### L.A. Radio Production Company Lands National Ad Campaigns for GM and CBS

Paul & Walt Worldwide, a Los Angles based radio production company that earlier this year won an unprecedented 5 Ollies at the International Broadcasting Awards Ceremony, recently landed a 9 spot national radio campaign for General Motors and has been tagged by CBS Television to create the national radio ads that will launch the network's Monday through Friday night comedy lineup for the fall season.

The General Motors ads, which began airing on August 23, focus on GM parts. The ads for CBS will be created for new and returning programs.

#### **Nevada Station to Fight Fine For Howard Stern**

The Federal Communications Commission fined KFBI-FM of Pahrump, Nev., \$73,750 for broadcasting indecent comments by disc jockey Howard Stern.

The FCC said Wednesday the station broadcast the comments on nine days between Nov. 10, 1992 and Jan. 13, 1993, during prohibited hours.

An official of KFBI vowed to fight the FCC action.

"We're confident that once we are afforded due process we will not have to pay a fine and that KFBI will be given a clean bill of health," said Tom Quinn, president of Americom Las Vegas, which owns KFBI. Quinn, in a news release, said the issue involved First Amendment rights of free speech.

The exact words used by Stern were not immediately available. Federal law defines indecency as language that 'describes, in terms patently offensive, as measured by contemporary community standards for the broadcast medium, sexual or excretory activities and organs."

Such talk can only be broadcast dur-

ing night and overnight hours when children are unlikely to be listening.

The FCC said the Stern remarks were "replete with references to sexual and excretory activities and organs" and were aired by KFBI between 6 a.m. and 11 a.m.

Quinn said the FCC sent him 19 pages of transcripts from various Stern programs broadcast in November and December of 1992 and January of 1993.

"Somebody at the FCC apparently believes that at least some of the material in the transcripts may be indecent, but it is difficult to determine which words, sentences or paragraphs the FCC finds troubling," Quinn said.

Americom has 30 days to respond to the FCC charges.

Other comments by Stern, whose show is syndicated by Infinity Broadcasting, have led to a \$105,000 fine against KLSX-FM in Los Angeles and a total of \$600,000 in fines against three Infinity-owned stations, WYSP in Philadelphia, WJFK in Manassas, Va. and WXRK in New York.

#### Limbaugh, Phillips Inducted Into Radio Hall of Fame

Talk show host Rush Limbaugh, National Public Radio's "All Things Considered" program and a man who helped develop the Top 40 radio format are among the six choices for induction into the Radio Hall of Fame.

Radio executives, state association directors and broadcast historians nationwide chose Limbaugh for his work as host of a controversial daily talk show carried on more than 650 stations.

Rick Sklar, who helped develop the now popular Top 40 format, was chosen for excellence in technology, production or management. Sklar was a programmer at WABC in New York and ABC Radio. He died last year.

"All Things Considered" is the first public radio program chosen for the Hall of Fame. The evening news and information program made its debut May 3, 1971.

Others chosen include writer, producer and director Norman Corwin and Chicago radio personality Wally Phillips.

Phillips spent 21 years in Chicago as WGN's morning personality and worked on and off the air on behalf of needy children.

Corwin worked as a writer, producer and director for CBS Radio in New York, producing such shows as "The Plot to Overthrow Christmas" in 1938 and a 1941 documentary on the Bill of Rights called "We Hold These Truths."

## **WOJO-FM Nominated for Spanish Language**"Station of the Year" by *Billboard* Magazine

WOJO-FM 105 has recently been nominated for Station of the Year, Spanish language format, by *Billboard* magazine. In addition to this honor, WOJO Programming Director and Personality Alberto Augusto, was named the 1993 Billboard nominee for both "Program Operations Director of the Year" and "Radio Personality of the Year."

The three nominations were determined by six blue ribbon panels composed of radio professionals, record company promotion executives and members of the bill-board editorial and chart departments.

"We're delighted to receive such recognition from our peers in the radio industry at Billboard. It's wonderful to represent such a talented group of individuals whose hard work and determination have given WOJO such a strong position in Spanish-language radio," said General Manager Chuck Brooks.

