clash a lot because I'm very liberal and he's more conservative," relates Katzbeck. Ironically, those differences may be just the grist that makes the mill run smoothly because, according to Spangler, "We have a pretty good chemistry between us and play off each other very well."

But Katzbeck is also realistic. "It's his [Spangler's] show and I respect that. My deal is that some day I'm gonna have my own show, and I won't want some idiot telling me what to do. That's not my place. J.D.'s very talented and knows what he

METRO TRAFFIC:

Competition In The Air And On The Airwaves

Gan Chicago radio support another rush hour traffic reporting company? According to Tom Johnson of newcomer Metro Traffic, the answer is definitely yes.

wants to do with his show.

"I'm the sidekick and I know my role. though I'll push the boundaries. We have a lot of discussions during the records. Usually it's J.D. yelling at me, 'What the hell are you talking about? Who the hell is Lenny Bruce?"

Katzbeck, it seems, has been pushing the boundaries ever since his days at Maine West High School.

"I was a goofball," he chortles, explaining one of the reasons he wasn't involved with Maine West's WMTH (FM 90.5) until his junior year, though by his senior year he was news director.

"Actually I didn't get involved because I was in the marching band, concert band, jazz band, and that took up most of my time." And it wouldn't be the last time that the saxophone player's energies would be divided between radio and performing live.

"I started playing sax in fifth grade. I tried playing the cello for a year but the thing was too big. I remember dragging it

to school in the snow. There'd be two foot prints and this big scrape mark 'cause I couldn't lift it."

After graduating from Maine West in 1982, Katzbeck took his sax and his budding love for radio broadcasting to Macomb and Western Illinois University. ("And where's Macomb?" he quips. "In mapocket.")

With his own show on campus station WIUS, Katzbeck began what would be a career-developing trend: the willingness to work, any time, anywhere, any shift.

"They gave me a weekend shift that nobody wanted to do. Who wants to work weekends, especially in college? So I worked Sunday mornings from 10 to 2. And I loved it. I was late for classes and I blew off a lot of classes, but I never missed my radio show."

"In the early '80s there was a whole new music scene," says Katzbeck, "and I was really into Elvis Costello, New Order, Joy Division and before them, Talking Heads." Katz and fellow students with similar tastes put together the group Odd Man Out, and for the next five years Katzbeck split his time between band gigs and radio.

En route to the self-discovery that all young adults seek, Katzbeck knew one thing for certain, that he wanted to get into some facet of the arts. "So I decided to transfer to Columbia [Chicago's Columbia College] because I wanted to get a smorgasbord of an education."

Ironically, Katzbeck "took only one radio class. We'd listen to tapes of Larry Lujack and then break into discussion groups.

"I understood what they were doing but I didn't care for the philosophy. They had a real strict format like professional radio stations are now. I'm from the school of thinking that college stations should be more free form. You should have the power to experiment a little because you're not going to be able to do it anywhere else, that's for sure."

On WCRX (FM 88.1), Columbia College's student-run station, Katzbeck "came in and did one shift of 'read through the news' because I figured it would be good experience."

And "experience" became the byword that shaped his career.

His first plunge into professional broadcasting came at Shadow Traffic, which at that time was Lee Communications, where he served an internship. After graduating from Columbia College in 1986, Katzbeck continued working for Lee. And it was there that he learned the most basic fact of radio life.

"I got fired!"

He went to Z-ROCK [hard rock WZRC FM 106.7, now Contemporary Christian WYLL] in Des Plaines in January of '87. "I did their production work and commercial producing. It was a satellite music show so I ran the board and I read local news once an hour. I was there seven months and then it turned into The Wave (WTWV), a New Age station. And not long after, they had flooded out," he says, laughing at the irony.

Located just a block's flow from the Des Plaines River, the station fell victim to the flood waters which devastated so much of the Chicago area during the summer of 1987.

