

### Colorado's KHNC Finds The "Right" Marketing Strategy

Johnstown, Colorado, population 1,614, is home to radio station KHNC, AM-1360, which boasts that it is always "on the right side." KHNC has been beaming conservative-minded talk to the northern Colorado and Denver-metro areas since February.

"I believe the traditional family values are really being challenged today, and people are looking for a voice to express their concerns," said Don Wiedeman, KHNC owner. "We seek to do that without being religious."

KHNC's call letters stand for "the heart of northern Colorado."

The station joins a fast-growing radio phenomenon around the country. Talk shows are credited with changing the face of the 1992 presidential campaign as well as impacting modern-day governing through what amounts to instant opinion polls.

KHNC's 500-watt signal is heard along the foothills from Wellington to Golden, and in all but the southern suburbs of Denver.

National personalities on KHNC include Charles Adler—toured as an equal of Rush Limbaugh—Phyllis Schlafly, and Dr. James Dobson, who does a national `Focus on the Family Show" from Colorado Springs. All network radio shows are live and have a toll-free call-in number.

Other features deal with non-political issues, like home repair, medicine and nutrition.

Bur the most popular feature is that of a local man—Dr. Norm Resnick, 50, a professor emeritus from the University of Northern Colorado. When he's on the air, says Wiedeman's son and station general manager Alan Wiedeman, the phones ring off the hook.

Resnick, who has a doctorate in educational psychology, is on weekdays from 4 to 6 p.m. An Orthodox Jew, Resnick said he believes in the moral absolutes of the Old Testament. He calls President Clinton a Marxist and says the battle between conservatives and liberals is being fought on all fronts, from education to abortion.

"We're in a cultural war, and the rules of the Geneva Convention don't apply," he said.

As the station manager for KUNC, FM-91.5 in Greeley, Neil Best is part

of "the liberal media" that KHNC rails against. Best said he dislikes the use of such sweeping labels.

He said the media is often seen as liberal because there was a Republican in the White House for 12 years, and reporters by nature of their job take an adversarial tone.

He calls KHNC's approach smart marketing, but he thinks it's only effective up to a point.

"I think it has a limited appeal, that people get tired of beating the same drum all day long," Best said.

KHNC has been dealing with FCC red tape since 1984. But KHNC's Don Wiedeman says it has been worth it.

"We think we're making some big waves," he said.

### Catholic Talk Radio Makes A Debut In Boston Market

The hosts of a new call-in radio show for Catholics promise that it won't be boring.

"We want to keep listeners engaged and know we have to be entertaining as well as formative," said Robert Kirby, 28, a music producer and graduate student in theology at Boston College and one of the hosts for "Catholic Forum."

Kirby and two old friends will explain the tenets of Roman Catholicism and answer questions five nights a week beginning Oct. 4 on Boston radio station WROL.

"I'm sure there will be many who may want to call and disagree, but our goal is to show the basis for our Catholic beliefs, to show how they are plausible and reasonable and not just something we dreamed up," said David Thorp, 40, director of evangelization for the Boston archdiocese and one of the other hosts.

The programs will run for 30 minutes, beginning at 6:30 p.m., Mondays through Fridays, and most will begin with a five- to seven-minute presentation of a theme on Catholic life.

Sponsors will be George Maalouf and Jack Benson, partners in Faith Films, a production company in Beltsville, Md.

The three hosts hope to get additional sponsors and expand the show to one hour and try for national syndication.

### Major Networks Inc. Names Kelly Operations Manager

Major Networks, Inc., formerly Major Broadcasting, today named a new operations manager to oversee the expansion of two 24-hour radio programming formats it distributes via satellite to affiliates nationwide. The new manager, Brian Kelly, also will develop and launch one or more additional formats for the rapidly growing company.

Kelly, 32, is the former program director at WYSY-FM (107.9) in Aurora and for six years served in the same role at Cap Cities/ABC Chicago stations. During his tenure with that company, it consistently ranked among the top providers of Contemporary Hit Radio.

"It has been a dream of mine to program at a national level ever since satellites made it possible," Kelly said. "My goal is to significantly strengthen the links we have with our affiliate stations—to apply their input to give our network a truly local sound.

Christofer F. Devine, president of Major Networks said Kelly's first assignment is to oversee production of "Super Hit Country," programmed

with the assistance of WSIX, Nashville's Number-One station; and "CITY-FM," an adult contemporary format designed by Joint Communications. Both formats were acquired by Major last May.