The awards ceremony will be held September 9, during the National Association of Broadcasters Convention in Dallas.

#### **Brant Miller Joins WTMX as Morning Host**

WTMX-FM 101.9 recently announced the addition of Brant Miller to its on-air staff. Miller will take over the morning drive timeslot (5:30am-9am).

Currently, Miller is the weekend weatherman at Chicago's WMAQ-TV, Channel 5, as well as host of the locally syndicate "Kidsradio" program.

Miller commented on his new role at WTMX saying "I like the music, I like the people, and I like the listeners. Radio is great place to have fun. The listeners are honest and know what they want from their radio station. My job is easy, I just pretend that I know what I'm talking about."

The morning show will combine music and information for today's active family. Newscasts will air on the half hour and traffic upadates every ten minutes.

#### Jiggets & North to Host Mike Ditka Show

The Score, Sportsradio 820 AM, announced this month that midday personalities Dan Jiggets and Mike North have been slated to host this year's edition of the Mike Ditka Show. The program will span 26 weeks including Super Bowl week and will originate Mondays at 4:30pm, from Chicago's Front Row in Presidential Towers, 555 W. Madison, Chicago.

In a newly expanded role on the Score, Ditka will also appear Mondays and Fridays at 7:30am with morning show host Tom Shaer. In addition to providing in-depth Bears coverage and insight of the National Football League, Ditka will be joined regularly by personalities from the NFL, as well as interacting with Score listeners.

"We are extremely excited to have Mike back for a second season on The Score," stated Ron Gleason, Director of Sports Programming. "Ditka is a Chicago institution. He has a tremendous passion for the game. Plus his quick wit and spontaneity make for a great marriage with The Score."

Guthrie also worked for JB Communications Inc., as an account executive for *Chicago Advertising & Media* and *Chicago Airwaves* magazines.


#### WYSY Names Van Loon Promotions Director

# FM 100 Gets The Point

Spears has obviously spent a lot of time and effort on the morning show, because it has become quite an extravaganza.

When FM 100 dropped its easy listening format several years ago, it raised more than a few eyebrows. After all, it was a profitable operation with very respectable ratings. The decision was

made to go after a younger and potentially more lucrative audience. Overnight, FM 100 became "The Point."

It was not a popular move. "The Point" never caught on. The unfortunate legacy of "The Point" will always be those incredibly embarrassing commercials featuring the disc jockey with the tape over his mouth. You remember them. The cleaning lady, who apparently had more power than the disc jockey, would rip the tape off just in time for him to say "Phil Collins on the Point," then she'd replace the tape on his mouth. I bet the air personalities were really proud of those spots.

Not surprisingly, a change was inevitable. Ten months ago a new program director, Michael Spears, was brought in to try and save a sinking ship. His first move was to drop those commercials. "They were embarrassing weren't they?" Uh, yeah.

Spears knew that the overall sound and image of the station was the first priority. They did some research and discovered that "the point didn't mean anything to anybody." Therefore, it was wisely discarded. FM 100 had been gone long enough, and was no longer associated with easy listening music. It was re-adopted as a moniker. "It's kind of our identity and address rolled up into one," is the way Spears puts it. Slick new ads were put together featuring the music you'll hear on FM 100, without humiliating the disc jockeys.

The music needed direction and fine-tuning. Instead of

copying successful A/C competitor WLIT, they decided there was a niche somewhere between WLIT and WBBM-FM. "We're not light junior. We're more like B-96, in that its more current based. You won't hear rap or heavy metal, but you will hear the currents our audience enjoys." In the winter ratings, they finished in fifth place with their target audience (women 25-54), behind only WLIT, WGCI, WUSN and WVAZ. They appear to be in the hunt for the long haul.

His second move was to hire a veteran morning man to build the station around. Dr. Phil Duncan joined the station back in November. He was a proven commodity in this town, a veteran of WCLR and WLS. Spears has obviously spent a lot of time and effort on the morning show, because it has become quite an extravaganza. There are no fewer than seven regular "cast members." Or as Spears puts it; "Our morning team is larger than an anchor team."

