



EDITORIAL

BENEFITS REMEMBERED

Before Washington area music lovers go 'ape' over the prospect of having Rostropovich as principal conductor of the National Symphony, I think a little appreciation of what Antal Dorati has done for the orchestra is very much in order.

Let there be immediate recognition that he raised the orchestra from a provincial ensemble that was on everyone's conscience (if not on their giving lists) to a musicianly group that one listened to with joy and not from a sense of duty.

Dorati also brought to the city a dedication that could make sense to people who were not musicians but who could understand what conviction about a calling could mean. In an interview he once said, "My profession is music. My occupation is conducting," thereby presenting us with a distinction that anyone concerned about professionalism could appreciate and adapt to his own uses.

Dorati's honesty about his work is refreshing and encouraging. It is a pity that the "glamour" of music cannot be stripped from all practitioners of the art so that the bones of hard, hard work and devotion could be laid bare.

Years ago when some of the critics in town seemed "out to get" the Symphony's first conductor, Hans Kindler, he wrote in a private letter that he could not be worried about what they said as he had too much to do. I hope this was the heart of the matter and not just cheerfulness put on at a time of disappointment.

I also hope that Dorati will be remembered, not for any suggestion of glamour or heroics, but for artistic accomplishment. (At least it could warn Rostropovich of what could lie ahead of him.)

BENEFITS FORGOT

I have a strange feeling that by the time 1976 is over, George III is going to seem like a much more admirable guy than we have been brought up to think. Unless, of course, we suddenly decide that **he**, and not the Bicentennial Administration, is the source of all our woes.

Twenty-five to forty million visitors are expected to pass through Washington during the Bicentennial year. And if this thought is not sobering enough, think how slowly they will pass through if Metro isn't completed. Anyone who re-

cently stood in line at the Chinese Exhibition has been given a foretaste of what it's going to be like.

But minor considerations of creature comforts aside, what is going to be accomplished? Not here alone, but in the other centers of rebellion on the East Coast? For that matter, what will "they"—out there somewhere—think of the Freedom Train? Museum addict though I be, I think the idea that the spirit of a movement can be boxed-up and carried around the country is certainly open to question.

If I were running the Bicentennial celebration, I think I would encourage the study of 18th century writing, carefully pointing out that the leaders wrote for themselves and did not hire a local ad man to contrive inspiring prose. Then I would point out that the words used—even though today we see them through a haze of piety—managed to survive fashion because they had style.

That is what I would do if I hoped to increase understanding of the revolutionary mind.

If I hoped to increase the understanding of the manners of our ancestors, I would see that everybody learned to minuet, that sexiest of dances. Nor would I bother to tell the dancers what became of the minuet in the hands of musicians. Nor would I listen to pedants pointing out that not everyone danced the minuet. Everybody who counted, danced the minuet.

It was a most civilized dance. And for a war, the American Revolution was remarkably civilized—shot and shell notwithstanding. It was civilized mainly because its leaders were civilized. So, perhaps the most fitting tribute we could pay to the Founding Fathers would be to try on a little more civilization, starting with language—both vocal and body.

FORECAST! BREAKS GROUND



Though seldom energized by pettiness, I nevertheless feel compelled to respond to the peevish complaint of Mr. Cyril H. Davies published April 1975 under the "Letters" section and entitled: "Improving Scanning the Dial." Forecast! provides so many worthwhile articles and features that to nitpick its small inperfections is somewhat trite. It is not the magazine's fault that few FM stations can afford to hire personnel just to make up a whole month's menu, movement by movement in advance, and punctuated down to the last stanza. The program listings are still far superior to most newspaper and other guides.

Secondly, there are compelling arguments for leaving the station listings by frequency as you currently have them. If significant numbers of people want them alphabetized, why not offer two separate listings? Surely it could not be that much more of a publication expense and would please everyone—ostensibly!

Thirdly, I can only conclude that if Mr. Davies chooses to turn off his radio or fails to renew his subscription to your magazine—merely because he has not been given an advance on the programs—he is indeed the one who loses and will miss much. But then again, he may not be that serious a listener anyway.

In closing this paean to trivia I have only one final observation. I was raised in a small West Texas town that for years had only one FM station and no program guides. Living in the Washington area provides any music lover, regardless his spectrum of preference and taste, a veritable smorgasbord from which to choose. Most listeners should have such high class worries as those of Mr. Davies.

Happenings



THE ORATORIO SOCIETY of Washington will present on May 17 a unique and exciting musical event—a Festival of Washington Composers

The concert of contemporary instrumental and choral music will be highlighted by Russell Woollen's to Martryum Memoriam, a magnificent work commissioned by the Society in 1969, in tribute to the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., President John F. Kennedy and Sen. Robert F. Kenneshi.

The Festival, to be held in the Kennedy Center Concert Hall, will mark the premiere of a work for chorus and orchestra by Fred Weck, one of Washington's most original composers. Mr. Weck, director of instrumental music in the schools of the Catholic Archdingese of Washington, has experimented in gast works with such techniques as non-musical vocal sounds, electronic music and film. His rich tonal imagination is enhanced by charal taxts chosen from such diverse sources as Latin masses and the poetry of e.e. cummings and T.S. Eliet.

The Festival will also present one of the finest works of the late Robert Evett, the acclaimed local composes whose untimely death on February 4, 1975, at the

age of 52, was a saddening loss to the Washington performing arts community. The legacy of Evett, who composed in every musical form from symphonies to solo songs, will be represented by his Concerto for Harpsichord and Orchestra, composed in 1961 for the Inter-American Music Festival at the Pan American Union.

The Oratorio Society has invited the D.C. Youth Charale, under the direction of Ed Jackson, to participate in the concert. The Chorale will probably perform a work by one of Washington's noted black composers, and will also join the Oratorio Society in singing the final chorus of in Martyrum Memoriam, a soaring arrangement of the traditional Millio Precious Lord

The Festival of Washington Composers promises to be one of the high points of the spring musical season. It will be a fitting prelude to the Bicentennial, putting emphasis on the work of modern enusical artists who are keeping alive the spirit of innovation that characterized America's past.

Recognizing the contribution that this concert will make to the area's cultural (Continued on page 17)

The gainting, formarly in the collection of the late James Murnaghan, of Dublin, is one of 13 presented to the gallery through the Dr. Francis D. Murnaghan Fund, and is the work of Adriaen van Nieulandt (1587-1658). At the time of its painting, 1624, it was not unusual for a Dutch gentleman to commission a portrait of his favorite horse to be hung in his house. In this particular canvas, the owner seems to be the elegantly dressed gentleman on the left, who faces a groom holding the bridle of a large gray horse.

The canvas was somewhat damaged in transit and required extensive repair work before it could be shown. The restoration took three months and was carried out by members of the gallery's conservation department, supervised by Elisabeth Packard. No drastic changes in composition were revealed but many hidden details were discovered, such as flower and grasses in the foreground, and a large, curly-haired dog.

Bergman was charming, magnetic, and a lot of other adjectives, but was it because her performance was all that great, or was it because she is Ingrid Bergman? I think it is the latter. The role is not that demanding the play not that complicated. No, I believe we all reacted to her as a legend, not to her as an actress on the stage at that sportent.

Why talk about stars? Because Washington is growing rapidly in terms of theater, and more and more stars are coming to the area and leaving with its money. The competition is increasing for the theatergoer's dollar. Good! most would say, but is it? Stars cost money, so ticket prices rise. Smaller theaters can't seat enough people to make the money necessary to pay the stars, so they, marginal to begin with, fade away. The public, you and me, respond to the star system like mice to cheese, right into the trap. Even the dinner theaters have felt the need to have a star. 



Why do these names attract us? Why do we presume the play will be any better? Because we have been trained to respond that way. All the media, the promoters, the advertisers, everyone who sells anything, reenforces the star system every time they put their hands in our pockets for our money. And we go and pay and tell everyone what a great time we had or what a great buy we got. And so it goes on. And up go the ticket prices. And larger get the theaters. Hayloft, to expand their profit margin, are soon to begin building a new dinner theater in suburban Maryland which will seat nearly twice the number of their Manassas house. Then, to fill it, they will need bigger names. Consider Shady Grove. As big a house as there is in the area. They have had to try nearly everything to fill that monster up each summer. Their schedule this year includes rock and roll, country and western, TV, and Broadway stars.


The bigger the house the bigger the headache, but the alternative is going broke. Or, like so many, government subsidy. The Arena is a balance of semi-stars, subsidy, and a huge house to fill.

While the public might agree that there is a role for the big and the little theater, a need for the contemporary and the historical, the fluffy piece and the classics, the stars and the beginners, the pomp and the bluejeans, when it comes to spending money on a night out, it is the star system that makes the money flow. But please do remember that quality and stars are not synonymous. And, truly, what we really want for our money is quality. There are many fine shows to be seen this summer. and not all of them have big names in the cast. For some ideas on how to spend your entertainment dollars this summer, see the "Summer in the City" special in this issue, and consider wisely whether you want to spend your money to see a name, or to see good theater.

Dining with the Nacrellis

The Green Tree is a sem addition to the desing scene in Northern Virginia. The restaurant is tocated in charming Leesburg mest on Route 7 from the Bullings.

The decor of the Green Tree is 19th century, from the period furniture to the costumed weitresses and a working fireplace. The management has created a pleasant and relaxing etmosphere in which to enjoy disting. We were a party of five which gave as a chance to sample many of the distes that are carefully researched and authenticated by the Chat.

For our appetizers we ordered The Sampling Platter (tiny pastries filled with chicken gâte, prunes stuffed with chutney miniature deviled crab and pickled walnuts) at \$2.75. Peach in Champagne. 190 Mushroom Canapes (mushrooms sauteed in sherry and stuffed with Virginia Ham and beef), \$90 and Oyster Pastries (cysters baked in a pastry crust) at \$1.50. The Green Tree has excellent appetizers ... an opinion shared by at.

