



The "March of Time" will resume its progress over the nation-KMOX-Columbia network wide Friday from 6:30 to 7 p. m.

A cast of fifty players under the direction of Donald Stauffer will re-enact the chief news developments of each week and an orchestra under the guidance of Howard Barlow will furnish the suitable musical background for each of the news dramatizations, as well as serving as a "curtain" between the various news scenes. The scripts will be prepared by Thomas Everitt, who has been spending the summer travelling through various parts of the country in order to familiarize himself with local conditions.

## **NBC's Music Appreciation Course** Had 6,000,000 Auditors Last Year

Copies of Walter Damrosch's 1932-33 Music Appreciation Course manual, as well as the students note book, are ready for mailing and soon will reach public school teachers, music instructors and club leaders.

It is anticipated that more than 75,000 copies of the manual will be supplied this year before the beginning of the Music Appreciation Hour, to be conducted by Dr. Damrosch for the fifth consecutive season over National Broadcasting Company networks.

Several thousand additional copies of the manual are expected to be mailed out after the opening of the weekly series, on Friday, October 14, over a combined coast-to-coast NBC network.