"As the water was coming in, we were signing off. Six hours later, they called me from the transmitter site in Buffalo Grove. The engineer had set up one turntable, a Radio Shack microphone, and one cart machine. They said, 'Hey, come on out here and keep us on the air, and bring some records.' They wanted to play the commercials so they could bill the sponsors.

"I'd talk in between the records so there wouldn't be a long space between each song. I'd ad lib until I could cue up another record and stick another commercial in the one cart machine. I stayed on the air 13 straight hours doing that.

"About this time I got a weekend job at WXLC [FM 102.3], too. So I was working at The Wave during the day in Des Plaines,

and I would drive out to the Satellite Music Network in Mokena a couple of week nights, and on weekends I'd do the overnight shift at 'XLC in Waukegan."

Despite putting considerable mileage on his CRX, Katzbeck was still playing sax in Odd Man Out. "We'd cruise to Macomb or Charleston or lowa City, and we'd be crammed in a van with all this equipment and eating at 7-Elevens.

"I finally had to quit [in 1988] and the reason was radio. I just couldn't keep a full commitment to the band. We'd be gonna play Biddy Mulligan's and I just couldn't tell the group, 'Hey, I've gotta do the midnight shift at 'XLC."

His first full-time job appeared next. Shadow Traffic rehired Katzbeck to file twice-a-day traffic reports. Flying out of Midway airport during both rush hours. Katzbeck was now logging a different kind of mileage. He also started doing traffic reports for WUSN (FM 99.5) in the mornings and for WMAQ (AM 670) in the afternoons.

Katzbeck was grounded when he became the on-air traffic reporter for Leigh Hamilton's afternoon show on WVAZ (FM 102.7). All the while, Katzbeck continued working at 'XLC, which gave him the chance to do his own show.

At the start of 1989, WXLC changed to its Hot Hits format, and they asked Katzbeck to be their nighttime guy, seven to midnight. "And I thought, 'Oh my God, you mean I can be just a disc jockey? Do one shift and work in one place only? You got me!""

Katzbeck had burned the late fires at 'XLC for a year when US99 called with an offer to be a part of their morning show. And, what started out as a roving reporter spot, quickly burgeoned into his current role as host J.D. Spangler's full-time sidekick.

"Ten years ago you couldn't have gotten me to work a country station," Katzbeck admits. "But, they're changing the boundaries of country music constantly. I grew up listening to rock, but Vanilla Ice, New Kids On The Block, I just don't identify with that. I can play k.d. lang, the Kentucky Headhunters, Lyle Lovett, and Kevin Welch," which he does on his own show, The Kat Man's Cutting Edge, every Saturday at 11 p.m.

Luck? Like we said, you make your own luck. At least the Kat Man do. 🛇

Baseball Broadcasters Pick Announcers'



Like the ballplayers they cover, baseball's radio announcers, even the Hall of Fame broadcasters now entering their golden years, have role models whose styles they often copied.

Commercial radio's coverage of baseball is entering its eighth decade, and these great vocal veterans fell in love with the game and its announcers during radio's "Golden Age" of the 1930s.

Who were the best baseball announcers of all time? Logical answers to that question should come from the biggest names

in the business – some of whom made the all-time lists of their peers.

RADIOChicago surveyed all the Chicago play-by-play announcers, some household names from other cities and even a prominent network broadcaster to get their ratings of the best voices of the summer game.

Start out with Harry Caray, in his 47th straight year of baseball play-by-play, the last 10 seasons on WGN Cub broadcasts. Among many others he lists the late Bob Prince of the Pittsburgh Pirates. Jack Buck of the St. Louis Cardinals, Red Barber

(formerly of the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees) and Vin Scully of the Dodgers.

Of Prince, Caray says, "Outstanding announcer. Very versatile and colorful – \$1 million worth of fun every day." He calls former Cardinals partner Buck "an outstanding announcer in any sport." Barber, still heard weekly on National Public Radio commentaries, is termed "remarkable... a guy from the South became so popular in a place like Brooklyn, where people wouldn't know what he's talking about." Caray also calls Scully a "wordmaster."