Our group sampled each of the three soups offered (Bean, Beef and Vegetable, and Clam Chowder) and found them to be hearty and well prepared.

Our entrée selections included Roast Beef at \$7.50, which while tasty was much too fatty. The Westmoreland County Game Pie (venison, duck, rabbit, Virginia Ham with vegetables) at \$9.75 was as tasty as it sounds. Virginia Ham and Brandied Peaches was ordered by a native Virginian who appreciates good country ham, and she was high in her praise of this offering at \$7.50. The Roast Duck was apparently a casualty of the late hour.

In fairness to the establishment, we arrived late due to poor driving conditions, but we feel if a restaurant accepts latecomers, it does so with a responsibility to provide top quality food and service. While the duck seasoning of apples, onions and currant

sauce was quite tasty, the duck was dry and tough. At \$8.25, a better performance elegated be expected. The Beefsteak and Kidney Pie at \$8.50 had the same flaky pastry crust as the game pie and distinguished itself by the flavor achieved with the blending of yeal kidneys, beef, wine, regetables, herbs and spices. Other entrées teclude Hampton Crab, Salmon Steak, Brunswick Stew and a Combination Seafood Platter priced between \$6.95 and \$7.95.

One area which assets immediate attention is the wine list; it is practically non-existent. A few bottled wine selections, not very impressive, were recited by our waitress. We settled on a cose at \$8.50 per litre from the bulk wine selection. In spite of the fact that we enjoyed the French rose, we felt the price was too high for a house wine. This sutuation should be remedied if the Green Tree expects to attract diners who are willing at patronize the establishment on a regular basis.

The luncheon menu is just as diverse as the dinner menu, featuring egg dishes, meats, seafoods and salads from \$1.95 to \$3.65. Virginia Ham, Corned Beef and Roast Beef Sandwiches are also available in the Long Ben Room and include a cup of bean coup and cole slaw for \$2.65.

It is obvious the Green Tree offers something unique and charming, and when some of the opening wrinkles are ironed out this restaurant should rank as one of the finest in the area.



If you prefer soup to start your meal, three are offered between \$1.50 and \$2.00. These are a meat-stuffed pasta in chicken broth, chicken broth and Italian vegetable.

The pasta dishes are probably the strongest offerings of the restaurant. Most are made daily by Mamma Regina. Since no pastas are offered as side dishes, we split an order of Fettucine Mamma Regina (golden noodles with mushrooms in cream cheese sauce). A variety of other pastas are also featured including linguine with clam sauce, Cannelloni, Ravioli and Fettuccine (Spinach Noodles). All are either \$4.25 or \$4.50.





The film-within-a-film approach—the same actors take roles in both past and present sequences—has interesting possibilities, but here it comes off mostly as a self-conscious gimmick, nor is it followed through to any conclusion. 



IN JAZZ

The jazz fare for the summer months in the Washington/Baltimore area is underly scattered and generally perfunctory. I guess we shouldn't grige that there isn't more azz and be happy with what we have, but the fact remains that as in past years the tried and true "jazz performers" will again grace the area's stages. This backing of the popular jazz performer is both good and 68d. Good, because it presumably might turn those otherwise not enticed by jazz sounds to become interested in the art form. That's true to an extent, but often the people who enjoy Ramsey Lewis or Oscar Peterson seldom axplare beyond them. These people are the ones at cocktall parties that are quick to tell you who their favorite jazz stars are: Goorge Shearing, early Dave Brubeck, and some of the things Ellington has done.

The bad thing about these bookings is that they perpetuate the very small select, intimate circle of jazz performers. The casual jazz fan knows little if nothing about a Stanley Turrentine, a James Moody or even a Stan Getz (after all it's been ten years since his hit record "Desafinado"). So FORECAST

So, except for the tight inner circle of customer-drawing jazz acts, virtually no one clos is used or eyen heard of. This is not the fault of the promoters because they sespond directly to audience desires. Promoters are often heard to say, "Listen, streetheart, if a barking dog act packs the bause, barking dogs they'll get." Get the goint? It's you, the audience, that creates the market for performance and thus far most enough of you have existed a desire to see anything but the regular regulars. So much for the headlines, now the details.

Of the two cities, Baltimore has a more ambitious schedule of events planned for the summer months and most of them are free, thanks to the Baltimore Promotion Council. Some of their events include the eight-day Preakness Festival Week (sic) starting May 11 which will include performances by the Duke Ellington Band, Sarah Vaughan, Ramsey Lewis, and Eubie Blake, who returns to the town of his birth; seekly free evenings concerts at Hopkins Plaza starting July 3rd through August and featuring local jazz artists; and a noon jazz session every Tuesday and Friday during the month of August, again at Hopkins

The Left Bank Jazz Society of Baltimore continues with its regular Sunday evening concerts at the Famous Baltroom through the summer. Vernon Welsh of Left Bank recommends you call the Jazz Line number for an up to date listing of performances (301) 945-2266. Left Bank will also sponsor free jazz concerts during July and August every Wednesday evening at the Town Center Plaza at Columbia, Maryland.

In Washington, jazz oriented programs will be limited to the Carter Barron, Wolf Trap, and Shady Grove Theatre for the most part. Carter Barron promises concerts by Nancy Wilson, Les McCann, The Crusaders, and Herbie Hancock among others. Shady Grove will feature a week of Count Basie, Ella Fitzgerald, and Oscar Peterson commencing June 22, and Wolf Trap, cagily heading their jazz offerings as "Nostalgia," will feature the bands of Stan Kenton, Woody Herman, Harry James, Glenn Miller and Benny Goodman's Sextet.

Human Kindness Day this year is May 10 and again this year Compared To What, Inc. will be organizing a free outdoor concert at the Sylvan Theater headlined by Stevie Wonder. Compared To What has also taken over the duties of the Summer in the Parks program and will be sponsoring free outdoor concerts at 12 area parks throughout the summer. Not all of those concerts, however, will feature jazz performers.

Washington is also a hotbed of Traditional jazz in the country. Spearheaded by the energetic Potomac River Jazz Club, regular Sunday evening sessions are held at the Windjammer Room of the Twin Bridges Marriott. Occasionally name groups are brought in to perform. PR Director Ken Underwood suggests you call the PRJC number for the latest concert information (301) 630-7752.

Royal Stokes, purveyor of traditional jazz on the radio in Washington, also recommends the Sunday evening sessions at The Pub in the basement of Healy Building, Georgetown University. Those concerts happen during the summer session and begin at 9 pm.

No attempt has been made here to enumerate the details of each of these events or to include listings of local night clubs and other similar houses of music.

What we do find is a predictable group of jazz performers not new to area people.

It is hard to imagine what the classical music lovers of Washington and Baltimore did during the summers six or so years ago. Perhaps they caught an event or two between rock and pop concerts at the Merriweather Post Pavilion or elsewhere on campuses, in churches or at DAR Hall. I don't know. But several things they could not have done then were to go to Wolf Trap, or to the Kennedy Center, or to full summer seasons by both the National and Baltimore symphonies. Thankfully, these and other organizations are now operating full blast, and this summer their offerings seem of unprecedented quantity and quality.

First, the quantity. It almost exceeds the number of offerings during any three winter months. Discounting opera and ballet (see page 00), the main flurry of classical activity during June, July and August will be symphonic. A total of 60 orchestra concerts is scheduled at press time by the National Symphony (40), the Baltimore Symphony (14), the Philadelphia Orchestra (3), the New York Philharmonic (2) and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra (1).

They will feature conductors such as Rostropovich, Boulez, Ormandy, Comissiona, Rudel, Fleisher, DePreist, Sidlin and Copland, and most of them will be directing works by composers for whom they have demonstrated special affinities. Thus, we have Rostropovich for nine largely Russian concerts with the NSO, Boulez for Stravinsky's "Petrouchka" and Bartok's "Miraculous Mandarin," Rudel continuing his Mahler cycle with the First Symphony and the "Songs of a Wayfarer" (with Jessye

Norman singing), and Copland conducting Copland.

There will be a special series of programs devoted to individual composers: three all-Beethoven concerts (including the Ninth Symphony from the Philadelphia Orchestra

Symphony from the Philadelphia Orchestra with Ormandy and the University of Maryland Chorus), an all-Ravel program by the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, an all Berlioz concert from the BSO (including the rarely-heard "Nuits d'Été" sung by Maureen Forrester) and an all-Stravinsky marathon concert by the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra.

These partial listings should give a clue to the diversity of orchestral sounds which will fill our summer evenings. Some of

these sounds will be free, including the 15 NSO Concerts in the Parks.

In addition to the parks, the NSO will be at Wolf Trap and at the Kennedy Center. The BSO is dividing its time about equally between the Post Pavilion and Goucher College, with one concert at Wolf Trap. The other orchestras will all be at Wolf Trap.

Orchestra concerts are followed in numbers first by pianists, then by organists, singers, violinists, chamber music groups and choruses. Add to these the various campus, community and church-sponsored programs (see box below) and the quantity is enormous.

The quality and the variety are equally enormous, and every concertgoer will have no difficulty in planning a very full summer of listening pleasure.

Although there will be more decisions to make than usual, only a few of them will be really tough ones. If you want to hear Rimsky-Korsakov's "Scheherazade," for example, will you choose to hear the BSO's performance under Fleisher at the Post Pavilion or the NSO's performance under Rostropovich at the Kennedy Center? Similarily, if you want to hear the Verdi Requiem, will it be the NSO's or the BSO's?

Decisions such as these are few, and they

partly depend on your time and your location. If you really care about these works, you will want to go to both performances and compare notes. Such opportunities are rare indeed.

