France Regulates Air

France Regulates Air
PARIS.—Under a new system of control, all Radio stations in France are to be put under the general administration of the post telegraph and telephone service and the Ministry of the Interior. No Radio establisment for sending or receiving signals can function except in accord with the new regulations. A commission of 44 members is to advise on all subjects covered by the decree or delegated to them by the ministers.

One of the objects announced by the report of the President of the Republic is to set up a greater government control in order to establish a coherent, rational and powerful Radio system which can combat foreign propagands through the dissemination of French ideas and civilization.

COMMISSION HEARS ONLY "NO, DONT!"

PUBLIC HEARINGS BEAR NO PRACTICAL RESULTS

Every Phase Discussed by Experts But Each Suggestion Encounters Vigorous Opposition

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Membors of the Federal Radio Commission expressed regret at the end of the four days of public hearings that no practical suggestion had been made for immediate relief of the chaotic conditions by any of the numerous personages who had made an appearance. The first suggestion that the broadcast band be widened met with a storm of protest. The same fate followed the proposal to decrease the separation between frequencies. It also was declared impractical oshici locations of various frequencies to avoid second harmonics and there was no agreement whatever as to what could be done in regard to a division of time. What about limitation of power? The answer was emphatic that the commission should make no arbitrary ruling in this regard. However, it was indicated that a power curb should be put on certain so-called "local stations." Hodged in by these negative demands the final inference seemed to be that some stations should be regulated as to a time schedule when they could broadcast or that there should be a material reduction to the number of stations permitted to have licenses.

200 "Expert Witnesses"

Some two hundred of the "best minds" of the radio manufacturers, broadcasters, and listeners assembled in this city on March 29 and for four days told the recently organized Federal Radio Commission what they thought of the various problems presented.

The subjects on which there was more or less discussion included: widening the broadcasting band, limitation of power-reducing frequency separation, simultaneous broadcasting with the same frequency, chain broadcasting, division of time, consolidation of broadcasting service, limiting the number of stations and ageneral discussion. Each one of these subjects was discussed from the various viewpoints of the different interests until the commission certainly must have a good cross section of the best thought on these subjects.

MONTREAL, Que.—Quebec City, which has been called a "dead spot" in Radioland, has just been brought to life by the opening of the new broadcasting station CNRQ. It is the eleventh in the chain of broadcasting stations established by the Canadian National railways. It takes the 340.7 meter wave.

In all its broadcasts this station will be connected by telegraph or telephone wire with the studios of the Montreal or Ottawn studios and on special occasion with CNRT at Toronto. Not only are the Canadian lines taking active part in broadcasting but deluxe trains carry receivers.

U. S. Pacific Coast Stations Leap to Atlantic By Air Relay Over WAAM

Three Remote Receivers Working From Same 150-Foot Aerial Scout for Signals, Reproduce, Amplify and Re-Transmit for All Eastern Listeners

NEW YORK—First aid to DX fans is offered by Paul Godley through WAAM, Newark, N. J. Many Eastern listeners find it very difficult to pick up Pacific coast stations, owing to interference and lack of equipment for fine tuning. Station WAAM has launched a Saturday night pilot service whereby the far-distant stations are brought in, either by tuning in WAAM or by following the directions received through the station. "We have erected a receiving outpost at Cedar Grove, about nine miles northwest of Newark," said Mr. Godley, "and from that point the programs we intercept are sent over land wires to the transmitter at Newark and put on the air so that the Radio fans throughout our area, may receive them without truuble. The California stations begin coming in at 10:30, but they are not at their best until after 12 o'clock.

California Comes Strong
"Among the stations we find most satisfactorily are KFI and KHJ, Los Angeles; KGO, Oakland; KGW, Portland, Ore; KGA, Denver; CZE, Mexico City; WBAP; Fort Worth, and WFAA, Dallas, Texas. Station KFI is hy far the easiest to get, as it comes in very loud."

The antenna is described as about 40 feet high and the wire 150 feet long, between a chimney and an olm tree. A counterpoise is strung beneath the antenna. Three receivers are employed, all operating from the same antenna and with six tubes. One is tuned to WAAM's 263 meter wave; the second is used as a scout to hunt new stations, while the third is pouring signals through two loudspeakers into a microphone connected by wire with the WAAM transmitter.

System Is Explained Mr. Godley explains the system further,

"We use two loudspeakers of the cone type connected in series so that we can set both the low and high tones. The loudspeakers are placed about eight feet from the microphone.

loudspeakers are placed about eight feet from the microphone.

"Subsequent to the tuning in of any station instructions are given to listeners as to how to get this station on receivers other than the one being, used at the pick-up point. This enables Radio owners to pick the station up direct on their own receivers, and should serve as an incentive for "fishing" for additional wost coast stations.