Meanwhile, chief WGN-Radio play-byplay voice Thom Brennaman lists his father, Cincinnati Reds voice Marty Brennaman, as his favorite. "He wasn't first on my list until I heard him do the playoffs and World Series last year. It was magic," he says.

The rest of Brennaman's list includes Scully, NBC-TV announcer Dick Enberg (formerly of the California Angels), Caray, ABC-TV announcer Al Michaels (formerly of the Reds and Giants), Buck, Prince, Don Drysdale of the Dodgers (and formerly of the White Sox), Milo Hamilton of the

Houston Astros (formerly of the Cubs). Jerry Coleman. Lanny Frattare of the Pirates and Dewayne Staats of the Yankees (also formerly of the Cubs).

Moving across town to the spacious booth at the new Comiskey Park, John Rooney, the top Sox play-by-play voice on WMAQ, who also works for CBS-Radio's game of the week, picks Buck and Scully in a first-place tie as his favorites. "Each has different styles that make them better than the others." A close second is Ernie Harwell. "He brings in such a human touch

with his storytelling," says Rooney.

Wayne Hagin, Rooney's partner, names Scully, Enberg, Michaels, Harwell, Hodges, Lon Simmons of the Oakland Athletics (formerly of the Giants), Buck, Mark Holtz of the Texas Rangers, Don Drysdale and Marty Brennaman.

Enberg was "so sensational on radio in both baseball and football," says Hagin. Michaels on radio was "very young - and very good." Holtz is "an unknown quantity" to most fans, but is "excellent."

To go back to the beginnings of baseball on radio, just ask Harwell, in his 32nd and

It's 6:35 a.m. and the guys from Metro Traffic are knocking back one last gulp of cold hangar coffee before lifting off from Midway Airport for the morning rush hour shift.

Tom Johnson (dubbed "Major Tom" by Fred Winston) double checks a stack of IDOT (Illinois Department of Transportation) construction updates. His regular pilot/sidekick, an easy going sort named Russ Franks, pitches his styrofoam cup into the cargo area of their Bell, Jet Ranger helicopter.

Over the next two hours Major Tom and Franks will fly modified figure eights over Chicagoland, delivering traffic reports to WWBZ listeners, while Metro Traffic cohort Chuck Myers does the same over WBBM-AM.

Metro Traffic Control, unheard of in Chicago until last August, is quietly challenging Shadow Traffic for a slice of the Chicago market.

"Before Metro Traffic opened a Chicago office, commuters had only Shadow Traffic to rely on," Johnson explains. "They were the only player in town, and Shadow Traffic wasn't even flying helicopters at the time! Inexcusable in my mind.

"Then we came along with chopper coverage and Shadow began flying again, and even added a 'Captain Don' in answer to my Major Tom, which surprised me. I thought they'd at least pull a higher rank.

"Now Chicago has three outlets with helicopters up during rush hour instead of only WGN, and there's more than enough work to go around."

Metro Traffic serves over 30 cities. When the company expanded to Chicago, Johnson was one of its first local employees. He explains, "They liked my versatility. Remember, I was working news, traffic and talk shows at WLS, jocking at WFYR, running WSSY in the suburbs and doing traffic on WMAQ as a Shadow Traffic reporter, all

his isn't brain surgery - it's traffic!"

at the same time! So I knew the market and the available talent. That's why Metro made me assistant director of operations.

"Our goal at Metro is to bring personality back to traffic. After all, this isn't brain surgery - it's traffic! The listeners want accurate information, true, but does that mean we have to be boring? I don't think so."

At 6:55 a.m., Franks eases the Metro Traffic chopper east to Lake Shore Drive, leaving the Midway Airport controllers behind. He checks in with the Meigs Field staff and asks about air space restrictions over Comiskey Park, where the White Sox are playing that day. With Vice President Dan Quayle in attendance, air space is closed over the new ball yard.