Two dozen or so pianists are scheduled to appear in solo recitals, with orchestras or in chamber music. Six of the most important of these artists will be playing on successive evenings at the University of Maryland's annual Piano Festival during the first week of August: Lili Kraus, John Ogdon, Richard and John Contiguglia,

Marie-Francois Bouquet and Nelson Freire. Kraus, in addition, will be heard in two Beethoven piano concertos with the NSO, and Tedd Joselson will play the Rayel G Major Concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra. Otherwise, the pianists scheduled to play concertos all will appear with the BSO: Eugene Istomin (Beethoven No. 5), Berkofsky and Blasdale (the recently-unearthed Bruch two-piano concerto), Earl Wild (Chopin No. 2 and Liszt No. 1), Garrick Ohlsson (Rachmaninoff No. 3), Ilana Vered, and Susan Starr. And of special interest to serious students of piano are the public master-classes by Irwin Freundlich and Lili Kraus at the University of Maryland, by Freundlich at Catholic University, and by Alan Mandel at American University.

Chamber music groups are normally one of the greatest assets of the Washington-Baltimore area during the winter months. But during the summer many of them seem to go into hiding. Some yet-to-be-scheduled local and imported groups may be heard on Catholic University's Summer Artist Series, on the University of Maryland's Baltimore County campus and at the new Fairfax Chamber Music Institute. Two important scheduled groups are the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center (at Wolf Trap) and Arthur Wiseberg's Contemporary Chamber Ensemble (at the Smithsonian's Natural History Museum).

The area's many excellent choral groups are similarly rather mute this summer. The exception is the University of Maryland Chorus. They will sing such different and demanding scores as Beethoven's Ninth Symphony with Ormandy, Fauré's Requiem under David Willcocks, Verdi's Requiem under Rudel, and excerpts from Copland's "The Tender Land" under the composer.

Among instrumentalists to pay attention to are violinists Pina Carmirelli and the young American Moscow prize-winner Eugene Fodor. Carmirelli will play the seldomheard Stravinsky concerto with the BSO, and Fodor will play the oft-heard Paganini D Major Concerto with the Philadelphia Orchestra. A particularly interesting group of works and instrumentalists will be

in the harum scarum world of film fabrication, with its bright lights and brillians promises, predictions are at best nigh on to impossible and at worst down right dangerous. Who knows when a pro-est planned will be completed - or even if it will ever begin? The star may break a teg at any time and set back production for weeks or months or end the project on the spot. And hundreds of other similar mishaps might hap. Who can targee the numerous problems that may, and usually do, arise in the post-tensing period of the tilms creation; editing, re-shooting if necessary, dubbing scoring, etc? Then of course, there are the marketing considerations where timing is so vital One needs just the right sales technique the which without all else is nought. All this is by way of saying that no one really tragges what's going to be playing in our cinemas come the summer sun (a problem made even more acute by the deadline of a magazine.)

And in the case of a leargh like Washington, it's a double dare to look too far ahead, for we are far from numero uno on the list of exhibition locations for film distributars. New York and Los Angeles lead the pack with Boston, Chicago and Philadelphia coming in soon after. Washington rates along with Kansas City, Detroit and the like and sometimes gets films months after they break elsewhere, sometimes not at all. But then, film marketing is appealing to the right audience at the right time.

Well, having thus appaerated myself from any and all blame for a scratch in my crystal ball, or a crack in my wee-gee, we progood to a brief discussion of the more important offerings of the film houses for the summer. Once again the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and Wolf Trap Farm Park (also) for the Performing Arts are pulling out all the stops for the upcoming summer season of dance and opera. Actually, Wolf Trap is devoted to the summer. The Kennedy Center just keeps rolling along and thereby adds excitement to what

In the fields of opera and dance, both producing operations are bringing major companies, both national and international, to their stages. Kennedy Center is having the crême de la crême with the appearances of the Bolshoi Ballet for a week at the very beginning of the summer (May 27-June 1) hot on the heels of the American Ballet Theater. The second half of the Center's creme puff project is the mid-summer appearance of the Bolshoi Opera (July 22-Aug. 5). A third Kennedy Center booking is the Stuttgart Ballet (June 24-July 6).

Wolf Trap is bringing in a greater variety of attractions than the Center, and almost all are American. The one exception is the one-night stand of the Panov's, the ballet couple who recently made so much news in their struggle (finally successful) with the Soviet government for permission to emigrate to Israel.

These attractions far outshine any others that may be offered in the area which, with the demise of the National Ballet and the problems of the Opera Society of Washington, have been steadily decreasing anyway.

Indeed, a good case has been made by many that the very fact of importing all the $\frac{\mathcal{L}}{2}$ big name, first class, national and international companies and stars, has weakened the position of the hometown performing arts organizations. While there must be some truth to this, more important is what it says about Washington audiences as a whole. As in the theater and to an extent in symphonic music, but most obviously in the less popular dramatic arts, the Washington area ticket buyer wants the safest bet, the guarantee of top quality, polish and star billings. He is not very adventurous, nor very tolerant. That the National Ballet could produce some fine dancers performing some excellent choreography was of little import when the American Ballet Theater came into town.

It is not that area residents are different in this respect from other cities; it is just that there aren't enough patrons willing to support the smaller, less brilliant, homegrown operations, an artistic sub-culture if you will. We really miss the National Ballet.

... pulling out all the stops

Anyway, this summer's dance fare at Wolf Trap, somewhat a return to what it was like in the Vienna Woods entertainment center's premier season, includes the New York City Ballet of George Balanchine and Jerome Robbins. The company will be performing some of the works from their, at this time, projected Ravel Festival (a smaller version of what they did for Stravinsky a few seasons back, I suppose.) The City Center Joffrey Ballet troupe will return as it has every summer, with its special mixture of mod rock works, minor classical offerings, and a few rather more experimental/sociological works thrown in to give the repertory an eclectic balance all its own. Eliot Feld, considered by some critics and balletomanes the most important new dancer-choreographer America has produced in the past generation, will bring his small but highly respected group to Wolf Trap (July 8-10) with a varied program including the bewitching "Intermezzo," and some new works.

These are all important organizations in their field and along with the Kennedy Center's productions of "Spartacus," "Ivan, the Terrible", and "Giselle" by the Bolshoi Ballet, and a full two weeks of the Stuttgart Ballet in their regular biennial appearance, Washington will have a full summer of top quality imported dance. The Stuttgart's schedule is not available but certainly will include their sparkling "Swan Lake," and the scintillating "Romeo and

Juliet." So everything from rock to reportedly bombastic splendor, from the crisp efficiencies of the New York City Ballet to the sinuously captivating sensuosity of Feld, all will be here come the dance of the summer sun.

Needless to say, the appearances of the Bolshoi Opera Company from Moscow (July 22 to Aug. 3) will highlight the summer opera season. The repertory is to include The Pique Dame, and Eugene Onegin, both by Tchaikovsky and both based on works by a Russian writer. Another Pushkin based opera will be Mussorgsky's masterpiece, Boris Gudonov. War and Peace, which Prokofiev based on Tolstoy's epic novel, and an opera based on Dostoyevsky's tale "The Gambler," complete the two week repertory. This will be the first visit to the United States for this world famous company and if for no other reason deserves the attention of opera lovers of the area.

No less esteemed is the Metropolitan Opera Company from New York City which will open the summer opera season at Wolf Trap Farm on June 23 with the performance of La Boheme, with Renata Scotto as Mimi and Mary Costa as Musetta. This will be followed by a double bill of Cavalleria Rusticana with Elinor Ross and Marcia Baldwin, and Pagliacci with Lucine Amara and Cornell MacNeill; and then performances of La Traviata with Anna Moffo, La Forza Del Destino with Rachel Mathes, and Verdi's Falstaff with Cornell MacNeill in the title role. This is the Met's second season at the Filene Center in Wolf Trap, and again will surely sell out fast. There was a lot of disappointment with last year's productions, and while the Met can still stand on its reputation, it requires a critical eye and ear to be sure.

In addition to these two major companies (which will have followed the New York City Opera's appearance in May at the Kennedy Center, and which will precede the engagement of the Berlin Opera Company in November), the Wolf Trap organization, with some guest stars and conductors, will present two more operas. The first will be the New York City Opera's production of Roberto Devereaux by Donizetti starring Beverly Sills and members of the Wolf Trap Company on July 27 and 29 (thus conflicting with the Bolshoi Opera company at the Kennedy Center). Later in August

(28th and 30th) **The Crucible**, an opera by Robert Ward based on Arthur Miller's play, will have two performances featuring Olivia Stapp and Richard Cross, and, of course the Wolf Trap Company.

The schedule of operas, spread out over the summer weeks as it is, and well balanced as fate would have it, makes this one of the richest and most promising summers for opera and dance in recent memory. You may not be able to see them all, but whatever you can see, you are sure to come away richer.



Probably the most significant thing about the area's summer theater offerings is that, with a couple of exceptions, you can't tell the difference from the regular season. Virtually all the first run and major road houses will be going full blast, and, with Lee Guber's and Shelly Gross' Shady Grove doing a major revamp of their policy, it promises to be an even better summer than last, which was one of the best ever.

Top-notch Broadway musicals will be available at Shady Grove, the Kennedy Center, Wolf Trap, and at Ford's, a major off-Broadway show that has gotten off to a rousing start there. Unfortunately, Center Stage and the Mechanic will be dark all summer.

At press time not all the schedules had been locked in, but of what is known, you will have to plan your summer theater budget carefully.

Starting off with May, Broadway's "Grease" will be at Shady Grove, having started there on April 8. Originally scheduled for last fall, this long-running 50s nostalgia leather-jacket romp brings back a lot of memories, depending on your age at

the time. But it is all in good fun, and enjoyable.

The Burn Brae Dinner Theater tas "Domn Yankees" continuing through May, followed by "1776" for the rest of the summer. A good choice, I think, for the summer of growing Bicentennial interest.

Among the dinner theaters this summer, Harlequin's production of "Carnival" will probably be the oustanding attraction. In just three years the Harlequin has set a new standard for the area in the quality of the productions they put together.