"The site of Cedar Grove was selected because of the convenience of telephone wire facilities. After the various stations are picked up on the Cedar Grove receiver they are reproduced in loudspeakers which are placed before a microphone and sent over telephone lines to the studio of WAAM, whence they are reradiated on a wave length of 263 meters.

"The scout machine is used to fish around through the air in order that material of interest fit for rebroadcasting can be spotted. In this manner a continual change of scenery is available. The operator at the scout machine having spotted 'KGO announces it to the operator on the rebroadcasting machine. The rebroadcasting set is then swung over to KGO subsequent to announcements, whereupon the scout machine begins to hunt for another station of interest."

Rebroadcasting heard in this way is spread throughout the eastern area with reports coming from listeners scattered from Florida to Maine.



The Houston Post, Houston, Texas, romped home with the exclusive channel of 296.9 meters-1010 kilocycles. Of course it wasn't a very favorable airway passage and anyway it was only a 750 watt station and probably escaped notice with the other two. The popular Northwest station, WCCO, Minneapolis, won the eighth prize of exclusiveness on 416.4 meters-720 kilocycles with 5,000 watts. It can be said to the credit of KOA that it was unselfish enough to separate itself for several hours on Thursday cvening each week in favor of WJAZ, Chicago, a station wandering around without an aerial outlet. This unexpected kindness on the part of one of the members of the Big Four may have turned the mind of the owner of WJAZ—thus sending him into a life of piracy and ripping the broadcasting ship wide open. KYW at Chicago was not as fortunate as its sister stations and had to divide time with the college station WHA at Madison, Wisconsin, on the choice band of 535.4 meters-560 kilocycles. WHA was silent with its 750 watts four nights a week and only three nights spread cheer to the world between the hours of nine and ten in the evening. THE final of the season's concerts sponsored by the Victor Company has come and gone, leaving behind a pleasant recollection of a program offering talent of extra high order and grateful diversity. These concerts established a precedent last year from which there has been no backsliding—rather an effort at improvement. Our good friend (to the Radio audience) Reinald Werrenrath sang "Duna" in his accustomed manner, which is equivalent to saying it was sung as few baritones render it, along with other numbers of merit. With possibly an exception or two, no baritone appearing before any mike sings with so uniformly good intonation and tone production throughout his range as does Werrenrath. It is undoubtedly true that in his repertoire there are selections of equal attraction to any sung that evening, yet the fact remains of his obligation to sing those songs for which records have been made. Mine. D'Alvarez possesses a contralto voice with very few imperfections, singing with expression and musicianship compositions portraying varied emotion. There is a peculiar quality to Mme. Jeritza's tones which make one think of the sparkle of a diamond—not too hard, though brilliant. Her singing of "The Erl King" lacked the poignant tragedy of a Bispham or a Schumann-Heink while retaining an excellent diction. So gracing a farewell to her unseen audience should spare any reference to her English.

We listened to another of the Atwater Kent programs in which a single artist was featured, Mr. Martinelli. However effective this great tenor is in operatic performances, it would seem that a whole program's dependence upon his singing was insufficient. There can be no question of the balance or pleasing nature of his program, yet there is secure basis for stating that his tones are without especial beauty and that too frequently they lacked complete support. Nervousness may have contributed to the latter difficulty, but not entirely, for such unpleasant tonal production is evident when no mike is present. In the course of this particular program the concert orchestra took on a prominence it almost never secures in such features. Naturally, listeners do not expect a group of highly paid artists to appear on each successive program, though they do hope for more than a single "star" in order that the program is aved any monotony.

Station KDKA, Pittsburgh, presents a feature which should find a cosmospolitan hearing, its "musical hour." After listening to hours upon hours of broadcasting that medium for Paul Whiteman's commercial benefit, or being bored with lectures upon subjects so comprehensive as religion and chickens, we like to sit back comfortably to enjoy—really enjoy—a session before the speaker. Such a period is this music hour from KDKA. The selections are not taxing either to nerves or tired brains; they soothe and afford rest with pleasure. Try them.

Those able to listen in to a special program by the National Broadcasters, the manufacturers' banquet in New York, not only had very good talent to entertain them but a feature quite unique. It was finally anounced that a surprise was to be presented in the form of a vocal duet with Milton Cross and Graham MacNamee, who samg "Oh. That Wc Two Were Maying." Both of these well known announcers are musicians of considerable ability, even if their appearances are usually heralded as directors of the "next feature." Incidentally, Milton's tenor and Graham's baritone are of about the same shade, giving a hlending entirely harmonious. ing entirely harmonious.