The morning show plays more music than most "zoo-types," and it's not as wacky. However, the large cast makes it difficult to follow at times. Many of the male voices sound remarkably similar. It can sound like Duncan is talking to himself. Still, it gives them a foundation to build around.

Duncan is the consummate pro. He is flanked by sidekick Kelly D'Angelo, who followed Spears up here from Dallas (KDMX). She is thankfully much more than a human laugh track. The newsman is the steady Eric Stallone. But the MVP of the morning show is probably Q-101 import Danger Dan Walker. He served the same role on the recently "retired" Murphy in the Morning show. He provides the humor with his "man on the street" bits. The funniest one is a feature called "late-busters." He shows up at the offices of chronically late people and busts them on the radio for their tardiness. As far as I know, he hasn't been punched yet.

The morning show isn't perfect, and WLIT is still comfortably ahead of them in the ratings, but the ship is no longer sinking. Spears has worked wonders in his first year. It seems FM 100 has gotten the point.

# ACCORDING T

he debate can become rather heated when trying to figure out just when the blues were born, but there's no doubt in anyone's mind that this classic form of music is alive and well at Chicago's all blues WSSD-FM 88.1.

Now located at 11026 S. Wentworth Ave., "the home of the blues" recently made a move from its former studios at 2118 S. Michigan Ave. to take it deeper into the South Side to better serve the communities within its reach. WSSD's signal currently reaches as far south as Crete, IL; north to Madison Ave. in the Loop; west to Pulaski Ave.; and east to Gary, IN. Tenants at the Wentworth location since April, executives at WSSD said the move westward will allow them to eventually stop so much of the station's eastward signal from bouncing into the lake and permit more Chicagoans to sing the blues.

But blues are not the only sounds to be enjoyed at WSSD. A non-commercial, educational radio station under the man-

agement of Lakeside Telecommunication Inc., WSSD has a definitive mission not only to entertain its listening audience but to educate the community as well. With 24-hr. programming, WSSD has met the demand for blues, gospel and jazz music as well as educational programming for minority communities.

Interspersed with the songs of blues greats BB King, Muddy Waters, Tyrone Davis, ZZ Hill and Koko Taylor are community-oriented talk shows like Conversations in Learning, a program for discussion of issues of general community concern; \$Vision, a forum for entrepreneurs to debate matters of investments; and My Health and Yours, a focus on healthy lifestyle choices.

"We want to serve our communities and get some information out to them," said Bill Tyson, general manager at WSSD and Lakeside board member. "It's not just getting music out. We feel we have an obligation to educate as well as to entertain our listeners. If someone in our audience needs to know something, we will either have that information for them or we'll find somebody who can give it to them."

Getting back in touch with what radio was originally intended to be-a forum for both education and entertainment—is a worthy challenge to the all-volunteer staff at WSSD. While most stations opt for the entertainment avenue rather than the educational one, the 40 volunteers who make up the WSSD blues crew take the idea of community education very seriously.

This dedication can be seen in the station's training program. While not a formalized internship program associated

with an accredited school, the opportunity to be on air in the country's third largest radio market is a valuable experience for any aspiring jock. Anyone interested in learning the mechanics of radio broadcasting and logging on-air time is encouraged to contact WSSD.

If the blues are A Mattie Evans grounded in putting life's hardship to music, then WSSD's struggle to get on the air merits a full-fledged blues song all its own. An idea conceived in 1976, WSSD's original air date was in 1980, but mismanagement and other problems kept it off the air more than on until the present crew took over in A GM, Bill Tyson 1987. Credit goes to

Tyson, who has worked for 19 radio station in Chicagoland, for turning the station around.

In one of the "off-again" periods, the studio equipment had been put into storage in someone's basement. It was Tyson's mission to get the equipment back up and running. After a few months of tinkering, Tyson got it right. . . accidentally.