One of the real highlights for this summer will be "Diamond Studs," opening May 12 at Ford's. This saloon musical about Jesse James was created at the West Side Theater in the Chelsea Theater Center in New York. If you have concluded that there is going to be a lot of music on stage in May, you're right. A couple of straight plays round out the month: Through June 14 at the Kennedy Center, Noel Coward's "Present Laughter" and at the Hayloft Dinner Theater, Garson

Kanin's "Born Yesterday," a comedy about a post-war senator on the make in Washington (it seems that a lot of the old comedies about graft have suddenly taken on new relevance and believability since the Watergate chaos).

June would probably be the best month to take your vacation, though you would want to be here the week of June 17 to see Angela Lansbury in "Gypsy" at Shady Grove, if you missed it at the Kennedy Center last season.

As for a great place to vacation, I suggest you give thought to visiting the Barter Theatre in Abingdon, Virginia. This remarkable professional repertory theater, tucked away in the mountains about seven hours from Washington, has been one of this country's finest theaters for over 40 years. Started by some out-of-work actors during the depression, where they were able to trade their craft for food, the atmosphere is still one of another time. Barter's season includes "The Devil's Disciple," "Diary of Anne Frank," "The Male Animal," "A Dolf's House," and possibly

"The Fantastiks." In addition, they provide intern productions and children's shows in a small theater across the street from the main stage. For a totally enjoyable family outing, I can think of no nicer place to spend an extended weekend. Try staying at the Martha Washington Inn, also a part of the theater's ownings, and you will make the trip back in time more complete.

A shorter trip during the month might be to the Wayside Theater in Middletown, Virginia. Under new direction this summer, this quaint theater has a charm that you will long remember, even after you've forgotten the play.

A major musical attraction this summer will be the production of "Kismet" by the Wolf Trap company. This show is more operetta than Broadway musical, having contributed many standards to the popular music repetoire: Stranger in Paradise, Baubles, Bangles and Beads, etc. The starring role will go to opera bass-baritone John Reardon. Margaret Harris will conduct and Gerald Freedman will direct. Running



from July 17 to 20, this is surely one of the season's big moments.

Also during July (July 16-August 3), the Sylvan Theater will present Shakespeare's "The Taming of the Shrew." This is one of the better comedies from the greatest playwright in the English language, and, of course, is free. How can you beat that?

The Hayloft Dinner Theater's Las Vegas bawdy imports will be represented by "Moll Flanders" starting in July and running through September. This is one of the more popular events at Hayloft each year, though it isn't exactly Broadway.

Every summer some of the finest theater in the world is presented at the Olney Theater in Olney, Maryland. The schedule was not set at the time this was written, but don't let that stop you from calling right now for tickets. Always packed, this theater is a benchmark in American theatrical excellence. The full schedule will appear in next month's Forecast! Their season begins June 3.

August and September belong to Shady Grove, as far as musicals are concerned, unless the Kennedy Center, whose schedule was unknown at press time, comes up with some. Jane Powell will appear here in "Irene," the role Debby Reynolds created, the week of August 5. Carol Channing will hold forth in "Lorelei" the week of August 19. The musical version of "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes" is a great vehicle for one of the great blondes of the contemporary stage. Music is by Jule Styne and lyrics by Comden and Green from the book by Anita Loos. The week of September 16 will have the two remaining Andrews Sisters appearing in "Over Here," one of this season's big hits on Broadway.

For theater this summer, Washington may be the best city in the country. New York slows down, giving way to the new second city of theater. For this claim to fame, we owe much to the Kennedy Center. Their magnet-like attraction to producers has drawn the shows to all the stages. And the summer season at the Kennedy Center is not even included in this brief look at the highlights around town. In next month's issue we will take a look at the Kennedy Center's schedule, most of which will focus on the coming Bicentennial celebration.

For live theater, our area may be the greatest place to be this summer. Enjoy it!

N BLUEGRASS

Spending a summer in the Washington/ Baltimore area and not soaking up some of the freely available bluegrass music seems to me to be a lot like living all your life next to a Budweiser brewery and never going on a tour. Twelve months of the year, this area has the reputation of being the nation's hotspot for top notch pickin' music. In the summer it absolutely cooks. Last summer, even in the middle of the gasoline "shortage," when every summer happening, vacation paradise, condominium-in-the-woods more than "just a half a tank away" was on shakey ground, trucks and buses full of people cruised all over Virginia, Pennsylvania and Maryland, in search of the hundreds of bluegrass festivals, which seemed to be lurking on just the other side of every sylvan scene within 200 miles. This summer promises to be no different.

notch pickin' music.

If you want bluegrass this summer, you have quite a choice of places to lend your ears. While the bluegrass clubs flourish the rest of the year, in the warmer months they kind of lay back a little to make room for the festivals. This is really where it happens in the summer. The festivals, which draw talent from all over the country, have a sizeable impact on the club scene, and here's what to expect:

THE CLUBS: The Washington-Baltimore area abounds in bluegrass-oriented clubs that are perfectly happy to take your money and keep your glass full, while you stomp along to your favorite band. For a good rundown of where they are, our devoted

readers will just pick up a copy of the November 1974 issue and refer to the list printed within. However, those two particular people have memorized it, so for the rest of you, who neglected to slip that issue into your perma-binder, we'll reprint it for you here.

No schedules for particular bands, though. While the festivals bring talent into town, they also take what is here out again, and sometimes on short notice. The bands often don't know where they will be playing next until that old signed contract and deposit check are delivered by their friendly mail-person. This keeps summer fare in the clubs pretty erratic, and also adds a certain note of suspense in bluegrass bar-hopping. Frequently, you can pick up a well-known band that doesn't ordinarily play the area but is in town for a festival. Call the club that interests you for the schedule on a particular night, and don't be too surprised if you find the scheduled group is off in the night in their air conditioned Greyhounds and someone you never heard of is on stage. They might be a very big act in another city. Another nice thing about making the club rounds in the summer is that you'll probably find them less crowded, because school's out, and most everybody else is off festival hopping or sitting in traffic on the Bay Bridge.

THE FESTIVALS: As the summer approaches, the newspapers and radio will be filling up with one announcement after another for bluegrass festivals. No official count as yet, but Bluegrass Unlimited is printing a list of some 300 festivals nationwide which are tentatively scheduled, and a sizeable portion of these are in the immediate area.

Here, a word to the novice testival goer: Bluegrass festivals, aside from being pulmerable to all the diseases that attack large scale outdoor events, are plagued by shady promoters even more than are rock concerts, if such a thing is possible. There are a few notorious promoters in team who advertise bands without bothering to tell them, don't pay the bands, or set up a completely nonexistent festival, and then not show up at the designated place and time. Be especially many of events which heep changing names and locations or acts like a game of country musical chairs. Anyway, this too, is part of what keeps bluegrass interesting. Festivals which are a yearly thing and have a reputation for delivering the music with a minimum of hassle are the best bets. In any event, the camp-out festivals are the most fun. The size of the crowds you can expect is anybody's guess. but take the advice of an old Woodstock veteran and Be Prepared! Here are my recommendations for the festivals which consistently come off and deliver good entertainment value:

andian Springs: Held twice this summer, at Indian Springs. Md., this three day camp-out affair is a sure-fire crowd pleaser and a dynamite way to spend a weekend if it doesn't rain too hard. The first one is scheduled for May 30-June 1, and the second session is on for September 12-14. Look for big name local and national talent, including (probably) the Seldom Scene, Bill Monroe, Ralph Stanley, the Lewis Family, among many, many others.

Berryville: Held in Berryville, Va., the July 4th weekend, the Berryville festival is considered by many to be the biggest and the bestest, in terms of attendance and talent. It has been held for many years and is a pretty safe bet.

Watch out for promoters that try to slip
a rock concert in the back door — you
know, two grass bands and about two dozen
rock bands. If you like rock music, fine, but
if you're looking for real bluegrass, that

kind of thing can be a bummer it not expecting it. Don't be afraid to call the promoters and demand a complete list of otho's playing — you usually find the phone number in the ads.

FREE MUSIC: If you don't want to spend the \$10 or \$20 it will cost you to spend three delirious days in the countryside, there are plenty of folks playin' real good for free, or close to it, right nearby. Two of the very biggest events in the country are held just down the block . . .

Yos American Folklife Festival, sponsored by the Smithsonian Institute, will be held twice also, featuring music and crafts from two different areas of the county. This is not entirely a musical happening, but spans the culture of a particular region. On June 25-29, you can check out the music and lifestyle of the middle border states -Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas - and that will probably mean some good traditional missic. On July 2-6, the culture of Coastal California will be featured, and it have no idea what that could mean. Last year there was a fot of good music heard at the Folklife Festival, which is held on the Mail. But don't look for brand name bands -- the Smithsonian geople comb the bills and plains in search of authentic examples of regional culture, and this is what you will hear.

The National Folk Festival: Held August 3-3 at Wolffrap Farm Park all day and a good part of each night, this quant is singular to the Smithsonian's and equally well attended. Fraditional musicians from all ower the country will be featured, some 40 separate acts and 200 individual musicians. You'll feet jazz, blues, American Indian old time string music and Cajum music as mell as mountain bluegrass. Probably nobady you've heard of but people you ought to feet. It's a big hit with kids, too.

The Columbia Laweride Comparts are a terrific bet if your insatiable appetite humagers for a weekly serving of open air and free, fing bluegrass. The Columbia Association agensors nightly entertainment by the take in the city that both Washington and Baltimore claim as a suburb. Last year bacerass was featured one night a week. This year, you can hear it two nights a week. It seems that bluegrass was out-drawing the other mights about 8 to one. Bring a blanket.

There are two good places which will supply you with a sympathetic and/or enthusiastic audience. You won't necessarily need money, and might even borrow the required instrument. Just keep it acoustic.