"Almost a third of the radio stations in the United States use satellite programming and the number is growing every day," Devine said. "They are discovering that we can provide a product that is as good or better than any local competitor and do so at a fraction of the cost."

He said the growth of the satellite programming industry can be traced to new FCC regulations that expanded the AM Band of frequencies and made it possible for individuals to own or lease and additional FM station in each market.

"The effect has been an explosion in market competition and in demand for high-quality, inexpensive programming," Devine said.

He said Kelly is the key ingredient in his company's growth strategy.

"Brian is the consummate hot Adult Contemporary and CHR program director," Devine said. "He has terrific interpersonal skills that will prove invaluable as we expand our base of affiliates."

### WXRT Holds 5K Run For local REST Shelter

Last month, WXRT-FM (93.1) held its 5th annual "XRT 5K Run," benefiting REST (Residents for Emergency Shelter), a homeless shelter for adults.

The course covered residential streets in the DePaul and Clybourn Corridor area. Along with winning prizes in age and team categories, runners participated in costume divisions by crossing the finish line dressed as Harry Caray, a member of the Conehead family, or their favorite cartoon character. There also was an open and corporate team competition, with all registered teams being eligable for special prizes.

Chicago Ed Celebrates 20 Years of Broadcasting

Commemorating a milestone few other radio personalities

are able to claim, **Ed Schwartz** recently celebrated twenty years of broadcasting on Chicago's airwaves. Schwartz began broadcasting at WIND where he changed the concept of overnight radio with the philosophy that radio should be entertaining no matter what is happening. Schwartz joined WLUP-AM 100 in May of 1992 after ten years at WGN, where Schwartz's show regularly rated

higher than most afternoon show on other stations. One of Schwartz's biggest accomplishments is his annual holiday food drive, now in its thirteenth year. His on-air and off-air efforts generate hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of food annually for the hungry of Chicago.

### WGCI's Dell Loses Sexual Discrimination Suit

**Shannon Dell**, midday disc jockey at WGCI-FM (107.5), recently lost her sexual discrimination lawsuit against the station. Dell had sued the WGCI and owner Gannett Co. for paying her substantially less than the station's male drive-time jocks **Tom Joyner** and **Doug Banks**. A jury found WGCI and Gannett not guilty of sexual discrimination. Dell had been seeking \$2.9 million in back pay, the difference between her salary (which ranged from \$40,000 to \$55,000 a year) and that of Banks and Joyner (which ranged from \$625,000 to \$750,000) since she joined the station in July, 1989.

### B-96 Under Fire From From Esposito

WBBM-FM is under fire from WMAQ-TV's news anchor Joan Esposito for broadcasting slanderous rumors about the fatherhood of her unborn child. The rumor was allegedly started in late March when a B-96 jock stated that a local newscaster was pregnant with the child of a Chicago Bulls superstar. As it turns out, Esposito was the only pregnant newscaster at that time. Esposito will be filing a defamation of character lawsuit against the jock, station and parent organization. The suit will likely seek a large cash settlement.

### WJMK Hires Landecker For Morning Drive

John Landecker, who reigned supreme at WLS-AM in the mid-70s, returned to the Chicago airwaves last month as the new morning man on WJMK-FM 104.3. "This makes all the sense in the world," says VP/GM Harvey Pearlman. "His audience at the height of WLS's euphoria totally coincides with our audience today." Landecker replaces Shawn

**Burke** who moves to middays. **Vicki Truax** will continue as morning co-host, handling traffic and weather.

### WMAQ Announces All-Sports Overnight Format

WMAQ-AM (670), one of Chicago's all-news powerhouse stations, recently switched over to all-sports radio at night. The switch, which coincides with post-season White Sox play, may turn out to be a shrewd marketing decision. The move, however, and does not bode well for WLUP-AM 1000's plans to move to an all sports format.

### WBEZ Appoints Jackson Director Of Development

**Nel Jackson**, director of the Washington-based Ethics Resource Center, has been appointed director of development at WBEZ-FM (91.5). The station has also hired **Barbara Carney**, membership program manager at the Museum of Science and Industry, as membership director.

