Collier's Hour will return to the air Sunday night (September 11) at 7:15 under the new name of "National Weekly Radio Review." WLW and other NBC stations will carry it. Senator Smith W. Brookhart, Iowa, and Congressman Fiorello La Guardia, New York, will be guest speakers this week. Uncle Henry and the Editor will be the central characters as in past seasons. Lucille Wall, the Collier's Love Story girl will be heard in a dramatization of "Practically Perfect." Professor Lucifer G. Butts has a new invention, to expose. John B. Kennedy, associate editor of Collier's will be master of ceremonies.

Libby Holman has Three Microphone Days This Week

Libby Holman, the Cincinnati girl whose moaning voice made her the hit of the first "Little Show" and one of the Big Three in "Three's a Crowd," will be heard three times this week at 6:15 p. m. (Monday, Wednesday and Friday) through WKRC in a new series of Limit programs which replaces the daily appearances of Dennis King.

Monday (September 14) she will sing "Moanin' Low." Wednesday (September 16) her song is "Body and Soul." Friday (September 18) she sings "Something to Remember You By" and "Can't We Be Friends." Each week a different stage or screen star is to be featured by Limit, with an orchestra and quartet on the side.

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Harry Richman, Irvin S. Cobb, De Wolf Hopper, Gus Van, In Majestic Gala Hour

With the irrepressible Gus Van as master of ceremonies, Harry Richman, DeWolf Hopper, Ruth Etting, Irvin S. Cobb, and Redfern Hollinshead will appear Sunday, (September 13), in the premier of the Majestic Gala Hour which will be broadcast weekly from 9 to 10 p. m. on WKRC and the Columbia network.

Ben Selvin's orchestra, after four years off the air, returns to background for the radio extravaganza.

Gus Van, in addition to his m. c. stunt, will sing his famous "Sauerkraut" and "Mussolini" numbers.

Harry Richman, the Cincinnati, who, like Ruth Etting, is a headliner in the current "Follies," will sing two new hits from George White's "Scandals": "That's Why the Darkies Were Born" and "This is the Missus." Long Live DX

At this time of year people are noticing signs of approaching Fall. So let us point out a portent as infallible as the proverbial frost on the pumpkin.

If, some crisp Sunday about noon, you chance to see a radio fan staggering downstairs, a light of high accomplishment banishing the sleep fog from his eyes, and chanting a litany of unfamiliar call-letters, be sure that both autumn and the DX season are here.

It is a spectacle you may witness any week-end now, and which will be repeated many times before spring comes again. For, like the reports of Mark Twain's death, the passing of distance-fishing has been very much exaggerated.

Despite frequent and impressive burials, interest in distance reception is not only still alive, but bigger and better than ever. And rightly so, we think.

True, it is no longer radio's major appeal, as it was back in the early days. Programs have stepped into first place. Nevertheless, the not always gentle art of fetching them in from the great open spaces remains the fascinating sport of dialing.

A fine sport it is, too. One pits his skill and patience against the whims of nature and obstacles of man's devising; moreover, with the spice of competition to spur him on.

Doubtless also, no small part of distance-getting's appeal is that it gratifies the wanderlust latent in all of us. At any rate, regardless of why, DX is flourishing rather than languishing. There is conclusive evidence of that on every side.

The development of more sensitive receivers, coupled with improvements in broadcasting, has done much to stimulate interest recently. And now, to make the distance-seeker's joy complete, comes the a. e. short-wave receiver, permitting direct trans-oceanic reception as well as the usual trans-continental jaunts.

Verily, many hours of precious sleep will be lost these next few months while the static-fighters listen raptly to strange call-letters being waffled from the far places. But the price will not be too high. There is nothing, in or out of radio, quite like the pleasure of DX.

H. V. Kaltenborn is back on the air (WKRC, Tuesday and Thursday at 6:30 p. m., beginning Sept. 15) after an interviewing tour of Europe. That's something to bring elaters from the many who've been missing him. He's one of the most fearless and interesting of the broadcasting news commentators. From Columbia comes a good story about him. They say he becomes so absorbed in putting his stuff across that he forgets rules and thumps the table with his fist to drive home his points. They have to put an inflated rubber cushion in front of him as a shock-absorber, to keep the mike from being wrecked.