The Red Fex, aside from being about the leading grass club around, has open mike on Monday night, and you'll frequently hear very good out-of-town performers or local pros who happen to be out of work on that night, as well as "normal" people. You can get up there too, if it isn't too hard an act to follow — and don't worry, I have never yet heard an audience, fail to clap.

The Washington Ethical Society, on 7750 15th Street and Kalmia in the District, holds an open bluegrass sing the 3rd Friday of each month. It's free, friendly and starts at 9 pm. The same type of musical criteria applies, so don't show up with the Heavy Metal Rockers and your Hot Watt Amplifiers. The Ethical Society sponsors concerts and workshops throughout the year, but slows down during the summer to allow people to leave town.

TRY BEFORE YOU BUY: And lastly, if you're not sure you want to pack up the old DeSoto and truck off for a weekend with the furry people to listen to music you're not entirely sure you like, let me recommend a good way to sample the genre without risking your good cordovans or your gasoline ration tickets (what? you say you haven't gotten yours yet?). You guessed it — it's that familiar item over there under the flower pot — your FM radio. Quite a few stations in the area feature bluegrass, or bluegrass mixed in with other types of folk and traditional music, and here are most of them:





Battle Brewing All-News Radio

Of the 3,041,800 inhabitants of the Washington Metropolitan Area, it is estimated that one third, or better, listens at some point in their day to an all-news station. If you're a member of this audience, then you have a choice of two — WAVA or WTOP

Living in the great bureaucratic seat of the nation, and certainly the news capital of the world, you probably take the idea of instant news for granted. But what you may not know is that the all-news concept in radio is a new-born babe that took its first formal steps right here is blashington, and which has since grown and multiplied into fourteen different markets with nineteen stations. most of which are owned by targe conglomerates with the dollars to satisfy its gargantuan appetite. The originator in the continental United States, WAVA, is still with us, for better or worse.

Despite the fact that all-news radio began officially in Washington, fair play demands that the name of Gordon McLendon and XTRA Radio be mentioned. McLendon sascessfully proneered the concept of all-news out of a Tijuana based transmitter which broadcast to the entire Los Angeles area in 1960. It is very interesting that considering the ground work that McLendon laid in Tijuana, WAVA promptional literature fails to mention him when they state that they launched the concept of all news in 1960. And so you might find the following account of how Arundel and WAVA came to know about all-news illuminating.

While McLendon was busy experimenting with all-news in Mexico, Arthur Arundel was back in Washington trying to breath new life into his very tired and near-bank-rupt WARL music station. Veteran broadcast newsman, Frank Pipes, then employed 36 FORECAST!

by Arundel, jumped the country music bandwagen and headed Southwest to pig McLendon's venture. Impressed with the concept a good deal more than the temperature and beer, he regularly sent sample all news programming tages to WAVA (Arundel seeking a new identity, transformed WARL and the country sound into WAVA, and was going with rock). Pipes insisted that the all-news format, in a city

trike Washington, would be dynamite. He then returned in July of 1963 as the Program Director of WAVA with the understanding that he was to help coordinate the switch to all-news. In an interview, Pipes said that "every morning for over a year, at our staff meetings, I ask only one question - when are we going to allheas? Arundel was terrified at the thought of changing to a radically new format upon which there were no guarantees for success." Finally, in 1964, WAVA implemented the all-news scheme on a trial basis during traffic-time, and from there to "all news all the time" (a phrase which Arundel copyrighted) in 1968.

During the seven years before the arrival of WTOP, WAVA enjoyed unrivaled dominance. They even maintained a direct line with the Oval Office during Johnson's presidency so that he could have the news at his fingertips. However, success had its drawbacks as it finally brought the squeeze of big-time competition to Arundel's front door, in the form of WTOP, a Post-News-

week enterprise and a CBS affiliate.

This probably would not be very significant were it not that WTOP is a member of a corporate octopus whose tentacles represent the number-one rated television station in the metropolitan area, the Washington Post, a major network (CBS); and, makes something like "...68% of all the

news impressions on the people of Washington every week," according to Arundel.

Considering the power and influence that has created and thrust WTOP in to the allnews market, it would seem surprising that a modest operation like WAVA, with limited resources, (both in talent and dollars) has continued to remain in business.... or is it?

When WTOP began operating, Arundel brought an antitrust suit against the Washington Post Corporation. A combination of the Post newspaper, Newsweek magazine, and the most powerful AM and FM (later given to Howard University) station in the area, made the concentration of the company, in news, excessive. The ca to a conference between WAVA's legal counsel, the Federal Trade Commission and later the Justice Department, which examined the case from the standpoint of the First Amendment (freedom of the press). Between the First Amendment and the Sherman Antitrust Act, the case was "shelved," and says Arundel, "I frankly could not afford to personally prosecute



the case all the way through the Supreme Court. It's too expensive a thing for one station or one man to do."

WTOP has, indeed, restrained themselves . . .

Arundel insists that the idea of competition with any other station would not have bothered him, and conceeds that "they (WTOP) can bury anybody without question . . . if they turned on all the heat of their combined media on promotion of their own assets."

WTOP has, indeed, restrained themselves with regard to the promotion of their continuous news sound. The name of the game is the loyal opposition. WTOP wants WAVA to stay in business, particularly since the **Washington Star-News** appears to be somewhere between rigor mortis and the funeral march.

So what can one station give you that the other can't? WAVA claims to gear itself to the Washington market. It seeks to cover the news as seen by the people who live here. Both local and national news stories are written from the local angle, whereas WTOP relies heavily upon the CBS network and a national orientation. In other words, you can listen to WAVA and hear Tom Snyder report the local angle of that's happening in the world, and hear Arundel's personal editorials; or, you can tune in WTOP and get Roger Mudd and Eric Severide, among others.

The hourly format at WTOP is broken down into eight sections, the first going to the CBS network, and with headlines every fifteen minutes. Time checks are at every four minutes, weather every seven, and there are sixteen commercial minutes every hour. Sports are at :15 and :45, business news at :20 and :40. When a major story breaks, the schedule is automatically canned and full coverage given the event. WTOP, for example, carried all of Watergate from start to finish — something no one else did, not even CBS. The format at WAVA, although organized differently on the clock, contains much the same information.

This story could be the same in another ten years, but for three harmonious little notes playing in the background... NBC! It has been learned that WAVA is picking up the NBC morning news from New York between 7:30 and 7:40 am, a maneuver which could easily be prophetic.

NBC is establishing an all-news broadcast network nationwide, with a target date of June 1, 1975. They will provide a service which a station can subscribe to for a fee ranging from \$750 to \$1500 monthly. Forty-nine minutes of news per hour, seven days a week will be produced by NBC News with the remaining $10\frac{1}{2}$ minutes to be used by the station for local news — five and one-half minutes on the hour and five minutes on the half hour. Part of the network time will provide commentaries by Joe Garagiola, John Chancel-

lor and David Brinkley, as well as other programs like "Meet the Press." NBC emphasizes that there will be plenty of time for the individual station to continue with the community interests that they wish to serve

To whom do you suppose NBC is attempting to sell this news service? We understand that they expect the appeal of such a program to be to the secondary tier of stations — outlets that are number two in news format in their market.

It certainly doesn't take a crystal ball to forsee the possibilities for WAVA if Arundel is unsatisfied with his ratings, and NBC is willing. On the other hand, this move by NBC could be the kiss of death for WAVA and a call to arms for WTOP.

NBC owns and operates WRC, a rock music station that isn't exactly a model of success in the Washington music market. If the New York management of NBC decides to make the switch from music to news at WRC, Arundel will have to use nothing short of magic to survive.

You've heard the joke that starts out by saying . . . "I've got some goods news, and then I've got some bad news . . ."

Well, maybe that goes for the listeners as well as for the broadcasters.

Heil Air Motion Woofer Displayed

A development which the audio industry and hi fi buffs have been maiting for with bated breath has now been announced in this area it was given its detailed airing at the February meeting of the diashington Chapter of the Audio Engineering Society. At that execting, the now famous Dr. Oskar Heil, known for his development of the Air Mexicon Transformer used in many ESS speakers, described his new creation.

So for the Air Motion Transformer has been used only in mid range faceter applications. The development which me have all been awaiting has been the application of the principle to the bass end of the audio spectrum. After several additional years of work on the engineering problems involved. Dr. Heil has finally come up with a workable and producible design.

Unfortunately, I was not able to attend the meeting because of other enavoidable out-of-town commitments, but 80s. Richard Mostow, Forecast's! publisher, was there with his Sony pocket cassette recorder. By listening to the tapes, I was able to piece together a reasonably good understanding of what the good doctor had to say.

First, a brief description of the basic Air

thation Transformer and the granciple by which is operates, usual be in order. The principal function of any kind of transformer is matching or impedance matching to be more precise.

What is impediance quatching? Probably the best may to describe it, and the one which for hieri used in his talk is the principle of the favor. We are all familiar with the grocess of moving heavy objects by placing a plant under the plank at some place along its length. If this object called the fulcrum, is spar the center of the plank you don't have much help in moving the object.


On the other hand, if the full rum is moved near the end, under the object to be moved you don't have to exert anywhere as much force as the object's weight to move it, but you must move through a smuch greater distance than the distance which the object moves. Thus, you have traded force for distance. You can do just the opposite with the same plank simply by movens the fulcrum nearer your and


Other examples of mechanical matching are pulleys and gears, in these cases you

are trading rotational speed for force, which is called torque. In electrical circuits the transformer is used to change impedance. Impedance is simply the voltage divided by current. If a transformer has many turns on its primary and only a few turns on its secondary, it will transform a high impedance; i.e., high voltage/low current to a low impedance, low voltage/high current. Note, that except for small losses in the transformer, the power, which is voltage multiplied by the current, is the same on both sides. Losses in transformers are analogous to friction in gears. They both change use-ful energy into waste heat.