### Damico Leaves WXRT

Effective the first of this month, WXRT-FM's news anchor Michelle Damico leaves Chicago's WXRT-FM (93.1) to

take the position of assistant director of communication for the Chicago Park District. Damico has served 15 years in radio covering the news. During her time at the progressive rock station, Damico and the WXRT news team have been the recipients of numerous awards for excellence in reporting—most recently the 1992 Associated Press award for "Best Feature" given to WXRT's weekly

"Scuttlebutt" report. The show was produced by XRT's **Neil Parker**, Michelle Damico, and **Mary Dixon**. WXRT is still looking for a canidate to fill Damico's postion.

### Steve Bashes Garry, Garry Quits Loop

Chicago's dastardly duo, Steve Dahl & Garry Meier of WLUP-FM (97.9), are on their own now. After Dahl made crude remarks on-air about Meier's new wife (while the two were on their honeymoon), Meier called it quits. Attempts to gather more information about the break-up have been stymied by pleas of ignorance.

### Miller Takes Kids Radio To The Mix

Brant Miller, who recently joined WTMX as morning host will move his "Kids Radio" program (formerly airing or WGN-AM) to his new home at The Mix. The children's program will air Sacurdays from 6am to 8am.

## They Fought The Law...

HIS SORT OF LAWSUIT USED TO BE AS rare as a Chicago World Series victory. There must have been something in the air this summer, because there was not just one broadcaster vs. employer lawsuit, there were three. In case you haven't been watching Court TV, I thought I would get you caught up.

### Shannon Dell vs. WGCI (Gannett Co.)

Dell is the #1 rated midday jock in Chicago. This year, Shannon (real name Karen Jones) sued WGCl for sexual discrimination (asking \$2.9 million in back wages). Her contention was that she was being paid substantially less than her drive time counterparts because she is a woman. This is the second suit in the last few years that has covered essentially the same territory.

She pointed out that the revenue generated from her midday show was comparable to the revenue generated from Doug Banks (mornings) and Tom Joyner (afternoons). However, it has long been a standard in the business that morning and afternoon drive jocks are considered "more personality-oriented." A quick scan of every station payroll in the city will show that the morning and afternoon jocks generally make substantially more cash than the midday jock. Fair? maybe not. Is it because she is a woman? Doubtful.

She fought the law, but the law won. A jury ruled in favor of Gannett Co. in late August.

### Mitch Michaels vs. WCKG (Cox Broadcasting)

Mitch has been a legend in Chicago for nearly twenty-two years. He was dumped early this summer by WCKG because they wanted to try a more personality-oriented morning show. Of course, they eventually moved midday jock Patty Haze into that timeslot. Nevertheless, that isn't why Michaels is suing. He filed a lawsuit claiming that the station reneged on a promise to not make him work six days, failed to promote his show, and waited too long to tell him his contract would not be renewed. His suit doesn't cite a specific amount because he is leaving open his options for damages for "emotional distress."

This one hasn't gone to court yet. On the surface it sounds like a pretty routine radio firing. If every station that didn't sufficiently promote air talent or fired them without warning was liable, this business could be up for grabs. This case could be in the hands of a jury (knowing our justice system—in about ten to fifteen years).

He'll fight the law, and the law...hasn't won yet. Bet the ranch that station managers will be watching the outcome of this one very closely.

### Howard Stern vs. WLUP (Evergreen Media)

Howard came into Chicago with a built-in bad boy reputation. His arrival into town was given more publicity than the Pope's recent visit to Denver. On his first day on the air here, he ripped just about every personality on his own station. Guys famous for dishing it out were suddenly taking it. Of course, this spelled doom for Howard. Apparently, the listeners also felt that this New Yorker shouldn't be ripping our "home-town-dishers." His ratings never quite caught on (although he was making headway with 18-24-year-old males). After ten months, the bad boy was fired because the station felt that Stern was a risk to their broadcasting license.

According to the trade publication "Radio & Records", Stern doesn't buy the station's reasoning. He doesn't buy it to the tune of over \$20 million. His lawsuit will claim that the Loop is just hiding behind the FCC reasoning. At the heart of his argument is the little matter of the three-year contract he signed. Evergreen Media will have to prove that Stern's show posed too great a risk of being cited for FCC violations, and therefore threatened their license, and therefore the contract was null and void. That's a lot of therefore, but that's why they pay the lawyers big bucks. Stern is also claiming that because he was dropped by the Loop, his reputation has been "tainted" and that is making further syndication of his show difficult. Translation: Punitive Damages.

