Crosley Stars On Air With Rudy and Irene Melodies of Old South Feature New Symphony

When Rudy Vallee and Irene Bordoni came to WSAI Thursday (May 5) to broadcast their Fleischmann Hour, Marjorie Hannan, Jack Zoller and Wally Maher of Crosley Studios assisted in the presentation. Wally was absent when the camera man did his work. For the one-hour broadcast, Rudy sent his Connecticut Yankees through a stiff four-hour rehearsal, from 2 to 6 p. m.

WCKY will originate a regular Friday 45-minute NBC sustaining feature Friday (May 13) at 11:15 p. m. over the WJZ network. "Southern Symphonies" will be the name of this new program and will be presented by Theodore Hahn, Jr. and his WCKY Orchestra.

The shifting moods of gaiety, melancholy and deep spiritual beauty that breathe the atmosphere of the Old South will distinguish "Southern Symphonies." The feature opens with the "L. B. Wilson Theme" in honor of WCKY's President, to whom, as well as to Maurice Thompson, Studio Director, is accorded credit for this NBC program.

Mr. Hahn is a distinguished member of a family famed for its musical tradition and has long been identified with Cincinnati's College of Music.

With him and his orchestra will be featured the Debutantes, consisting of Ruth Heubach Best, Mary Hartwell and Nadelle Schuping, favorites with WCKY listeners for their blue harmony. Russell Henderly creates their

arrangements and is pianist. WCKY Virginians, to be heard Friday, include Grady Hodges, Ramon Black, Ellis Frakes and Russell Hodges.

The Hahn Orchestra includes Milton Henysch, violin; Ned Reese, violin; Howard Dhanan, violin; Earl Springer, cello; Al Tiemever, bass, oboe and English horn; Carl Portune, piano; Fred Schutt, clarinet and saxophone; George Carr, clarinet and saxophone; Joe Leichtmann, clarinet and saxophone; and Robert Fuller, marimba, xylophone, drums and traps.

"Southern Symphonies" will be announced by James S. Alderman, chief announcer of WCKY, a native Texan.

The artists are members of the Russian Opera Foundation and include in their roster Max Panteleieff, baritone; Feodor-Manya Maruchess, soprano; Marina-Anna Leskaya, dramatic soprano; Schuisky-Gabriel Leonoff, tenor; Dmitry-Ivan Ivantsoff, dramatic tenor; Varlaam, Michail Schvets, bass-o; Missail-Josef Kallini, tenor; Pimenn-Prince Alexis Obelensky, basso, and a Jesuit-Stephan Kozakevitch, baritone.

A CAKE WITH A CANDLE

Radio Dial is one year old this week.

Celebrating a birthday with much "pointing with pride" has become an old publication custom. But, without hiding behind any false modesty, we believe the occasion of our first cake with a candle can be commemorated more fittingly by restating the fundamental facts and policies to which Radio Dial owes its existence.

First, despite its technical and artistic perfection, radio is not self-sufficient. Alone, it is pretty much like a telephone system without directories. You may have the finest receiver obtainable. Near you the most modern stations may be transmitting splendid programs. Yet without some dependable means of knowing when and over which stations any desired programs can be heard, your receiver will remain comparatively useless, and the stations will have only a catch-as-catch-can audience.

So Radio Dial's primary function is that of a printed link between listeners and stations; a constantly corrected radio directory, as it were.

Further, intelligent and interested listening demands something more than a bare listing of programs. Without pertinent information regarding radio artists, actors and speakers, the listener is no better off than a theater-goer who must choose a play merely by its title.

Hence we think it our province to print all the timely and trustworthy news to be had at the various studios, together with interpretive discussions of those broadcasting problems and trends which seem most significant from week to week.

That, in brief, is our editorial creed.

As embodied in paper and ink, many of you have been good enough to give it your hearty endorsement. For these friendly expressions of approval we are deeply grateful, and no less so for the numerous constructive suggestions which have helped us mightily in rounding out our conception of what a weekly radio program paper should be.

To become a stronger link between listeners and stations; to be a more faithful interpreter of each to the other; to assure every reader greater enjoyment from his receiver, and a wider audience for every worth-while program; these are among our objectives for our second year, now just beginning. In their attainment, we are looking forward to the same friendly help from both listeners and stations which has made our work as intermediary so pleasant in the past.



Lots of us have been wishing somebody would rediscover waltzes, as a relief from ubiquitous jazz, not to mention the pleasure of flowing melodies. And Frank Munn has a sweet tenor. By the way, he's the son of a New York policeman.

The 1932 edition of the Kodak Week-end Hour (CBS over WKRC, Friday at 8 p. m.) turns out to be a highly enjoyable variety show. Of course Nat Shilkret can be counted on for that. And they're billing a glittering succession of guest attractions.