One of the problems in loudspeaker design has always been matching the moving mass (conventional cone loudspeakers can be thought of as a piston.—Ed.) to the air in order to get reasonably efficient energy transfer. In the case of air, the corresponding quantities to voltage and current are pressure and velocity. Thus, in air the acoustical impedance is expressed in terms of pressure divided by velocity.

Various ways have been used over the years to match physical motion of a diaphram to the outside air. In the very early days of loudspeakers this was universally accomplished by horns. In fact, even before loud-





Since, in the case of the new Heil low frequency Air Motion Transformer, the energy is transmitted longitudionally along a thin-walled tube. such nonlinearities are not produced. Therefore, distortion is said to be much lower than with conventional speakers.

Dr. Heil's presentation was extremely convincing and he is obviously very knowledgeable. Unfortunately, for those present at the meeting of the Washington Chapter of the Audio Engineering Society, the prototype which Dr. Heil had brought with him from California became damaged in transportation and was not usable. Thus, the industry will have to wait for another one. I, for one, am looking forward to hearing it. You can be sure that I will pass along my observations in these pages just as soon as am privileged to witness a demonstration.

(When will you be able to purchase an ESS/Hell loudspeaker system that incorporates the newly developed woofer? A firm date is not known as we go to press. There's still some final design work to be done, and then tooling-up for the actual manufacturing must take place. A spokesman for ESS stated they are shooting for sometime in the 1975-76 winter season. We expect to be able to publish one of the first photo's of the completed unit, and will keep you posted.—Ed.).



Murrow, William L. Shirer, Douglas Edwards, Bob Trout, Quincy Howe, Ned Calmer, Bill Slocum and Major George Fielding Eliot. There also will be Norman Corwin's ode to the day of victory, "On a Note of Triumph." Narrated by Martin Gabel and scored by Bernard Hermann, this broadcast set a new record for listener response following any radio dramatic program.

There will be a special Hollywood Victory Show starring Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald, Charles Boyer, Shirley Ross and Frank Sinatre: a Five Star Broadcast featuring the voices of major military leaders; among them, Gen. The first complete Bayreuth production of the Ring took place over a four day period in August, 1876. NILS LOFGREN: A&M

Washington's Nils Lofgren appears to be, or is being built up to be, rock-'n'-roll's great hope. No matter how adept some rock performers may be, they remain essentially faceless. Nils is the exact opposite: He projects the personna of the brash, cocky, young kid who plays a mean guitar. Of course, not all his songs portray this character, but enough of them do to perpetuate it. Add to this that he writes songs that get right to the heart of teenage love relationships, and you can imagine the potential of his appeal.

Nils' band Grin broke up last summer, and Nils did this album with the backing of only a rhythm section consisting of local bassist Wornell Jones (who has worked extensively on the local soul scene and has backed Eddie Kendricks), and British drummer Aynsley Dunbar, who has been in bands with John Mayall and Frank Zappa, as well as leading the Aynsley Dunbar Retaliation. His main spot now is in a group called Jourpey, with two ex-members of Santana. Besides all the guitar parts, Nils plays piano, an instrument which figures prominently on the album.

Nils' voice sounds better than it has on record in some time. He also sounds good doing his own backup vocals. Hopefully he's learned his lesson from the All Out album when Kathy McDonald's backup vocals became more than just backup, and nearly ruined the songs she sang on. The material is the best overall since 1971's 1+1, the second Grin album. Lofgren's stamp is all over them; I could imagine other people doing these songs, but I can't imagine them sounding as creditable. If A&M doesn't get a hit out of songs like "Back It Up," "One More Saturday Night," or "The Sun Hasn't Set On This Boy Yet," then their corporate machinery needs an overhaul. The lone non-original is Goffin/ King's standard "Goin' Back," which is given a fresh arrangement, with Nils playing particularly effective piano.

Nils Lofgren is the most satisfying and enjoyable record to come from this man in over three years, since the release of 1+1. The only question that remains is—regarding the current publicity that Nils is 22-years old—hasn't similar publicity from the past few years all said he was 22? Is he the Jack Benny of rock-'n'-roll, only perpetually 22 instead of 39? Be that as it may, those of us who were sad to see Grin break up can take comfort that Nils sounds as good as ever, and nothing's going to stop him now.—B.R.

JOHN CALE: Fear, ISLAND

John Cale is an example of a cult hero in search of a bigger audience. A Welshman, he first became known in the sixties as a member of The Velvet Underground, overshadowed by Lou Reed. He left the group and recorded a solo album for Columbia, Vintage Violence, sporting a rather hideous cover drawing of Cale's face in melting wax. Then followed Church of Anthrax, a collaboration with Terry Riley, Cale's debut for Warners, where he was signed as a recording artist and producer. Then came the superb Paris 1919, produced by Chris Thomas, Procol Harum's producer. In this, Cale's traditionally gloomy, moody, depressing visions were tempered a bit, and out came lovely things like "Child's Christmas In Wales" and "Andalucia." There was also a sizzling rocker, "Macbeth," with Little Feat's Lowell George on slide guitar.

Despite its title, Fear, Cale's first for Island, is his most accessible album to date. Each side opens with a long hard rock piece, "Fear Is A Man's Best Friend," and "Gun." As good as these are, it is the slower material that works best. Cale plays lovely keyboards on the ballads "Buffalo Ballet" and "Ship Of Fools." There are a couple of nice send-ups in "Barracuda," which starts off with nearly the same intro as "Turn On Your Love Light" and proceeds into a modified reggae beat, and "The Man Who Couldn't Afford To Orgy" (he pronounces it with a soft g). This has "Judy Nylon" providing a special narrative, and Cale's lyrics for it are the closest he gets to outright humor. (He's very big on black humor, though).

I somehow can't picture John Cale as a star for the masses, but I can see his cult widening, and maybe even a hit single with "Barracuda" or "You Know More Than I Know." Cale's initiates will also want Island's June 1, 1974 live album, which features Cale, Kevin Ayers, Eno, and Nico. On it Cale does the world's most bizarre version of "Heartbreak Hotel."—B.R.

Gallagher and Lyle: The Last Cowboy. A&M Hudson-Ford: Free Spirit. A&M

Who knows how many people there may be in bands who are taking a back seat and deferring to the wishes of the others, and not playing the music they desire? Some people get up and go out on their own, which was the case with Benny Gallagher, Graham Lyle, Richard Hudson, and John Ford. The first two were members of McGuiness Flint, while the latter two were members of The Strawbs.

This is the fourth "solo" album for Gallagher and Lyle, and the second for Hudson-Ford. Like their predecessors, each album is tasteful and well rounded, abundant in good songs and careful production. Gallagher and Lyle traditionally work with production stalwart Glyn Johns, who incidentally is trying his hand at the next Fairport Convention album. Though neither band has had an American hit (they've each had better luck in their native Britain), their songs are at least partially geared to being listened to as good singles. G&L basically are soft, pretty, and catchy; H-F are hard, driving, and catchy. G&L's "King of the Silents" is very good lyrically, and "Song and Dance Man" has some colorful saxophone playing by Jimmy Jewell. Hudson-Ford is explosive on the six minute "I Don't Want To Be A Star," and "Take A Little Word" rocks in the tradition of their fine previous album, Nickelodeon. "Mother Mild" even sounds a bit like their work with The Strawbs. Gallagher and Lyle and Hudson-Ford have gone off into careers they can be proud of.—B. R.

Ambiphon Records (P.O. Box 341, Kingsbridge Station, Brons, R.V. 10663) does make recorded tages. As of this writing they have produced three for sale More of thus presently A but of information on the company's genesis and ghrlosophy is in ordes test

Ambiphon Records is the creation of tour men whose backgrounds span the distance between the physicist's laboratory, the recording studio, and the operatic stage. About two years ago they began working toward the goal of reproducing music as exactly as possible for home playback. Rather than picking up timere current recording theory left off homewer, they decided to begin again, to set their com criteria than develop the methodology to satisfy them.

The goal they set was a still one: completely matural and pure repreduction of the music as performed—minus such aberrations as distortion, hiss or the effects. tion of the frequency or dynamic range commonly hound to recordings. As if this wasn't difficult enough they also decided the ideal recording should bring the sound field along with the sound into the listening room, that is, virtually recreate the some aspect of the place where the music was perfurance.

Wildle these rigid standards before them, the Ambiphan team proceeded to deline into the realize of "psycho-acoustics," tipp study of how people perceive sound. Yes, Ambiphon has created a four-channel system, but four channels are the medium rather than the message. While proponents of quadriphonic systems to date have never decided geocisely what each channel should do or where it should be placed in relation to the listener, this system uses four speakers, one so each corner of the room, to recreate an experience that happened in a place with the music front and Cember.

Indeed the obvious presence of speakers. in the corners of the listening room is at times confusing and disconcerting, since one expects to see an organ, a piano or a singer at the front of the room instead. And unless the front speakers are turned off, the listener is hard put to tell just how much sound is emanating from the rear units, even when he stands next to one of them. Facing front, this listener was generally unconscious of the speakers at the rear-until they were turned off and one dimension of the experience abruptly disappeared.

Probably ambighonics, a term which has been circulated in British and European hi-fi circles and refers to the recreation of the system. Ambiphory is indeed quadriphony (since the developers determined four channels are the minimum necessary for the recreation of a three dimensional space—and more than that number comprise a system less than feasible for home use). Yet most quadriphopy is by no means action phone.

The Ambiphon team creates its tapes via a procedure that involves an smorthodox way of miking. But that's only the beginning. they say, claiming a multiplicity of differences exist between their procedures and equipment (called Aurion System 90) and those used for conventional recordings. They remain mum about most of these.

