

Syndicated Talk Radio Host Indicted in Peso-Exchange Scam

Syndicated radio talk show host Thomas Michael Donahue has been indicted in a 1980's peso-exchange scheme, prosecutors said.

Thousands of investors lost more than \$40 million entrusted to Donahue and other peso brokers, court records show.

The indictment alleges Donahue once controlled more than \$2 million of the investments. But Donahue claims a business associate, who is testifying for the prosecution, stole \$1.2 million.

Investors were led to believe they were buying Mexican pesos at favorable exchange rates, but instead the money wound up in a pyramid scheme.

Friends of West Virginia Public Radio Speak Out Against State Control

Friends of West Virginia Public Radio says the state Educational Broadcasting Authority violated open government meeting laws by forming a group to control funding.

The allegations came in a memo filed by the Friends of Public Radio in its County Circuit Court lawsuit against the authority.

The Friends of Public Radio filed the lawsuit last month to block the newly-formed Educational Broadcasting Authority Foundation from taking funds raised by the Friends. The foundation was formed in 1992 and began operating in July to manage and allocate all public radio funds except government appropriations.

The memo asked Kanawha County Circuit Judge Herman Canady to issue an injunction giving the Friends of Public Radio control of its money and property. The

group lists 6,000 members and raised \$400,000 last year.

Friends of Public Radio contends the authority is attempting an illegal takeover of private funds.

The memo filed by Friends of Public Radio attorney Robert Rodecker alleged the authority did not give a proper five-day notice of an Aug. 5 meeting in Beckley, did not inform the public the meeting would deal with operating rules of the foundation, and did not inform Friends of Public Radio of the effects of the new rules.

Rodecker's memo also said two new authority members were not given time to study the foundation operating rules.

The memo said the authority action is "the unauthorized takeover by a state agency of the assets of a private corporation without compensation."

Illinois Town Says Shut Off the Music

The music in the air in downtown Paxton—golden oldies, farm news and Paul Harvey—has struck a dicordant note with some people.

Several people have complained about the practice of playing the local radio station, WPXN-FM, over seven loudspeakers situated in the three-block downtown area.

David Swink was the first to complain publicly in a letter to the editor of the Paxton Record. Swink maintained that his "constitutional rights are being violated by the noise pollution."

Swink's letter was followed by others, and some people have complained directly to members of the Paxton Chamber of Commerce, which pipes the radio programming over the downtown speakers.

Even though the volume has been reduced downward in recent days, some people say they can still hear it blocks away.

But Paxton's librarian, La Fonda Evers, enjoys the radio.

"It's great, it adds to the atmosphere," she said.

Library clerk Cathy Whitcomb agrees, "I like the seasonal things, Christmas carols, Swedish music for the heritage days in June,."

Swink says he turns off his hearing aids when he goes downtown because the announcers' voices are so loud.

WGCI Tops the Ratings for Third Quarter Running

WGCI-FM 107.5, Chicago's urban contemporary powerhouse, has done it again. Topped the ratings, that is. For the third consecutive quarter, and for the fourth time in the five quarters, WGCI-FM holds the number one spot in the Chicago radio ratings.

The station, showing no signs of relinquishing its title, held on to the number one spot while increasing its market share from 6.9 to 8.5.

The Loop AM Changes Call Letters/Format to Become WMVP

The summer ratings proved to be a disappointment for the Loop-AM. The station dropped in their market share to 1.9—the lowest for the Loop-AM in five years.

Of course, WLUP would have liked to have done better, but their sights are now set on the future of

WMVP. WMVP-AM, which replaces WLUP-AM, is an all-sports radio station. That's right, there is no longer a WLUP-AM.

The new call letters are an acronym for "most valuable player" will set the stage for what they hope will be a ratings powerhouse.

WMVP's main competitor will be WSCR which until recently was Chicago's only sports-talk outlet.

It's still too soon to do any predicting, but keep your eye out for the next ratings. It will be interesting to see how listeners react to the new sports-talk station.

So, imagine my surprise when I saw the new advertising campaign for "The Score." The television ads feature a man and wife driving in their car. Radio Promotions

n the broad tableau of American popular culture, radio promotions—those nifty, toogood-to-be-true, often goofy consciousness-raisers—easily rank in the same league with Cracker Jack prizes, box top freebies and the mystical secret decoder ring. What adult can't remember their first set of temporary tattoos or X-ray specs, or the first time they tried to be the tenth caller to their favorite radio station?

Promotions help to create listener loyalty which translates into higher ratings and advertising revenues.