He'll soon fight the law, and the law... make that the lawyers...will win.

### The Waiver Wire

rofessional athletes are said to be employed in the most volatile business in America. On any given day an athlete can be traded, cut or just plain fired, and not see it coming. Moves are made for indefinable reasons like "team chemistry" or "locker room presence." It's still a cutthroat business where "What have you done for me lately" is the "phrase pays."

People in radio wish they had it that good.

If you haven't been paying attention over the last few months, you missed more than a few changes in the local radio scene. Some big players have been changing teams and/or positions, and there are some new faces up from the farm clubs, too. Get out your scorecard and take note of these roster moves.

### Magic 104

The powers that be at WJMK have coaxed a hall-of-famer out of retirement to bat clean-up and take over the morning shift; John "Records" Landecker. He attained stardom in the '70s as part of one of the most legendary lineups in Chicago radio history at WLS (1972-1981). He also had less successful stints at WLUP, WCKG, and a return to WLS in the mid '80s. He hasn't had a full time slot in Chicago since 1989. Nevertheless, this seems to be a perfect marriage of host and audience, since he will again be playing the music he helped make famous. Don't forget to move former morning host Shawn Burke into the midday slot on your scorecard.

### The Mix.

The team had been mired so low in the standings (23rd), I recently predicted that they would simply give up and try something else. I received an angry reply in the mail from new program director Barry James. He chastised me for looking at past performance (three consecutive extraordinarily dismal ratings books, 1.5, 1.7, 1.5), and not on current statistics. He denied that a format change was inevitable, citing encouraging monthly Arbitrend figures. I say let's see what the numbers say when the summer book comes out. In the meantime, check your scorecard for these changes. After less than a year as morning man, Ron Britain was released. One of the city's best A/C jocks was hired to take his place a few

weeks later; 14 year WLS/Z-95 veteran Brant Miller. Scratch Miler from your WGN lineup (KidsRadio). If you follow local television, you can keep him listed as your Channel 5 weatherman. I just hope Brant doesn't do any forecasting or predicting. His new boss is a little sensitive about that.


### WCKG

The summer began with big morning plans for WCKG. First they released long-time morning man Mitch Michaels. They decided they didn't want a music-oriented morning show anymore. They then traded for Steve Cochran (from Minneapolis) to do a sports-oriented morning show. Unfortunately, they forgot to mention it to Cochran, who assumed he would be doing the "Letterman-style" show he did in Minnesota. Oops. He quit after one day. Management then shifted gears. Apparently they wanted a music-oriented morning show after all. They simply ended up moving midday personality Patty Haze up a slot. Into Patty's vacated midday slot, enter the name Bob Stroud on your scorecard. Stroud comes aboard after a ten-year stint at WLUP-FM. He is a favorite with the classic rock crowd. Somehow, WCKG has gone from industry laughing-stock to one of the strongest stations in Chicago in the span of a few short months. With the Loop recently dropping its music format, WCKG figures to clean up in the fall ratings.

### The Rest.

Of course, there have been many other changes. WLS has a new evening host; Jay Marvin. Pencil him in for 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. Q-101 has a new overnight host; Heidi Hess. Heidi takes over for Diane Banks, who was released. WLUP-FM released Bobby Skafish, who has yet to be picked up by another team. He will almost certainly resurface. WGN released the popular "Sportswriters" show. Look for that to end up on the new all-sports station. Howard Stern was let go by AM 1000. He's suing them. Figure this one; B-96 released their afternoon host Gary Spears. Spears had the third highest rated program in his timeslot, an amazing 5.7 rating. No reason was given.

Athletes should thank their lucky stars they are in such a forgiving business.



### Local Music Roundup

zaza. Suffer Urtha. His Majesty's Clerks. Kool Rock Steady. Simple Simon. As a radio listener, what do the above names

have in common?

A. They're all Chicago recording artists.

B. You've probably never heard of them before.

C. Both "A" and "B".

If you answered "C", why not tune in to the many programs on Chicago radio stations that spotlight local artists? It's not only an enjoyable education but also an entertaining experience.

With enough call letters to fill a can of Campbell's alphabet soup, Chicago radio is a veritable cornucopia of musical tastes. Reflective of the highly diverse population found within the many neighborhoods of the city, suburbs and rural environs, Chicagoland radio pays tribute to the many different ethnicities who call the "Windy City" their home.