Kicking the Jet Ranger into a snug left turn, Russ heads north along LSD for a closer look at the construction zone.

"We fly at about 1,000 feet and 115 miles per hour," he explains, "and probably go through 50 gallons of fuel every morning. I follow Major Tom's lead, take him where he wants to go. He spots accidents, stalls and radar traps. I talk to the people at the three airports and watch for other aircraft."

Radar traps. Of all the traffic reporters working in Chicago, only Johnson calls radar traps for his listeners.

"The purpose of a radar trap is to slow traffic down to the legal limit. That's exactly what happens when I call a radar trap on the air. People slow down. Does my blowing the whistle bother the State Police? Nobody's ever complained."

Heading outbound along the Kennedy and Northwest Tollway, Major Tom takes a break over the Motorola complex in Schaumburg, hovering at 600 feet as he delivers his first report of the morning. Referring to shorthand notes, he sounds smooth, almost scripted. After a little Danny Bonaduce/Adam Rich schtick with Blaze morning man Brian Kelley, it's south along the tollway.

"In a few minutes we should cut directly over O'Hare," Major Tom explains. "You're not allowed to fly over in fixed wing aircraft. Helicopters give us far more flexibility for traffic reporting than airplanes.

Here's an example. A few minutes ago I spotted a semi blocking North Avenue. The trailer roof was peeled back. That guy hit a low bridge. In the helicopter, Russ can hover in place while I take notes. In a plane he'd have to fly by and come around.

"Helicopters also offer us an advantage in bad weather. We fly at under 1,000 feet. Fixed wing aircraft must fly higher than 1,000 feet. This means we usually fly "under" the weather, and can go up when fixed wing aircraft are grounded.

"There are exceptions, though. Russ and I were flying the day of the tornado out in Lemont last year, and we barely beat the storm back to Midway. Russ had us up to 150 miles per hour, the top end for this babv."


The Metro Traffic morning shift ends at 9:15 a.m., when Franks eases the Jet Ranger straight down onto an eight-footsquare, wooden platform at Midway Airport. Over breakfast at the nearby Midway Diner, Major Tom ticks off a laundry list of reasons for slow rush hour traffic in the Chicago metro area.

"Construction projects, accidents and stalls bring the obvious backups and gapers' slow-downs," he says, "but from the air we notice other problems. Something as simple as a slow curve in the road or a left-hand exit ramp causes hesitation among drivers, no matter how many times they've taken a particular route. The Harlem and Austin exits on the Ike are good examples, and when drivers back off by five or 10 miles per hour we get a ripple effect, slowing traffic down as the volume increases."

By 10:30 a.m., Major Tom has returned to the Metro Traffic offices on Michigan Avenue. Leaning back from his desk, he looks up and says, "This is the real action, and I love it! Metro Traffic is here for the long run, and we're only going to get bigger and better."



last season behind the mic in Detroit.


He names Graham McNamee, who broadcast network World Series games starting in 1923, and Cardinals announcer France Laux, who preceded Caray as St. Louis' top voice. He adds Herb Carneal and Russ Hodges to his list.

Harwell worked with Carneal, currently heard on 50,000-watt WCCO-Radio in the Twin Cities, in Baltimore in the 1950s. "He's a fine announcer, but he kind of gets lost nationally, working up in that area," he says. "But he's a household name in his market." Former partner Hodges "was not a super announcer, but he had appeal because he was a people's announcer."

Starting with his boyhood in Ohio, Buck goes back a long way to name his favorites. His list is topped by the late Jack Graney, the first ex-player to ascend to the broadcasting booth, with the Cleveland Indians. Another Indians announcer of note, Jimmy Dudley, is named.

Bob Costas, based in St. Louis, has not broadcast weekly baseball since NBC lost the network TV contract to CBS. But he satisfies part of his need to stay close to his favorite game by filling in for Buck on some KMOX broadcasts.