"I wasn't supposed to get involved in any technical work because somebody else was supposed to be doing it," Tyson said. "But they never materialized so I ended up doing all the wiring myself. I played Ghetto Cowboy the whole two months while I was hooking up the wiring to keep me company. One day, right after the telephone company had put the lines in, and we still couldn't get the sound through, I decided to go outside for a breath of fresh air. As I passed through the front room, which is separate from the studio, I heard Ghetto Cowboy!

"I knew I didn't have a speaker in there, but there was a small radio tuned in to 88.1 just in case we got lucky. Sure enough, the song was coming from the radio and that was the first time the station was on the air. But I still can't tell anyone what I did to get it on," he said with a laugh.

Tyson's still laughing to himself at how he and the other volunteers have kept WSSD a vibrant force. It's truly been a labor of love because there are no salaries for the staff, and more astonishingly for a non-profit endeavor, there have

> been no grants. The station operates through underwritings, with a selection of donations ranging from \$5 for 10 seconds to \$200 for one hour. Live/remore broadcasting is available for \$250/hr., just another indication that programming at WSSD really is a reflection of what the community wants.

> While it's true that WSSDreaches out to predominantly minority listeners, don't classify WSSD as a "black station." Despite WSSD's wattage limitations, the universal appeal of the blues, as well as the other programs, makes WSSD a station for all kinds of listeners.

But at the same time, it wouldn't do any good to WSSD's mission to deny that most of its listening

audience is black. The blues crew at WSSD wants to reverse a disturbing pattern that has evolved over the years. While Chicago claims to be home of the blues, most blues listeners—in a commercial sense—are white. With a few notable exception, most blues bars are on the North Side. For years, record companies have targeted white audiences when marketing blues music. So for a music form that traces a proud heritage through the history of black people, why aren't more blacks listening to the blues?

To answer this weighty question, Tyson reflected first upon why Chicago itself doesn't have a stronger blues pool. "This is the blues capital of the world, but Chicago doesn't want to

# Cultural Horizons

WBEZ (91.5 FM) has recently passed two

significant milestones. 1993 marks the station's 50th anniversary in broadcasting and the beginning of its third decade as a public radio station. Each week, the station serves 350,000 listeners in northern Illinois, northwest Indiana and southern Wisconsin 24 hours a day, making it one of the most listened-to public radio stations in America.

Although two thirds of all WBEZ listeners work in executive or professional occupations, they find time on average to tune in for 14 or more hours per week. With its highly intelligent and well-informed listener base, WBEZ has gained

recognition from the media for their news and issues programming. Sondra Gair, profiled this spring on ABC's "Prime Time Live" is one of the station's most noteworthy personalities. She is best known for her probing interviews with world leaders, diplomats and journalists on "Middays With Sondra Gair" and her monthly broadcast hook-up with Radio Kiev. Earlier on weekday mornings, Mara Tapp brings a razor-sharp interview style to her own public affairs program. Bruce DuMont (who has appeared on WTTW's "Chicago Tonight") covers Chicago's colorful political environment on "Inside Politics," while Mark Miller discusses economic trends on "Crain's Chicago Business Report." On

a personal level, "Magnificent Obsession" addresses drug and alcohol dependency by airing true stories about people affected by addiction.

During the dramatic news year of 1992, the station presented listeners background to all the major headline stories in addition to basic facts and statistics. For example WBEZ's Gulf War coverage included reports from National Public Radio, the Canadian Broadcasting Company, the BBC and Radio Deutsche Welle. Along with top notch programming produced in Chicago, WBEZ's listeners receive the best of nationally broadcast NPR and APR shows including groundbreaking Things Considered."

On the arts and cultural front, the station offers a range of programming which is as equally impressive, innovative and diverse as its information coverage.

"There is always an interest in developing new shows." remarks acting programming director Linda Paul. "I don't think that by any stretch of the imagination we have oversaturated our listener's interest in arts and culture. I believe our listeners have a huge appetite for this programming. What I hope will happen is that some of the most successful elements of this programming spawned on shows like "Artistic License," "Backstage Pass" and the new "Stories on Stage" will be integrated throughout our talk programming so we

won't have just a few ghettoized arts and culture programs interwoven throughout our schedule."