From adult to urban contemporary, hot jazz to cool blues, talk shows to Top 40, alternative to rock, Chicago radio stations play it all. Like any major market, Chicago stations have rotations filled with national recording artists. But local artists are not snubbed by programming directors or listening audiences. Hours of unprogrammed airtime await Chicago artists who are eager to give their own music some valuable exposure. For a rundown of stations that offer these opportunities to local artists, read on.

### **ALTERNATIVE**

A longtime supporter of the local music scene, WCBR-FM 92.7 provides two different, weekly outlets for local artists. "The Local Spotlight" is a two-year-old feature that now airs at 2:15 p.m. on

Wednesdays. It originally aired on Tuesdays and Thursdays, but station management chose to "trim it down" in the hopes of focusing more on truly alternative groups.

But the program's format stayed the same: The chosen artist or group plays a track from a demo or album and then gives a brief interview with a chance to plug upcoming show dates.

"Live at Lunch" is a feature that runs at 12:30pm on Fridays. Beginning in early 1993, "Live at Lunch" is an unplugged segment where the featured band plays a 20-minute nonstop, acoustic set.

Robert English, assistant music director, explained what WCBR hopes these two features will do for local bands. "When playing at clubs, these bands need people looking them up and coming out to see them," he said. "That's what we want our programs to do: play their music, have people hear them on the radio, go out to see them, get a following and bring in the numbers."

A similar rationale is behind the creation of "The Local Music Showcase," heard on Sundays at 9pm on WKQK-FM 101.1. The hour-long program, hosted by Carla Leonardo, debuted April 11, 1993.

With such an abundance of talented local bands, why aren't there more groups like Smashing Pumpkins and Urge Overkill being recognized outside of Chicago? "I don't know if this is because of the stigma that hung over Chicago—that whole 'Styx' mentality—but there's just so much talent out there that won't get played on regular rotations," Leonardo said. "At least I can get them exposed, can get people to hear them and go see them. That's really important to me because these bands bust their butts day in and day out. They hold day jobs, practice at night and maybe get a few hundred bucks for a gig. A lot of them are more talented than that."

While pointing out that being broadcast on local music programming is just one step in helping local bands break into both local and national markets, Deborah Brosseau of Events & Entertainment Marketing said that such radio exposure can be an excellent gauge.

"From a musician's standpoint, these local shows are very useful to assess how your music comes off as far as accessibility and production values," said Brosseau, who does marketing for Brain Kiss, a visitor on "Local Music Showcase." "It's really good to hear your music on the radio because it comes off in a different way than when you're playing live or sitting in the studio. It's a very good gauge for how your material actually works on the radio

### COLLEGE

If larger, commercial radio stations are more apt to follow national playlists, then the very essence of college radio stations welcomes local input. At WCRX-FM 88.1, affiliated with Columbia College, an underground dance format ranging from house to hip hop to techno is played. Sonny Bhawnani, program director, estimates that local artists make up one-quarter of WCRX's play list. The feature that exclusively spotlights Chicagoland talent is "The Guest Mix Show," heard Wednesdays from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

"Our listeners can send in their mixes, and if there's no profani-

ty in them, we'll play it on the air," said Bhawnani. "We ask our listeners to call in and let us know which mix they liked best that night. For the ones that get good responses, we keep them aside on the waiting list for the regular mix show."

FINE ART/CLASSICAL

When it comes to quality local talent, don't forget to look under the shadow spread by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and the Lyric Opera. You'll find many other classical groups flourishing there. Earlier this year, WFMT-FM 98.7 aired a 26-week Chicago Music Alliance Series that ran from January through July. The CMA is a 94-member organization dedicated to providing technical, managerial and promotional support to Chicago's music community.

Norman Pellegrini, program director, said that WFMT is hoping to run a 17-week series featuring other artists from the Alliance who were not in the original series. The CMA series ran Tuesdays at 7 p.m. In other local programming news from WFMT, the Sunday morning concert series that featured local artists may not return from its summer hiatus. The five-year-old program that traditionally ran at 11 a.m. has yet to find an underwriter.