Growing up in the New York area, he developed a keen ear for the game's voices. In Costas' long list he includes Buck and Caray.



Of Buck, Costas says, "A commanding presence, terrific dry wit. A special sustained relationship with his St. Louis audience. At his best in the big, memorable moments."

Costas' longest analysis is reserved for Caray. "His work with the Cubs on WGN {TV} has given him national visibility, but his greatest days as an announcer came as the voice of the Cardinals," he says. "Then, his bigger-than-life personality was matched by his play-calling and sense of theater. He helped make the Redbirds a regional franchise with millions of fans beyond St. Louis."

Meanwhile, noted baseball funnyman Bob Uecker, heard throughout much of the Chicago area on Milwaukee's WTMJ, has always given serious thought to his favorite radio announcers.



While growing up in Brewtown, Uecker liked listening to Bert Wilson and Jack Quinlan, two late Cub announcers on WIND and WGN. Likewise Bob Elson with Sox broadcasts on the former WCFL. "I used to love to imitate him," says Uecker. "He wasn't boring if you really listened to him."

Uecker also names Costas and Milo Hamilton.

"Costas would be a great radio guy doing it full time," says Uecker. "He's a great BS'er; he helps make it entertaining when your team is getting its ass kicked." Hamilton impresses Uecker with his "great record keeping and meticulous style."

For Hamilton himself, broadcasting the Houston Astros for the past seven years after leaving the Cub radio booth, the No.

I pick was fairly simple.

"Growing up in lowa, I heard Bob Elson and he's obviously my first choice," Hamilton says of his late partner on early and mid-1960s White Sox broadcasts on the old WCFL.

"His style was the key, and he really was the first one in Chicago who made it [base-ball announcing] into a profession," Hamilton adds. "And a lot of the terminology you hear on baseball broadcasts began with Bob."

Hamilton's list then picks up with two former Cub broadcast-booth mates, Quinlan (on the old WIND in the mid-1950s) and Jack Brickhouse. Although the latter did no baseball on radio after 1947, Hamilton remembers Brickhouse from his earlier stints on WGN and WJJD.

Somewhat surprisingly, Hamilton also picks Harry Caray. The two feuded during a shotgun marriage in the Cub booth from 1982 to 1984, a relationship that ended with Hamilton being phased out. But Hamilton gives credit where credit is due – he loved Caray in St. Louis. "That's when he was still just a baseball announcer," he says.

Just like the players, baseball's radio announcers have their own idols, influences and favorites. The boys of summer, in the booth.

MARTY FAYE

Seventy years old and the man still draws breath after two quadruple bypass surgeries. Look at him swing the golf club, this Marty Faye. On the green in two strokes and he never stops talking, because that's what Faye does. He talks!


"People often ask about Sophie Tucker," he says. "Sophie would sell jams and jellies for charity between her shows, but she never named the charity! I didn't think a star should be selling preserves in the lobby, and I also didn't believe she had any charity. Sophie threatened to have me fired when I said as much, but it never happened."

"You want to know about my career?" he asks. "I'll tell you about my career. I'm from a show business family. My sister was Frances Faye the nightclub singer and my first cousin was Danny Kaye, yes, the Danny Kaye!

"I came to Chicago from New York in 1952 as a radio and TV pitch man. I was doing live radio commercials at WAAF [now WJPC] one afternoon when the announcer played a song and left his mic open. I said, 'What is that garbage?!' My voice went out over the air — and his listeners loved it! They'd never heard anyone knock a record before, so I ended up with a show called *Marty's Morgue*. I'd play lousy records and rip 'em to shreds.

"You know, I had Paul Anka on at the beginning of his career, when 'Diana' was a big hit. Such a trite song — it stunk! I asked Anka to read the lyrics aloud. He got a little defensive and said, 'In your day you had Jerome Kern and Cole Porter. Today you have me.' Well, I told him to get out! He asked if we were still on the air and I said, 'I am, but you're not. Get out!' Some nerve! Comparing himself to Cole Porter!"