Promotions above and beyond basic advertising are pivotal to the success of most commercial radio stations, and especially to rock stations aimed at the lucrative 18-to-49-year-old market. Unlike print media, which usually costs consumers something and has distributions that can be easily quantified, radio is free to anyone with a radio; The link between individual radio stations and their listeners would be a complete mystery without conscious effort on the part of station management to find out exactly who is paying attention.

Furthermore, because radio doesn't cost its listeners anything, audiences can be as fickle as they want to be; changing stations is neither expensive nor inconvenient—and loyalty can be elusive.

Effective promotions can boost a commercial radio station's visibility in short order by solving both these problems. Promotions help to create listener loyalty which translates into higher ratings and advertising revenues. Promotions also allow management to turn audiences into black and white demographics to show

to potential advertisers and to gauge the success of individual shows or entire formats.

Radio promotions generally fall into two categories. Call-in promotions are the easiest and most popular. Live remotes increase visibility and generate plenty of demographics by putting their promotional dollars—or even somebody else's—exactly where their listeners are.

"Listeners love to win money," said Ingrid Bjors, promotions manager at WCKG-FM 105.9.

"Money giveaways are by far our most popular promotion."

According to Bjors and promotions managers at WLUP and WWBZ, the success of call-ins is gauged by the number of calls received after there has been a winner. If a station receives, say, 300 calls in addition to the pivotal first 10, competition is pretty fierce.

The odds of winning a call-in promotion are better than most forms of legal gambling. For one thing, everybody knows somebody who has won something in a radio call-in promotion. For another, the odds are usually measured in the hundred, as opposed to the thousands for the lottery Daily Game or the bazillions for Lotto. If 300 people call in, your odds are one in 300. Not bad for the price of a local phone call. "It seems that in the beginning of a contest we have a lot more participation than toward the end," said Bjors of multiweek promotions. "Toward the end we try to add little bonuses or up the ante a bit."

Not all call-in promotions are so carefully planned, though. The Loop, with its stable of personality-ori-

ented jocks, gives on-air personalities unusually free reign in their use of the telephone. "We try to vary things," said Cindy Gatziolis, promotions manager at the Loop. "Johnny B. has come up with some interesting call-ins, and Kevin Mathews, well, who knows where he gets his ideas. We allow the jocks the freedom to do the giveaways as they would like, provided they make sure they mention the sponsor the right way and get the information out that needs to get out to the listener.

The Loop is also fond of associating itself with outside events not originating within the station itself. "It's good for us to be associated with say, big named artists who are coming to town," Gatziolis said. "If we can say 'the so-and-so concert series and the Loop FM bring you Eric Clapton,' that's good association in the listeners head, that we're such a power broker that we can bring Eric Clapton to town."

This relationship works well for the artists too. According to Gatziolis, concert promoters seek out such associations with local radio stations in order to have a ready outlet for their own promotions, such as ticket giveaways and backstage parties. Giving a local radio station a stake in the success of the show is an ironclad guarantee of constant advance publicity.

Live remotes, where hundreds of people will "line up just to watch a couple of guys do a radio show," according to Gatziolis, provide a wealth of demographic information and attract listeners in hordes. "When we had the las Steve & Garry show, 800 people showed up in Downers Grove at Six O'clock in the morning," Gatziolis said. "Getting close to the listener is what's successful."

The Blaze, WWBZ-FM 103.5, takes a direct route to live appearances, offering a promotional package that includes an on-air personality, two "Blaze girls" and at least two live call-ins from the site during the event—all without the expense of an actual remote. Although the Blaze also works up associations with high-profile events, visiting bands and movie screenings, this standard promotional package is available to anybody who wants to pay for it. Clients purchase commercials promoting their event, and, by doing so, promote the Blaze too. "We send out an announcement banner a week to 10 days in advance to tell people to join the Blaze at the event," said Natalie DiPietro, promotions manager for the Blaze. "We promote it on the air heavily and then we just take note of who shows up."

Opinions. Doesn't everyone have them? Well, sure, but would you be comfortable enough to air yours to all of Chicagoland... and then be prepared to defend them? While Chicago radio audiences may have a more mellow reputation than some of their national counterparts, it is not an easy task voicing your views, particularly if they are unpopular ones.

But when it comes to talk show hosts, aren't opinions supposedly a dime a dozen? Doesn't every talk show host have a 1,001 opinions—and aren't 999 of them right? Not every talk show host began their career with a ready-made opinion on the Middle East, NAFTA and U.S. intervention in Bosnia. While some hosts came out swinging, oth-

ers needed a few rounds to warm up. And so began the talk show career of Catherine Johns. The evening talk show host on WLS used to have a hard time telling you just what was on her mind. Commenting on her own initial difficulties as well as why there are few women hosts and even fewer women callers in to talk shows, Johns explained, "I think part of the reason is that women do not grow up learning to take a position, to defend it and to stay separate from it. Maybe that is organic, but my guess is that it is the way women are raised. What we wind up with is that things are personal to me in a way that they are not to some of the guys. It was more difficult to follow the instruction from my program director, namely, 'Take a position, C.J.!' He would tell me, 'Have an opinion. Defend it. When they yell at you, yell back. Do not give up control of the show.' That didn't come naturally to me



at all."