Paul cites a specific example with Mara Tapp's two-hour morning show, stating it is not unusual to walk into the studio some days and see Tapp surrounded by a local theater

group or having an impassioned discussion with somebody about a piece of literature. On some occasions, she has even had a book club segment where several listeners who were asked to read a specific book will come into the studio and discuss it.

Even with plans to add more arts and culture segments throughout the day, shows like "Backstage Pass" and "Artistic License" stand out as cornerstones in the station's coverage. Although these two shows have different angles and approaches, they both provide their listeners with a diverse compliment of reports on fine and performing arts. They also put much emphasis on the best Chicago has to offer.


"There is no such thing as far as I know as a conventional cultural maga-

zine show," says "Artistic License" host Victoria Lautman as she reflects on the history and purpose of her show (airing Fridays from 2 to 3p.m.). "When we started the show three years ago, there were no other cultural programs in Chicago,

and there is still nothing completely devoted to all the diverse cultural events we cover on the show. You might hear theater or book reviews piecemeal on some other stations, but there is no place where you can get art gallery reviews or walk-throughs of exhibitions with artists or museum curators. We offer live performances on the show from poetry reading to actual performance artists at work."

When WBEZ approved the planning of this show back in 1990, Lautman with co-host Neil Tesser (who left the show this past January) and a producer were asked to develop it based on defining the parameters of arts and culture, examining what could be covered and finding different ways to cover cultural events besides reviews and interviews.

Within the first nine months of "Artistic License," they brought in a team of noteworthy Chicago writers and critics to cover everything from television and architecture to music and dance to film and fine art. On occasion, they even stretched their definition of culture to include things like fashion and food. Once the core of this show was established, they wanted to broaden the base to include examinations and discussions related to news tied directly to arts and culture issues (i.e. censorship, the impact of computers on the arts, racial issues in theater, etc.).



just interviewed the Grateful Deads's, Jerry Garcia. I have interviewed David Hockney as well as Pulitzer Prize-winning authors and playwrights. There is nobody else out there covering talents like these."

"Backstage Pass," created by host Karl T. Wright and aired at 7pm, Fridays, aims to present performing arts from a more

"alternative" pop culture point of view. What sets this show far apart from "Entertainment Tonight" and "MTV"-type shows is emphasizing works that may not have major film or record company hype, but have the quality and integrity

which merits attention from the public.

"Backstage Pass" started with an idea I had four years ago that somebody on Friday nights should tell people what is going on," recalls Wright. "There used to be calendar listings on a program I used to do called 'Airplay' aimed at young adults. Around the time 'Airplay' ended, I thought we should expand this idea into a show of its own, and the program director asked me to create the show based on the arts scene.


"This show was originally designed to be an interview and review program highlighting what was going on in Chicago and its arts community-movies, theater and concerts. It started off with our discussing things like major studio movies, but it evolved into a program that exam-

ined things that don't get as much play.

For example, we interviewed Robert Rodriguez who made the film "El Mariachi," the brothers who made "Menace II

Society," and many others who would not get interviewed normally."

Video List" where listeners call in to recommend great smaller films on video during weekends when all the "hot" releases might be checked out, and guest there'er reviews from listeners pledging money to WBEZ. Future place for the show include new theme music, more segments in the mix including dance reviews, and actual "backstage" behind-the scenes features. Recently alled is a monthly

segment by Jeannie Affelder, who interviews celebratics about their favorite music and asks what albums they would want if stranded on a desert island.

In addition to these two unique variety programs. WBFZ offers several music shows geared to people with diverse tastes. According to Dana Calderone, the station's director of music programming, jazz is WBFZ's dominant music format (which included "Archives of Jazz" hosted by Dick Buckley Sundays at 1pm and "Jazz Forum" airing Monday through Thursday at 9pm). Other formats, meanwhile, have developed devoted followings as well as cross-over appeal to different audiences. Among

these shows, the most popular include "Passport" (Saturdays at 7pm), "Earth Club" (Sundays at 5pm) and "Mambo Express" (Saturdays at 9:30pm).