Along with *Marty's Morgue*, Faye also hosted a live show from the Black Orchid Club. His guests included — along with some greats and the not-so-greats — Vic Damone and Johnny Mathis. He once advised Neil Sedaka "to give up on music and be a court reporter!"

You don't have to be a Shirley MacLaine camp follower to tune into psychic radio. Professional seers like Irene Hughes, Warren Freiberg, Marlena the Rock Lady, Gwen Pippin, Melody Joy, Laurie Brady and Allene Cunningham sound quite down-to-earth when they give callers their psychic impressions. Even skeptics have to give them credit for the practical advice and common sense counseling they dispense on the airwaves. For the most part, these radio psychics are "Dear Abby" with a clairvoyant twist. But sometimes they can forecast with mind-blowing accuracy.

The far-out format of psychic talk radio is, in fact, very traditional. Barbara Schermer, astrological consultant, says, "Radio and astrology are a natural match. Radio speaks directly to each individual and astrology speaks directly to each individual--they are extremely compatible."

Schermer had her own radio show on KIQQ in Los Angeles and was an occasional guest on the *Phyllis Levy Show*, formerly on WLS. She has been a consultant to Rich Melman of Lettuce Entertain You, fashion designer Maria Rodriquez and was hired by Michael Butler to advise on the best opening dates for his revival of *Hair*.

Psychic radio dates back 60 years. Evangeline Adams, a noted astrologist of the time, was one of the pioneers of this phenomena. In April 1930, she began broadcasting three times a week and was deluged with mail. (Miss Adams had a studio in Carnegie Hall where she was visited by such notables as King Edward VIII, Caruso, Mary Pickford and J.P. Morgan.)

Today, psychic radio is fast becoming one of talk radio's hottest formats across the country, according to WCGO/WTAS' Warren Freiberg. The host of his own morning talk show on the Chicago Heights sister stations, Freiberg also works as a radio psychic outside the Chicago area. He uses his mental powers for six different radio stations across the U.S., giving out psychic readings to listeners who call in.

"In the '30s, the airwaves were crawling with these radio mentalism shows. One station in the New York area had no fewer than 15 mentalists on it. It was a million dollar industry and a lot of quacks dispensing love potions got in on it," says Freiberg. "The radio stations then became concerned that all this hoopla would cause the government to interfere in their programming, so radio stations' management decided it was better to police their own industry and they banned the psychic shows." It wasn't until 1943, when a popular mentalist named Joseph Duninger hosted a national show over the Blue Radio Network, that the format came back.

Freiberg credits psychic Long John Nebel with popularizing the format on WOR in New York City in the early '60s, inspiring Freiberg to find Midwest psychics to guest on his call-in show for WWCA in Gary, Indiana. At first Freiberg was a cynic who gave the soothsayers a hard time. But the late psychic Joe East influenced the talk host to study ESP. Alexandria East, his widow, was a well-known psychic, palm reader and expert handwriting analyst. Freiberg credits the Easts with encouraging

him to tap his own mental powers.

"I believe that we're all mini-radio transmitters and that we all send out psychic signals. I simply interpret them," he explains.

Some psychics use crystal balls, tarot cards or astrology to boost their telepathy. Some "read" palms, head bumps, coffee grounds and even beer foam. Marlena the Rock Lady uses crystals and semi-precious gems, such as rose quartz or amethyst, to help tune into her psychic wavelength. "The quartz or crystal in a rock triggers my psychic ability. It puts your brain into an alpha wave state," she explains.

Some psychics, like Freiberg, use no aids at all, as they are sensitive to voice recognition. An ability to pick up a person's vibration from his or her voice is especially useful for radio mentalists.