"Jazz Chicago Style," heard on WNUA-FM 95.5 on Saturdays from midnight to 2 a.m., traces its roots all the way back to the late 1970s when hosts Dave Freeman and Frank Lee worked at WXFM (currently WCKG 105.9). The pair left the station in the mid-1980s and didn't return to the airwaves with the revamped show until last August.

The show, which spotlights aspiring amateur jazz musicians, became a weekly feature on WNUA in January 1993. With their vast personal collection of recordings and contacts, Freeman and Lee are free to do all their own programming without any input from WNUA management. "Finding out what's going on in your own backyard" is what radio is all about, according to Freeman.

"By playing Chicago artists, we develop a circle of business," Freeman said. "It's important from everyone's viewpoint—the musicians, club owners and local producers."

### **PROGRESSIVE**

Playing on what he semi-seriously termed "The Holy Grail of Chicago Radio," WXRT-FM 93.1, not only gave Matt Berglind and The Howards a well-timed ego boost but also a needed attitude adjustment.

"For bands starting out, being played on the radio gives them a sense of respect and pride," said Berglind, vocals. "It almost validates what you're doing. When we first got played on XRT a few years ago, it really turned out attitudes around."

Not that every band played on WXRT ends up like The Howards (who just took off for a three-month tour of the South and the East Coast), but Richard Milne has seen a lot of Chicago talent pass through on their way to bigger and better things. Milne, creator of "Local Anesthetic," hosts the weekly half-hour show Sundays at 7:30 p.m. "Local Anesthetic" has been on the air for a couple of years as a monthly feature but made the move to its weekly slot back in April 1993.

Milne said the show was born more from an urge to satisfy the

audience rather than to fulfill any sense of responsibility to local bands. "I've been going out of my way lately to point out that the show is not there to serve the bands themselves. That's definitely a part of it, but it's not the whole story," he said. "It's there to entertain the radio audience and to make them aware of a lot of the significant bands that are making music in Chicago."

### RAP

Other stations don't shy away from saying that helping local talent is at the top of their priority list. While station policy at WJPC-AM 950 dictates that all artists in the rotation must be signed on with a recording label, there's an informal policy to help local artists as much as possible. While there is no program exclu-

sively for local artists, they are worked into the rotation as much as possible. Having a younger market gives WJPC more room to experiment with local talent.

"With rap music, kids like to hear the new and different stuff," said Jay Alan, programming director. "Your bigger stations are set on playing the things that are already suc-

cessful hits. With rap music, you can experiment more."

For a station promo recently filmed for airing on cable this fall, Alan turned to local talent rather than the pool of national artists available to him. Kool Rock Steady, a Chicago rapper who signed with the D.J. International label, is featured in the WJPC-AM spot.

"I could have called LL Cool J or Public Enemy to do a commercial for us," Alan said, "but we wanted to try and support the Chicago rap scene. Chicago's rap market is growing stronger and stronger. We're getting a lot more respect, and I want to make sure that I take care of the rappers in Chicago and support my own."

Of course, there are many other opportunities for local artists besides the ones listed here. Many stations program local talent into their regular rotations but do not sponsor a specific time slot exclusively for these acts. In keeping with the inherently diverse spirit of Chicago radio, local artists are given a home on their local airwaves. Who knows when or where a star is born?

## Howard \$tern

adio's provocateur extraordinaire Howard Stern had his record for prognostication tarnished recently when WLUP-AM severed its relationship with the high strung New Yorker. Stern used an unprecedented on-air press conference to tell his new Chicago audience that he would be number 1 in their market in one year. He then promised to travel to the Second City to lead a funeral procession-style parade in honor of his dominance of the city's airwayes. A controversial and ineffective 10 months later, Stern leaves this major market quite a distance from the top spot.

The station's Vice President and General Manager Larry

Wert adamantly insisted Arbitron had nothing to do with their decision. In a very carefully prepared statement, Wert declared that it was Stern's penchant for alleged indecency that caused the falling out. "We're not saying Howard's indecent. We're saying the FCC thinks he is," Wert said in his signature statement to the press. He admitted that the Loop is in a "lesser position to be able to accept the risks" the Stern Show poses because of a history the station has with the FCC. In-house mainstays Steve and Garry, Kevin Matthews and Jonathon Brandmeier are no strangers to the FCC's wrath. However, Werr is confident in his ability to limit the damages. He complains of having no creative control over the East coast pro-

duction. Wert also deemed the \$1.3 million in fines levied against XRK-FM's favorite son since December to be intolerable.