But so do all us males—at least, in our tactical moments.

No, Amos and Andy's theme tune is not a phonograph record. It's played by a live orchestra under the direction of Joseph Gallicchio. The piece, by the way, is "The Perfect Song," from "The Birth of a Nation," and was written by Joseph Carl Brink.

Those Maxwell House programs (CBS over WKRC, Monday, Wednesday, Friday, at 10:15 p. m.) are good entertainment. Lanny Ross is a he-baritone, not a crooner, and really worth dialing.

are turning up in artists' fan mail. Who said this is the blasé age?

So Canada Dry is back on the air with George Olsen's orchestra and Jack Benny as master of ceremonies (NBC over WLW, Monday at 8:30 p. m.). George's music is good, and Jack is one of the few really funny radio M. C.'s. Still, we do miss those stories of the "mounties."

Julia Sanderson has a superstition that is different from most, anyway. She thinks it's unlucky to have goldfish about the house.

There's a report that Canada is going to assign stations to the 540, 550 and 520-kilocycle channels, now used by military aviation. If the United States follows suit, there may be considerable changes in the broadcasting map of North America.

Another glimpse behind the radio scenes: that sound of a cow being milked, which you heard in a recent Stebbins Boys episode, was produced by squirting water from rubber bulbs into a tin pail. Taking a leaf from the milkman's book?

And Ben Bernie has joined the army of Kentucky colonels. But it's going to be tough if Colonel Bernie ever has to stand at attention. As a top sergeant may have reminded you—very tactfully, of course—one can't smoke a cigar while standing at attention. And Ben without his cigar—well, it just wouldn't be Bernie.

This Business of Broadcasting

Every now and then a novel twist, in radio, calls attention to what actually is being accomplished in a new field.

In every day American life, it takes something out of the ordinary to attract attention. In radio the day-after-day broadcasts are apt to be taken for granted. The staid old world usually needs something to bounce it out of its complacency and America of all nations looks and longs for the unusual. That is why

a certain thrill goes with the broadcasting of unusual events, happenings, anything out of the ordinary.

Radio satisfies a natural yearning when it broadcasts program entertainment from a train moving a mile-a-minute. When it broadcasts from three fast-moving airplanes it does the same thing. When in a laboratory in Schenectady a pistol shot is fired whose sound is heard around the world, radio gets out in front of the big parade.

When a local station broadcasts the sound of a factory whistle, or the heart beat of a human being, it also steps into the picture.

Spectacular broadcasts of this kind are of interest to the radio engineer merely because they prove what can be done with a marvelous mechanism. Such broadcasts are of interest to the average person because they awaken the imagination, call attention to something that is taken almost as a matter of fact. Broadcasting, even in its infancy, has come to be so much a part of living that it rates now with the necessities of life.

Morning, noon and night, the broadcaster is on the job. As life is now lived, the day begins with radio. It ends in the evening hour with a mu-

sical program best suited to sleepy-time, down South or up North. At no time during the course of the day is radio out of touch with its people.

There is something for everybody—and that is why, even in this stage of existence, broadcasting is sometimes not quite fully appreciated. It takes a spectacular broadcast to add salt to a jaded mind. It takes a rude awakening to make people realize that a great invention is serving them.

One of the blessings of the broadcast is this: It is there, always, at the turn of the dial, and it works with the precision of a railroad. There is perhaps no other industry that runs so regularly, so much on schedule time. A minute in a broadcasting studio is a precious period. This is proved by any prolonged silence, at the receiving set, when seconds seem like large pieces of eternity. The radio must function with the same degree of punctuality as the throb of the human heart.

Broadcasting has come into American life and without broadcasting American life would never be the same. It seems rather remarkable that, only so long as twenty years, life ran along smoothly without broadcasting. Now, if radio were ever taken out of life a great void would be established. People might not know it, but their entire lives would be changed without this convenience—all brought about within one or two generations. That is, the broadcasting part of it.

It takes a spectacular broadcast to call attention to something within the reach of all. Ever now and then something out of the ordinary must be done, if only for the fun of it.

Occasionally, American listeners, if they pay attention to their receiving sets, get that thrill of hearing a man talking in Timbuctoo or in South Wales, or Sidney, Australia. It might be the thrill of an aviator flying over the West Coast on a pleasant afternoon and talking to a brother aviator flying in the moonlight over some Eastern airport. All these things have their usefulness. In mental pictures they show what a vast country America is, even how time is divided, and how in any one period the weather is vastly different over various parts of the continent.

Certainly there could be nothing finer than this to impress children and even grown-ups, with the magnificent nation in which they live. A spectacular broadcast, if it does this, gives a glimpse of America and accomplishes something worthwhile, even though it might be called "only a stunt." Every now and then the nation needs novelty.