Joe Who, a noted voice-sensitive psychic, hosted a weekly call-in segment on Chuck Britton's overnight WLS show from 1986 to 1987. He's been on WLUP-AM with Kevin Matthews, on WTMX-FM with Peter Dean, on Channel 11's Wild Chicago and he guested on TV's Morton Downey, Jr. Show.

Suburban resident Who predicts he will land a slot on a major Chicago radio station in the near future. When giving a reading, mentalist Who likens his psychic state to "a script rolling behind my eyeballs." It runs by so quickly that he must read it with rapid-fire speed in order to keep up. Similarly, Irene Hughes has described it as watching a movie played at high speed.

Calling into a psychic talk show is a bit like gambling. Sometimes they're dead

she had mental powers at age 4 and has been working as a psychic/astrologer since 1959. She predicted the Kennedy assassinations and is known for her accurate forecasts of earthquakes, space shuttle disasters and plane crashes.

She does short readings for B96 listeners, gives general horoscopes and makes global predictions. Her on-air time is sandwiched between news, weather, Top 40 hits, etc., so she can only take a few calls. Her readings are quite terse and blunt, but often shockingly accurate. B96's hosts like to tease Hughes and act skeptical, but ultimately they admit: "People think we BS about Irene, but we don't."

MARLENA THE ROCK LADY WRMN-AM / WXLC-FM

Earth mother Marlena uses stones and crystals to turn on her psychic powers both on and off the air.

A minister's daughter, Marlena has made predictions for celebrities like Gavin McLeod, Kaye Ballard and sports stars. She once helped the Love Boat actor find a lost diamond ring. She's also had her own local cable TV and radio shows.

GWEN PIPPIN WFXW-AM

Psychic Insights, Friday, 11 a.m.-noon. Phone: (708) 232-1480. Marlena's daughter, Pippin is a licensed broadcaster and hosts her own show on this Geneva, Illinois, station. A cabaret singer/keyboardist at French restaurant Yvette, she's an astrologer, psychic and tarot reader.

A cheerful, colorful and light-hearted host, Pippin has the luxury of giving each



caller a lengthy four or five minute reading. Sometimes Pippin's mom or sister Melody Joy guest on her show.

MELODY JOY WKRS-AM

Dave Allen Show, one Friday a month, 2-4 p.m. Phone: (708) 244-1220. Like sibling Gwen, this psychic is a singer. From ages 13 to 18, Melody, Gwen and sister Autumn comprised the Berndt Sisters, a Christian musical group that sang and played 23 instruments, toured the country and recorded three albums.



She takes her role as Dave Allen's "prognosticator" seriously. Using tarot cards to "unlock the subconscious mind," the seeress takes many calls at a quick pace, and often surprises callers with her accuracy. M.J.'s advice is always no-nonsense and direct. "You must have a family meeting to solve this," she'll instruct.

LAURIE BRADY WJJD-AM

The Clark Weber Show, Friday, 9:30 a.m.-10 a.m. Phone: (312) 591-WJJD or 977-1160. Nancy Reagan wasn't the first First Lady to consult an astrologer. Psychic/ astrologer Laurie Brady forecasted for President and Mrs. Gerald Ford, and she was the Oakland A's astrologer. She predicted the assassination attempts on Pope John Paul II and President Reagan, and the resignations of Spiro Agnew and President Nixon. She's been on major shows like The



Oprah Winfrey Show, Geraldo, 60 Minutes and regularly appears on national TV and radio shows. A former Hollywood actress, Brady predicts for callers by using astrological charts and her psychic intuition.

WARREN FREIBERG-LIBBY COLLINS WCGO-AM/WTAS-FM

Warren Freiberg-Libby Collins Show, Mon.-Fri., 7-10 a.m. Phone: (708) 754-4335 or 756-7896. Since the early '60s, psychic Freiberg has hosted local psychic radio



and TV shows, held psychic fairs and written columns for national tabloids and psychic magazines. He is also known as an arch-conservative talk show host — a prototype for Morton Downey, Jr.