The shining jewel of this collection, however, is "Blues Before Sunrise." Although the show airs from midnight to 5 a.m. week-nights, the show has developed a strong national fan base. Additionally, WBEZ is also known nationwide for its broadcasts of the Chicago Blues and Jazz Festivals, including this years Jazz Festival taking place the 10th, 11th and 12th of this month.

play the blues," Tyson said, noting that there is not one station with an exclusively blues format. Why not? The reasons for having an all-blues station overpower any arguments against having a blues station.

"The blues sell continuously," Tyson continued. "They might sell a smaller amount, but they keep selling. People are locked into doing quick money things and producing records that will go platinum in a hurry. Blues records won't do that, but they are a steady seller. Also, when blues artists come to town, be it Tyrone Davis, Johnny Taylor or BB King, they always play to sell-out crowds."

But Chicago's reticence to really play the blues is only a partial answer. The other part is a murkier issue, one of blacks' pride and/or embarrassment in a music form largely attributed to them and their cultural history.

Emphasizing that the following is just his own opinion,

The nice thing about "Blues Before Sunrise" is that it is in it's third sear of being nationally distributed," says Calderone. "It can be heard on over 31 stations nationwide, and as far away as Hawaii and Alaska. based on listener reaction at a later date.

These shows, in addition to the other locally and nationally produced shows, are designed to expand the horizons of listeners culturally as the station's news programming does with valuable information. The target is a listener who sets out to be well-rounded and aware of as many things as possible. Or, as Wright says, "If people hear about something that's good, they are going to want to see it. If they don't hear about it, they won't experience it. It's just that simple."

Tyson conjectured on the mixed feelings associated with the blues. "We don't want our neighbors to know that we like Muddy Waters or Howling Wolf, but we love it behind closed doors," he said. "I've been in places where really sophisticated people, after a shot of Jack Daniels and one of Muddy Waters, come back down to earth."

Hoping to get more and more people singing the blues, Tyson and the other volunteers at WSSD continue to work hard to keep their station going. "I just want to play some sort of small part in getting people to return to the blues and understanding that the blues is a beautiful art form," Tyson said.

He has a natural delivery, a self-assured confident air about him, and most importantly, an engaging personality. His barbs at Santo come frequently, but they are done without the slightest trace of animosity. It sounds like two good friends just chatting about the ballgame, complete with just the right mixture of unabashed tooting and playful sarcasm.

The age difference doesn't seem to matter Brennaman was still more worried about getting his box of 64 Crayola Crayons when Santo covered the hot corner for the Cubs in the '60s and early '70s. Still, he directs the flow of the broadcast. At the age of 29, he handles the pressures of the big time with ease and grace. He will soon be the Cubs/WGN franchise.

I found myself wishing he wasn't about to switch over to TV, but I knew it was time for the man that is now the Cubs/WGN franchise; Harry Caray. He works the middle innings on the radio. It has become fashionable to bash Harry over the last few seasons. I admit that I laugh at his mispronunciations and occasional gaffes.

I don't know why, but this season I also appreciate Harry more than I have for years. It seems he has regained his edge; his ire turns on the Cubs more easily, his crackle at his own expense is infectious, and his love of the simple things connects with the fan in all of us.

The Cubs hit a long ball. "It might be," his voice raised to meet the excitement of the game. "It could be," the cheer of the crowd reverberated. "It is!" And it was like I was there. Only better. The imagination paints a much more vivid picture than reality.

I lifted my frosty cold one to toast the man when he said "There's nothing like fun at the ol' ballpark."

I turned to my wife to clink cans with her. Surely Harry must have turned her around. Finally, after all these years I had created the perfect scenario for her to appreciate what I have loved since childhood. She had a big smile on her face. Her imagination was painting a Rembrandt.

Unfortunately, she was fast asleep.