The Stern contingent was caught understandably off guard with AM 1000's sudden announcement. Stern mouthpiece/agent Don Buchwald has stated that Stern will sue the Loop for breech of contract.

Stern had no chance of fulfilling his bold prediction. He was testing uncomfortably on the number 18 spot with two months left before the designated deadline. He clearly endured a bumpier road than the fast track to number one he took in Los Angeles. Nonetheless, his departure conspicuously coincides with the dismissal of

veteran Loop personalities Bob Stroud and Bobby Skafish. These moves, among others, give every indication that unconfirmed reports of an all talk/comedy FM, an all sports AM and light metal rock on recently acquired WWBZ-FM (103.5) is inching toward reality.

Danny Bonaduce graciously postponed his trip to the Cayman Islands to fill in and take his best shot at the morning drive spot. The tattooed wonder took full advantage of his unexpected opportunity using all the jocks bits he had at his disposal. He knocked his predecessor's inability to stay within FCC guidelines calling him a self-serving bastard." He then challenged manage-

ment to permanently keep him on for a double shift (Bonaduce can already be heard on AM 1000 from 6-10 p.m.). He ranted that disc jockeys are "wooses" for only working 4 hour shifts since everyone he knows puts in an honest 8 hour day. The highlight of Bonaduce's first morning drive experience was an ad lib remote from the rock and roll McDonald's.

This whole ordeal has really been blown out of proportion. Wert himself phrased it quite simply during last October's welcoming press conference. "If it works, he stays; if it doesn't, he goes," said Wert appeasing an anxious press corp. It doesn't get any easier. That explains why he gets the big bucks.

## Irreconcilable Differences

THE STEVE & GARRY STORY

teve & Garry, two names synonymous with Chicago radio for the past 15 years, have stayed true to form to the end. Their listeners were shocked for the last time when sidekick Garry Meier dropped a bombshell. Meier returned from a much ballyhooed honeymoon in Europe and promptly quit. Meier did it in style severing all relations, for now, with the industry,

WLUP and, last but not least, one Mr. Steve Dahl.

Initial reports indicated the split was caused by Dahl's on-air antics while the Meiers honeymooned. The whirlwind chain of events began (not so innocently enough) with Dahl wielding some rather unsavory barbs in the direction of the new Mrs. Meier's direction. The unflappable Dahl went so far as to compare Mrs. Meier's relationship with Steve & Garry to that of Yoko

Ono's with the Beatles. Meier listened to the tapes of Steve's solo show and realized that the honeymooned was really over. He immediately served notice leading to a nine day hiatus during which neither faction performed live. An entertaining and possibly auditioning Vince (Argento) and Stiney(Tony Faldingham) spent the first half of peace talks hosting The Best of Steve & Garry Show. Supersub Danny Bonaduce, already pinch hirting for the dearly departed Howard Stern, began the week of September 20 doing an ever popular Loop simulcast. The downtrodden, self proclaimed radio "King Pin" recmerged that Wednesday to begin anew minus a man with whom he has spent the majority of his career.

Despite appearances to the contrary, this was not an impulsive decision. Speculation that Steve & Garryland had not been a happy place for quite some time was confirmed in Dahl's opening statement upon returning from his sabbatical. He admitted that comments made during Meier's honeymoon weren't entirely responsible for the break-up but might have provided the "catalyst" for the decision.

The Dahl-Meier Affair was clearly not the publicity stunt insiders believed it to be. Nonetheless, the controversy lent itself to a wealth of media attention, some clever radio bits and possibly a stronger WLUP during their tedious transition. It was especially interesting to observe Dahl's ability to maintain his sense of humor throughout the ordeal. Those fortunate enough to access Dahl's answering machine would hear: "I

can't come to the phone right now because I'm having a nightmare. In the nightmare, Garry gets married, his wife tells him I'm a jerk and he quits the show. I'll return your call when I wake up."

Dahl fans will be waking up to their hero on AM 1000. His show will remain "general interest" in nature, but will be the anchor for an all sports format. Kevin Mathews will take his "talkmess" to the FM side; and Meier will follow Mathews with his own solo show. All things considered, this story has a happy ending: WLUP keeps its stars, Dahl gets his own show, and Meier—the big winner—gets the girl, and the money.