Natural or not, Johns certainly has no trouble expressing her opinions these days. Read on for more of Catherine Johns on being a women in broadcasting, learning to be assertive and dealing with irate listeners. But remember—they're just her opinions!

Chicago Airwaves: You graduated from Western Illinois University in 1975 and worked at all-news radio stations until coming to WLS-AM in 1979. How did you end up as a talk show host here in 1993?

Catherine Johns: WLS was a whole different kind of format for me. I was working at stations that were much like WBBM and came to work at WLS on a morning show where the mission was not only to do the news but to be part of the show and be funny. Working with Larry (Lujack) and Jeff (Hendrix), I discovered a whole new side of my professional self that I did not even

know I had. Before that morning show I had done very straight news. Doing straight news was also enjoyable—I liked my work, but when I came to WLS, I added a new facet to it.

I thought a talk show would be more fun, and I was right! After the format change at WLS, the news was not as much fun because it was kind of like doing a straight newscast that was dropped into a talk show. I was not part of a team anymore. My move into talk radio came when one of the regular hosts was gone, and there was a substitute host. I listened to him doing an interview and thought, "Criminy! I could do better than that."So I went to the program director and said, "Criminy! I could do better than that." He said, "But you've

never done a talk show." I said, "So teach me—how hard can it be?"

What he did was set up an audition for me. WLS cancelled the network program they had been running at night and called it "The Week of Women." I did a couple of shows, and so did a couple of other women. For all of us, it was an on-air audition. And I was so nervous-I had been on the radio for years, but there is a safety net there when it is someone else's show and you are just kind of along for the ride. This was working without a netthis was my show and I was responsible for how it sounded. It had a very different feel to it, but the audition went well. After that, they used me as a fill-in person for vacationing or ill hosts. That was in January 1990 and then in June of that year, I signed a contract and got my own show. It was really great and very exciting.

Airwaves: You say you look forward to

coming in to work everyday. What is the most enjoyable aspect of being a talk show host?

CJ: Talking to people and having them talk back! That is why talk shows are so much more intriguing to me than other kinds of programming. In other kinds of radio or television, you put on a performance and then maybe you get some feedback later, or more likely, not at all. So you kind of assume it is going well or sometimes you finish a show and assume that it went very badly! There is a delay before you get a letter that says, "Oh, that was the funniest thing I ever heard"or "Catherine, you're an idiot. How could you possibly say that?" Whereas in talk radio, it is right there in the moment that people are responding and are part of the show—they are the ones moving the show forward. Or sometimes they are not doing that so you know it is a bad topic and you better talk about something else! The response is immediate, and I love that about talk radio.

Airwaves: On the flip side, what is the

least enjoyable aspect?

CJ: Occasionally, there are things I wish I did not have to talk about. But I do. A good example was the Reginald Denny verdict in Los Angeles last month. It was a huge story, and it was what everyone was talking about all over town. If that is what everyone is talking about at the water cooler or at their favorite breakfast spot, then that is what we need to be talking about on the radio. That is what talk show hosts do-we talk about the things that are current and hot and of interest to people. Those topics then become kind of mandatory. But do I really want to spend three hours listening to people saying, "Reginald Denny got what he deserved?" No. I would not call that fun, but that is just part of the job.

Airwaves: An argument advanced by some media watchers is that talk show hosts like Rush Limbaugh, or to a greater extent Howard Stern, are irresponsible for "whipping up" all sorts of negative emotions. As a talk show host, how do you respond to that?

CJ: I do not think Rush is as powerful as some of his critics believe he is. I think those negative emotions are already out there; I don't think he has created them. A lot of people think he has made people hateful or negative, but I think there has been plenty of hate in the world before Rush came along. I think he articulates the anger that many, many people feel about the political establishment and about what could loosely be called "the left," lumping in the typical Rush targets: environmentalists, feminists, etc. A lot of people do not like those movements, do not like the impact those movements have had on their lives and feel powerless to do anything about it. Rush can be a focal point for their feelings. So would I call that irresponsible? No. In fact, I feel it behooves people who feel differently from Rush to make sure that their own voices are heard. One of the criticisms I hear frequently is, "Well, there's no balance. There is nobody who speaks for the open-minded." That is

partly because those people don't speak up. Talk radio has become the province of the politically conservative. Maybe it always was that way. But in the recent past, it certainly has that bent.