Don't think that yet another quadriphonic system has been thrown into the magician's hat where too many doves are already tearing at each other's throats. These tapes need no special decoding or demodulating equipment. They can be played on any open-reel recorder that runs at 7½ ips. To experience the spatial effect, of course, you need a quadriphonic deck with four channels of amplification powering four loudspeakers. Yet even in the twochannel mode, its developers claim, the system yields markedly better sound. It certainly should if the specs they claim are at all accurate. These include a signal-tonoise ratio close to 90 dB, distortion they say isn't even measureable on conventional equipment, and a level of tape hiss approaching dead silence. While this listener did no lab testing to confirm those claims, the demonstration was most impressive. The tapes differ very obviously from records, even good records, in terms of naturalness of sound as well as factors described by the specs above.

The first three tapes Ambiphon is marketing were recorded in a small salon where planist Natalie Ryshna played Debussy, Chopin, Prokofiev, Rameau, Schubert and Ravel on a nine foot Bechstein. The performances are said to be as played, with no cutting and splicing. The signal, it is claimed, underwent no alteration whatever-with the crescendos every bit as loud and the diminuendos as quiet as the artist and her instrument produced them. With a list price of \$19.95, each tape includes an alignment section designed to allow the listener to adjust his system for optimum reproduction of the recorded sound.

it will be interesting to see what happens to Ambiphon in its second two years. Whether it will keep its process to itself or offer it via licensing or some other basis to the recording industry at large remains to be seen. Whether the industry will be interested is another question. The kind of quality Ambiphon's principals demand is always expensive, and expensive products just don't appeal to the mass market. At least that's what people who thought the hi-fi industry would never get off the ground used to say.

Bernard Peiffer still speaks with a noticeable accent even though he came to America almost 21 years ago. Friends in his native France urged him to come to the U.S. to seek his musical fortune because, they advised, America was more inclined to accept his rather progressive musical ideas. What he found here was a similar measure of obscurity.

Peiffer's father realized by the time his son was 13 that the lad's head was into music and not conventional schoolwork, so he urged him to pursue music exclusively. Peiffer had been playing piano at age five and even at that age, he recalls, he was already beginning to improvise. He continued his musical studies in Marseille where he won a prize one year as the best pianist. He played for a while in the famous Hot Club of France with Django Reinhardt and Stephane Grappelli, but their alliance did not last long because Peiffer admits that his harmonic ideas were a little more advanced than most people were willing to accept. And that, for the most part, has been the story throughout Bernard Peiffer's all too shrouded career.



became aware of Peiffer through a demo tape he sent to a friend of mine. "Have you ever heard of him?" my friend asked. I pleaded ignorance and listened to the tape. What I heard was an obviously brilliant technician with an intriguing harmonic uniqueness. His choice of tunes was interesting too. The first was the Bill Evans composition "Orbits." Peiffer pretty much emulated Evans' style on this tune. Having never heard Peiffer before I was afraid I was going to hear a great technician, but an imitator. Those fears were dispelled on the next selection, "Greensleeves." This traditional tune has been done by everybody from Rosemary Clooney to Jimmy Durante. But take my word for it, you have never heard it the way Peiffer performs it. Again by restructuring the chords he achieved a remarkable effect. It had more depth and poignancy. Performed on electric plano, both the melody line and the comping behind the bassist's solo was first rate. After "Greensleeves" I began to better appreciate what Bernard Peiffer was all about.

The third offering, "Exodus," an original by Peiffer, showcased him in a moderately avant garde setting. By overdubbing a second piano part, Peiffer deals the listener the coup de grace on the demo tape. The presentation was beautifully conceived: first, a gentle and excellent opener to put you at ease followed by a familiar tune masterfully restructured to reveal new beauty and thereby making you a full fledged convert, and then, a slight deviation of style to show dynamics and his scope of musical knowledge. Whether that thought went into the selection of the music on the tape or not, the effect is achieved.





Pennario's rachmaninoff reissues

Two Sergonics (As combine Lebinard Penmens's earlier recordings of Rachmaninos's Piano Concerto No. 2 in C Minor, Op. 18. with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Erich Leinsdorf (S 68237. \$3.98) and the same composer's Plano Concerto No. 3 to D Minor, Op. 30, with the Philharmonia Grohestra conducted by Walter Susskind (6 60239, \$3.98). Pennario never was a particularly flashy planist and be offers have rather subbound interpretations of Bachmaninoff's two most popular conpertos. I want to bear more of the sound of flesh on the being in this opportory, but Ohore is no quastioning Pennaria's simbore cousicianship and involvement. The opcontings are well-balanced, but rather tacking to brilliance. PEMARKOVSKY: Symphony Ste. 4 in F Minor, Op. 36. Symphony No. 5 in E. Minor, Op. 64. Moscow Radio Symphony Orchestra, Genmady Rozhdestvensky, c. ANGEL MELODINA SR 40254 and 40255, \$6.58 auch.

Blot on the heels of their discs of Tchaillov-Say's first three symphonies and Manfred we have these two LPs containing two more of the Russian master's popular symphonies. Rozhdestvensky must be counted genong the finest conductors of the day, pardicularly in this repertory. Here he is working with a first-rate orchestra of great size with massive, rich strings. I don't particularly care for the horn vibrato, particularly in the exposed agoons movement solo of the Symphony No. 5, but otherwise the brass sound is vibrant and bold. The reproduction is typical of other releases in this series-a big hall sound with much resonance. I look forward to the forthcoming release of the Symphony No. 6.

WAGNER: Excerpts from Parsifal, Siegfried Idyll. London Symphony Orchestra, Sir Adrian Boult, c. ANGEL S 37090, \$6.98.

Here is Volume III in Boult's continuing series of Wagnerian discs for Angel, and it is as successful as the first two. The tender Siegfried Idyll is an appropriate disc-mate for the Parsifal excerpts, which include the Prelude and Transformation Music from Act I and, from Act III, the Prelude, Good

Friday Music and Transformation Scene. Fine sonics, too. If the repertory interests you, you will not be able to find a competing version superior to this.

RAYEL: La Value: Menuel Antique: Mother Goose Ballet (complete); New York Philiharmonic, Pierre Boulez, c. CCLUMBIA M. 32636, \$6.96. La Valse: Rapsodie Espagnole; Bolero; Boston Symphony Orchestra. Soul Cours, c. DEUTSCHE GRAMMOPHON 2530 475, \$7.56.

Both conductors are recording the compiele orchestral works of Ravel for their respective companies; Ozawa is just now beginning his series with the Boston orchestra while Boulez is well along the way. utilizing three different orchestras. Both of these new recordings offer splendid onobjectral playing, although I am not imattessed by the first trombone solo in Oza-655's Bolero which shows a decided lack of imagination. Ozawa's interpretation of La Yalse is, I feel, quite superior to Boulez's. The latter chooses a slow tempo, and it seems as if he is overemphasizing many minor details. All of the Boulez performances would benefit from a more natural big half sound than is provided by Columbia's engineers. Ozawa's disc has a more distant aural perspective. There is plenty of impact in timpani and bass drum, but, with the exception of the side drum in Boiero, which sounds overly prominent right from the beginning of the piece, the remainder of the percussion is back too far.

Repetidio Espagnole is the top performance on Ozawa's LP, and is played with remarkable virtuosity. All of the works on both of these new LPs can be heard in more effective recordings elsewhere: Mother Goose on Angel with Andre Cluytens leading a enoroughly idiomatic performance with the Paris Conservatory Orchestra; La Valse, also on Angel with Cluytens, or other versions by Monteux, Munch or Ormandy; the Rapsodie with Boulez, Cluytens, Martinon or Stokowski. The popular Bolero can be heard on many excellent recordings and a few superb ones: Martinon, Ormandy on Columbia, and, best of all, a hand-picked large studio orchestra led by Charles Gerhardt available only by mail from the Readers Digest, the only recording of this music that sonically captures its total dynamic range and interpretively boasts stylish playing and a properly slow tempo.

SHOCKING OPERAS


A new recording of the final scene from Strauss's Salome, issued by London, is very much worth investigation, but not because of the contribution of the soprano. Anja Silja, who is accompanied by the Vienna Philharmonic directed by Christoph von Dohnanyi, is not in her best form here (London OS 26397, \$6.98).

In addition to the Strauss, the record also contains a thirty-five minute suite of music from Alban Berg's Lulu. Both operas are shockers with the heroine meeting an untimely death; Salome by being crushed by shields and Lulu by the hand of Jack the Ripper. The Berg is almost entirely orchestral; those who can remember Antal Dorati's old Mercury recording of this will miss Lulu's death scream, a terrifying sound on the older recording. The glory of this new disc is its orchestral playing and quality of reproduction. The Vienna Philharmonic has never sounded as powerful as this, or been as well recorded. Strings are full and rich, brass glistens, percussion has impact and clarity and everything seems perfectly balanced.

Silja's career thus far has featured some of the most demanding roles in the soprano repertory: Salome, Elektra and Brünnhilde. She has a fine disc on London of excerpts from Tosca sung in German, and it is unfortunate that she is not in as good vocal condition on this new Berg-Strauss LP. Perhaps to help camouflage her weaknesses some extra reverberation has been added to her voice; she sometimes sounds as if she is in a separate resonant room some distance from the orchestra. I find that interpretively she does little with the role of Salome and, as there is little to enjoy in her vocalizing, for me the superb orchestra is the sole justification for owning this disc. But when the orchestra sounds like it does here, that is sufficient justification. The Salome excerpt begins with the passage as she awaits the execution and continues to the end of the opera. Texts are provided for the Strauss but not for the Berg. For Salome at its most powerful don't overlook either of the monophonic Welitsch performances of the finale, or the fine complete recordings in stereo by Nilsson and Caballé.