That series of talks by Jeff Davis (WLW, Tuesday, 7:30 p. m.) sounds promising. "The King Of The Hoboes" broadcasts well and knows what he's talking about. If he can debunk the "open road" he'll be doing something worth while for a lot of misguided youngsters.

Gibert and Sullivan Light Opera Gents (WSAI, Sunday, at 4 p. m.) is worth an hour of anybody's listening. For sparkle and gaiety, here's the genuine article. And besides good voices, this NBC version has a smooth narrator to keep the amusing stories moving.

Comes the report that Tris Speaker will help Graham McNamee handle the World Series. That's something to look forward to. The great old outfielder's been covering the Cubs and White-socks for WENR all summer, and they say he's as good at announcing the game as he was at playing it. Maybe NBC has tumbled to the fact that the real fans want more baseball and less about "One-eyed Conolly" et al. It won't be long now, either.

The youngsters are tickled pink to have Red Goose Adventures doing business at the old stand again (WKRC, Tuesday at 7:30 p. m.). These frontier yarns are sure-fire stuff for little listeners.

"Hink and Dink" fans now can find their backface favorites adorning the Werk Bubble-Blowers program (WLW, Tuesday, at 8:30 p. m.) The Oxford boys deserve such a break. They've been doing consistently good work for years, so good that it's surprising a sponsor hasn't snapped them up long ago.

Willard Robison and His Deep River Orchestra put on a mighty dandy show (WSAI, Thursday, at 8 p. m.) Willard's famous for blues that are something besides discordant. And he's put together an orchestra that's just as different. Altogether here's a refreshingly unique act.

That new series of Peters Parades (WKRC, Thursday, at 9:45 p. m.) is a diverting popular bit. Irene Beasley, Victor Young's Orchestra, and the Ken Christie male trio join forces to keep things moving quite entertainingly.

Though it's just getting under way, the Old Reliable Coffee Hour (WLW, Friday, at 7 p. m.) already has the earmarks of a winner. Bill Stoess' able orchestra and a splendid sextet guarantee the high caliber of the talent, and the programs are shrewdly built. It's going to be one of the much talked of features by the time a few weeks roll by.

Fall is just around the corner sure enough. Columbia has announced its football schedule, and a plenty interesting one, too. If Ted Fusing keeps up the pace he's been setting the last couple of seasons it's going to be hard to pry the old ears loose from a loudspeaker, come pigskin time.

The program of the Fuller Brush Man (WSAI, Tuesday, at 8:20 p. m.) cleans up quite neatly. It's a smooth, nice of good entertainment. And by the way, Allen Johnson, who does the Brush Man, is one of the best in the business when it comes to radio acting. You'll find him on several NBC acts every week.

Singing from WHK in Cleveland, the Boswell Sisters will be heard through WKRC at 8 p. m. They will sing "Star Dust," "I'm Keepin' Company," "Yes or No," and "Take It From Me."

Charles Farrell and Chic Endor will be guest artists on the Club Valspar program at 8:30 p. m. through WSAI.

Sunday, September 13
CROSLY THEATRE

"The Fire of Frenchman's Bayou" will be broadcast in the Crosley Theatre at WLW at 9 p. m. and again at 11:30 p. m. Wednesday (September 16), with Alfred Aldrich in a leading role. You Should Know --- Josef Cherniavsky



Josef Cherniavsky, director of the Gibson Synco-Syncopaters, is as agile and dynamic as this picture shows him.

His early energy was worked out as a musician under the Czarist regime in Russia where he toured the country, conducting symphonies. He was born in a small town in Ukraine, son of a family of prominent musicians. His uncle was Mischa Elman's first violin teacher. His father was a noted bandmaster in Russia and started his little son to playing the snare drum in his band when only eight years old.

Under the regime of Kerensky, Cherniavsky, with Vladimir Bakaleinikoff, of the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra, was an officer of the Russian musical organization. Coming to America, he joined the Capitol Theatre (New York) orchestra as solo 'cellist. There he became intensely interested in American jazz and organized his own orchestra. With the advent of talkies, he went to Hollywood and for two years was movietone director for Universal, scoring their productions (including "Show Boat") and directing a jazz orchestra in the making of musical accompaniments.