Howard Stern is another matter entirely. I think he is just utterly disgusting and was thrilled that his show did not succeed in Chicago. I think that said something good about our city. I think that speaks to a sort of Midwestern character that is different from what you might find in a lot of other markets. I think he is vile and very irresponsible, and, I will concede, occasionally funny. I have listened to him and laughed. The people who love his show will tell you, "But he's so funny," and yes, sometimes he is, but at what price? I think he puts out poison into the atmosphere and, goodness knows, there is enough poison out there already without inviting him in to give us more.

Airwaves: Do you find a lot of "poison" on your show?

CJ: It depends on what the topic is. Sometimes it is really a useful part of the show. If you are doing a show about racism, and somebody calls and says something offensively and overwhelmingly racist, that highlights the need for what the other people are saying. It is right that we are talking about this because look what is out there. Occasionally people say things that are just so awful that I really wish they had not said them. Usually the answer then is to cut them off. I have on occasion apologized, as in, "I'm really sorry that I let that come into your house." But that does not happen very often. In the show that I do, poison comes up, but it is not a staple. It is more of an occasional spice.

Airwaves: You said that "staking out your turf and defending it against people" was difficult for you in the beginning. How does that feel now?

CJ: Being a talk show host for several years now, I have found ways for myself to put up a protective shield and use listeners' animosity, anger or mockery to make it a better show. For me it was hard to get to that point where I didn't take it personally, where it wasn't a wound to me when someone disagreed

with me. The truth is that the disagreement is what makes the show. Starting out the show fresh after my five minute monologue, I have four or five calls to choose from. I will always pick the call that is the most negative because that is where the excitement will happen. The excitement will not happen with someone who says, "Catherine, you're a genius and you're absolutely right." What is there to talk about? The excitement will happen with somebody who says, "You're completely wrong and let me tell you how it really is." From there, I will weave in people who agree with me and people who don't. But it always is a better show if I start out with someone who opposes what I just said. That was a hard thing for me to do in the beginning. In the beginning, I had a natural inclination to go to the people where I would find agreement because it was safe and comfortable.

Airwaves: Based on your own experiences and observations, what kind of challenges do women face in broadcasting today?

CJ: In talk radio, the challenge is to overcome the cultural expectation that women will be nice, that they will not argue, that they will be conciliatory. In other fields, if you look at the way women operate and the way men operate, men will get together and the guy with the most clout will prevail when there is a disagreement. Whereas with women, they will get together and naturally want to come to a consensus. They do not want to hurt each other's feelings or be right at someone's expense. That is how women tend to operate, but for the purposes of a talk show, that is utterly uscless. The internal effort is to overcome all of that cultural conditioning. That does not mean I have to be a man or be like a man, but it does mean there is effort in that, a challenge to get to a place where I have the skills that are required for this kind of medium.

In the other sense of overcoming challenges, when I graduated from college and started in radio it was not uncommon to hear people say, "You know, I just don't think women should be on the radio. Their voices just aren't nice to listen to." I heard that more

than once from women! Radio was an exclusively male province except for a smattering of "gals" on the dial. So when I first got into this business, the first challenge was to get a job!It was pretty basic, and it was not unusual for listeners to say, "Those women's voicesthey're too shrill." The model in radio was that low-pitched, Jeff Hendrix kind of voice. And it became the model for women. Almost without thinking about it, women who were getting into broadcasting at that time followed that same model. So that is why you had women who also had low-pitched voices. If you listen around the dial, you still will hear a lot of women with low voices.

Twenty years later, there is room for variations, but it took a long time to get there. I know that the business has changed and opened up. I think what you still see in the way as obstacles for women is the notion that women just are not funny. The notion is that a woman could play some music, and a woman could sound sexy on the air, and a woman could even be knowledgeable about music. But if you wanted a conventional "morning man", it was a man. I think that still lingers. If you want someone funny, entertaining or cute, then you have to have Steve Dahl, John Landecker or Kevin Mathews. It's a guy thing. Although there is a handful of exceptions (like Patti Haze on mornings at WCKG), in general women work fringe shifts. If you scan the dial when I'm on the air at 8 o'clock at night, you hear a lot of female voices. Not coincidentally, the people who work at nights make a fraction of the money as the people who work mornings. Although there are feet (in pumps!) in the door all over the radio dial, women have certainly not achieved anything like equality.

I really sympathized with Shannon Dell and her lawsuit against WGCl, but I wasn't surprised that she lost. I don't think that lawsuits are going to take women where we need to go. The marketplace moves radio like nothing else. When women who listen to the radio begin to object to the way women are portrayed on the radio, then the people who run the stations will start to

listen.