CONCERTOS BY HOROWITZ

RCA has issued a handsome four-LP monophonic set that offers what they call "Horowitz-His Complete Recorded Concerto Repertoire." Included in the set are the Rachmaninoff Concerto No. 3 recorded with Fritz Reiner and a studio orchestra in May of 1951, Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 5 in E Flat, Op. 73 "Emperor," also with Reiner, recorded in April of 1952, and two recordings with Arturo Toscanini and the NBC Symphony Orchestra, Tchaikovsky's Concerto No. 1 in B Flat Minor, Op. 23, recorded in 1943 during a War Bond Concert broadcast, and the Concerto No. 2 in B Flat. Op. 83 of Brahms, recorded in May of 1940. Pianistically these performances are stunning; Horowitz is in a class by himself. After hearing him play the Tchaikovsky Concerto No. 1 other performances seem dull indeed, especially after hearing the particularly tense, dynamic performance on these records. The Brahms is a powerful, yet serene, interpretation played by Horowitz with fingers of steel. Of the two Reiner performances the Beethoven is the more successful because the Rachmaninoff is accompanied by an orchestra that sounds very undermanned, and the reproduction offers a clangy piano tone very much in the foreground. But even with its faults, this is an album that should be in every piano collection (RCA CRM4-0914, four records, \$20.94).







People who find architecture the most reepaining art of any period will be glad to begin that architects are included and, indeed, some of the most penetrating remarks in the book are those on the architects. This is gorticularly true of Theodore M. Bream's essay on Le Corbusier which, making no attempt to sound totally committed to objectivity, pronounces the polyrimage chapet. Notre-Desse-du-Haut, "one of the most impressive objects built by modern man." A remarkable omission is that of Basil Spence, architect of the new Coventry Cathedral which, liked or not, should have put the designer in the league for entry in thes book-

The illustrations are all a black and while and nearly all from the Museum of Modern Ant in New York, and I'm not at all sure that the book is really helped by them (Lewis Carroll to the contrary, notwithstanding). This is a good introduction to the study of the ever-growing field of 20th century art. and it's a good, comfortable size.

Nobody Like Nilsson

In a recent issue, **Time Magazine** stated that Birgit Nilsson "admits to 56 years." The "Musical Book Of Days," the handsome calendar printed annually by the publishers of **Forecast!**, lists the diva's date of arrival on this planet as May 17, 1922, which would set the renowned Swedish artist's age at 53.

Whichever is right, this is the month of her birth, and there is cause for celebration. To my way of thinking, it is a rare privilege just to be alive and possessed of a set of functioning ears while this supreme Wagnerian soprano is at the peak of her incredible powers. There is nobody like Nilsson!

Time, whose critics are notoriously hard to please, poured ecstatic ink over its Music Pages last March 3, when Nilsson, appearing infrequently with the Metropolitan Opera this season, accomplished a miracle. Leonie Rysanek, who had been scheduled to sing several Sieglindes in Die Walküre during runs of the Ring Cycle, fell ill and was unable to appear. Nilsson, who has been tearing up audiences the world over as Brünnhilde in the same opus for years, was in town. And available. Schuyler Chapin, the Met's general manager, approached her and asked — would she? The

to forget her other triumphs. She does Aïda, Macbeth, Turandot, Salome and Elektra, too, just to mention a few in her bag of marvels.

Born in Skane, the southernmost of Sweden's twenty-six provinces, "where the air is crisp and fresh, and the wind blows from the sea," Birgit Nilsson passed nearly a quarter of a century on the family farm in Svenstad. An only child, she spent those early years as a working farmer, picking sugar beets for the most part. Clearly, it was nearness to the soil, this affinity for the land, that endowed her with robust health, a warm and friendly nature and a solidity of character and purpose that provided the rock-like foundation for her climb to unbelievable musical heights. She was 24 when she began her studies at the Royal Academy in Stockholm, and already then she possessed a fervent devotion to her art and an awesome capacity for the long, hard effort required to attain her goals.

As one who has been a devoted admirer of this Superb Swede almost from the time she first appeared on the musical horizon, and who has zealously followed her work



Stunning Swede had not sung the role for 18 years, but she agreed, and lucky ticket holders were rewarded with a Sieglinde the likes of which Wagner buffs had never experienced. To quote **Time** again: "Those who heard Nilsson sing it will not forget it, and quite possibly never hear it sung right again." The same writer referred to her as "the only great Wagnerian soprano today."

Which, on reflection, is an understatement. As is every other accolade offered her. It is simply impossible to summon words that do justice to the Nilsson artistry. There is no singer, male or female, on any operatic stage that can match her or even approach her. She stands alone.

Unfortunately, Nilsson is in such great demand for the Wagnerian repertoire in the world's top opera houses, that one tends

in person, through recordings and by radio broadcasts, I find it difficult to isolate all but one Nilsson highlight. Except for an Aïda, several Turandots and a handful of Salomes and Elektras, I have heard Nilsson almost exclusively in the Wagnerian roles. And I find something almost symbolic about a particular Tristan that took place at the Met on December 28, 1959 (a Saturday matinee broadcast, by the way) when Ramon Vinay was scheduled to partner her Isolde. Vinay was ailing, and survived only through the first act. When the curtain rose on Act Two, Karl Liebel was the Tristan. But Herr Liebel, too, wasn't in the best of health, and for the final episode of the afternoon a third Tristan, Albert Da Costa, had to be pressed into service. Nilsson outsang them all. She was, and is, equal to any odds.

Except for the recently deceased Wolfgang

Windgassen, and the hapily active Jess Thomas and Jon Vickers—where are the Tristans today? Vickers, who comes within an inch of loathing all Wagner, practically had to be forced into Tristan, and when he sang the role for the first time, in South America, Nilsson was possibly the happiest person in the house. Here, at last, was a tenor who could at least remain audible to the last curtain!

The great diva has appeared in Baltimore on several occasions, but there was one event I'll never forget. This was the "highlight" I referred to a moment ago, and for obvious reasons it practically obliterates all the Götterdämmerungs and Siegfrieds and Walküres, even Tristans, in my album.

The date was March 5, the year was 1962, and the place was the Lyric Theater. The Metropolitan has been coming to Baltimore for spring performances for years, but this was a thing of the past. The Baltimore Opera Club, sponsors of the Met's visits, joined forces with the Peabody Conservatory of Music to stage the first entirely new production in America in more than a decade of **Tristan Und Isolde.**

To conduct, with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra in the pit, there was Laszlo Halasz, Hungarian-born founder and for twelve years director of the New York City Opera, who had made his American debut conducting the same opera with Flagstad and Melchior. To stage the work there was Herbert Graf, for many years the leading stage director for the Met, and then general manager of the State Opera in Zürich. To create the sets there was the Peabody's gifted regular designer who has since risen to eminence for his imaginative and highly original work at the Met and for the legitimate theater — Ming Cho Lee.

... a Sieglinde the likes of which Wagner buffs had never experienced.

For the cast, the heldentenor of the Vienna Staatsoper, Sebastian Feiersinger, was flown from Austria to Baltimore to sing Tristan. Blanche Thebom, statuesque American beauty from the Met roster, was signed for Brangaene, and her illustrious colleague from the same house, Hugh Thompson, was engaged for Melot. Paul Schoeffler, a veteran star of the San Francisco and Vienna State Opera companies, agreed to make one of his last appearances in this country as Kurvenal. And Thomas O'Leary, the American who had built such a brilliant career for himself in Europe (mainly at the Frankfurt State Opera in Germany) came by air to Baltimore to assume the role of King Mark.

And for Isolde — there was Birgit Nilsson!

I was then on the staff of the Peabody Conservatory, and at this late date I must make a confession. For a week or so prior to that **Tristan** I did very little to earn my salary. Rehearsals were held in the school's North Hall, and elsewhere, and I simply couldn't tear myself away. It was intriguing, watching that masterpiece being put together.

And it was especially rewarding to watch, and hear, Birgit Nilsson at close range.

I found her to be a warm, friendly creature, butching with good humor, radiating a joy for life and music, considerate of her fellow artists, and willing to spend endless hours moiding a new shape and form for opera she had already sung so often she could sing the score backwards.

And that soice?

Opera singers traditionally save their vocal resources for the big moment, the real thing, using only half-voice for rehearsals. Nilsson, I am convinced, used only a tiny fraction, a tenth, of her reserves those days. Once, only once, did she pull out all the stops. That was in the second act Love Duet, and had she permitted that glorious voice to soar at full strength for more than a few moments, I am certain she would have shattered every window in Baltimore for miles around. It is impossible to comprehend the awesome dimensions of the follsson voice unless one has stood within arm's length of that silvery cascade. It retains its lustrous beauty, even as it soars over the massed instrumentation Wagner demands! "Fabulous volume," is the way one critic described it, "supported by brains."

She stands alone.

On that March 5 of 1962, a fearful snowstorm descended on the city, and by curtain time Baltimore had pretty much ground to a standstill. Even so, the faithful traipsed through the white to fill every seat in the house. And how they were rewarded! The Baltimore Symphony Orchestra played like a pack of angels, singers in minor roles performed with seraphic skill, even the stage hands outdid themselves. And near midnight, with Feiersinger's convulsive thrashing ended and Tristan's death achieved - there was Nilsson, still endowed with fresh, full voice, her poignant Liebestod floating with whispered ease to the last row of the balcony, every note perfectly in place, each sound exquisitely fo-

You can see, I think, why I pile this atop the heap of all my Nilsson memories. You can understand, I suspect, why though countless thrilling moments come alive for me at the mere mention of her name, this Tristan, with its days of preparation, comes to the fore when I look at the calendar and realize that this month Birgit Nilsson passes another milestone.


Whether 53 or 56 or anywhere between or near, Birgit Nilsson has become the true living legend. She evokes the most lavish praise, a gushing stream of superlatives, wherever in the world she chooses to sing — and it is all deserved. I would hope that for her time might stand still. Failing this, we can only be grateful that her art has been ours to enjoy, and we can wish that the years will be kind and she will reign in the realm of the Valkyries for a long time to come. As it is, there is something of the immortal about her.

Hail, Birgit Nilsson, greatest of them all!