Due to health problems, Freiberg no longer acts as a psychic on his own show. He does have psychic guests on to take calls every two weeks. Regulars include Joseph DeLouise, Alexandria East, Ruth Berger, Diana of the Dunes and Nettie Leo. Freiberg's wife and fellow radio host Libby Collins is a canine astrologer who dispenses dog psychology for perplexed pooch owners.

wrong; sometimes they're close; sometimes they're so right on the mark it's goosebump scary. For instance, one morning on Jobo and Eddie's B96 show, Irene Hughes was on a roll as she closed her eyes and continuously told callers the answers to their questions before they even asked them. A gasp, followed by: "Oh, my gosh, how could you possibly know that?!" was the typical reaction.

Talk show psychics usually ask callers for their birthdate, perhaps a first name and for one quick question, either general or specific. Questions like, 'What will my future be?' are too general for the radio psychics to focus on. Oftentimes, the show's host will play off the psychic or the callers and make jokes to keep the pace light and lively.

"I try to keep my predictions very positive, especially with health questions," says Marlena. "If you make someone worried about getting sick, the stress could bring it on." Marlena once advised a very depressed caller to sing. "I don't care if you can't carry a tune, just sing for yourself and your depression will lift," she harmlessly prescribed. Most of the radio psychics, however, won't touch medical questions for obvious legal and ethical

The psychic world certainly is an arena fraught with controversy. Some view psychics as master showmen out to empty the pockets of the gullible, not unlike how some see the professional TV preacher. Many dismiss the whole mystic area as nothing more than New Age flakiness. And there are religious right-wingers who denounce the psychics as satanic. Rock Lady Marlena notes that sometimes Bible thumpers picket the psychic fairs which she and her family operate.

Flaky or not, Chicago radio's psychics all consider themselves to be cosmic counselors and are often faced with trying to help desperate people.

"Sure, there's charlatans. There's good and bad psychics just like there's good and bad doctors or lawyers," Freiberg opines.

As far as devil-worship goes, one thing all of Chicago's seers have in common is a strong Christian background. Laurie Brady went to convent school and almost became a nun; Irene Hughes is an ordained minister who studied in a seminary for seven years; Allene Cunningham was a star Bible school student who worked with Rev. Billy Graham and was once married to a Baptist minister. Rock Lady Marlena is a minister's daughter and her husband is an ordained Protestant minister. Their psychic daughters, Melody and Gwen, are graduates of Bible high schools and colleges. Warren Freiberg was raised in a strict German Lutheran family.

"There's nothing supernatural about being psychic. Everybody has it to some degree. Just like everybody sings in the shower, but not everybody is Caruso," Freiberg says.

Unlike in the '30s, Freiberg notes, radio today is far freer, allowing many psychics on the air once again. "It won't be banned again because society has liberalized," says the conservative host.

"Spiritualism has always flourished in times of war or economic depression," he adds. "Whenever we have psychics on our show, we get a greater audience pull. People who normally wouldn't call a talk show will call in."

According to Freiberg, psychic radio is a bigger trend across the country than in the Chicago area. "Psychic radio has burgeoned in the last two years and it has yet to reach its potential," he predicts.

PSYCHIC RADIO SHOWS

Known as the "psychic Ann Landers," Allene Cunningham has been traveling the country for 17 years doing radio and TV shows. The popular psychic, who sounds like the world's sweetest granny, specializes in working the top-rated "morning zoo" shows on music stations, rather than talk radio formats. Calls into Q101 are screened and only callers with "unusual" problems get on. In other words, if it's about sex, you're in like flint.

Prior to Q101, Cunningham has been on the air here with Johnny B., Roy Leonard and Wally Phillips. The pride of Wichita, Kansas, Cunningham was a teen-singing starlet who found fame in Hollywood. She worked for NBC radio in Chicago and sang on shows hosted by Jack Benny, Perry Como and Don McNeil.

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
